## Foreign Languages

## Sociology

## Business

Economics is that bronch of the social sciences which deals with the problems of optimum allocation, full employment and stable growth of o society for moximum human satisfaction. A complex of business exists to aid in attaining these goals.

Through study of past and present economies and practice in accounting ond others tools of business the student becomes fomiliar with both theory and practice. Students preparing for careers in business, government civil service, teaching, or law have time to supplement these courses with electives to attain a general education.


## Psychology

The Department of Psychology has as its aims a development in the student of an understanding of the bases ond role of human behavior ond a fostering in him of a corresponding odjustment through application of psychological principles. In pursuit of these aims, the department has recently moved into the north end of the third floor of the administration building, where modern laboratories and equipment are located for efficient study and observation.
The department oims to acquoint not only the psychology major but also the liberal arts student with its field, for such a study will aid in both specific occupations and in the general process of day-to-day living.

The biology department emphasizes the development of an appreciation of man's relation to his universe, the acquisition of those fundamental facts necessary to the proper interpretation of the phenamena manifested by living things, and the laying of a broad foundation for specialization in professional courses concerning biolagy.

facilities are utilized by students and professors to gain insight into the technical and theoreticol aspects of the natural sciences.


The vigorous schooling in techniques and principles of modern chemistry which its students receive has helped the chemistry department of Lebanan Valley College to become known for possessing a high degree of excellence.

Students interested in the teaching profession are given an opportunity to study chemistry and the various techniques of teaching science. Students preparing for industrial work, the medical sciences, and advanced study in chemistry are given troining which will enable them to become both good scientists and good citizens.

Individual work and scientific thinking is encouraged. A summer program has been set up to give opportunity for extra training. Students working for departmental honors must prepare and defend a thesis based on extensive laboratory investigation of an original problem.

## Mathematics

A recard enrallment of fifty mathematics majars this year shows the increasing importance af the mathematics department at Lebanon Valley Callege. Turning out mathematics teachers, actuaries, and aspiring engineers annually, the math department includes in its curriculum classical mathematics caurses as well as caurses carresponding to mare recent developments.

A series of eight evening lectures on modern mathematics by Mr. Rabert J. Wagner, assistant professor of mathematics, indicates the extension af the mathematics department out of the classroom. Along the same line, a research contract from the United States Navy has authorized Lebanon Valley's math department for research in statistical aspects of inventary control.

## Physics



Increased understanding of the basic laws of nature as they relate to aur physical environment and an indication of the possible extent and limitatians of our knowledge of the physical warld are aims of the Department of Physics.

To attain these goals, recent developments in nuclear and atomic physics, as well as traditional fields of physical phenomena, are emphasized. The relationship of physics to other sciences far industrial and medical advances is stressed and frequently utilized. Mathematics, in particular, is an important toal of the young men and women in the wellequipped physics laboratories and classrooms.

## DIVISION OF TEACHER EDUCATION

Prospective teachers at Lebonan Valley College ore offered courses designed to meet certification requirements for teaching in the public schaals. Courses in methods of teaching, principles of guidance, philosophy of education, and audiovisual techniques ore included in the curriculum.

The division attempts to instill in its students a sound knowledge of classroom skills, on understanding of the high academic and ethical principles necessory to a teacher, and an appreciotion of the value of the teacher's contribution to society.

## Elementary Education

The elementary educotion department is the responsibility of Dr. Cloyd Ebersole, Mrs. June Herr, and Mr. William Botchelor. Elementary educotion majors are given a background nat only in the vorious subjects taught in primory schools, but in the fundomentals of music, art, and recreation os well.

Through these studies ond with the practical experience goined in observing octual classes and in student teaching, Lebonon Volley College sends farth men and women well-prepared to give children a meoningful start in the nation's classrooms.

The Elementory Education Club is affilated with this department, and affords an opportunity for students who wish to ocquire further experience in their field to do so.

## Secondary Education

Secondary education courses supplement a future junior or senior high school teocher's knowledge of the subject matter which he will teach. This is occomplished through o student's observation of genuine clossroam situations, his study of principles and techniques of teaching, and student teaching.

Dr. Gilbert McKlveen, head of the division of teocher education, supervises those entering secondary education and acts of odviser to the compus Student Pennsylvania State Education Association, an organization to which both secondory and elementary education majors may belong.

## Health and Physical Education

Seventy-five percent of American youth may be underdevelaped physically, but the Men's Physical Education Department is doing its best to carrect this situation. Compulsory gym classes for freshmen and sophomare men teach the rules and regulatians of variaus individual and team sparts. Sponsoring intramural basketball, volleyball, and softball teams, and eliminatian tournaments in table tennis, handball, squash, and badminton, the department seeks to keep Valley students strong and fit.

Of equal importance are the physical activities available to all co-eds. An extensive intramural pragram is conducted throughout the three seasans af our school year. Team competition comes to the fore in varsity hockey and basketball. We have indeed met the demand of our society to value mare highly the physical development of its citizens.
