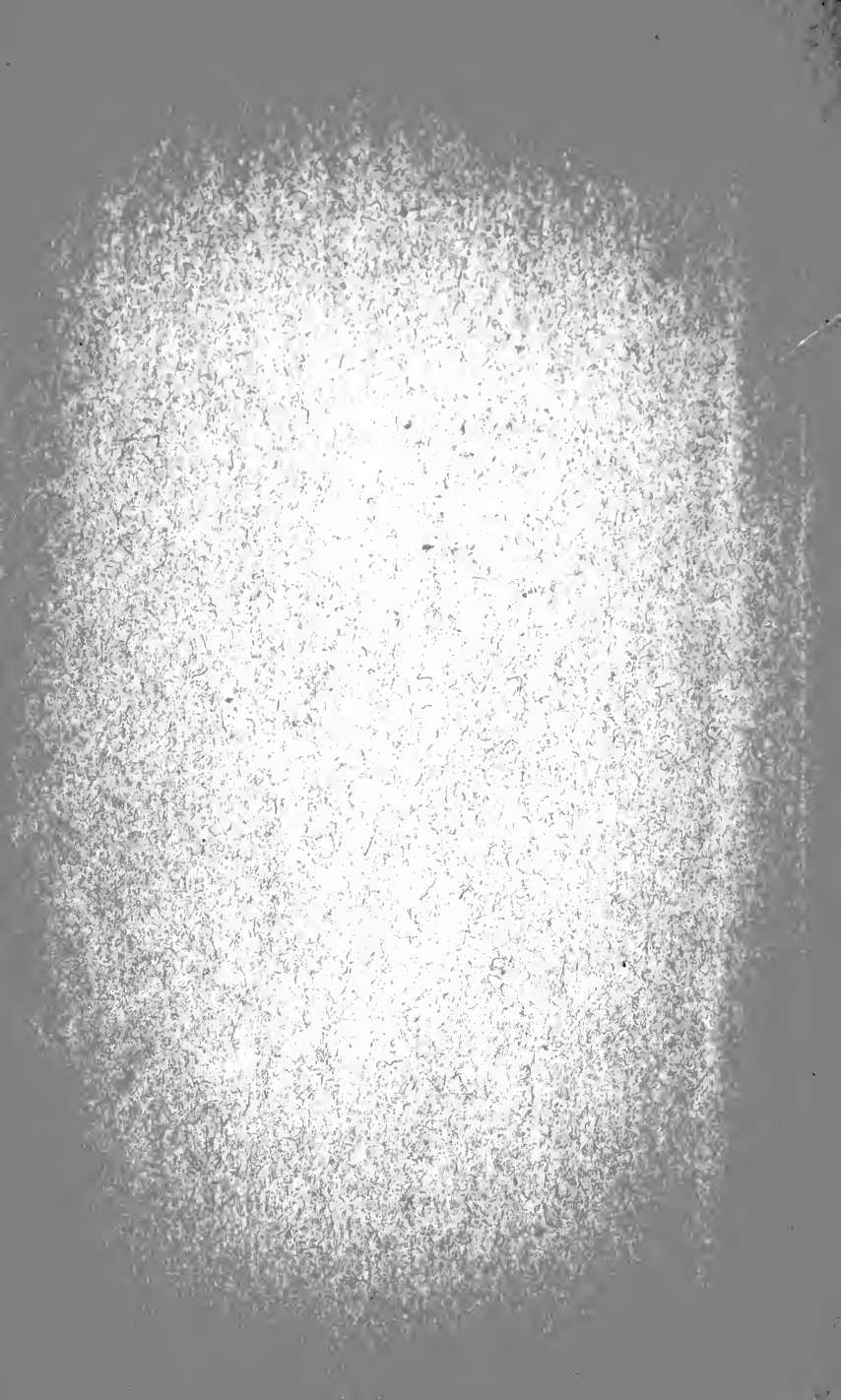

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INTRODUCTORY.

He who can pursue a subject so deep, profound and important, with so many avenues for thought and study opening up in so many diverse directions as that of Genealogy without gathering some thoughts from it that will germinate and yield good fruit for future generations is unworthy the name borne by this Genealogy. The genealogist stands, as no other can, upon the summit of time and looks down the generations past for hundreds of years. He can, like no other, study the influence of circumstances and society upon the different lines for many generations.

It is difficult to calculate the amount of greatness one may possess by inheritance. The mantle of the illustrious does not always fall upon the son, nor does the son always inherit his father's low estate, or meanness. Kepler, the great astronomical calculator, whose mother could neither read or write, and whose father was keeper of a low dirty inn, immortalized his name without ancestral greatness. "Some are born great, some achieve greatness and some have greatness thrust upon them," while some, born with the elements of greatness, die before the opportunity arrives for its development. Well has Gray said of the country church-yard,

"Perhaps in this neglected spot is laid
Some heart once pregnant with celestial fire;
Hand that the rod of empire might have swayed,
And waked to extacy the living lyre."

The true man should be benefitted by his parents' lives whether reckless and low, or careful and illustrious. If his ancestors were low and mean he should shun the causes that made them so, if great, he should be thankful for that greatness to emulate.

This work was commenced and considerable data obtained before a thought of its publication was entertained. It seemed a pleasant and interesting research and the pleasure it afforded was the incentive to its further prosecution. At length correspondence for records and data brought orders for a "Rust Book." Up to this point considerable time and some money had been given to it and from this stage of the work until its completion the chief aim was to make a book as complete and correct as possible, and for that purpose and with that end in view the summer of 1889 was spent in the East, collecting data and other necessary records and information. So far as the labor on the work is concerned, it at first appeared as the apex of a small mole-hill, but as difficulties, annoyances and data for the work increased, it soon became a mountain of gigantic proportions, and it was more so because no genealogy of the family had ever been published, more so because at the inception I possessed no knowledge whatever of such work, or of the existence of other genealogical works, or even of the existence of any genealogical society, and more so because of the great remoteness from the land of my ancestors, and still more so because of my limited means to carry through such a work especially as all my time was needed in my regular publishing business.

Returning from Boston in 1889, my work again commenced with over 400 pages of additional data. It was then easier to understand the force of what Rev. Augustine Caldwell, of Ipswich, once wrote me; he said: "It requires all the grace of Heaven to get a genealogy correct and then it does not always prove wholly correct."

The first information received in answer to genealogical inquiries was from an aunt, Mrs. Sally (Rust) French, and bears date, March 9, 1858. That letter bridged a chasm which could not otherwise have been passed. My grandfather, an orphan at one year of age, his mother remarrying and moving far away, leaving the child in the hands of strangers, formed this well-nigh impassable chasm. In 1878, at the time the work was commenced with a view of following it up with any degree of regularity, this aunt and her father had passed away, leaving

only the letter mentioned through which to connect the living with the dead records.

In 1886 it was determined to print a private volume in a cheap form, embracing the results of the research thus far, but with the rapid growth of the records, grew also the interest of prominent members of the family. My time was mostly devoted to the work until June, 1889. since which my entire time has been given to it, not only my own time but also most of the time of her whose life and interests are so closely united with this immediate family. Since 1886 the date of publication has not appeared more than a year distant. While in Boston in 1889, it was determined to have the printing and binding done in the East where there were much better facilities for such work than any part of the west or southwest afforded. Copy for the book was sent at different times to three different publishers in the East, but becoming satisfied that the work would not be done as satisfactorily there as here under the personal and immediate supervision of one most familiar with the work as well as being acquainted with the printing business, where every detail of the work could be carefully watched and all the changes or additions arriving during the time it was in press, noted and properly arranged, the copy was recalled, new material purchased and January 2, 1891 the first type was set for the work. Many unlooked-for hindrances, together with the very great care and constant attention in comparing and correcting by the original records, has protracted the time to about double what was expected.

It is useless here to attempt to describe the endless amount of labor, the great care and multiplicity of annoyances entailed upon the conscientious genealogist, as that can be found and not too highly colored in almost all other like works.

This genealogy is so condensed that while it is clear and comprehensive it would have made a book one half its size larger had the usual number of words found in such works been employed in this. Many lines of those not Rusts but whose descendants have intermarried with the Rusts have been carried back to the emigrant ancestor

or beyond ; these are always found in foot-notes.

Most genealogists give less credit to public than to private records, but experience in this work has been that it is much easier to harmonize public than private records. Different dates are given for the same event by different members of the same family, and different names have been given to the same person by own brothers and sisters ; this has been a frequent occurrence and after a half dozen or perhaps a dozen letters have been written in an attempt to harmonize the records, no other way remained but to leave them as unsightly and prima facia errors. The errors for which the author is responsible, although an immense amount of care, toil and study has been given the work, will be enough without publicly assuming the errors of others, and it is hoped the family will not be too severe, but charitable in their criticisms.

What this work is has been made by one alone at his own expense without that systematic and organized assistance needed upon such a work, and in its present form is submitted to the family.

ENGLISH FAMILIES OF RUST.

The earliest mention of Rust of which the author has been able to learn is of one Hugh Rust in England in A. D., 1312. In Vol. VII., *Conventione Literæ* is a document drawn up in England, A. D., 1379, where mention is made of Thomas and Robert Rust. Dr. George Rust, a learned English prelate, a native of Cambridge, England, originally of Catherine Hall, and Proceeding B. A., 1646, and M. A., 1650; as a member of that house he took the degree of B. D. in Christ College, Cambridge, in 1658. He was invited into Ireland by Bishop Jeremy Taylor, ordained deacon and priest on the same day, May 7, 1661, and instituted to the deaconry of Connor, August 31, 1661. In 1662 the Crown presented him to the rectory of Island McGee. In 1664 he was rector of Lisburn and in 1667 was raised to the bishopric of Dromore, where he died in December, 1670, and was interred in the choir of the cathedral of Dromore, in the same vault with his friend Jeremy Taylor. Archdeacon Bonney said of him: "A person of whom no commendation could be extravagant." From Thompson Cooper's *Biographical Dictionary*, (London, 1873,) we find that Dr. George Rust wrote "A Discourse of Truth," and "Discourse of the use of Reason in Matters of Religion." "His Remains were published 1686, by Henry Hallywell."

Mr. Ezra Rust, of Saginaw, Michigan, who has spent several summers in England and upon the continent, obtained some valuable data of Rust from the Herald's college, being extracts from Davy's Suffolk Collection. The following are a few of the facts obtained by Mr. Rust:

Rev. Edgar Rust was born in 1799; died May 17, 1849. (About 1840 the family changed the surname to D'Eye.) He was the father of nine children. The arms borne by Rev. Edgar Rust, of Abbott's Hall, Stowemar-

ket, Rector and Patron of Drinkston, County Suffolk, England, as described in *Burk's Heraldry*: "A Saltire az. betw. two Roman fasces, in pale ppr. and as many crosses pattee fitchee in fesse gu. Crest:—A demi lion gu. holding in the dexter paw an ivory rod and charged on the shoulder with three crosses pattee fitchee chevronwise or. Motto:—*Veritatis et æquitatis tenax.*" Rev. Edgar Rust was an only child and was the great-grandson of John Rust, of Stowemarket, a linen draper, born 1696; made his will May 1, 1775, proved January 23, 1776. He had one sister and three brothers, one of whom, Robert of Wortham, County of Suffolk, a clothier, was born 1669; married Mary Russell and died May 24, 1737. Robert was the father of twelve children, one of whom, Thomas Rust, born 1703, the author believes to be the Thomas whose record appears in the parish register of North Lopham, Norfolk Co., and who married first, Hannah ——. She died and was buried April 7, 1738, and he married second, October 2, 1738, widow Susan Astin. She died and was buried March 28, 1743. Thomas Rust, by his first wife, had, besides other children, William, baptised in North Lopham, December 19, 1734. He was the father of Thomas Rust, of Stowemarket, who was the father of Rev. Cyprian Thomas Rust, born March 25, 1808, late Rector of Westerfield, Suffolk Co., now living with his son, Rev. John Cyprian Rust, Vicar of Soham, Cambridgeshire, England. Rev. Edgar Rust's father, John Edgar Rust, Esq., of Stowemarket, was Deputy-Lieutenant of Suffolk Co., and one of the oldest magistrates on the bench at the time of his death, March 31, 1840, aged seventy-three years.

After dilligent effort to learn of a coat of arms to which the descendants of Henry Rust have a right, no such has been found.

Walter Rust, who was born in 1615, left a charity:

" BATTISFORD CHARITIES.

RUST CHARITY.

"A rent charge of £1 a year, given by the will of Walter Rust, who died in 1685, is paid by the occupier of a farm called Valley Farm, in Battisford, now or late

the property of Mrs. Jackaman, & is distributed in Bread, given yearly about 22 July, by the occupier among the poor persons of the parish at his discretion."

CHURCH NOTES.

Against the N. Wall on a large Mural Monument of White Marble.

"In the Vestry near this Place Lyeth the body of Walter Rust of Battisford, in the county of Suffolk gent. and Lydia his wife, who departed this life the 16th day of July 1685, aged 70 years. And the said Walter Rust did (by his last Will and Testament) bequeath twenty Shillings worth of Bread to be given to the Poor of the said Parish at or in the Porch of the said Parish church upon every twenty-second day of July forever.

Above is a white shield, but no arms upon it."

An examination of the early records of the parish of Hingham, Norfolk Co., England, discloses records of only the following Rusts :

"Marriage—13 day of Oct 1655, Peter Rust and Mary Hubord."

North Lopham records, same county, disclose this early record.

"Marriage—Johannes Rust solut et Elizabeth Womock solut nupt fuere vicesemo septo octobris 1625." She died January 27, 1651.

SOUTHERN RUSTS.

It was the original purpose to include in this volume record of all the Rusts in the United States; but the data collected of Henry Rust and his descendants has grown to such proportions that the idea was abandoned and only a synopsis can here be given.

What may be called the Southern branch of the Rust family is quite numerous and from it have sprung several attaining national prominence. The compiler has made a careful and persistent effort to collect and arrange the records of this branch, but it has been very unsatisfactory on account of the loss and destruction of both public

and private records during the civil war, besides there is much less interest manifested by the Southern branch than by the descendants of Henry Rust.

The earliest record of any Rusts in the South is revealed by two wills. One is the will of William Rust, made in Westmoreland county, Virginia, March 18, 1696-7; proved 28 July, 1697, witnessed by George Rust and others. Children named: William, Ann and Margaret. Probably Samuel, and George who witnessed the will, were also his children. His wife's name was Margaret. Another will was made in the same county by William Rust and bears date 1699. This was probably the son of the first William mentioned, and it is supposed he had a son John. It is thought possible that earlier records may exist in Northumberland county, an older county than Westmoreland.

Doubtless the large majority of the numerous Rusts of the South are descended from this William, 1696-7, and many of the present generation have been traced directly to him; but in other lines links are wanting. The records that have been collected of this branch are valuable and would make quite a volume.

GERMAN RUSTS.

By far the larger number of distinct families that the compiler has learned of were either themselves or their immediate ancestors from some of the German states and of Teutonic origin. Paul Rust came from Germany and settled in Pennsylvania, dying at an advanced age, in 1790. He had among other children a son Charles who was born in Pennsylvania in 1764; settled in Baltimore, Maryland, and raised a large family.

The name Russ was brought to this country from England. Comparatively few of that name of foreign birth have been found. Most of those now bearing the name in the United States originated from the Rust family in this country, for evidence of which see page 106. Considerable Russ data not belonging to this Genealogy has been collected; these collections would lead us to conclude that the original families who brought the name to this country settled in Connecticut and Massachusetts.

ORIGIN OF THE NAME RUST.

The exact facts regarding the origin of the name Rust is hid in obscurity, at least to the author. There are however he believes, sufficient grounds for a very probable and altogether reasonable theory.

The author of "The Norman People" says Rust is the same as Rous and Raste. In Bardsley's work on English surnames, 1873, that author says: "Peter Le Russe would seem at first sight to be of Russian origin, especially with such a christian name at the fore as the one above, but it is far more probably one more form of the endless corruptions of Le Rous, a sobriquet of complexion so extremely familiar to all who have spent any time over mediæval registers."

Burke, in his works on heraldry, says: "Rous, (Edmerstone, Co. Devon, and Halton, Co. Cornwall; descended through the marriage of Wm. Le Rous, son of Sir Robert Le Rous, Knight Banneret under the Black Prince, with Alice, daughter and heir of Thomas Edmerstone, of Edmerstone, from Radulphus Le Rufus, a Norman Knight in the army of William of Normandy; of this family was Francis Rous, M. P., for Devonshire, Speaker of the Short Parliament, and one of Cromwell's lords.) Or, an eagle displ. az. pruning its wings, with feet and bill gu. Crest:—A dove ar. Motto:—Vescitur Christo.

"Rouse, (as borne by the Rev. Oliver Rouse, Rector of Tetcott, a lineal descendant of Sir Radulphus Le Rufus, who accompanied the Conqueror to England. The exhibition in Pembroke College, Oxford, founded by the celebrated Francis Rous, of the time of Cromwell, was lately declared to be in the patronage of the Rev. Oliver Rouse). Arms:—Same as Rous of Edmerstone." Bardsley regards it as a name descriptive of complexion or personal appearance, perhaps derived from the tawny, ruddy or russet appearance of the skin which exposure to the weather gives to the healthful, sturdy farmer, soldier or seaman. Various forms of the name: Rous, Rouse, Rowse and Rosse.

William H. Rust, Esq., of New Brunswick, N. J., who has travelled in Holland and Germany wrote the author several years since, that when he was in Holland he saw many villas with the following or similar mottoes on the gateways: "Lust und Rust," "and others, nearly all of which," says Mr. Rust, "had in some connection the word "Rust," signifying rest, ease or repose in the Holland or Low Dutch dialect. These villas were owned by merchants of cities who used the mottoes to express, that after labor or work (lust in Holland or Low Dutch,) came rest. (Rust).

Besides the above the author has made no discoveries regarding the origin of the name that he feels warranted in presenting in this work. Either of the above suggests the source from which the name may have been derived.

PLAN OF THIS WORK.

The plan of this Genealogy is the same as that recommended by the Genealogical Register.

The large black faced numbers (called history numbers) and the name in black type in the same line represent only those male Rusts who have descendants. Under this head will be given all the history and record of this person.

The superior or small figures, (called generation numbers,) following the name, if a descendant of a Rust, thus, John,⁶ refers to the generation from Henry¹ Rust.

The small figures at the left of the Roman numerals in the margin, (called first appearance numbers,) refer to the history number of that person in the succeeding generation. Only the date of birth and name of wife or wives are given at first appearance.

All record and history of any Rust, male or female, without first appearance numbers, together with that of their descendants, to the fourth generation will be given at the first appearance of the name.

The family number of daughters of Rusts, is in Roman numerals in the margin; her children's names appear in small capitals with Roman family numerals; her grandchildren's names are in Italics with Arabic family numerals; her great-grandchildren's names appear in Roman with Arabic family numerals in parenthesis. In a very few instances the fifth generation is given and the family numeral is given thus, (*a*), (*b*), (*c*), etc.

In all families the generation number appears only after the name of every first child.

Surnames of descendants of daughters of Rust appear in parenthesis after the christian name of the first child bearing another name.

The maiden surname of the mother of companions has been given in parenthesis when obtainable.

EXAMPLE:—Desiring to find the record of Horatio N. Rust, reference to the index will give his history number, (372) in parenthesis instead of the page; having found this, the father's record can be found by turning to the same number 372, at its "first appearance" showing H. N. Rust to be the first child in the family of his father, Nelson⁷ Rust whose record is found under history number (214), by referring to which number at its "first appearance" will be found Nelson⁷ Rust to be the first child of John⁶ Rust whose history number is (105), the corresponding number at first appearance shows that John⁶ was the seventh child of Lieut. Lemuel⁵ Rust, whose history number is (50), thus tracing it back to Henry¹ Rust.

To trace the other way, it is only necessary to notice the "first appearance numbers" in a family, then turn to the corresponding "history number" in the next generation.

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ABBREVIATIONS AND EXPLANATIONS.

1. The name of the state is not given with the names of places in Massachusetts.
2. Only initial letter of towns is frequently given but always closely preceded by the full name and easily understood.
3. Where double dates are given, as 1641-2, the first refers to old style, the second to new Style.

ABBREVIATIONS USED.

Besides the abbreviations in such common use that an explanation is unnecessary, the following are used: b.—born, m.—married, d.—died, æt.—aged, bap.—baptised, ch.—children, dau.—daughter, s.—son, wid.—widow, unm.—unmarried, res.—resides—resided—residence, w.—wife, ab.—about, grad.—graduated, coll.—college, Ips.—Ipswich, Glo.—Gloucester, Massachusetts, (int. pub.)—intention published, admr.—administrator, ex.—executor, app.—appointed, sch.—school, gen.—genealogy.

As soon as it was determined that the printing should be done at the author's home, it was thought proper to continue to receive records and such alterations and corrections as might be sent him up to the latest date and have such appear in a department by itself, under the head of "Additions and Corrections." Considerable new record and some corrections have been received for this department, and it is important that the reader consult these Additions. All the record for this department, received up to September 1, will be found immediately after the body of the work, on pages 471 to 482. All received since that date will appear immediately in front of the body of the work, on page xv.

HENRY RUST AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

1 Henry,¹ the progenitor of the family to which this work is devoted, came from Hingham, Norfolk county, England, 1633-35 and settled in Hingham, Mass., and was the first of the name to settle in America. The author has not been able to learn the exact date of his landing, nor the ship he came over in, but history informs us that he was at Hingham as early as June, 1635, as the following will prove :

"June 1635 Thomas Jason is to have two acres for a planting ground on Weary-All-Hill on the north side coming to the sea." [Daniel Fop joins Thomas Jason on the westward, John Farrah joins Fop on the westward.] "Henry Rust is to have two acres for planting ground next to John Farrah to the westward upon the same hill, be it more or less as it is measured." Then Thomas Lincoln has two acres joining Rust to the westward.*

March 5, 1637. Henry Rust received his proportion from the town of meadow and upland of Nantascus Division; 39 recipients, "Henry Rust received one acre of meadow and five acres of upland." †

"March 23, 1637. These nine men hereafter mentioned being freemen of the town be chosen and deputed by the whole body of freemen to agitate and determyne concerning any general business within the town except it be the making of any Rates, unless they be newly chosen in a legal way, or receiving in of any person to be an inhabitant into the town that is to say Edmont Hubbard, the older, Clement Bate, Nicholas Jacob, Henry Tuthill,

NOTE.—It appears that the new towns claimed title to the land wherever they settled and it was apportioned to whoever the selectmen or other proper authorities thought best; sometimes by lot, sometimes by selection by the authorities and sometimes by vote of the town, but it must be remembered that to constitute one a voter he must be a freeman, and to constitute him a freeman he must be a member of some Congregational church

Henry Rust, Thomas Hammon, Anthony Eames, Samuel Ward and Thomas Underwood, and have full power put into their hands to agitate and to determine of all such business as shall concerne the town within the same — to give, *grant, let* and *set* all and every part or parcel of the same to the good of the whole, according to the best wisdom and skill for one whole year after the date hereof.”*

August 14, 1637. “Great lots” were given by the freemen as follows: “Henry Rust received 14 acres.”

