Chelsea Clinton Comes to Campus

Former first daughter Chelsea Clinton laid out the case for her mother Hillary Clinton's presidential candidacy in the state's Republican heartland in March, making a direct plea for votes to a constituency that's key to Barak Obama's chances in Pennsylvania.

Nearly 440 students, faculty, staff and community members filled the atrium of Lynch Memorial Hall to pose questions for Clinton in an unprecedented appearance.

With Senator Clinton locked in a fierce battle for the Democratic presidential nomination against U.S. Sen. Barak Obama, the younger Clinton's stop at LVC was one of three she made to stump on behalf of her mother.

"Please ask me any questions you have today...I'm happy to talk about anything," Clinton said while standing on a small stage, sporting a jacket and navy Lebanon Valley hooded sweatshirt.

She was introduced by Greg Kauffman '09, president of College Democrats. Clinton spoke for about five minutes and then fielded more than a dozen questions from mostly political science students, that included education, college financial aid reforms, the federal budget deficit, health care, stem cell research, NAFTA, and renewable energy.

Much of Chelsea Clinton's talk centered on education, including her mother's plans to broaden Pell Grants for students and to forgive loan debt for those who enter such public service jobs as education and law enforcement.

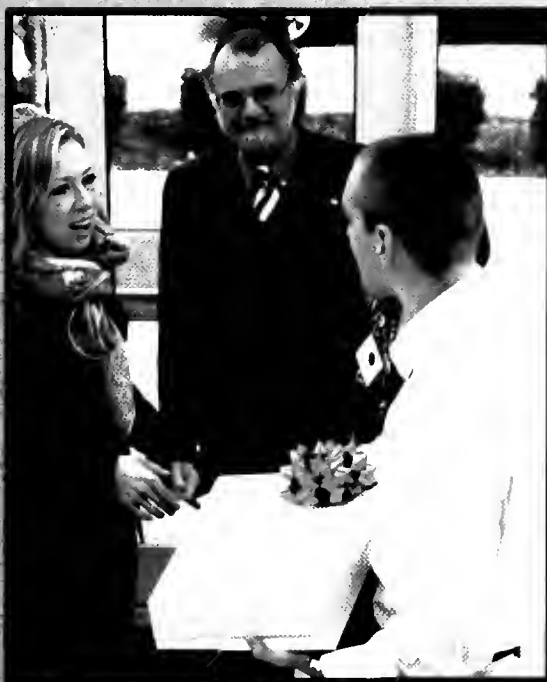
Both the elder Clinton, a New York senator, and Obama have proposed making college more affordable by reinstating direct aid from the government to students at lower interest rates. Chelsea said her mother wants to double the maximum federal Pell Grant for low-income students to \$10,800 and double existing tax credits for undergraduate and graduate students.

Dedication, sweat and teamwork -- three things behind the women's rugby championship team. Qualifying for playoffs this fall was a goal the girls had been working towards for the past four years.

The team was led by senior club officers who had taken their position as sophomores, and fundraised, recruited and reorganized the club into a well-respected team. The team was an unstoppable combination of experienced returning players and fresh talent among freshmen, both sharing a passion for the sport.

Their shot at qualifying for play-offs came Oct. 20 when The Valley hosted their rivals Franklin & Marshall College. The women dominated the pitch, claiming victory 32-5. The women's goal had been met, qualifying the team for play-offs for the first time since 2002.

With championships in sight the women faced a huge issue. Depth. Throughout the fall season, the once sizable team lost many of their players to injuries. The girls were down to 15 players -- the exact number needed on the field.

But with zero substitutes, women's rugby prevailed and went into championships with their heads up and game faces on. The women battled through their match, many playing through injuries in order to keep numbers on the pitch.

What seemed to be a victorious match against Muhlenberg was stolen away in the last ten seconds of the game, when Muhlenberg scored on a rare penalty called by the referee.

Win or lose nothing can take away the memories created between these women on and off the pitch. Between the time spent at team dinners and socials, or the unbelievable tackles and endless sprints at practice, these women formed a team that will last them a lifetime.



Reaching Out

LVC students completed 18,638 hours of community service during the 2007-08 academic year -- equal to \$363,623 worth of service, mostly for the greater Lebanon community.

