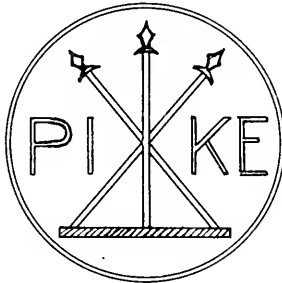

FOURTEENTH REUNION OF THE PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA

The Pike Family held it's last regular meeting on June 28, 1941 in Boston, Massachusetts.

Due to the war years and the passing away of Mrs. Lillian Pike Packard the then Secretary, the Association was in a period of inactiveness, until Rev. R. Vernon Pike of Greenfield, Iowa, a Vice-President felt that it was necessary to preserve our heritages and proceeded to schedule a meeting in the mid-west.

During the Fall of 1955 the following notice was sent to all members of the Pike Family Association to their last known addresses and to many Pike descendants known to be interested.

Dear Cousin:

Since the Colorado Springs Chamber of Commerce are planning a year long celebration of the sesquicentennial of the discovery of Pikes Peak by Zebulon Montgomery Pike during 1956, we also are planning for a reunion of all of the descendants and relatives of General Pike there also. While the Historical Society will major on special events from time to time, we hope that the Pike families will make the first two weeks of July their major celebration.

We are assured that the Post Master General of Washington, D. C. is giving consideration to a request made by the "Historical Society for the Pikes Peak Region" for a special stamp recognizing the sesquicentennial observance of the discovery of Pikes Peak by Zebulon Montgomery Pike in 1806. We are also informed that there is a very large number of such requests on file at this time and that there are only 12-15 such stamps issued annually.

The Historical Society says that the hope of our securing the special stamp rests upon the wide spread interest in its publication outside of Col.

I am addressing this letter to you to emphasize the value, as I see it, of this sesquicentennial observance. While it is true, that General Pike's claim to fame is more realistically concerned with his life as a soldier than as an explorer, it is equally true that his influence upon American life is perpetuated in a more definite way by keeping that influence alive by the recognition of the monument erected to him by the hand of the Infinite and named as a natural by the American people.

Since the first settlement of the Pike forebears on the shores of New England in 1635, those who bear the name have borne "aloft the principles of Freedom and Democracy" and have sought to "keep their honor untarnished and to be always ready to die for their country".

The thrilling feature of this story is that a young foot soldier with this noble ideal before him walked into immortality with no other fanfare except his loyalty and obedience to his superiors. What appeal for a special stamp equals this effort to bring this impulse of loyalty to young Americans.

ACTIVITIES OF THE PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA
Colorado Springs, Colorado - July, 1956

The State of Colorado celebrated in 1956 a year long Sesquicentennial of the Discovery of Pikes Peak.

In observance with the Sesquicentennial activities, the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA made plans to hold a National Pike Family reunion during July 1-15 in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Much credit and appreciation is due Rev. R. Vernon Pike of Greenfield, Iowa, who spent over a year and a half in planning the activities of this official meet. The Sesquicentennial Committee in Colorado Springs gave much assistance. Invitations were sent to known Pike members and their relatives throughout the United States.

We were sorry that our President, Dr. Maurice M. Pike of Hartford, Connecticut, and Miss M. Elizabeth Kilburn of West Newton, Massachusetts, could not attend.

Because a large number of Pike members were present during the first week of July and couldn't stay until July 13, a meeting was held at the Chamber of Commerce room on July 3, 1956 at 10:00 A. M. Rev. R. Vernon Pike acting as Chairman welcomed the Pike members from the various states and a period of getting acquainted followed.

The following committee was appointed to nominate a slate of officers for the forthcoming meeting of the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA to be held July 13, 1956.

Proxies were signed by Pike members who could not remain until the July 13 meeting.

An informal listing of desired motions to be presented at the July 13 national meeting were discussed and formulated. These included: raise in dues - request for coat of arms in a form suitable to frame or used on stationery, buttons, or pins - issuing of membership cards - Salisbury Memorial Fund in honor of Major Robert Pike - regular meeting dates and location of the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA - publication of 1956 records and that an effort be made to catalogue or secure historical objects or papers of importance to the Pike family.

