IX. ORGANIZATION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE.

The Secretary of State is charged, under the direction of the President, with the duties appertaining to correspondence with the public ministers and the consuls of the United States, and with the representatives of foreign powers accredited to the United States; and to negotiations of whatever character relating to the foreign affairs of the United States. He is also the medium of correspondence between the President and the chief executives of the several States of the United States; he has the custody of the Great Seal of the United States, and countersigns and affixes such Seal to all Executive proclamations, to various commissions, and to warrants for the extradition of fugitives from justice. He is regarded as the first in rank among the members of the Cabinet. He is also the custodian of the treaties made with foreign States, and of the laws of the United States. He grants and issues passports, and exequaturs to foreign consuls in the United States are issued through his office. He publishes the laws and resolutions of Congress, amendments to the Constitution, and proclamations declaring the admission of new States into the Union.

CHINA AND ADJACENT TERRITORY.

Amoy.

That portion of the Province of Fukien comprised in the prefectures of Ting-Chou-fu, Chang-chou-fu, and Chuanchowfu, and the independent subprefecture of Lung-yen-chou.

Antung.

This district corresponds to the intendency of the three Eastern Marches, and consists of that portion of the Province of Shengking south and east of a line starting from the sea west of Chuanghoting, thence north about 30 miles, thence northeast, crossing the Antung-Mukden Railway a little north of Feng-huan-cheng and continuing in the same direction to the boundary of Shengking and Kiriu, thence following this boundary southeast to the Choscu frontier.

This will give to the consular district of Antung the following places opened to trade, viz, Feng-huang-cheng, Antung, and Tatungkow.

CHINA AND ADJACENT TERRITORY Continued.

The Provinces of Kwangsi, Kweichow, and Yunnan and that portion of the Province of Kwangtung west of longitude 115°.

The Province of Hunan.

Chefoo.

The Laichow Prefecture, except the Department of Pingtu and all of the Province of Shantung lying east and north of a line drawn from Liachow to the easternmost point in the boundary of the leased territory of Kiaochow.

The Provinces of Szechwan and all of Tibet south of the Kokonor region.

Dairen.

The Japanese leased territory of Knantung,

The whole of the Province of Fukien except the four prefectures forming the consular district of Amoy.

Hankow

The Province of Honan south of the Yellow River and the whole of the Provinces of Hupeh, Kiangsi, Sheusi, Kausu, the Kokonor region, Sinkiang (Turkestan), and that portion of Mongolia not included in the Tientsin district,

The Province of Heilungkiang and all that part of the Province of Kirin lying to the north of a line drawn between the cities of Kuanchengtzu (Changchun) and Kirin (which are included in the consular district of Mukden), and continued thence eastward to the Russo-Chinese frontier.

It will include the following places opened to trade; Manchuria, Khailer, Tsitsihar, Aigun, Sansing, and Harbin.

The whole of the Province of Anhwei and all of the Province of Kiangsu north of the Yangtze River, and two prefectures south of the same (Chiangning and Chui Kiang).

Saigon. All of French Indo-China.

Shanghai.

The whole of the Province of Kiangsu with the exception of that part which is included in the Nanking district, the island of Tsungming, and the whole of the Province of Chekiang.

Swatow.

That portion of the Province of Kuangtung east of longitude II5°.

Tientsin.

The whole of the Provinces of Chihli and Shansi, and that portion of the Province of Honan north of the Yellow River, together with all of Eastern Mongolia, including the Ordos country and the territory inhabited by the eastern and southern Khalkhas.

Tsinan.

That portion of the Province of Shantung, except the leased territory of Kiaochow, not included in the Consular District of Chefoo.

Tsingtau.

The leased territory of Kiaochow.

Bristol.

The county boundary of Somerset from the coast at the west to Mero, Marlborough, Didcot, and Oxford (all towns excluded) to and including Bnrford, Tewkesbury (excluded), and Gloucester (included).

Calcutta.

Bengal, Bihar and Orissa, Assam, United Provinces, corner of Punjab, including Delhi and Simla, Nepal, Sikkim, and Bhutan.

Cardiff.

From Portheawl to Brecon, Hay, and Hereford (all included), thence to but excluding Tewkesbury and Gloucester.

Dublin.

All counties lying between the Cork and Belfast boundaries. *Galway* (Consular Agency).

Beginning with County Sligo and taking in entire the counties of Sligo, Roscommon, Galway, and Mayo.

Dundee

The counties of Forfar, Perth, Aberdeen, Kincardine, Banff, Elgin, Nairn, Sutherland, Caithness, Orkney, Shetland, Ross and Cromarty, and the Hebredes or Westward Islands, and that portion of the county of Inveness north of a line from Rannoch following the railroad via Tulloch and Spean Bridge to Gairlochy[Inn (all excluded) on the Galedonian Canal, thence northeast as far as the outlet of Loch Arkaig into Loch Lochy, and thereafter westward to the coast to the mouth of the river Dessary; all that portion of the county north of Loch Nevis.

Aberdeen (Consular Agency).

All the mainland of Scotland north of a straight line drawn from Montrose in Kincardine to Beaulty in Inverness, and from thence to Ullapool in Ross and Cromarty, including the Orkney Islands

Dunfermline.

The counties of Fife, Kinross, and Clackmannan.

Edinburgh.

The counties of Edinburgh, Linlithgow, Haddington, Peebles, Sclkirk, Dumfries, Roxburgh, and Berwick.

GREAT BRITAIN-Continued.

Glasgow.

The counties of Lanark, Renfrew, Dumbarton, Stirling, Argyll, Bute, Ayr, Kirkcudbright, and Wigtown and, of the county of Inverness, that portion from and including Rannoch lollowing the railroad via Tulloch and Spean Bridge to Gairlochy Inn (all included) on the Caledonian Canal, thence northeast to the outlet of Loch Arkaig into Loch Lochy and thereafter westward to the coast to the mouth of the river Dessary; all that portion of the county south of Loch Nevis.

Troon (Consular Agency).

The counties of Ayrshire, Wigtownshire, and Kirkcudbrightshire. The district is bound on the west by the Firth of Clyde, and on the south by the Solway Firth. The eastern boundary extends from Wemyss Bay, which is this district through Beith, in the Troon district, to Muirkirk in the town district and to Dumfries in the Edinburgh district.

Whitby (excluded) to Glaisdale and Thorne (both included). Thorne to northern apex of Nottingham County, and by a line drawn from thence to Saltfleet (included).

Kingston, Jamaica.

All of the island of Jamaica.

Leeds

Penistone (excluded) to Dewsbury (included), thence to Richmond (excluded); and thereafter east to Glaisdale, south to Thorne and west to Barnsley (all excluded) to Penistone.

Liverpool

Fron Aberystwyth to Ludlow, Shrewsbury (all points excluded), Ellesmere (included), Middlewich, Northwich (both excluded), Warrington (included), Wigan, Preston, Lancaster, Kendal (all points excluded), to St. Bees Head; Isle of Man (included).

London.

The western county boundaries of Norfolk (from coast in Wash), Cambridge, and Ely, Huntingdon, Bedford, and Buckingham to Brackley (excluding), from thence to Oxford, Didcot, Reading, and Aldershot to Littlehampton, including all points named.

Madras.

Madras Presidency, native States of Hyderabad, Mysore, Travancore, Cochin, and Coorg.

Manchester.

From and including Buxton to Middlewich (excluded), Northwich (included), Warrington (excluded), Wigan, Preston, Lancaster, and Kendal (all included). Kendal to Mulier (included), thence south to and including Hawes. From 'Hawes to Burnley, Todmorden, Glossop, and Buxton, including all points named.

Newcastle-on-Tyne.

From St. Bees Head to Kendal, and via Mulier to Richmond (all points excluded except Richmond). Richmond (included) to and including Whitby. Northern boundary to end with Scottish border.

GREAT BRITAIN-Continued.

Nottingham.

Saltilect to northern apex of Nottingham County, thence by county boundary south to Pinxton (included). From Pinxton to and including Derby, Burton-on-Trent, and Market Harborough; from thence to county boundary of Bedford near Wellingborough (included) and northeast by county boundaries of Bedford, Huntingdon, Cambridge, and Ely, and Norfolk, to coast.

Penang, Straits Seltlements.

The island of Penang and the Provinces of Wellesley, Kedah, Dindings, Perak, and Perlis.

Plymouth.

The counties of Devon and Cornwall and Scilly Isles.

Oueenstown.

All counties west of and including Clare, Tipperary, and Waterford.

Limerick (Consular Agency).

The counties of Limerick, Clare, and Tipperary, and so much of the county of Kerry as is north of an east and west line drawn through the town of Tralec, but including the town of Tralec.

Rangoon.

Burma, Shan, and Karenni States and the Andaman and Nicobar Islands.

Sheffield.

Burton-on-Trent to Derby, Pinxton (all excluded), thence by county boundary to northern apex of Nottingham County, and Thorne (excluded). From Thorne to Barnsley (included), Penistone (included), Buxton, Stafford, and Burton-on-Trent (excluding all last named).

Singapore, Straits Settlements.

The Malay Peninsula except that part embraced in the jurisdiction of the Consulate at Penang.

Southampton.

From Littlehampton to Aldershot, Reading, and Didcot (all excluded) to Marlborough and Mere (both included). From Mere by western boundary of Dorsetshire to and including Lyme Regis.

Jersey (Consular Agency).

Including all of Channel Islands.

ll'eymouth (Consular Agency).