The College also helped to build a modular home in Cleona destined for a needy family in Southeast Texas, assisted in Hurricane Katrina Relief in the New Orleans area, helped out at an Oneonta, NY retreat center, and participated in an Appalachian Mountains Service Project in West Virginia.

The community service figures come from data compiled by Gene Kelly '01, LVC's assistant director of student activities and student development. The students represented 42 organizations, athletic teams, special interest residence communities, and campus-wide planning committees.

Any advice to future seniors?

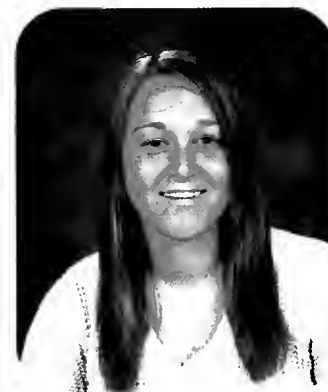
Senior year has to be the single most exciting and frightening time ever. If you blink, you might miss it, so take advantage of every opportunity and live it up.

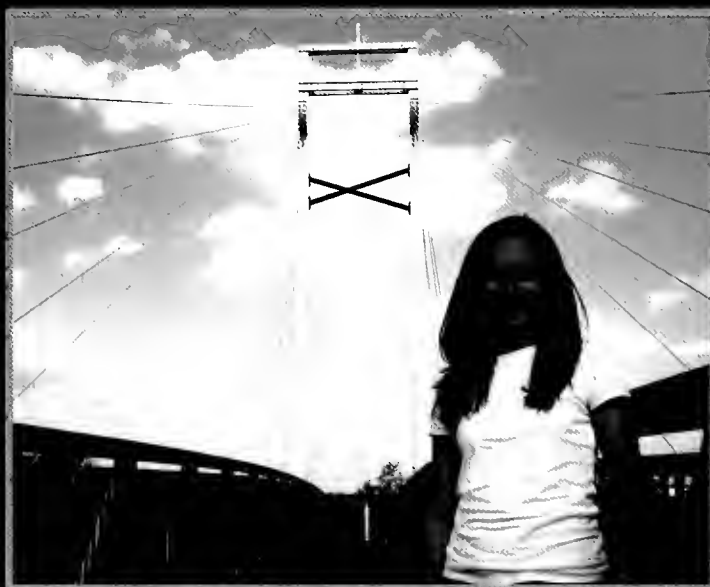

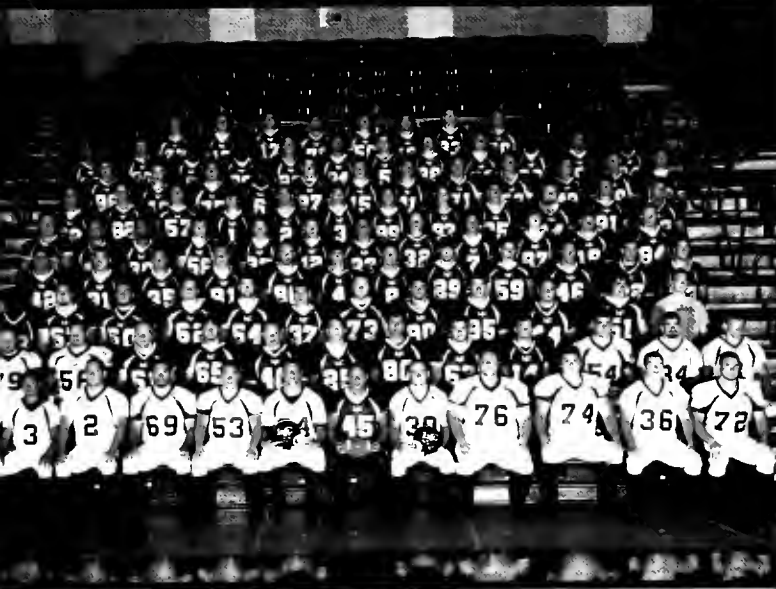

FIND A WAY

After starting the 2007 campaign with a 1-5 mark, the Flying Dutchmen were able to rebound and win three of the remaining four games in the regular season, finishing the year with an overall 4-6 record. In Week Two of the season and victory number one, Lebanon Valley College defeated Susquehanna University by a final score of 27-12. As the final whistle blew on that hot and humid afternoon, starting sophomore tailback Charlie Parker carried the football 29 times and rushed for 196 yards, averaging 6.8 yards a carry. On the career day, Parker's feat surpassed the performance by Dave Holland '05, who rushed for 187 yards in a single game. For the season, he posted 241 carries (single-season record) while rushing for 1,105 yards, which is also a single-season record, breaking the old mark set by Ken Wilson '89 of 1,103 yards.