February 16, 1638. “Henry Rust with five others was chosen to make rates.”

“The name of Henry Rust appears among the first settlers of Hingham about 1636. Henry Rust by joynt consent have five acres to his house lot which he bought of George Russell next to Clement Bate on the east side and three acres of planting ground upon Weary All Hill† which he bought with his house lot and next John Farrah; and three acres to a planting lot, upon the neck to the west of the ware. And two acres of marsh at Layford’s Liking next to John Smart and is to have all these several parcels of land to be and to his heyeres for ever, be it more or less as it is measured.”‡

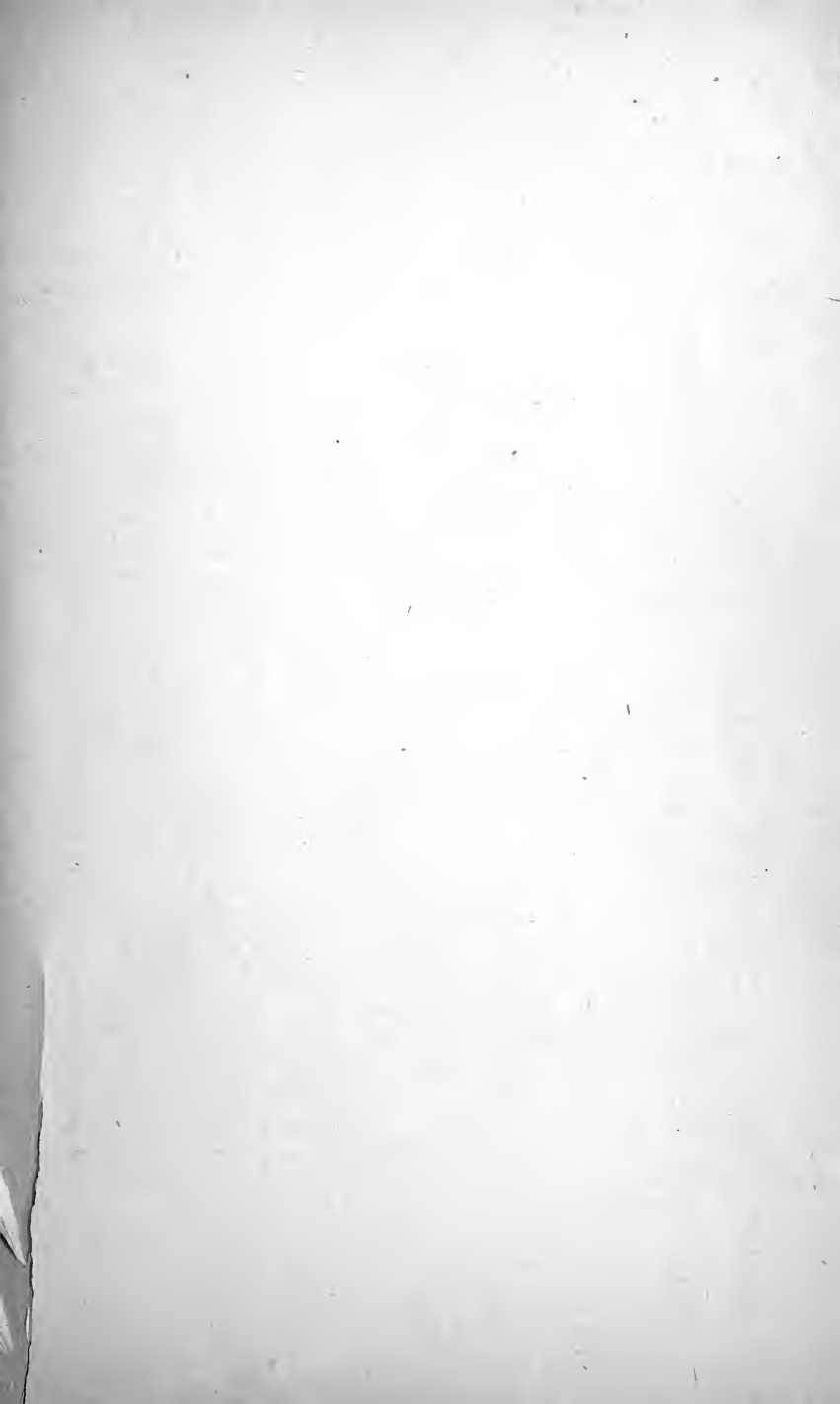
As to his home in the old world, the following, from the N. E. Hist. and Gen. Register for April, 1876, is submitted as conclusive:

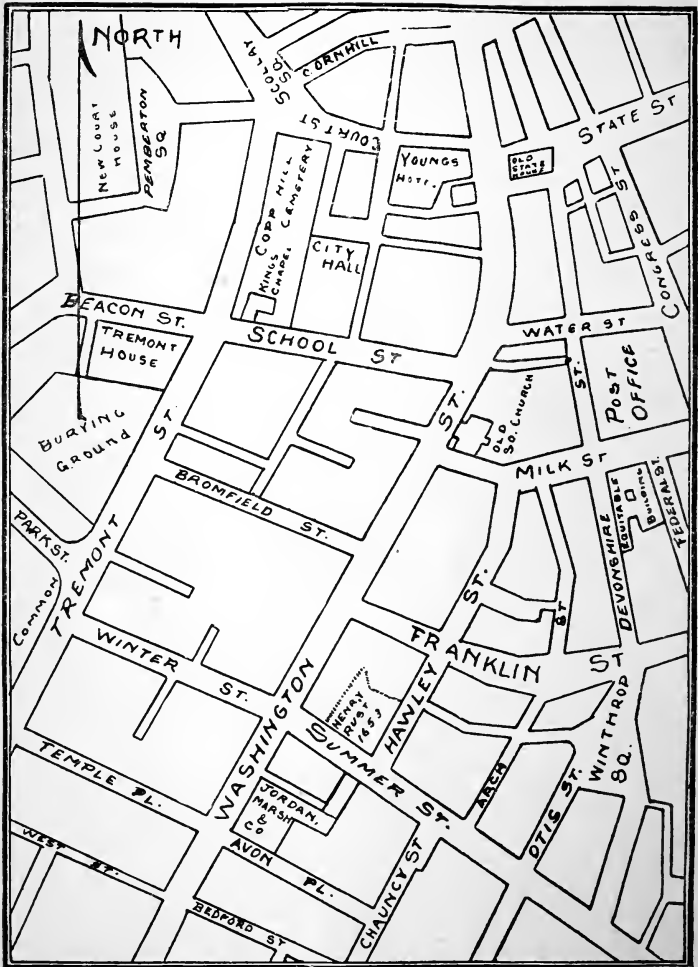
“On the 26 of April, 1638, the ship ‘Dilligent, of Ipswich,’ England, of 350 tons burden, John Martin, Master, set sail from the mouth of the Thames for Massachusetts Bay having on board nineteen families and six or eight single persons, in all one hundred and thirty-three. Twelve of these families, numbering eighty-four souls, were from old Hingham, the rest from the immediate vicinity; and they had all embarked for the purpose of joining a colony settled in Hingham, Mass., 1633-37 (consisting of ten families and five single persons, in all forty-nine) who had been their friends and neighbors in old Hingham.”

"The rector of the parish, Rev. Rob't Peck with his family consisting of wife, two children and two servants, also formed a part of the company." In same volume we learn that "The party having landed at Boston, Mass., Aug. 10, 1638, immediately proceeded to their place of destination about fourteen miles S. E. from Boston." From the above we deduce the facts that at the time of this accession the total population of Hingham was forty-nine and that Henry Rust must have been one of that number. We also learn that the first colonists at Hingham, among whom was Henry Rust, came from old Hingham, Norfolk county, England, or its "immediate vicinity."

In 1645 he was appointed for "ye recording births and buruals in Hingham in the room of Mr. Peck;" but he must soon have removed to Boston as he was admitted to be an inhabitant of that place March 31, 1651.

Soon after becoming a citizen of Boston in 1651, Henry Rust purchased property there. The following is the deed of conveyance to him :

The property purchased in 1653 by Henry Rust, of Awdrey Palmer, was subsequently, to wit: 25 April, 1728, made the site of Trinity Church as the following description of transfers will show. northerly on land of the heirs of s'd Marion measuring there twenty-seven feet, then running northerly by the s'd Marion land till it comes to the said Valentines land measuring there 40 feet & six inches." Sixth deed: June 4, 1728, Samuel Tyler by Adm'r to William Speakman, same property.* Apr. 25, 1728, "Land was at this time purchased of William Speakman at the corner of Summer St. and Bishops Alley, now Hawley St., by Leonard Vassal, John Barnes, and John Gibbens apothecary" who were "with all convenient speed immediately to erect a church on it, to be contrived in a manner most conducing to the decent and regular performance of divine service, according to rubrick of the common prayer book, used by the church of England as by law established." The corner stone of the Trinity church was laid Apr. 15, 1734.† "Curiously enough, Trinity Church occupies the site of the old 'Pleiades' or 'Seven Star Inn' from which Summer street took its ancient name of 'Seven Star Lane.' There was another sign of the same name, displayed by William Whitwell, a tradesman, near the drawbridge, in 1768."‡ When, in 1889, the author visited the early home of his ancestors he visited the identical property above described in Boston and it is the S. E. corner of Summer and Hawley streets, or, more accurately, it is the south corner of the block surrounded by Washington, Summer, Hawley and Franklin streets, directly opposite Jordan, Marsh & Co. on Summer St. A four-story stone block now occupies the corner, the interior of which was burned out in June, 1889. The ground floor, previous to the fire, was occupied by C. A. Browning & Co., as a millinery store and the three floors above were occupied by the Heyer Bros. for all kinds of fireworks, etc. This property named above is only about one-quarter of the property sold to Henry Rust by Awdrey Palmer. this building, sold the last week in Aug., 1889 to a widow Pickett for \$350,000 or \$65 per square foot.

It is quite clear that the first property owned by Henry Rust in Boston was that subsequently known as the "Seven Star Inn" property, and it is quite reasonable to suppose that the name was adopted by him as a sign for his business, to wit: that of "Glover." If this sign was not adopted by Henry Rust it certainly must have been by his son-in-law, Robert Earle, as he called it by that name when he sold it in 1698.

In 1677 Henry Rust was a deponent in Boston.

We find no date of his death, but he must have deceased between January, 1684, the date of the instrument conveying his property and 1685, the date of the conveyance of the same property by Nathaniel Rust to Robert Earle, as Nathaniel refers to his father as "Henry Rust late of s'd Boston dec'd."

The name of his wife nowhere appears, hence we are left to speculate as to the name of our maternal emigrant ancestor. We have no knowledge of there being but one daughter, to wit: Hannah, and we may infer that the mother's name was the same as that of her only daughter. We are also left in the dark as to the date of her death and find but two allusions to her. It is recorded on the books of the First Church, Boston, "Henry Rust & wife admitted to the church 20 of y^e 12 mo 1669," again in Henry Rust's deed of conveyance to Nathaniel Rust and Robert Earle he refers to "my wife." We are quite as much in the dark as to whether our ancestor married in England or America, but probably the latter as he was in America as early as June, 1635, and perhaps earlier, and their first child, whose birth is recorded, was born in August 1638.

From the three sons of this Henry Rust, Samuel, Nathaniel and Israel, has this entire family sprung. Samuel settled in Boston, Nathaniel in Ipswich and Israel in Northampton.

The following are the credits given under Major Savage, whose company in this campaign, (Phillip's War), from February, 1675-76, to May, was under the immediate command of Lieut. We have no record of the death of Samuel, but he must have died between April 15, 1676, the date of his memorial, and 1684, the date of the conveyance of his father, Henry Rust, as in the conveyance he is referred to as deceased. Samuel's wife was alive in January, 1684, as appears by the deed, Henry Rust to his son, Nathaniel, and Robert Earle.

He was in Ipswich as early as 1661 and engaged in the manufacture of gloves by which vocation he earned the title of "Nathaniel the Glover" and was so called, probably, to designate him in later years from his son, Nathaniel.

"In 1674 Nathaniel Rust and Samuel Hunt are permitted to set up a wear about the Falls (in Ipswich) if it do not hinder the mill nor the passage thereto"

"Dec. 10.—As Major Samuel Ward & the rest of the officers belonging to Mr. Rust's company are absent, he is to grant certificates to the soldiers of this company".

Henry F. Waters' collection of Rust genealogy has the following :

"In probate records Nathaniel Rust's name appears as appraiser of estates of Thomas Andrews (1683), Jona. Wade (1683), Abraham Fitts (1692), Joseph Fellows (1693), Robert Lord, Sen'r (1683), Thomas Fellows (1689), Serg't. Tho's. Clarke, Sen'r., (1689), John Day (1689), Anthony Potter (1689), Samuel Pearce (1691), John Hodgkins (1690), appointed overseer by Anthony Potter (1689); and in account with estates of Cornelius Kent (1673), John Emery, Sen'r, of Newbury (1683), John Wood (1685), Capt. Moses Bradstreet (1691), Fennel Rosse (1683), Edward Hazen of Rowley (1683), John Poor, Sen'r. (1685), John Knowlton (1684), Thomas Bellows (1691), Thomas Abbott of Andover (1695), John King (1684); he deposes in 1689 as witness to William Wood's will; "bo't a new flock bed" for Theophilus Wilson before 1690; and in 1693, (Oct. 13), Mr. Nathaniel Rust, Sen'r. and Mr. John Whipple were commissioners to receive claims against the estate of Peter Be y dec'd, (insolvent)."

y a bond of Capt. Rindge and Deacon Norton, or file with their administrators' bond, but not recorded and now hardly legible, it appears that he had conveyed his real estate to them for the "support and comfortable maintainance of himself and his wife in their age and under infirmities etc." The date of the acknowledgment of their bond was 9 May, 1710-11. The count of administration was presented 11 May, 1719,

when the inventory had increased to £175 18s 8d, accompanying this is an account drawn off by Capt. Rindge from his books, (not recorded), Jan. 6, 1713-14. This account begins with the last adjustment, 26 July, 1701, and the last entry is as follows: "9 Dec. (1711) to sundries for funeral charge, As gloves, mourning cloth for the wido wine, sugar, Digin ye grave pai in the Doctor & paying ye nurs all 8£ 02s 06d." His wife died 1720, "she age 78 years."

The General Court records are as follows: "In pursuance of the order of the General Court, 16 Oct., 1679, about those that are behind what they subscribed to the new building for the Colledge at Cambridge, have appointed Nathaniel Rust to demand the same of such as live on the south side of the river." We also find the following upon the records: "1680 Feb 7 Simon Stace and Nathaniel Rust brought in an account of nineteen pounds, fifteen shillings in corn and malt, put aboard John Dutch his sloop and brought a receipt under the hand of Mr. John Woodmancie, who was to receive it by order of Mr. William Manning of Cambridge, of seventy-eight bushells and a half of indian corn, and thirty bushells and three pecks of malt, and this was in April the 20 1680."

On the funeral occasion of Mr. Cobbets, we find the following recorded: "That Mr. Rust provide if he can against the funerall, Gloves sutable for men and women to the value of five or six pounds, not money pay, and some spice and ginger for the Syder."

In the itemized account of the expense of this funeral was the following:

"It. To Mr. Nathaniel Rust money layd out for funeral £2 04s 00d".

"It. For said Rust going to Salem 4s 00d."

"Sept ye 1st 1692, Nathaniel Rust sen. with others was appointed on a committee to oversee affairs necessary for ye ordination of Mr. John Rogers."

NOTE.—It must be remembered that this Rust was the "Glover" and before he had the contract to furnish the gloves on this occasion, but not to receive pay in cash, but as Cambridge Colledge was paid for, in corn, malt, etc., or some other articles or commodities. It will also be noticed that "Syder" was a necessity on funeral occasions and provisions were also made for spice and ginger in the "Syder."

"March 23 1692-3 Mr. Nathaniel Rust was appointed one of the selectmen to lay out more town", and we find that William Wilson sold his lot "with ye rocks thereon" to Mr. Nathaniel Rust, Sen.*

Nathaniel the "Glover" took the freeman's oath 27 May, 1674, and was appointed quartermaster in the expedition to Canada, 19 June, 1690, and was representative to the legislature in 1690 and 1691. Mr. Nathaniel Rust, Sen., of Ipswich, "Glover," died intestate and his sons-in-law, Capt. Daniel Ringe and Mr. Thomas Norton, were appointed administrators of his estate, 23 Dec., 1713. Amount, £100 17s 2d, all personal estate.† Account of Daniel Rindge and Thomas Norton, the administrators, presented 11 May, 1719. Nothing left after £10 was allowed to the widow.‡

WILLIAM WARDELL.

William Wardell had a brother Thos. Wardell who was a shoemaker and resided in Lincolnshire, England, who came to this country and was admitted to the Boston church 9 Nov., 1634; and whose son Samuel was hung at Andover as a witch in 1692. William Wardell doubtless came to this country from England with Edmond Quincy ~~as his servant~~, as on his admission to Boston church 9 Feb., 1634, he is called "one of our brother Edmond Quincy's servants." Jan. 6, 1638-9, "The Boston church dismissed Wheelwright and eight others including Thomas and William Wardell unto the Church of Christ at the falls of Piscataqua if they be rightly gathered and ordered."—(Bell's Hist. Exeter, p. 12.) William was one of the Hutchinsonians and was banished from Massachusetts because he was an adherent of Rev. John Wheelwright and together they went to Exeter when William and his brother Thomas, with several others, signed the Exeter Combination, "5 day 4th mo 1639." Feb. 20, 1636, he received in Boston two acres of land laid out at the Mount (Wollaston) "only for his present planting," and, Feb. 19, 1637, a great lot at the same place "for three heads." But the next year he migrated to Exeter on being disarmed as a friend of the Antinomian party. He took with him some cattle or goats, as it appears that he had in the first division of lands one hundred and twenty poles of meadow "on this side of Mr. Hiltons" and the same quantity at Lamprey river. "He also had ten acres and fifty poles of upland; and set his hand to the combination." He soon returned from Exeter with Wainwright and his name is subscribed as a witness to the deed of Sagamore Thomas Chobinocke to John Wadleigh at Wells, 18 Oct., 1649, and settled by Wardell's oath, 25 Mar., 1657. He also swore allegiance to Massachusetts at Wells, 5 July, 1653.—(Bell's Hist. Exeter, p. 37.) William Wardell's first wife was Alice, by whom he had: 1 Meribah, b. in Boston 14 May, bap. 25 June, 1637. 2 Uzell, b. in Exeter 7 Apr., 1639. 3 Elihu, bap. in Boston 5 Dec., 1641. 4 Mary,

bap. in Boston 14 Apr., 1644, "when she was about 9 days old." 5 Leah, b. 7 Dec., 1646. He married, for his second wife, 5 Dec., 1657, Elizabeth, widow of John Gillett. By Elizabeth he had: 6 Abigail, b. 24 Apr., 1660. There is a discrepancy between the date of birth of Mary as found on Boston Town Records and her stated age at death.

The Boston records do not leave us in the dark regarding the vocation of William Wardell. 29 April, 1661, permission was granted to William Wardell "to draw beere;" 25 Apr., 1670, the permission was granted to "widdowe" Wardell, and so on, year after year, till June 19, 1691. In the latter year permission "to sell strong liquors out of Doors" was added and at the last Widow Wardell's daughter, Deborah Mann, was included. In 1649, Savage says William Wardell "was drawing wine" at Wells. The name is variously spelled Wardall, Wardhall, Werdall, Wardle, Woodell or Wardell and sometimes Wardwell.

I William Wardell of Boston: being by the dispensation of God it this tyme sick and weake: yet through mercy of Competent understanding and memory doe by this my last will and Testament order and dispose of the Temporall Estate the which the Lord hath bene pleased to Leave unto me as followeth: first that all my Just Debtes and funerall charges being paide, then I doe give and bequeath unto my Deare wife Elizabeth Wardell the one halfe of my now Dwelling house in Boston Dureing the naturall life of my sd wife and no longer and of that sayde halfe my sd wife to take her choise whether end to accept: and in any case of difference betwene my sd wife and my Sonn Uzall concerning the sd howse or apurtenances hereafter expressed I refer the same to my overseers hereafter named also I give and bequeath unto my sd wife all my movables in my now Dwelling howse out of which she shall pay unto my Daughter Rachell Wardell twenty and five poundes to be payed in one feather bed and furniture with other nesisaryes at the ordering and disposing of my overseers the which twenty-five

poundes I doe give & bequeath unto my sd Daughter as a legacye and to be payde within six monthes after my Decease also I Doe give and bequeath unto my wives Daughter Hannah Gillett the summe of twenty one poundes to be payde by my sd wife out of the howsehold stuff as my Daughter Rachels referred also to my overseeres and to be payde at her Day of mariage or when shee shall attaine to the age of eighteen yeares : my will and Desire also to my wife is that my wives Daughter Debora may have twenty poundes out of the household stuff or goodes before mencioned except her owne nesesity shall require for her nesesity use left also to my overseeres to order fforther I Doe hereby give and bequeath unto my Eldest Sonn Uzall Wardell the other halfe of my now Dwelling house together with the one halfe of the out howse and howseing to him his heires and assignes forever with halfe the Garden and the use of the yeardes well and oven in common betwene my loving wife and my sayde Sonn after my sd wife hath made choise of her halfe of the Dwelling howse and whenever there may fall out any Difference in the devideinges my overseeres to Determine : also the halfe disposed of to my wife dureing her natural Life my meaning is the halfe of my Dwelling howse so Disposed to her as above written I doe also give and bequeath to my sd Sonn uzall he paying the summe of fourty powndes in Silver or equivalent to my Sonn Elihue wardell or to his Executores administrators or assignes within Six monthes after the decease of my sd wife Elizabeth moreover whereas there is given and bequeathed to Hannah Gillett my wives Daughter the summe of twenty one powndes the same is to be taken notice of to be so given bequeathed or be payde in consideration of and answer of the order of the County Court at Boston concerning the sd, Hannah Gillett : moreover I Doe give to my Daughter Leah wife of william Tower tenn shillings in money : also to my Daughter Meribah wife to ffrancis Litlfeild of welles tenn shillinges also to my Daughter Mary wife to Nathaniell Rust tenn shillinges in Silver all which last three Legacyes I apoint to be paide by my Sonn Uzall wardell to whom I give and bequeath all the rest of my Estate reall and personall

whom I make and ordaine my Sole Executor of this my Last will and Testament he upon all ocasions of Differences or Difficulty betwene himselfe and any relationes or others to take the advise and counsell of my Loving friendes James Everill and william Bartholmew whom I constitute and apoint overseers of this my Last will and Testament a line being omitted above he caused this to be written that after his wives decease he giveth that part of his Dwelling howse outhousing and garden he doeth give and bequeath the sd halfe of the Dwelling howse out howseing garden and yeardes to his wife disposed of During her natural life as above written: after her Decease to his Sonn Uzall being Executor of this his Last will & Testament to him his heires and assignes forever also my will is that the sd halfe shall be kept in good reaire Dureing the tyme of my wives surviveing the wordes he paying betwene therty two and the therty therd Line were aded before signing hereof.