Follows the county boundary of Dorsetshire from and including Lyme Regis via Mere to but excluding Bournemouth.

Stoke-on-Trent.

From and including Stafford to Shrewsbury, Ellesmere, Middlewich (included), Buxton to Stafford, all towns excluded other than Stafford and Middlewich.

From and including Aberystwyth to Ludlow, Hereford, Hay, and Brecon, to Porthcawl, excluding all points other than Aberystwyth.

The Provinces of Janina, Arta, Preveza, Aetolia, Acarnania Archaia, Elis, Arcadia, Tryphylia, Corinth, Argolis, the Ionian Isles, and Zante Island.

Kalamata (Consular Agency).

The Provinces of Laconia, Messenia, and Lacedemon.

Saloniki.

The Provinces of Albania, Florina, Cozani, Edessa, Serres, Drama, and Saloniki.

Catania.

The Provinces of Catania and Syracuse.

Department of Liguria, and Libya.

Leghorn

Department of Tuscany, except the Provinces of Florence and Arezzo.

Prefectures of Shimane, Tottori, Hiroshima, Okayama, Hyogo, Kyoto, Osaka, Nara, Wakayama, Kagawa, Tokushima, Ehime, Kochi.

Prefectures of Yamaguchi, Fukuoka, Saga, Nagasaki, Oita, Kumamoto, Miyazaki, Kagoshima, Okinawa, including the Riukiu Islands.

Nagoya.

Prelectures of Miye, Shiga, Fukui, Ishikawa, Toyama, Gifu, Aichi, Nagano.

Taiwan.

All of Taiwan and the Pescadores Islands.

Yokohama.

Prefectures of Shizuoka, Yamanashi, Kanagawa, Chiba, Tokyo, Saitama, Ibaraki, Gumma, Tochigi, Niigata, Fukushima, Yamagata, Miyagi, Akita, Iwate, Aomori, and Hok kaido and adjacent islands to the north.

The State of Guerrero.

The State of Aguascalientes and that part of the State of Zacatecas which lies south of the Tropic of Cancer, except that part which lies south of a line running east and west through the town of Juchipila, which is not included in this consular district.

That part of the State of Chihuahua lying south of the 29° of latitude, including the towns of Temosachis, Sauz, Las Varas, and Madera, in the northwest part of the district, and all that portion of the State lying south and east of a line from the point of junction of the 29° of latitude and the 166° of longitude to the Rio Grande River through San Antonio, Chihuahua. That portion of the State of Durango lying north of a line running east and west, through and including the town of Inde, and west of a line running north and south, through but excluding the town of Descubridora.

Ciudad Juarez.

That part of the State of Chihuahua bounded on the north by the United States border, on the west by the Sonora boundary, on the south by the 29° of latitude, and on the east by a line drawn from the junction of the 29° of latitude and the 106° of longitude through San Antonio, Chihuahua, to the Rio Grande River.

Durango.

That part of the State of Durango lying west of the ro4° of fongitude and south of a line running east and west, drawn through but excluding the town of Inde and excluding the town of Descubridora and the region tributary thereto, in the northeastern part of the State of Durango, which should be left in the Torreon district.

Ensenada

All of Lower California, excepting that portion lying northeast of a line drawn northwest from the mouth of the Colorado River to the junction of the United States border and the Pacific Oceau.

Frontera.

All of the State of Tabasco. That part of the State of Campeachy which lies west of the 91° of longitude. That part of the State of Chiapas which lies north of a line running easterly from the intersection of the State lines of Vera Cruz, Chiapas, and Tabasco to the boundary of Guatemala.

Guadalajara.

That part of the State of Jalisco lying northeasterly of a fine drawn from the Nayarit boundary passing through and including San Marcos and Ameca, and Zapotlan (excluded), and thence to the border of Michoacan on a line with Los Reyes, Also that portion of the State of Michoacan bounded by the Jalisco and Guanajuato boundaries and a line running from the Jalisco border through and including Los Reyes, Zamora, and La Piedad. Also that part of the State of Zacatecas lying south of a line running east and west, just north of the town of Juchipila.

Guaymas

That part of the State of Sonora lying south of a line drawn east and west through but excluding the town of Carbo.

Manzanillo.

The State of Colima. That part of the States of Michoacan and Jalisco lying southwesterly of a line drawn from the Guerrero boundary through and including Zirandaro and Tacambaro, and through but excluding Uruapan, Los Reyes, Zapotlan (included), Ameca and San Marcos (excluded), to the Nayarit boundary. Zapotlan and the adjacent territory is included in this consular district.

Matamoros.

That part of the State of Tamaulipas lying north of the 24° of latitude to the Rio Grande River and northwest to a fine drawn from Mier, Tamaulipas; to Paras, Nuevo Leon; the town of Mier, with its surrounding district, being included in this consular district.

MEXICO-Continued.

Mazailan.

The States of Sinaloa and Nayarit.

Mericali.

The northeast corner of Lower California; bounded on the east by the Colorado River, on the north by the United States border, on the southwest by a line drawn from the mouth of the Colorado River northwest to the junction of the United States border and the Pacific Ocean.

Mexico City.

The States of Guanajuato, Queretaro, Hidalgo, Puebla, Tlaxcala, Morelos, Mexico, Federal District, and that part of the State of Michoacan lying northeast of a line passing through La Piedad, Zamora, Los Reyes, Tacambaro, and Zirandaro (all excluded). Also that part of the State of Oaxaca north of a line drawn due east from the boundary of Guerrero as far as San Carlos, passing through and including Ejutla, thence northeasterly to a point on the State line of Vera Cruz, due east of Choapam; San Carlos being included in the district of Mexico City.

Monterey.

That part of the State of Nuevo Leon lying south of a line passing through Mier, Tamaulipas; and Paras, Nuevo Leon; leaving Paras in the district of Nuevo Laredo.

Nogales

That portion of the State of Sonora lying north of a line drawn east and west through and including the town of Carbo.

Nuevo Laredo.

That part of the State of Nuevo Leon lying north of a line passing through Mier, Tamaulipas; and Paras, Nuevo Leon; and that part of the State of Tamaulipas lying northwesterly from the line drawn from Mier to Paras. Paras is included in this consular district but no part of the district tributary to the town of Mier, Tamaulipas.

Piedras Negras.

That part of the State of Coahuila lying north of a line drawn east and west, running just south of Monclova, excepting the district lying south of the 28° of latitude, and west of a line running north and south through Cuatro Cienejas, which is included in this consular district, and diverging westward to the northwestern point of the Saltillo district.

Progreso.

The State of Yucatan, the Territory of Quintana Roo, and that part of the State of Campeachy which lies east of the 91° of longitude.

Salina Cruz.

That part of the State of Oaxaca lying south of a line drawn due east from the boundary of Guerrero as far as San Carlos, passing through but excluding Ejutla; thence northeasterly to a point on the State line of Vera Cruz due east of Choapam; leaving San Carlos in the district of Mexico City. That part of the State of Vera Cruz lying southeast of a line from Point Zapotitlan on the Gulf of Mexico to the boundary of Oaxaca and passing through Achotal. That part of the State of Chiapas south of a line running east from the point of intersection of the State lines of Tabasco, Vera Cruz, and Chiapas to the Guatemala border.

Saltillo.

That part of the State of Coahuila lying south of a line running cast and west, drawn just south of Monclova, and east of a line through but excluding Paras, drawn to Cuatro Cienejas. That part of the State of Zacatecas lying east of a line running north and south, through and including Mazapil, but leaving the town of Cedros in the district of Torreon.

San Luis Potosi.

The State of San Luis Potosi.

MEXICO-Continued.

That part of the State of Tamanlipas lying south of the 24° of latitude, and that part of the State of Vera Cruz lying north of Barra de Cazones; also that part of the State of Vera Cruz lying west and north of the River Chiffon.

That part of the State of Durango lying east of the 101° of longitude, including the town of Describridores and the surrounding district. That part of the State of Zacateeas lying north of the Tropic of Cancer and west of a line running north and south, drawn through but excluding Mazapil; including Cedros in the district of Torreon. That part of the State of Coahuila lying west of a line from and including Paras, but excluding Cuatro Ciencjas, and thence north to the 25° of latitude.

Vera Cruz.

That part of the State of Vera Cruz lying south of Barra de Cazones, and northwesterly of a line running from Point Zapotitlan on the Gulf of Mexico to the boundary of Oaxaca, and passing through Achotal; also the town of Tuxtepic and territory tributary thereto, in the State of Oaxaca.

The Provinces of North Holland, Drenthe, Friesland, Gelderland, Groningen, Overÿssel, and Utrecht.

XIII.—TARIFF OF UNITED STATES CONSULAR FEES.

[Revised to take effect November 1, 1906; amended by Executive orders and by Act of Congress approved June 4, 1920.]

Tariff of fees prescribed by order of the President to be charged by consular officers of the United States. All consular charges must be in strict accordance with this tariff and be collected in gold or its equivalent. No fee or compensation will be collected for any service not covered by this tariff.

(The fees in this tariff are not prescribed for American vessels and seamen, because they are exempted by law from the payment of consular fees. Consular agents will make the fees in this tariff a basis of collection from the Treasury for services to such vessels. Foreign-built vessels, unregistered, owned by American citizens, and vessels documented under the laws of the Philippine Islands are not exempt from the payment of the fees prescribed herein.)

