





All year students have been serenaded by the sounds of the construction of the new Knobloch Student Union. Knobloch will be Davidson's first intentional college union facility after the present union was developed by Shaw Smith. With excitement, Tom Shandley said that Knobloch will be a "common gathering spot where students, faculty, staff and alumni can come together."

William Brown explained about plans for the building, "The whole building is exciting: finally a post office, a first-rate food service, great public space, lots of windows- it will be the place to see and be seen, to find people. The openness of this new building will make it a feel-good place, where you are a part of a community."

Each floor of the new union will serve a very functional purpose in the lives of the students. The fourth floor will be home to the literary publications on campus as well as several other offices. On the third floor will be the cafe that promises to be a top notch meeting ground for students as well as other members of the community. The second floor will have the bookstore and post office. Brown feels that "people can find each other at the post office and will stick around to talk because they can also get a cup of coffee and sit down." 








# Lasting Connections Through Community Service



What a way to end a perfect season! Not only did Davidson win, we did so with gusto, overcoming a first quarter deficit to come crashing back, 41-17. First-year Wildcat coach Joe Susan led the 2000 team to a 10-0 record, the first time any athletic team has gone undefeated in our school's 163 year history. In fact, Georgetown marked our 17th straight win. tieing Robert Morris as the longest Division 1 winning streak in the nation!

The 'Cats' scoring frenzy started off with a 2nd quarter field goal by sophomore Daniel Hanks, whose 2 for the day brought his season total up to 11, a new Davidson record. Quarterback Paul Nichols clocked in with 4 touchdown passes, throwing a career-high 368 yards. Two of those bombs landed in the hands of senior Corey Crawford, the other two going to sophomore Mike Tarver and senior Brian Fish, who became the first player since 1982 to net us a 1000+ yard season. Senior Ryan Hutto added to the fun with a 36 yard punt return for a TD in the fourth quarter.

Before the clock hit 0:00, most fans crowded the sideline, making plans for which goalpost to rush. It didn't matter, however: they both succumbed to our rowdy jubilation, coming down with a bang. This was the first time the uprights have kissed our sacred turf... hopefully, it won't be the last.














#### Humanitles

### Classics

While Dr. Peter Krentz spent his sabbatical as Elizabeth A. Whitehead Visiting Professor at the American School of Classical Studies in Athens, Greece, Dr. Michael Clark brought his knowledge of Athenian Historians and Ancient Greece to the Davidson ampus. Dr. Dirk French taught Hittite, the language of the inhabitants of ancient Turkey, to seven hrave students. Dr. Michael Toumazou, Dr. French, and other officers also inducted several new members into their Classics Fraternity, including a faculty member. After the induction ceremony, Dr. French demonstrated ancient fashion, both Greek and Roman, with live models. Dr. Toumazou also gave a lecture about the dig in Cyprus that he oversees each summer. 

# Psychology

The diplomas for psychology majors will look a bit different this May. In 1999, the department adjusted major requirements to put a further emphasis on experimental reserach, requiring students to take three research classes and at least one class from the physiological, cognitive, developmental, and clinical/social/industrial-organizational fields. As a result, the 43 graduates this year will earn a Bachelor of Science instead of the traditional Bachelor of Arts.

Three new professors joined the department. Assistant Professor Rudy Jackson introduced African-American psychology to the cirriculum. Visiting Professor Jeffry Kellogg and Adjunct Professor Maurya Boyd filled in for professors on sabbatical. While on sabbatical, Associate Professor Margaret Munger received tenure.



# Sociology

In its most recent reincarnation the department of sociology appeared on Davidson campus in 198, under the guidance of Dr. Janet Shannon. Before that from 1985 it was in the guise of a department Anthropology and Sociology which was directed by Dr. Grant Jones and Dr. Rosemary Levy Zumwa Though these two recent changes with suggest a change in personnel, it was actually more an administratic change, since three persons who were teaching sociology have worked here for several years. In 1999 Dr. Gay Kaufman joined the department as an assistant professor. The other three professors in the department a Dr. Robert Ruth, Dr. Lakhi Sabaratnam, and Dr. Janet Shannon.