At legendary Arnold Field on November 17th, which was the season finale and Senior Day, LVC wide receiver and starting punter Adam Brossman finished his brilliant and superb career at the Valley. Brossman, on the afternoon, hauled in five catches for 80 yards and punted the football five times for 174 yards, while launching a 57-yard bomb. For his career, he goes down as one of the best all-around athletes at LVC, posting 207 receptions, 3,619 yards, and 42 touchdowns in a four-year span. Parker, on the day, scored four touchdowns, which ties a single-game performance. Freshman Brittany Ryan, the only female to ever step foot on the gridiron for Lebanon Valley College, knocked down 8-of-9 extra points as she saw her first action on October 27 in a road game at Albright. Her first kick sailed straight through the uprights. On defense, Russ DeStefano finished his final year in the blue and white with seven interceptions, which was second best in the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) and his 150 yards off interception returns placed him first in the MAC. He recorded two interceptions in the final game against Lycoming.



Beast 'Em Up

For the second time in as many years, the LVC field hockey team found themselves in the NCAA Division III Semifinals. The Dutchmen got there by way of a perfect 19-0 regular season and a hard-fought playoff run. Bowdoin College, the eventual national champions, ended the Valley's run when they defeated LVC 1-0 in the Final Four, held at Ursinus College. If one game could encapsulate the entire season it would be the Oct. 17th contest against Messiah College. For years, the Dutchmen had been foiled by their conference rivals, until finally besting the Falcons in last year's Commonwealth Conference Championship game. This season, the Valley traveled to Grantham and made a statement, winning the game 4-2. Throughout the year, awards abounded for LVC. Over the course of the regular season, the Valley accumulated eight Commonwealth Conference weekly awards. In the postseason, the Valley cleaned up in the CC Awards, placing seniors Mimi Sullivan and Chelsea Byers, junior Alex Wolfe, and sophomore Caitlin Baro on the All-Commonwealth Conference First Team, as senior Shauna Enck, junior Amber Corcoran and sophomores Avery Carter and Nicole Bomberger landed on the All-Commonwealth Conference Second Team. In addition to the all-star awards, Sullivan took down Commonwealth Conference Player of the Year honors, freshman Shelly Lobach earned Rookie of the Year honors. Sullivan and Wolfe were also named All-Americans by the NFHCA. LVC ended their fine season with a 21-2 overall record and a 4-0 record in the conference.

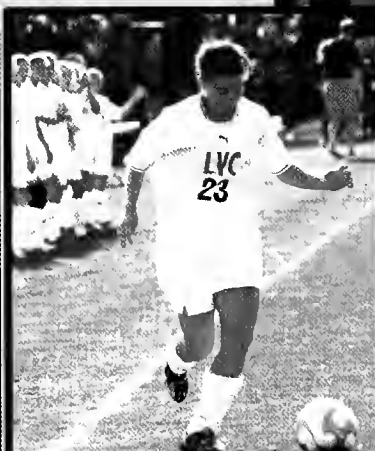
The 2007 season for the men's soccer team started off with a bang, winning six of their first eight games. However, in the final 10 regular season contests, the Dutchmen were only able to muster two ties, finishing the season with an overall record of 6-10-2. In conference play, LVC was unable to tally a victory in the win column, posting a 0-4-1 record. Starting the season 3-0 on the road is impressive but outscoring their opponents by an 11-2 margin was even better. Freshman forward King Saah during the winning streak tallied four goals and an assist as seniors Zach Barkus and Ben Wagner chipped in offensively, as Barkus found the back of the net once and Wagner added two goals. Barkus also gathered three assists in the victories over King's College, the University of Scranton, and Ursinus College. On the season, Saah led the offense, scoring seven goals and adding two assists. He recorded 16 points in his 16 games played while putting home three game winners. Barkus finished second on the team in points as he recorded 13 points on four goals and five assists. In the home opener at Herbert Field on September 13 hosting Delaware Valley College, the Valley scored three in the first period en route to a 5-1 victory. Seniors Chris Rothermel, Mark Johnson, Dan Pitonyak, Wagner, and sophomore Mark Johnson scored Dutchmen goals on the day. Sophomore Travis Steedle was the other player posting a double-digit scoring output during the 2007 campaign, reaching 10 points on four goals and two assists in his 18 games played. Between the pipes, junior starting goaltender Tim Mehl turned in a solid season for Lebanon Valley. In his 15 games started and 18 games played, Mehl accumulated 1432 minutes, allowing only 30 goals as he carded a 1.89 goals against average mark. He stopped 81 shots and held a .730 save percentage as he concluded the season with a 6-9-2 overall record and two shutouts.