^{*} Executive order of Mar. 29, 1918, prescribes that during the continuance of the war and until further orders, any services which American consular officers shall be called upon to perform under items 12, 31, 33, 38, 39, 49, 41, 42, and 43 of the Tariff of United States Consular Fees for any person in the military or naval service of the United States, shall be rendered free of charge.

Consular officers must require all fees to be paid in advance and before the stamps are canceled, except in case of attendance out of office or of commissions, when the amount can not be determined until the service is performed. Advance deposits to cover fees in 3 uch latter cases may be accepted, but in no other cases.

[‡] Executive order of Dec. 21, 1906, prescribes that no fee shall be charged for the affidavit of temporary stay of owner of seal-skin garment entering the United States from Canada.

XIV. DISPOSITION OF FEES AND COMPENSATION OF CONSULAR AGENTS AND VICE CONSULS.

The act for the reorganization of the consular service of the United States, approved April 5, 1906, provides:

"Sec. 8. That all fees, official or unofficial, received by any officer in the consular service for services rendered in connection with the duties of his office or as a consular officer, including fees for notarial services, and fees for taking depositions, executing commissions or letters rogatory, settling estates, receiving or paying out moneys, earing for or disposing of property, shall be accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the United States, and the sole and only compensation of such officers shall be by salaries fixed by law; but this shall not apply to consular agents, who shall be paid by one half of the fees received in their offices, up to a maximum sum of one thousand dollars in any one year, the other half being accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the United States."

The act for the improvement of the foreign service approved February 5, 1915, amends section 1685 of the Revised Statutes to read as follows:

"* * for such time as any vice consul shall be lawfully authorized to assume charge of a consulate general or consulate during the absence of the principal officer at the post to which he shall have been appointed or assigned, he shall be entitled to receive, in addition to his regular salary or compensation as a subordinate consular officer or employee, compensation equal to the difference between such salary or compensation and fifty per centum of the salary provided by law for the principal consular officer at such post."

XVIII.—REGULATIONS CONCERNING PRECEDENCE OF DIPLOMATIC AGENTS.

The rules on this subject which have been prescribed by the Department are the same as those contained in the seven rules of the Congress of Vienna, found in the protocol of the session of March 9, 1815, and in the supplementary or eighth rule of the Congress of Aix la Chapelle of November 21, 1818. They are as follows:

ARTICLE I. Diplomatic agents are divided into three classes: That of ambassadors, legates, or nuncios; that of envoys, ministers, or other persons accredited to sovereigns; that of chargés d'affaires accredited to ministers for foreign affairs.

- ART. II. Ambassadors, legates, or nuncios only have the representative character.
- ART. III. Diplomatic agents on an extraordinary mission have not, on that account, any superiority of rank.
- ART. IV. Diplomatic agents shall take precedence in their respective classes according to the date of the official notification of their arrival. The present regulation shall not cause any innovation with regard to the representative of the Pope.
- ART. V. A uniform mode shall be determined in each state for the reception of diplomatic agents of each class.
- ART. VI. Relations of consanguinity or of family alliance between courts confer no precedence on their diplomatic agents. The same rule also applies to political alliances.
- ART. VII. In acts or treaties between several powers which grant alternate precedence, the order which is to be observed in the signatures shall be decided by lot between the ministers.
- ART. VIII. * * * It is agreed that ministers resident accredited to them shall form, with respect to their precedence, an intermediate class between ministers of the second class and chargés d'affaires.

These rules have been formally or tacitly accepted by all governments except the Ottoman Porte, which divides diplomatic representatives into three classes only—ambassadors, ministers, and chargés d'affaires.

XIX.—ACTS FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF THE FOREIGN SERVICE, AND FOR THE REORGANIZATION OF THE CONSULAR SERVICE OF THE UNITED STATES.

An Act for the improvement of the foreign service, approved February 5, 1915, with subsequent legislation and regulations provides—

That all appointments of secretaries in the Diplomatic Service and of consuls general and consuls shall be by commission to the offices of secretary of embassy or legation, consul general, or consul, and not by commission to any particular post, and that such officers shall be assigned to posts and transferred from one post to another by order of the President as the interests of the service may require. That any such officer may be assigned for duty in the Department of State without loss of grade, class, or salary, such assignment to be for a period of not more than three years, unless the public interests demand further service, when such assignment may be extended for a period not to exceed one year, and no longer. That no secretary, consul general, or consul shall be promoted to a higher class except upon the nomination of the President, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

That secretaries in the Diplomatic Service and consuls general, consuls and other officers in the Consular Service shall be graded and classified as follows, with the salaries of each class herein affixed thereto.

That for such time as any secretary of embassy or legation shall be lawfully authorized to act as chargé d'affaires ad interim at the post to which he shall have been appointed or assigned, he shall be entitled to receive, in addition to his salary as secretary of embassy or legation, compensation equal to the difference between such salary and fifty per centum of the salary provided by law for the ambassador or minister at such post; and for such time as any vice consul shall be lawfully authorized to assume charge of a consulate general or consulate during the absence of the principal officer at the post to which he shall have been appointed or assigned, he shall be entitled to receive, in addition to his regular salary or compensation as a subordinate consular officer or employee, compensation equal to the difference between such salary or compensation and fifty per centum of the salary provided by law for the principal consular officer at such post.

That a secretary, consul general, or consul of whatever class detailed for special duty outside of the city of Washington shall be paid his actual and necessary expenses for subsistence during such special detail not exceeding \$5 per day: Provided, That such special duty shall not continue for more than sixty days unless in the case of international gatherings, congresses, or conferences, when such subsistence expenses shall run only during the life of the international gathering, congress, or conference, as the case may be.

That the Secretary of State is directed to report from time to time to the President, along with his recommendations for promotion or for transfer between the department and the foreign service, the names of those secretaries in the Diplomatic Service and the names of those consular officers or departmental officers or employees who by reason of efficient service, an accurate record of which shall be kept in the Department of State, have demonstrated special efficiency, and also the names of persons found upon examination to have fitness for appointment to the lower grades of the service.

That the official designations employed throughout this title shall be deemed to have the following meanings, respectively:

First. "Consul general" and "consul" shall be deemed to denote full, principal, and permanent consular officers as distinguished from subordinates and substitutes.

Second. "Consular agent" shall be deemed to denote consular officers subordinate to such principals exercising the powers vested in them and performing the duties prescribed for them by regulation of the President at posts or places different from those at which such principals are located, respectively.

Third. "Vice consuls" shall be deemed to denote consular officers subordinate to such principals exercising and performing the duties within the limits of their consulates at the same or at different points and places from those at which the principals are located, except that when vice consuls take charge of consulates general or consulates when the principal officers shall be temporarily absent or relieved from duty they shall be deemed to denote consular officers who shall be substituted, temporarily, to fill the places of said consuls general or consuls.

Fourth: "Consular officer" shall be deemed to include consuls general, consuls, vice consuls, interpreters in consular offices, student interpreters, and consular agents, and none others.

Fifth. "Diplomatic officer" shall be deemed to include ambassadors, envoys extraordinary, ministers plenipotentiary, ministers resident, commissioners, chargé d'affaires, counselors, agents, secretaries of embassy and legation, and secretaries in the Diplomatic Service, and none others.

That no ambassador, minister, minister resident, diplomatic agent, or secretary in the Diplomatic Service of any grade or class shall, while he holds his office, be interested in or transact any business as a merchant, factor, broker, or other trader, or as an agent for any such person to, from, or within the country or countries to which he or the chief of his mission, as the case may be, is accredited, either in his own name or in the name or through the agency of any other person; nor shall he, in such country or countries, practice as a lawyer for compensation or be interested in the fees or compensation of any lawyer so practicing.

An Act to provide for the reorganization of the Consular Service of the United States, approved April 5, 1906, with subsequent legislation and regulations, provides—

That the consuls general, consuls, and other officers in the Consular Service of the United States shall be classified and graded as appears on pages 200 and 201.

That the office of vice consul (not of career) shall be filled by appointment, as heretofore, except that whenever, in his judgment, the good of the service requires it, consuls may be designated by the President without thereby changing their classification to act for a period not to exceed one year as vice-consul, and when so acting they shall not be deemed to have vacated their offices as consuls. Consular agents may be appointed, when necessary, as heretofore.

That there shall be seven inspectors of consulates, to be designated and commissioned as consuls general at large, who shall receive an annual salary of five thousand dollars each, and shall be paid their actual and necessary traveling and subsistence expenses while traveling and inspecting under instructions from the Secretary of State. They shall be appointed by the President, with the advice and consent of the Senate, from the members of the consular force possessing the requisite qualifications of experience and ability. They shall make such inspections of consular offices as the Secretary of State shall direct, and shall report to him. Each consular office shall be inspected at least once in every two years. Whenever the President has reason to believe that the business of a consulate or a consulate-general is not being properly conducted and that it is necessary for the public interest, he may authorize any consul-general at large to suspend the consul or consul general, and administer the office in his stead for a period not exceeding ninety days. In such case the consul general at large so authorized shall have power to suspend any vice consular officer or clerk in said office during the period aforesaid. The provisions of law relating to the official bonds of consuls general, and the provisions of sections seventeen hundred and thirty-four, seventeen hundred and thirty-five, and seventeen hundred and thirty-six, Revised Statutes of the United States, shall apply to consuls-general at large.

No person who is not an American citizen shall be appointed hereafter in any consulategeneral or consulate to any clerical position the salary of which is one thousand dollars a year or more.

