Q: What was your greatest accomplishment while at LVC?

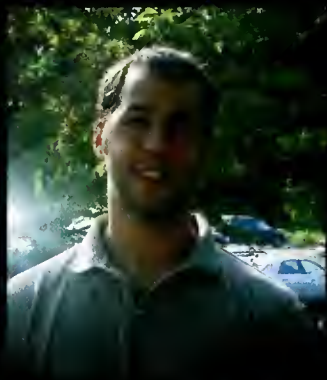

A: The people...you can get to know a lot of people well because of how small the school is.



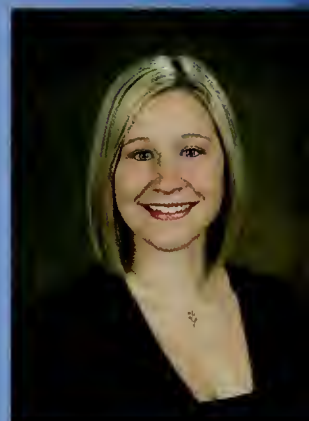

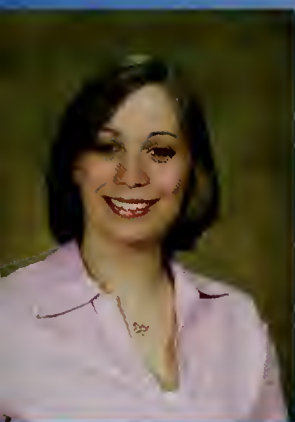

Q: What are your plans for the future?

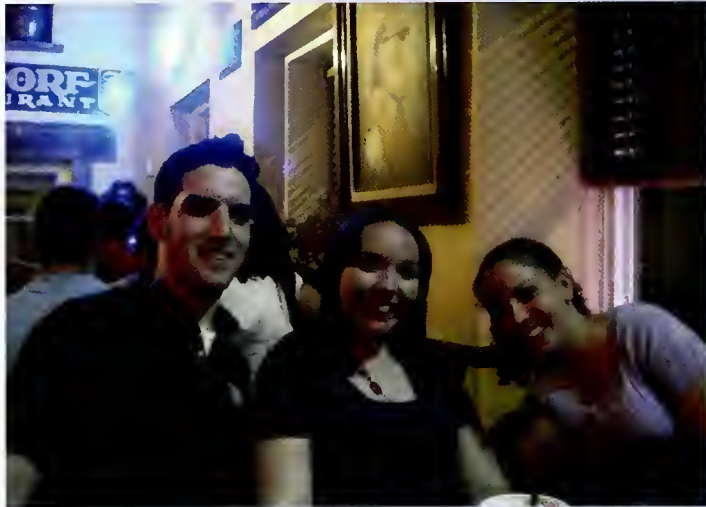
A: I plan to volunteer with InterVarsity Christian Fellowship for a year and then plan to pursue graduate school in hopes of becoming a licensed professional counselor.

