## Servicing the community

- s service is valued more highly on the Davidson application than most, this campus honors a unique commitment to community work that enriches students' time here and their lives forever after.

Holding a fair at the beginning of each semester, the Reach Out committe offers dozens of service options for students to get involved in anything from the Adopt a Grandparent program to the Uptown Men's Shelter in Charlotte. Through such programs as Youth at Risk, there are a number of offerings for tutors to volunteer in elementary schools, middle schools, and high schools in Davidson, Mooresville, and Charlotte.

Students can also work with children in more than an academic context, by volunteering to be
a big buddy to an elementary school student or aiding children in art or recreation at the Ada Jenkins Center.

On a larger scale, Davidson is involved with the nationally affiliated "Into the Streets" organization, and this year, our campus strove to complete 2000 hours of service in a month long "Into the Streets" program, in celebration of the millenium. In efforts to accomplish this goal, students made peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for area shelters, and sorted 45,000 pounds of potatoes to distribute to the hungry, among other things.

So, whether students are volunteering for the Project Life bone marrow drive or walking in the Relay for Life, they are always aware, involved, and committed to service on and around campus.

though there had been rumors of a new Student Union and new dorm on campus, students were not prepared for what they saw when they returned to Davidson after fall break. The new Union is designed to include an ampitheater, a post office and copy center, an exercise and fitness center, a performing arts theater with over 500 seats, a new and improved Union Cafe, and more.

Although Davidson no longer retains this strict Presbytarian affiliation, there is a huge Christian presence on campus. Whether it is through praise and worship music or organized Bible studies, many students enhance their Davidson experiences and their lives thereafter with Christian fellowship.

Lots of students do actually manage to roll out of bed for church on Sunday mornings, but a variety of weekly activities allow them to enrich their spiritual lives throughout the week, as well. The DCPC Weekly College Worship group meets in the Union on Sunday nights, and Andy Baxter, associate pastor of Davidson United Methodist Church, leads a Methodist fellowship group at his house on Monday nights.

Students also attend Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) on Tuesday nights, InterVarsity Large Group Christian fellowship on

Wednesday nights (with smaller family Bible study groups that meet throughout the week), and Interfaith on Thursday nights. Other students are also involved in Catholic Campus Ministries and Sanctuary, and some hold Young Life leadership positions at area high schools.

Finally, students also enjoy less organized opportunities for prayer and worship, such as chapel gatherings Thursday nights led by Mark DiCristina and Dave Tolley. Here, the drums and guitar make for a very relaxed and uplifting spiritual experience.

. A hile most students spent spring break soaking up sun in Florida or relaxing at home, three groups poured their efforts into something a little more worthwhile, through alternative break trips.

Joslyn Ogden led the trip to Carretta, West Virginia, where students painted and cleaned the Caretta Community Center, an old elementary school made meeting place and daycare center. Students also participated in a meeting of the Young People's Action Council, a group of high school students trying to improve their education system.

Further north, Mark Jones and Pete Thomson led another trip to Harlem, New York, where they
lived and worked at the Emmaus House, a homeless community for people who have been abused, are recovering from drug addictions, or have finished time in prison. Here, students helped move the Emmaus House into a new building, while interacting with and learning from the residents.

Finally, Jeremy Campbell led a trip to Immokalee, Florida, where students participated in several area service projects, including work at an abused women's shelter and an alternative school for girls. Students spent seven days cooking and cleaning at the Immokalee Friendship House, which provides free assistance to a large number of migrant workers in south Florida.

have turned their attention to the dynamics of life in modern complex societies, examining topics such as racism. immigration, "corporate culture," gender and popular culture.
Because anthropology can`t master all of the various perspectives, it is often divided into four subfields: cultural, linguistic. biological anthropology(s) and anthropological archaelogy. At Davidson, geographical areas where study is concentrated are the Caribbean. Mexico, Central America, North America. Africa and the Middle East.

tions influence the production, distribution and delivery of services. Medical Humanities courses emphasize the role ethical values play in defining problems as "medical," worthy of scientific study, calling for mobilization of social as well as individual resources.

One of the greatest assests of the Medical Humanities program is its alliance with Carolina Medical Center, which enabled Reid Leavitt and Kelly Carter to serve as interns to the Ethics Committee at CMC. In
addition to attending monthly committee meetings, they analyzed the results of a nursing survey. The topics and cases debated at the committee meetings were educational because they included issues a medical student might face, and fascinating as they involved real people. The strength of the CMC/ Davidson cooperation is that students experience real-life applications of the ethical concepts introduced in the classroom.