That sections sixteen hundred and ninety-nine and seventeen hundred of the Revised Statutes of the United States are hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 1699. No consul-general, consul, or consular agent receiving a salary of more than one thousand dollars a year shall, while he holds his office, be interested in or transact any business as a merchant, factor, broker, or other trader, or as a clerk or other agent for any such person to, from, or within the port, place, or limits of his jurisdiction, directly or indirectly, either in his own name, or in the name or through the agency of any other person; nor shall he practice as a lawyer for compensation or be interested in the fees or compensation of any lawyer; and he shall in his official bond stipulate as a condition thereof not to violate this prohibition.

"Sec. 1700. All consular officers whose respective salaries exceed one thousand dollars a year shall be subject to the prohibition against transacting business, practicing as a lawyer, or being interested in the fees or compensation of any lawyer contained in the preceding section. And the President may extend the prohibition to any consul-general, consul, or consular agent whose salary does not exceed one thousand dollars a year or who may be compensated by fees, and to any vice consular officer or consular agent, and may require such officer to give a bond not to violate the prohibition."

That every consular officer of the United States is hereby required, whenever application is made to him therefor, within the limits of his consulate, to administer to or take from any person

any oath, affirmation, affidavit, or deposition, and to perform any other notarial act which any notary public is required or authorized by law to do within the United States; and for every such notarial act performed he shall charge in each instance the appropriate fee prescribed by the President under section seventeen hundred and forty-five, Revised Statutes.

That all fees, official or unofficial, received by any officer in the Consular Service for services rendered in connection with the duties of his office or as a consular officer, including fees for notarial services and fees for taking depositions, executing commissions or letters rogatory, settling estates, receiving or paying out moneys, caring for or disposing of property, shall be accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the United States, and the sole and only compensation of such officers shall be by salaries fixed by law; but this shall not apply to consular agents, who shall be paid by one-half of the fees received in their offices, up to a maximum sum of one thousand dollars in any one year, the other half being accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the United States. For such time as any vice consul shall be lawfully authorized to assume charge of a consulate-general or consulate during the absence of the principal officer at the post to which he shall have been appointed or assigned, he shall be entitled to receive, in addition to his regular salary or compensation as a subordinate consular officer or employee, compensation equal to the difference between such salary or compensation and fifty per centum of the salary provided by law for the principal consular officer at such post.

That fees for the consular certification of invoices shall be, and they hereby are, included with the fees for official services for which the President is authorized by section seventeen hundred and forty-five of the Revised Statutes to prescribe rates or tariffs; and sections twenty-eight hundred and fifty-one and seventeen hundred and twenty-one of the Revised Statutes are hereby repealed.

That every consular officer shall be provided and kept supplied with adhesive official stamps, on which shall be printed the equivalent money value of denominations, and to amounts to be determined by the Department of State, and shall account quarterly to the Department of State for the use of such stamps and for such of them as shall remain in his hands.

Whenever a consular officer is required or finds it necessary to perform any consular or notarial act he shall prepare and deliver to the party or parties at whose instance such act is performed a suitable and appropriate document as prescribed in the consular regulations and affix thereto and duly cancel an adhesive stamp or stamps of the denomination or denominations equivalent to the fee prescribed for such consular or notarial act, and no such act shall be legally valid within the jurisdiction of the Government of the United States unless such stamp or stamps is or are affixed and canceled.

XX. REGULATIONS GOVERNING APPOINTMENTS AND PROMOTIONS IN THE DIPLOMATIC SERVICE AND FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF THE PERSONNEL OF THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE.

EXECUTIVE ORDERS.

Whereas, The Congress, by Section 1753 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, has provided as follows:—

"The President is authorized to prescribe such regulations for the admission of persons into the civil service of the United States as may best promote the efficiency thereof, and ascertain the fitness of each candidate in respect to age, health, character, knowledge, and ability for the branch of service into which he seeks to enter; and for this purpose he may employ suitable persons to conduct such inquiries, and may prescribe their duties, and establish regulations for the conduct of persons who may receive appointments in the civil service."

And, Whereas, it is deemed best for the public interest to extend to the Diplomatic Service the aforesaid provision of the Revised Statutes and the general principles embodied in the Civil Service Act of January 16th, 1883:—

The Secretary of State is hereby directed to report from time to time to the President, along with his recommendations, the names of those secretaries of the higher grades in the Diplomatic Service who by reason of efficient service have demonstrated special capacity for promotion to be chiefs of mission.

There shall be kept a careful efficiency record of every officer of the Diplomatic Service, in order that there may be no promotion except upon well-established efficiency as shown in the service, and that retention in the service may be conditioned upon the officers' maintaining a degree of efficiency well up to the average high standard which the interests of the service demand.

Initial appointments from outside the service to secretaryships in the Diplomatic Service shall be only to the Classes of Third Secretary of Embassy, or, in case of higher existent vacancies, of Second Secretary of Legation, or of Secretary of Legation at such post as has assigned to it but one secretary. Vacancies in secretaryships of higher classes shall be filled by promotion from the lower grades of the service, based upon efficiency and ability as shown in the service.

To make it more practicable to extend to the appointment, promotion, transfer, or retention of secretaries in the Diplomatic Service, the civil-service principle of promotion on the basis of efficiency as shown in the service, and in order that the action of the department may be understood by the officers concerned, all secretaryships in the Diplomatic Service shall be graded according to the importance, volume, difficulty, or other aspects of the work done by each mission in proportion to the number of men allotted to it, and this classification shall be made known to the members of the service.

A person separated from a secretaryship in the Diplomatic Service without delinquency or misconduct at his own request in writing may, within a period of one year from the date of such separation, be reinstated in the grade from which he was separated, provided he shall have been originally appointed after the prescribed examination for that grade. In the event, however, that such separation shall be for the purpose of undertaking other work under the Department of State, the limitation of one year for eligibility for reinstatement shall not hold. This rule shall be applicable as regards reinstatements to the Consular Service and also to the Department of State when transfers shall have been to another branch of the foreign service.

The Third Assistant Secretary of State,* the Solicitor for the Department of State, the Chief of the Diplomatic Bureau, the Chief of the Bureau of Appointments, the Chief Examiner of the Civil Service Commission, or such persons as may be designated by the Secretary of State and the Comuissioner President of the Civil Service Commission, respectively, to serve in their stead, are hereby constituted a board whose duty it shall be to determine, from among the persons designated by the President for examination, those who are fitted for possible appointment as Secretaries of Embassy or Legation.

The examination herein provided for shall be held in Washington at such times as the needs of the service require. Candidates will be given reasonable notice to attend, and no person shall be designated to take the examination within thirty days of the time set therefor.

The examinations shall be both oral and in writing and shall include the following subjects: international law, diplomatic usage, and a knowledge of at least one modern language other than English, to wit, French, German, or Spanish; also the natural, industrial, and commercial resources and the commerce of the United States, especially with reference to the possibilities of increasing and extending the trade of the United States with foreign countries; American history, government, and institutions; and the modern history since 1850 of Europe, Latin America, and the Far East. The object of the oral examination shall also be to determine the candidate's alertness, general contemporary information, and natural fitness for the service, including mental, moral, and physical qualifications, character, address, and general education and good command of English. In this part of the examination the applications previously filed will be given due weight by the board of examiners. In the determination of the final rating, the written and oral ratings shall be of equal weight. A physical examination shall also be included as supplemental.

Examination papers shall be rated on a scale of 100, and no person with a general rating of less than 80 shall be certified as eligible.

No person shall be certified as eligible who is under twenty-one or over thirty-five† years of age, or who is not a citizen of the United States, or who is not of good character and habits and physically, mentally, and temperamentally qualified for the proper performance of diplomatic work, or who has not been specially designated by the President for appointment to the diplomatic service subject to examination and subject to the occurrence of an appropriate vacancy.

Upon the conclusion of the examinations, the names of the candidates who shall have attained upon the whole examination the required mark will be certified by the Board to the Secretary of State as eligible for appointment.

The names of candidates will remain on the eligible list for two years, except in the case of such candidates as shall within that period be appointed or shall withdraw their names. Names which

have been on the eligible list for two years will be dropped therefrom and the candidates concerned will not again be eligible for appointment unless upon fresh application, designation anew for examination, and the successful passing of such second examination.

Applicants for appointment who are designated to take an examination and who fail to report therefor, shall not be entitled to take a subsequent examination unless they shall have been specifically designated to take such subsequent examination.

In designations for appointment subject to examination and in appointments after examination, due regard will be had to the rule, that as between candidates of equal merit, appointments should be made so as to tend to secure proportional representation of all the States and Territories in the diplomatic service; and neither in the designation for examination or certification or appointment after examination will the political affiliations of the candidates be considered.

The Board of Examiners is authorized to issue such notices and to make all such rules as it may deem necessary to accomplish the object of this regulation.

Transfers from one branch of the foreign service to another shall not occur except upon designation by the President for examination and the successful passing of the examination prescribed for the service to which such transfer is made. Unless the exigencies of the service imperatively demand it, such person to be transferred shall not have preference in designation for the taking of the examination or in the appointment from the eligible list, but shall follow the course of procedure prescribed for all applicants for appointments to the service which he desires to enter. To persons employed in the Department of State at salaries of eighteen hundred dollars or more, the preceding rule shall not apply and they may be appointed, on the basis of ability and efficiency, to any grade of the diplomatic service.

The Secretary of State may, as provided by Rule III of the present Civil Service Rules, request the Civil Service Commission to hold special examinations for the position of clerk of class two or above in the Department of State, such examination to follow generally and so far as the Secretary of State shall deem practicable, the lines of the present foreign service examinations.

