Selectmen of Pelham, Petition to establish the highway bounds at the intersection of Harkness and Amherst Roads.

To The County Commissioners of Hampshire County,

Whereas the Town of Pelham at its annual meeting in February voted a sum of money for improvements on the highways at the intersection of Harkness and Amherst roads, and as these improvements necessitate more or less land damage, we the selectmen in and for the Town of Pelham respectfully request the County Commissioners to view the premises and establish the highway bounds.

The foregoing petition was filed on the eleventh day of June, 1929. The Commissioners, deeming a view of the premises expedient, appointed Monday, the fifteenth day of July then next and two o'clock in the afternoon, at the premises in Pelham as the time and place for viewing the premises; and caused a copy of said petition to be served upon the clerk of the town of Pelham being the town within which such establishment of highway bounds is prayed for, thirty days at least before the time appointed for said view; and also caused abstracts of said petition, containing the substance thereof, to be posted in two public places in said town; and also gave notice to all persons interested by causing a copy of said petition to be published three weeks successively in the Daily Hampshire Gazette a newspaper published in said County, said posting and the last publication of said copy having been fourteen days at least before the time appointed for said view; and before said view was had, said Commissioners gave notice in like manner as described in the foregoing notice of the petition, to all persons interested, of the time and place for commencing said view.

And on the said fifteenth day of July, the Commissioners met at the time and place appointed, and proceeded to view the premises, and having viewed the same the Commissioners then determined to hear the parties at the same time of said view; and having heard the parties, said Commissioners then proceeded to consider and adjudicate upon the prayer of said petition and after considering the same, said Commissioners did then and there adjourn said hearing without day.

On the sixth day of August, 1929, it was voted by the County Commissioners to appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars to the Town of Pelham for the purpose of improving the entrance to Harkness Road and for establishing the highway bounds of both Harkness Road and Amherst Road.

On the third day of September, then next, the Commissioners met at the Court House at ten o'clock in the forenoon and did then and there adjudge that common convenience and necessity require that the highway bounds at the intersection of Harkness and Amherst Roads be established and did order that said bounds be established in accordance with plan on file and the following description:

The following is a description of the proposed relocation of a part of the Amherst Road, in Pelham, and also a part of the Harkness road leading southerly from the said Amherst Road.

thence S.65°18'W. 303.1 feet; thence S.18°40'E. crossing the Amherst Road, 49.57 feet to the place of beginning.

Set the upstream line of planking two or three feet nearer to the existing masonry and set the two side lines of planking (those parallel to the channel of the stream) about two or three feet nearer together; the object of these changes in location of the piling being to have the top of the plank imbedded in the concrete part of the dam.

Notify me when you are ready to drive or set your piling and again when you are about to begin pouring concrete.

The law requires that it shall be prepared in such a manner as to give the taxpayers a full and clear understanding of affairs of the County and of the objects and methods of the County expenditures, and along most lines directs the method of preparation.

PROCEEDINGS AND EXPENDITURES

Except as otherwise stated in this report, all expenditures have been for the usual and necessary running expenses of the County, viz: Maintaining the Courts, Salaries of County Officers, Care of County Buildings, County Hospital, Support of Prisoners and Maintaining the Jail and House of Correction, Clerical Assistance in County Offices, Fuel, Lights and Water, Highways and Bridges, Law Library and Annual Installment on cost of State Highways, for specific details thereof, reference may be had to the report of the County Treasurer, to which this is annexed.

HALL OF RECORDS AND COURT HOUSE

The increased details connected with all departments of the County have been so great that for a good number of years the Commissioners and other people that have had business in the Courthouse have realized that as



a matter of necessity more room for County business needed to be provided.

In 1929 the Commissioners bought the Harlow property for a Hall of Records. In the Spring of 1930 the contract was awarded to J. A. Sullivan & Sons, Inc., and other sub-contractors for the erection of a building which is well under way.

The Commissioners are well pleased with the progress that is being made on the construction of the new building. We feel that it will be adequate to care for all the additional needs of the County for years to come.