4 Israel² (*Henry*¹) baptized in Hingham, 12 Nov., 1643. Removed from Hingham to Northampton when a young man, and there married, 9 Dec., 1669, Rebecca, daughter of William Clark. In 1678, 8 Dec., he took the oath of allegiance, and 30 March 1690, he took the freeman's oath, in Northampton. He died intestate 11 Nov., 1712. The following document will show the disposition made of the estate in its settlement. She died 8 Feb., 1733.

"Articles of agreement made by Rebecca Rust, wid^{ow} & Relict of Israel Rust, deceased, & Nath^l & Israel, Jonathⁿ & John Rust & Sam^l Allin & Robert Danks with respect to the estate of the said Israel Rust, Deceased their Hon^d father—

First, 'Tis agreed that ye wid^{ow} shall have out of the movable estate at her own disposal £24-9s-2d, and the use & improvement of one third of the Real Estate during life.

2^d That Nath^l shall have £61, 16s, 2d, two thirds to be paid now, viz; lbs41, 4s, 1d, and after the decease of their mother, within three months, lbs20-12s-1d-

3^d That Israel shall have all the land in the Inventory in Pynchon's meadow, being 8, acres, and the lot at Round Hill, all valued at lbs39, and his share is lbs20, 3s, 7d, he paying to the other children, Ten Pounds, Sixteen shillings & five pence—

4th That Jonathⁿ shall have one half of the house and homestead with all the appurtenances thereunto belonging, only his mother's third during life, his portion being Lbs36, 3s, 7d—and the half of the homestead being Lbs90—he paying out lbs53, 16s, 5d-

5th—John shall have the other half of the house & homestead aforesaid, he paying out lbs18, 11s, 5d, the afore-

said three sons what they are particularly to pay out, two thirds is to be paid now, the other third within three months after their mother's decease.

6th That Samuel Allin, in right of his wife shall have twenty pounds eighteen shillings & seven pence—

7th That Robert Danks shall have in right of his wife, Thirty two pounds one shilling & seven pence, the daughter's portion to be paid at the same time, and in the same proportion as the sons—And what is Israel, Jonathⁿ & John to pay out together with the movables shall be to pay the Respective portions above mentioned, each of them giving particular obligation to pay s^d money, & if there be any more estate 'tis equally to be divided, & if lots to be so subducted, to the confirmation—we have signed and sealed this 6th of December, anno Domini 1712 & pay ye judges confirmation—

On 15 Dec., 1719, Jonathan Rust and Benjamin Stebbins, two of the above witnesses, made oath that they "see John Rust signe and seal" the above instrument, "said John Rust being supposed to be out of the government." He removed to Westfield in 1736, was of Poughkeepsie, N. Y. Had his land in New Hampshire attached for debt. In Book L, Land Records, Springfield, it appears that John Rust, son of Israel Rust, sen., formerly of Northampton, since of "Pekipsy" in the Province of New York, is called "an absconding debtor for the sum of six pounds eleven shillings and five pence money debt, & three pounds and sixpence cost of suit & the sheriff Ebenezer Sheldon Thomas Wright & Gideon Lyman were the appraisers & met June 25 1736—found he was entitled to one sixth part of that lot in the long Division also one sixth part of that lot in the Lone Field Division also one sixth part of that lot in the Mountain Division also one sixth part of that right in proportion which the said Israel Rust owned south of Munhand River & west of the county 'Rhoad' leading to Westfield from Northampton, also one sixth part of the said Israel Rust's right in all the common & undivided land in Northampton all of which was apprizd at nine (9) pounds, Rec'd May 16, 1738 and recorded from the original prs. Timothy Dwight J. P."

of Quartermaster Robert, son of Robert and Mary* (Boreman) Kinsman.† She was born 25 Apr., 1665; died at Chebacco, (Essex) 28 Jan., 1733; he died at Chebacco, 9 Sept., 1711. Lieut. Nathaniel, like his father, the "Glover," was a prominent and useful man. He married at about seventeen years of age, his wife being two years his senior. He was on the expedition to Canada in 1690; opened and taught the first free school ever taught in Chebacco, as the following will show:

(It appears that in the spring of 1695, a public meeting was held to devise means to open a free school in Chebacco.) "The result was the choice of a committee to hire a teacher, and provide suitable accommodations for a school. This committee made choice of Nathaniel Rust, jr., who opened his school in June, 1695, and taught through the summer with such acceptance that the next summer they invited him to settle with them as their school teacher. This invitation he accepted and taught here several years. The town gave six acres of pasture for the benefit of the school and one quarter of an acre to Mr. Rust to set his house on. The house he then built is the same as to most of the timbers, with that now owned by William H. Mears. It was remodeled and enlarged about seventy-five years since. . . . The school was probably taught in a room in Mr. Rust's house, as no school house was built till the beginning of the next century." ‡

Quartermaster Robert Kinsman with five others of Ipswich, who, 24 Dec., 1687, resisted taxation under Gov. Edmond Andros' government, was taken to Boston, tried, fined and imprisoned. The verdict against Robert Kinsman was, "not to bear office, fine £20 pay costs, £500 bond for good behaviour for one year." The cost of time and money to these six men was about £400 which was afterwards paid back by Ipswich, 1689. He was confirmed Quartermaster again 1691 under T. Wade.—Felt's Hist. of Ips., pp. 123-5.

"Master Rust," as he was called, also taught the first grammar school in Essex. The first school house was built in 1702.*

"Whereas it was left to the Selectmen to appoint a place for the erecting a school house in Chebacco, we, the subscribers, having duly considered the same, have appointed that the said house be built on the right hand of the way as you go from the meeting-house to Deacon Thomas Lows upon a handsome rising, dry piece of ground, right opposite to Mr. Adam Cogswell's barn, which is accounted to be pretty near the centre of the place. Near said place stands a shrubbed white oak.†

"The school which had been originally commenced in this parish in June, 1695, had been hitherto kept in the private house of the teacher, Nathaniel Rust, jr."‡

The following is upon record in the town of Essex :

"Dec. 1704 it was voted to give Nathaniel Rust, jr., in behalf of his father (father-in-law Quartermaster Robert Kinsman) two acres of land by his house in Chebacco, up ye Hill which land is accepted in full satisfaction for ye loss and damage ye s^d Kinsman sustained under Sir Edmond Andros's Government."

"Boston, March 4 1705-6 Bond of Mr. Rust £30, to prosecute his son (Robert)'s master, John Staniford, The mother (Mrs. R.) came from Ipswich on purpose."§

March 19, 1707, Nathaniel Rust, Mr. John Choate, Mr. Jona. Burnham, Sr., Mr. William Thompson and Capt. William Goodhue were elected trustees for the ensuing year. Their duties were to select some person whom they "shall think fit to ring y^e Bell sweep y^e meeting house and set up A bason of water for the baptising

of children when there shall be Ocation for y^e same to be paid in Graine out of y^e change rate."*

Lieut. Nathaniel Rust, Jr. died at Chebacco in Ipswich, Sept. 9, 1711.† His widow, Joanna Rust, was appointed administrator of his estate, Oct. 15, 1711, "at which time the inventory of the estate was presented." This date doubtless should be 1711-2.

Widow Joanna Rust kept tavern in Ipswich.

Jan. 2, 1711-2, the widow charges, paid her brother Pelatiah Kinsman.

Sarah, (—) Potter,* born 11 Dec., 1685. He died in Ipswich, Jan., 1713; his widow, Sarah (Potter) Rust, married, second, Jonathan Fellows, (intention published) "29 day of 10 mo. 1716." Probate Records show that he died intestate and his widow was appointed administrator 22 Jan., 1716-17. Bond, £100; sureties, John Potter and George Hart. Inventory £35-9s. The real estate consisted of "housing" and about 18 rods of land. "Account of Administratrix, then the wife of Jonathan Fellows, Estate rendered insolvent and finally settled among the creditors, 22 Mar. 1722-3 when Jonathan Fellows who had married the widow, gave bond with sureties to return the sum of £9-6s-8d which was the widow's third of dower to and among the creditors at her death." †

When his youngest son, Nathaniel, (who was posthumous) was about eighteen years old, to wit: 23 Jan., 1730-1, his brother John was appointed his guardian; bond £1,000, sureties, Eben Smith and Samuel Williams. ‡

8 Nathaniel³ (*Israel*,² *Henry*¹) born in Northampton, 17 Nov., 1671; married, first, 17 May, 1692, Mary or Mercy Atchinson "from Hatfield." She was born 1673; died 21 Jan., 1754, in the eighty-first year of her age. He married, second, widow Mary Rose, 9 Sept., 1754.

"Mercy, wife of Capt. Nathaniel Rust, died 21 Jan., 1754, in the eighty-first year of her age. Now if we balance probabilities and make Captain Rust as old as his wife he must have been in 1754, eighty or more than eighty years old. Jan. 21, Mrs. Rust died. Captain Nathaniel Rust and the widow Mary Rose were married, Sept. 9, 1754, and this is the last we hear of Captain Rust."*

This was certainly a remarkable marriage, for the groom was born 17 Nov., 1671, married his second wife 9 Sept., 1754, when he was eighty-two years, nine months and twenty-three days old.

The following in substance is on record in the office of Register of Deeds, Book A., Springfield:

"Nathaniel Rust gave a mortgage of full two acres of land with house and barn in Northampton to Richard Lord in the county of Hampshire in the Province of Massachusetts Bay in consideration of ten pounds already received of Mr. Richard Lord but could redeem it by paying him the full sum of ten pounds twelve shillings in current money at his house in Hartford at or before the 24 day of July next year

As early as when Nathaniel was young—about 200 years ago—people were subject to the immigration fever. In early life he left his native town to seek a better land—an undiscovered country. In his early venture from Northampton he followed down the Connecticut river, arriving at Hartford, then a young village in the wilds of the new world. Here, leaving the but lightly beaten path of civilization, he directed his course eastward from Hartford to a wild and unsettled wilderness and there made the first “pitch” in what is now known as Coventry, Tolland county, Connecticut. This was in 1700. Here on the west side of the beautiful little lake in what is now South Coventry, he erected the first house ever built there.* Nathaniel was married before he went to Coventry and a part of his children were born in Northampton before his removal thither with his family, which was in 1709. The town records do not show that any of his children were born in Coventry, but it is probable his last two were born there. However, all his sons and probably his daughters settled and raised families there.

*State's Attorney James Huntington, of Woodbury, Conn., writes the author, under date of Oct. 25, 1887: “The statement that Nath'l Rust built the first house in Coventry is correct as I have been taught by tradition and I know very well the place where he built his house on the west side of the little lake in South Coventry.” Under date of Jan. 28, 1890, the same writer says: “That Rust of old who first built a hut in Coventry, and whom Rev. Marvin Root (the historian of Coventry) in his historical address of Coventry designated as one of the founders of the doctrine of Squatter Sovereignty, pitched his camp in one of the loveliest spots in all our state, by the shore of the beautiful Wangombang lake in South Coventry.”

Nathaniel's father died in Northampton after he removed to Coventry, to wit: 11 Nov., 1712. In the agreement between the widow and surviving children, Dec., 1712, Nathaniel received as his portion of his father's estate, £61 16s 2d. He also owned the "Samuel Parsons place" in Northampton before 1709 when it was bought by Samuel Lancton.

Nathaniel Rust was not only the first to settle at Coventry but he was one of the prominent men there as long as he lived. In the MS. history commenced by Rev. Mr. Root and now owned by Mrs. J. B. Porter, of Coventry, his name is met with on nearly every page.

The following are only a few of the instances where the name of Nathaniel Rust, Sen., appears on the records of the town of which he may be said to be the father. We quote from the MS. history of Rev. Mr. Root.

"The oldest land document embracing the present site of Coventry was the will of Attawanhood, or Joshua, Sachem, son of Uncas, the Sachem of the Mohegan tribe of Indians, now on record in Windham, Conn."

"The original territory called Coventry was six miles square, but that part embracing Coventry was known for many years as the 'Mile and a quarter.' In the General Court, May 9, 1706, in session at Hartford, William Pitkin, William Whitney, Joseph Talcott, Richard Lord and Nathaniel Rust or any three of them was appointed a committee to lay out the town, admit inhabitants, etc. In the October session of the General Court, Oct. 11, 1711, 'It is ordered and enacted that this Assembly shall call the said town Coventry and that the brand mark for their horses shall be this figure [____]' The committee appointed by the General Court proceeded to lay out the town and reported the boundary line all of which appears on record in the Coventry town books. The General Court, 8 May, 1712, passed the act of incorporation of Coventry.

The first town meeting for the choice of officers was 3 Dec., 1714. The Selectmen elected at this meeting were: Nathaniel Rust, Timothy Alcott, Samuel Parker, David Lee and James Pike; Town Clerk, Thomas Root; Grandjurymen, Ebenezer Alexander and Benj. James; Listers, John Crane and Ebenezer Edwards; Inspectors, Benj. Carpenter and William Long; Tavern Keeper, Nathaniel Rust.

"Nathaniel Rust lived where Wm. O. Gardner now resides and kept Tavern for many years. He held offices in town frequently and it will be remembered that he was one of the proprietor's committee to lay out the town in 1711. To what extent is not known, but he was, as appears from the town records, a proprietor in the undivided lands in ancient Wangombaug."

"At a Legall Town meeting held in Coventry, Feb. ye 15 A. D. 1734, Peter Buel, Esqr. was chosen Moderator for s^d Day then Humphrey Davenport and Nathaniel Rust, sen. was chose to Audiate accounts with ye farmer school commity." p. 226.

Chosen Moderator of a "Legall" town meeting 10 Dec., 1733.

Chosen School Committee, 27 Jan., 1734-5. p. 230.

"At a Legall town meeting held in Coventry ye 25 Day of March, A. D. 1734-5 Joseph Strong Junior was chose one for a committee and added to ye farmer committee to audiate accounts with ye farmer school committee, that is Mr. James Badcock, Mr. Nathaniel Rust and Mr. Aaron Cody."

"Then voted" (at the same meeting) "that Peter Buel Esqr. Nathaniel Rust, Senr. & Sargent Ebenezer Root were a committee to Demand and Receive ye whole of the school money and that they are fully impowered to dispose of the same for the use of ye school and to improve it for ye benefit of ye school to the best of their discretion." pp. 231-2.

Elected one of the Selectmen of the town, 6 Dec., 1736. p. 241.

Was empowered to "exchange lands," 13 Dec., 1736.

Was elected Moderator at a "Legall" town meeting, 24 June, 1737. p. 244.

The records of the town show a residence there of Nathaniel's descendants as late as 1792, and the land records show that some of the family were there as late as 1806.

His will dated 1760; wife's name Mary Rust; gives to his sons and grandsons of "my beloved son Nathaniel Rust, deceased, to Simeon Rust, to Mathias, to Malatiah son of Malatiah Rust, to Jehial and Joseph Rust, etc." Gives to his daughters Experience Gurley and Lydia Herrick. Samuel Rust and Ezekiel Herrick he appoints as executors of his will.*

early life, a butcher. Soon after his marriage, Nov. 30, 1738, he purchased of his father-in-law, the old Rust Tavern at the head of Little River. The following is, in substance, the wording of the deed. The boundaries are given verbatim.

John Proctor of Ipswich, yeoman, and Anna his wife, for £340 paid by Samuel Rust of Gloucester, a mariner, sells one messuage or tenement consisting of an house, barn & orchard and other land adjoining, "Containing 20 acres bought of Jacob Lufkin in Gloucester and 6 acres bought of Joseph Davis adjoining it, at the head of Little River, so called, on the northerly side of the way to Kettle Cove so called, butted and bounded as followeth viz: Begining at a great ledge of rocks near the barn thence running by the Highway to one heap of stones at the N. E. corner and so by the fence to a white oak tree in the said fence and from thence as the fence stands to a white pine stump, thence as the fence stands to an heap of stones being the norwest corner bounds of the land bought of said Lufkin and from thence by the way to a white oak tree marked being the norwest boundery of the said Lott bought of the sd Davis Joining sd land of John Day from thence N. E. to a white oak tree marked thence to another white oak tree marked near the dam and from thence to another white oak tree marked by the way leading to Kettle Cove being the S. E. corner and so N. E. by the way to an heap of stones in the fence and so as the fence stands to a white oak tree with stones about it thence by the fence to a great Rock with a stone on it thence northwesterly by the mill dam to a white oak tree marked, thence north to a rock with a stone upon it and from thence to the Ledge of Rocks being the bound first mentioned also 4 acres of meadow in the upper mill pond together with all the rocks, water, woods, mines, minerals, pavying, fences and other privileges reserving only the mill pond and water course and a way to pass through said land in the winter season."

Samuel kept tavern here many years and was succeeded by his son Benjamin. He made his will 14 March, 1781; witnesses, Joseph Eveleth, Levy Roberts and John Quarles; proved 5 March 1782. All the children were named in the will except Samuel, Anna and first Sarah, who doubtless died young. The inventory was presented at court 7 Feb., 1786. In the Probate Records, as well as in the deed from John Proctor he is called a mariner. "He died of small-pox caught from the hat of a sailor who landed from a cartel from Halifax and stopped at Rust Tavern at the head of Little River." †

Anna, daughter of Col. Richard and Eleanor (Vaughn) Waldron,* born 27 Aug., 1698; died in Stratham, N. H., 20 May, 1733, and was interred in the old Stratham burying ground. Her tombstone is not an ordinary one. It consists of a pile of solid masonry about six feet long, two feet wide and about three feet high; lying flat upon the top of this is a large slab bearing the following inscription:

20 Capt. Samuel⁴ (*Nathaniel,³ Israel,² Henry¹*) was born 10 May, 1703, probably in Northampton; married Sarah Hawkins 2 July, 1722, in Coventry, Ct., where the marriage is on record; he died in Coventry, 6 Sept., 1773.

Capt. Rust was prominent in town affairs and represented the town in the General Assembly. The following extracts, copied from the MS. history of Coventry by Rev. Mr. Root, will convey to the reader a very correct idea of his prominence and the business positions he occupied:

"'Chose Lister and Inspector,' 11 Dec., 1732." p. 65.

"At a 'Legall' town meeting held 17 Jan., 1733-4, a piece of land which had been laid out for a highway was granted to Samuel Rust. Meets and bounds given," p. 225.

"At a 'Legall' town meeting 10 Dec., 1733 Samuel Rust with others was appointed surveyor of highways."

"At a 'Legall' town meeting 12 Dec., 1737 Samuel Rust was appointed surveyor of highways."

April 8, 1740, Capt. Rust was appointed on a committee to exchange land.*

"Capt. Samuel Rust was 'chose' as one of the Selectmen of the town at a town meeting 5 Dec., 1748." p. 263.

"Capt Samuel Rust was chosen Moderator of a town meeting 18 Dec., 1749."

*It appears that in those days when a highway was laid out or altered an exchange of lands was resorted to as a pleasant mode of adjusting the claims of those whose land was affected thereby and thus preserve peace in the community, hence the "committee to exchange land."

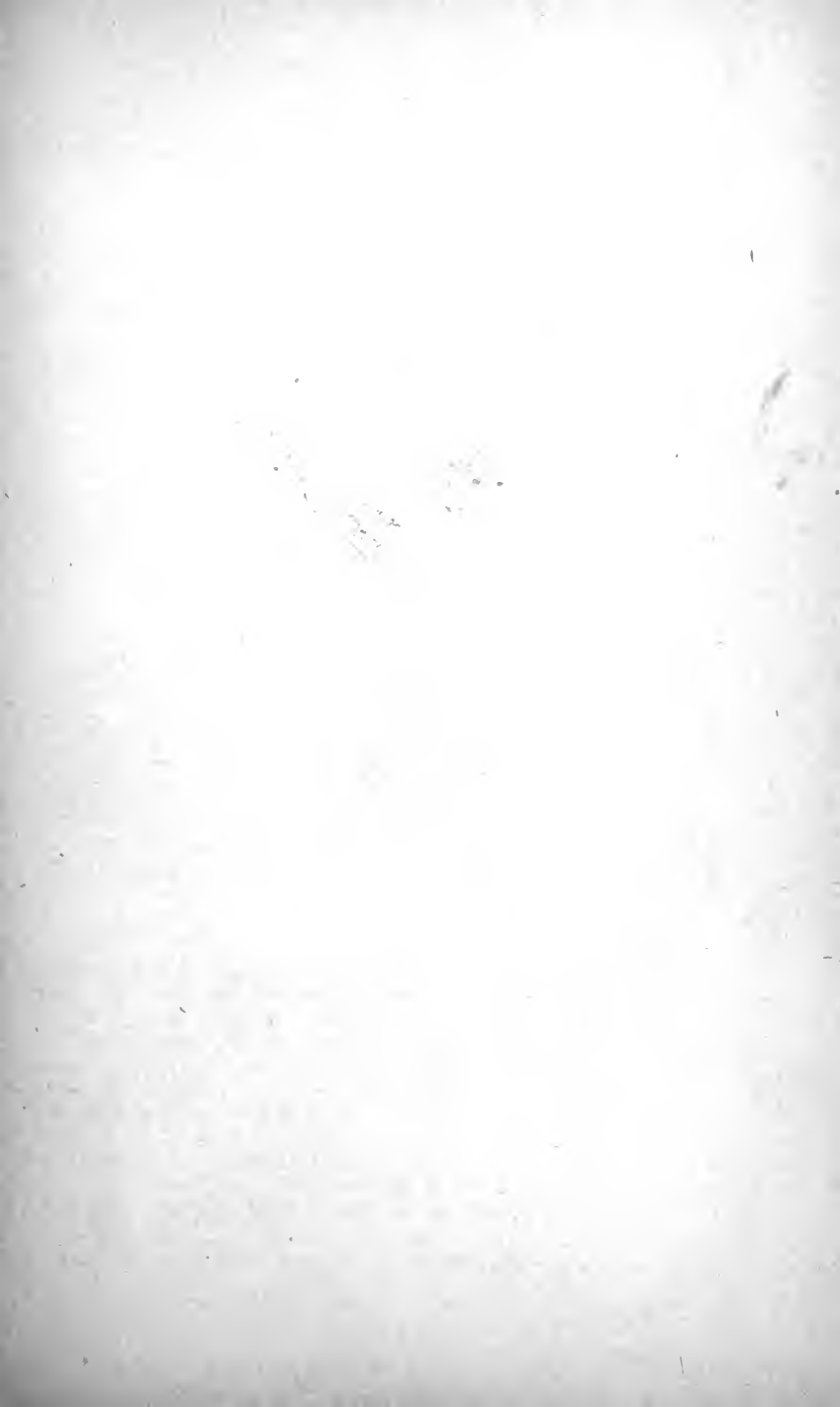

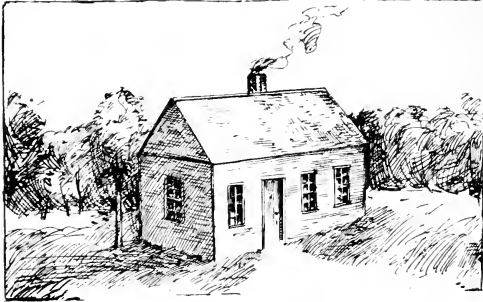

The following is from the history of Carroll county and the town of Wolfboro, 1890 :

"Captain Henry Rust, afterward Colonel, was the only original proprietor to make a permanent home. His lot of 600 acres included a portion of Rust's Pond and South Wolfboro village. He began improvements in 1768 and for some years passed his summers here with his two sons, Henry and Richard. He built a log house which was burned, destroying their clothes, provisions, guns and ammunition. One winter the boys, one aged fourteen, the other twelve, remained here to take care of stock and for nine weeks saw no white person. Colonel Rust was appointed Judge of Probate for Strafford county in 1773, and was for many years a kind, obliging and leading citizen. He was firm, fixed in his opinion but conscientious and just. When sworn in Judge of Probate he took the oath of allegiance to the crown and after the state government was established, considered that oath so binding as to refuse to take one of allegiance to the state. He had three sons and four daughters.