Kenney Englert, President of the Historical Society of the Pikes Peak Region, presented a schedule of events to be held in Colorado Springs and to which members of the Pike family were invited as special guests.

Everette Conover, President of Kiwanis, was present to make specific plans for participation in July 4 "Parade of Champion" celebration. Schedule of events included:

Fireworks followed which included historic scenes.

- July 5 - Pike Family guests at SKY-SOX ball game in Memorial Park.
- July 6 - Junior Chamber of Commerce chuck wagon dinner. Pike Family and board members of Historical Society.
- July 8 - Dedication of memorial placque in Williams Canon presented by Mrs. Rose Mansfield Pike - Rev. R. Vernon Pike represented Pike family.
- July 12 - Pike Family guests of honor at meeting of Historical Society of Pikes Peak Region held at Ghost Town - Pioneer Museum of which Dorothy Smith is curator - held special and interesting exhibits for the Pike Family.

Rev. R. Vernon Pike of Greenfield, Iowa and Zebulon Montgomery Pike, Jr. of Lakewood, Colorado represented the Pike Family in many activities held before and after these dates as at dedication of Zebulon M. Pike School - Range Riders Breakfast - Zebulon Pike marker dedication by Historical Society on highway 115 - and Radio Week.

This preliminary meeting was adjourned at 12:00 to the Swiss Chalet where dinner reservations had been made for the entire Pike Family.

SESQUICENTENNIAL YEAR REUNION OF PIKE FAMILY ASSOC. OF AMERICA
Friday, July 13, 1956 - Colorado Springs, Colorado

The regular biennial meeting was called to order by acting Chairman, Rev. R. Vernon Pike of Greenfield, Iowa. Several minutes were spent in introductions, before business was transacted.

Zebulon Montgomery Pike, Sr. of Golden, Colorado, was selected as Chairman and Mrs. Luella Pike Mason of Portland, Oregon, as Secretary pro-tem. This was because of the absence of our president, Dr. Maurice M. Pike, Hartford, Connecticut and our secretary, M. Elizabeth Kilburn, West Newton, Massachusetts.

Rev. R. Vernon Pike gave a report of his findings concerning the Pike National Association to bring members up to date.

Members of the nominating committee which had been appointed at the preliminary meeting July 3, 1956,

Chairman Zebulon Montgomery Pike, Sr. asked for nominations from the floor or for any comments on the report. It was moved and seconded that the secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for these officers collectively. Motion carried.

Motion made and seconded that the proxies of members who were here at the July 3 meeting be accepted. Motion carried.

The report of the nominating committee for the Board of Directors or Policy Committee was presented:

The president pro-tem asked for additional names. Mrs. Rose Mansfield Pike was nominated. The report was accepted unanimously.

The chair then presented the gavel to the new president, Zebulon Montgomery Pike, Jr. of Lakewood, Colorado.

Our new president then brought in recommendations from the meeting of members on July 3, 1956.

1. RECOMMENDATION: That the Salisbury Memorial Fund in honor of Major Robert Pike which is now held by the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA be turned over to the Salisbury Library Association to establish a memorial room in the name of Major Robert Pike. This is to be in the new library to be erected in Salisbury, Massachusetts.

It was further suggested that some early family history might be kept in the Salisbury Memorial room and balance of Pike historical matter be placed in Masonic Temple, Washington, D.C. and made available for research.

Motion made, seconded and passed with authority given to Board of Directors and executive officers to act on the above.

Secretary note: Reference: 1941 - 1948 Record page 8 - Association voted money turned over "when the foundation of the building has been put in".

2. RECOMMENDATION: That the regular meeting of the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA be held on even numbered years in different geographical locations in response to invitations from Pike Family groups.

Motion made, seconded and passed.