In the case of promotions in the Department of State to the grades of clerk of class two or above, the Secretary of State may require the passing of an examination in the general nature of the present diplomatic or consular service examinations.

With further reference to the matter of promotions in the Department of State, the Secretary of State is directed to cause to be kept, as a guide in determining the promotion or retention of the personnel, a careful record of the efficiency of each clerk in the Department.

No officer or employee of the Government shall, directly or indirectly, instruct or be concerned in any manner in the instruction of any person or classes of persons, with a view to their special preparation for the examinations of the Boards of Examiners for the diplomatic and consular services.

The fact that any officer or employee is found so engaged shall be considered sufficient cause for his removal from the service.

SAMPLE EXAMINATION FOR THE DIPLOMATIC SERVICE.

The following questions are furnished as suggestive of the character of those comprised in the examination—for the taking of which two days of six hours each are allowed:

SUBJECT-INTERNATIONAL LAW.

- r. (a) State the origin and nature of international law and indicate the chief factors in its modern development.
- (b) What is the status of international law in American jurisprindence; i, e, is it regarded as a branch of municipal law or is it considered a foreign system?

- (c) State some of the leading writers in international law, enumerate some textbooks on the subject, and state what books you would refer to if a question of international law arose with which you are unfamiliar.
- 2. (a) Upon the execution of Louis XVI, the British Government refused to receive the French diplomatic agent and sent him his passports. Was the action of the British Government correct?
- (b) Napoleon III began a suit in the Supreme Court of the United States. Upon his dethronement and the establishment of the French Republic on September 3, 1870, it was contended that the suit abated by reason of the deposition of the Emperor Napoleon. What, in your opinion, should be the holding on this point?
- (c) Cotton owned by the Confederate States was shipped to their agents in Liverpool, who paid the expenses of transportation, took possession of the cotton, stored it in warehouses, and guarded it at considerable expense. Upon the fall of the Confederacy the United States filed a bill, praying to have the cotton delivered to a duly constituted agent of the United States. The agents of the Confederacy seek to enforce a lieu on the cotton for their expenses. How, in your opinion, should the court decide?
- 3. (a) A local statute forbids fishing within the three-mile limit without a license and forbids, under penalty of confiscation of the vessel, all fishing on Sunday. The sloop *Venturesome* began fishing Sunday morning beyond the three-mile limit, but after the ne's had been laid and the fish surrounded the *Venturesome* drifted within the three-mile limit and was apprehended while taking the fish from the nets placed beyond the three-mile limit, but which had drifted within the limit. Upon suit brought for confiscation of the vessel, what, in your opinion, would be the holding of the court?
- (b) Suppose the vessel had begun fishing within the three-mile limit, and noticing the approach of a revenue cutter put to sea. The cutter followed, captured the *Venturesome* upon the high seas, brought it to port, and began condemnation proceedings. What, in your opinion, should be the holding of the court?
- 4. (a) A diplomatic agent, driving his automobile at a rate of speed forbidden by law, runs over and seriously injures a passer-by. The chauffeur is notified by the police to go with him to the police station but refuses. The policeman thereupon arrests him, the diplomatic agent protesting that he must be driven at once to the State Department on important business for his Government. If consulted, what would you advise the diplomatic agent and the chauffeur as to their rights and duties in the premises.
- (b) A diplomatic agent leases a house for the period of two years at an annual rental of five thousand dollars, payable monthly. The agent pays rent for the first three months, but thereafter neglects to pay the rent when due. At the expiration of a year the owner of the house seeks to evict the diplomat and files an action to recover the rent due and damages for the breach of the lease. What, in your opinion, should be the result? Would it make any difference in your answer if instead of a diplomat the tenant was a consul-general?
- 5. (a) The late President Castro proceeded to La Guaira upon a French merchant ship. Upon his arrival in La Guaira the Venezuelan authorities came aboard and demanded Castro, but the captain refused to deliver him. The Venezuelan authorities thereupon withdrew, and the captain, fearing that force would be used, transferred Castro to a French man-of-war lying in the harbor. Upon demand made upon the man-of-war to surrender Castro and refusal, a land battery opened fire upon the man-of-war. Discuss and distinguish the two situations.
- (b) During the recent revolution in Constantinople one X, a member of the late Turkish Cabinet, applied to the American embassy for admission and was admitted. One Y, a member of the recent Government, indicted for the misappropriation of funds, secretly entered the American embassy. Z, an opponent of the revolution, pursued by a mob, seeks refuge in the American embassy. What should be the action of the American embassy in each of these cases?

Would it make any difference, in your opinion, if the events described had taken place in Paris upon the overthrow of Napoleon III or in Brazil upon the expulsion of Dom Pedro?

6. A Japanese army crosses the boundary between Korea and China at 1.30 a. in., on May 15, 19—. News of the invasion of China by Japanese forces does not reach Manila until May 17, 19—. On May 16, without any knowledge of the state of affairs created by the invasion of China, X, Y & Z, an American firm, shipped on board an American steamer a cargo of arms and ammunition, destined to a Chinese port, in fulfillment of a contract previously entered into. The vessel is captured by a Japanese cruiser

on the ground that war existed between China and Japan. X, Y & Z asked the good offices of the American embassy at Tokyo to secure the release of the cargo on the ground that there was no declaration of war and the American shippers did not and could not know at the date of the shipment of the hostile relation between Japan and China. What advice would you give to the representative of X, Y & Z?

- 7. Discuss the effect of war upon trade; upon executory and executed contracts.
- 8. (a) Define contraband, state its divisions, and the penalty for its carriage if captured.
- (b) Define blockade and note the conditions under which a declaration is valid as binding upon neutrals.
- 9. State the requirements of a valid capture of (a) enemy and (b) neutral property upon the high seas. State when title passes to captor in each case and the formalities requisite to give a perfect title to captured property.
- 10. (a) Enumerate some of the more important recent international conferences and state some of their most important results.
- (b) Explain the distinction between "good offices," "mediation," and "arbitration." Cite some American instances of arbitration, and explain the attitude of the United States toward arbitration.
- (c) Give the general arbitration clause and explain why "independence, vital interests, and honor" are excluded from the obligation of arbitration provided for by recent treaties.

SUBJECT-DIPLOMATIC USAGE.

- 1. What official relations, if any, does a secretary of legation have with the Government of the country in which he resides?
- 2. Give your understanding of the difference between a chargé d'affaires, a charge d'affaires ad interim, and a chargé des affaires.
- 3. A secretary of legation being in charge of the legation at the time of the arrival of a new minister, what part would the secretary of legation be called upon to take in the preliminaries preceding the minister's official reception?
- 4. The immunity from the criminal and civil jurisdiction of the country of his sojourn, which the diplomatic representative possesses, is also accorded to the secretary of the legation. On what ground?
- 5. What is the procedure in the case of an international convention to which a large number of Governments are signatory?

SR. PRESIDENTE:

El Ministro de Negocios Extranjeros de la República, á quien comuniqué la adhesion del Gobierno de S. M. á nuestra proposición de reanudar en Paris las negociaciones relativas á la delimitación de los territorios discutidos entre nuestros dos países en el Golfo de Guinea, me encarga manifieste á V. E. que está dispuesto por su parte á continuar inmediatamente esta negociación, poniéndose de acuerdo, al efecto, con el Sr. León y Castillo.

A su juicio, el Embajador de S. M. podría estar asistido, como él lo estará, por uno ó dos Delegados, á quienes incumbiría la preparación de las soluciones sobre las cuales habría luego que ponerse de acuerdo. Monsieur Deleassé está dispuesto á confiar este trabajo á un Agente de su Departamento, en unión de un funcionario de la Administración de las Colonias. V. E. apreciará si le es posible confiar igual encargo á uno de los miembros de la Embajada española en Paris y á un Delegado técnico para que exista igualdad en la representacion de los dos países.

Por lo que respecta á las negociaciones en si mismas, el Ministro de Negocios Extranjeros de la República estima como V. E. que es preferible volver lo menos posible al examen de los títulos invocados por una y otra parte, ya que el estudio de que han sido objeto y la facultad de referirse á esta primera parte de los trabajos permiten reducir al mínimum esta especie de información previa.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE,
Washington, August 12, 1900.

The Government of the United States learns with satisfaction of the appointment of Earl Li Hung Chang as envoy plenipotentiary to conduct negotiations with the powers, and will, on its part, enter upon such negotiations with a desire to continue the friendly relations so long existing between the two countries.

It is evident that there can be no general negotiation between China and the powers so long as the ministers of the powers and the persons under their protection remain in their present position of restraint and danger, and that the powers can not cease their efforts for the delivery of these representatives, to which they are constrained by the highest considerations of national honor, except under an arrangement adequate to accomplish a peaceable deliverance.

We are ready to enter into an agreement between the powers and the Chinese Government for a cessation of hostile demonstrations, on condition that a sufficient body of the forces composing the relief expedition shall be permitted to enter Peking unmolested and to escort the foreign ministers and residents back to Tientsin; this movement being provided for and secured by such arrangements and dispositions of troops as shall be considered satisfactory by the generals commanding the forces composing the relief expedition.

XXI. REGULATIONS GOVERNING APPOINTMENTS AND PROMOTIONS IN THE CONSULAR SERVICE.

EXECUTIVE ORDERS.