# Swimming \& Diving <br> Women Win 4th Southern States Title! 

## Men Finish 2nd in Southern States!

The 1999-2000 season offered plenty of excitement as it saw one of the men`s records fall and nine of the women`s. Made special by a close-knit group of athletes, led by the seniors, this season was another step in the right direction for the up-and coming Wildcat swimming and diving programs.

The women's team was led by 19 seniors: 10 women and 9 men. Members from this year's women`s team are responsible for 19 of the 23 school records and over half of the men's records belong to current athletes.

Senior Mary Shell Brosche leads the way as she easily holds the distinction as the best Davidson swimmer, ever. She captured first-place finishes in each of the 12 events she competed in during four years of Southern States action, three of which she earned Swimmer-of-the-Meet honors.

Brosche's name appears nine times in the record book. She holds a record in all but one event ( 200 butterfly) in which she has ever competed. This year`s victims include the 100 fly (:59.03), 200 $\mathrm{IM}(2: 06.74)$ and $400 \mathrm{IM}(4: 27.38)$. She posted a second place finish in the 200 back at East Coast Athletic Conference Swimming and Diving Championships. Her 15 firsts were a season-high for the women.
Brosche (1:00.01) also combined with seniors Britta Toleman (1:06.75), Jennifer Howard (:58.66) and Rachel Horak (53.60) to set a record in the 400 medley relay (3:59.02). The foursome landed a fifth-place finish in the ECACs. Toleman, a native of Juneau, Alaska, notched

Nugent also qualified for the NCAA Zone Championshi for the second-straight year where she improved her scores from a year ago a came within 10 points of qualifying for the NCAA Championships.

The women's team captured its fourt consecutive Southern States title and landed four athletes on the All-Southe States team: Brosche. Kendra Berner. Heidi Hester. Starr Daniell and Liz Nugel

The men's team, also lead $t$ outstanding seniors, finished third in the team standings at Southern States al a team best sixth at the ECAC's. Junior Kurt Hirsekorn became the first Davidsu athlete to win an ECAC event with his school-record 4:02.00 in the 400 IS. Including relay efforts, he had 17 first-place finishes. Hirsekorn joined Grahal Gravley, Sam Kuykendall and Scott Harper on the All-Southern States team.

The men fi ished with a 4-6 record in a season of ups and downs. They dropped five straig
al meets before turning the season around and picking up three wins in a v . Their strength lies in potent relay corps and freestylers. Conversely lack of divers has repeatedly come to haunt them as precious points ve slipped away in nearly every meet. A two-point loss against Emory 8-116) left the Wildcats heartbroken as they dropped a meet by two nts or less for the second-straight year. Last season Georgia Southern ivered a 114-113 loss. Consecutive losses to Georgia Tech (151-76), 1liam \& Mary (123-107), East Carolina ( $134-103$ ) and UNC Wilmington ;0-106) prepped the Wildcats for a three-games hot streak.

Kendra Berner ( $1: 57.79$ ) and Matt West ( $1: 45.55$ ) captured the 200 free, while Horak (25.49) and Warner (22.08) sprinted to victory in the 50 free. Elizabeth Nugent (232.73) and Medendorp (127.20) combined to win the one-meter while the senior duo of Dolch ( $1: 54.87$ ) and Mary Shell Brosche (2:10.00) secured the top spots in the 200 back. Brosche (2:09.39) teamed up with Hirsekorn for the 200 IM double-win.

The Wildcats ran into a talented Virginia Tech team. as both teams suffered losses Sunday in the final regular-season home meet. The men's score was 136-94 and the women's was 145-89 on Senior Day at Cannon Pool.

Sophomore sensation Liz Nugent closed out the regular season in unprecedented fashion. She became the only diver in school history to go undefeated for the entire season in the three-meter (253.43). She was seven points away from doing the same in the onemeter (249.53), but fell just shy of Virginia Tech's Nagle.

The Hokies got off to a hot start as they won the first 15 events before Davidson's Michael Warner won the 100 -yard free (47.80). Then the Wildcats took firsts in eight of the next nine events as Mary Shell Brosche ( $1: 01.08$ ) and Terry Dolch (52.21) won the 100 -yard back. Heidi Hester (5:15.47) and Graham Gravley (4:54.40) each took the top spot in the 500yard free before Nugent won the three-meter.

Britta Toleman ( 1:08.05) and Kurt Hirsekorn ( 58.45 ) combined to sweep the 100 -yard breaststrokes. The only other first was the men's 200 -yard free relay where Scott Harper, Steven Reece, Warner and Dolch posted a 1:28.15.

Coach DeSelm and the Wildcats will look to come back next season and reestablish themselves as a itamate force in Division I swimming and diving. The men will be shooting for a fifth-straight Southern States $e$ and the men have taken a two year break since their $t$ title. Both teams will have a new look in the 2000 01 season with a total of 19 seniors graduating.
