# September 11, 2001 

THE PRESIDENT: Good evening. Today, our fellow citizens, our way of life, our very freedom came under attack in a serics of deliberate and deadly terrorist acts. The victims were in airplanes, or in their offices; secretaries, businessmen and women, military and federal workers; moms and dads, friends and neighbors.
Thousands of lives were suddenly ended by evil, despicable acts of terror.
The pictures of airplanes flying into buildings, fires burning, huge structures collapsing, have filled us with disbelief, terrible sadness, and a quiet, unyielding anger. These
 acts of mass murder were intended to frighten our nation into chaos and retreat. But they have failed; our country is strong.
A great people has been moved to defend a great nation. Terrorist attacks can shake the
 foundations of our biggest buildings, but they cannot touch the foundation of America. These acts shattered steel, hut they cannot dent the steel of American resolve. America was targeted for attack because we're the brightest beacon for freedom and opportunity in the world. And no one will keep that light from shining. Today, our nation saw evil, the very worst of human nature. And we responded with the best of America -- with the daring of our rescue workers, with the caring for strangers and neighbors who came to give blood and help in any way they could.


Immediately following the first attack, I implemented our government's emergency response plans. Our military is powerful, and it's prepared. Our emergency teams are working in New York City and Washington, D.C. to help with local rescue efforts.

Our first priority is to get help to thase who have been injured, and to take every pre caution to protect

citizens
at home and around the world from further attacks. The functions of our government continue without interruption.

# A Day To Remember 


ederal agencies in Vashington which had to be vacuated today are reopening or essential personnel onight, and will be open for usiness tomorrow. Our nancial institutions remain rong, and the merican economy ill be open for usiness, as well.


The scarch is underway for those who are behind these evil acts. I've directed the full resources of our intelligence and law enforcement communities to find those responsible and to bring them to justice. We will make no distinction between the terrorists who committed these acts and those who harbor them.

I appreciate so very much the members of Congress who have joined me in strongly condemning these attacks. And on behalf of the
American people, I thank the many world leaders who have called to offer their condolences and assistance.


America and our friends and allies join with all those who want peace and security in the world, and we stand logether to win the war against terrorism. Tonight, I ask for your prayers for all those who grieve, for the children whose worlds have been shattered. for all whose sense of safety and security has been threatened. And I pray they will be comforted by a power greater than any of us, spoken through the ages in Psalm 23: "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death. I fear no evil, for You are with me."

This is a day when all Americans from every walk of life unite in our resolve for justice and peace.
America has stood down enemies before, and we will do so this time.
None of us will
 ever forget this day. Yet, we go forward to defend freedom and all that is good and just in our world.

Thank you. Good night, and God bless America.

## Winter Olympics 2002

From the NBC Coverage of the Games:
Day 1: On a brisk Utah night, with temperatures dipping into the teens and light snow falling from the skies, America welcomed the world to play in peace and harmony on the slopes and in the arenas of the Wasatch Range for the next 17 days as the curtain raised on the XIX Olympic Winter Games.

Day 2: The first gold medal of the Salt Lake Olympic Winter Games wasn't decided until the closing seconds but the theme of the day was utter dominance.

Day 3: Three new Olympic stars strode into the dazzling light that broke over Utah's Wasatch Mountains on Sunday. Around their necks, gold medals shone with special brilliance on Day 3 of the Salt Lake Olympic Winter Games.

Day 4: Expect the unexpected...except in Olympic pairs figure skating. By the time the 2002 Olympic Winter Games have spun to a close, it appears that most, if not all, of the 15 disciplines in the Salt Lake program will have given that slightly amended adage another hard workout.

Day 5: The focal point may have been a few meters beyond cach sport's official boundary, but there was no mistaking the mood that dominated the XIX Olympic Winter Games on Tuesday.

Day 6: Ottavio Cinquanta, the president of the International Skating Union, probably would prefer less limelight. But he took center ice Wednesday morning and skated a long program for the better part of two hours

accompanied by the international sporting press extra-loud takeoff on Tchaikovsky's 1812
Overture.
Day 7: Two Russians dominated an Olympic figure skating competition Thursday night. No one disagreed.

Day 8: Canadian pairs skaters to share gold with Russians, but not all the news was good for Canada on Friday. Its hockey team, among the favorites to win the gold medal in men's ice hockey, fell hard in its opening game.

Day 9: Do you believe in home ice? The 2-2 tie between the Russia and United States men s ice hockey teams might not have been the stuff of miracles. But given the circumstances the return to an American venue of two teams that created.

the epitome of Olympic drama 22 years ago belief could wait.

Day 10: Canadian figure skaters Jamie Salc and David Pelletier got their gold six days late. Norway and Italy restaged their cross-country relay rivalry with a cardiac finish. Italy's Daniela Ceccarelli skied out of the clouds to win the women's super-G. But none of them could knock the Chris Witty Story off page one.

Day 11: It's a fine point of team ski jumping, but an important one: If you're the fourth jumper, it's good to be tackled. Martin Schmitt accomplished that this day. Schmitt's final jump gave Germany the gold medal by the slimmest of margins over Finland. Schmitt's teammates rewarded him with a hero's dogpile.

Day 12: Welcome women's bobsleigh to the Olympic Winter Games program. And celebrate the victory of USA-2, the little sled that could: driver Jill Bakken and brakeman Vonetta Flowers. Speed skater Derek Parra of the United States also set a world record in the 1500 -meter race on the lightning-fast Utah Olympic Oval.

Day 13: Jack Shea must have heard the cheers and sent back one of his own. The late grandfather of Wednesday's gold medalist in men's skeleton, symbolically along for the ride in the form of a photograph tucked inside his grandson's helmet, crossed the finish line in spirit.

Day 14: Where does a person go to learn the mathematics of emotion? Surely such a study is coming our way. Until it arrives, we know where to look: into the eyes of Sarah Hughes, gold medalist in ladies figure skating at the Salt Lake Games. Day 15: The United States men's ice hockey team put a television play-by-play man's celebrated expression to rest on Friday. It happened exactly 22 years after the 1980 U.S. "Miracle on Ice" victory over the Soviet Union.

Day 16: Somebody finally caught up with Arthur Tyler. He d been waiting there in the Olympic record book for 46 years under "Four-Man Bobsleigh, Cortina, 1956, Bronze Medal." So when the U.S. got its first Olympic men's bobsleigh hardware in nearly a half-century, the team left no doubt. It sent two sleds to finish the job.

Day 17: Fifty years after it last carried home a set of Olympic gold medals, the Canadian men's ice hockey team returned to the top of the podium with a $5-2$ victory over the United States in the final competition of the Salt Lake Games.
