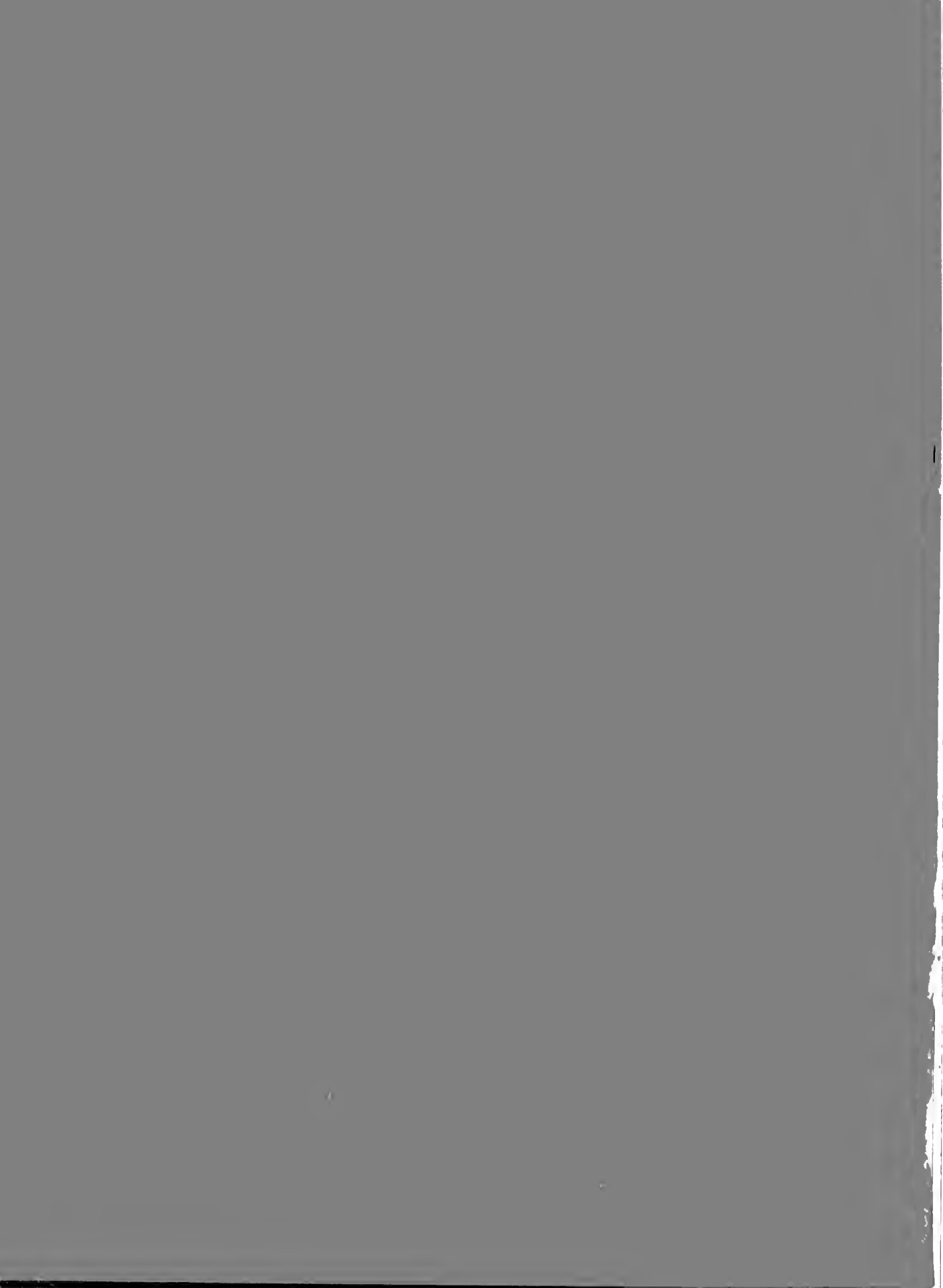

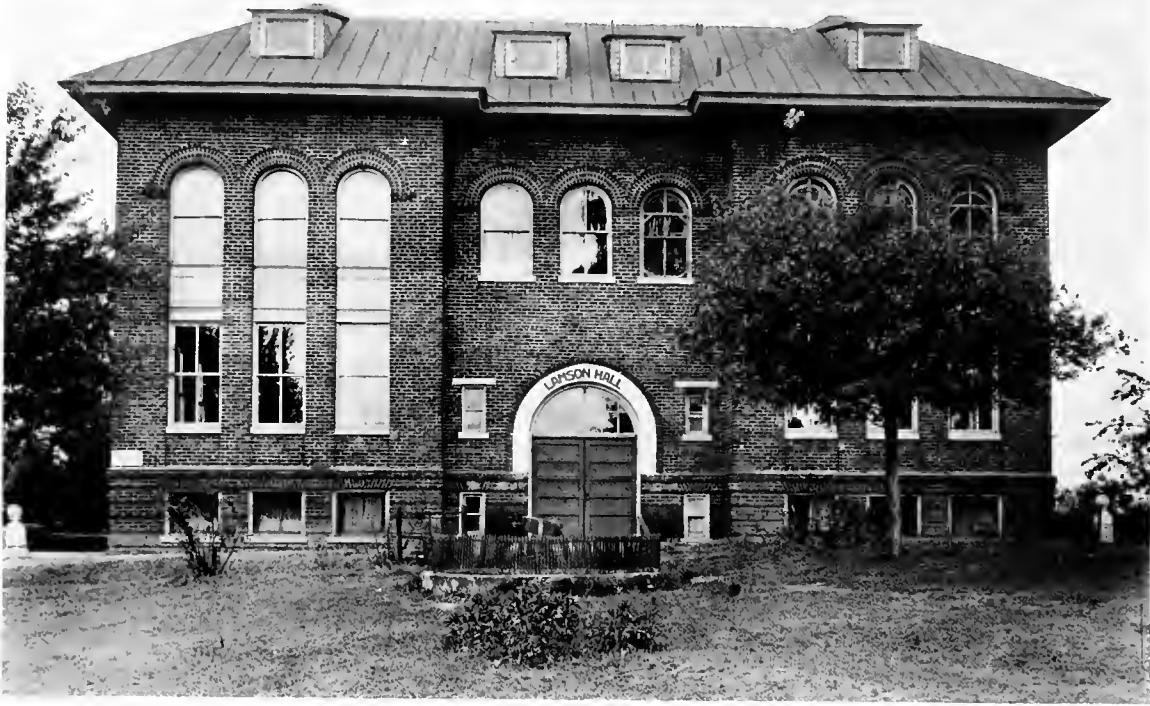

WINSTON-SALEM STATE COLLEGE HISTORY AND HIGHLIGHTS

Winston-Salem State College was established as "The Slater Industrial Academy" by Simon Green Atkins in Columbio Heights at Winston-Salem, North Carolina, in September, 1892. The academy was named for John F. Slater, a philanthropist who established the Slater Fund for educational purposes and to foster industrial education. Early trustees were S.G. Atkins, J.S. Hill, E.P. Mayo, W.A. Blair, H.R. Storbuck, Thomas H. Sutton, J.C. Alston, C.N. Grandison, C.B. Cash, Henry E. Fries, and A.H. Eller. Mr. Fries became chairman and Mr. Blair became treasurer of the Board of Trustees. The Slater Industrial Academy actually began operations in 1893 with 25 pupils and one teacher.

Dr. S.G. Atkins, first president of the College, devoted his full time as head of the school starting in 1895. About 1905 he was succeeded by Professor C.G. O'Kelly who was followed in office by Professor F.M. Kennedy. Dr. S.G. Atkins returned as head of the institution sometime prior to 1915.

On March 6, 1899, the General Assembly of North Carolina passed a new enactment under which the name of the institution became Slater Industrial and State Normal School.

On July 13, 1905, the Trustees of Slater Industrial

and State Normal School conveyed the institution and its properties to the State Board of Education of North Carolina. The school thus passed under the full control of the State. It was not until 1920, however, that the first class completed regular courses above the high school level. A year later, the Slater State Normal School was placed under the supervision of the State Board of Education.

From the beginning, the school has insisted upon the vital importance of Negro citizenship, and emphasis has, therefore, constantly been placed upon the quality and quantity of training for these teachers. By an act ratified on March 7, 1925, the General Assembly of North Carolina enacted in Section 1 that: "The Slater State Normal School, located at Winston-Salem, shall hereafter be known as the Winston-Salem Teachers College." The General Assembly granted the school a new charter, extending its curricula above high school and empowered it under authority of the State Board of Education to confer appropriate degrees. The Winston-Salem Teachers College thus became the first Negro institution in the United States to grant degrees for teaching in the elementary grades.