"Col. Rust served eight years as selectman. His son, Henry served as town clerk five years, and as representative to the state legislature four years. His son Richard served as town clerk four years and as selectman nine years. His son-in-law, Matthew S. Parker, served as town clerk nine years and as selectman six years; and his son-in-law, Isaiah Horne, served as town clerk four years, as selectman four years and as representative six years. His grandson, Henry Rust Parker, served as selectman seven years. His grandsons, Isaiah Greene Orne and Charles Belker Orne, served as selectman each one year. His grandson, Thomas Rust, served as town clerk two years, as selectman three years and as county justice. His grandson, Henry Bloomfield Rust, served as selectman one year and as representative six years. He was a member of the State Senate, counselor and judge of common pleas. His great-grandson, Samuel S. Parker served as town clerk two years and as selectman one year. His great-grandson, George Rust, served as selectman two years; and his great-grandson, Alphonso H. Rust, served as representative twice and counselor

twice. John H. Rust, a great-great-grandson, has been selectman twice. The colonel and his descendants have held the office of town clerk twenty-six times, of selectman, forty-five times, of representative eighteen times since the organization of the town."

Col. Henry Rust drew his land by lot as seen by the following from the same history.

"The early settlers of Wolfboro were called 'Masonian Proprietors.

"When the survey of the township was made by Bryant in 1765, he estimated the neck at 1200 acres, and divided it in two lots numbered fifteen and twenty-four. The former was drawn by Henry Rust and the latter by John Parker. Subsequently, when an actual survey of it was made it was found to contain only 547 acres. In July, 1766, the whole tract was confirmed to John Parker and it was voted to grant to Henry Rust as much land (out of the 1050 acre tract once granted to Elisha Bryant and others and now declared forfeited) as would make his share equal to one of the other proprietors. 600 acres were laid out for him, which was really a very valuable lot, including, as it did, the falls on the outlet of Middle Pond (now Rust Pond.)

The following are excerpts from the same history.

"In November 1773 the proprietors voted to raise thirty pounds lawful money" towards building a meeting house not less than thirty by forty feet and appointed Col. Henry Rust and Dr. A. R. Carter a committee to attend to the matter.

"At the annual town meeting 2, 9th of March, 1784, the town elected five selectmen, the only time in its history when more than three persons were chosen. They were: John Martin, Richard Rust, Isaiah Horne, William Lucas and Andrew Lucas.

"In March, 1786, the town voted to constitute a committee consisting of the selectmen, Col. Henry Rust & Col. Wm. Cotton, to treat with the proprietors for an exchange of the ten acre lot granted for public purposes for a more desirable one. Also, to raise \$100 for clearing a lot for a meeting-house.

"In Sept., 1786, the town proprietors offered to give in lieu of the thirty pounds promised heretofore, 25000 four penny nails, 15000 five penny nails, 10000 ten penny nails, 3000 two penny nails, 30 gals. of West India rum, 1 quintal of fish, 50 pounds of sugar, 50 pounds of coffee, 8 lbs of tea and 200 feet of glass toward erection of a meeting house. The gift was accepted by the town and in November Henry Rust, Matthew S. Parker and Eben Meader were appointed committee to receive the articles.

"It is not known that the town enjoyed the ministrations of any religious teacher except Mr. Collins, the teacher, during the Revolution, and he remained but a few months. In 1784, Rev. John Allen preached some sermons, and in 1791, Rev. Mr. Cushman and Rev. Isaac Townsend held meetings, and a large proportion of the citizens determined to settle a minister. The leader of this movement was Col. Henry Rust. It was voted to give Mr. Ebenezer Allen a call, and a committee of invitation was appointed consisting of Col. Henry Rust, Joshua Haines and many more. Mr. Allen's answer was acceptable to the meeting, which voted that Thursday, the 25th day of Oct., 1792 be appointed for the ordination of Mr. Allen, and Henry Rust, Jr., Richard Rust, Reuben Libby, and Stephen Horne were appointed committee to extend invitations to ministers and churches." In the presence of the ordaining council the following signed the constitution: Henry Rust, Joshua Haines and others.

"The year following the organization of the church, 1793, Henry Rust and Andrew Wiggin were appointed deacons. Thus Col. Henry Rust was the first deacon in Wolfboro."

Col. Rust removed to the new town of Wolfboro from Portsmouth, N. H., where he had formerly resided, in about 1768. From him has spread the numerous Rusts of that part of the state. He was master of a vessel, colonel, judge of Strafford county and a farmer; twenty-five years of his life were spent as a sailor before he settled at Wolfboro. "He earned and, for several years before his death, bore the title of 'Honorable.'"

Col. Henry Rust never yielded up allegiance to royal

authority and never acknowledged our republican government and would never accept an office under it. He believed that as he had once taken oath of allegiance to the crown, he could never consistently recall it.

When Col. Rust settled on his land, he built a log house at the head of the pond bearing his name. He died 17 March, 1807, upon the spot where now grows a beautiful Lombardy popple and an elm tree, shown in the painting presented to the author by one of his descendants. (See 131, xi, ii.) This land he divided between his four children, and a large part of it still remains in possession of his descendants.

Dr. Parker's business life is a bright example of a self-made man. His stock of native pride and perseverance was ample to accomplish the good work it has. Left an orphan at the tender age of twelve years, with absolutely no means at his command, his mind at once seemed to grasp the situation and he

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immediately devoted himself to the work of procuring means with which to educate himself. Through his own efforts, backed by his undaunted energy, he soon acquired sufficient means to commence a course of study and at once entered the academy in his native town. He subsequently became tutor in the same well-known institution. He made such proficiency in his studies that his education soon became sufficient to enable him to teach and he took the high school at Farmington, N. H., which he taught with creditable success and satisfaction for six years. During these years, Mr. Parker pursued the studies of his chosen profession, that of medicine, and graduated from the medical department of Dartmouth College in 1866. It was soon observed that he was a bright and promising member and he at once took a prominent position in the medical profession. In his regular practice, Dr. Parker soon discovered that honesty and discretion were necessary elements to insure success; he possessed both in a high degree and from that time forward he sought to cultivate those leading traits of character required to make a wise and useful citizen; he soon became the acknowledged leader in the profession in Carroll county, nor was this reputation confined altogether to his county, but extended into adjacent counties. In 1881 he removed to Dover, N. H. where his practice has constantly increased and to-day is, alone, quite sufficient to place him high in the scale of worth as a physician and a citizen. Dr. Parker was examining surgeon for pensions for Strafford county and president of the board of examining surgeons for the same county during President Cleveland's administration. He is a member of the Medical Society of Dover, the Medical Society of Strafford county, and the Medical Society of New Hampshire. He was recently appointed a trustee under the will of Hiram Barker of Farmington, N. H., who left an estate of about \$1,000,000. Nov. 25, 1890, he was elected Mayor of the city of Dover, on the democratic ticket, the first democratic Mayor the city ever had, although the oldest settled town in the state, being now over 267 years old. Through his indomitable perseverance, his inherent honesty and ample fund of intelligence, Dr. Parker has placed his name high up on the temple of fame.

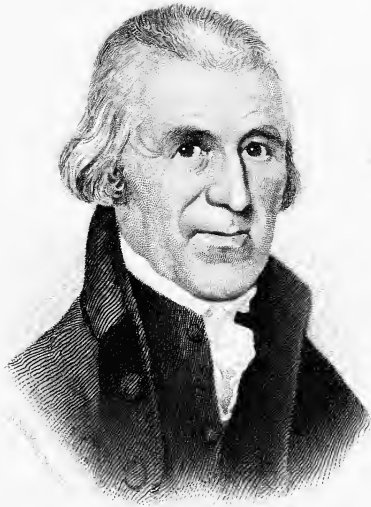

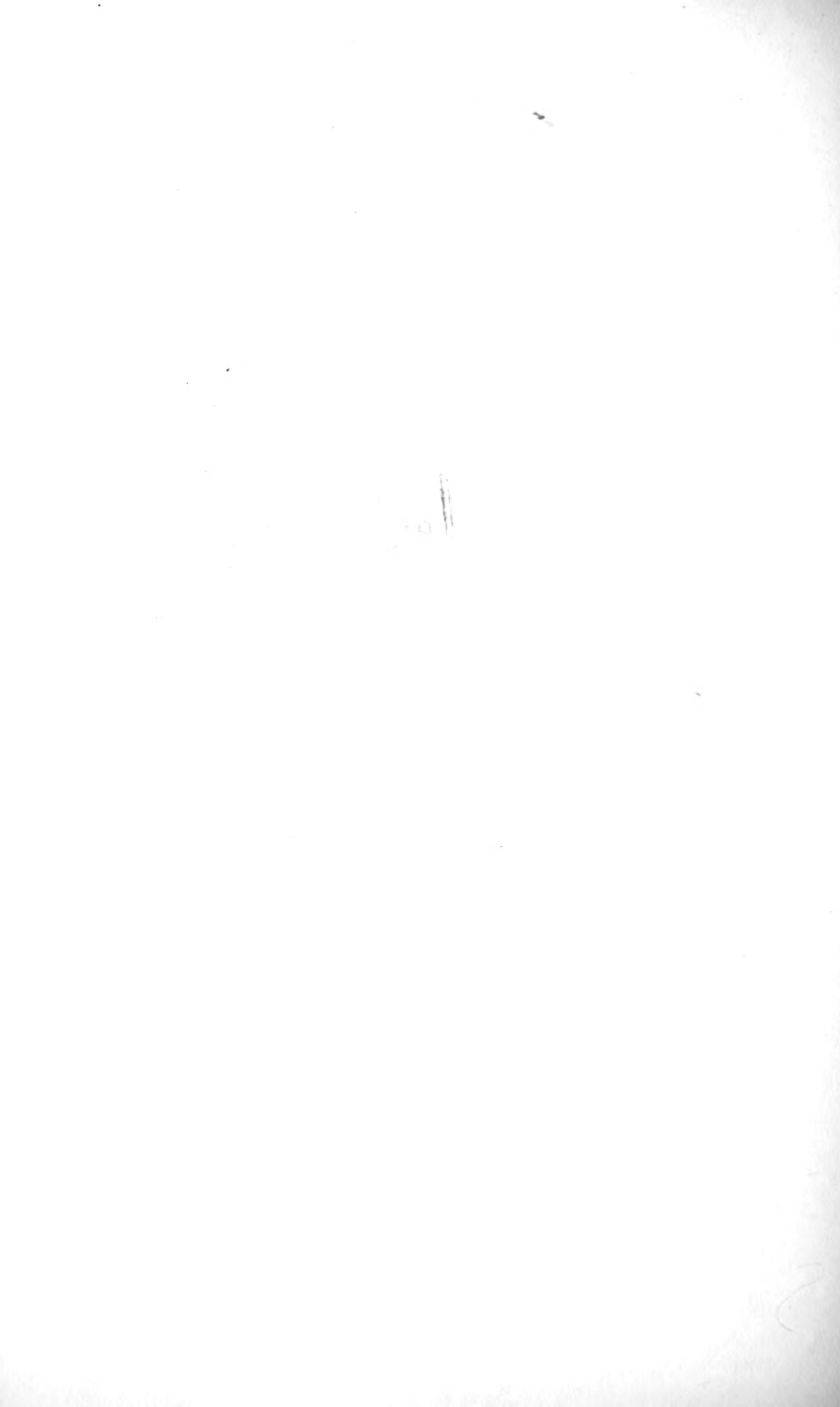

"Henry Rust, Essex St., Salem, ward 1, one store, Henry Rust, Essex St., Salem, ward 3, one house." He was known as Capt. Henry Rust of Salem. "The first house in the street (Essex) as you come from the west end of the lane is a brick store built in 1786, by Henry Rust and Benj. Brown. On this spot formerly stood the court-house which was built in 1718 and pulled down in 1785. On the N. W. corner stood the old town pump immediately by Hawthorne. On County St. as formerly known, now Eastern or Federal street, is a house owned by Mr. Henry Rust, and occupied by his son, Capt. Henry Rust—The Rust house has been moved easterly some feet and standing, 1864, owned by the heirs of John Gardner."* Henry Rust was a merchant in Salem, 1796, on the Main St.; was on a committee in church matters.† In 1765, Aug. 1, Henry Rust and Benj. Deland bought of Thos. Needham, of Marblehead, a messuage in Salem, consisting of a building and about 3-4 of an acre of land in that piece, the whole being the "Governor's Field," so called because it had formerly belonged to Gov. Endicott. "This he subsequently divided with Benj. Deland, and afterwards added to this lot from time to time, by various purchases, until he had become possessed of considerable land in the neighborhood; he sold off at different times, after the town had laid out the lane (recently called County and now Federal St.) from the 'Goal,' (now Washington St.) From this lane he opened a lane in 1785, or earlier, towards the North river, (now called Rust St.)

"May 6th, 1791, Henry Rust, of Salem, merchant, Benj. Witt, yeoman, of Lynn and wife Abigail, and William Parsons, mariner, of New Gloucester, Cumberland county, District of Maine, and wife Sarah, conveyed to John Rust, of Gloucester, Essex county, mariner, all their interest and title in and to two pieces of land in Ipswich, being about five acres, which was conveyed to their father Rust, by Abraham and Nathaniel Foster, by

deed dated 24 Dec., 1742, and recorded in the Register of Deeds, Book 146, p. 232. July 9, 1782, "He bought of David Britton, for £480, an houselot, containing about 8 poles, near the town house, bounded N. on the Main St., thence measuring 75 ft. east on the street leading to Marblehead, about 30 ft. S. on land of widow Sarah Ropes, dau. of the late Joseph Hawthorne, dec'd, and west on land of Daniel Sheever, or his wife and dau. This estate, afterwards known as Rust corner, was once the property of the famous Hugh Peters, and by his attorneys sold to Benj. Felton; afterwards in possession of Edward Britton," etc. Oct. 11 1785, Henry Rust bought of the town of Salem, the old court-house land, close by the lot above described.

He was the progenitor of Rustfield (now Norway) Me. On page 12, Norway History, it is recorded that, "In 1786 Henry Rust, of Salem, Mass., purchased of the committee for the sale of eastern lands, a tract containing 6000 acres for £450 continental money. The date of the deed is 1787. Bounded by Paris on the East, Waterford on the west, by the south line of Lee's grant extended to Waterford line on the north, and by Nelson and Otisfield and a small gore on the south and southwest. The title deeds of the early settlers, several of whom were squatters, came from Henry Rust. Three of his sons, Henry, John and Joseph, subsequently settled on the purchase and became influential citizens of the town and county." On page 27, the Norway historian says: "Henry Rust, Esq., of Salem, Mass., the progenitor of Rustfield, belonged to one of the old and respectable families of Essex county, Mass. His first American ancestor was Nathaniel Rust,* who, on the ancient records is frequently styled 'Glover' and who was for many years a resident of Ipswich, Mass. He died intestate, 23 Dec., 1713.

"Capt. Henry Rust settled Essex county people on his land at Norway and often visited it in the early times, coming through from Salem with his own horse and

chaise; his first visit with his chaise, in 1804, was the first time a wheeled carriage had been seen in the place; he built a summer residence on Pike's Hill; the door step was cut in the solid rock and still marks the site of his house. He was very kind to the early settlers, selling them land and taking his pay in labor at the rate of a day's work for an acre of land till each had a homestead of his own. He commenced the erection of a saw-mill and grist-mill in 1789; also, later, built a tannery and store in order to facilitate settlements. He is remembered as a very generous man. He gave land for a church and cemetery. Among other things, he brought from Salem quite a lot of small four-squared windows of six-by-eight glass, which he distributed among the settlers, a window or two to each. This was a valuable present to them as it was the first glass known in the place.

"In 1797 he took his grandson, Henry Rust, then ten years old, to spend the summer with him in Rustfield. They rode as far as Gloucester in a carriage, then on horse-back, the last twenty miles guided only by spotted trees, the boy riding behind his grandfather."

Appointed Administrator of his brother John's estate, 6 Nov., 1809.

On the 10 of July, 1812, he wrote his will which was proved 5 Oct., 1812. He gave his wife, "Nabby," a life estate in his house on Rust St., called the "Skew house," and an income of \$125 every six months; to his son Henry, "my part of the tan-yard" etc., owned by him in Norway, Me. To his son, John, the saw-mill, grist-mill etc. in Norway. He also mentions his son Joseph, daughter Lydia Austin, son Daniel's children, son Jacob P. Rust, daughter Sally's son Henry Rust Deland, daughter Polly J. Page, grandsons John and Henry. His sons Henry and John were appointed executors of his will. The inventory was presented 19 Oct., 1812. amount of real estate, \$23,023; of personal property, \$7,878.53; inventory of real estate in Norway, \$12,-809.53.

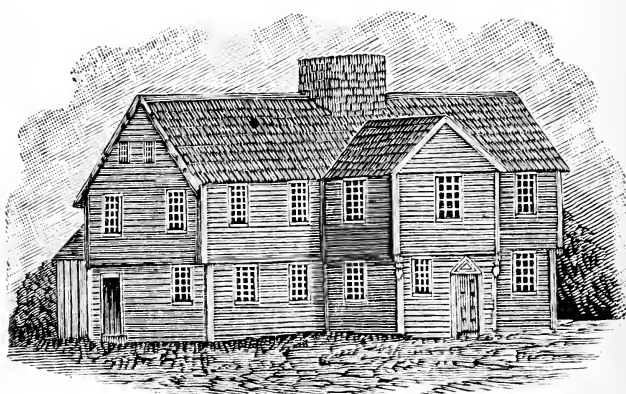

38 Dr. Wallis⁵ (*Nathaniel,⁴ John,³ Nathaniel,² Henry¹*) was born in Ipswich 8 Jan., 1741; married 17 Nov., 1764, Abigail, daughter of William and Joanna (Lord) Jones; died in Ipswich, 1 Dec., 1792. She died in Ipswich, 28 July, 1792. Dr. Wallis Rust was a skilled surgeon and an eminent physician; served at his profession in the Revolutionary war. He occupied the "ancient Rust house" and kept an apothecary shop after the death of his grandfather, Dr. Samuel Wallis, for whom he was named. He resided in Salem in 1772 and 1773 and perhaps longer.* The Probate Records show that Dr. Wallis Rust died intestate, and by the request of all his children over twenty-one years of age, then in the country, 7 Jan., 1793, William and Abigail Rust, Asa Andrews, Esq. was appointed administrator of his estate.† The estate was insolvent and paid but fifty

cents on the dollar. Dr. Wallis Rust had a seal, the head of Galen, which is still in possession of his descendants.

The accompanying illustration is a very faithful delineation of the ancient "Rust Mansion," in Ipswich. The following history of this ancient building is from the "Antiquarian Papers."*

"Mr. Dowe, this month presents us the ancient house, which stood about half way between the Town Hall and the residence of the late Miss Sally Choate, now the office of Mr. George Haskall, Esq. For many years its easterly end was but a heap of ruins. It was called the 'Rust house' and the 'Foster house.' It was entirely taken down about twenty years ago. In its prime it was a handsome and substantial mansion. Some years ago a writer in the 'New England Historical and Genealogical Register' (probably Mr. Hammatt) thought it might have been the first house built by Reginald Foster, which he gave to his son Deacon Jacob Foster. If this is correct, the house was built about 1638.

"It was occupied by Dr. Samuel Wallis, a conspicuous citizen of Ipswich, who died in 1728.

"Dr. Wallis Rust occupied it and died there, Dec. 1, 1792. His wife, Abigail (Jones) Rust, died July 28, of the same year.

"It was owned many of its last years by Fosters and Rusts of Boston; was finally sold to Mr. Augustine Heard, who removed it."

39 Samuel⁵ (*Nathaniel*,⁴ *John*,³ *Nathaniel*,² *Henry*¹) was born 25 Nov., 1749; married Ruth,† daughter of Jeremiah and Mehitabel (Haynes) Calef, born in Exeter, N. H., — Aug., 1752; died in Exeter, 13 Feb., 1825. He died at Marblehead, 7 Feb., 1827, and was buried in Exeter.

Samuel Rust was a ship-carpenter and worked on the old "Constitution" at Portsmouth. His name is quite frequently met with in the town records, tax lists and on petitions of Exeter. The following allusion is made to him in Gov. Bell's new history of Exeter: "The Goal in Exeter, during the rebellion was made a receptacle for

foreign prisoners and for Tories from this and other provinces, especially New York. It was not a safe place of confinement as was proved by the notorious Henry Tufts and others having made their escape from it. A guard had to be furnished in 1777, for two months, when it was filled with prisoners, to keep them secure, and the following Exeter men were employed in that capacity: Samuel Rust and others, "for which, for 2 mo. service he was paid £12 10s." He was also in active service in the Revolutionary war and described as follows: twenty-nine years old, five feet, nine inches high and dark complexion. He was Sergeant in Col. Brown's regiment, in the twenty-eight days service; traveled 112 miles.* Nov. 6, 1795, Samuel Rust and Ruth, his wife, of Exeter, N. H., deed one-fifth of all the real estate "my honored Grandmother, Sarah Rust, widow, late of Ipswich, died seized, to Nathaniel Rust, Cordwainer."† It is a remarkable fact that although Samuel had nine children, five of them being sons, there are only three of his descendants living who bear the name Rust, two grandsons and one granddaughter.