It will be recalled that the grades of Gothic and Court Streets were considerably lowered to improve the general surroundings and the westerly side of the Courthouse was made much more useful by lowering the windows. The improvement now makes it possible to enlarge the offices and court room facilities on the first floor where the District Court is now located.

HAMPSHIRE COUNTY SANATORIUM

As Chairman of the Trustees of Hampshire County Sanatorium I have tried to assist in bringing about many changes and improvements during the year 1930. Dr. O'Brien, the nurses and all of the employees have been very patient and faithful to their positions.

Very many improvements have been made. We have a very complete and up-to-date 100-bed hospital; a larger water supply has been provided; also a stock room, new electric equipment and larger heating capacity has been supplied. In addition we now have 30 new private rooms.

Our greatest improvement and benefit was in getting a gas supply for all of the buildings at the Sanatorium. The Northampton Gas and Electric Light Company was very obliging and helpful in bringing this about.

Under present contracts Hampden County pays 40%; Franklin, 25%; Berkshire, 20% and Hampshire County 15% of all new construction and new equipment.

We feel very sure that many have been greatly benefited while at the institution. All connected with the Sanatorium are very much interested in its welfare and do their best to make everyone comfortable.

PROCEEDINGS AND EXPENDITURES

Except as otherwise stated in this report, all expenditures have been for the usual and necessary running expenses of the County, viz: Maintaining the Courts, Salaries of County Officers, Care of County Buildings, County Hospital, Support of Prisoners and Maintaining the Jail and House of Correction, Clerical Assistance in County Offices, Fuel, Lights and Water, Highways and Bridges, Law Library and Annual Installment on cost of State Highways. #### HALL OF RECORDS

The new Hall of Records, a two-story brick and marble structure of Georgian architecture which has been erected in the rear of the Court House on Court Street, was completed and ready for occupancy in October, 1931. Putnam & Stuart of Northampton were the architects and D. A. Sullivan & Sons, Inc. of Northampton the contractor. This was done by the County Commissioners in pursuance of the Legislative authorization contained in Chapter 230 of the Acts of 1928.

The Registry of Deeds, Registry of Probate, Probate Court room and a private office for the Judge of Probate are located on the main floor. The Hampshire County Extension Service occupies the rooms on the Gothic Street side of the basement. The rooms on the second floor are now vacant but one will eventually be occupied by the law library which is at present in the Court House, and the remaining space is left for future needs of the County as they may arise.

#### HAMPSHIRE COUNTY SANATORIUM

As Chairman of the Trustees of Hampshire County Sanatorium I have tried to assist in bringing about many improvements during 1931. A very complete nurses' home was erected which will accommodate twenty nurses. It is a separate building and complete in every respect. Also an examination room has been equipped with all modern appliances and conveniences necessary for an efficient examination of the patients.

Under present contracts Hampden County pays 40%; Franklin County 25%; Berkshire County, 20% and Hampshire County 15% of all new construction and new equipment expense as well as administration costs.

We feel confident that many have benefited while at the Sanatorium. All connected with this institution are very much interested in its welfare and do their best to make everyone comfortable. Doctor O'Brien, the nurses and all of the employees have been very patient and faithful to their positions.

Report of the County Commissioners for the Year 1933.

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1933.

The County Commissioners, in compliance with the requirements of Chapter 35, Section 26 of the General Laws, submit the following report:

The law requires that it shall be prepared in such a manner as to give the taxpayers a full and clear understanding of affairs of the County and of the objects and methods of the County expenditures, and along most lines directs the method of preparation.

PROCEEDINGS AND EXPENDITURES

Except as otherwise stated in this report, all expenditures have been for the usual and necessary running expenses of the County, viz: Maintaining the Courts, Salaries of County Officers, Care of County Buildings, County Hospital, Support of Prisoners and Maintaining the Jail and House of Correction, Clerical Assistance in County offices, Fuel, Lights and Water, Highways and Bridges, Law Library and Annual Installment on cost of State Highways. For specific details thereof, reference may be had to the report of the County Treasurer to which this is annexed.