Discussion of group present suggested also that meetings of the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION meet alternately on odd numbered years at Colorado Springs for officers and policy committee members for acquaintance fellowship and the future of the organization.

3. RECOMMENDATION: That the regular meeting date of the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA be set on the first Monday following the 4th of July.

Motion made, seconded and passed.

4. RECOMMENDATION: That appropriate membership cards be prepared and distributed to all present and future members of the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA. Suggested size for wallet, 2-1/2 x 3-3/4 approximately.

Motion made, seconded and passed.

5. RECOMMENDATION: That the 1956 records of the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA, including the minutes of the regular meeting held at Colorado Springs during the Sesquicentennial be published and made available to all members in good standing.

Motion made, seconded and passed.

6. RECOMMENDATION: That pins or buttons and Coat of Arms be made available for purchase to all members of the Association.

Motion made, seconded and passed.

7. RECOMMENDATION: That funds paid in for life memberships be segregated from the cash account and invested in U. S. Government Bonds for the purpose of guaranteeing life memberships.

That the income from these bonds be used same as current dues.

That moneys remaining in the Life Membership Fund at the expiration of a member be maintained in the fund as a memorial for the future use and perpetuation of the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA.

Motion made, seconded and passed.

8. RECOMMENDATION: That an attempt be made to obtain objects or papers of importance pertaining to the PIKE FAMILY which could be assembled in a designated place as a (museum) so that they may be viewed by the entire family. Copies should be obtained if the originals are not available.

Motion made that an attempt be made to obtain objects or papers of importance pertaining to the PIKE FAMILY which will be assembled in the Pioneer's Museum, Colorado Springs, Colorado so that they may be viewed by the entire family.

This motion was not seconded or passed.

Secretary note: It is assumed that this matter would be handled by Board of Directors and Executive Officers. This is a purely volunteer gesture on the part of the membership. Details will be worked out to best satisfaction of all concerned.

The President expressed a word of appreciation to President Kenneth Englert and the Historical Society of Pikes Peak Region for their help in publicizing and sponsoring various activities in honor of Pikes during the Sesquicentennial. Further business originating in July 13 meeting was:

Motion made, seconded and passed that Mrs. Raymond Renaud, Cleveland, Ohio, be made an Assistant Research Secretary to assist Secretary-Treasurer Mrs. Kenneth R. Pike, Hartford, Wisconsin.

Motion made, seconded and passed that initial dues for new members be \$3.00 and that \$1.00 be continuing yearly membership dues to begin January 1, 1958.

Motion made, seconded and passed that we authorize the Executive Officers to send out copies of the Historical Sesquicentennial book with 1956 minutes of PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA to all members in good standing.

Motion made, seconded and passed that a letter of appreciation be sent to all groups who have been instrumental in making the PIKE FAMILY ASSOCIATION reunion a success and for all the courtesies extended to the PIKE FAMILY.

President Zebulon M. Pike, Jr. gave a word of appreciation for the efforts of Rev. R. Vernon Pike in organizing this most successful reunion.

MAJOR ROBERT PIKE MEMORIAL FUND
Salisbury Library

This project was consummated by the former officers of the Pike Family Association, Dr. Maurice Pike of Hartford, Connecticut, President and M. Elizabeth Kilburn of West Newton, Massachusetts, Secretary-Treasurer. (See minutes of 1956 meeting.)

On November 15, 1956, Miss Kilburn sent our Robert Pike Memorial fund check

"To the Town of Salisbury (Salisbury Public Library) the sum of twenty-one hundred and twenty-five dollars and four cents (\$2,125.04) to be expended by the trustees toward a Robert Pike Memorial room."

Ward F. Messenger, Secretary to the Salisbury Public Library Board of Trustees wrote on March 14, 1959,

"The Library building was built in 1956 and 1957 and was in use most of 1957. The Trustees and Building Committee had an open house reception May 5, 1958 which was well attended. An oil painting of Captain Robert Pike (artist, Sam Sargent) was hung in the entry of the building and we expect it to stay there as long as the Library stands. The people of the town were all made aware of the Pike Family's contribution to the new Library."