She lived a widow over 70 years; had a remarkable memory for names and incidents; just previous to her death she related an incident of her early life. She rode from Exeter to Sanbournnton, N. H., alone on horse-back, carrying her sister's infant son. She was very active throughout her long life and was a great reader, which she said she could not help as it was a Rust habit. Towards the latter part of her life her sight became dimmed but her mind was unimpaired, while her hearing was remarkably acute. A very amusing incident is related by her niece, Mrs. Ruth Berrian, who has favored the author with valuable data. The week before the death of the old lady, (she died of pneumonia, after an illness of only three days,) while she was sitting by the window in the dining-room, she heard the conversation

of two people who were at work there. They were talking of some affair that had recently occurred in the town, and attracted the old lady's attention and she remarked in an undertone, not audible to the talkers, "Well, I think this must be the sixteenth time I have heard you tell that story. Now, if you will tell it four more times, so as to make it the twentieth, you will probably both know it by heart." This was amusing, coming from an old lady of over ninety. It was also characteristic of the vein of humor always indulged in by her. She remembered well when the first umbrella was carried in Exeter. It was of scarlet silk and the man who carried it over him, as it was raining hard, was followed by a crowd of boys calling to him, "Say, mister, are you made of sugar or salt?" She said it was not long before they came into use, but being expensive, it was considered a luxury to be the owner of one and she would never forget the pride she felt when she first became the possessor of an umbrella. That umbrella she preserved with great care and it is now in the possession of her niece Mrs. Ruth Elizabeth (Weed) Berrian, of North Andover. Married at twenty-two, widowed three years later, she from that time served God, not as Anna, the prophetess did, with fastings and prayers, but in faithful, loving service to her parents and friends, making herself such a mother, though childless, that many children "rise up even now to call her blessed."

He served in the Revolutionary war and was one of the minute-men of Ipswich, 24 Jan., 1775;* was on the Ipswich rolls, May 10, 1775;† was engaged in the service, July 15, 1779, Capt. Jeremiah Putnam, Nathaniel Taylor's regiment for four months and sixteen days; he received pay for one month.* He served as private in September, October, November and December, 1779, Capt. Thaddeus Read, Col. Nathaniel Taylor. He was also in R. I. service three months and fourteen days, ending July, 1780.

The Land Records of Windsor show that on the 25 of May, 1752, John Searles deeded to Matthias Rust, forty acres of land, and the same land was deeded by Matthias Rust to Joshua Moore, 18 June, 1754. The Town Records of ancient Windsor show that Matthias' third child, Phineas, was born in that town. From thence he evidently removed to Norwich, Ct., where his next three children were born, after which he removed to Mansfield, Ct., where his last daughter, Mercy, was born; he then returned to his native town, Coventry where he appears to

have remained but a short time before he went to Vt. and settled permanently at North Hartland, which his descendants think was about 1765. Their last two children were born in Hartland. This was the first mill in town.

From this Matthias and Lucy (Fitch) Rust has sprung a very large and prosperous family that has scattered over many of the states.

NOTE.—Rust-Russ.—Most of the descendants of Matthias Rust have changed their name to Russ, which members of many other branches have also done. The following will interest some who do not know the fact of the change:

QUECHEE, VT., April 19, 1889.

A. D. RUST, DEAR KINSMAN:—Concerning the change in our family name, from Rust to Russ, I will say, the change was in my generation, as my father always spelt it Rust; Phineas, Sen. spelt it Rust: his sons were Phineas, Jr., and Levi; Levi, the father of Judge Darins Russ, spelt it Russ, but I do not know when he commenced spelling it so. The children of Oliver, Sen. spelt it Russ as long ago as I can remember. Four of Matthias, Sen.'s children, settled in this vicinity. My grandfather, Lemuel, Nial, (father of Matthias, Jr.) Phineas, Sen., (father of Phineas, Jr.) and Levi, (father of Judge Darius,) all spelt their name Rust. I have seen the head-stones of Matthias, of Coventry, and it is spelt Rust on them.

Respectfully, ASA RUSS.

The following, under date of March 28, 1879, from the late Hon. William M. Rust, editor of the "*Progressive Age*" Belfast, Me., bears upon the same subject: "There is a branch of the Rusts, one of whom is Jonathan Russ, lives at Farmington in this state. He may have sprung from the same Ipswich family. He spells his name Russ, I believe, for which neither he nor numerous others of the original family have any authority."

In Crowell's History of Essex, page 260, appears the following:

"1805, Dec. 19th, the physician of this parish, Dr. Parker Russ, died in the thirty-seventh year of his age. Dr. Russ was born in this place; a descendant of 'Master' Rust, the first school-teacher. He was the son of Joseph and Mary Rust."

Mr. Harry Russ, a man about 72 years old, wrote the author under date of June 29, 1887, as follows:

"My father, Matthias Russ, wrote his name Russ, but I see by an old deed of land he received from his father, (Niold) that he wrote it Rust."

Many other similar letters have been received, all tending to show that Russ is an innovation on the proper name; but the above is deemed sufficient. The author has found but very few named Russ whose ancestors came to this continent before 1700, under that name.

H., where he bought a "hill farm" in the south part of town, where he and his son, Daniel, lived, died and were buried. His wife, Hannah, also died at Alstead. The following is an extract from a sermon delivered by Rev. Seth Arnold, pastor of the First Congregational church in Alstead, on the first sabbath in Jan., 1826: "Nathaniel Rust came from Tolland Co., Ct., in Apr., 1767. He married Hannah Burroughs, by whom he had two sons and six daughters. The sons' names were Nathaniel and Daniel. Daniel Rust still lives in town on the same farm which his father first bought. His mother, an aged widow, living with him, has resided in town sixty-three years, longer than any other woman now here." Nathaniel was in the Revolutionary war as there is an account of his enlistment and pay for service.‡ He was in Capt. Wetherby's Co.

It appears that Daniel Rust removed to Orwell, Vt., but it is quite evident that all his children were born in Coventry, as all their births are recorded there. He died in Orwell, 3 Jan., 1814; she died 31 Jan., 1827, æt. eighty-six years.

49 Gersham⁵ (*Daniel*,⁴ *Nathaniel*,³ *Israel*,² *Henry*¹) was born in Coventry, Ct. or Southampton, Mass., about March, 1738; married (int. ent., 6 Aug., 1761; notification posted 7 Aug., 1761) in Springfield, 28 Oct., 1761, Mary Cooley, of that place; he soon removed to Chester, where he raised his family and died 8 Oct., 1823, in his eighty-fifth year. Nice marble head-stones mark the spot in Littlefield cemetery, where his dust reposes. She died about 1829, in the family of her son, Gersham, in Mayfield, N. Y. and was buried by the side of her husband. He resided about two miles east and a half-mile south of Chester meeting-house, which was in the center of the township of Chester, and a half-mile east of Little River, on a stony hill farm, which was bounded on the east by the east line of Chester township, which is also the east line of Hampden county. He was a carpenter as well as a farmer, and had a good shop on his farm. His house, barn and out-buildings were all good and substantial, the workmanship of his own hands. All his children were born in that house. Sergeant Gersham Rust from "Murrayfield" marched from home, 21 Oct., 1776, under Capt., Shepard, Col. John Mosely Reg. "Who marched up to Mount Independence under the command of Lieut.-Col. Timothy Roberson, in the alarm in October Last on the 21 1776." "Sergeant Gersham Rust marched on the Alarm at Bennington, 17 Aug., in the same company."*

Y., in 1817; lived in Ellicottville, Cadiz, Great Valley and Franklinville, N. Y., also in Milan and East Townsend, Ohio.

The following is an extract from a letter to the author from Dr. Staunton, bearing date, March 17, 1889:

"I have voted for seventeen presidents, all of one political stamp, but do not expect to vote for another. My wife, faithful and true, just fell asleep without one sign of pain, on August 1, 1888, at 6 p. m. I did not think the loss would be so great."

His was a tragic death. While walking along Ninth street, on his way from the residence of his daughter Helen to that of his daughter Viola, in Ottawa, Kansas, at 3 o'clock p. m., Monday, May 20, 1889, he was struck by an engine attached to passenger train No. 202, running at a high rate of speed on the Southern Kansas Railroad, and was instantly killed. His remains were interred beside those of his wife, in Highland cemetery.

50 Lemuel⁵ (*Daniel*,⁴ *Nathaniel*,³ *Israel*,² *Henry*¹) was born in Coventry, Ct., 11 Feb., 1740, Old Style; 22 Feb., 1741, New Style; married (intention published) in Southampton, 23 Dec., 1762, Azuba, daughter of Ebenezer and Mary Kingsley, of Southampton, born 29 Nov., 1741; died in Otisco, N. Y., 22 Jan., 1827. He died 31 July, 1813.

Lieut. Lemuel Rust was among those who were engaged in the eight months service at Cambridge, in 1775.

Lieut. Lemuel Rust, of Southampton, Capt. Lemuel Pomeroy, under Col. Ezra May, was engaged 20 Sept., and discharged 14 Oct., 1777; was 112 miles from home; engagement in expedition to Saratoga.*

He was an early settler in Southampton, and lived the latter part of his life on what was originally known as the Kingsley farm, opposite the Central cemetery.

The following is the substance of a deed upon record in Book 15, Land Records, Springfield, Mass.:

NOTE.—Elisha Staunton was the only one of a family of ten children that made use of the "u" in the name. After about twenty years' absence he returned but only for a short visit. He had been captured by the Indians, and forced, with three others, to run the gauntlet. He was the only one that survived this ordeal. An old Indian, having taken a fancy to him, gave him the Indian's prescription, a billet to bite upon when tempted to cry out with pain. This enabled him to pass between the two files of tomahawks and receive their blows without flinching. His courage saved him and gave him the favor of the Indians. He afterwards became a leading spirit among them. It is said that he stood in such great favor with them that they desired him to marry the chief's daughter which he refused to do. After his return to his own people, when asked if he would remain with them, he replied, "The Indians are good and I have become acquainted with their customs and will return to them." He was afterwards heard of at Binghamton, where he married and raised several children. These facts were told to William H. Rust, druggist, New Brunswick, New Jersey, by his second cousin, Mrs. Prudence Whitaker, and Mr. Rust gave them to the author.

† Moses was captain of his own vessel and his brother, Samuel, was his mate. He was hailed by a friend in a passing vessel, just before the storm struck, who asked him if he was homeward bound. He replied that he had "one more hog's-head of salt to wet," then he would start for home. He was never after heard of. All went down. Eleven other families in Gloucester were caused to mourn by the work of this storm.

Dr. Parker Russ* lost his father when he was but about two years old and the widowed mother married Rev. Paul Park, 26 Nov., 1772.

The History of Essex, page 260, published in 1868, has the following regarding Dr. Parker Russ: "Dec. 19, 1805, the physician of this parish, Dr. Parker Russ, died in the thirty-seventh year of his age. Dr. Russ was born in this place, a descendant of 'Master' Rust, the first school teacher. He was the son of Joseph and Mary Rust. His father died when he was quite young. His widowed mother married Rev. Paul Park, of Preston, Ct., and removed there with her son, then three years old. Parker received his education in Connecticut and remained there until prepared to practice medicine, when he came to this place about the year 1788 and succeeded Dr. Davis as the physician of the parish. The first winter of his residence here he taught the North school with great success. He resided in the ancient Rust house, where he was born, now owned by William H. Mears. In 1800, Dec. 14, he married Elizabeth, daughter of Jonathan Cogswell, Esq., who died June 5, 1803. Dr. Russ was well skilled in his profession and successful in his practice. Integrity, decision and energy were prominent traits in his character." Dr.

Parker Russ left an only son, John Dennison Russ, a niece, Hannah Treadwell Russ, and a brother, John Russ, of Hartford, Connecticut.*

Russ having inherited a large estate from his parents, the new alliance created a rupture between the children and the adopted father and their displeasure was so keenly felt by him that when he made his will he bequeathed his entire estate of \$50,000 to his native town, Essex, for the benefit of the old and orphans. One daughter, Eliza Russ, married in Essex, 6 Jan., 1858, Judge Frederick Cogswell, of Circleville, Ohio; he d. 3 May, 1870. The wid. res. at 1, Gramacy Park, N. Y. City. The celebrated Russ pavement of N. Y., was the invention of one of the adopted sons. They are now in Cal. His wid. res. Pompton, N. J. Dr. Russ never had any children of his own. He d. in N. J., 1 Mar., 1881, and was buried in his native town, Essex.

74 Henry⁶ (*Henry*,⁵ *John*,⁴ *John*,³ *Nathaniel*,² *Henry*¹) was born 18 Sept., 1760; married 18 June, 1785, Sally, daughter of Nathaniel and Hannah Archer, of Salem, born 15 Jan., 1764; died at Norway, Maine, 4 Aug., 1846.

He was the first of the name to settle permanently in Norway. He was known as Capt. Rust, having been master of a ship, previous to settling in Norway, engaged in the European trade, acting in both the capacities of captain and supercargo. He followed this occupation until broken in health from extreme exposure and hard work. Once Capt. Rust came very near being shipwrecked on our coast in mid-winter, himself and crew being badly frozen and just escaped death. After abandoning a sea-faring life he removed to Rustfield, Maine, where he engaged in farming and manufacturing of various kinds and opening up his "Grant" to settlers, until his death which occurred in Norway, 25 Aug., 1820. This sketch is rendered imperfect as to dates by the loss by fire of Capt. Rust's residence which contained much valuable record. Capt. Rust was treasurer of his county thirteen years and was succeeded by his son, Henry. In 1803 he became the proprietor of the town. In 1805 he

Mrs. Elizabeth M. Proctor, of 404, Essex street, enjoyed the distinction of celebrating her ninety-ninth birthday anniversary, Tuesday. She has always been rather reticent about mentioning her age, and so have her friends, which is the reason it has not been generally known that Mrs. Proctor was the oldest person in the city. She is a native of Salem, and was the daughter of John and Nancy Rust, of Ipswich. She is the widow of Captain Thorndike Proctor, a man well known among the last generation. She now resides with her daughter, Mrs. Nathaniel W. Osgood. Mrs. Proctor, like most people who live to a great age, has passed a quiet life. For many years she has devoted much of her energies to the work of the Seaman's Orphan and Children's Friend Society, of Carpenter street, and despite the advancing weakness of years she still occupies the post of president of the organization. Her mind, of course, is still bright, and apparently several years of comfortable existence are before her."

After her decease a Salem paper gave the following notice of her :

"Mrs. Proctor was distinguished for her love for children, and for upward of fifty years was identified with the work of the Seaman's Orphan and Children's Friend Society, being president of the organization at the time of her death. She was a woman of considerable wealth and very generous to every worthy charity. She retained her faculties to a remarkable degree up to within a short time of her death."

Joseph Rust was elected register of deeds and removed to Paris Hill, where he resided ten years, during two terms of his office. He was elected town clerk while residing in Paris Hill. The Rusts of Norway were Universalists and he was clerk of the society for many years. His wife, Ruthy Rust was said to be a lady of rare beauty, sweet disposition, polite and affable and very retiring in her manners.

Doctor Rust is the only living member of the family in the sixth generation.

A silver mounted cane, now in the possession of Dr. Rust, and which once belonged to his father, bears the following inscription: "Nathaniel Rust born May 5, 1755, died Mar. 26, 1822, aged 66 years 10 months and 22 days. R. S. Rust." It was presented to Dr. Rust by his cousin Samuel, son of Samuel Rust. At that time the signature was "S. Rust," but after it came into the possession of Dr. Rust, he added the "R.," thus making his own initials.

Richard Sutton Rust, A. M., D. D., LL. D., is one of the most energetic, enthusiastic and successful ministers of the Methodist Episcopal church, and in the varied official positions to which he has been called, has rendered valuable service and exhibited rare executive ability in the administration of affairs intrusted to his care.

He was born in Ipswich, Mass., Sept. 12, 1815. His mother, from whom he inherited many of his traits of character, was a woman of deep piety and superior attainments, the daughter of Richard Sutton, distinguished among his townsmen for integrity, independence and intelligence. He was left an orphan, his father dying when he was eight years old and his mother when he was ten, leaving him no patrimony but a parentage spotless and revered. One of his uncles gave him a year's schooling, where he first formed a taste for study which never forsook him. Another uncle gave him a home till he was fourteen, during which time he was compelled to work hard upon a farm, with only three month's schooling each winter. He was then apprenticed to learn a cabinet-maker's trade, and at the end of three years, yearning for school and more congenial pursuits, pur-

chased the balance of the apprenticeship and entered Phillips Academy, Andover, Mass., to prepare for college. While at Andover the distinguished abolition lecturer, George Thompson, of England, visited Phillips Academy and lectured on slavery to the students. With his wonderful eloquence, wit and logic the students were charmed, and a large number of them became abolitionists and formed an anti-slavery society. The teachers were displeased at this action, and required the students to leave the anti-slavery society or the academy. Nearly one hundred of them, rather than give up their principles and rights, left the school. Some went into the anti-slavery field as lecturers, and others to institutions where freedom of thought and speech could be enjoyed. Young Rust, with several others, went to Canaan, New Hampshire, where an academy had been established upon liberal principles and where young men and women of color were allowed to enter and enjoy the advantages of culture. So bitter was the opposition to this school, because it extended its privileges alike to all without distinction of color that the mandate went forth that it must be broken up, and the farmers in the vicinity, with a hundred yoke of oxen, drew the academy more than a mile out of town into the woods and broke up the school. Our young friend finished his preparatory studies at the Wilbraham Academy, and in 1837 entered the Wesleyan University, Middletown, Ct., where he was graduated in 1841, and received the degree of Master of Arts in 1844. In 1859 he received the honorary degree of D. D. from the Ohio Wesleyan University at Delaware. While in college he paid his expenses by teaching and lecturing winters. He was one of the first anti-slavery lecturers in Connecticut, and in New Haven county was mobbed repeatedly for his lectures against slavery. He aided the ladies in organizing the first anti-slavery fair at Hartford, and published for that occasion, "Freedom's Gift," a little annual of anti-slavery poems and prose. The great anti-slavery struggle reached its height as he came to his manhood, and he did valiant service in the good cause, and was a pioneer in the Methodist Episcopal church in this grand conflict. In 1842 he was principle of Elling-

ton school, Ct. ; in 1843 he was principal of Middleton high school ; in 1844 he joined the New England Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, and was stationed at Springfield, Mass., and in 1846 was stationed at Worcester, Mass. During the next five years Mr. Rust passed through one of the most interesting periods of his life. He originated and published the "American Pulpit;" was transferred to the New Hampshire Conference; was principle of the New Hampshire Conference Seminary and Female College, and was state commissioner of common schools for New Hampshire for three years. He delivered popular lectures on education all over the state, awakened the deepest interest in the schools, assailed with wit, sarcasm and invectives the miserable old school-houses, and did a grand work in introducing into New Hampshire good school-houses, teachers' institutes and an improved system of common school education.

In 1859 Dr. Rust was transferred from the scenes of his early struggles and triumphs to the Cincinnati Conference. The name and character of the man preceded him in the west and he was at once welcomed to active service in the leading enterprises of the church. He was for four years president of the Wilberforce University at Xenia, Ohio, after which he became pastor of Morris Chapel, Cincinnati, when he was elected president of the Wesleyan Female College, Cincinnati, where he remained until the old college was sold and vacated, and the school was suspended until the new college could be erected. He was corresponding secretary of the Western Freedmen's Aid Society, and in connection with Bishop Clark and Rev. Dr. Walden, aided in the organization of the Freedman's Aid Society of the Methodist Episcopal church in 1865, and for the last twenty years has been its corresponding secretary and has discharged its duties with such efficiency and ability as to meet the highest commendation of the whole church. This society under the administration of Dr. Rust has established and sustained in central locations in the South, thirty institutions of learning, styled seminaries, colleges or universities for the training of teachers and preachers for the elevation of

this long neglected race, so lately admitted to all the rights and duties of American citizens. For the successful management of this important educational work, the subject of this sketch, by his deep, long, life interest in this people, his attainments as a scholar, his previous experience as an educator, and shrewd business habits, was pre-eminently fitted, and the results achieved by this society have exceeded the highest anticipations of its friends.

Dr. Rust was successful as a pastor, a fine writer and an impressive preacher, pre-eminent as an educator, possessing great power over the young of awakening them to high and noble purpose; and there are but few men in this country who have aided in educating so many of her youth who now fill important positions in society and wield so great influence for Christ and the right. In his boyhood he espoused the cause of the slave, labored for his emancipation; and his mature life, attainments and ample means are consecrated to the preparation of this emancipated people for the appropriate discharge of the important duties imposed upon them by freedom, so that liberty may prove a blessing rather than a curse to them. As a Christian philanthropist he has done his noblest work and for this, by a grateful people, will he be held in remembrance.—The above is from the Biographical Encyclopedia of Ohio.

In time of peace he was called the "Peace-maker" of the neighborhood; in war he was a faithful soldier and efficient officer; served as private in Olmsteads Co., Enos' Regiment, Connecticut Militia, 1778; was also Lieutenant under Gen. Schuyler.

The land records of Kent, Ct., show that 30 Sept., 1795, Levi Rust sold 32 acres of land in Kent to his brother Abel for £75. Levi Rust was a very extensive land owner and dealer in those days. He was a tanner and currier and carried on the shoe-making business also.

militia in the state of Connecticut, To Abel Rust greeting. Do by these presents, Reposing special trust and confidence in your Loyalty and good Conduct Do Constitute and appoint you the said Abel Rust, to second Serg't. in the Sixth Company in the 13th. Reg't of militia in the state of Connecticut and I do here by authorise and Empower you to Exercise and discharge the Duties thereof which you are Dilligently to attend and Do your Duty as second serg't aforesaid acurding to the trust Reposed in you for which this is your sufficient Warrenty. Given under my hand and seal at New Milford the 5 Day of April 1787 and in the Eleventh year of the independence of America.

Comd't of the 13th Regt. of
Militia C'mn."

Sergeant Abel Rust served under Gen. George Washington, and when very old he amused the younger folks with stories of his hardships during the war. He had a lock of white hair on the crown of his head, the result of being inoculated for small-pox when a boy. Mrs. Mary A. Thorn, of Millbrook, N. Y., a grand niece of his, remembers him very well, as he visited her father, David Rust, about the year 1834.