Whereas, The Congress, by Section 1753 of the Revised Statutes of the United States has provided as follows:

"The President is authorized to prescribe such regulations for the admission of persons into the civil service of the United States as may best promote the efficiency thereof, and ascertain the fitness of each candidate in respect to age, health, character, knowledge, and ability for the branch of service into which he seeks to enter; and for this purpose he may employ suitable persons to conduct such inquiries, and may prescribe their duties, and establish regulations for the conduct of persons who may receive appointments in the civil service."

And, whereas, the Congress has classified and graded the consuls-general and consuls of the United States by the act entitled "An act to provide for the reorganization of the consular service of the United States," approved April 5, 1906, and has thereby made it practicable to extend to that branch of the

civil service the aforesaid provisions of the Revised Statutes and the principles embodied in the Civil Service Act of January 16, 1883.

Now, therefore, in the exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Constitution and laws of the United States, the President makes the following regulations to govern the selection of consulsgeneral and consuls in the civil service of the United States, subject always to the advice and consent of the Senate:—

- 1.* Vacancies in the office of consul-general and in the office of consul above class six shall be filled by promotion from the lower grades of the consular service, based upon ability and efficiency as shown in the service, provided, however, that, whenever the good of the service requires, consuls of classes three, four, and five to serve as assistants to consuls-general in economic investigational work may be appointed from among candidates who shall have successfully passed an examination equivalent in character to that prescribed by the Civil Service Commission for economist in addition to the usual oral examination for the consular service; but consuls so specially chosen shall in no case exceed a total number of twenty-five and shall not be eligible for promotion to the higher grades of the consular service until they shall have served satisfactorily at least four years in responsible charge of consulates of class three, four, or five. Consuls already in the service of class six or above who have demonstrated their ability to perform the character of economic work required shall be given preference over specially chosen candidates.
 - 2.* Vacancies in the office of consul of class six and class seven shall be filled
- (a) By promotion on the basis of ability and efficiency, as shown in the service, of vice consuls, consular assistants and interpreters in the diplomatic or consular service who shall have been appointed to such offices upon examination.
- (b) By new appointments of candidates who have passed a satisfactory examination for appointment as consul as hereafter provided.
- 3.* Persons in the service of the Department of State with salaries of two thousand dollars or upwards shall be eligible for promotion on the basis of ability and efficiency as shown in the service, to any grade of the Consular Service above class 3 of vice consuls.
- 4.† The Assistant Secretary of State, the Director of the Consular Service, the Chief of the Consular Bureau, and the Chief Examiner of the Civil Service Commission, or such persons as may be designated by the Secretary of State and the Commissioner President of the Civil Service Commission, respectively, to serve in their stead, are hereby constituted a board whose duty it shall be to determine, from among the persons designated by the President for examination, those who are fitted for possible appointment to the consular service.
- 5. It shall be the duty of the Board of Examiners to formulate rules for and hold examinations of applicants for admission to the consular service.
- 6. The scope and method of the examinations shall be determined by the Board of Examiners, but among the subjects shall be included at least one modern language other than English; the natural, industrial, and commercial resources and the commerce of the United States, especially with reference to the possibilities of increasing and extending the trade of the United States with foreign countries; political economy; elements of international, commercial, and maritime law.
- 7. Examination papers shall be rated on a scale of 100, and no person rated at less than 80 shall be eligible for certification.
- 8. No one shall be examined who is under twenty-one or over fifty years of age, or who is not a citizen of the United States, or who is not of good character and habits, and physically and mentally qualified for the proper performance of consular work, or who has not been specially designated by the President for appointment to the consular service subject to examination.
- o.* Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the sixth or seventh class of consuls which the President may deem it expedient to fill, the Secretary of State shall inform the Board of Examiners, who shall certify to him the list of those persons eligible for appointment, accompanying the certificate with a detailed report showing the qualifications, as revealed by examination, of the persons so certified. If it be desired to fill a vacancy in a consulate in a country in which the United States exercises extraterritorial jurisdiction, the Secretary of State shall so inform the Board of Examiners, who shall include in

the list of names certified by it only such persons as have passed the examination provided for in this order, and who also have passed an examination in the fundamental principles of the common law, the rules of evidence, and the trial of civil and criminal cases. The lists of names which the Board of Examiners shall certify shall be sent to the President for his information.

- 10. No promotion shall be made except for efficiency, as shown by the work that the officer has accomplished, the ability, promptness, and diligence displayed by him in the performance of all his official duties, his conduct, and his fitness for the consular service.
- r1.* It shall be the duty of the Board of Examiners to formulate rules for and hold examinations of persons designated for appointment as consular assistant or as student interpreter, and of such persons designated for appointment as vice consul and consular agent, as shall desire to become eligible for promotion. The scope and method of such examination shall be determined by the Board of Examiners, but it shall include the same subjects hereinbefore prescribed for the examination of consuls. Any vice consular agent now in the service, upon passing such an examination shall become eligible for promotion, as if appointed upon such examination.
- 12. In designations for appointment subject to examination and in appointments after examination, due regard will be had to the rule, that as between candidates of equal merit, appointments should be so made as to secure proportional representation of all the States and Territories in the consular service; and neither in the designation for examination or certification or appointment will the political affiliations of the candidate be considered.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CONSULAR SERVICE PROMULGATED BY THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS DECEMBER 13, 1906.

- 1. The examinations will be the same for all grades and will be to determine a candidate's eligibility for appointment in the consular service, irrespective of the grade for which he may have been designated for examination and without regard to any particular office for which he may be selected.
- 2. The examinations will consist of an oral and a written one, the two counting equally. The object of the oral examination will be to determine the candidate's business ability, alertness, general contemporary information, and natural fitness for the service, including moral, mental, and physical qualifications, character, address, and general education and good command of English. In this part of the examination the applications previously filed will be given due weight by the Board of Examiners, especially as evidence of the applicant's business experience and ability. The written examination will include those subjects mentioned in the Executive order, to wit, at least one modern language other than English—French, German, or Spanish;† the natural, industrial, and commercial resources and the commerce of the United States, especially with reference to possibilities of increasing and extending the foreign trade of the United States; political economy, and the elements of international, commercial, and maritime law. It will likewise include American history, government, and institutions; political and commercial geography; arithmetic (as used in commercial statistics, tariff calculations, exchange, accounts, etc.); the modern history, since 1850, of Europe, Latin America, and the Far East, with particular attention to political, commercial, and economic tendencies. In the written examination, composition, grammar, punctuation, spelling, and writing will be given attention.
- 3. To become eligible for appointment, except as student interpreter, in a country where the United States exercises extraterritorial jurisdiction, the applicant must pass the examination outlined above, but supplemented by questions to determine his knowledge of the fundamental principles of common law, the rules of evidence, and the trial of civil and criminal cases.
- 4. The examinations to be given candidates for appointment as student interpreters will follow the same course as in the case of other consular officers, provided, however, that no one will be examined for admission to the consular service as a student interpreter who is not between the ages of nineteen and twenty-six, inclusive, and unmarried; and, provided further, that upon appointment each student

interpreter shall sign an agreement to continue in the service so long as his services may be required, within a period of five * years.

- 5. Upon the conclusion of the examinations the names of the candidates who shall have attained upon the whole examination an average mark of at least eighty, as required by the Executive order, will be certified by the Board to the Secretary of State as eligible for appointment in the consular service, and the successful candidates will be informed that this has been done.
- 6. The names of candidates will remain on the eligible list for two years, except in the case of such candidates as shall within that period be appointed, or as shall withdraw their names, and of candidates holding subordinate positions in the consular service, when eligibility shall not expire until appointment to consular rank or until separation from the service. Candidates whose names have thus been dropped from the eligible list will not again be eligible for appointment unless upon fresh application, designation anew for examination, and the successful passing of such second examination.†

GENERAL INFORMATION REGARDING CONSULAR OFFICERS.

DUTIES OF CONSULAR OFFICERS.

Consular officers are expected to endeavor to maintain and promote all the rightful interests of American citizens, and to protect them in all privileges provided for by treaty or conceded by usage; to visa and, when so authorized, to issue passports; when permitted by treaty, law, or usage, to take charge of and settle the personal estates of Americans who may die abroad without legal or other representatives, and remit the proceeds to the Treasury in case they are not called for by a legal representative within one year; to ship, discharge, and, under certain conditions, maintain and send American seamen to the United States; to settle disputes between masters and seamen of American vessels; to investigate charges of mutiny or insubordination on the high seas and send mutineers to the United States for trial; to render assistance in the case of wrecked or stranded American vessels, and, in the absence of the master or other qualified person, take charge of the wrecks and cargoes if permitted to do so by the laws of the country; to receive the papers of American vessels arriving at foreign ports and deliver them after the discharge of the obligations of the vessels toward the members of their crews, and upon the production of elearances from the proper foreign port officials; to certify to the correctness of the valuation of merchandise exported to the United States where the shipment amounts to more than \$100; to act as official witnesses to marriages of American citizens abroad; to aid in the enforcement of the immigration laws, and to certify to the correctness of the certificates issued by Chinese and other officials to Chinese persons coming to the United States; to protect the health of our scaports by reporting weekly the sanitary and health conditions of the ports at which they reside, and by issuing to vessels clearing for the United States bills of health describing the condition of the ports, the vessels, crews, passengers, and cargoes; and to take depositions and perform other acts which notaries public in the United States are authorized or required to perform. A duty of prime importance is the promotion of American commerce by reporting available opportunities for the introduction of our products, aiding in the establishment of relations between American and foreign commercial houses, and lending assistance wherever practicable to the marketing of American merchandise abroad.