Mr. Ward Messenger, issued an invitation to any member of the Pike Family to call at the Library when in Salisbury and thanked the Association for the generous gift.

It was hoped that a picture of the Library and the oil painting of Major Robert Pike might be included in this report, but request was not fulfilled. Anyone visiting the Library or having pictures of same, please send to the Association Secretary-(104 S. Rural Street, Hartford, Wisconsin).

JOHN PIKE was eighth from Sir Richard Pyke of Bridgewater in Somerset Co. England. First of the line in America, who came to this country sailing from Southhampton April 6, 1635 on ship "James of London" (have photostatic copy of passenger list) and settled in Newbury on banks of Parker River. Was made Freeman in 1642 and was attorney at Newbury and Salisbury. He was one of three commissioners to build a schoolhouse and get a teacher. He and his sons took leading parts in town life in Newbury and Salisbury being selectmen, surveyors, heads of detachments of Militia, and chosen as commissioners "to end small causes", a sort of court for all minor cases.

Captain John was made Selectman of Newbury 1647-48, educated a lawyer. He and eight associates bought a tract of land in New Jersey, and founded the town of Woodbridge. Articles of Agreement signed May 21, 1866 whereby a Colony was established over which John was chosen Judge and Governor which position he held for many years. Returned to Newbury 1671 and was chosen a member of Governor Carteret's Council and in 1675 was appointed Captain of the Militia and by this appellation he was generally known. He was executor of his father's will.

JOHN BROWN PIKE was born at Lawrenceburg, Indiana, November 22, 1827 to James Brown and Elizabeth Carberry Pike. Both of them were children of Revolutionary soldiers. They had come from New Jersey and Pennsylvania first to Ft. Washington located on a hill overlooking Cincinnati and the Ohio River. Cincinnati at this time was only a frontier town of 400 log houses. His father, James Brown Pike, was the next younger brother of Zebulon Montgomery Pike, who discovered the mountain named for him, Pikes Peak. His grandfather, Colonel Zebulon Pike had been granted title to land on the banks of the Miami and Ohio Rivers for his services in the Revolutionary and Indian Wars and some of his grandparents on his mother's side had settled on the Kentucky side of the Ohio River. His grandfather was said to be the first white settler in Boone Co. Kentucky.

At the outbreak of the Mexican War young John joined the Infantry in Indiana (Co. C 4th Indiana Infantry) and was with Gen. Scott at the conquest of Monterey after which they were withdrawn and shipped to the conquest of Vera Cruz. From there they advanced against and captured the City of Mexico.

Immediately following the War with Mexico and the discovery of gold in California, the Pike families began their trek westward. Some joined covered wagon trains from St. Louis to Oregon and California, but John Brown Pike and his father, James Brown Pike and their families came down the Ohio River and up the Mississippi to Burlington and across the prairies to Jefferson, Wapello and Mahaska counties in Iowa.

At the outbreak of the Civil War, he and a group of men from these counties taking their own horses rode to Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, where they became a part of the 4th Iowa Cavalry organized November 23 to December 26, 1861. His Regiment served through the War, but on account of a break in his health he was transferred to the Marine Corps through the siege of Vicksburg and until the end of the War. His wife, Eliza Frazier, whom he had married in the early '50's and who had battled through the war period with a family of small children, died in March 1864.

He was married again at Hopkins, Missouri to Ann Eliza Hull and as carpenter, wagon maker, millwright, he took up life at Braddyville, Iowa. While his general health had been weakened by his war service, he never liked the idea of being a pensioner on the Government. His Congressman, Major John F. Lacey made out and brought him the papers which he signed granting him a pension of \$8.00 per month for his service in the Mexican War, and this was increased from time to time to the end of his life January 28, 1910 and extended to his widow to August 8, 1930.