F. Barker, which he continued until 1861, when he co-edited several with his brother, Henry S. Perkins. Dr. William O. Perkins, Mus. Doct., musical composer, conductor and journalist, stands high in his profession. He is the author of many works for the use of classes, choirs and conventions. In 1885 he changed his residence to New York, and is one of the well-known musicians of that city as well as Boston. Permanent address, 159, Tremont st., Boston. Is unmarried.

ii HENRY SOUTHWICK, b. in Stockbridge, Vt., 20 Mar., 1833. As in the majority of cases with the Green Mountain boys in early times, farming during his minority was the principle muscle and mind developer together with the common school and singing school, the latter being taught by his father. In 1849 the family moved to Woodstock, Vt. At the age of nineteen Henry taught district school in his own (Windsor) county. His academic course was taken at Kimball Union Academy, Meriden, N. H. In 1854-5 he was a member of the "Mendelssohn Quartet," a concert company. In 1857, he entered the Boston Music School and graduated in 1861. In 1867 he accepted the position of Professor of Music in the Iowa State University and the principalship of the Iowa Academy of Music, located at Iowa City. In 1872 he located permanently in Chicago, where he

now resides. His specialties as a teacher of music are: Voice, harmony, sight-singing, methods of teaching and conducting. He is very noted as a conductor, having conducted musical festivals and conventions in nearly all of the northern states and territories from Maine to California. He has also conducted normal music schools in New York, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Kansas and Texas. He is the author of over thirty music books for the public schools, the class, choir and choral society. They have been very popular individual works, reaching a sale of from 50,000 to 200,000 copies. Among them are "The Song Echo," "Graded Music Readers," (three books,) "New Century," "Advance," "Vocal Method," "Headlight," "Sunnyside," "Glee and Chorus Book," "Model Class Book," "Song Indicator," "Festival Choruses," "Graded Anthems," "Choir Anthems" and "Climax." In 1875-6, he traveled extensively in Europe and as far east as Egypt. In 1885 he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Music. He was one of the organizers of the Music Teachers' National Association in 1876, and organized the Illinois Music Teachers' Association in 1886. Dr. Perkins has done much literary work. He is one of the foremost and one of the most active in the musical profession of to-day.

"Julius Edson Perkins possessed histrionic musical talent in a very marked degree, inherited from his parents and developed to great artistic excellence. His musical studies were commenced in Boston at the age of fourteen and continued with occasional interruptions, the intervals of which were devoted to teaching, until 1867, when his brother, Henry S. fur-

nished him the means and sent him to Europe to continue his musical studies and fit himself for the operatic stage. One year was spent in Paris and five in Italy studying voice and dramatic action, with the best masters. During his early studies his attention was devoted principally to the piano theory and composition, in which departments he excelled. After arriving at manhood he gave his attention almost entirely to the cultivation and development of his voice, which was classed by the Italians as *basso profondo assoluto*. In profundity, purity, flexibility and intensity the voice of J. E. Perkins was far superior to any other which America had produced up to his time or the present. He was the greatest and most profound exponent of the vocal art by an American in Europe and the only native-born American basso in Italian opera who had achieved success. During his studies in Italy he filled several operatic engagements in that country and at Warsaw in Poland, meeting with instantaneous success. In 1873 he entered into an engagement with Her Majesty's Royal Italian Opera, at Drury Lane, London, for five years. After Col. J. H. Mapleson, the operatic manager had shrewdly secured the signature of Mr. Perkins to the contract at Milan, Italy, an operatic impresario from Constantinople, offered Col. Mapleson \$20,000 for his bargain, after hearing his magnificent voice in La Scala at Milan. Mr. Perkins' operatic engagement commenced in London with the season of 1873. Directly his artistic greatness was acknowledged throughout England and his fame came to America to the great satisfaction of his countrymen. In addition to his superior musical talents and acquirements, he was a profound student in mathematics, philosophy, history and languages. He became acquainted with Marie Rose who was one of the prima donnas of the same opera company when his engagement commenced. They were married in London in 1874, at the close of the operatic season. They visited America during that summer and appeared in oratorio concerts given by his brothers Henry S. and William O. These were the only public concerts in which the great American basso appeared in his native country, after achieving a world-wide reputation. His death was regarded both in England and America as a great loss to vocal art. It is probable that there never was such universal mourning for the loss of an artist as in the death of Julius Edson Perkins." Justin and his brother, Quartus were in the Revolutionary war and were two of the one hundred young men under twenty-one years old with whom General Washington entered and captured New York City, the British being compelled to retreat and leave the city. Justin Rust enlisted under Noah Goodman, "Superintendent," 16 Apr., 1781, for three years; was described as seventeen years of age, height five feet, five inches, light complexion, occupation farmer, from "Maraysville."* He died from enlargement of the kidney. He was helping roll logs and a handspike was violently thrown against his side, injuring one of his kidneys. Dr. Gersham Rust Staunton, Justin's nephew, called a council of doctors and it was decided to take out the kidney which was found to weigh seven pounds.

Zebulon Rust had the reputation of being rough and rather fast. The following little incident related of him by Charles Rust, his nephew, now deceased, will illustrate his eccentric character: "'Zeb,' as he was familiarly called, was sick and Dr. Furness, the family physician attended him. On one occasion the doctor left a

nurse to look after and care for him, and gave instructions to leave a memorandum if the nurse should leave before he returned so he might know about the case. The memorandum was as follows: 'Dr. Furness, I leave your patient thus:—Peevish, squeamish, cross as h—l. A d—d old rascal, sick or well.'

Chauncy Rust removed from Southampton to Otisco, in the spring of 1800, his wife following in the fall. At this time Otisco was a wilderness. The brave and loyal wife and determined mother rode horseback the entire distance, carrying her first child, a small babe, with her while men cut out the brush to let her pass. This babe was the first white child ever in Otisco. For several months there were no white women in the vicinity and she was compelled to call the red-skin women her neighbors. The family occupied their first house some weeks with no roof to shelter them. "The first public religious services ever held in the town was a prayer-meeting at the residence of Mr. Rust, in Sept., 1800. The following names appear on the books of the Otisco Congregational church as members 1803 and 1804, to-wit: Lemuel Rust, Azuba Rust, Aurelia Rust, Mary Rust, Esther Rust and Silence Rust." He was a farmer.

John Ames Russ was a man of education and refinement, a kind, industrious and useful citizen, a friend to the poor and those in trouble and was beloved by all who knew him. He led the life of a consistent and conscientious Christian. In early life he joined the Trinity (Episcopalian) church, to which he belonged as long as he lived; was elected warden in Utica, in 1819, which position he filled until 1860. His first venture from Coventry was to New York City. (No dates.) From there he went to Rensselaerville, where he taught school and was married. Jan. 17, 1817, he came to the then village of Utica, where he remained until his death. His vocation was that of master builder and architect; was also a large real estate owner. When Utica was in-

incorporated as a city in 1832, John A. Russ was elected a member of the first board of aldermen, then a very honorable position. When still young he united with the Masonic fraternity and was an active member in promoting its welfare. At his death the obsequies were conducted by the Masons and Knight Templars of which order he was also a member. He was called a father in the fraternity.

Line, 1777 to 1781, from Farmington, Ct."*

Amos Rust, Sen. was drowned in Farmington river in the town of Farmington, north of Fuller's bridge, in August, 1825. He had been fishing and when found his body was taken home ten miles in a wagon and buried at Terrysville, Litchfield Co., Ct. No headstones were ever set. The probate records of Harwinton show that Ira Palmeto, son-in-law of Amos Rust, settled the estate

which paid but a few cents on the dollar. Ira Palmeter and family removed to New Jersey. The following note, written to the author in 1887, will explain itself:

"Anciently, say fifty to sixty years last past, there lived in the southeast part of the town of Harwinton, about a quarter of a mile from the town line of Burlington, a family by the name of Rust. The father's name was Amos Rust. He had, as remembered, John, Saul, Amos and perhaps other boys and one or more daughters. The name of Rust is forgotten except by a very few old men. The writer is eighty-two years old. I well remember Amos Rust and sons named.

He was christened Henry, but in 1822 he added the middle name, "Bloomfield," assigning as a reason that there were "too many Henry Rusts."

Judge Rust was very widely known, and wherever known highly esteemed. He always resided at South

Wolfeboro, was a gentleman of intelligence and integrity, of strict and successful business habits, of rare and engaging social qualities, courteous and affable to all, hospitable and generous, and a good Samaritan in sickness. He retained his faculties to a wonderful degree until the very close of life.

Some estimate of his public character may be found in the fact of his having served in many offices of trust during his long and active life. In 1828, he was elected to represent his town in the General Court; after serving in that capacity for two years, he was elected to the Senate. In 1832, he was appointed one of the associate judges of the Supreme Court of New Hampshire, which office he held for six years. In 1838-40 he was in the Legislature again. In 1840-42 he was a member of the Council. In 1846-7 and 1852 he was again a member of the State Legislature. All of these offices he filled with honor to himself and satisfaction to his constituents.

"In early life Judge Rust espoused the doctrine of Universalism, a faith cherished, loved and exemplified by an upright life and whose sustaining power he found sufficient to cheer and support the soul as it entered the valley of the shadow of death."

Mr. Rust was one of the few remaining of the old school, polite in real kindness of heart and hand, and many outside the large circle of his immediate relatives and descendants, will sigh with regret at the passing away of another long familiar landmark of the best old days gone by. His wife outlived him several years. April 13, 1888, she celebrated her nintieth anniversary at South Wolfeboro and forty-six days later her life on earth was finished. She was respected and esteemed by a large circle of friends. Many a person in trouble and poverty has known her word and deed of sympathy. For many years she was a firm Universalist, "believing all life here and hereafter is through Christ," which were her last words on religious topics. The last rites were paid her at her late home, June 1, 1888. W. H. Trickey, of Tufts College, spoke words of sympathy and comfort. Many beautiful floral offerings showed the

tender feelings of relatives and friends. "She lived not only long but well."

He owned the first store ever opened in Belfast, being one of the first settlers there.

Below are a few items which were taken from the History of Belfast:

"Major John Russ was one of the many hardy, strong-willed, enterprising men, who came here to build up a home in the comparative wilderness in the early part of the present century. He was at one time extensively interested in real estate in the village, and in navigation. At the commencement of the war of 1812 he was the sole or principle owner of a brig just launched. She lay in the dock westerly of the railroad wharf until the close of the war, at a heavy loss to her owner. The wharf which stood near the dock belonged to him and was known as long as it remained there as "Russ's Wharf." The precise year when he removed his residence and business to the locality now known as City Point is not remembered. Prior to his removal, it was known as Clary's Point; afterwards and for many years as Russ's Point.

He was a man of great muscular power but never exercised it to the detriment of his fellow men. He was a man of humor, but his mirth was never boisterous. His wife was the daughter of Major-General George Ulmer, one of the prominent men of this section of the country in the early part of the century.

ordinary ability. Born in a new and comparatively unsettled country, his opportunities for an education were very limited. However through the zeal and indomitable energy of his parents he was enabled to attend the country school and learned his first lessons while sitting upon the slab bench. As he grew into manhood his time was divided between hard labor on a new farm and the school room until he had acquired a first-rate common-school education, and, while he never taught school as a vocation the children and young folks of the neighborhood "went to 'Jake' to help them out in arithmetic."

He remained with his father on the new farm until it was cleared up and several years after he had attained his majority and finally the property was willed or given to a younger brother who had never aided in making it a farm.

In early life he became interested in politics and took a very active part in the campaign of 1840 in favor of Van Buren. Being very proud-spirited he was made sore by the defeat of "his man" and the election of Harrison. He was one of the best posted men of his day, particularly on political and religious subjects. When the author visited his native state in 1889, several of the former associates of Mr. Rust in his early life made the remark, "Jake Rust was the best posted man in this country."

Though possessed of a stainless character, sterling integrity and a heart overflowing with sympathy, he was

not a successful man in business matters, but there was much that came not to the knowledge of the world to account for it. Few men, attaining the age of sixty years, ever encounter the constantly recurring obstacles and barriers that came in his way. At twenty-five he was thrown from a sleigh, resulting in a physical disability from which he never recovered and which rendered him an easy prey to the tortures of rheumatism. Once he was suddenly left penniless among strangers, with a large family to care for, under the most trying circumstances, and thus one adversity succeeded another until the culminating point was reached when the entire family was stricken with that loathsome scourge, the small-pox, from which one daughter, the youngest, died. One son left his home at the promising age of 16 years, never to return. One daughter, just blooming into the loveliness of womanhood, was called from earth by the dark-winged messenger. A child of the oldest daughter who, with her husband at that time constituted a part of the family, died. Through all these trials and afflictions, Mr. Rust bore up and continued his struggle for a clear sky. Meanwhile he never forgot to bestow his affection and tender care bountifully upon his faithful companion, or his parental care upon his children. His children, mindful of his cares and affection, remember with pleasant thoughts the paternal love, the faithful instruction, the rigid discipline, the constant care and the unlimited interest he had in and for them.

No man could be more honest or true, and few try harder to live an exemplary Christian life than he.

After leaving the homestead Mr. Rust went into a flouring mill in North Danville, at which business he continued for fifteen years. In 1844 he removed with his family of eight children to the west. Illinois being the objective point where he expected to locate and with his family of sons make a new home in that then new country. On his arrival at Beaver, Pa., he was obliged to remain a few days before proceeding; while here the calamities above noted overtook him. After two years' sojourn in Pennsylvania he returned to Ohio where he had tarried with his family when he first removed from

Vermont; here he remained until the fall of 1851 when he removed to Michigan and purchased property in Winfield, Montcalm county, where he made a very pleasant home and where he resided until 26 July, 1861, when he died. Nice marble headstones mark the spot of his last resting place in Winfield, Michigan.

MOTHER.

The poet, Coleridge, says :

“A mother is a mother still,
The holiest thing alive.”

MOTHER—what a wonderful word. What a vast scope of goodness it suggests—love, affection, purity. The influence of a true mother, as transmitted to her off-spring, is never lost, never diminished. To the author the word “mother” defines all goodness, love and purity. The subject of this sketch, the author’s mother, has been, by no means, a creature of circumstances of a character to render her specially superior to other good mothers, but she certainly has been a creator of such circumstances and means. Wrestling, sometimes, with most extreme adversity, she looked it serenely but defiantly in the face with never a thought of discouragement. She was born with a mighty fund of courage, pride and modesty, and yet if bravery can grace a female character, she was brave. She has lived for her children and family, and while she had enough to do to keep them so, yet when young they were always neat and whole dressed, or, if not whole—clean patched and polite. Sometimes while her husband was trying to hew out a home in the Green Mountains of Vermont, or later, in the new west, the “wolf” came nigh and then the dear mother put into practical operation the maxim, “Necessity is the mother of invention,” and food and raiment came, but from whence, the innocent objects of a mother’s love and pride, knew not.

“Her office there to rear and teach,
Becoming as is meet and fit
A link among the days, to knit
The generations each to each.”

Mrs. Marinda (Allen) Rust was endowed with a great degree of moral courage, deep piety and a disposition to "do or die" in rearing children of whom she might be proud when her office work was past. How well she has succeeded, the love her children bear her will attest. It may be excusable in the author to say, that, if her pride in her children exceeds that of theirs in their mother, it is simply indescribable. For a woman she possesses rare executive ability and her capability for business seems to grow with her years; even now, when past eighty-three years of age, her watchful eye is always on the alert, and a good opportunity for a bargain rarely escapes her attention; she insists on superintending all of her own affairs when moving, building, traveling, etc., and seems to have a burden that others will tire, with no thought of herself. On one occasion, when she was past eighty, the writer was assisting her up a long flight of stairs to his office; when about half way up, fearing that it might weary the old lady, he said to her, "Mother, we had better rest a moment." She looked up into his face with an expression of sympathy, and instantly inquired, "Why, are you tired?" At one time when she was only seventeen years old she was left in charge of her youngest brother and sister during the night. About midnight she awoke to find the house on fire; with her characteristic presence of mind, and bravery coming to her relief, she went deliberately to work bringing water, and after a hard struggle succeeded in extinguishing the flames which had reached to the ceiling overhead and extended half way across the room. When about nine years of age, her baby brother was taken violently ill in the night time. Her father being away, she was the oldest at home except the mother, and though a mere child, she was dispatched for help to the nearest neighbor's, which was quite a distance away and where she arrived at two o'clock in the night. The road was all ice and she could only make progress by supporting herself by the fence and feeling her way along. When she was sixty-five years old she visited Chicago and went to the top of the tower of the city water works, about 200 feet high. In 1877 she removed to Texas from Michigan and when rid-

ing in a wagon near Fort Worth, on the day she was seventy years old, she deliberately jumped to the ground while the wagon was in motion. When nearly sixty-five year old she sustained a painful and serious injury in being thrown from a buggy, breaking her left arm in such a manner as to disable her so that for more than a year she was not able to dress or undress herself and she has never entirely recovered from it. She has been a widow over thirty years. She resides in Dallas, Texas, with her youngest child, Emory G. Rust, whose care and attention towards her is evidence of his attachment to and love for his mother, and no daughter could be more thoughtful and attentive to an own mother than his wife has been to the subject of this sketch. On Christmas, 1887, there was a re-union (the first in thirty-seven years) of all the living members of her family, five sons and a daughter. The meeting was at the home of her son, Alfred B. Rust, in Dallas.

She is a remarkably conscientious and truly devoted Christian woman. She is never boastful but alludes with some pride and much joy to a work which she was instrumental in accomplishing when about fifteen years old. At that age she was turned to God through the preaching of her father's uncle, Rev. Robert Allen. It was her practice to offer her prayers in the garden, and on such occasions she never forgot her parents, who, at that time, were neither of them professors of religion. On one occasion her father chanced to take a seat by the open window that looked into the garden when Marinda was praying and hearing the prayer he inquired of his wife who it was and was told that it was Marinda. Two or three years later Mr. Allen was converted and turned to the service of God with great earnestness. The effect of the prayer of his daughter, as related by himself years afterwards, is as follows: "When my daughter, Marinda, took us to the Lord in the arms of her faith and told him that our heads would soon be blossoming for the grave and we were without hope and without God in the world, that moment an arrow of conviction struck my heart and it was never removed until removed by the blood of Jesus, two or three years later." Both parents commenced the

earnest service of the Lord about the same time, and that same earnest service never grew less as long as their lamps held out to burn. Her father died aged ninety-five years and it is said that for forty years just previous to his death he never failed for a single day to offer prayer to God.

Her interest in this work has been great and the author is indebted to her influence and the liberality of her purse for the steel plate of himself herein.

She enjoys a good degree of health and retains her faculties remarkably well. No mother ever lived more in the sunlight of the love of her children than she.

One half of his children crossed the river before he died.

The following is a newspaper report of his sad death.

"William Rust, aged eighty years, an esteemed citizen of this town, was found dead in a boat at the mouth of Parker river yesterday afternoon. Saturday morning Rust sailed down Ipswich river after a load of hay and during the forenoon was seen at Lobster Rocks loading his boat. Not returning in the afternoon, his friends became anxious regarding his safety, and later their fears were intensified by the announcement of Joseph Hoyt, who lives at Great Neck, that he had seen an empty boat drifting up Parker river. Searching parties were organized, but Saturday night and Sunday forenoon passed without any result. A number of small boats went almost to Newburyport and after a long search found the lost boat this afternoon about a mile below the old town bridge. When they reached the boat they were horrified to find the dead body of Mr. Rust in the bow. The body was brought to this town and Medical Examiner Tucker viewed the remains and decided that death was caused by heart-disease. Mr. Rust leaves three children, Mrs. John Glover, John Rust, of Boston, and a daughter. He was a Mason and an Odd Fellow, both of which societies will participate in the funeral services."

In 1819 he left the sea at New Orleans, La., and made the entire trip from New Orleans to Randolph county, Ill., in a barge, up the Mississippi river. This consumed about three months. He remained in that vicinity until 1824, when he again tried sea-faring and continued to sail for about two years more, when he returned to Illinois and settled for life, where he married and resided until 1866, when his wife, with whom he had lived happily many years, passed away. She suffered an attack of the palsy and after lingering about six years, she passed over the dark river of death.

Mr. Rust was a good and pure man and enjoyed the confidence of all who knew him. He was elected school treasurer at the organization of his town in 1829 and held that office until he died. Sergeant Abel A. Rust, a true reproduction of his grandfather, Sergeant Abel Rust's manhood and loyalty and his name-sake, gave his life for his country's cause. He belonged to Co. M. 2d N. Y. Artillery from Herkimer Co. Among the thousands who en-

listed at their country's call, none did so with purer motives than he. The love of country triumphed over the strong ties of home and its endearing influences.

Slowly, day by day, the time for his return grew less to his friends at home, until the time had almost arrived, when simultaneously with the news that he was safe came the sad intelligence, "He is dead—killed by a rebel shell."

When came the struggle of a brave and pure soul to free itself from its shattered tenement of clay, the brave soldier remembered the living and sent back his last utterance in a heaven-inspired promise: "Tell them I will meet them in heaven." The sole comrade of the original company saw him fall; saw him off the field; he closed his eyes in death; he bore the last message to his friends; he saw him placed within the narrow walls of his charnel house; and then, as a last act of kindness to the memory of a faded flower, he placed at the head of the grave in the land of strangers, a rude head-board with the sleeping hero's name and the name of his company and regiment cut thereon. He could do no more.

Capt. Phineas B. Rust received but a common school education. In May, 1835, his father, with his family, removed to Brecksville, Ohio. Young Rust, then seventeen years old, went to the village of Richfield, near by, where he set out to acquire a knowledge of carpentering. In the fall of 1837 he emigrated to Bureau Co., Ill. His course was via the Ohio canal to Portsmouth on the Ohio river, thence via the Ohio, Mississippi and Illinois rivers to Hennepin, Ill., where he found employment at his trade and in 1843 he settled on a piece of government land in the township of New Lamoille in Bureau county. Here he married Hannah Frances,* daughter of Peter I. and Frances (Raymond) Dodge. In 1854 he removed from his farm to the then new city of Mendota, Ill., where he purchased and platted an addition known as "Rust's Addition," and he soon became an active business citizen of the place.