KICKING IT UP A NOTCH!

After starting the 2007 season with an 0-3 record, the Lebanon Valley College women's soccer team reeled off 10 victories in the final 15 regular season contests, posting an overall 10-8-1 record and a Commonwealth Conference mark of 2-4. After three consecutive 1-0 defeats, the Dutchmen were able to string together a six-game winning streak, which lasted over two weeks. In the second win of the season as LVC hosted the Aggies of Delaware Valley College, the Valley was able to show the home crowd at Herbert Field (2001 STMA College Field of the Year) something special. In overtime, junior Jenny DiMauro ripped a shot that hit off the goalkeeper and sailed into the cage at the 94:00 minute mark that led the Dutchmen to the 2-1 victory. For the season, DiMauro led the squad with 14 points on six goals and two assists. She also tied for the team lead with two game-winning goals while starting in all 18 games. In the first conference game of the season, the Dutchmen proved to be too much for archrival Albright College as LVC defeated the Lions by a final score of 2-0 on October 16 at Herbert Field. Goals tallied by junior Emily Bainbridge and freshman Lauren King were enough to give junior goalkeeper Erika Ely enough breathing room. King, in 10 games played, scored four goals and posted eight points. Ely, in her nearly 1500 minutes between the pipes, allowed only 17 goals during the season, giving her a .844 save percentage. She was able to notch an 8-6-1 overall record, including seven shutouts. In the playoff-clinching game, the Dutchmen took care of business, defeating Lycoming 2-0 on October 27. Goals by junior Erin McGarvey and sophomore Dana Thomsen sealed the deal for the fourth seed in the Commonwealth Conference playoffs.