In addition to the foregoing duties, consular officers in China, Turkey, Siam, Morocco, and a few other so-called non-Christian countries, are invested with judicial powers over American citizens in those countries. These powers are usually defined by treaty, but generally include the trial of civil cases to which Americans are parties, and in some instances extend to the trial of criminal cases.

VICE CONSULAR OFFICERS.

The office of vice consul is a subordinate office except during the absence from duty of the principal officer at the post, in which case the vice consulship becomes temporarily a substitute office. Vice consuls exercise and perform the duties of the consular offices to which they are attached, as stipulated in the Consular Regulations and laws of the United States, including the duties heretofore per-

formed by deputy consular officers. These duties will be performed under the direction of the principal consular officer when he is at his post of duty, and when he is absent the vice consul will assume full charge of the office under his bond. But a vice consul may be detailed by the Department for duty at a post in the district different from that at which the principal officer is stationed when the public interests so require.

In the case of offices to which it is necessary to assign more than one vice consul, the Department determines the relative rank of the vice consuls so assigned and designates which one of them shall

take charge of the office in the absence of the principal officer.

Vice consuls receive no compensation as such when the principal officer is at his post of duty, but when the principal officer is temporarily absent or relieved from duty, the vice consul lawfully authorized to assume charge of the consular office shall be entitled to receive in addition to any salary or compensation due him as a subordinate officer or employee an amount sufficient to make his compensation for the period he may be in charge of the office equal to fifty per centum of the salary of the principal officer for the period. In case no such officer shall at the time be so assigned, the additional compensation shall be computed on the basis of the salary of the principal officer last assigned to the post. A vice consul who receives no compensation as a subordinate officer or employee is entitled to compensation equal to fifty per centum of the salary of the principal officer assigned to the post for the period during which the vice consul shall be temporarily in charge of the post during the absence of the principal.

CONSULAR AGENTS.

A consular agent is an officer subordinate to a consul general or consul, exercising similar powers at a place different from that at which the consulate general or consulate is situated. He acts under the direction of his principal, and one-half of the fees collected by him constitute his compensation, which may not exceed \$1,000 in any one year. Consular agents pay the rent of their offices, the Government furnishing them with forms, record books, stationery, etc., for official use. A consular agent may engage in private business in the country of his official residence.

CONSULAR ASSISTANTS.

There are forty consular assistants, who are appointed by the President and hold office during good behavior. They may be assigned, from time to time, to such consular offices and with such duties as the Secretary of State may direct. When so assigned they are subordinate to the principal officer at the post, and perform such clerical or other duties of the office as he may designate. They receive a salary at the rate of \$1.500 for the first year of continuous service, \$1.650 for the second year of continuous service, \$1.800 for the third year, and \$2,000 for the fourth year of continuous service and for each year thereafter. Consular assistants are eligible for promotion to the grade of consul without further examination. It is the policy to designate only unmarried men between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-eight for examination to determine their eligibility for appointment to the corps of consular assistants.

CLERKS IN CONSULAR OFFICES.

Clerks are employed at the various consular offices and receive compensation varying, as a rule, from \$1.000 to \$2,000 a year, beginning with their arrival and entrance upon duty at the consular office. Their duties embrace bookkeeping, letter writing, recording correspondence, and routine consular work. It is usually required that they be stenographers and typewriters and possess a knowledge of the language of the country where they are employed. They are frequently appointed upon nomination of a consul general or consul, but the Department of State exercises its right to make independent appointments whenever that course appears to be in the interest of the service. American citizens only, single persons under thirty five years of age, are appointed to clerkships.

For such appointments no examination is required, but to become eligible for promotion to the grade of student interpreter, consular assistant, or vice consul de carrière a clerk in a consular office must pass the prescribed entrance examination.

STUDENT INTERPRETERS.

Provision is made for ten student interpreters at the legation to China, six at the embassy to Japan, and ten at the embassy to Turkey. These officers receive annual salaries of \$1,500 and allowances for tuition of \$350 each in China and \$200 each in Japan and Turkey, and are required to study the language

of the country with a view of becoming interpreters to the American diplomatic and consular offices in China; Japan, and Turkey. Only citizens of the United States, unmarried men between the ages of nineteen and twenty-six years, are examined for appointment as student interpreters. Upon receiving an appointment each student interpreter is required to sign an agreement to continue in the service as interpreter to the legations and consulates so long as his services may be required within a period of five years. After acquiring the language of the country, they may be assigned to duty in diplomatic or consular offices.

COMPENSATION OF CONSULAR OFFICERS.

All consuls-general and consuls are prohibited from engaging in private business in the country in which they have their official residence, and the Department may extend this prohibition to any other consular officer or employee. Consular officers are required to account for all fees collected by them, and the salaries fixed by law or regulation constitute their sole and only compensation, except as specially provided in the case of consular agents, who are compensated, up to the limit of \$1,000, by one-half of the fees collected by them.

TRAVELING EXPENSES.

Consular officers and clerks in consulates are allowed their necessary expenses of transportation, under such regulations as the Secretary of State may prescribe, in going to and returning from their posts or when traveling under orders of the Secretary of State, at the rate of not exceeding ten cents per mile, but not including any expense incurred in connection with leaves of absence. Consular assistants are allowed actual and necessary traveling expenses.

EXAMINATIONS.

As will be seen by reference to the foregoing regulations for promotion and examination, all candidates for the offices of consul of class 6 or 7, consul for economic investigational work, vice consult de carrière, consular assistant, and student interpreter, and also candidates for the offices of vice consult and consular agent who may desire to become eligible for promotion are required to pass the prescribed examination. Applicants for appointment as vice consult, not of career, consular agent, or clerk in the consular service are not required to be examined. Vice consuls, consular agents, and clerks can not, however, be promoted to be officers of career without having first passed the prescribed examination.

XXII.—REGULATIONS GOVERNING INTERPRETERS AND STUDENT INTERPRETERS IN CHINA, JAPAN, AND

[Issued by the Acting Sceretary of State, July 7, 1919.]

- r. Nature and purpose of the office.—Student interpreters are consular officers. The office of student interpreters was created for the purpose of facilitating the training of personnel for the consular service in China, Japan, and Turkey, where an essential part of the equipment of officers is a knowledge of the Chinese, Japanese, or Turkish language. Consistently with that purpose, student interpreters are required to study the Chinese, Japanese, or Turkish language, and such other languages and subjects as may be required by these regulations or subsequent instructions, with a view to supplying interpreters and vice consuls to the embassies, legations, and consulates in China. Japan, and Turkey, and eventually diplomatic and consular officers able to speak, read, and write the language of those countries.
- 2. Salary and allowances.—The salary of student interpreters has been fixed by law at \$1,500 a year. In addition to his salary each student in China is allowed \$350 per annum and in Japan and Turkey \$200 per annum for tuition, but this allowance ceases upon promotion of the student to the grade of interpreter. Interpreters are expected to bear their own expenses for tuition. In Japan and Turkey an allowance is made for payment of rent of quarters for student interpreters. In China furnished quarters are provided in premises owned by the United States. The cost of transportation between the United States and the post of duty and when traveling under orders of the Secretary of State, but not including travel in connection with leaves of absence, is reimbursed by the Government upon the submission of accounts in accordance with the Foreign Service Travel Regulations.
- 3. Eligibility for appointment.—In order to become eligible for appointment as a student interpreter it is necessary to be a citizen of the United States between the ages of 19 and 26, inclusive, unmarried, and to pass successfully the examination for student interpreter prescribed by the Executive order of June 27, 1906.
- 4. Method of selection and service agreement. The method of selecting persons for appointment as student interpreters is required by law to be nonpartisan, and each student interpreter appointed must sign an agreement to continue as interpreter for the Government so long as his services may be required within a period of five years.
- 5. Preliminary instruction.—After appointment student interpreters will report to the Department of State when directed to do so and will there receive preliminary instruction in regard to the duties of their office for a period of not more than 30 days.
- 6. Entrance on duty abroad.—Upon the completion of the preliminary instruction period the students will report for duty to the head of the diplomatic mission in China, Japan, or Turkey, as the case may be, or to such other place as may be designated, and, except as otherwise provided herein, will remain there two years.
- 7. Nature of duties.—After entering upon their duties at the mission or other place designated, students will devote their time to the study of the language of the country and the other subjects listed in paragraph 11, under the supervision of the head of the mission and under the immediate direction of the language secretary or other designated officer, to the end that they may acquire the ability to read, write, and speak the language as well as a good knowledge of the other subjects prescribed and thus qualify for duty as interpreters and subordinate consular officers at missions and consulates. In addition to the foregoing, students will be required at the same time to study the local business methods and trade practices and to acquire facility in the use of the typewriter. The study of consular law, regulations, and administration will be included after the first year.
- 8. Tenure of office.—The retention of students in the service will depend upon their progress in mastering the language and the other prescribed subjects and upon their industry and good conduct.
- 9. Progress examinations.—Students will be examined quarterly by the language officer of the mission, or other designated officer, and a report of the examinations will be made annually to the chief of mission and by him transmitted to the Secretary of State with his own report upon the general efficiency, dependability, loyalty, and good moral conduct of the students. The substance of these reports will be entered upon the records of the students in the Department of State.
- 10. Consequences of failure in progress examinations.—In forwarding to the Secretary of State the examination papers and ratings of each student at the end of the first year after the student's arrival at the diplomatic mission, the chief of the mission will attach to the examination papers a report setting forth

whether in his opinion and that of the language officer of the mission the student, by progress in his studies and by his conduct and bearing, has shown that he possesses the qualifications indispensable for successful work as an interpreter and as a consular officer. If his report should be unfavorable to the student, he will recommend either that the student be assigned to some subordinate position, the duties of which, in his judgment, the student may be capable of discharging, or that he be retired from the service

11. Examination for promotion.—At the end of two years after entry on duty at the mission, or earlier if in the judgment of the language secretary preparation therefor has been made, students may take the following examination for promotion to the grade of junior interpreter, the salary of which is \$2,500.