At the outbreak of the civil war, 1861, when the first call for three months men was made he was one of the first to respond; he enlisted 19 Apr., raised a company, was made captain of it and May 2, they were mustered into service as Co. B., 12 Reg., Ill. Inf. Vols. He was immediately ordered down opposite St. Louis, Missouri; May 3, took possession of the Ohio & Mariposa R. R. camp at Caseyville, nine miles east, ready to co-operate with Generals Lyon and Blair in suppressing the rebel element in St. Louis, which culminated in the Camp Jackson affair, on which occasion the first blood was shed at St. Louis, and the surrender of the rebel General Frost, which occurred May 10, 1861. Capt. Rust was a faithful and fearless officer and had the confidence and esteem of his men in a marked degree; he also had the approval and high esteem of his colonel, John McArthur, for his bravery and the excellent discipline of his company. Having served faithfully through the time for which he enlisted, in September of the same year he re-enlisted and was assigned to the post of captain of the Color Company—Co. E., 37 Ill., and was highly complimented by his superior officers for bravery in several in-

stances; notably the battles of Pea Ridge and Prairie Grove. After becoming disabled and upon the advice of Surgeon Clark, he was discharged from further duty. Soon after he came out of the service he removed to the new state of Kansas, to recuperate and restore his impaired constitution, and measurably succeeded. He is now and has been, since his removal to that state, residing on his farm in Jackson county. Capt. Rust is engaged a major part of his time aiding soldiers and their dependents to procure pensions. He has been a life-long temperance and anti-slavery advocate and an associate of Hon. Owen Lovejoy. He cast his first presidential vote for James G. Birney in 1840. Capt. Rust was with the Liberty party until it was merged into the Republican party and now he basks in the sunshine of the banner Republican and temperance state of the Union. On one occasion some derogatory remarks were made regarding Capt. Rust in the hearing of one of his old company comrades, when he immediately replied: "Capt. Rust is a good and brave man. I served under him and he treated his men well and he was not afraid of bull, bear or the devil."

Capt. Rust certainly possess a courageous spirit and one of his leading virtues is he has the courage of his convictions. He is also an earnest and devoted adherent to christianity as against all forms of infidelity; he is proud of his ancestry from the old bay state; of his sojourn in Ohio, where rest his parents, sisters and brother Edward; of his pioneer life in Illinois, his manhood home for twenty-five years, engaging there with his noble compatriots in the fight for the freedom of the slave, the chains of which he helped to break, and he claims that "those who would be free must first strike the blow."

He is a prominent G. A. R. comrade and expects that in the near future all the states of the Union will move grandly on toward universal equality and freedom by law from all class legislation, freedom from the monopoly of wealth or other grinding oppression. He looks for the ushering in of the emancipation of mankind from the

thralldom of vice and the power of darkness to the sunlight of American liberty.

He, with his friend, Dr. Howard Crosby, of New York, was one of the originators of the New Brunswick City Mission. In about 1856, he was elected to the common council and has served many years as a director of the New Brunswick Savings Institution. He was one of the original members of the New Jersey Pharmaceutical Association and was its only treasurer for the first nineteen years of its existence. So long as he would consent to serve, no other man was ever thought of for the treasurership, and when he finally and positively declined re-election, resolutions of regret and thanks for his long faithful service were enthusiastically passed and ordered suitably engrossed and presented to Ex-Treasurer Rust. This testimonial, a richly bound and artistically illustrated volume executed by an expert, will be long cherished by his family as an heirloom.

In 1885 he and his wife celebrated their golden wedding. Added to the invitations was a request that no presents be offered. The surviving witnesses of the

original ceremony, only two in number, and nearly all the relatives were present. The following verses were composed for the occasion by Fanny Crosby, the blind poetess, (not a relative) and read by one of the neices :

TO OUR UNCLE AND AUNT ON THEIR GOLDEN WEDDING.

When the roses bloomed the fairest,
 And the skies were blue and bright,

 Fifty years ago, to-night.

In 1854 William Rust visited New Granada to endeavor to induce the natives to abandon the reckless practice of felling rubber trees and to substitute the wiser plan of merely tapping them to get the rubber "milk" as he had seen it done in Brazil a few years before. This proved to be a hopeless task with this improvident people, who urged that every tree tapped by one native would be cut down for the remaining rubber by the next. Rubber "milk" quickly coagulates and none had ever been brought away in liquid form until Mr. Rust did it by the addition of concentrated ammonia. Several museums have since asked for and received specimens of it from him. It has, at present, no commercial value.

William and Louisa Rust are blessed with children and grand-children, nearly all of whom live sufficiently near to make frequent visits to the Rust homestead in New Brunswick.

Mr. Rust conceived the idea of compiling the genealogy of the Rust family, commencing his work on it in 1849, just nine years prior to the author's first correspondence on the subject. Mr. Rust did most of the work on his genealogy in 1849-50. The work embraced only descendants of Rev. Henry Rust, first minister at Stratham, N. Wheeler & Potter, wholesale druggists of that city. In 1859, on account of failing health, he spent a few months traveling in Europe. In April, 1860, he removed to New York City and engaged with Messrs. Demas Barnes & Co., in the drug business.

He was in Charleston, S. C., during the bombardment and surrender of Fort Sumpter, and witnessed the first blow of the great civil war of 1861-5.

In July, 1862, he formed the co-partnership of Carter, Rust & Co., wholesale druggists, 43 and 45, Hanover street, Boston. Hon. William Maxwell Rust attended school in his native town until 1832, when his father removed to Belmont, Me. Here he attended school, went to Belfast academy and fitted for college at Monmouth academy. For several years he taught school with success. Early in the '40's he engaged in trade at Washington with Dr. R. E. Ryder. He read law with Gen. George W. Bachelder, a prominent lawyer and military man of Gardiner. Mr. Rust was admitted to the bar in Lincoln County in 1845 and first practiced at Washington, where he continued in practice for several years. In 1852 he removed to Belfast, where he remained the rest of his life. When he first settled in Belfast he opened a law office but soon drifted into politics.

Politically, Mr. Rust came of good democratic stock, his father being an influential member of that party. He continued to act with that party until 1854, which dates the birth of the republican party. Mr. Rust, being opposed to the extension of slavery into the territories, found himself with the new party, not then known as the republican party. The "Progressive Age" was established as a campaign paper, July 1, 1854, in the interests of the new party. Mr. Rust was one of the writers. In October, 1854 this new paper became a fixed reality with Mr. Rust as its editor. In 1857 he became the sole owner and so remained until his death. Mr.

Rust was, from the first, one of the leading men in the republican party, both with his pen and upon the stump. He was a member of the Republican State Committee for two or three years, and was at one time president of the state convention of the party. In 1878, he, believing that the republican party had fulfilled its mission and he being radically opposed to the views of that party on the currency question, came out boldly for the Greenback party. The same year he was prominently named as a candidate of that party for governor, but at the convention he withdrew before the nomination was made. The same year he came within a very few votes of receiving the nomination for Congress. In 1879 he was candidate for mayor of Belfast on the democratic and greenback tickets. In 1884 he was one of the early advocates of the nomination of Governor Cleveland for president. He was one of the delegates to the Chicago convention and one of its vice-presidents. In 1888 he was elected one of the alternates at large to the national convention at St. Louis. He was a delegate to the democratic state convention at Augusta, Maine, the same year. In 1868 and 1869 Mr. Rust was a member of the Legislature. In 1880 he was elected senator from his county. In 1867 he was a member of the board of directors of the Belfast and Moosehead Lake Railroad Company. As in all other bodies of which he was a member he took an active part on the board

Mr. Rust's home life was always exceedingly pleasant. He was a kind, loving husband and an affectionate, indulgent father.

The following notice was issued by the mayor of the city, on the occasion of Mr. Rust's death :

"The burial of our esteemed fellow-citizen, Wm. M. Rust, editor of the 'Progressive Age,' takes place Tuesday, June 19. As a public expression of our regard for the deceased, I respectfully request that all places of business may be closed on Tuesday afternoon from two to three o'clock.

"Hon. James R. Tabor, of Unity, who served in the

senate of 1883, with Mr. Rust, writes as follows, in speaking of our late editor's death :

"I feel that I have truly lost a friend, kind-hearted and true, one whom I held in the highest esteem. To his family I tender my heart-felt sympathy."—*Progressive Age*.

The result of an honest effort to convert an honest man is illustrated by the following facts :

When Mr. Rust was a republican and published a republican paper, a Mr. Simpson, a strong democrat, edited at the same time a democratic paper in Belfast. Each was intensely partizan and exceedingly hostile to the other. As time rolled on and the political temperature was high they began to box the compass for political tenets continuing at the same time their antagonistic attitude toward each other and so continued until each landed square in the other's political shoes, each paper retaining its old name and each strongly maintaining the political principles previously advocated by the other.

father's family, removed to Belmont, Waldo county, same state. He first engaged in merchandising in Massachusetts; but not being satisfied with the business, he returned to Maine, where he remained until the California gold excitement broke out, when he procured a stock of goods and a house all framed ready to go together, and started by water for California, arriving in San Francisco Bay March 15, 1850, having been five months on the voyage. After arriving in California he disposed of his goods and tried several kinds of business but without satisfying an ambitious and progressive spirit. He soon went to Placerville, where he purchased a drove of cattle with which he went to Eel River valley, which he reached in the fall of 1852 and here he made his winter camp upon the identical spot where now stands the brick building so long occupied by him at the village of Ferndale. The next spring he went to Sacramento and bought another drove of cattle, returned to Humboldt county and opened a meat market at Eureka. After a short time he closed out his business there, and for three years he was in search for gold. After this he went to Oregon, purchased a drove of cattle, returned with them to Bear River, and followed stock raising until 1859, when he again opened a market at Eureka, which was continued by him without interruption until his death.

In 1870 he built a sawmill on Indian Island and from that time he was largely interested in the manufacture of redwood lumber. He established and was principle owner of the Russ Lumber and Mill Company, of San Diego, Cal. The Russ school of that city was named for him. He was a large stock owner in the "Excelsior" mill; was sole proprietor of the Russ market; had a large interest in and was one of the directors of the Humboldt County Bank; the latter enterprises were in Humboldt county. He was greatly interested in the development of his state and county and held many prominent positions in both; was member of the state legislature; was returned to the state legislature in 1871, and subsequently re-elected at different times, and was a member of the house of representatives, state legislature, at the time of his death.

Hon. Joseph Russ possessed a remarkable degree of business sagacity, which developed at an early age and increased with his years. His uncommon business foresight and ability, with his integrity and private worth, naturally inspired confidence and gave him many friends, thus fixing the basis for the accumulation of the large fortune he left at his death; and in the accumulation and possession of this large estate he was never unmindful of the laboring class. His interest in and for them may be summed up in his own words in his speech delivered on the occasion of the completion of the Excelsior mill in Feb., 1882: "After working hard all day I want a good room and a good bed to sleep in and I want every man that works for me to have just as good a room and just as good a bed to sleep in as I have myself. I try always to measure such things as I would have them measured out to me." He acted upon his convictions in this respect and had large comfortable buildings erected for the laborers. He was a zealous supporter of religion, virtue and education and to every cause which had for its object the elevation of society. He was a man of strict honesty and integrity; gave careful attention to the affairs of life, which earned for him that position among men which brought him honor and admiration. He was a devoted and affectionate father and husband and was always happiest when mingling with his family.

James B. Russ, his younger brother and Mr. J. G. Graham, a brother-in-law of James' father, together with several others, started, on May 15, 1875, with a large herd of cattle to drive them to Indian Creek in another part of the county. On the way, while crossing Eel river, which was unusually high, James, in an attempt to get the cattle over, was drowned. He had crossed the river once or twice on his horse, which finally gave out, leaving the brave and energetic young man in the water just deep enough to permit him to wade; from some misstep or other accident

he suddenly lost his footing and went down; but soon appearing, every effort was made to save him; again he sank, this time to rise no more alive. Although a dilligent and continued search was made, his body was not recovered until the next day.

What a sudden and sunless cloud of gloom was thus cast over the doting parents and that entire household. The hopes and bright anticipations of a fond father's heart were now blasted forever in the loss of a noble and promising son. Filled with grief, the heart-broken mother thus suddenly plunged into the depths of sorrow for the loss of her brave and manly boy—the eldest child—finds no present consolation under this black cloud. The brothers and sisters see, with sorrowing hearts, the vacant chair and the absence of that courteous protector and devoted brother opens anew with every recurring thought, the wounds left by that sad, sad occurrence.

James Russ had just graduated from the McClure military school at Oakland with unusual honors, and had, through his happy disposition and manly bearing, ingratiated himself into the good wishes of all who knew him. He was a devoted son and brother and was known throughout the county as a type of true and noble manhood. The funeral services were conducted at his parents' residence, by Rev. A. Hitchcock and it is said that the assembly was the largest of the kind ever witnessed in Humbolt county.

Gen. Rust remained with his father until he was nineteen years old assisting in carrying on a large farm and store and was educated at the common schools and academy. He was interested in the ship-building business for several years until 1851, when he was appointed sheriff of Waldo county, which office he held for several years. In 1852 he was appointed coroner by the governor of that state, which office he held almost continuously as long as he lived. He held other positions of trust. In 1855 he moved to Rockport, the family's present residence. Here he engaged in farming, merchandising and ice shipping. In 1857 he was appointed aide-de-camp on the staff of Gov. Lot M. Morrill with rank of Colonel, which post he held until 1860. In 1861 he raised a company and was first to enroll his name as private. At the organization of his regiment he was chosen captain of Co. H., 8th Me. Reg., at the capitol of the state. This regiment at once entered the service and moved to South Carolina under Gen. Sherman. He rose rapidly to the positions of

Lieutenant-Colonel, Colonel and Brigadier-General. He was in command in many important engagements, including the seige of Fort Pulaski, Georgia, where the Eighth Maine bore a conspicuous part, and at the surrender their colors were hoisted over the fort in honor of their meritorious conduct during the seige. Gen. Rust was in the army three years, serving in the Department of the South, Florida, Georgia and Virginia, with ability and credit. During the time of his service in the war he had presented to him by his old command, a colonel's uniform complete, including a very elegant gold mounted sword and spurs, and a very elaborate horse equipage which cost upwards of \$500, in token of their high esteem for their old commander. At the close of the war he returned home and took up his former pursuits of harvesting and shipping ice and lumber and mercantile business in which he was engaged up to the time of his death.

Henry Rust resided in Norway with his father until he enlisted in 1861. After the war he returned to Haverhill and married. He engaged in business and resided there until just before the close of his life on earth. He died at the Maine General Hospital at Portland, just ten days after he was taken ill. He was buried in the family tomb in Norway.

Gen. Henry Rust, who is called "the last of the Rust family of Norway," made a good record in the civil war of 1861-5; he went into the war as Orderly-Sergeant, Co. G., 1st Me. Reg., in Apr., 1861; in May following was promoted to 1st Lieutenant; the next Oct. was promoted to Captain in the 10th Me. Reg. While at Baltimore he was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of the 13th Reg., which arrived at Ship Island, 1862. In May following he was promoted to Colonel and made commandant of the port. In Jan., 1864 he commanded the 2d Brigade, 1st Division, 13th Army Corps, and was brevetted Brigadier-General. He was in the Red River campaign as well as the Shanandoah. He was appointed Provost-Marshal and president of the board of enroll-

ment of the 2d Congressional District of Louisiana. He was mustered out of service Jan., 1865. In July, 1866 he removed to Haverhill where he became one of the incorporators and was superintendent of the Haverhill Hat Factory.

June 1, following, at the battle of Cold Harbor, Va., he was wounded and lay on the field of battle one night and two days; was then taken to the field hospital of the enemy where the minnie ball that had passed through both hips and back and lodged in the right side was taken out by a rebel surgeon; he was then taken to Richmond, Va., and put in prison hospital, a branch of Libby prison, where he was held for three months, then exchanged and sent to Annapolis, Md., to the parole camp. Mr. Albert D. Rust is a man of rather peculiar traits of character. "Ne tentes aut perlice" has been the maxim of his business life and all his undertakings have been marked by a great degree of thoroughness and perseverance. In all public affairs he maintains his

Benjamin Perkins Warner's father, Josiah, was drafted in the war of 1812, but being the sole support of his aged parents besides his own family, he hired a substitute by the name of Benjamin Perkins. Their next male child was named for him, hence the name Benjamin Perkins Warner.

convictions, though they might differ with all others, and for this reason he preferred to remain out of public life as much as possible.

Mr. Rust's education was very limited, never having attended school after the winter he was sixteen years old, but he always had a craving for knowledge and after his school days were past he acquired a good knowledge of the common and some of the higher branches. Soon after his marriage he taught several terms in the public schools of Michigan, with pleasing success and satisfaction both to himself and his patrons. After forty years of age he gave considerable attention to the study of geology and Paleontology and now owns one of the largest and finest general collections in the state of Texas, gathered from all parts of the world. It was on exhibition for the first time at the Texas State Fair at Dallas, in 1886, where he took five premiums and one diploma.

At the age of fourteen his father placed him in the care of Dr. Wm. H. Rodgers, a traveling lecturer and practicing physician, with whom he travelled through Michigan, Indiana and Ohio, spending considerable time at Nashville, Tennessee, and Franklin College near that city. While at Nashville he performed a remarkably difficult and very dangerous feat for one so young. The suspension bridge across the Cumberland river was in course of construction, the large cables, four over each tower, spanned the river, and he crossed over the river on the bare cables, distance between towers 640 feet, and 110 feet above low water mark, crossing on his hands and knees; he was the first person to cross the river by the cables. He returned to his home in Ohio, 14 Nov., 1850, much benefitted physically. The day after his arrival all the living members of the family met at his father's house and were re-united for the first time afterwards in Dallas, Texas, on Christmas day, 1887.

His father's family moved from Ohio to Michigan in 1851, where Mr. Rust followed farming with his father two years, after which he apprenticed himself to the carpenter's trade under Mr. Benjamin P. Warner, his future father-in-law. After following house building a few

years he made some few ventures in other lines ; but his chosen life work has been journalism.

After his marriage he located a piece of government land in Salem, Allegan county, Michigan, where he carved out with his own hands, a pleasant little home for his young family. Here he walked three miles and taught the district school, for which he received twenty dollars per month, boarding himself.

He sold his home in Salem after his father's death in 1861, and removed to Winfield, Montcalm county, that he might be near his widowed mother and have an oversight of her affairs, she being left with no sons at home old enough to manage for her.

In 1865 he removed to St. Louis, Gratiot county, Michigan, where in April, 1868, he established the "Michigan State Advance." Some account of his work for Michigan through this paper may be found in the "Red Book of Michigan," 1871, by Charles Lanman, pp. 128, 135 and 521. The "Advance" and "Saginaw Courier" were consolidated in 1870 and the new paper was now called the "Michigan Courier and Advance," of which Mr. Rust had editorial management until August 1, 1871, when he, in company with others, organized a colony which located in Adams county, Nebraska, he being one of the organizers of that county. During his three years sojourn in that state he bought and sold school bonds, took contracts for building school houses and dealt in school, church and office furniture.

In 1874 he removed to Ellis county, Texas, and the following year closed a contract to publish the "Ellis County News." This step was a more venturesome one than the crossing of the river at Nashville, not to life or limb, but to honor and reputation. At the time of taking the contract neither himself or children, who were to assist him, knew anything of the mechanical part of the newspaper business, and in one month from that time he must assume control of the whole business of a country newspaper office, which included the printing of both sides of a seven column folio paper and doing the job work. None but a practical printer can comprehend the difficulties and discouragements of such a venture ; but

through hard toil and patient perseverance it was accomplished, and this volume will witness by its typography and arrangement that Mr. Rust has been neither dull or idle in his chosen profession.

In October, 1879, in company with W. R. Lotz, now his son-in-law, he established the first paper issued in Callahan county, Texas, at Belle Plain, then the county seat. His two elder daughters joined him in this enterprise, volunteering to accompany him to this frontier town, 175 miles beyond railroad communication. They were each good compositors as well as efficient house-keepers. Mr. Rust sold his interest in this plant to his son-in-law, Mr. Lotz, and being importuned by his Ennis friends to return and establish another paper at that place, he purchased the "Fort Worth Daily Journal," and Nov. 11, 1880 issued the first number of the "Ennis Commercial Recorder," a seven column folio. In April, 1882, he established the "Giddings Plaindealer" at Giddings, Lee county, Texas, leaving his eldest son in charge of his Ennis paper. After the political campaign of 1882, the entire outfit of the "Plaindealer" was removed, without missing an issue, 175 miles, over two lines of railroad to McGregor, McLennan county, Texas, the first number being issued Nov. 11, 1882, and was the first paper published in that place. In January following everything pertaining to the office was destroyed by fire with no insurance. The publication was resumed on February 10, as a seven, instead of a six column sheet, with entirely new material and office building. The first of October, 1887, he removed the "Plaindealer" to the city of Waco, not missing an issue by the move. Here, during the first year in Waco, the "Plaindealer" absorbed the "Dawson Sentinel," of Dawson, Texas, the "Commercial Recorder," of Ennis, and the "Star and Crescent," of Waco, and was enlarged to an eight page six column sheet. On December 7, 1889, Mr. Rust sold the paper and business to Mr. J. K. Street, and since then has devoted his entire time to the compilation and publication of the Rust Genealogy.

Mr. Rust has held the office of town clerk and ex-officio school inspector in the townships of Salem and Win-

field, Michigan; also justice of the peace in Winfield; was twice appointed notary public for St. Louis, Michigan, and elected school director for the same place. In Nebraska he was appointed county superintendent of the poor and elected justice of the peace; was also elected school director of his district; was prominently before the Democratic senatorial convention for the 12th District of Nebraska in 1872, as a candidate for state senator and, although defeated, received a very respectable vote. He received the appointment of census enumerator for the tenth United States census, for Callahan county, Texas. Was elected president of the board of directors of the McGregor high school in 1883. He bore the title of Colonel, but it was not bestowed as a military honor and for years he protested against it.

He witnessed the inauguration of Grover Cleveland in 1885; visited Mount Vernon and looked upon the sarcophagus containing the remains of the "father of our country," and twice ascended to the top of the Washington monument. He also visited the birth-place of all his children the same year. He was a delegate from Texas to the first National Editorial Convention held in the United States, in February, 1886, at Cincinnati, Ohio.

The year 1889 was perhaps the most prolific of pleasure of any of his life. In April he attended the State Press Association, of which he had been a member for eight years, which met at El Paso, Texas. With other members he visited the quaint old City of Mexico, and witnessed its grand army review on Cinco de Mayo, its veritable bull fights and many other interesting scenes. On June 10, following he started on a pilgrimage to the land of his fathers, the main object of which was to collect data for the Rust Genealogy. He made a thorough search of all the records of Boston, Hingham, Ipswich, Gloucester, Essex, Hamilton, Newburyport, Marblehead, Salem, Peabody, Charlestown and other places in Massachusetts and gleaned much from the great libraries of New England. He also visited the birth place of every one of his American born ancestors in the Rust line, also his native town and the house where he was born.

Mr. Rust is a democrat after the Jeffersonian type.

In religion, while he is not a member of any denomination, he is a most thorough believer in the principles enunciated by Jesus Christ and believes that the Bible student should not read that sacred volume unless he can free himself from the dangerous traditions of his forefathers forced upon them during the dark ages and which most of the so-called Christians still hold to through prejudice. He is a well posted Bible student and feels sure that a correct understanding of the Bible can be obtained only through accepting it in its most natural and simple signification.

