the said tenth day of October the Commissioners met at the time and place appointed and proceeded to view the premises, and having viewed the same the further consideration thereof was deferred till the next regular meeting of the Commissioners held at Northampton aforesaid on the Tuesday after the second Monday of June then next at which meeting the parties were heard, and after the hearing said Commissioners proceeded to consider and adjudicate upon the prayer of said petition; and after considering the same said Commissioners did adjudge that common convenience and necessity required that a highway be laid from the intersection of Main and North Main Streets in said South Hadley Falls to the intersection of High and Canal Streets; and after adjudicating as aforesaid, Commissioners appointed Tuesday the twentieth day of July then next, and nine o'clock in the forenoon on the premises named in said petition in said South Hadley Falls as the time and place when and where they would meet and proceed to locate and order said new highway; and the said Commissioners having given notice of the adjudication and the time and place appointed for said meeting in the same manner as the notice and publication was given and made, and as is by law in such case made and provided, before proceeding to view (except publishing an abstract of said petition instead of a copy thereof), on the said twentieth day of July 1909 met and proceeded to locate and order said new highway.

The following is a description of the Northerly side of the road.
Beginning at a stake on the Easterly side of North Main Street at a point 8.3 feet Northerly of a round stone marking the intersection of the Northerly line

Working of the road

The detail of the working and surfacing of the road is left in the hands of the Board of Selectmen of the town of South Hadley but it is directed that in all cuts whether rock or otherwise the excavation shall be the full width of the location and for the roadway, to the above specified grades for a width of not less than 25 feet. The grade for the sidewalks shall be established by the said Board of Selectmen

In all fills the top of the fill shall extend the full width of the location at the sidewalk grade

A retaining wall is required from the Northeastly (front) corner of the before mentioned boarding house to the Northerly side of the ell part (dining room) of the same. By agreement with the Hadley Mills Co. owners of the said boarding house, the face of this wall shall be the face of the Northerly brick wall of the main part of the said boarding house except in front of the doors and windows in the said Northerly wall where the face of the said retaining wall shall be one foot Northerly from the said brick face. This is to extend to the Southerly wall of the ell (dining room) which is to be removed

Across the said ell, the Southerly face of the said retaining wall is to be 1'6" Southerly of the Northerly brick face above referred to and to be parallel to the same. The retaining wall is to be built at least as high as the before mentioned grade for the center line of the road and may not be over one foot higher for the sidewalk grade designated by the said Board of Selectmen.

A retaining wall shall be built if required by.

Recommendations

As the proposed grade of this location at its intersection with Carew Street will be about seven feet below the present grade of the said Carew Street, it is recommended that the said Carew Street be graded on an 8% ascending grade Northerly from the Northerly side of this location for a distance of 80 feet and further Northerly at a 3 1/2% grade

until the proposed grade coincides with the present grade. It is further recommended that Carew Street from the southerly side of this location be ascending at a 7% grade for a distance of 80 feet and further at a 4 1/2% grade until the proposed grade coincides with the present grade. The proposed grade for this location being lower at its intersection with High Street than the present grade, it is recommended that the grade in High Street be ascending at 4% grade northerly until the proposed grade coincides with the present grade.

The Carew Paper Company having been so public spirited as to have signified their willingness to donate a part of the site of their brick store-house at the corner of High and Canal Streets for highway purposes, it is recommended that the northerly line of this location be continued in a straight line westerly until it intersects the northeasterly line of Canal Street and that the grade immediately easterly of High Street be continued until it intersects the present grade of Canal Street.