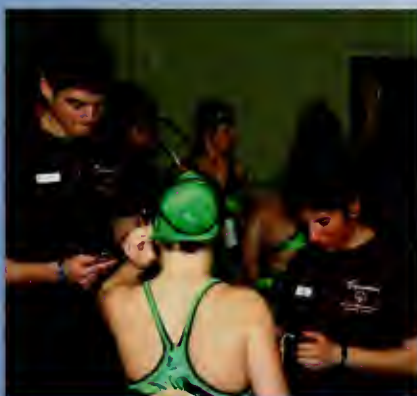

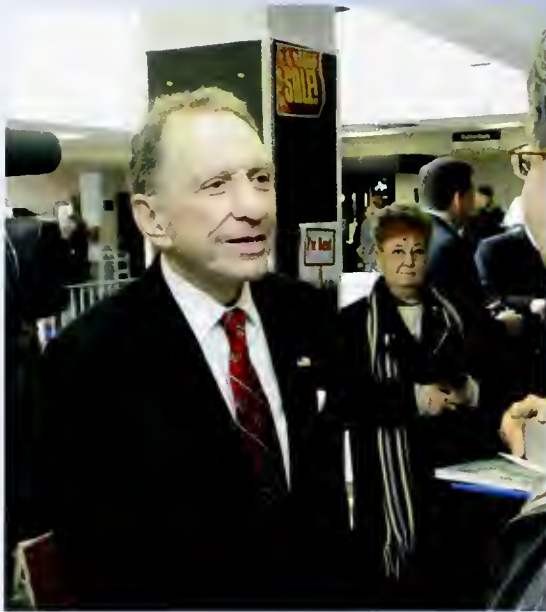

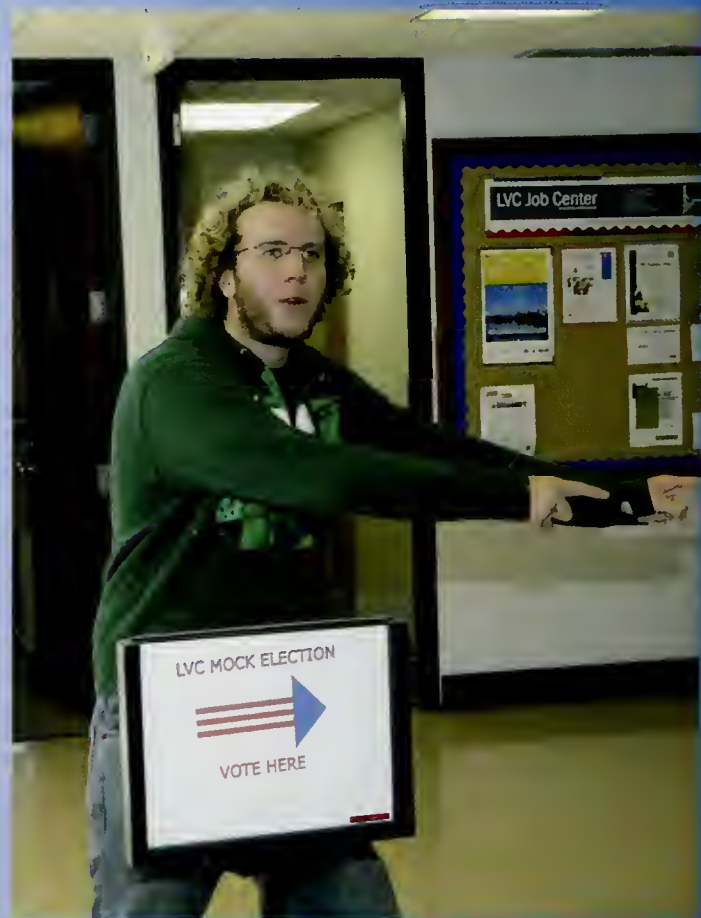

The 2008 Presidential Election saw two United States Senators square off for the nation's top office in a time of economic turmoil and uncertainty. Even before polls opened in November, though, LVC hosted its own mock election through La Vie Collegienne, College Conservatives, and College Democrats. The election was open to 2,189 students and employees of the college, though in the end the turnout was much less than expected. Current President Barack Obama won the LVC election with 380 votes, followed by Sen. John McCain with 179 votes. In total, 598 participants cast a ballot.