Anxious to overcome the handicap of broken health and his to gain a competence in his later years, he, at the age of 77 years filed a claim on 160 acres of land in western South Dakota and assisted in building his own house (shack) and lived there with his wife until they were able to make final proof and receive a Government patent for the same. This he later sold to help ease the burden of their declining years. He departed this life from their humble home in Kirkville, Iowa, where they had reared their family to maturity and was laid to rest near his father and mother, James Brown and Elizabeth Carberry Pike who had come to Iowa with him in 1849 from Lawrenceburg, Indiana.

Letters written by Victor to his sister Mary (Mollie) in possession of Rev. R. Vernon Pike, Greenfield, Iowa.

Worked on the railroad in Creston, Iowa. In letter December 16, 1874 says: "I am living in Creston again and have a new engine, the prettiest on the road. Only three like it. The paint is green, red, white, black and gold leaf. It is a large pasinger engine." Was later in Topeka, Kansas in 1875, and Newton, Kansas in March, 1876.

April 23, 1886 wrote from Aragupe, Peru, South America:

My dearest sister,

I received your very welcome and good letter yesterday and take this first opportunity of answering it. It is more than twelve years since I have seen or heard from you although there is scarcely a day passes that I do not think of you and your husband. Your letter has done me more good and given me more pleasure than any I have received since I left home and I thank you for your goodness in hunting me up. Your first letter did not come to my hands or I should have answered it. Well, sister Mary in twelve years, we both have grown older and I hope wiser. I for my part have had many an up and down and particularly in this Country. I would very much like to see you and your husband, and also your little boy (Galen Russell) and I think it will not be many months before I am with you and then I don't think I will get so far from home again soon. I have one child, a little girl, who will be four years old the 30th of August next, and nothing would give me greater satisfaction than to know she had a home with you. I send you her picture with this letter. I cannot send you my wife's picture as I have not one here. I have, in Lima, that I will bring you when I come home. I expect to pass the winter with you, if I am allowed to get out of this country alive. I was married to a native woman of this country, but she was a good and true woman.

Today is Good Friday and there is no work. It is a grand Feast day in Peru. I wish I could have you here today to see the customs of these people. You would enjoy it. I am sure this is a very nice city, sixty thousand inhabitants, but the people are very deficient in modern civilization and customs differ from ours. I have not eaten but two meals a day since I came here. Breakfast at 10:30 A. M. and dinner at 5:30 P. M. Tell me if you have a R. R. in your place, or how you get there. I do not remember the town of Tarkio. My pay here is six dollars per day, every day in the month, but living is high and all foreigners have to pay dear for their living. Still I try to save something. I am running a pasinger train from here to the Sea Port town (Mollendo) to this place, distance 107 miles, and I get every month \$180 dollars in silver. I suppose there are great changes in the country and people since I left there as ten years is a long time. Well Mary I will say good by for a short time and hope to see you as well as your husband and little boy. With my best wishes, I remain your loving brother to M. E. Russell.

Last letter we have, written to husband of his sister Mary - from Peru, S. A. 1888