The interests of the department are relevant to the modern changes in the United States, changes which both teachers and students are subject. The criminologist, Dr. Ruth, has focused on Hate Crimes in t United States, and on Medical Sociology. He teaches several courses in he fields of Deviance and Crimin Justice. Dr. Shannon teaches Urban Sociology, Race and Ethnic Relations, and American Community. Dr. Sabaratnam teaches courses on global ethnic conflicts, on comparitive studies of family and gender. T most recent recruit in the department, Dr. Gayle Kaufman, teaches courses in Gender, Statistics, Resear Methods, and Demography. These courses are taught at several levels ranging from freshman classes to semi seminars. Student majors go on to several different occupations, including different manifestations of medicibusiness, law, teaching, computers, and so on. 





# Theatre and Speech



With everything from deconstructionalist Shakespeare to classical Moliere, and shows directed by everyone from stdents to an off-Broadway playwright, theater at Davidson proved itself to be one of the most progressive and fastest growing parts of campus.

Finally, April ended with new shows written and directed by senior theater majors Matthew Hurt and Matthew Moretz, with a new show created by the Studio Theatre class, and with a night of one acts from the Directing II class, featuring yet another world premiere.

In hetween these two concerts, they performed both on campus, in Statesville, and in Belmont Abbey to large and enthusiastic audiences. The Concert Choir joined with the orchestra in presenting two very successful performances of John Rutter's Requiem. in addition, the Concert Choir and Chamber Singers joined forces on a concert tour of Florida, Georgia, and South Carolina, as well as presenting the Annual Christmas Vespers service to a standing room only crowd in DCPC. Other n campus performances by the choirs, orchestra, jazz band, and wind ensemble rounded out the department's ensemble offerings. In additin to the ensembles, a full slate of student recitals and a performance by the Opera Theater Workshop of two one act American operas helped create a full year of music for the college.

The faculty of the music department remained active as well. Of particular note were Dr. Crott's presentation for the Conductors Guild National Conference in January, Dr. Neil Lerners presentation of a paper to the Royal Music Association of England on the film music of John Williams as well as his election as President of the American Musicological Society Southeast Chapter, and Dr. Jennifer Stasack's ASCAP 2000 Standard Awad as well as her involvement as an invited respondent at the International Symposium of Cultural Comparison in Korea.

The department continued its comittment to musical diversity on campus by sponsoring events as diverse as the residency of the African Drumming and Dance company Les Percussions de Guinee, the jazz pianist Harry Pickens, and an informal talk by the American Opera composer Carlisle Floyd. 




























#### Warner Hall










#### Kappa Sigma






#### Black Student Coalition






Randall Hardy enters the Wildcats as a freshman Quarterback from Georgia. The Community will look to have the dership in the average.


avidson's attempt to take the crown by winning four games came to an end in he semifinals of the Southern Conference Tournament on Saturday evening as the UNC Greensboro Spartans (18-11) defeated the Wildcats (15-17), 73-68.

Junior Michael Bree drained a three-pointer with 16 minutes left to give Davidson its biggest lead of the game at 48-35. The 'Cats still led by nine four minutes later when sophomore Wayne Bernard canned a pair of free throws after UNCG Head Coach Fran McCaffery picked up a technical foul for throwing his suit jacket.

But the technical seemed to spark the Spartans, as they rattled off nine straight points. Freshman Jouni Eho made one of two foul shots before UNCG's Luke Boythe hit a layup to give Greensboro its first lead in over 20 minutes at 55-54.

Davidson didn't wilt, however, immediately retaking the lead on a jumper by junior Emeka Erege and two free throws by sophomore Chris Pearson.

A three-pointer by Courtney Eldridge put UNCG up for good with 5:48 to play, 62-60. With Ronnie Taylor and Eldridge converting all six of their free throws in the final 24 seconds, the Spartans wrapped up the game.



Avenge Nemesis

"We emptied are tank today," said Head Coach Bob McKillop afterwards.
"You could see with eight to 10 minutes left, we just ran out of gas. Our energy level didn't come into play until UNCG started its run. Without momentum on our side, it was very difficult to maintain our energy."

