136 DECISIONS AT EAST TORONTO CRUSADE FOR CHRIST

→ joined with some 15 church-1.D. ...es in East Toronto for its annual evangelistic campaign and visitation programme. Due to the larger effort, arrangements for a two week campaign were made, and Dr. Joe Blinco of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association was invited as the evangelist, accompanied by musicians Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Boyd.

The College students took a census of 8,741 homes in the area; conducted 20 children's meetings which had a total attendance of 780, and nearly a dozen children accepted Christ as Saviour.

In the visitation there were 5 decisions for Christ, 443 persons were dealt with, and many unchurched families and children were contacted.

Students also served as counsellors and sang with the Chorale which provided special music on alternate nights. A choir formed by church choirs sang at the other services. In the evening meetings there were 136 decisions for Christ and we thank God.

For the College, it was another opportunity for an evangelistic outreach, to fulfill our great design of witnessing for Christ at home and abroad; and to provide a means of "serving while training".

Students were faced with many and varied situations, some of them very unique. People of all faiths and beliefs (even Buddhists) were witnessed to; situations involving broken homes, alcoholism, sickness and tragedy were met day by day, with a clear, winsome, winning word for Christ. Some of these needy people were saved as the Gospel was presented. Christ is indeed, the answer, for, as the hymn says,