My dear Russell,

I have just received your very welcome letter, date Jan. 1. I can assure you I was very glad to hear from you. I received your letter also of last June announcing the death of Mary (sister June 1, 1887). I did not receive it until Sept. as I was away to the interior of the country looking for some mines that I was interested in, but they proved a bad spec. financially. I was surprised to learn of your loss in your wife. I believe she was a good wife and mother as well as a good sister. I am glad you are doing well in your business. My trade brings me a good salary each month, but it is very difficult to make money in this country at present, as the late war left it a complete wreck. I have written to Willie (brother) in Chicago, by the address you sent me and I am greatly obliged to you for the kindness in letting me know where he is living. I should like very much to come home and I think it will not be long before I am moving. My little girl is growing fast and in splendid health, going to school. I will bring her to the States soon to be educated. I hope your boy Galen is well, he is a fine fellow, judging from the photo his mother sent me. Well, Russell, I have Gold mining here, but did not make out good, but there is plenty of gold, but very little water to wash with. I think I will try it again. I am writing to a New York firm for an improved machine that is highly recommended to use little water. If it will work I will come out splendid. About the existence of the gold, there is no doubt, the Indians bring it in in abundant quantities. I would like to see you down here, if you choose. There is no laws prohibiting or restricting immigration or travelers going when they choose. What keeps all the foreigners here, is the lazy life they can pass. I have never seen a man do what we call a day's work since I came here. The foreigners don't have to work hard, and the natives won't do it. I could entertain you for some time I think, with giving you a history of my ups and downs since I left Yankee land, but will reserve it for some future time, when I hope we will get together. It is not my desire to be laid on the shelf in this country. You would like this climate very much but it is bad at present for trade. If you will come down for a time, I will send you a list of novelties that you might make expenses for the trip. Mollendo is the sea port town. My run as you say to the interior, run 107 miles and return but I make my home in Araguape a more temperate climate. Mollendo is very warm almost unbearable. This road has 425 miles of track and equipped with 46 American locomotives and cars in proportion all in very good condition. We cross over the Andes Mountains at an altitude of 16,000 feet above sea level, it is a continual rise of 245 feet to the mile. Our engines 40 ton, pull 4 loaded cars up and take down 6 and 8 so you see we are not on no level roads. We get far above the clouds and rain some times, can look down and see it raining below the Oraya R. R. where I worked two years, runs out of Lima the Capitol and in a distance of 82 miles gets an altitude of 12,800 feet and has 40 tunnels and an innumerable lot of bridges, the highest is 266 feet above the water. It is that road, that is considered the greatest engineering feat in the world. Road as I told you is 82 miles long and at its present terminus is 12,800 feet above sea level and cost the Peruvian Nation 46 millions of dollars. It does not begin to pay interest on the money invested. This road that I am running on is the best paying road in Peru at present. Well, I will close for this time, wishing you health and prosperity and hope you will conclude to make a visit in the near future. Give my regards to all your family and in particular to Galen. In my next, will send you a photo of my girl Rosa hoping this will meet with a speedy answer. I remain. Yours truly, Francisco Pike

"FRED ALDRIDGE, A SURE GENIUS" - - Fremont Gazette - 1902

About 35 years ago, a baby was born in the J. S. Aldridge home over on Cedar Creek (south of Fremont) and the parents christened him Frederick. There was nothing particularly striking about the child that would lead the parents to believe that when he grew to manhood he would be genius enough to build an automobile without ever having seen one of the machines. True when he was a strip of a lad he would rather get a hammer and drive nails than hoe in the garden but most boys would rather do that too.

When he got to be 12 or 14 years old he rigged up a workshop in an old grainery and made miniature windmills, hayrakes, mowers, pumps, etc. and gladly welcomed the day when it rained so hard that working in the fields was an impossibility and he could spend a day in his den. At 18 he conceived the idea of starting a blacksmith shop on the farm and made the anvil, bellows and every tool that was used in the shop, and spent many a day in this old place with his tools, models and shop playthings as his only companions. He stayed on the farm until he was 29, doing as little as he could in the fields and spending all his spare time in his shop.

When he married and moved to Fremont and accepted a position as tinner and machinist with Aldridge and Reeves about 1900, he manufactured his first steam engine, but later he has made five, ranging in power from 1/2 horse-power to the 8 horse-power one on his automobile. About a year later he conceived the idea of building an automobile and during the summer he gathered old pieces of mowing machines, sewing machines, etc. with which to construct it. Never having seen a machine, his only working model was a picture of one showing the different parts. From this he constructed his machine, having made every part of it except the boiler, which he bought, but put the flues in the same. He used 400 feet of Shelby bicycle tubing for the boiler and it can stand a pressure of 500 pounds. The lubricator is of his own design and works better than the ordinary ones. His auto has attained a speed of 20 miles per hour, but he plans to put in a larger engine later on. When completed the machine will have seats for four people and will be equipped with rubber tires on the wheels. When we consider that he has done all his work at odd times, a person is constrained to believe that besides being a genius of the first water, he is also a swift workman.