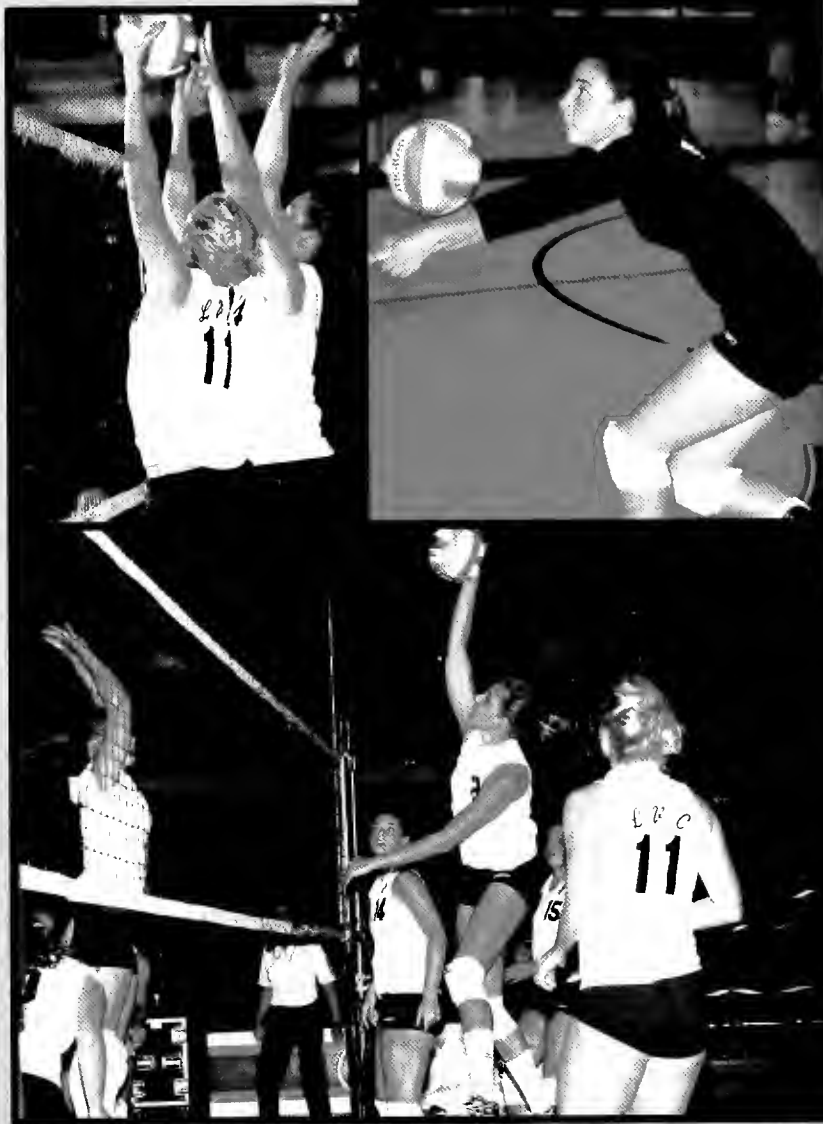
Perry's Pack

During one stretch in the year, the Dutchmen were able to win 14 of 19 matches. After going 11-6, the squad hosted Lycoming College to kick off the conference schedule on September 26 at the LVC Gymnasium. Lebanon Valley won the match 3-0 as they shut down the Warriors by final scores of 30-21, 30-13, and 30-13. Junior Margaret Prebula tallied 13 kills during all three matches as freshmen Emily Hopkins and Joelle Snyder each posted 11 kills in the three matches. Senior Jill Miller recorded 15 digs in the three-match sweep. Playoff Fever

After falling in the first two Commonwealth Conference contests of the season, the men's basketball team was victorious in five of the final eight regular season games against conference foes, earning an overall 11-15 mark in the 2007-08 campaign while clinching a playoff spot. As the Dutchmen ended January with a disappointing 7-11 record, the Valley played solid in the month of February, posting a 5-4 record. In the final three regular season games, LVC swept the schedule as the squad defeated Elizabethtown and Messiah in nail-biting fashion at home and went on the road to defeat conference leader Lycoming. On Hot Dog Frank Day and Senior Day as the Blue Jays came to town, junior Dan Hodge stole the show as he recorded his second-best performance of the year with 25 points, drilling 7-of-12 from the field, including 5-of-7 from downtown. He finished the game in the final two minutes with two shots from beyond the arc to ice the contest 78-70. On the year, Hodge led his team in scoring in eight games as he finished the season in the two-guard role averaging 11.9 points per game and 63 assists in 710 total minutes from the hardwood. While hosting the Falcons with all playoff hopes riding on the game, junior Dustin Kerns allowed his team to play another day, while scoring the go-ahead bucket with just 2.3 seconds left on the clock and defeating Lebanon Valley's arch-nemesis Messiah College 68-65. Junior Kyle Enoch started the magical play, as he came down with a defensive rebound, passed the basketball off to Hodge who airmailed the ball downcourt into the hands of Kerns who took it to the rack, kissed the ball off the glass, and celebrated his biggest shot of the season. Enoch led the Dutchmen on the season in many categories: 12.6 points, 2.7 assists, 1.9 steals, 36.4 minutes, 2.2 three-pointers, and 4.5 field goals made per game in all 26 starts. After defeating the Warriors on the road 72-68 and earning a playoff birth as the number four seed in the conference tournament, LVC unfortunately fell to Lycoming four days later in the first round by a final score of 71-56.