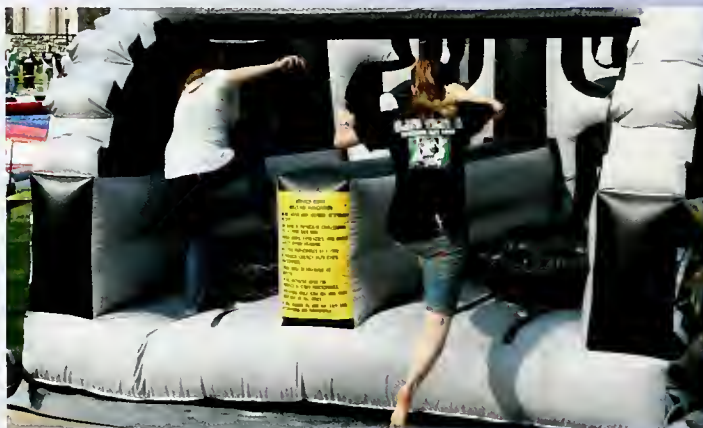

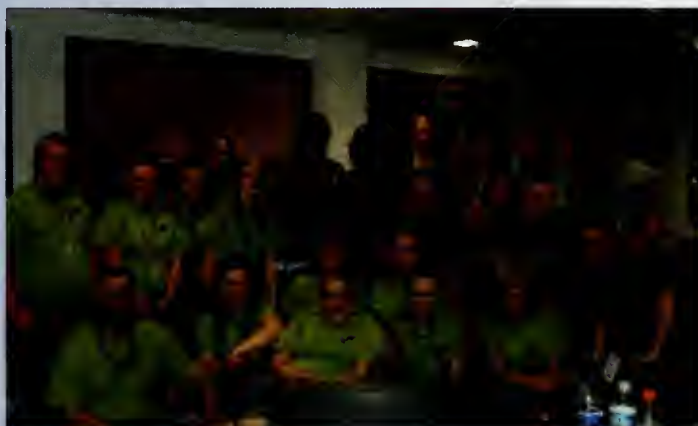

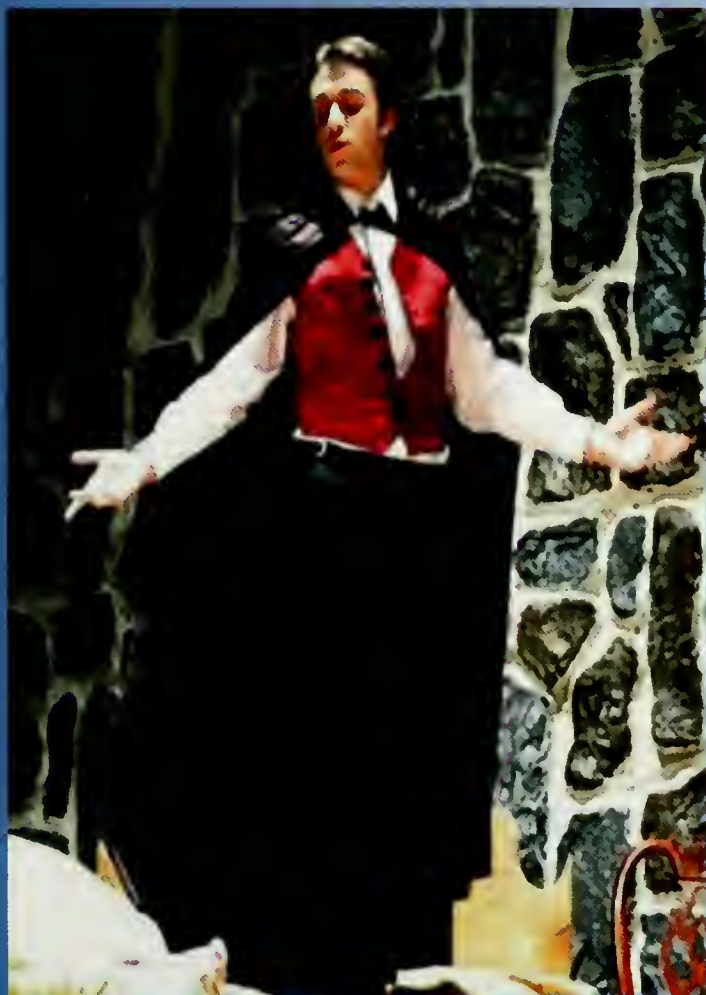

After a 2007 season in which the team went 4-6, the Dutchmen rebounded to go 6-4 in 2008 for the second time in the last three seasons under 16th-year Head Coach Jim Monos. Leading the squad on the season offensively was Charlie Parker '10, who racked up 1,133 all-purpose yards with 936 yards on the ground. He played in eight games at tailback, scoring eight touchdowns en route to being named a First-Team All-Commonwealth Conference selection. Wide receiver Joe Brennan '10 also turned in a brilliant season on offense, hauling in 44 catches for 813 yards, scoring nine touchdowns. He received Second-Team All-Commonwealth Conference accolades for his success. He started in all 10 games, aiding quarterback Caleb Fick '11. Fick threw for 1,782 yards and 15 touchdowns while racking up a 126.5 efficiency rating. Brittany Ryan '11, the first female to suit up and record a point in Valley football history, was efficient in 2008, going 3-for-3 in field goals and 27-of-30 in the PAT department. On defense, linebacker Brian Cottone '09 led the Dutchmen with 71 tackles, leading to the honor of being named the MAC Defensive Player of the Year, which also put him on the first-team all-conference team. In addition, he was named to the Third-Team All-East squad by d3football.com. Also joining Parker, Cottone, and Brennan on the all-conference team are Brian Lynch '10, Sean Tetreault '10, Jason Sneeringer '11, Zach Bleiler '11, and Dane Eichelberger '10.