The game was won at the foul line as the Spartans knocked down 21-of-23 free throws, and their last 11 in the final seven minutes. Davidson, meanwhile, shot near their season average at 65.5 percent (19-for-29).

The Wildcats took a 40-34 lead into the break, as they shot a splendid 56.5 percent (13-for-23) for the half. With UNCG putting so much effort into containing Bernard and junior center Martin Ides, Pearson was able to lead Davidson with 10 points at the half.


Pearson also led the Wildcats with 16 points and seven rebounds for the game. Both Eho and Erege added 10 points to the Davidson cause.

Pearson wasted no time in setting the school record for blocks in a season. Within the first four minutes, he swatted away three shots to reach 50, breaking the mark set by Jamie Hall in the 1978-79 season. Pearson finished the game with four rejections.

UNC Greensboro had four players finish in double figures, led by Eldridge with 18. David Schuck scored 17, Ronnie Taylor had 15 and SoCon Freshman of the Year Jay Joseph had 12, all on three-pointers.

The loss left Davidson with a losing record for the first time since the 1991-92 season when the Wildcats had a record of 11-17. The 32 games played this season set a new Davidson record, breaking the mark of 31 from the 1985-86 and 1988-89 seasons.







### It's a Davidson vs. Goliath matchup

It has been 27 years since Davidson, a 1,600-student liberal arts college near Charlotte, N.C., allowed women to enroll. A year later in 1974 its women's athletics program was born. Last year, it had its first women's team in an NCAA Tournament.

That team is back, and plays here tonight against third-ranked University of Hawai'i in the first round of the Women's Volleyball Championship.

Has their been a bigger match in the history of Davidson women's sports?

"No," first-year coach Tami Darwin says without hesitation.

Does her team know that?

"I sure hope not," Darwin says with a grin.

In reality, her team's state of mind is not a concern. It doesn't take an SAT score of 1,300 — the average at Davidson — to realize the Wildeats have absolutely nothing to lose tonight. And Darwin has four seniors, including two-time Southern Conference Player of the Year Mara Mordini and Brooke Bentley, that she promises are "up for the challenge."

It won't hurt that their first postseason taste — a year ago in Lincoln, Neb. — was terribly bitter. Davidson scored just 11 points against Nebraska, hitting negative numbers before a few thousand fans who thrived on their frustration.

Tonight, there will be a few more thousand, on an island curiously hooked on their sport. They were recognized the moment they stepped off the plane, and again while shopping.


"We were just astounded at how well people knew the game," Barton said. "In Charlotte, it's more like, 'Oh yeah, volleyball ... do you serve or what?' It's incredible the status that volleyball has in Hawai'i. We feel very fortunate to be chosen to come here.

"As far as the crowd goes, our team really thrives on good defense and I think the crowd will help us to get excited and be motivated to dig those balls and feed into our offense."

Mordini, a 5-foot-9 hitter, is the focal point of that offense. She will break the school's single-season kill record the first time she tools a block tonight. She also anchors the country's third-ranked defense, sucking up more than five digs a game.

"A lot of them are a little taller than us," Mordini says of the Wahine. "We experienced that with Nebraska last year, too. We're just going to be using our agility and our defense ... hopefully bring our match that will win it."

Davidson's second season of Southern Conference success has given them a swagger. Combined with the Wahine's recently realized vulnerability — "We watched the Long Beach match," Darwin said, "I think every team that comes here will watch that" — it is easy to believe in miracles.

ven though the men's team amassed only one win and the women notched three this season, the year ended on a high note for many Davidson swimmers. With a total of 35 personal best times set at last weekend's season-ending Colonial Athletic Association's Swimming & Diving Championships, the 2000-01 season will be remembered as one of personal improvement for Wildeat swimming.

Senior **Kurt Hirsekorn** got the ball rolling on the first night of the CAA's when he shattered the school record in the 200 lM. Three other school records were broken by the men's team during the weekend. Hirsekorn also broke the old record in the 200 breast with a time of 2:03.48. In the 200 fly, freshman **Charlie Hunter** broke a four-year mark previously held by Scott Harper. Senior **Matt West**'s first leg of the 400 free relay also shattered a Davidson record. West's :47.09 in his 100 yard leg was .15 seconds faster than the previous top Davidson time in the 100 free.