A Season To Remember

While finishing the season with a 24-6 overall record and a 6-4 conference record, LVC proved to be the most improved team in NCAA Division III history, turning a 7-17 program around into one of the finest in the country. With four freshmen getting the nod in the starting five for the 2007-2008 campaign, the squad of 12 improved their record from a year ago by 14 games. The Dutchmen started the season on a tear, reeling off 14 consecutive wins. On February 5, LVC hosted Lycoming for a Commonwealth Conference showdown. It was a nail-biting 76-75 overtime victory for the women in the blue and white. For the game, junior forward Megan Bish turned in an all-around outstanding performance, posting a double-double in her 30 minutes off the bench. She finished the game with 26 points on 9-of-14 shooting and knocked down 6-of-7 from the line. In addition, she grabbed 11 boards and canned two three-pointers, with the final 22-foot trey going in with just 11 seconds on the clock. Bish finished the season fourth on the team with 8.5 points per game in 30 games played. With a 20-4 regular season, LVC was awarded the third seed in the conference playoffs, traveling to Albright College for the first round on February 27. After being snubbed of an NCAA playoff birth, the Dutchmen were given an ECAC South Tournament bid as they took the number three seed. After 67-50 and 65-55 victories over Dickinson College on March 5 and Pitt Greensburg on March 8, LVC ultimately fell in the championship game to Washington and Jefferson on March 9 by a final score of 78-70. In game one, freshman guard Lori Lidlow led Lebanon Valley with 13 points on 6-of-8 shooting from the floor in addition to her seven boards in 31 minutes of action. Bish led the team in game two with 20 points off the bench as she converted on 6-of-9 from the floor, drilled 3-of-4 from downtown, and sank 5-of-6 from the charity stripe. Lidlow was Lebanon Valley's leading scorer with 13.9 points per game.

On Sept. 8, the squad hosted the LVC Invitational at Memorial Lake State Park at Fort Indiantown Gap, which was one of the better finishes for the Dutchmen. On the afternoon, the men placed fourth out of 10 teams and the women finished fifth of nine teams, giving the men 98 total points and the women 121 total points. For the 8,050-meter competition, senior Kyle Himmelreich carded an outstanding performance, turning in a fifth-place finish with a time of 28:30:00. Other notable competitors for the Valley who turned in solid performances were freshman Brad Sweigart, placing eighth and sophomore Guillermo Munoz finishing in 19th place. A week later, at the Baptist Bible College Invitational on Sept. 15, Himmelreich and Abbott were outstanding, as he won the 110-man event with a time of 27:38:06 as she tallied third place in 20:30:91. Sweigart and Munoz placed in the top 10 as junior Chris Bauer earned a spot in the top 20. Cronin culminated the event in eighth place as seniors Brittany Duke and Allison Conety rounded out the top 20.

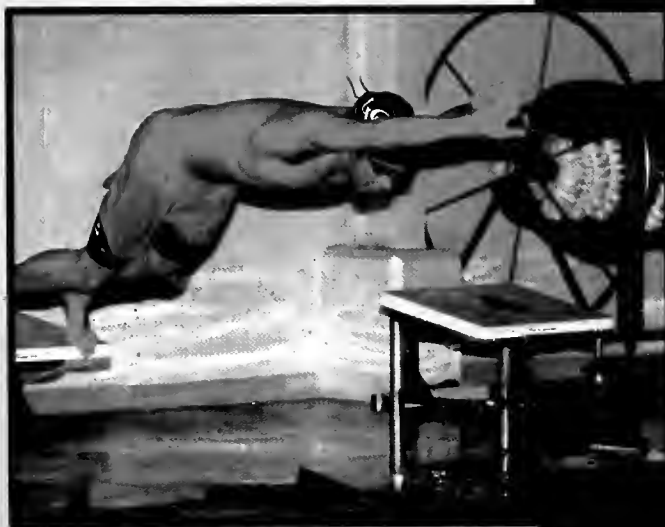

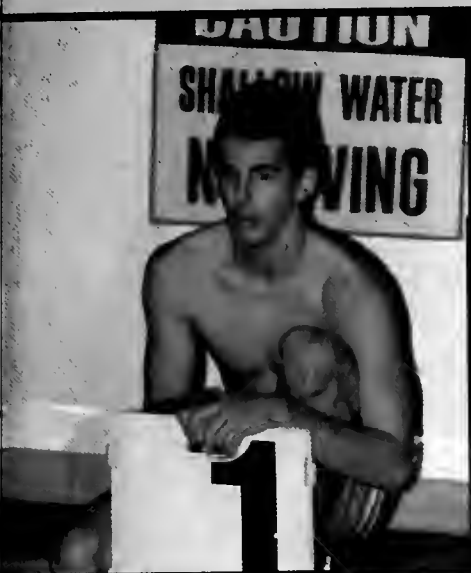

Freshman standout Jenn Cronin shined at the DeSchraver Invitational held at East Stroudsburg University on Feb. 2. Boys of Spring