In 1953 the Nursing School of Winston-Salem Teachers College was established. The basic nursing program covers four calendar years of study, with equal emphasis on academic and professional training. Graduates are granted the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

Having served the school and college from its beginning until his death in 1934, except for the intermediate principalships of C.G. O'Kelly and F.M. Kennedy, Dr. S.G. Atkins was succeeded by his son, Dr. Francis L. Atkins, who served as president until his retirement in July, 1961.

Dr. Kenneth R. Williams was elected President of the College in 1961.

DR. S. G. ATKINS

President of Winston-Salem (N. C.) Teachers College

There are few men in all the world that merit a special article in a newspaper or magazine. Who a man is as well as what he does will determine his imprint upon his peers and posterity alike.

It was the inimitable critic and writer, Frank Harris, who popularized the habit in modern supposedly great leaders. In his criticisms the breadth and depth or the culture of men weighed more heavily than so many jobs put over to their credit. This being a suitable criterion, the writer is applying the same yard stick in part to Dr. S. G. Atkins, president and founder of the Winston-Salem Teachers College.

The writer has had the pleasure of meeting a number of Negro educators in the South and writers and business men from all sections of the country. In some cases the time spent in conversation with certain of these leaders appears as so much time wasted in an intellectual void. And yet there are many Negro educators, writers, business men, and leaders whose lives are inspiring and stimulating. Dr. Atkins belongs to this group.

Careful Student; Veteran Educator

After all it is not what Dr. Atkins has done, as important as this is, but the man himself that impresses his admirers. He is a careful student of the race problem as well as a veteran educator. His chief interest is in ideas and principles rather than things. The large plant at his college is but the crystallization of his best thought in the field of education. And tho the ideal is high, the school is rapidly approaching it.

Dr. Atkins is a graduate of the St. Augustine Normal and Collegiate Institute and a life long student of social and educational problems. His long years of service in education have added immensely to his formal training in the class room as a student. His years of teaching at Livingstone College, Salisbury, North Carolina, as principal of the Grade School in Winston-Salem, and as secretary of education for the A. M. E. Zion Church were rich with experience.

Under Dr. Atkins' direction and leadership what was formerly The Slater Industrial Academy, incorporated in 1892, has developed thru several stages into The Winston-Salem Teachers College with "A" rating granted by the state of North Carolina, in 1926. The school plant consists of ten large well equipped buildings the majority of which are fire-proof and modern in every respect.

Teacher-Training Pioneer

Dr. Atkins has devoted his whole life to the work of education. He is a pioneer in the field of teacher-training in Negro education. His college is specializing in teacher-training. The Winston-Salem Teachers College, I be-

lieve is the only Negro school specializing in this one branch. From the first it was Dr. Atkins' purpose to develop an institution which could offer expert training in the field of education. So well has he done his work and so successful has been his administration that the school has developed to the point where its plant is valued at \$600,000.00. At its last meeting the State Legislature appropriated \$51,200 a year for two years for current expenses. The increase of 100 in last year's enrollment over that for the previous year is quite significant despite the fact that last year's enrollment was only 281.

While developing Winston-Salem Teachers College, Dr. Atkins has found time to study many aspects of the race problem. He has manifested keen interest in the labor and economic phases of the race problem. He has given serious thought to the important question of Negro leadership, and is one of that small group who sense the failure of Negro leaders to remain true and loyal to the Negro masses. In fact, Dr. Atkins makes the charge that the majority of our leaders are selfish, narrow, and inefficient. They have more interest in their jobs, says he, than they have in the welfare of the race.

Some of His Philosophy

A puritan in morals and religion, Dr. Atkins is quite naturally an adherent of educational principles which will produce men and women of strong Christian character. He believes that age should give youth a chance and that youth should use every opportunity to prepare for a life of usefulness and service.

On meeting Dr. Atkins one is impressed by his plain manners and lack of show regarding himself and all that he has done. He hesitates to talk about himself, but he is deeply concerned with the welfare of his school. One may study the man by conversing with him on the social problems in which he is interested. A mutual discussion of such questions serves to reveal the inner depth and wide range of interests of the educator, for he talks quite freely on all the social problems which affect the race.