Two women swimmers broke school records in the CAA Championships as well. Freshman **Sara Laws** destroyed the

previous 200 back mark by over two seconds, touching the wall in 2:02.36. Laws finished second in the event and also came within .63 seconds of qualifying for the NCAA "B" Championships. According to Head Coach Jim Conlon, that was the closest a Davidson woman has ever come to qualifying for the NCAA's. Fellow freshman **Joanie Gidas** swam the 200 breast in 2:25.00, breaking the previous school record by almost a 1.5 seconds.

For the entire season, both teams combined to notch 58 top-10 performances in Davidson history. Last season, even with more swimmers on both squads, Davidson could only muster 51 top-10 performances.

"This was a great year for personal improvement," noted Conlon. "Every guy on the team swam at least one personal best at CAA's. Even with a limited amount of women swimming at CAA's, I was impressed with the number of top-10 times we were able to record."

The waters may be calm now, but soon the Wildeats will be back shooting for even more records to shatter



ive Davidson wrestlers picked up victories and three of them placed in the 2001 South ern Conference Wrestling Tournament, helping the Wildcats to a sixth place showing at the season-ending tournament. Senior Anthony Albert, junior Jeff Libersat and freshman Shawn Reynolds finished in fourth place in their respective weight classes.

Albert (149 pounds) placed fourth in the SoCon tourney for the second time in his career at Davidson. He opened with an 8-6 decision over Gregg Fox from UNC Greensboro before falling to the eventual champion, Adam Britt of VMI, in the semis. In the wrestle-backs, Albert scored a 12-2 major decision over Cardin Smith of Chattanooga to earn a berth in the consolation finals. However, Justin Bellman of The Citadel defeated Albert 7-2 for third place.

At 184 pounds, Libersat triumphed over Luke Bialy of




UNC Greensboro, 7-4, in the consolation semis, but fell to Jon Gross of The Citadel in the third-place contest. Libersat had defeated Gross earlier this season in dual meet action.



Finally, Reynolds (HWT) added two more pins to his teamleading total on his way to a fourth place showing. In the first round, Reynolds pinned Jordan Everett of The Citadel to reach the semis. Reynolds bounced back after a loss in the semis to pin Brian Toney of VMI to reach the consolation finals. A.J. Lyczkowski of Chattanooga defeated Reynolds for the second time this year in the third-place match.

Sophomore Grant Doornbos (141) and junior Jeff Bender (157) were the only other Wildcats to triumph in at least one match in the conference tournament.

For the fifth time overall and first time since 1997, Appalachian State finished first in the team standings. Five Mountaineer wrestlers won their brackets, while two from Chattanooga, and one each from VMI, UNC Greensboro and The Citadel placed first in a weight class.



The Davidson Wildcats stunned The Citadel on Sunday after noon by scoring nine runs in the eighth inning to win the series finale, 15-13. The two teams also completed a suspended game from yesterday, with the Wildcats (13-17, 7-11 Southern Conference) squeaking out a 4-3 victory to take the series two games to one.

The Citadel (22-9, 9-3), ranked 18th in the nation by Collegiate Baseball, took a 13-6 lead into the bottom of the eighth inning with its closer, Randy Corn, on the mound. But Corn didn't have his best stuff, yielding six hits and a walk, retiring just one batter he faced.

Stephen Aldrich opened the fatal inning with single up the middle. Jack Purcell followed with a drive to right-center that hit the top of the fence for a double. The first run of the inning came on an infield single by Ryan Stroker, but he was picked off by Corn for the first out. After a walk to Tim Frend, James Marino reached on an error to score Purcell.

Marino drove in the first run in the inning with his third single of the game, and Matt Berry followed with his own RBI single. Following a pitching change and a strikeout, Lundin poked another single through the infield for the final run of the frame.





In non-relay events, Freshman Laura Puckett (St. Paul, Minn.) finished 77th overall in the women's 1500 meters in a time of 4:59.99. Freshman Amanda Yeck (Swansboro, N.C.) leapt 9.96m and earned a 47th place in the triple jump. Junior Megan O'Neill (Charlotte, N.C.) finished 39th overall in the shot put with a throw of 10.47m.