REPAIRS

During 1933 the prisoners at the Hampshire County Jail painted the chapel, cellar and cell blocks; put in a new curbing in front of the Jail and a retaining wall at the rear. Civil Works Administration funds were used in laying two new floors--one in the guard room and one in the kitchen.

The roof on the Court House was repaired by John E. Fisher of Northampton at a cost of \$527.33 which was on a per diem basis.

CAMP HODGKINS

For the past seven years a special effort has been made to do something for the boys and girls of Hampshire County who seemed to require some special care and treatment to find any weakness that might be corrected; to help them on the way to strong manhood and womanhood; to keep them as free from disease as possible. This is the work that is being carried on at Camp Hodgkins by the Hampshire County Public Health Association and we have ample proof that much good has been done.

HAMPSHIRE COUNTY SANATORIUM

The County Commissioners have good reason to be pleased with the continued improvements at the Hampshire County Sanatorium and its gradual growth in all lines of work; also the equipment which has put the hospital in a position to do better work with the patients who are placed there for treatment.

We now have an up-to-date institution for the treatment of tuberculosis patients with a per capita cost among the lowest in the State and with a 100-bed capacity.

#### HIGHWAYS

During 1933 the following petitions were received:

No. 1041 - Selectmen of Amherst, Petition for the layout, relocation and alteration of Pine Street and the East Leverett Road. Work on this road was finished on November 22, 1933. The State contributed \$12,000; the town of Amherst, \$8,000 and the County, \$4000.

No. 1047 - Selectmen of Williamsburg, Petition for the layout, relocation and alteration of South Main Street for the new bridge. The State contributed \$16,000; the town of Williamsburg, \$2500 and the County, \$1500. Work was closed down December 29, 1933. Land Damage in the sum of fifty dollars was awarded to Frank L. Taylor; twenty-five dollars to Harry W. Sanderson and fifteen dollars to Walter Smith.

No. 1052 - Selectmen of Plainfield et als., Petition for the layout relocation and alteration of the Main Road. The State contributed \$10,000; the town of Plainfield, \$1300 and the County, \$1300. Work was closed down December 5, 1933.

No. 1053 - Selectmen of Southampton, Petition for the layout, relocation and alteration of the Holyoke Road or East Street and Strong Road for a new bridge. The State contributed \$8000; the town of Southampton, \$4000 and the County, \$4000. Work was closed down December 6, 1933.

No. 1069 - Martha Gere Combs et als., Petition for specific repairs or alterations of a highway extending from Clapp Street in Southampton to the premises of Martha Gere Combs situated in that section of Northampton known as Pynchon Meadow. On December 22, 1933, it was decreed by the County Commissioners that the way in question is a public way and that common convenience and necessity require that it be made safe for public travel and that the roadway be worked to a travelled width of fifteen feet; the center of the worked part of the highway to follow approximately the center line of the road now in use and that it be so built as to allow for proper drainage.

No. 1063 - Katharine Frazier and Playhouse-in-the-Hills, Incorporated, Petition for the discontinuance of a portion of a county highway in Cummington. This petition is pending.

No. 1073 - Celia Mayotte et als., Petition for the layout of a highway in Williamsburg. This petition is pending.

During 1933 the following petitions were also acted upon:

No. 726 - M. H. Buzzee et als., Petition for the relocation of South Street in Easthampton. On October 3, 1933 this petition was dismissed at petitioners' request.

No. 267 - On the petition of A. G. Cone and two others to make the following Public Ways Private Ways under the provisions of Chapter 289 of the Acts of 1924, namely: Road running southerly from residence of A. Lawton to residence of Frank Maynard near the Chesterfield Road; Road known as Unkuomonk Hill Road from residence of J. Stabb, running westerly and northerly to Dolan Road; Road running South from Chesterfield Road, near residence of Frank Maynard to the Dolan Road; Road leading from Nash Hill Road in a northerly and westerly direction to Highridge. On December 5, 1933, it was voted by the County Commissioners that so much of the foregoing petition as was not granted by the decree of June 2, 1925 be dismissed without prejudice.