While the LVC baseball team was victorious in their first two outings of the 2008 season with victories over Juniata and Kenyon, the squad struggled during the rest of the season, posting an overall 11-25 record and a 1-11 mark in conference play. During the month of March, the Dutchmen were able to string together four consecutive victories, defeating Lancaster Bible College, Dickinson and Ursinus. Going into the final game of the season, LVC was given the chance to enter the Commonwealth Conference four-team playoff bracket, but ultimately fell to Widener University by a final score of 6-5. On the year, the Valley offense was led by senior second baseman John Mentzer, who started in all 36 contests, posting a .388 batting average. In the 2008 campaign, the hot-hitting Mentzer went 52-for-134 at the dish, lacing 10 doubles, three homeruns, and 34 RBIs. Junior Joe Soupik placed second on the team in batting average, recording a .364 average (32-for-88) with three homeruns and 21 RBIs. As the starting first baseman, Soupik carded a sizzling .984 fielding percentage, only committing four errors at the hot corner, tallying 236 putouts. Senior third baseman Corey Lamoureux also turned in a solid season, batting .282 with 35 hits, 19 RBIs, and 39 total bases. Lamoureux also led the team with six stolen bases. On the mound, senior Andrew Pipkin led the Dutchmen with a 3-1 record in 15 appearances. On the year, the southpaw posted a 6.00 ERA, allowing 18 earned runs in 27 innings pitched. Junior southpaw Nick Faria ended 2008 with a 3-3 overall mark with an 8.35 ERA. Faria, in his 10 appearances, fanned 19 batters in 36.2 innings pitched.

Conference Champs!

After starting the season 3-4 on their annual spring break trip, the LVC softball team concluded the regular season with a 24-9 record and a 9-1 conference record. In the Commonwealth Conference playoffs, the Dutchmen defeated Elizabethtown and Messiah by final scores of 9-0 to reach the championship game, squaring off against the Blue Jays for the second time in as many days. At one point during the season, LVC reeled off an 18-2 record, riding two eight-game winning streaks. This accomplishment revealed the endurance and strength of the squad, but the Commonwealth Conference Championship showed fans what this team is really made of. The group of 16 fought back in the home half of the seventh, defeating the Blue Jays in a 4-3 come-from-behind Valley victory. The Lebanon Valley offense produced five hits in the first six innings of the contest, as Elizabethtown scored their only three runs of the game on a three-run homer in the fifth off of freshman phenom Laura Snyder. Snyder earned her 14th victory in her seven solid innings of work, fanning 11 Blue Jays.

Sanford recorded a .529 on-base percentage from the leadoff position as Salisbury slammed five home runs in the cleanup spot in the lineup. Sophomore third baseman Allie Davies posted a .337 average at the plate with 17 RBIs. The team collectively hit .302 with a .422 slugging percentage.

For the season, Krajnik and Fisher averaged rounds of 84.1 and 86.4 in 13 and 14 rounds of golf respectively. Calvario averaged an 87.9 in his 11 rounds on the links.

While four LVC men's tennis players were able to earn 10 or more wins during the 2007-2008 campaign, the squad was able to reach a 13-8 overall mark, going .500 in the conference at 2-2. The team marched off on the right foot in their season and home opener at the LVC Tennis Courts on September 15, defeating Susquehanna University, 7-2. In flights one and two in singles play, sophomore Matt Grodzinski and junior Jared Zeigler were able to record victories, winning 6-3, 6-2 and 6-3, 11-9. Freshman Tom Neckelmann and sophomore Jonathan Gingrich also were victorious on the afternoon, clinching 6-0, 6-3 and 6-3, 6-4 wins.