Winston-Salem Teachers College is fortunate in having a man of Dr. Atkins' training and practical experience. He has devoted nearly 40 years to educational work, and during that time he has acquired great efficiency in his chosen field by continuous study and persistent efforts to become fully conversant with the requirements and changes in that field.

Contributes Much To Church

The A. M. E. Zion Church, of which Dr. Atkins is a member, has profited by his educational training and experience. As secretary of education he contributed a great deal to the educational program of his denomina-

tion. Thru the many graduates who are now teaching in the South, Dr. Atkins' influence as an educator is being felt in every part of that section. The status of Negro teachers is being constantly raised by the type of training given at the Teachers College. But most of all, Dr. Atkins' work is shaping the lives of North Carolina's colored boys and girls where many of the graduates of the school are teaching.

To broaden and strengthen this influence for good in Negro education, Dr. Atkins is soliciting the aid of the best prepared men and women. As fast as he can secure sufficient funds he is engaging the service of expert instructors and professors in the field of education. As Dr. Atkins says his purpose is to develop a first class college of education where concentrated attention can be given to the definite task of specializing in the whole field of education proper. In other words, The Winston-Salem Teachers College is to become an institution for the special purpose of offering expert training, thru standardized methods and modern equipment, in teacher training.

It is this work which stamps Dr. Atkins as a veteran educator. The significance of his work lies in the fact that it runs counter to the notion that teachers did not need any specialized training. Just as the inspiration of God was supposed to fit the minister for his task so it was thought that ordinary training was sufficient for the teacher. But Dr. Atkins knows better. He realizes that the proper training of children is at once the most delicate and the most difficult calling open to men. If the physician must pass an examination on the basis of standards set up by the profession then teachers must do the same, and Dr. Atkins, is preparing them for the test. In doing this work he is rendering a valuable service not only to North Carolina but to the whole South.

MORE INFORMATION ABOUT OUR COLLEGE . . .

The physical facilities of the College consist of sixteen buildings and a home for the College President. The value of the plant in 1925 was \$513,899.56 and in 1965 the value is approaching \$7,000,000.00.

The College Library is located in the heart of the campus. It has a book collection totaling more than 55,000 volumes, including subscriptions to 300 current periodicals. The School of Nursing has its own departmental library with 2,900 volumes.

Faculty expansion since 1925 shows an increase of 58 members. The number of faculty members with the doctors degree increased from none to 18; the number with the masters degree increased from three to 52; the number with the bachelors degree decreased from 11 to seven.

Courses of study available at the College are courses leading to the bachelors degree in the teaching of English and History, and in Biology, Elementary Education, Health and Physical Education, Music, and Nursing. Summer sessions are an integral part of the college offerings.

In 1961 the College initiated a Division of Extended Services to provide varied educational opportunities for the citizens of the State. The services are designed primarily to provide for academic advancements by way of evening classes and for educational program assistance to community organizations and schools. To date these services have consisted of the following: credit evening classes for adult students; non-credit classes for senior citizens; credit evening classes at the Winston-Salem Air Force Base.

Winston-Salem State College and Southern Illinois University are in the process of developing a co-operative program designed to add strength to the teaching program of Winston-Salem State College. Under this arrangement, it is anticipated that faculty members and students will be exchanged between the two institutions, joint research projects will be conducted, and opportunities will be provided for Winston-Salem State College graduates to study for advanced degrees.

There are 30 organizations—athletic, social, fraternal, and academic—which provide varied activities for the students and faculty. The College Choir can boast of these recent accomplishments:

- Performed for NBC on Great Choirs of America and National Pulpit of the Air
- Participated in Singers Guild and the Winston-Salem Symphony Orchestra
- Participated in performances with High Point College Choir and with Lee Street Methodist Church Choir
- Participated in the Easter Sunrise Service at Radio City Music Hall, New York, and at Phil-

harmonic Hall, Lincoln Center, New York, during the 1965 Easter season.

The College has an extensive athletic program in six sports and is a member of the following national and regional athletic associations:

The Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association
The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics

The National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Students enrolled in the College assist in the community as volunteers, as cadet teachers prior to their student teaching experiences, and as assistants for various agencies.

Enrollment at the College has increased from 981 students in 1959 to 1200 students for the academic year 1964-65. Since the College was founded in 1892, it has graduated 5,000 students. Many of these former students have attained advanced degrees in the fields of education, medicine, and dentistry. A few have entered the field of law, and others have been highly successful in endeavors related to their basic college education at Winston-Salem State College.