DAMS

On March 19, 1929, the Trustees for Frank Newhall Look Memorial Park Property petitioned for permission to construct three dams on Mill River. After several hearings it was voted on September 26, 1933 by the County Commissioners to dismiss the aforesaid petition.

The Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Northampton requested the County Commissioners to have their engineer make an investigation of the dam at the Mountain Street Reservoir. Engineer Eugene E. Davis of Northampton and Engineer James L. Tighe of Holyoke investigated and filed a report with the County Commissioners.

During 1933 Engineer Eugene E. Davis also examined the dam at the Florence Ice Pond, off Spring Street, Florence and the Goshen Lower Reservoir dam and recommended specific repairs, in accordance with the provisions of Section 45 of Chapter 253 of the General Laws.

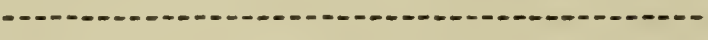

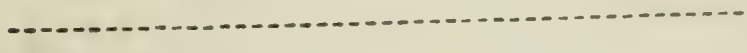

The County Commissioners, in compliance with the requirements of Chapter 35, Section 26 of the General Laws, (Ter. Ed.) submit the following report:

The law requires that it shall be prepared in such a manner as to give the taxpayers a full and clear understanding of affairs of the County and of the objects and methods of the County expenditures, and along most lines directs the method of preparation.

PROCEEDINGS AND EXPENDITURES

Except as otherwise stated in this report, all expenditures have been for the usual and necessary running expenses of the County, viz: Maintaining the Courts, Salaries of County Officers, Care of County Buildings, County Hospital, Support of Prisoners and Maintaining the Jail and House of Correction, Clerical Assistance in County offices, Fuel, Lights and Water, Highways and Bridges, Law Library and Annual Installment on cost of State Highways. For specific details thereof, reference may be had to the report of the County Treasurer to which this is annexed.

EXPENDITURE OF COUNTY FUNDS UNDER THE PROVISIONS  
OF SECTION 33 OF CHAPTER 35 OF THE  
GENERAL LAWS

On the 20th day of September, 1934, the Sheriff of the County issued a precept calling out the militia for duty in the strike area in that part of Easthampton known as Hampton Mills Village. This call was issued by the Sheriff upon urgent request of the Selectmen of the Town of Easthampton because of disorders which it was represented to the Sheriff had occurred in said area where a strike had been called by the employees of the Hampton Company and had been in progress since about September 14, 1934.

A bill for services for members of Company G. 104th Infantry, who answered this call was rendered to us on October 30, 1934 in the amount of \$890.85. It being incumbent upon the County to pay this bill by virtue of the provisions of section 32 of chapter 33 of the General Laws and there being unexpended funds available under the provisions of section 33 of chapter 35 of the General Laws, there seemed to us to be no reasonable alternative but to pay this bill which was done on November 8, 1934.

#### HAMPSHIRE COUNTY SANATORIUM

The County Commissioners and the Board of Visitors, appointed by the Governor, have followed the Hampshire County Sanatorium very closely and the new form of treating tuberculosis which was brought about after careful study by the Federal Government, State and County. As a result of using modern methods, a very large improvement has been shown.

At a recent meeting of the county commissioners of Hampden, Berkshire, Franklin and Hampshire Counties, general satisfaction was expressed as to the efficiency of the sanatorium. Reports were read, and at that time the following percentages of the cost were recommended to be paid by each county effective January 1, 1935:

Franklin County	17%

Doctor O'Brien and Doctor McKeough are devoting very careful attention to all the patients at the sanatorium and doing all that is possible for their comfort and improvement.

For the past eight years a special effort has been made to do something for the boys and girls of Hampshire County who seem to require some special care and treatment. These boys and girls have been taken from every town in the county. They are selected after careful examination by nurses at the clinics and when their X-ray pictures show a condition which requires attention. We have ample proof that many children have received a lasting benefit at Camp Hodgkins.

A filter bed 40 x 50 and excavated to a depth of four feet was built at the Hampshire County Sanatorium. Hampshire County paid \$193.97 for cement, trap rock, sewer pipes and Chapman Sheer Gates on this project. Six men were employed. C.W.A. paid \$227.50 for sand.

