
















aturday. September 30, was the College Union's 10th Annual International Festival. It was a sensory extravaganza of people.

foods, costumes, performances and objects from all around the world. Davidson's 60 international

students sponsored booths picturing their homelands with art, photographs, and costumes, and offering samples of traditional foods. The festival was the largest ever, with between 250 and 300 people attending.

International hosts offered visitors an opportunity to have their hands decorated with "mendhi," a henna dye used in

India, to have their names written in Arabic, and to learn native games. Participants wore native dress to greet the spectators. At the Indian booth, Chris Martin served hot "parathas," a type of bread. A special performance was given by Francis Kofi, a world-reknowned Ghanaian drummer and dancer. Besides the Ghanaian show, there was also an hour of student performances that included Japanese pop songs. Bharatnatym

dancing, and Korean love songs. Kenny Lee, a Davidson student form Inchon, Korea, sang a Korean ballad.

Nick Kallan, a Davidson senior, helped out with the Greek booth and toured all the rest. "My grandparents were Greek and I am a second-

generation American," he said.
"I went to Greek school when I was younger and was so embarrassed to have to go that I didn't really listen. Now I am kicking myself for not learning more. I am proud of my heritage and I am glad to be here telling others about it ... besides, it's hip to be ethnic."

In the Europe/Middle East room, sat Chris Machon,

surrounded by Polish pottery, food, and art. His Poland booth included the nations traditional drink: vodka. "People think that Russian vodka is strong, but Polish vodka is the best because it is made from the heart of the Polish people," joked Machon.

The festival provided a time to share traditions with others and an opportunity for Americans to learn more about other cultures.



Shakin' Things Up at Dean Rusk

With Ambassador Brown at the helm, the Dean Rusk Program expands to new horizons... by Eric Sapp

What do an Israeli diplomat, an American Congressman, a Chinese political activist, and a delegate from the State Department have in common? They have all spoken at Davidson, courtesy of the Dean Rusk Program. To many, this is what the Dean Rusk Program is -- a group that is always putting up fliers advertising various famous international speakers at 7 pm in the 900 Room or Carolina Inn. However, as Ambassador Ken Brown (the new director) put it, "Dean Rusk is much more than just great speakers." Nothing could be more true. Bringing international speakers to Davidson is only one of the many things the Dean Rusk Program does.

Secondly, the Dean Rusk Program gives out tens of thousands

of dollars to Davidson students each year in effort to encourage tis international experience. This major funding (which everyone is eligible for) has pushed Davidson to have the ninth highest percentage of students who study abroad.


The Dean Rusk Program also funds a large number of student organizations and outreach programs, like the SAC. The Student Advisory Committee meets regularly to organize and suggest Dean Rusk events. Members of the SAC wine and dine (or at least dine) speakers after picking them up from the airport and attend special pre-talk lunches and dinners with speakers.

The Dean Rusk Program also puts out several publications. Along with the <u>Toilet Paper</u>, weekly international news columns are also

featured in <u>The Davidsonian</u> and <u>The Worldly News</u>. A new biannual publication will present comical and the resting stories of the culture-clash esquenced by Davidson students and professors studying abroad.

From sending students to the International Women's Conference in China to taking students to hear the Dali Lama, the program probably affects a greater number and a wider variety of students than any other college organization. Ambassador Brown summed up its importance: "In an academic institution of Davidson's caliber, it is important for us to increase international awareness. No matter what career a Davidson student chooses, he/she will find that they are affected by what goes on outside our boarders. We need to understand that."

Habitat for Humanity is a common name for most Americans. It is a nonprofit ecumenical Christian housing organization that works in partnership with people in need to eliminate substandard housing. Habitat houses are built with donations using both volunteer and skilled labor. While building a house, the donors, volunteers, and home owners build relationships as well.

The idea for a Davidson College sponsored house was the result of a spark that was started by various groups of students and staff all over campus. From a Habitat trip to Jacksonville last spring break to a leadership conference in Charleston

in May 1995 to a meeting of the Patterson Court service coordinators in September, the interest expressed in this project was tremendous. Slowly but surely hammerheads on yellow pieces of paper began to appear in windows and on doors all over campus. Wildeat Habitat was underway.

The project began when Catherine Turner and Smita Donthamsetty decided to put the project in motion by forming the Habitat House Committee. The Committee was comprised of various faculty, students, and staff who have coordinated the entire project. Some of the events that have taken place for the project include Homeruns for Habitat in October, the FLAG

fashion show in November, the Habitat Rally and Variety Show in December. The 1996 spring semester will involve the complete building of the house.