EXAMINATION A.—JUNIOR INTERPRETER.

(a) Chinese, Japanese, or Turkish language (moderately difficult conversation, official and commercial correspondence, and translation from newspapers and periodicals).

(b) Political history and political institutions of the country.

(c) Commercial geography of the country.

(d) Foreign trade of the country.

- (e) Elementary knowledge of such of the laws of the country as pertain to the duties which the student may ultimately be called upon to perform as a consular officer.
- (f) Elementary law of American citizenship and the elements of practice in handling consular invoices.
- (q) French language (for students in Turkey).

12. Method of examination.—These examinations shall be held by a board composed of the language officer, one consular officer, and one qualified American designated by the head of the mission. The examinations shall be both oral and written, and in order to pass students must receive a rating of 80 in a scale of 100.

The findings of the board, accompanied by the papers in the written examinations and a detailed report of the special qualifications, industry, moral conduct, and dependableness of each student will be made by the head of the mission to the Secretary of State for consideration and approval. Inasmuch as the findings of the board are not effective until approved, no information in regard to the ratings given by the board should be communicated to the candidates except upon the specific authority of the Secretary of State.

All examinations will take place at the diplomatic mission in the country of which the students are studying the language unless orders to the contrary are issued by the Secretary of State. In the event that the exigencies of the service shall not permit students who may have been detailed elsewhere to return to Tokyo. Peking, or Constantinople for the purpose of examination, the head of the mission may, after the preparation of the papers by the language officer, mail them in personal and sealed envelopes to the officer in charge of the post at which the student is serving, which officer shall conduct the written examinations in the same manner as if they were being held at the diplomatic mission, leaving the oral part of the examination to be taken at the diplomatic mission or elsewhere when feasible, as the Secretary of State may determine in each case.

13. Effect of failure in examination.—If at the completion of the first period of two years' study the student shall be unable to pass the prescribed examination, he shall be permitted, at the discretion of the chief of mission and language officer, to continue his studies at the mission for not more than one year longer. If he shall still be unable to pass the examination he shall be ordered to the United States and his separation from the service shall become immediately effective.

INTERPRETERS.

- 14. Appointment.—Student interpreters who successfully pass examination A, and whose efficiency records are in other respects satisfactory will be promoted to the grade of junior interpreter in the Consular Service or vice consul of career, whichever the Secretary of State may in his discretion determine, subject, however, to the rule that promotion to the grades of junior interpreter or vice consul may not be made until the student shall have attained the legal age of 21 years.
- 15. Salary and allowances.—The salary of the grade of junior interpreter or vice consul of career to which student interpreters are eligible for promotion is \$2,500. Junior interpreters and vice consuls who have attained said grades by promotion from the grade of student interpreter may in time, upon passing the prescribed examination, be promoted to the grade of senior interpreter or the equivalent

grade of vice consul of career at a salary of \$3,000 per annum, after which they will be eligible to appointment as consul of Class VI (\$3,500). No allowance is made to junior and senior interpreters, and vice consuls for tuition or for quarters, but expenses of travel between the United States and the post of duty abroad, or when traveling under orders of the Secretary of State, but not including travel in connection with leaves of absence, will be reimbursed upon the submission of accounts in accordance with the Foreign Service Travel Regulations.

- 16. Duties.—Interpreters and vice consuls are subordinate to the consular officer in charge of the post to which they may be assigned, and it will be their duty to perform, under his direction, the work of translating and interpreting and such other duties in the office as may in the judgment of the officer in charge be necessary, including the preparation of accounts, the drafting of correspondence, the filing and recording of correspondence, the certification of invoices, notarial work, the handling of citizenship and passport cases, the coding and decoding of telegrams, and the preparation of trade reports; provided that until he shall have reached the grade of senior interpreter or the corresponding grade of vice consul, each interpreter shall be given one hour each day, within the established office hours, to be used for the purpose of study, unless in the judgment of the officer in charge of the post, the volume of business of the office renders this course impracticable.
- 17. Examination for promotion.—At the expiration of two years after appointment to the grade of junior interpreter, or equivalent grade of vice consul of career, or earlier, if in the judgment of the language officer of the mission preparation therefor has been made, the following examination may be taken for promotion to the grade of senior interpreter or equivalent grade of vice consul of career, the salary of which grade is \$3,000 per annum.

EXAMINATION B .- SENIOR INTERPRETER.

- 1. Advanced Chinese, Japanese, or Turkish (conversation, composition, and translation from newspapers and current periodicals).
- 2. Political history and political institutions of the country.
- 3. Commercial geography, resources, and industries of the country.
- 4. Foreign trade of the country.
- 5. Elementary knowledge of the law of the country as affecting foreigners6. International and commercial law.
- 7. Consular regulations and practice.
- 8. French language (conversation, translation, and composition) for students in Turkey.
- 18. Method of examination.—The method of examination will be that prescribed for the grade of junior interpreter which is described in paragraph 12 of these regulations.
- 19. Promotion.—Upon successfully passing the foregoing examination junior interpreters will be promoted to the grade of senior interpreter, the corresponding grade of vice consul, assistant assessor on the mixed court at Shanghai, or vice consul, who shall, when necessary, discharge the duties of assistant language secretary of the diplomatic mission, the salary of these positions being \$3,000 a year. Thereafter said senior interpreters, vice consuls, or assistant assessors shall be eligible for promotion on the basis of efficiency as shown in the service and without further examination to the grade of language secretary at the diplomatic mission, assessor of the mixed court at Shanghai, or consul of Class VI, the salary of the first being \$3,600 and of the last two \$3,500.

GENERAL.

- 20. Speedy advancement encouraged.—The chiefs of diplomatic missions, as well as consuls general and consuls, are expected to exert every proper effort to encourage student interpreters and interpreters consistently with the other responsibilities placed upon them by these regulations to apply themselves industriously to the task of qualifying for their examinations in order that the foreign service organization in the three countries mentioned may as speedily as possible be equipped with men conversant with the language, history, and institutions of the countries in which they are stationed.
- 21. Advisory control of chiefs of mission.—The chiefs of mission may exercise advisory control over the movements of the student interpreters and interpreters and recommend to the Secretary of State such transfer as may, in their judgment, serve the best interests of the Diplomatic and Consular Service and also have a broadening influence on the students and interpreters themselves by enabling them to acquire an intimate knowledge of conditions throughout the countries in which they are stationed. Chiefs of mission have no authority to transfer students and interpreters without the express approval of the Secretary of State in each instance.

- 22. Performance of office work by students.—Students attached to a mission may be required, in the discretion of the chief of mission, to perform some minor part of the official work of the mission, preference being given to consular work, to the end that they may gain useful knowledge of the mode of transacting official business and of the forms and practices employed therein. In Turkey work in the consulate general at Constantinople will, as far as practicable, be substituted for work in the embassy. The chief of mission will be careful, however, not to permit duties of the character mentioned to interfere with the duties of the student in acquiring a thorough knowledge of the language of the country.
- 23. Injunction against marriage.—It is desired that student interpreters and interpreters shall not marry until they shall have been in the service for a period of at least four years and shall have attained a position in the service with salary sufficient to justify them in assuming the financial responsibilities of a family.
- 24. Leaves of absence. Officers who have been promoted to the rank of junior interpreter may be granted leave of absence for a period not to exceed 60 days, exclusive of transit time, when permission to visit the United States is expressly granted. The application for said leave of absence shall be made to the Secretary of State and must receive the approval of the officer under whom the interpreter may be serving at the time. Subsequent to the first leave of absence after the promotion to the grade of interpreter the provisions of the consular regulations governing leaves of absence will apply to the members of the corps of interpreters and vice consuls.
- 25. Efficiency records.—The officers under whom students, interpreters, and vice consuls serve are required to submit annually reports upon the efficiency and conduct of each of said officers, and efficiency records for students, interpreters, and vice consuls are kept in the Department of State along with like records for other diplomatic and consular officers.

The Department is not able definitely to forecast when vacancies in the service may occur.

Dependent upon the number of candidates, the examination lasts from three to six days. The written part of the examination covers a period of two days of six hours each. The first four subjects will be given on the first day, and the remaining subjects on the day following, probably in the order presented in the sample examination.

XXXVII. INTERNATIONAL TRIBUNALS OF EGYPT.

In 1876, as the result of negotiations between the Ottoman and Egyptian Governments and the various Christian powers having representatives at Cairo, certain courts were created in Egypt for the trial of civil and compercial causes arising between natives and foreigners of different nationality, as well as all question of createstate between any person and suits of foreigners against the Egyptian results of the Khedival family. These mixed tribunals, in civil matters within their exclusive jurisd control on, superseded the consular courts. A mixed tribunal consists of five judges, three of whom are for generated two natives. The foreign judges are appointed by the Khedive on the recommendation of the great powers, each of which is represented by from one to three judges. There are three tribunals of original jurisdiction (first instance), one each at Cairo, Alexandria, and Mansura, and a court of appeals at Alexandria. 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
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