Twenty five acres of brushland was thinned out and the brush burned. Six men were employed. C.W.A. paid \$10 for axes.

The following buildings were painted: Administration, Barn, Men's Ward, Women's Ward, Doctor's House, Garage, Kitchen, Laundry, Convalescent Home and Nurses' Home. Six painters were employed. Hampshire County paid for paint in the sum of \$526.48 and C.W.A. and E.R.A. paid \$207.00 for paint.

The amount paid for labor on this project by C.W.A. and E.R.A. was \$5269.00.

Project 2278

A gravel road used for mail and trucking purposes from Haydenville to the sanatorium was graded and filled. Seventeen hundred feet of road was built 33 feet wide with a stone base. Twelve men were employed. C.W.A. and E.R.A. paid \$2022.50 for labor and \$377.50 for materials. Hampshire County paid \$72.36 for teams and culverts.

Project 3395

A 950-foot guard rail was erected along the roadway at the Hampshire County Sanatorium. The old fence was removed and 117 posts erected for the new one. Hampshire County paid \$297.10 for concrete guard rail posts, galvanized hook bolts, cable and end fittings.

A hatchway was put under the large building to be used for storage. About 60 feet of roadway, eight feet wide, was excavated at an average depth of six feet. A cement wall was removed and garage doors installed. This project gave employment to twelve men. C.W.A. and E.R.A. paid

seventy dollars for doors and cement blocks and \$689.00 for labor.

The following rooms in the Court House were painted: the four rooms leading from the Superior Court room, the Upper Hall, Clerk of Courts' office, Main Corridor, Court Room #2 and the adjacent corridor. When E.R.A. county projects were discontinued it seemed necessary to complete the painting which had been started. Hampshire County paid \$1434.16 for labor and materials and C.W.A. and E.R.A. paid \$1358 for labor. Thirteen men were employed.

Project 6507-3

New plumbing fixtures were installed in the men's toilet room in the basement of the Court House. The old hot water boiler and water heater were removed and the present system was connected with the one in the Hall of Records building across the street. The old partition was removed and a new one erected. All pipes were enclosed; sewer pipes relocated and brass pipes replaced the old ones. As this project could not be left in an unfinished condition, the work was completed by Hampshire County when all E.R.A. county projects shut down. The county contributed \$2595.29 for labor and materials and C.W.A. and E.R.A. paid \$757.60 for labor.

HOUSE OF CORRECTION

Major Albert G. Beckmann, high sheriff of Hampshire County, reports that the county has been saved a substantial amount during the past year by a vegetable-growing project carried on at the House of Correction. This plan has been in operation two or three years, but during 1934 was by far the most successful to date.

The county owns more than three acres of land in the fertile meadows near the Connecticut River, and from twelve to fifteen inmates of the House of Correction were busy all summer, cultivating a variety of crops under the supervision of Eugene W. Brennan, an officer of the institution. The men chosen for the work were those regarded as most trustworthy and no abuses of their privileges were reported.

Produce from the "farm" not only supplied the prisoners with fresh food throughout the season, but provided a large surplus which has been stored or canned under the direction of Harry W. Miller, an officer at the jail. Vegetables stored at the House of Correction as a result of the project included, at the close of the 1934 season:

- 311 bushels potatoes
- 100 bushels beets
- 95 bushels carrots
- 75 bushels turnips
- 25 bushels parsnips
- 14 bushels shell beans

In addition, 398 gallons of string beans, 532 gallons of tomatoes and 1800 dill pickles were preserved, while a ton of cabbage was made into four large barrels of sauerkraut.

Fresh vegetables from the farm that were served to the prisoners during the season included sweet corn, swiss chard, radishes, tomatoes, peas and spinach.

The men engaged on the farm project were enthusiastic about the outdoor life it gave them and were all in excellent physical condition as a result of the experience.