The Wildcat Habitat project embraces the spirit of service to which Davidson aspires in preparing "young men and women for productive and meaningful lives of leadership and service in a complex world." The main hope of the Habitat House Committee for this project is that it will bring together the Davidson community. With this project, we have not only built a house, but we have also made windows through which we can see each other clearly.

EDICATION, DONATION, DEVOTION

Project Life is an organization founded by students with the dual goals of community education and participation in the movement to expand the number of potential blood marrow donors. Headed by senior Sarah Lindsey, this year's drive succeeded in raising enough money to fund the typing of the 300 students and faculty who donated blood.

Lindsey cites the "at least five or six donors that have been typed at Davidson in recent years" as incentive for the college community to get involved in Project Life.

This fall, Davidson added another bone marrow donor to this list. Junior Brian Boyd drove with his mother to North Carolina Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem on Friday, September 29 to undergo the operation to remove some of his healthy bone marrow.

Boyd found out from the Red Cross that he was a first level match during final exams at the end of his sophomore year. Several weeks later, after another series of tests, he found out that his blood matched that of a twenty-nine year old female patient in need of a transplant. He received complete information about the donation process at that time.

When Brian returned to Davidson in the fall, he underwent the standard physical, EKG, and other tests necessary to confirm his health before the surgery. Then he became one of the growing number of people who have had the opportunity to donate marrow after participating in Davidson's Project Life Bone Marrow Drive.

The operation took twice as long as the usual 45 to 90 minutes due to "my exceptionally dilute bone marrow," but Boyd recovered quickly. He returned to his usual pace shortly after his operation, saying, "I needed to go back to class. I had a paper due on Monday."

Brian knows that his recipient is divorced with three children, and he can communicate with her through anonymous letters.



Crazy for the Cats

Basketball Talent Thrills Community

A sea of red and black predominated Mar. 3 in points, conference foes by 20, and won 19 games the Greensboro Coliseum, as heavily favored Davidson met Western Carolina for the Southern Conference championship and a ticket to the NCAA basketball tournament.

Many students put their Spring Break plans on hold and traveled en mass to Greenshoro. "Davidson was well-represented by all classes, alf races, all majors, all houses," said 1995 student body president Bill Gullan, "We were there, loud, and proud."

But even with the Wildcat following and the team's efforts, a 69-60 loss snapped a 19-game winning streak and sent disappointed Davidson to their second National Invitational Tournament in three years, where the South Carolina Gamecocks ended a magical 25-5 campaign for Davidson.

The potent combination of veteran experience and youthful exuberance steamrolled through the regular season, going 23-3 overall and 14-0 in the Southern, becoming the first squad to post an undefeated league mark in 21 years.

They dismantled opponents by an average of 18

in a row from Dec. to Mar., the second longest winning stint in school history.

The Wildcat's domination garnered regional and national media attention, the Charlotte Observer called the Wildcats "a team to get excited about and to dream dreams about," while Dick Vitale, ESPN's coforful basketball analyst, energetically promoted Davidson on his telecasts.

The campaign ended with defeat, but hoops hysteria which swept campus in '95-96 will not soon be forgotten. Following their Senior Day comeback victory over Marshall, the seniors saluted students and fans for their constant backing throughout the season.

Davidsonian columnist David Mortlock wrote, "I have fallen in love with not just our basketball team, but with the idea that they were going to make Davidson recognizable to the world. The magic of the season lay not with their impressive wins but with the hope and excitement they gave to us all."


CAKE RACE


tive and qualitative overview of cro and macroeconomics and ear metrics allows seniors to grad with a bang in terms of workload achievement.



students were not deceived.



ach professor of the Spanish department focused on a different area of literature and culture. Dr. Luis Pena, the department chair, specialized in Latin American Twentieth Century narrative, film, and Mexican nationalism. Dr. Alberto Hernandez - Chiroldes taught classes focusing on Nineteenth Century Hispanoamerican literature and culture. Dr. Kemp's forte was modern Spain with special interest in Spanish theater. Dr. Ramon Figueroa, the newest addition to the Spanish department, taught classes in Spanish Golden Age literature. Magdalena Pena, the 1995 winner of the Jefferson award, specialized in women's studies. Cecilia Montero dedicated herself to nurturing those students beginning their studies.