### Track &Field

For the men, there were two top 30 performances in the relays. The 4x100 meter relay team finished 27th in a time of :44.34 while the 4x800 relay was 25th. Their time of 8:03.42 was among the top 10 fastest in school history. Five individuals also competed at the meet. Jimmy Swansbrough finished 27th in the steepleehase with a 9:50.53 which puts him among the 10 fastest athletes to compete in that event at Davidson. Brad Becken and Chris Schmader both competed in the 10,000 meters finishing 51st and 58th respectively. The duo of Ben Gaspar and Dave Bunge ran the 5,000 meters and finished 114th and 120th.

The men and women will head their separate ways this weekend as the men head to Durham, N.C. for the Duke Invitational while the women head to the Georgia Tech Invitational in Atlanta, Ga.

"This was a great match," said Davidson head coach Jeff Frank. "Quite frankly, I didn't expect us to win this, but it puts us in much better position in the conference."

### Singles

A solid nucleus in the form of juniors Kelley Cantrell and Elizabeth Moreno, as well as sophomores Yasamina Hilu and Gayle Jones, look to lead the 'Cats into action this year. Cantrell, the team captain and bona-fide leader, brings a lot of experience to the table. With her big first serve and attacking ground strokes, Cantrell had a breakthrough year a season ago. "Kelley has gained a lot of confidence and belief in her game from her successful year at number four singles in 2000," commented Head Coach Caroline Price.

Moreno's quick hands make her a tremendous doubles competitor, but in singles she prefers to make her living along the baseline. The Spicewood, Texas, native is a frustrating opponent to play against because she finds a way to get to nearly every ball. This season, Moreno will be looking to draw upon her match experience and determination to cultivate a successful year.

"Pure enthusiasm," is the way Coach Price describes Hilu. She is one of the few tennis players who uses a two-handed backhand and forehand. Having two hands on the racquet at all times has helped her develop solid, powerful groundies from both sides. One part of her game Hilu is working on is her volleys. Becoming a stronger volleyer will make the two-time Virginia state champion much more dangerous and a better all-court player.

Jones knows exactly what hard work is all about. The second-year player wasn't in the starting lineup at the beginning of the 2000 campaign, but fought her way to the number six spot and four conference victories by the end of the year. Probably the strongest player physically on the squad, Coach Price expects to see more consistency out of Jones, especially in her ground strokes.

The two remaining spots in the lineup could possibly be filled by the freshmen duo of Lindsay Offutt and Katherine Hatch. Offutt has already made an impact for the 'Cats, winning the second flight of the Harvard

Invitational this past fall. In the finals, she disposed of her Harvard opponent while only dropping four games in two sets. An aggressive baseliner, Offutt's game is built around putting pressure on her opponents and moving in to put volleys away. "She [Offutt] can certainly hurt you with her weapons off of the ground," noted Coach Price.

Another one of the talented freshman to join the team, Hatch comes to Davidson all the way from Portland, Ore. "The more experience she gains, the better she will get," admitted Coach Price. A solid baseliner and quick learner, she already has had the chance to gain some collegiate experience by participating in the Harvard Invitational, Wolfpack Invitational and Southern Intercollegiate this past fall.

Junior Katte Brooks should be in the mix as well this season. Brooks played five matches at number five and six singles in 2000. Her experience will be a valuable asset for the young squad.

### Doubles

With only one returning doubles tandem from a year ago, the Wildcats will be mixing things up in the first days of practice and early matches in the season. "To establish the right combinations, we'll have to pull from the talent of the freshmen and the experience of the returners to see what groups have the right chemistry," said Coach Price.

Cantrell and Jones teamed up to form the number three doubles duo last year. These two could be grouped together again, as they were .500 in conference play in 2000 and have learned each other's games from playing together

Moreno and Hilu also bring a year's worth of doubles experience to the table. Moreno's soft and quick hands make her a pertect plaser for doubles. Hilu's powerful ground strokes often put servers on the defensive when acrossing and volleying

ks and ophomores Catherine Rainhow and Flizabeth Super have experience in doubles, too. These is not not 11 for oven matches played last year and could be in the mix for doubles this year.






enior Sean Davidson (Princeton Junction, N.J.) led the Davidson golf team to an 18th-place finish at the 54-hole Furman Intercollegiate this past weekend.

The invitational was held at Furman University Golf Course, a par-72, 6,800-yard course, in Grenville, S.C.

The 'Cats shot a 926 (+62) for the three-day event which put them 18th in the 21-team field. The Wildcats shot a 307 on the first day which was good for 19th and then dropped to 20th with a 315 on the second day. Davidson shot a 304 on the final day to move from 20th to 18th for its final standing.

Virginia Tech fired a tournament-low 283 and finished with an even par 864 to oust Furman from atop the leaderboard at the 32nd annual Furman Intercollegiate. The 12th-ranked Hokies erased Furman's hopes of winning its first Intercollegiate Title since 1986, with a







scorehing five-under in the final round.

Davidson led the Wildcats during the weekend as he finished the tournament in a five-way tie for 52nd with a score of 228 (+12). He opened the first two rounds with identical scores of 78 before firing a 72. The number 72 reappeared for the Wildcats as both sophomore Ben Friedell (Shaker Heights, Ohio) and senior Scott Shupe (Riehmond, Va.) finished tied for 72nd with a score of 16-over par. Shupe shot 76-77-79 to reach his total of 232 while Friedell went 78-81-73. Junior Oliver Cross (Winston-Salem, N.C.) finished 79th (75-79-80=234) overall while junior Andy Allen (Augusta, Ga.) rounded out the Wildeat team with a finish of 104th (81-86-81=248).

Furman's Kirk Satterfield carded a 70 to finish eight under for the tournament, winning his first collegiate title with a three stroke cushion. Michael Sims of Rhode Island and Dylan Keylock of Francis Marion finished in a tie for second at five under





n the past, the Davidson erew has only gone to the Southern Intercollegiate Rowing Association Regatta (SIRA) as a learning experience and to see some of the best clubs in the nation compete. This year, Davidson surprised those incredibly powerful teams and showed them that it can no longer be taken lightly.

Although the varsity men's team captured medals at each of the spring regattas this year, hardly anyone thought they could achieve a top ranking amidst SIRA's stiff competition. Even when they made a strong showing in the earlier heats, placing second in the preliminaries and third in the semi-finals, it still seemed unlikely that a medal was in reach. In the finals, however, the varsity men stepped up their performance and fought hard against the University of Texas to tie for the bronze medal. As a matter of fact, the battle for third place was so close that the race officials could not decide which boat finished first even after watching the videotape. The judges finally compared race times and found that the two teams both completed the race in exactly 7:17.43 seconds and granted both teams the bronze.

The men's victory is even more impressive considering that crew at Davidson is a club sport and does not have a full-time coach unlike most of the other teams at SIRA. Now, the varsity men will advance to the Champion Collegiate Regatta which will be held in Gainsville, Georgia in mid-May. This will be the first time in the history of Davidson crew that a boat will attend a national regatta.

Despite their amazing finish at SIRA, the varsity men remain humble about their victory. While sophomore varsity rower, Charlie Babcock, acknowledges his boats accomplishments because it "represents a phenomenal race" and "attests to the importance of determination in achieving one's goals," he quickly points out that the rest of the team also made and impressive showing.

"The attention we have received," says Babcock, "neglects the novice men and varsity women who also had spectacular races."

In fact, most members of the novice men's and the varsity women's boats agree that SIRA reflects some of their strongest rowing this semester.

After easily coming in second in their preliminary heat, the men faced a tough semi-final and were not able to advance to the finals. Although frustrated with their finish, the novice men were extremely pleased with their race.

"We felt proud of our tremendous improvement since the season's beginning," said freshman rower Dan O'Neill. "It really counts for something having done so well against such big schools...even despite intense competition."

The varsity women also felt they rowed their best possible race. They faced fierce competition in the lightweight category and finished fourth in their final. As sophomore rower Monica Siegenthaler stated, "Although we did not necessarily do well as far as the placing, we felt that we had our best race of the season. We first d well together and gave it all our strength. That's all we could ask for in a race."