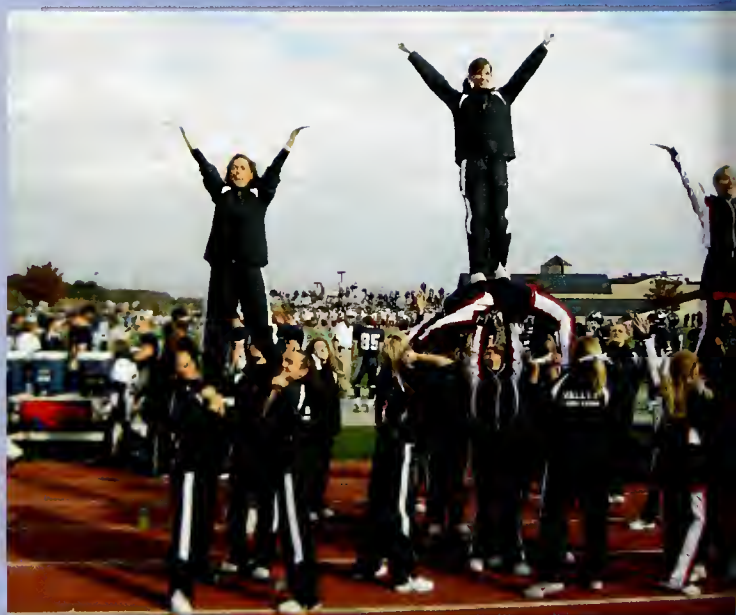
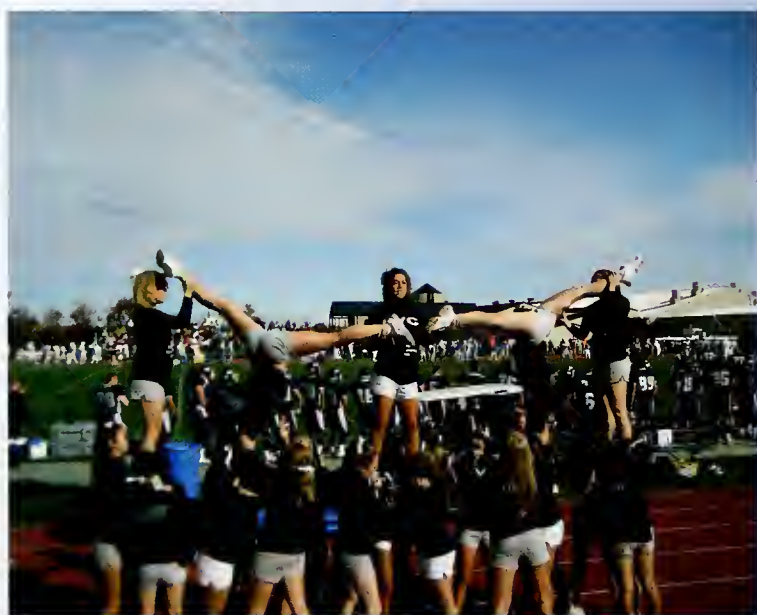

For the Lebanon Valley College men's golf team, home-field advantage took effect as the five-man White team finished second in the annual LVC Spring Invitational. Out of the 19 teams hitting the links at the Lebanon Country Club on Monday, April 6, the Dutchmen under 20th-year Head Coach Lou Sorrentino '54 shot a season-low 323 with three men placing in the top 25 of the 97-man field. Leading LVC on the afternoon were Charlie Fisher '09 and Steve Garby '10, both carding an 80 to finish tied for 14th place. Brian Moskevich '12 finished just one stroke behind Fisher and Garby, shooting an 81 to place 18th in the field. Four-year golfer Mike Krajnik '09 finished 24th in the field, posting an 82 on the par-72 course. Lebanon Valley's Blue Team finished 15th on the day, led by Matt Becker '12 and his 86. On an individual note, LVC's Matt Staub '10 carded an 86 at his first collegiate tournament. On Thursday, April 9, the Dutchmen struggled at the Elizabethtown Blue Jay Classic and placed 18th out of a possible 19 teams at the Hershey Country Club East Course. Jablonski led the Valley on the par-71 course, shooting an 85, while Fisher, Garby, Krajnik, and Matt Snyder '11 finished out the scoring. Fisher carded an 86 with Garby and Krajnik following with an 87 and 88 respectively. Snyder rounded out the scoring with an 89.

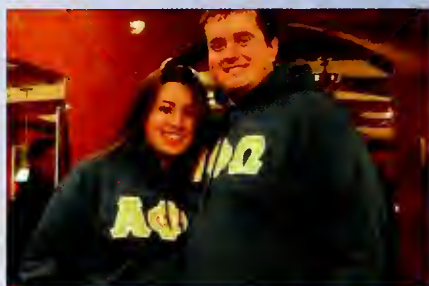