Mrs. Julia A. (Warner) Rust, the author's wife, has occupied an important position in the compilation and publication of the Rust Genealogy. Without her careful and able assistance it could never have been as full and correct as it is, The author's eyes having failed him through constant use in this work, her's have served the purpose in much of the labor. The manuscript for the printer, over one thousand pages, has all been prepared by her pen. This will be bound in two volumes and preserved in the family as an heir-loom. She has carefully read all the MS. twice before it was given to the printer and twice after it was put in print. She has spent many months in careful, patient copying and comparing and has shown very great interest in the work from its incipiency and has sacrificed no little that the work might be as correct and complete as possible. Her sense of honor is very great, having inherited that quality from both her parents. Her life is wrapped up in her companion and children. She has lived as a consistent Christian and labors to have her children emulate her life. Her love of home and quiet domestic life is very great and no occasion is lost by her to render her husband and family happy. She is worthy of more credit as a mother, wife and neighbor than can be given her in this volume.

Capt. Elbridge Gerry Rust was deprived of what might be termed a liberal education but received abundant instruction in the principles of honesty, sobriety and industry. At an early day he manifested great desire for knowledge. An opportunity presenting itself, at fourteen years of age he apprenticed himself to the printer's trade in the "Statesman" office, Marshall, Mich., serving four years, after which he worked in most of the larger cities of the country and on many of the leading journals of the United States. At the outbreak of the civil war he was "holding cases" on the "New York Times." Desiring to aid his country in her struggle, he crossed the river into New Jersey and aided Captain Hughes in raising a company for the 21st Regiment New Jersey Volunteer Infantry, which was hastened to the front and placed in 2d Division, 6th (Sedgwick's) Corps, Col. G. Van Houten commanding. When the company was fully organized, Mr. Rust was elected third or commissary sergeant of Company K. The term of enlistment was for nine months. In this capacity he served his country faithfully and well. He was in numerous hard fought battles, chief among which was that of Fredericksburg, Dec. 12-16, 1862, under Gen. George B. McClellan, and Chancellorsville, May 2-4, 1863, under Gen. Joe. Hooker. In this battle, his captain, Edgar A. Finney, being severely stunned by a cannon ball which mowed its way through Co. K., killing several men, Sergeant Rust, the then ranking officer, was placed in command of the company, and while leading his men in the thickest of the fight in that memorable battle, was severely wounded in the right hip and taken off the field. This occurred about 4 P. M., on Monday, May 4, 1863. On the day previous when the 6th Corps charged Maryes

Heights, and the Confederate cannon on the Heights loaded with grape and cannister mowed down the charging column like grass, he exhibited his native bravery and heroism by seizing and carrying to the top of the hill the regimental colors after several color sergeants had been shot down, for which act he was promoted on the field to the position of Orderly-Sergeant.

After his recovery from his wounds he returned to Michigan and in April, 1866 married Miss Rose. In 1870-1, Capt. Rust compiled and published the History and Directory of Calhoun County, Michigan, a volume of about 500 pages. With his family he removed to Chicago immediately after the great fire of 1871, established himself in business there where he remained until the panic of 1873, when he returned to Michigan, settling at Battle Creek.

In March, 1875, Capt. Rust removed to Texas and in July following settled permanently at Dallas. Jan. 8, 1882, he established the "Sunday Mercury," a weekly paper in that city. In September, 1883, changed the name to "Dallas Mercury." In April, 1887, he was prominent in the organization of the Southern Mercury Publishing Company and again changed the name of his paper to the "Southern Mercury," now one of the most influential papers of the entire South. He soon sold the entire plant, good will and all, to the company. In July following, in company with Richard Flood, he established the "Real Estate and Immigration Journal," which he sold within one year and engaged in the real estate business.

In 1867 he was employed as clerk in the state treasurer's office to adjust that official's accounts, which he found to be \$85,000 short, but which deficit was made up by making proper entries in correction of errors. The state treasurer then resigned and Mr. Rust was elected to the office by the general assembly without an effort on his part, two ballots having been cast before he was aware that he was a candidate. Russ, at the age of twelve years, went away from home to live; he worked on a farm in the summer season and went to school in the winter; entered Thetford academy and fitted for college, teaching school in the winter for a livelihood. His intention was to enter Norwich University, a military college at Norwich, Vt., but after the death of Gen. Ransom, the president of the college, the idea of a profession was abandoned and the study of the mechanic arts engaged his attention.

After his marriage he settled in Woodstock, Vt., and took a position as superintendent of a sash, door and blind factory, where he remained two years, when, finding that town too small for his ambitious spirit, he removed to Worcester, Massachusetts, where he remained twenty-five years. He was in Dennis & Lee's wood-working establishment in Worcester for eight years as superintendent and draughtsman; in 1863 he formed a co-partnership with Lorin Eddy under the firm name of Russ & Eddy, for the manufacture of builder's finish and mouldings, picture frames, mirrors, etc. This was at one time the largest establishment of the kind in the country. In 1873 they were burned out and the company dissolved. Mr. Russ then started the Worcester Moulding Company, and after running that a few years, sold out and organized the Russ Moulding Company, of Boston, for the manufacture of interior decorations, mirrors, curtain-poles, etc. This institution took the highest prizes for its goods. He continued in this business five years, then closed up and removed to Chicago to engage in the trade of architecture.

Mr. Russ is quite an inventor, having obtained several valuable patents. Among those of the most value were

Mr. Elam Rust, being a mere infant when his father died, and his mother soon re-marrying, he was adopted into the family of his aunt Rebecca Colburn, where he remained until he was of proper age to choose his own guardian when he selected one of the neighbors, Deacon Short. He received, under his care, such educational advantages as the town academy afforded. Subsequently he removed to Canton, N. Y. and engaged himself as a teacher. Here he attracted the favorable notice of Hon. Silas Wright, the eminent statesman and politician, then in the zenith of his career, who took Mr. Rust into his office and instructed him in the study of the law. Here he married Miss Foote, a member of one of the then leading families of the county. While his partner, Silas Wright, was governor of the state of New York, he

spent one season in Albany, during a session of the legislature connecting himself with the "Argus," the leading newspaper of that city. Here he acquired a passion for journalism which he never lost and which appears to have been inherited by his sons. Accordingly when in 1840, he removed to the west, locating in Bellville, Ill., he united journalism with the practice of his profession as a lawyer. He afterwards removed to Waterloo, Monroe county, Ill., where he was similarly employed and was publishing a paper at the outbreak of the Mexican war. At the close of the struggle he was publishing a paper and practicing law at Alton, Ill. A "trade" in newspaper properties led to another change in location, this time to Greenville, Ill. The construction of railroads in the state appeared to leave this place temporarily at one side and he removed to Decatur, Ill., where law and journalism again divided his attention. He died at this place 7 Mar., 1857, leaving a widow and four surviving children.

Mr. Elam Rust was reputed one of the best lawyers in his part of the state, but the districts in which he lived did not originate, in that early day, such litigation as would enable him or any other lawyer to achieve special distinction outside of the mere locality in which he lived. He never manifested any great desire for political preferment, but his name was often mentioned in connection with prominent offices, and one year he lacked only a few votes of receiving, unasked, the democratic nomination for secretary of state and at the time of his death was the state attorney for the district in which he resided, embracing eight or nine counties. The widow resides in Denver, Colorado.

In a letter to the author the widow, Mrs. Mary P. F. Rust, wrote: "It is not often that a lady of my age—nearly seventy-two—is left, after raising a family, with no children, no brother or sister, no one nearer than my grandchildren and neices; but I try in God's strength to bear my loneliness as well as maybe. * * * I am of a cheerful disposition, always looking for the brightest side; I found it pretty hard to bear, though, when I lost

Maj. Henry A. Rust's father died in 1834, leaving a daughter, five years and Henry, not yet two years old.

His boyhood and youth were passed in the clear and loving atmosphere of this early smitten household, whose head was a woman of large intellect and quiet dignity; one who, having lost a noble object of a noble love, thenceforward lived enveloped in its ever-present precious memory, so that, while grandly true to loving home duty and the broader social duties, still, of her it might be said that though "living in this world, she was not of it." Under this home care and influence, and the instructions of the public schools of Springfield, was passed the childhood and youth of Henry until he was fifteen years old, when he was sent to Suffield, Connecticut, where, at the Connecticut Literary institution, he completed his studies preparatory to entering upon a business career.

Upon leaving school, he assumed a clerkship in a mercantile establishment in Springfield, continuing in the same business until he attained his majority, when the narrow limits of opportunity in New England and the wider field for effort and enterprise in the west combined to fix his determination to "go west etc." And his clerkship engagement expiring one evening at eight o'clock, the next morning at eight o'clock he started upon the westward journey, which, ending March 2, 1854, brought him to the cherished goal of his eager hopes—Chicago.

Shortly after his arrival he secured employment in the office of Messrs. Stone & Boomer, railroad bridge builders, and thus entered upon the business which was to constitute his "life occupation," for, since 1854, his business life has been devoted to public work in the departments of railroads, their organization and construction and railroad bridge building.

In 1855 he went to Davenport, Iowa, to engage in the construction of the Rock Island bridge across the Mississippi river, the first bridge ever built across that mighty stream, and upon its completion in April, 1856, he was upon the locomotive that first crossed the structure, which was the avant courier of the immense trans-Mississippi railway traffic.

Mr. Rust has been connected with the building of very many of the other existing railroad bridges that cross the Mississippi, Missouri, Arkansas and other principal rivers of the country, including the Hudson river bridge at Poughkeepsie. His manufacturing works have been at Chicago, where also has been his principal office, with branch offices in New York and Houston, Texas.

At the outbreak of the civil war he resigned a railroad secretaryship and August 12, 1861, entered his country's service as Adjutant 27th Ill. Inf., participating in the many battles and sieges of the historic campaigns of the armies of the Mississippi and the Cumberland; operating in the states of Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi and Georgia; notably, Belmont, Island No. 10, Corinth, Stone River, Chicamauga, Rocky Face Ridge, Kenesaw Mountain, Atlanta, etc. After the battle of Belmont, November 8, 1861, through the written special order of General Grant, he was presented with a horse, which he rode throughout the war, it being one of three horses which he captured from the rebel forces at the battle and sent wounded men upon to the rear.

At the siege of Island No. 10, he was Assistant Adjutant-General of the land forces co-operating with Commodore Foote and from their headquarters after personal interview with Commodore Foote and General Buford, he was made the bearer of dispatches to Maj.-Gen. John Pope, commander of the army of the Mississippi, who, with his large army was then encamped about three miles in rear of and occupying New Madrid, Mo. At ten o'clock on the evening of March 19, 1862, disguised as a civilian countryman and in company with a genuine native, familiar with that territory, he embarked in a skiff, and by a tortuous course crossed the peninsula and finally emerging upon the broad Mississippi, some three

miles above New Madrid, at about one o'clock in the morning. After escaping the sentry's fire a landing was effected in the thick darkness. Capt. Mower, post commandant immediately sent an escort with Adjutant Rust to General Pope's headquarters where they arrived at two o'clock in the morning. A personal interview with General Pope was had at once, resulting in a meeting of Pope's general officers the next forenoon for the purpose of hearing Adjutant Rust's account of his trip, and considering the matter of a junction of the forces above Island No. 10, with the New Madrid army, the opening up of the Mississippi river and the dislodgement of the enemy then occupying Island No. 10, as also the eastern shore of the river. The assembled generals present were: Pope, Stanley, Paine, Hamilton, Palmer and several others. During the conference and while Adjutant Rust was explaining the route by which he came across the peninsula, Gen. Schuyler Hamilton jumped up and with a prefatory and vigorous expletive, said: "I believe we can get boats through that way," to which Adjutant Rust responded with emphatic assent. The following night Adjutant Rust returned with dispatches from General Pope to Commodore Foote and General Buford, which dispatches gave information of the adoption of the plan to make a channel through the timber, across the peninsula, (cutting off trees several feet below the surface of the water where necessary)—in general, conformable to the aforesaid route. This enterprise was promptly undertaken and successfully executed resulting in the evacuation of Island No. 10 and the capture of many prisoners and munitions of war.

At Rocky Face Ridge, Major Rust, while in command of the advance line was wounded in the head. After the battle of Chickamauga, by special order of General Grant, he was detailed for service in the engineering department upon bridge construction, fortifications etc., thereafter cheerfully rendering service of that character. During the Atlanta campaign from Chattanooga to Atlanta, Maj. Rust had charge of the construction of field work and fortifications, aggregating more than thirty miles in length.

Adjutant Rust was successively promoted Captain and Major of his regiment, and with it was "mustered out" after more than three years' service.

Returning to Chicago after the termination of his army life, he married Sarah De Forest, and immediately proceeded to Nashville, Tenn., where he had his office during the following year, being engaged in the execution of heavy contracts entered into with the government, for the re-building of railroad bridges upon the various lines in Tennessee, Alabama and Georgia, destroyed during the war.

Since 1866, Mr. Rust's residence has been continuously in Chicago and his business interests centered there.

The sacredly patriotic regard in which Mr. Rust holds his army associations causes him to affiliate with his old-time comrades in the army organizations of the Grand Army of the Republic, Society of the Army of the Cumberland and the military order, Loyal Legion United States.

Mr. Rust is a member of several Masonic organizations, also of representative philanthropic, religious and other organizations of his city, not the least amongst which is that of member of the board of trustees of "The University of Chicago," which has received an endowment fund of \$1,600,000 from that wealthy philanthropist, John D. Rockefeller.

Mr. Rust's education was received in the public schools of his county and Amherst academy; but like many others of his time he was obliged to turn from his studies and take up the sterner duties of life, and at an early age began his business career in the Collinsville, Ct., axe works with which his father was associated in the years of 1840-6. For two years he continued in this business, then, ambitious and desirous of completing what he deemed an insufficient education he began the study of medicine. During this period he undertook the drug business and for nearly a decade conducted the village drug store, there acquiring a knowledge of the theory and practice of medicine that was of eminent value in after years.

The confining character of his position warned him of departing health and for two years he devoted himself to active farm life at South Deerfield, Massachusetts. He then became associated with business firms in New York City and East Hampton, and for eighteen years traveled in their interests.

At the breaking out of the war in 1861, Mr. Rust offered his services to the government and joined the medical corps in the field before Antietam, serving with Surgeon Warner of the 16th Connecticut Regiment. He was ordered by General Burnside to superintend the transportation of wounded men from the field to their homes, a delicate and responsible position. Upon his return he saw active service at City Point and in the memorable days before Petersburg. At these points he was acting assistant surgeon, and with a corps of competent assistants did much to alleviate the sufferings of the wounded, and was in a position to see many of the horrors of modern warfare. At the close of the war Mr. Rust settled in Chicago, and for many years conducted the Central ware-house.

While successful as a business man and generalizer, he is best known in two entirely different fields, philanthropy and science. The first was an inheritance and a labor of love; the second the result of innate powers of observation and a desire for that knowledge which enables one to bestow the most good upon the greatest number. His views of philanthropy were early received from his father, Nelson Rust, who was one of the earliest and leading abolitionists, and who lost no opportunity to impress upon his son the principles that are now recognized as embodying the true rights of mankind. On his death-bed he uttered the following prophetic words: "My son, I am about to die. I had hoped to live to see the end of slavery, but I shall not; I hope you may, but I fear you will see this country bathed in a bloody war." Not only by precept but by example was the young man moulded to perpetuate his father's work. The homestead was a station on the famous "underground railroad," and he was constantly meeting the leading anti-slavery workers, and early counted John Brown and his sons among his friends, and in ensuing years leading up to the war of the rebellion, was always an active partizan in the cause.

After the war, and during his residence in Chicago, the exodus into Kansas began. The sufferings of this unfortunate people at once enlisted his sympathy, and he was for many months a worker in and the honored secre-

tary of the Chicago Relief Association. From this question his interest was transferred to the Indian tribes under the charge of the government and he is an active member of an association for their protection and preservation. That his interest in John Brown and his work has not flagged is shown by the fact that at the present writing he is a plaintiff in a case to protect the sons and daughters of the hero of Harper's Ferry from certain designing persons.

While engaged in business in Massachusetts and Connecticut he began the study and collection of objects representing the pre-historic races of the United States, which in time resulted in an extremely valuable collection giving him a very important national reputation as an archæologist. His researches among the mounds of Missouri and other localities have been particularly successful, and he was among the first to suggest the theory of the origin of these people held by scientists to-day. While living in Chicago, Mr. Rust made an extensive exploring trip to Mexico and enriched his cabinet with some valuable finds. On other occasions he visited the Pueblos of New Mexico, the cliff-dwellers of Arizona, and all the localities of interest, the results of which and many explorations in Southern California, are to be seen in his famous collection at Pasadena. Mr. Rust is a member of several scientific societies including the American Association for the Advancement of Science and vice-president of the Pasadena Academy of Sciences. In 1881 he removed to Pasadena, California, and began the culture of oranges. He is identified with the notable progress of this locality, especially the advancement of its people. He was early president of the Pasadena Literary Association. In 1889 he was appointed Indian agent for Southern California, and the appointment was a surprise to him as it came unsought and unexpected. Probably his fitness for the position had become known to the department during his travels in antiquarian fields. Since

Mr. Rust's appointment he has become much interested in the establishment of a manual training school for the Indians of the Pacific Slope. In 1890 he secured a gift to the government of eighty acres of land for this purpose. The land is at Perris, San Diego Co., California. Gen. T. J. Morgan, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, visited the site and approved the selection and Mr. Rust was ordered to prepare a plan for a building to cost \$12,000 to start with.

Dr. Rust was a self-made man, being thrown upon his own resources at twelve years of age; at this tender age he commenced laying the foundation for the rich legacy of an unstained name which he leaves for his descendants to look back upon.

“And, when the stream
Which overflowed the soul was passed away,
A consciousness remained that it had left,
Deposited upon the silent shore,
Of memory, images and precious thoughts
That shall not die and cannot be destroyed.”

He was a good man, a true and consistent doctor, an affectionate and just companion and father. His life had been one of remarkably good health until weakened by exposure resulting in pneumonia about nine years before he died; but an undue exposure resulting in a second attack of pneumonia carried him away in the short space of six days. During his boyhood George W. Rust acquired a knowledge of the printer's art in the offices owned by his father, and in these and common district schools, which never rose to the dignity of passing pupils clear through the arithmetic or grammar, he acquired his education. In the fall of 1856 his father associated him with himself in the publication of a newspaper at Decatur, Ill., and almost immediately turned over to him the entire management. His father died in the spring of 1857, leaving him at nineteen with this business and a mother and four brothers and sisters on his hands. The printing material proved not to have been paid for and had to be given up, and with barely money enough to reach Omaha, Nebraska, he removed to that place, working as a printer and doing editorial work when opportunity offered. At the outbreak of the war he was the editor but not proprietor of the first daily newspaper ever regularly published in the state of Nebraska. Seeking a better field, he removed to Chicago in 1862, and secured a connection with the Chicago "Times," and was assigned to duty as police-court reporter. Shortly afterward a railroad department was organized on the paper and he was placed in charge and made it quite a feature of the great daily. He was from time to time promoted by regular gradation to the positions of law editor and army correspondent, then a general outside editorial writer, in which position all sorts of special work was assigned him.

Later on he was promoted to financial and commercial editor, the most responsible position on the staff of a great metropolitan newspaper. He thus made the round from the bottom to the top of the ladder. While in this position his attention was attracted to the loose method in which the grain trade was conducted, and he drew the "Eastman warehouse law," and by dint of persistent advocacy in the "Times" and equally persistent personal solicitation among members of the legislature, he procured its passage. After eight years' service on the "Times," he resigned in 1870, and started a Sunday paper on his own account. But the time had not yet arrived in that city for an independent publication of this character, and after a brief career it was abandoned. Then he founded the "National Live Stock Journal," which marked the beginning of successful live-stock journalism in the United States. He gave close attention to every business detail and made such close study of matters within the scope of the paper as to himself become an authority on pedigrees and many other matters connected with the breeding and management of improved stock, and in a few years the paper became the recognized authority on such matters in the United States, and was productive of a handsome income. About the time the publication of the "Journal" was undertaken, Mr. Rust invented a system of moveable stereotype blocks to be used by newspapers in place of the "patent insides," and at the time of the great fire had fitted up a printing office and stereotype foundry to engage in their manufacture; the fire, however, so crippled his resources that this purpose could not be carried out. The idea was taken up by others and is the basis upon which several large business establishments have been built. Owing to Mr. Rust's declining health the "Journal" was sold out in 1876, and he removed to Boulder, Colorado. Here he gave his attention to the concentration and reduction of the precious ores and incidentally to mining, mineralogy, metallurgy etc., but it did not pay and being offered a position on the staff as mining editor by the "New York Daily Graphic," and being assured that most of his work could be done in Colorado, he resolved to return to journalism.

He made the "Graphic" the best daily mining paper in New York, and his descriptions of mines and processes were regarded by mining men as among the most accurate and interesting which appeared in the American press. This position he surrendered on account of inability to longer travel to the mining camps and make personal inspection of the mines. He settled down on a small farm adjoining the city of Boulder and gave himself up to the study of horticulture in connection with which he soon became widely known. But he soon returned to journalism: this time on the editorial staff of the "Breeder's Gazette," of Chicago. He was engaged by the United States Department of Agriculture to examine certain questions connected with the live stock interests, requiring special knowledge and skill. He never displayed much desire for political preferment, though an active party worker, but served as trustee of the Colorado Agricultural College and in 1884 was the candidate of his party on the state ticket for regent of the Colorado State University.

For several years before his death he had been driven from one vocation to another and from one locality to another by constant decline of health until his useful life was ended. The following is an extract from a notice of his death in the "Rocky Mountain News," Denver, Colorado:

AN ANCIENT WARRANT.

Deacon D. F. Secomb, Librarian of the Fowler Library, of Concord, N. H., has found among some old documents recently purchased, an old warrant that intimates that the high officials in that state—subjects of King George II.—were not as highly respected as might have been over 150 years ago. The instrument is here reproduced from the Boston *Globe* of June 7, 1891:

or Deputy, greeting:

Information being given to His Hon'r the Lt. Govr. and the Honble board, that Benj'n Rust, of Portsm^o, in y^e Province aforesi^d, Innholder, did on or abt y^e 16th instant, Jany, at y^e house of Thomas Harvey in Portsm^o, and at sundry other times and Places in a most scandalous, vile and malicious manner, misu^e y^e name and character of the s^d Lt. Gov. and Council as such by publickly declaring them to be *curs'd dam'd rogues, & that they had not done him, y^e s^d Rust, justice—that they had no power—that they were no more a court than y^e Devil—that he would pull them down—that he would head a compy to tare them to pieces—dam^d their legislative power—and s^d they would go to hell—and all this with a mixture of the most impious & profane language, &c.*

There are, therefore, in his majtes name, pursuant to an order of his Honor the Lt. Govr. and council, to require you forthwith to apprehend y^e body of y^e s^d Benj'n Rust if he may be found within y^e Precinct, and him bring before the Hon'ble the Council board to be examin^d in the