In A.T. students had the opportunity to communicate in Spanish outside of the classroom setting and learned that statements such as "I do not like to climb mountains with ropa" does not mean without a rope but rather without clothing. Students were also given the opportunity to experience Hispanic culture first hand. Some professors offered study abroad programs in the summer, such as the Davidson trips to Guadalajara, Mexico and to Central America. The latter program included travel throughout several countries and participation in various service projects. Other students chose to spend a semester or two in a foreign Spanish-speaking country. All students who studied abroad returned to Davidson with a new perspective and a new accent.

Students who majored in Spanish graduated with a profound knowledge of Spain and Latin America. They began studying literature from the Middle Ages and finished with readings from the Twentieth century. They related the poetry, theater, essays and novels they read to the history and cultures of the countries studied. After proving their proficiency in the language, the students each got to chose a topic on which to write a thesis.

Each professor made a point to be available for majors and non-majors alike. They turned a seemingly monotonous subject into an exciting adventure. Perhaps that is why so many students continued to take Spanish courses beyond the core requirements.


large events.




Phi Gamma Delta




Coach Betsy Pryor reflects, "We



The Davidson men and women swimming and diving teams again made great strides in building an improving program during the 1995-1996 campaign. Head Coach Rich DeSelm, Assistants Sam Jalet, Ted Hantan, William Robert and volunteer coach Ken Vogt continued their attempt to lead the Wildcars to success.

Although their dual meet record was 1–9-1, the women, lead by senior co-captains Katharine Welling and diver Meg Bentley. Men's Basketball

When the pluses and minuses are all weighed, the Davidson College's 1995-96 basketball season should be remembered more for the accomplishments and excellence than the Wildcat's 100-73 loss to South Carolina at Columbia in the first round of the National Invitational Tournament.

It was a stunning end to an otherwise outstanding season for the Wildcats, who finished 25-5 overall-second highest win total in school history and went 14-0 in the Southern Conference regular season race, winning league's North Division championship.

"It was a magical year filled with memories and accomplishments that everyone associated with the program will remember proudly," said Coach Bob McKillop. "Despite the season-ending and not getting an NCAA bid, we won 25 games, had a 19-game win streak and went undefeated in conference play. These are hallmarks of excellence this team demonstrated consistently throughout the year. It was encouraging to see the way the Davidson community embraced these players. We are proud that our players earned this affection by what they did on the court and did in the community."

Five experienced seniors — forward Brandon Williams, forward Quinn Harwood, guard Chris Alpert, guard Jeff Anderson, and center Mark McGuire — blended effectively with solid underclass standouts to form one of the most dominant teams in recent Southern Conference history, building a reputation for defensive excellence.

During most of the year, the Cats led the Southern Conference in field goal percentage, defense (.422) and scoring defense (68.2) while averaging 12 steals and forcing an average of 22 turnovers. They were among the nation's top 10 in scoring (84.3) and scoring margin (16.1).

"A lot of our success would be attributed to the seniors. Their experience and leadership were keys. They helped keep us focused," said McKillop. "But we also needed our depth and flexibility to establish our style of defense. This was the first year we've had the numbers to do that."

The success was enough for McKillop to earn Southern Conference Coach of the Year honors from both the Southern Conference Sports Media Association and the coaches in the conference.

Williams and Harwood both crossed the 1,000 point level in career scoring. Williams finished his career with 1,505 points — ninth on the Cats' all-time list — and Harwood finished with 1,027 for 29th place all-time. Point guard Chris Alpert finished as the Cats' all-time assist leader with 542 and second in career steals with 174.

Williams was named to the Southern Conference all-conference team for the second time in three years. Harwood was a member of the all-league team as well. Alpert earned a spot on the Media Association all-conference team. Williams and Harwood also were named to the Southern Conference all-tournament team.

Although the 25 wins will probably be one this year's seniors most enduring achievements, they will also be remembered for having won more games than any other class in college history. Williams, Harwood, Alpert, McGuire, and Anderson won 75 games and never had a losing season.

Where do the Cats go from here?

"We've got a lot of holes to fill," McKillop said. "We lost a lot of experience, heart and production. But we've got some experienced players returning, notably Ray Minlend, Narcisse Ewodo and Mark Donnelly, Ali Ton, Chadd Holmes, David Burns, and Ben Ebong add significantly to that core."


Coach Filar says, "This season was one of success and growth. We committed ourselves to a goal (N.B.G.) and our entire team remained focused on achieving it."

The mer crossed the 2000 meter mark in 7:46.24, a two minute improvement over their 9:48.9 Clemson finish.

Two years ago a place on the starting line was no more than a lofty goal, and the club measured success by how far they rowed from the boathouse during practice. Now with two regattas behind them, the Wildcats look forward to bringing home their first victory.

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
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
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EDITOR'S PAGE