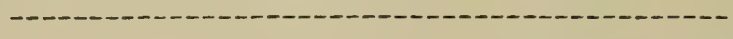

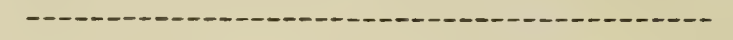

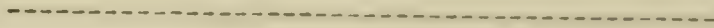

And on the said ninth day of July the Commissioners met at the time and place appointed and proceeded to view the premises, and having viewed the same the Commissioners then determined to hear the parties at the same time of said view; and having heard the parties, this hearing was thence continued.

On the twenty-eighth day of August, 1935, the County Commissioners met and proceeded to consider and adjudicate upon the prayer of said petition; and after considering the same, said Commissioners did then and

there adjudge that common convenience and necessity require that said layout be made and did order that said layout be made in accordance with plan filed August 26, 1935 and the following description:

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The layout consists of a cutoff or new location for Bay Road, so-called, and begins at the junction of Bay Road with Hockanum Road, so-called, extending thence about one-fifth of a mile in a northwesterly direction as hereinafter described, to a point about 600 feet distant northwesterly of the old bridge over Fort River.

The base line is that of a survey made by the engineers of the Massachusetts Department of Public Works in July 1935 and begins at a point on the base line of the 1931 County layout on Hockanum Road shown on plan of said layout as Station 200+16.97; thence leaving said base line of the 1931 layout and extending north 4° 41' 15" east 18.87 feet; thence by a curve to the left of 499.91 feet radius 323.27 feet; thence north 32° 21' 45" west 387.57 feet; thence by a curve to the left of 599.90 feet radius 347.18 feet; to a point at the end of the layout in the present roadway of Bay Road about 600 feet distant northwesterly of the old bridge of Fort River, as aforesaid, said point of ending being shown on plan as Station 210+93.86.

The southwesterly location line begins at a point on the westerly location line of the 1931 County layout on Hockanum Road, bearing north 55° 46' 39" west and 40.35 feet distant from Station 200+35.84 of the above described base line and extends thence, leaving said 1931 location line, but tangent thereto, northerly and northwesterly by a curve of 457.56 feet radius 281.62 feet to a point bearing south 57° 38' 15" west and 33.00 feet distant from Station 203+59.11; thence north 32° 21' 45" west 380.85 feet to a point bearing south 46° 07' 51" west and 33.68 feet distant from Station 207+46.68; thence by a curve to the left of 577.18 feet radius 334.03 feet to a point at the end of the layout, on the southwesterly location line of the present County layout on Bay Road, as approximately located, said point of ending bearing south 24° 28' 45" west and being 35.00 feet distant from the point of ending of the above described base line shown on plan as Station 210+93.86.

The northeasterly location line begins at a point on the southwesterly location line of the present County layout on Bay Road, as approximately located, said point bearing south 76° 07' 16" east and being 47.71 feet distant from Station 203+59.11 of the above described base line and extends thence, leaving said location line, north 32° 21' 45" west 486.13

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feet to a point again on the aforesaid southwesterly location line of the present County layout on Bay Road, said point bearing north 51° 51' 15" east and 36.24 feet distant from Station 208+07.23 of the above described base line.

For the purpose of laying out, relocating and altering said Bay Road across Fort River, the County Commissioners, acting for said County of Hampshire, by virtue of the power and authority conferred upon them by Chapter 82 of the General Laws and of any and every other power and authority them hereto in any wise enabling, having complied with all the preliminary requirements prescribed by law, do hereby take in fee simple in the name and in behalf of the County of Hampshire, the land hereinafter referred to and rights in land and all easements, privileges and appurtenances thereto belonging, being several parcels of land situate in the Town of Hadley, County of Hampshire, including all trees located thereon, said parcels of land being shown on a blueprint on the plan hereinbefore referred to, entitled: "The Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Plan of road in the Town of Hadley, Hampshire County, Laid out by the County Commissioners. Scale: 40 feet to the inch"; said blueprint plan to be filed with a copy of this order of taking which is to be recorded in the Registry of Deeds of Hampshire County at Northampton.

For damages sustained by persons in their property by reason of the aforesaid takings the following awards (to be paid by Hampshire County) are made:
