1. ORGANIZATION OF THE DEPARTMENT

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE

The Secretary of State is charged, under the direction of the President, with the duties appertaining to correspondence with the public ministers and the consuls of the United States and with the representatives of foreign powers accredited to the United States, and to negotiations of whatever character, relating to the foreign affairs of the United States. He is also the medium of correspondence between the President and the chief executives of the several States of the United States; he has the custody of the seal of the United States, and countersigns and affixes such seal to all treaties, Executive proclamations, to various commissions, and to warrants for the extradition of fugitives from justice. He is regarded as the first in rank among the members of the Cabinet. He is also the custodian of the treaties made with foreign States and of the laws of the United States. He grants and issues passports, and exequaturs to foreign consuls in the United States are issued through his office. He publishes the laws and resolutions of Congress, amendments to the Constitution, and proclamations declaring the admission of new States into the Union.

The Undersecretary of State is the principal assistant of the Secretary of State in the discharge of his various functions, aiding in the formulation and execution of the foreign policies of the Government, in the reception of representatives of foreign governments, etc. In matters which do not require the personal attention of the Secretary of State he acts for the Secretary of State, and in the absence of the Secretary of State he becomes the Acting Secretary of State. OFFICE OF THE SOLICITOR

Drafts and interprets treaties, conventions, protocols, and other international agreements; deals with questions of municipal, foreign, and international law, and handles diplomatic claims of American citizens against foreign governments; claims of foreigners against the Government of the United States; questions of personal and private rights of aliens in the United States and of American citizens in foreign countries, such as acquisition, inheritance, and transfer of property; arrest, detention, fines, imprisonment, personal injury, acts of insurgents, taxation, breach or annulment of concessions or other contracts; failure to pay interest or principal on Government obligations, sequestration or confiscation of property; complaints regarding action of executive, legislative, judicial, or military authorities; questions concerning the rights and privileges of American diplomatic and consular officers abroad and of foreign diplomatic and consular officers in the United States, and concerning the rights and immunities of sovereigns and public property; questions relating to the jurisdiction over and control of public or private vessels; questions relating to citizenship, naturalization, expatriation, extradition, and extraterritoriality; questions relating to the acts and rights of belligerents, neutrals, and insurgents on land or sea; and a large number of miscellaneous legal questions not included in the above classification.

FOREIGN SERVICE PERSONNEL BOARD

The duties of the Foreign Service Personnel Board, under the Executive order of September 11, 1929, are to submit to the Secretary of State (a) names of Foreign Service officers whose records entitle them to promotion and who are recommended for promotion, and the names of officers and employees of the Department of State who have served continuously therein for five years, and who are recommended, because of special ability and merit, for transfer to the office of Foreign Service officer, (b) names of Foreign Service officers who have demonstrated special capacity for promotion to the grade of minister, and (c) names of Foreign Service officers recommended for designation as counselors of embassy or legation; to recommend assignments and transfers of Foreign Service officers; to consider controversies and delinquencies among Foreign Service personnel, and to recommend proper disciplinary measures.

DIVISION OF FOREIGN SERVICE PERSONNEL

The duties of the Division of Foreign Service Personnel are: To maintain contact with Foreign Service officers and employees while on visits to the United States; to discuss with Foreign Service officers ways for the development and improvement of their work; to confer with the geographical divisions of the Department concerning the work of Foreign Service officers; to interview applicants and prospective applicants for the Foreign Service; to examine and recommend for appointment applicants for positions as subordinate employees in the Foreign Service; to collect, collate, and record pertinent data relating to Foreign Service personnel; to keep the efficiency records of all Foreign Service officers and employees; to hold strictly confidential all personnel records of the Foreign Service, and to reveal no papers, documents, data, or reports relating thereto, except to the Secretary of State and to the members of the Personnel Board; to keep the records of the Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service and attend to all details connected with the holding of examinations for the Foreign Service; to submit recommendations on all matters within the authority of the Personnel Board; to attend, through the personnel officers assigned to the division, the meetings of the Personnel Board when so directed.

The port and municipality of Santos and the municipality of São Vicente in the State of São Paulo, and the State of Santa Catharina

São Paulo

The State of São Paulo, excepting the port and municipality of Santos and the municipality of São Vicente, and the States of Paraná and Matto Grosso.

Amoy, Fukien

That portion of the Province of Fukien comprised in the prefectures of Tingchowfu, Changehoufu, and Chiianchowfu, and the independent subprefecture of Lungyenchow

Canton, Kwangtung

The Provinces of Kwangsi and Kweichow and that portion of the Province of Kwangtung west of longitude 115°; the Portuguese colony of Macau.

Chefoo, Shantung

The Laichow Prefecture, except the Department of Pingtu and all of the Province of Shantung lying east and north of a line drawn from Laichow to the easternmost point in the boundary of the former leased territory of Kiaoehow.

Dairen, Manchuria¹

The Japanese leased territory of Kwangtung

Foochow, Fukien

The whole of the Province of Fukien except the four prefectures forming the consular district of Amoy.

Hankow, Hupeh

The Province of Honan south of the Yellow River and the whole of the Provinces of Hunan, Szechwan, Hupeh, Kiangsi, Shensi, and Kansu, the Kokonor region, Sinkiang (Turkestan), and all of Tibet except that portion of southeastern Tibet in the vicinity of Batang.

Harbin, Kirin, Manchuria

All of the Province of Hellungkiang; and all that part of the Province of Kirin lying to the north of the parallel of 44° north latitude, including the following places in Kirin which are open to trade: Harbin, Ninguta, Sansing, and Suifenho.

Hong Kong²

The British colony of Hong Kong.

Mukden, Liaoning, Manchuria

All of the Province of Liaoning (Fengtien) except the leased territory of Kwangtung; and all that part of the Province of Kirin lying to the south of the parallel of 44° north latitude, including the following places in Kirin which are open to trade: Changchun (Kwanchengtze), Hunchun, Kirin, Lungchingtsun, Towaokow, Wangching (Paitsaokow), and Yenki (Chützuehieh).

Nanking, Kiangsu

The whole of the Province of Anhwei and all of the Province of Kiangsu north of the Yangtze River, and two prefectures south of the same (Kiangning and Chenkiang).

Saigon, French Indo-China³

All of French Indo-China.

Shanghai, Kiangsu

Swatow, Kwangtung

That portion of the Province of Kwangtung east of longitude 115°.

Tientsin, Hopei

The Provinces of Hopei (Chihli) and Shansi, that portion of the Province of Honan north of the Yellow River, and all of Mongolia including the [special] administrative districts of Suiyuan, Chahar, and Jehol.

Tsinan, Shantung

That portion of the Province of Shantung, except the former leased territory of Kiaochow, not included in the consular district of Chefoo.

Tsingtao, Kiaochow

The former leased territory of Kiaochow

Yunnan-fu, Yunnan

The Province of Yunnan and that portion of southeastern Tibet in the vicinity of Batang.

COLOMBIA**Barranquilla**

The Department of Atlántico; the Department of Magdalena, except in the part lying north of the Sierra de Santa Marta and adjacent to the Santa Marta Railway as far as the Magdalena River; the Departments of Santander del Norte, Santander, Cundinamarca, and Boyacá; the Intendencia of Meta; and the Comisarías of Arauca, Caquetá, Vaupés, and Vichada.

Medellín (vice consulate): the Department of Antioquia, except the northwestern portion which is drained by the Sinu and Atrato Rivers and along the Caribbean Sea.

Buenaventura

The Department of Naríño; those portions of the Departments of Cauca and Valle which drain into the Pacific Ocean and lie west of the Cordillera Occidental; and the Intendencia of Chocó south of a line drawn from Cape Corrientes to the juncture of the boundaries of the Intendencia of Chocó and the Departments of Antioquia and Caldas.

Cali

The Comisarías of Putumayo and Amazonas; the Departments of Huila, Tolima, and Caldas; and the portions of the Departments of Cauca and Valle lying in the Cauca River basin and east of the Cordillera Occidental.

Cartagena

The Department of Bolívar; the northwestern portion of the Department of Antioquia which is drained by the Atrato and Sinu Rivers and along the Caribbean Sea; the Intendencia of Chocó north of a line drawn from Cape Corrientes to the juncture of the boundaries of the Intendencia of Chocó and the Departments of Antioquia and Caldas; and the Intendencia of San Andrés y Providencia.

Santa Marta

The Department of Magdalena lying north of the Sierra de Santa Marta and adjacent to the Santa Marta Railway as far as the Magdalena River; and the Comisaría of Goajira.

Department of Alpes-Maritimes and the Principality of Monaco.

Straasbourg

The Free State and City of Bremen (except the city of Bremerhaven), the Prussian Province of Hanover (except the city of Wesermünde), the State of Brunswick, the State of Oldenburg except the exclaves of Landsteil Birkenfeld and Landsteil Lübeck, and the Kreis Rinteln belonging to the Prussian Province of Hesse-Nassau.

Brømerhaven (vice consulate): The city of Brømerhaven in the Free State of Bremen, and Stadtkreis Wesermünde (Lehe and Oestemünde) in the Prussian Province of Hanover.

Breslau

The Prussian Provinces of Upper and Lower Silesia.

Cologne

The Rhine Province (not including jurisdiction over Saar Basin Territory which is subject to eventual plebiscites), the enclave of Landesteil Birkenfeld belonging to the State of Oldenburg, the Prussian Province of Westphalia, and the States of Schaumburg-Lippe, Lippe, and Waldeck.

Dresden

The State of Saxony, with the exception of the Kreisauptmannschaft of Leipzig.

Frankfort-on-the-Main

The Prussian Province of Hesse-Nassau except the exclaves of Kreis Rinteln and Kreis Schmalkalden, the State of Hesse, and the Bavarian Palatinate (Pfalz) (not including jurisdiction over Saar Basin Territory which is subject to eventual plebiscites).

Hamburg

The Free State and City of Hamburg, the Prussian Province of Schleswig-Holstein, the States of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, Mecklenburg-Strelitz, and Lübeck, and Landesteil Lübeck belonging to the State of Oldenburg.

Leipzig

The Kreisauptmannschaft of Leipzig in the State of Saxony, the States of Thuringia and Anhalt, the Prussian Province of Saxony, and the Kreis of Schmalkalden belonging to the Prussian Province of Hesse-Nassau.

Munich

The State of Bavaria with the exception of the Bavarian Palatinate (Pfalz).

Stuttgart

Bradford, England

That part of Yorkshire (portions of the administrative counties of West Riding and North Riding) comprised within the following boundaries: Beginning at the point common to the boundaries of Yorkshire, Cheshire, and Derbyshire, thence following the Yorkshire boundary westwardly and northwardly to the point where a straight line drawn from Colne (Lancashire) to Hawes (North Riding) intersects the Lancashire-West Riding

boundary; thence northwardly along said line to the boundary between the West Riding and the North Riding of Yorkshire; thence northwardly along said boundary to the Westmorland boundary; thence northwardly and eastwardly along the Yorkshire boundary (North Riding) to a point due north of Richmond; thence due south to Richmond (included); thence southeasterly to the City of York (the entire county borough of York being included); thence southwardly along the boundary between the West Riding and the East Riding to Selby (excluded); thence following the same boundary to Goole (excluded); thence southwestwardly to Thorne (excluded); thence westwardly through Barnsley (excluded) and Penistone (excluded) to the point of beginning.

Bristol, England

All of Gloucestershire and Somersetshire, and those portions of Wiltshire and Berkshire lying to the northwest of a line drawn from the point common to the boundaries of Wiltshire, Somersetshire, and Dorsetshire northeastwardly to Marlborough (excluded); and continued northeastwardly through Didcot (excluded) to the Berkshire-Oxfordshire boundary.

Cardiff, Wales

In Wales the counties of Brecknock, Cardigan, Carmarthen, Glamorgan, Pembroke, and Radnor; in England, Herefordshire and Monmouthshire.

Dundee, Scotland

The counties of Forfar, Perth, Kincardine, Aberdeen, Banff, Elgin, Nairn, Sutherland, Caithness, Orkney, Shetland, Ross and Cromarty, and that portion of the county of Inverness north of a line from Rannoch following the railroad via Tulloch and Spear Bridge to Gairloch Inn (all excluded) on the Caledonian Canal, thence northeast to the outlet of Loch Arkaig into Loch Lochy, thence westward by the river Dessary and Loch Nevis to the sea, and including all of the Hebrides or Westward Islands (comprising parts of the counties of Inverness, Ross and Cromarty); also that portion of county Fife to the north and east of a line connecting Newburgh on the Tay, Collesie, Cupar, Ceres, and Lower Largo on the Firth of Forth via the main road, these and all other towns on the main road being included in the Dundee consular district.

Edinburgh, Scotland

The counties of Edinburgh, Linlithgow, Haddington, Peebles, Selkirk, Dumfries, Roxburgh, Berwick, Kinross, and Clackmannan, and that portion of county Fife to the south and west of a line connecting Newburgh on the Tay, Collesie, Cupar, Ceres, and Lower Largo on the Firth of Forth, via the main road, these and all other towns on the main road being excluded.

Glasgow, Scotland

The counties of Lanark, Renfrew, Dumbarton, Stirling, Argyll, Bute, Ayr, Kirkcudbright, and Wigtown, and that portion of the county of Inverness south of a line from Rannoch following the railroad via Tulloch and Spear Bridge to Gairloch Inn (all included) on the Caledonian Canal, thence northeast to the outlet of Loch Arkaig into Loch Lochy, thence westwardly by the river Dessary and Loch Nevis to the sea

Hull, England

All of the East Riding and portions of the North Riding and West Riding of Yorkshire, together with a portion of the administrative county known as the Parts of Lindsey in Lincolnshire which lie within the following line: Beginning at Saltfleet (included) on the Lincolnshire coast, a line drawn westwardly

to the point common to the boundaries of Lincolnshire, Yorkshire, and Nottinghamshire; thence northwardly to Thorne (included) and Goole (included); thence along the East Riding-West Riding boundary to Selby (included); thence along the same boundary to the City of York (excluded); thence in a straight line northwardly to Richmond (excluded); thence due north to the Yorkshire boundary; thence eastwardly along the Yorkshire boundary to the sea, but excepting the City (county borough) of Middlesbrough.

Liverpool, England

Those portions of Shropshire, Cheshire, Lancashire and Cumberland lying within a line drawn from the point where the River Severn cuts the western boundary of Shropshire; north-eastwardly to Market Drayton (included); thence eastwardly by the northern boundary of Staffordshire to Harecastle, thence northwardly to Middlewich (included); thence north-westwardly through Warrington (included), Wigan (excluded), Preston (excluded), and Lancaster (excluded), and extending in a straight line across a portion of Morecambe Bay to the southernmost point of Westmorland on the coast; thence along the Lancashire-Westmorland boundary northwardly and westwardly to the Cumberland boundary; thence north-westwardly to St. Bees Head; and the following counties in Wales: Anglesey, Carnarvonshire, Denbighshire, Flintshire, Merionethshire, and Montgomeryshire; and the Isle of Man.

London, England

All of Norfolk, Cambridgeshire (including the Isle of Ely), Huntingdonshire, Bedfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire, Surrey, East Sussex, and all counties to the east thereof (Essex Hertfordshire, Kent, London, Middlesex, East Suffolk, and West Suffolk); that portion of Berkshire to the east of a line drawn through Reading (included) to the Surrey-Hampshire boundary; and that portion of West Sussex to the east of a line drawn from the Surrey-Hampshire boundary southeastwardly to Littlehampton (included).

Manchester, England

Those portions of Cheshire, Lancashire, and the West Riding of Yorkshire, comprised within a line beginning at the point common to the boundaries of Cheshire, Derbyshire, and Staffordshire; thence northwardly along the eastern boundary of Cheshire and Lancashire to the point where a straight line drawn from Colne (Lancashire) to Hawes (North Riding of Yorkshire) intersects the Lancashire-West Riding boundary; thence northwardly along said line to the boundary between the West Riding and the North Riding of Yorkshire; thence westwardly along said West Riding-North Riding boundary to the Westmorland boundary; thence along the southern boundary of Westmorland to the sea; thence in a line drawn southeastwardly through Lancaster (included), Preston (included), Wigan (included), Warrington (excluded) and Middlewich (excluded) to the Staffordshire boundary at Harecastle, and thence eastwardly by the north boundary of Staffordshire to the point of beginning.

Newcastle-on-Tyne, England

All of Durham, Northumberland, and Westmorland; that part of Cumberland to the north of a line drawn from the point common to the boundaries of Cumberland, Lancashire and Westmorland north-westwardly to St. Bees Head; and the city (county borough) of Middlesbrough in the North Riding of Yorkshire.

Plymouth, England

The counties of Devon and Cornwall (including the Scilly Isles).

Sheffield, England

All of Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, and, in Lincolnshire, the Parts of Kesteven, and the Parts of Holland; and those portions of the West Riding of Yorkshire and the Parts of Lindsey in Lincolnshire lying to the south of a line drawn from the point common to the boundaries of Yorkshire, Derbyshire and Cheshire, eastwardly through Penistone (included) and Barnsley (included) to Thorne (excluded); thence southwardly to the Lincolnshire-Nottinghamshire boundary; thence eastwardly to the sea at Saltfleet (excluded).

Southampton, England

All of Hampshire (administrative county of Southampton and the Isle of Wight); all of Dorsetshire; and those portions of Wiltshire and Berkshire lying to the south of a line drawn from a point common to the boundaries of Wiltshire, Dorsetshire, and Somersetshire, northeastwardly to Marlborough in Wiltshire (included), and continued through Didcot, in Berkshire (included) to the Berkshire-Oxfordshire boundary; thence southwardly along said boundary to Reading, and thence south-eastwardly from Reading (excluded) to the Hampshire-Surrey boundary; that portion of West Sussex which lies west of a line drawn from the Hampshire-Surrey boundary southeastwardly to Littlehampton (excluded); and the Channel Islands.

Madras Presidency, native States of Hyderabad, Mysore, Travancore, Cochin, and Coor.

That part of the State of Sonora lying north of latitude 29° east of 113° west longitude, and west of 110° west longitude and including the territory immediately tributary to the Cananea-Naco Railway.

Nuevo Laredo, Tamaulipas

That part of the State of Nuevo León lying north of a line passing through, but excluding, Golondrinas, in a direction slightly south of east through Faras (included); and that part of the State of Tamaulipas to the north of a line drawn east and west just to the north of Mier on the Rio Grande.

Piedras Negras, Coahuila

That part of the State of Coahuila lying to the north and east of a line drawn on the parallel of 28° north latitude from the Chihuahua boundary due east as far as La Fe; thence south-eastwardly from La Fe (excluded) to Cuatro Ciénegas (included); thence directly east through a point just south of Monclova to the Nuevo León boundary.

Progreso, Yucatan

The States of Campeche and Yucatan; and the territory of Quintana Roo.

6. TARIFF OF UNITED STATES CONSULAR FEES¹

The following Tariff of United States Consular Fees is prescribed by the President under authority of section 1745, Revised Statutes, as amended by the Acts of April 5, 1906, c. 1366, sections 7, 8 and 9, 34 Stat. 101, and June 4, 1920, c. 223, sections 1 and 2, 41 Stat. 750, to be charged by consular officers for official services. All charges for such services must be in strict accordance with this tariff, and be collected in the coin of the United States or at its representative value in exchange. No fee or compensation will be collected for any service not covered by this tariff.

The fees in this tariff are not prescribed for American vessels and seamen, because they are exempted by law from the payment of consular fees. Consular agents will make the fees in this tariff a basis of collection from the Treasury for services to such vessels. Foreign-built vessels, unregistered, owned by American citizens, and vessels documented under the laws of the Philippine Islands are not exempt from the payment of the fees prescribed herein.

Services, except those for which fees are fixed in items 8, 9 and 10, under this tariff shall be rendered free of charge when performed: (a) in connection with the settlement of the estate of any employee of the United States dying abroad while on official duty; (b) for the use of any person in the collection of claims from the United States or from any State for compensation, pensions, backpay, bounty, bonus, property loss in the service of the United States; (c) for obtaining the return of property held by the Alien Property Custodian; and (d) for the official use of the United States Veterans' Bureau.

Consular officers must require all fees to be paid in advance and before the stamps are canceled, except in case of attendance out of office or of commissions, when the amount can not be determined until the service is performed. Advance deposits to cover fees in such latter cases may be accepted but in no other.

This tariff is effective July 1, 1929, and should be posted in a conspicuous place in consular offices as required by section 1731, Revised Statutes.

7. DISPOSITION OF FEES AND COMPENSATION OF CONSULAR AGENTS AND VICE CONSULS

The act for the reorganization of the consular service of the United States, approved April 5, 1906, provides:

SEC. 8. That all fees, official or unofficial, received by any officer in the consular service for services rendered in connection with the duties of his office or as a consular officer, including fees for notarial services, and fees for taking depositions, executing commissions or letters rogatory, settling estates, receiving or paying out moneys, caring for or disposing of property, shall be accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the United States, and the sole and only compensation of such officers shall be by salaries fixed by law; but this shall not apply to consular agents, who shall be paid by one-half of the fees received in their offices, up to a maximum sum of one thousand dollars in any one year, the other half being accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the United States.

The act for the reorganization and improvement of the Foreign Service of the United States approved May 24, 1924, amends the act of April 5, 1906, as follows:

SEC. 11. That the provisions of sections 8 and 10 of the act of April 5, 1906, relative to official fees and the method of accounting therefor shall include both branches of the Foreign Service.

The act for the reorganization and improvement of the Foreign Service of the United States approved May 24, 1924, amends section 1685 of the Revised Statutes as amended by the act entitled "An act for the improvement of the Foreign Service, approved February 5, 1915," to read as follows:

SEC. 1685. That for such time as any Foreign Service officer shall be lawfully authorized to act as chargé d'affaires ad interim or to assume charge of a consulate general or consulate during the absence of the principal officer at the post to which he shall have been assigned, he shall, if his salary is less than one-half that of such principal officer, receive in addition to his salary as Foreign Service officer compensation equal to the difference between such salary and one-half of the salary provided by law for the ambassador, minister, or principal consular officer as the case may be.

MIXED TRIBUNALS OF EGYPT

In 1876, as the result of negotiations between the Ottoman and Egyptian Governments and the various Christian powers represented at Cairo, courts were created in Egypt having sole jurisdiction in the trial of civil and commercial causes arising between natives and foreigners or between foreigners of different nationality, in all questions of real estate, and in suits of foreigners against the Egyptian Government or members of the Khedival (now Royal) family. These mixed tribunals, in matters within their exclusive jurisdiction, are taking the place of the consular courts which continue to exercise general criminal jurisdiction over their nationals, to decide matters involving the civil status of their nationals, and to adjudicate civil and commercial suits to which their nationals exclusively are parties. There are three tribunals of original jurisdiction (first instance), one each at Cairo, Alexandria, and Mansura, and a court of appeals at Alexandria. The judiciary is made up of foreign and Egyptian judges, at present 65 in number, 16 of whom serve on the bench of the court of appeals. Judgments in the lower courts are rendered by three judges, of whom two are foreigners, in the court of appeals by five judges, of whom three are foreigners. The foreign judges are appointed by the King of Egypt on the recommendation of their respective governments. The United States is represented in these courts by the following judges:

DIPLOMATIC AGENTS PRIOR TO 1789¹

JOHN ADAMS, of Massachusetts

Joint commissioner to court of France, November 28, 1777, elected to replace Silas Deane on commission with Benjamin Franklin and Arthur Lee; commission dissolved, September 14, 1778, upon appointment of Benjamin Franklin as sole minister plenipotentiary.

Minister plenipotentiary, September 27, 1779, to negotiate a treaty of peace and commerce with Great Britain; reached Paris, February 9, 1780.

Authorized by Congress, June 20, 1780, to negotiate in the Netherlands for a loan of ten million dollars, in place of Henry Laurens and until he should arrive in Europe.

Minister plenipotentiary, December 29, 1780, commissioned to negotiate treaty of amity and commerce with the Netherlands, but was unsuccessful at that time; new powers conferred by Congress, August 16, 1781, and treaty of commerce signed at The Hague, October 8, 1782; returned to Paris, October 26, 1782.

Joint commissioner, June 14, 1781, with Benjamin Franklin, John Jay, and Henry Laurens,² to negotiate a peace treaty with Great Britain; preliminary articles signed at Paris, November 30, 1782; definitive treaty signed, September 3, 1783.

Joint minister plenipotentiary, May 12, 1784, with Benjamin Franklin and Thomas Jefferson, to negotiate treaties of amity and commerce with European countries and the Barbary States; signed treaty of amity and commerce with Prussia, August 5, 1785; and treaty with Morocco, January 25, 1787.

Minister plenipotentiary to Great Britain, February 24, 1785.

THOMAS BARCLAY, of Pennsylvania

Vice consul in France, June 26, 1781, elected by Congress to act until the arrival of the consul general; ³ commissioned as vice consul, July 10, 1781.

Consul general in France, October 5, 1781.

Commissioner, November 18, 1782, "with full power and authority to liquidate and finally settle the accounts of all the servants of the United States who have been intrusted with the expenditure of publick money in Europe, and all other accounts of the United States in Europe."

Agent, appointed, October 5, 1785, by John Adams and, October 11, 1785, by Thomas Jefferson ⁴ to negotiate a treaty with Morocco; he was accompanied by a secretary, Colonel Franks.⁵ The concluded treaty was delivered to him by the Moroccan authorities on the "first day of the blessed month of Ramadan," or June 28, 1786, and was signed by John Adams and Thomas Jefferson in January, 1787.

WILLIAM CARMICHAEL, of Maryland

Assistant to Silas Deane, spring of 1776, while Deane was secret agent of Congress at Paris.

Traveled to Berlin, fall of 1776, in American interests.

Secretary to commissioners in France, November 28, 1777, but did not act in this capacity; returned to the United States, May, 1778.

Secretary, September 28, 1779, to minister plenipotentiary to negotiate a treaty of amity and commerce and of alliance with the court of Spain.

Chargé d'affaires in Spain, May 20, 1782; ⁶ received formally, February 20, 1783; presented to King, August 23, 1783; commissioned, April 20, 1790.

FRANCIS DANA, of Massachusetts

Secretary, September 28, 1779, to the minister plenipotentiary to negotiate treaties of peace and of commerce with Great Britain; reached Paris, February 9, 1780.

Alternate, June 20, 1780, to John Adams to negotiate a loan in the Netherlands.

Minister plenipotentiary to Russia, December 19, 1780; although he was in St. Petersburg from August, 1781, to September, 1783, he was not recognized at the Russian court.

SILAS DEANE, of Connecticut

Secret agent to France, March 3, 1776, appointed by Committee of Secret Correspondence of the Continental Congress; arrived in France, May 4, 1776.

Joint commissioner to the court of France, September 26, 1776, with Benjamin Franklin and Arthur Lee; recalled by resolution of Congress, December 8, 1777; signed, with other commissioners, treaties of commerce and alliance with France, February 6, 1778.

CHARLES WILLIAM FREDERICK DUMAS, of Switzerland and the Netherlands⁷

Secret correspondent, December 19, 1775, employed by the Committee of Secret Correspondence of the Continental Congress. Acted as secretary to John Adams, 1781-1782, when he was minister plenipotentiary to the Netherlands.

Acted as chargé d'affaires in the Netherlands upon the departure of John Adams, October 26, 1782; exchanged ratifications of treaty with the Netherlands on behalf of the United States.

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, of Pennsylvania

Joint commissioner to court of France, September 26, 1776, with Silas Deane and Arthur Lee; signed, with other commissioners, treaties of commerce and alliance with France, February 6, 1778.

¹ In addition to the secret agents included in this table the following persons, among others, also acted as secret correspondents of the Continental Congress: Jonathan Loring Austin, Edward Bancroft, William Bingham, William Bollan, William Hodge, William Lee, Thomas Morris, and Thomas Story.

Joint minister plenipotentiary, May 12, 1784, with Thomas Jefferson and John Adams, to negotiate treaties of amity and commerce with European countries and the Barbary States; signed treaty with Prussia, in Paris, July 9, 1785.

DAVID HUMPHREYS, of Connecticut

Secretary, May 12, 1784, to commission for negotiating treaties of amity and commerce with European countries and the Barbary States.²

RALPH IZARD, of South Carolina

Commissioner to court of Tuscany, May 7, 1777; commissioned, July 1, 1777, but was never received at court; empowered to negotiate a loan from Tuscany, February 4, 1778, but was unsuccessful; mission ended by Congress, June 8, 1779.

JOHN JAY, of New York³

Minister plenipotentiary to the court of Spain, September 27, 1779; letter of credence approved by Congress, October 15, 1779; left Madrid for Paris, May 20, 1782.

Joint commissioner, June 13, 1781, with John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, and Henry Laurens,¹ to negotiate a peace treaty with Great Britain; preliminary articles signed, November 30, 1782; definitive treaty signed, September 3, 1783.

THOMAS JEFFERSON, of Virginia⁴

Joint minister plenipotentiary, May 7, 1784, with Benjamin Franklin and John Adams, to negotiate treaties of amity and commerce with European countries and the Barbary States; commissioned, May 12, 1784, and went to Paris; signed treaty with Prussia, July 28, 1785; with Morocco, January 1, 1787.

Minister plenipotentiary to France, March 10, 1785. Left France to return to the United States, September 26, 1789.

JOHN LAMB, of Connecticut

Agent to the Dey and Government of Algiers, appointed, October 5, 1785, by John Adams and, October 11, 1785, by Thomas Jefferson;⁵ he was accompanied on the mission by Paul R. Randall, as secretary. Unsuccessful in mission.

HENRY LAURENS, of South Carolina

Minister plenipotentiary to the Netherlands, November 1, 1779, to negotiate a treaty and, if possible, obtain a loan. Sailed for the Netherlands, August 13, 1780. On September 3, 1780, the ship was captured and his papers seized by the British.

He was taken to London and confined in the Tower of London. On November 29, 1782, he reached Paris after release from the Tower, having been exchanged for Cornwallis.

Joint commissioner, June 14, 1781, with Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, and John Jay⁶ to negotiate a treaty of peace with Great Britain; preliminary articles signed, November 30, 1782; definitive treaty signed, September 3, 1783.

JOHN LAURENS, of South Carolina

Secretary to the legation at Paris, September 28, 1779.

Special minister to France, December 23, 1780, to assist in negotiating loans.

ARTHUR LEE, of Virginia

Secret agent in London, December 12, 1775, appointed by Committee of Secret Correspondence of the Continental Congress.

Joint commissioner to court of France, October 22, 1776, with Silas Deane and Benjamin Franklin, to replace Thomas Jefferson who had declined appointment on the commission; signed, with other commissioners, treaties of commerce and alliance with France, February 6, 1778; commission to France dissolved, September 14, 1778, upon appointment of Benjamin Franklin as sole minister plenipotentiary.

Unofficial visit to Spain, February, 1777, in endeavor to procure aid for United States. After leaving Spain, elected, May 1, 1777, and commissioned, June 5, 1777, as commissioner to that country, but never returned.

WILLIAM LEE, of Virginia⁷

Commissioner to courts of Vienna and Berlin, May 9, 1777; commissioned July 1, 1777; but was never received at either court.

OLIVER POLLOCK

Commercial agent at Habana, May 30, 1783; commissioned, June 2, 1783.

THOMAS RANDAL, of Pennsylvania

17. REGULATIONS CONCERNING PRECEDENCE OF DIPLOMATIC AGENTS

The rules on this subject which have been prescribed by the Department are the same as those contained in the seven rules of the Congress of Vienna, found in the protocol of the session of March 9, 1815, and in the supplementary or eighth rule of the Congress of Aix la Chapelle of November 21, 1818. They are as follows:

ARTICLE 1. Diplomatic agents are divided into three classes: That of ambassadors, legates, or nuncios; that of envoys, ministers, or other persons accredited to sovereigns; that of chargés d'affaires accredited to ministers for foreign affairs.

ART. 2. Ambassadors, legates, or nuncios only have the representative character.

ART. 3. Diplomatic agents on an extraordinary mission have not, on that account, any superiority of rank.

ART. 4. Diplomatic agents shall take precedence in their respective classes according to the date of the official notification of their arrival. The present regulation shall not cause any innovation with regard to the representative of the Pope.

ART. 5. A uniform mode shall be determined in each State for the reception of diplomatic agents of each class.

ART. 6. Relations of consanguinity or of family alliance between courts confer no precedence on their diplomatic agents. The same rule also applies to political alliances.

ART. 7. In acts or treaties between several powers which grant alternate precedence, the order which is to be observed in the signatures shall be decided by lot between the ministers.

ART. 8. . . . It is agreed that ministers resident accredited to them shall form, with respect to their precedence, an intermediate class between ministers of the second class and chargés d'affaires.

18. ORGANIZATION OF THE FOREIGN SERVICE

GENERAL INFORMATION

CONDUCT OF FOREIGN RELATIONS

The President is charged under the Constitution with the responsibility of conducting the foreign relations of the United States.

The Secretary of State is his adviser in such matters and acts as the agent through whom he issues his instructions to the Foreign Service which forms the field force through which the necessary contacts with foreign governments are established and maintained.

FOREIGN RELATIONS

A nation's foreign relations grow out of the whole range of transactions entered upon by its citizens with the nationals and governments of other countries.

As these transactions engender controversies there arises from time to time the need for the making of treaties or international agreements, understandings, and arbitrations. These agreements and understandings constitute the body of international law or the international charters under which the peoples of the several countries conduct their intercourse.

THE FOREIGN SERVICE

The Foreign Service of the United States is the expert service established by law to assist American citizens who have occasion to travel or to do business abroad to understand what their rights are while abroad and to protect them in the exercise of those rights.

The Foreign Service also performs the very important function of collecting and transmitting for the use of the Secretary of State information bearing upon conditions abroad in the countries where American citizens travel and trade. This information must not only be currently accurate and complete, but with it must be supplied dependable forecasts of the probable course of events.

The Foreign Service of the United States consists of a number of officers classified by salary grades, and performing the varied duties that are required of such officers whether serving as vice consuls or as ambassadors or ministers. Some conception of the range of these duties may be obtained from the following outline:

The efficient Foreign Service officer—

Creates good-will and common understanding, and, with restrained and critical leadership born of mature experience and profound knowledge of men and affairs, uses these as instruments for enhancing international confidence and cooperation among governments and people.

Adapts himself, his conduct, and his mode of living, appropriately to climate and surroundings in the country to which he is assigned.

Learns to speak the language of the country in a manner that reveals a background of intelligence and cultivation.

Comprehends his own country, and with unremitting endeavor comes to understand deeply the foreign country where he is stationed.

Further accurate knowledge and friendly understanding of the United States, in foreign countries; and, also, of the foreign countries, in the United States.

Promotes and protects the interests of the United States and of its citizens.

Makes effective representations to the authorities of foreign governments concerning the protection of American citizens, their rights and their property, in accordance with international law.

Advises and assists Americans traveling abroad for business or other purposes with wise counsel and accurate information.

Negotiates, with tact, sound judgment, and intimate knowledge of conditions at home and abroad, protocols, conventions, and treaties, especially regarding international intercourse, tariffs, shipping, commerce, preservation of peace, etc., in strict conformity to Government instructions.

Cooperates and counsels with superior officers and colleagues in Government service, on all matters relating to his official duties.

Establishes and effectively utilizes personal contacts in far-sighted ways for the benefit of his Government and of American citizens.

Analyzes and reports on political and economic conditions and trends of significance to the United States.

Analyzes and reports on market conditions, statistics of trade, of finance, of production, of labor, etc., in foreign countries, so far as they are significant to the United States and to its people.

Analyzes and reports on crops and other agricultural, forest, fishing, and mining resources, so far as they may affect similar American interests.

Analyzes and reports on shipping practices, shipping legislation, freights, charters, pools, etc., so far as they vitally affect any American interests.

Reports on all legislation of interest to the United States.

Reports on tariffs, both laws and practices.

Reports on vital statistics of Americans abroad.

Replies to individual trade and other inquiries from American citizens in ways to promote good will and help both present and future trade relations.

Exercises skill in following prescribed form and routine procedure when possible; and displays discriminating judgment, as may be necessary in more complicated situations requiring investigations, careful accumulation of information, or professional understanding of laws, customs, conditions, etc.

Issues passports to American citizens, registers citizens, and advises on questions relating to citizenship generally.

Issues bills of health, makes sanitary reports, and supervises disinfection of merchandise.

Certifies invoices of all goods shipped to the United States and reports on under-valuations for protection of revenues.

Visas alien passports and issues immigration visas under immigration laws.

Enters and clears American ships and airships, administers relief of seamen, signs on and discharges seamen, settles disputes between masters and seamen, and takes charge of shipwrecked vessels.

Assists in prevention of importation of prohibited articles.

Administers regulations relating to plant and animal quarantine.

Takes custody of and with sagacity administers and settles estates of American citizens and sailors who have died abroad.

Handles extradition cases.

Witnesses marriages, where at least one of the participants is an American citizen, in accordance with American and local laws.

Performs notarial services in accordance with Federal, State, and local laws.

Administers an office in a business-like and efficient manner.

Gives helpful information to colleagues, and fundamental instruction and guidance to subordinates in assigning problems, investigations, duties, etc.

Apportions responsibility and work among personnel, reports on personnel, and maintains morale.

Maintains records of business and files of correspondence received and sent.

Estimates needs of office and plans budget expenditures for present and future activities.

Receives, cares for, and accounts for public property in accordance with Government regulations.

Collects and properly accounts for fees for services rendered under law.

Disburses funds received from the Treasury of the United States for salaries, wages, and contingent expenses; makes up required returns and accounts; and remits surplus funds to Treasury.

From this body of officers the men are chosen to perform the tasks that the Government of the United States requires to be done abroad. At the commencement of their careers all are assigned to the several consulates as vice consuls. As these officers make reputations for themselves in the service they are assigned to posts where their services are most needed, whether at consulates or at diplomatic posts.

Consular posts are established at trade and communication centers where the actual business of international commerce, transportation, and travel is carried on and where the officer is required to deal with the entrance and clearance of United States vessels, the granting of bills of health to ships departing for the United States, the care of seamen, the documentation of cargoes exported to the United States, the visaing of the travel documents of aliens coming to the United States, the issuance of passports to American citizens, and the making of surveys of conditions under which American commerce and trade may profitably be carried on. Diplomatic missions are established at the political capitals of foreign states for the purpose of maintaining direct contact between the Government of the United States and the foreign government concerned. The Foreign Service officer is given opportunity for a variety of service at consular posts and at diplomatic posts, as the needs of the posts may require.

Entrance into the Service is by a threefold examination: written, oral, and physical. Examination is open to anyone between the ages of 21 and 35 designated therefor by the President. The successful candidates make up the eligible list from which appointments into the Foreign Service are made.

The entire commissioned personnel of the Foreign Service is entered upon a list which is periodically reclassified in order of ascertained efficiency. Officers are promoted from salary grade to salary grade as vacancies occur and in the order in which their names appear at any given time on this classified list.

LANGUAGE STUDENTS

Selection will be made annually of a few officers from among new appointees in the Foreign Service who have shown special aptitude for acquiring languages, and who possess the other necessary qualifications, for assignment to study the languages of China, Japan, the Near East, Eastern Europe, and North Africa, where, in addition to learning and performing the usual diplomatic and consular duties, they will be expected to acquire familiarity with the language of the country and with the laws, customs, history, and race psychology of the people, with a view to serving for the most part in the area of their assignment. Officers selected for these assignments may receive, in addition to their salaries, an allowance for language tuition, and may be provided with quarters. This is one of the most attractive fields of activity in the entire Foreign Service and offers unusual opportunities for rendering distinguished service to the Government and for advancement in the service.

Regulations governing Foreign Service officers assigned for language study will be found on pages 355 and 357.

FOREIGN SERVICE EXAMINATIONS

Under the present regulations the written portion of the examination is held at the offices of the civil service district secretaries in Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Denver, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis, St. Paul, San Francisco, Seattle, and Washington. The grades made by the candidates in the written tests are communicated to them in due time, and they are informed of the date on which they may, if they so desire, appear in Washington to complete the examination by taking the oral tests and the physical examination.

Candidates seeking designation for examination may obtain from the Department of State upon request forms of application for appointment. Applications and all correspondence relating thereto should be addressed to the Secretary of State, who will in due course notify by letter such

applicants as may be designated for examination. The letter of designation furnishes all information necessary as to date and places of the examination, and it is the practice to send out such letters two months prior to the date set for the examination. No designation will be made within the 40 days immediately preceding the date set for the holding of the written portion of an examination.

In accordance with civil service principles, the names of those candidates who are successful in the examination are placed on the list of persons eligible for appointment as Foreign Service officers in the order of the ratings attained in the examination. Appointments to the service are made from this list beginning with the candidate who has the highest rating regardless of the date on which his eligibility was established.

The period of eligibility is two years, and unless the candidates are appointed or request the withdrawal of their names from the eligible list within that time, their names are dropped from the list. Such candidates can not again become eligible for appointment except upon new application, designation, and examination.

All applications, whether for designation for examination or for appointment to a clerkship, must be filled out completely in the handwriting of the applicant, and accompanied by five indorsements in the form of letters from competent and responsible persons, attesting the moral character, integrity, good deportment, and ability of the applicant, his business experience, and his qualifications as set forth in the application. The originals of all indorsements listed in the application must be filed therewith; copies are not acceptable. Indorsements remain a part of the Government records and may not be withdrawn while a person remains an applicant or while he is an officer or employee of the Department of State.

Applications should also be accompanied by a birth certificate and an unmounted photograph of the applicant, plainly marked with his name and the approximate date when the photograph was taken.

Applicants for appointment in their correspondence with the Department should always sign their names as given in their applications, without enlargement or contraction, one given name at least being used.

An applicant should be particularly careful to give his legal residence correctly. The Department of State does not undertake to determine an applicant's legal residence.

Applicants are required to state if they have had, or still have, outstanding financial obligations, and if so the nature and extent thereof.

An application is considered as pending for a period of two years. After such period has elapsed another application with new indorsements will be necessary to obtain further consideration.

Under the law and regulations, Foreign Service examinations are open to any American citizen between the ages of 21 and 35 years (see paragraph 16, page 352) who from the application presented would appear to possess sufficient education for the service, and who may be designated therefor.

There are about 450 posts in the two branches of the Foreign Service, presenting many peculiar climatic, social, and racial conditions. Candidates can not be certified as eligible to serve at a few posts only, but must be chosen from the standpoint of their availability for at least a majority of the posts. Officers must expect assignment to tropical and unhealthful posts as well as to posts where healthful climatic conditions prevail.

Many colleges and universities furnish courses covering the subjects of Foreign Service examinations.

The Government does not recommend any particular institutions, does not furnish a course of study in any educational institution, nor suggest a list of books to be studied in preparation for examination.

It is suggested that prospective candidates correspond with respect to courses with any institution they might wish to attend; and that persons teaching the subjects embraced in the examination are prepared to suggest the best textbooks.

The Foreign Service School, established by the Executive orders of June 7, 1924, and September 11, 1929, is for the instruction of persons who have passed the prescribed examinations and have been appointed Foreign Service officers, unclassified grade. Candidates preparing for examination are not admitted to the Foreign Service School.

The Department does not furnish information regarding vacancies or possible vacancies in the Foreign Service.

The attention of applicants for examination is called to the following Executive order of January 13, 1920:

EXECUTIVE ORDER OF JANUARY 13, 1920

The Executive order of October 13, 1905, as amended on May 17, 1919, is hereby amended to read as follows:

No officer or employee of the Government shall, directly or indirectly, instruct or be concerned in any manner in the instruction of any person or classes of persons, with a view to their special preparation for the examinations of the United States Civil Service Commission. The fact that any officer or employee is found so engaged shall be considered sufficient cause for his removal from the service: *Provided*, That this order shall not be so construed as to prevent the Federal Board for Vocational Education, the Medical Departments of the Army and Navy, and any other branches of the Government from utilizing the Government facilities and the services of Federal officers and employees where such facilities or services may be necessary or useful in carrying out the duties imposed upon such departments or branches by law, in the training and testing of disabled soldiers, sailors, and marines.

This order has since been amended to extend to Government establishments generally the exemption heretofore made in the case of the Federal Board of Vocational Education.

CLERKS

Clerks are employed in the Foreign Service, and receive initial compensation from \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year. Compensation begins upon the date of departure for the post to which they are assigned. Transportation expenses are paid by the Government, under certain regulations.

Appointees are expected to remain in the service for at least two years, and their transportation expenses in returning to the United States in case of resignation are not payable unless they have served for that period. They are, furthermore, expected to accept such assignments or transfers as the Department may deem desirable in the best interests of the Service. No appointments can be considered for special countries, although a statement as to preferences of assignment is welcomed by the Department.

Such appointments are restricted to those who are unmarried and without dependents, as it is seldom found practicable to pay compensation in an amount sufficiently large to justify the appointment of married men, nor is the appropriation for transportation sufficient to permit the payment of transportation of wives and families of clerks in the Foreign Service.

The employment of citizens or subjects of foreign powers as clerks in the diplomatic branch of the Foreign Service, and in the consular branch where the salary is \$1,000 per annum, or more, is prohibited by law. Therefore, only American citizens are employed as clerks at diplomatic posts, and in positions in consular offices, the salaries of which are \$1,000 or more. Preference is given to honorably discharged soldiers and sailors who possess the requisite qualifications.

Women are equally eligible with men for clerkships in the Foreign Service. However, the climatic and social conditions at many posts render it impossible for women to serve at them with satisfaction to themselves and advantage to the Government.

The duties of clerks consist of such routine work as may be assigned to them by the officers in charge. An idea of the scope of these duties may be gained from a perusal of the functions of secretaries and consular officers which are enumerated elsewhere in this publication. It is desirable that clerks should be stenographers and possess a knowledge of the language of the country in which they are to be employed.

It is the practice of the Department to commission clerks as vice consuls only when a need exists at the office to which they are assigned, and not until they have served for a sufficient period to judge of their abilities and conduct and that they merit such recognition. Clerks commissioned as vice consuls not of career are not eligible to promotion to the grade of Foreign Service officer without undergoing the usual examinations. A commission as vice consul not of career does not carry with it an increase in compensation.

No formal examination is required for appointment to a clerkship; the Department, however, reserves the right to examine an applicant in any particular it may deem advisable.

No one who is under 21 or over 35 years of age or who is not in excellent physical condition will be considered for these positions. The Department may require the applicant to undergo a physical examination.

Application blanks for clerical appointments may be obtained from the Division of Foreign Service Personnel, Department of State. For further information regarding applications for such appointments, see page 342.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Fees.—Foreign Service officers are required to account for all fees which they collect, and the salary fixed by law or regulation constitutes their sole and only compensation, except as specially provided in the case of consular agents who are compensated by one-half of the fees collected by them not exceeding, in any case, \$1,000 a year.

Leave of absence.—Within his discretion, the Secretary of State may grant Foreign Service officers leave of absence, for reasonable periods, in no case to exceed 60 days in one year, except that, when leave is granted with permission to visit the United States, the time actually and necessarily occupied in transit by the most direct route will be approved in addition to the 60 days.

Traveling expenses.—Under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of State, the Government defrays the actual and necessary expenses of transportation, and subsistence to a legal limit, of Foreign Service officers and clerks in missions and consulates, and their families and effects, in going to and returning from their posts or when traveling under orders, but makes no allowance for any expense incurred in connection with ordinary leaves of absence. Section 15 of the act of May 24, 1924,¹ authorizes the Secretary of State to order officers to the United States on leave at the expense of the Government after three years of continuous service abroad, and provides that while in the United States the services of such officers shall be available for trade conference work or for such duties in the Department of State as the Secretary may prescribe.

Efficiency records.—A Foreign Service officer's work is the object of constant appraisal by the Department of State and the senior officers of the Foreign Service. Detailed records of each officer's service are maintained covering the personal and official conduct of the officer, the manner in which he handles business intrusted to him, and his demonstrated knowledge of the laws and regulations upon which the practice of the Foreign Service, as applied to the varied aspects of the diplomatic and consular function, is based. All diplomatic and consular posts are visited at intervals by inspecting officers whose duty it is to examine into the conduct of the personnel, the administration of the office, and the responsiveness of office and personnel to the needs of the Government, to give counsel and advice to the officer, and to report completely their findings to the Department.

Retirement.—Section 18 of the act of May 24, 1924,² provides for a system of retirement and disability annuities to be paid any Foreign Service officer who has reached the age of 65 years and rendered at least 15 years of service;³ or who has, before reaching the age of retirement, become totally disabled for useful and efficient service by reason of disease or injury not due to vicious habits, intemperance, or wilful misconduct on his part.⁴ The annuities are based on percentages of the average annual basic salary for the 10 years next preceding the date of retirement. These percentages depend upon the length of service, and, commencing at 30 per cent of the average annual basic salary for the minimum service of from 15 to 18 years, rise by increments of 6 per cent for every additional three-year period served.⁵ The maximum is 60 per cent for 30 or more years' service. The cost of retirement is borne in about equal shares by the officers and the Government—each officer contributing 5 per cent of his basic salary which is credited to him with 4 per cent interest per annum compounded annually. In case an annuitant dies before having received in annuities an amount equal to the total amount of his contributions, or an officer dies without having reached the retirement age, either the balance, or total, of his accumulated contributions are paid to his legal representatives.⁶ The same is done when an officer becomes separated from the Service, but in this case only 75 per cent is returned.⁷

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

ACT OF MAY 24, 1924¹

[Public—No. 135—68th Congress—II. R. 6357]

An Act For the reorganization and improvement of the Foreign Service of the United States, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That hereafter the Diplomatic and Consular Service of the United States shall be known as the Foreign Service of the United States.

DESIGNATION—PROMOTION—ASSIGNMENT

SEC. 2. That the official designation "Foreign Service officer" as employed throughout this Act shall be deemed to denote permanent officers in the Foreign Service below the grade of minister, all of whom are subject to promotion on merit, and who may be assigned to duty in either the diplomatic or the consular branch of the Foreign Service at the discretion of the President.

CLASSIFICATION—SALARIES

SEC. 3. That the officers in the Foreign Service shall hereafter be graded and classified as follows, with the salaries of each class herein affixed thereto, but not exceeding in number for each class a proportion to the total number of officers in the service represented in the following percentage limitations: Ambassadors and ministers as now or hereafter provided; Foreign Service officers as follows: Class 1, 6 per centum, \$9,000; class 2, 7 per centum, \$8,000; class 3, 8 per centum, \$7,000; class 4, 9 per centum, \$6,000; class 5, 10 per centum, \$5,000; class 6, 14 per centum, \$4,500; class 7, \$4,000; class 8, \$3,500; class 9, \$3,000; unclassified, \$3,000 to \$1,500: *Provided*, That as many Foreign Service officers above class 6 as may be required for the purpose of inspection may be detailed by the Secretary of State for that purpose.

APPOINTMENTS AS SECRETARIES OR CONSULS

SEC. 4. That Foreign Service officers may be appointed as secretaries in the Diplomatic Service or as consular officers or both: *Provided*, That all such appointments shall be made by and with the advice and consent of the Senate: *Provided further*, That all official acts of such officers while on duty in either the diplomatic or the consular branch of the Foreign Service shall be performed under their respective commissions as secretaries or as consular officers.

EXAMINATION—PROBATION—TRANSFER FROM DEPARTMENT—CITIZENSHIP—REINSTATEMENT—APPOINTMENT TO CLASS NOT POST—TRANSFER—PRESENT COMMISSIONS VALID

SEC. 5. That hereafter appointments to the position of Foreign Service officer shall be made after examination and a suitable period of probation in an unclassified grade or, after five years of continuous service in the Department of State, by transfer therefrom under such rules and regulations as the President may prescribe: *Provided*, That no candidate shall be eligible for examination for Foreign Service officer who is not an American citizen: *Provided further*, That reinstatement of Foreign Service officers separated from the classified service by reason of appointment to some other position in the Government service may be made by Executive order of the President under such rules and regulations as he may prescribe.

All appointments of Foreign Service officers shall be by commission to a class and not by commission to any particular post, and such officers shall be assigned to posts and may be transferred from one post to another by order of the President as the interests of the service may require: *Provided*, That the classification of secretaries in the Diplomatic Service and of consular officers is hereby abolished, without, however, in any wise impairing the validity of the present commissions of secretaries and consular officers.

REPORTS TO PRESIDENT AS TO EFFICIENCY—PROMOTION AND APPOINTMENT FOR EFFICIENCY

SEC. 6. That section 5 of the Act of February 5, 1915 (Public, 242), is hereby amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 5. That the Secretary of State is directed to report from time to time to the President, along with his recommendations, the names of those Foreign Service officers who by reason of efficient service have demonstrated special capacity for promotion to the grade of minister, and the names of those Foreign Service officers and employees and officers and employees in the Depart-

ment of State who by reason of efficient service, an accurate record of which shall be kept in the Department of State, have demonstrated special efficiency, and also the names of persons found upon taking the prescribed examination to have fitness for appointment to the lower grades of the service."

RECLASSIFICATION ON PASSAGE OF THE ACT

SEC. 7. That on the date on which this Act becomes effective the Secretary of State shall certify to the President, with his recommendation in each case, the record of efficiency of the several secretaries in the Diplomatic Service, consuls general, consuls, vice consuls of career, consular assistants, interpreters, and student interpreters then in office and shall, except in cases of persons found to merit reduction in rank or dismissal from the service, recommend to the President the re-commissioning, without further examination, of those then in office as follows:

Secretaries of class one designated as counselors of embassy, and consuls general of classes one and two as Foreign Service officers of class one.

Secretaries of class one designated as counselors of legation and consuls general of class three as Foreign Service officers of class two.

Secretaries of class one not designated as counselors, consuls general of class four, and consuls general at large as Foreign Service officers of class three.

Secretaries of class two, consuls general of class five, consuls of classes one, two, and three, and Chinese, Japanese, and Turkish secretaries as Foreign Service officers of class four.

Consuls of class four as Foreign Service officers of class five.

Secretaries of class three, consuls of class five, and Chinese, Japanese, and Turkish assistant secretaries as Foreign Service officers of class six.

Consuls of class six as Foreign Service officers of class seven.

Secretaries of class four and consuls of class seven as Foreign Service officers of class eight.

Consuls of classes eight and nine as Foreign Service officers of class nine.

Vice consuls of career, consular assistants, interpreters, and student interpreters as Foreign Service officers, unclassified.

PRESENT INCUMBENTS OF CERTAIN OFFICES—CONSULAR ASSISTANTS ABOLISHED

SEC. 8. That consuls general of class one and consuls of class one holding office at the time this Act takes effect shall not, as a result of their re-commissioning or reclassification, suffer a reduction in salary below that which they are then receiving: *Provided, however*, That this provision shall apply only to the incumbents of the offices mentioned at the time this Act becomes effective.

That the grade of consular assistant is hereby abolished, and that all consular assistants now in the service shall be re-commissioned as Foreign Service officers, unclassified.

ALL OFFICERS TO BE BONDED

SEC. 9. That sections 1697 and 1698 of the Revised Statutes are hereby amended to read as follows:

"Every secretary, consul general, consul, vice consul of career, or Foreign Service officer, before he receives his commission or enters upon the duties of his office, shall give to the United States a bond, in such form as the President shall prescribe, with such sureties, who shall be permanent residents of the United States, as the Secretary of State shall approve, in a penal sum not less than the annual compensation allowed to such officer, conditioned for the true and faithful accounting for, paying over, and delivering up of all fees, moneys, goods, effects, books, records, papers, and other property which shall come to his hands or to the hands of any other person to his use as such officer under any law now or hereafter enacted, and for the true and faithful performance of all other duties now or hereafter lawfully imposed upon him as such officer: *Provided*, That the operation of no existing bond shall in any wise be impaired by the provisions of this Act: *Provided further*, That such bond shall cover by its stipulations all official acts of such officer, whether as Foreign Service officer or as secretary in the Diplomatic Service, consul general, consul, or vice consul of career. The bonds herein mentioned shall be deposited with the Secretary of the Treasury."

FOREIGN SERVICE INSPECTORS

SEC. 10. That the provisions of section 4 of the Act of April 5, 1906, relative to the powers, duties, and prerogatives of consuls general at large are hereby made applicable to Foreign Service officers detailed for the purpose of inspection, who shall, under the direction of the Secretary of State, inspect the work of offices in the Foreign Service, both in the diplomatic and the consular branches.

OFFICIAL FEES

SEC. 11. That the provision of sections 8 and 10 of the Act of April 5, 1906, relative to official fees and the method of accounting therefor shall include both branches of the Foreign Service.

REPRESENTATION ALLOWANCES

SEC. 12. That the President is hereby authorized to grant to diplomatic missions and to consular offices at capitals of countries where there is no diplomatic mission of the United States representation allowances out of any money which may be appropriated for such purpose from time to time by Congress, the expenditure of such representation allowance to be accounted for in detail to the Department of State quarterly under such rules and regulations as the President may prescribe.

PRIVATE SECRETARIES TO AMBASSADORS

SEC. 13. Appropriations are authorized for the salary of a private secretary to each ambassador who shall be appointed by the ambassador and hold office at his pleasure.

ASSIGNMENT TO DEPARTMENT OF STATE—DETAIL TO CONFERENCES, ETC.

SEC. 14. That any Foreign Service officer may be assigned for duty in the Department of State without loss of class or salary, such assignment to be for a period of not more than three years, unless the public interests demand further service, when such assignment may be extended for a period not to exceed one year. Any Foreign Service officer of whatever class detailed for special duty not at his post or in the Department of State shall be paid his actual and necessary expenses for travel and not exceeding an average of \$8 per day for subsistence during such special detail: *Provided*, That such special duty shall not continue for more than sixty days, unless in the case of trade conferences or international gatherings, congresses, or conferences, when such subsistence expenses shall run only during the period thereof and the necessary period of transit to and from the place of gathering: *Provided further*, That the Secretary of State is authorized to prescribe a per diem allowance not exceeding \$6, in lieu of subsistence for Foreign Service officers on special duty or Foreign Service inspectors.

STATUTORY LEAVE OF ABSENCE

SEC. 15. That the Secretary of State is authorized, whenever he deems it to be in the public interest, to order to the United States on his statutory leave of absence any Foreign Service officer who has performed three years or more of continuous service abroad: *Provided*, That the expenses of transportation and subsistence of such officers and their immediate families, in traveling from their posts to their homes in the United States and return, shall be paid under the same rules and regulations applicable in the case of officers going to and returning from their posts under orders of the Secretary of State when not on leave: *Provided further*, That while in the United States the services of such officers shall be available for trade conference work or for such duties in the Department of State as the Secretary of State may prescribe.

COUNSELORS OF EMBASSY OR LEGATION

SEC. 16. That the part of the Act of July 1, 1916 (Public, Numbered 131), which authorizes the President to designate and assign any secretary of class one as counselor of embassy or legation, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"*Provided*, That the President may, whenever he considers it advisable so to do, designate and assign any Foreign Service officer as counselor of embassy or legation."

FOREIGN SERVICE OFFICER AS COMMISSIONER, CHARGÉ, MINISTER RESIDENT, DIPLOMATIC AGENT—SALARY AS CHARGÉ OR CONSUL IN CHARGE

SEC. 17. That within the discretion of the President, any Foreign Service officer may be appointed to act as commissioner, chargé d'affaires, minister resident, or diplomatic agent for such period as the public interests may require without loss of grade, class, or salary: *Provided, however*, That no such officer shall receive more than one salary.

That section 1685 of the Revised Statutes as amended by the Act entitled "An Act for the improvement of the Foreign Service, approved February 5, 1915," is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 1685. That for such time as any Foreign Service officer shall be lawfully authorized to act as chargé d'affaires ad interim or to assume charge of a consulate general or consulate during the absence of the principal officer at the post to which he shall have been assigned, he shall, if his salary is less than one-half that of such principal officer, receive in addition to his salary as Foreign Service officer compensation equal to the difference between such salary and one-half of the salary provided by law for the ambassador, minister, or principal consular officer, as the case may be."

RETIREMENT SYSTEM

SEC. 18. The President is authorized to prescribe rules and regulations for the establishment of a Foreign Service retirement and disability system to be administered under the direction of the Secretary of State and in accordance with the following principles, to wit:

REPORT OF FUNDS—APPROPRIATIONS

(a) The Secretary of State shall submit annually a comparative report showing all receipts and disbursements on account of refunds, allowances, and annuities, together with the total number of persons receiving annuities and the amounts paid them, and shall submit annually estimates of appropriations necessary to continue this section in full force and such appropriations are hereby authorized: *Provided*, That in no event shall the aggregate total appropriations exceed the aggregate total of the contributions of the Foreign Service officers theretofore made, and accumulated interest thereon.

RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY FUND

(i) There is hereby created a special fund to be known as the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund.

FIVE PER CENT DEDUCTION—BASIC SALARIES

(c) ¹Five per centum of the basic salary of all Foreign Service officers eligible to retirement shall be contributed to the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund, and the Secretary of the Treasury is directed on and after the date on which this Act takes effect to cause such deductions to be made and the sums transferred on the books of the Treasury Department to the credit of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund for the payment of annuities, refunds, and allowances: *Provided*, That for the purpose of computing deductions and calculating annuities all basic salaries in excess of \$9,000 per annum shall be treated as \$9,000.

AGE OF RETIREMENT

(d) When any Foreign Service officer has reached the age of sixty-five years and rendered at least fifteen years of service he shall be retired: *Provided*, That the President may in his discretion retain any such officer on active duty for such period not exceeding five years as he may deem for the interest of the United States.

ANNUITY CLASSES

(e) Annuities shall be paid to retired Foreign Service officers under the following classification, based upon length of service and at the following percentages of the average annual basic salary for the ten years next preceding the date of retirement: Class A, thirty years or more, 60 per centum; class B, from twenty-seven to thirty years, 54 per centum; class C, from twenty-four to twenty-seven years, 48 per centum; class D, from twenty-one to twenty-four years, 42 per centum; class E, from eighteen to twenty-one years, 36 per centum; class F, from fifteen to eighteen years, 30 per centum.

REFUNDS FOR EARLY RETIREMENT

(f) Those officers who retire before having contributed for each year of service shall have withheld from their annuities to the credit of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund such proportion of 5 per centum as the number of years in which they did not contribute bears to the total length of service.

INVESTMENT OF RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY FUND

(g) The Secretary of the Treasury is directed to invest from time to time in interest-bearing securities of the United States such portions of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund as in his judgment may not be immediately required for the payment of annuities, refunds, and allowances, and the income derived from such investments shall constitute a part of said fund.

FUNDS NOT ASSIGNABLE OR SUBJECT TO LEGAL PROCESS

(h) None of the moneys mentioned in this section shall be assignable, either in law or equity, or be subject to execution, levy, or attachment, garnishment, or other legal process.

DEATH OF ANNUITANT

(i) In case an annuitant dies without having received in annuities an amount equal to the total amount of his contributions from salary with interest thereon at 4 per centum per annum

compounded annually up to the time of his death, the excess of the said accumulated contributions over the said annuity payments shall be paid to his or her legal representatives; and in case a Foreign Service officer shall die without having reached the retirement age the total amount of his contributions with accrued interest shall be paid to his legal representatives.

RETIREMENT FOR DISABILITY—PHYSICAL EXAMINATION—RECOVERY

(j) That any Foreign Service officer who before reaching the age of retirement becomes totally disabled for useful and efficient service by reason of disease or injury not due to vicious habits, intemperance, or willful misconduct on his part, shall, upon his own application or upon order of the President, be retired on an annuity under paragraph (e) of this section: *Provided, however,* That in each case such disability shall be determined by the report of a duly qualified physician or surgeon designated by the Secretary of State to conduct the examination: *Provided further,* That unless the disability be permanent, a like examination shall be made annually in order to determine the degree of disability, and the payment of annuity shall cease from the date of the medical examination showing recovery.

Fees for examinations under this provision, together with reasonable traveling and other expenses incurred in order to submit to examination, shall be paid out of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund.

When the annuity is discontinued under this provision, before the annuitant has received a sum equal to the total amount of his contributions with accrued interest, the difference shall be paid to him or his legal representatives.

UNHEALTHFUL POSTS

(k) The President is authorized from time to time to establish, by Executive order, a list of places in tropical countries which by reason of climatic or other extreme conditions are to be classed as unhealthful posts, and each year of duty at such posts, while so classed, inclusive of regular leaves of absence, shall be counted as one year and a half, and so on in like proportion in reckoning the length of service for the purposes of retirement.

SEPARATION FROM THE SERVICE

(l) Whenever a Foreign Service officer becomes separated from the service except for disability before reaching the age of retirement, 75 per centum of the total amount of contribution from his salary without interest shall be returned to him.

EMPLOYMENT AFTER RETIREMENT

(m) Whenever any Foreign Service officer, after the date of his retirement, accepts a position of employment the emoluments of which are greater than the annuity received by him from the United States Government by virtue of his retirement under this Act, the amount of the said annuity during the continuance of such employment shall be reduced by an equal amount: *Provided,* That all retired Foreign Service officers shall notify the Secretary of State once a year of any positions of employment accepted by them stating the amount of compensation received therefrom and whenever any such officer fails to so report it shall be the duty of the Secretary of State to order the payment of the annuity to be suspended until such report is received.

EXPENSES

(n) The Secretary of State is authorized to expend from surplus money to the credit of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund an amount not exceeding \$5,000 for the expenses necessary in carrying out the provisions of this section, including actuarial advice.

AMBASSADORS, MINISTERS, OFFICERS OF THE DEPARTMENT

(o) ¹ Any diplomatic secretary or consular officer who has been or any Foreign Service officer who may hereafter be promoted from the classified service to the grade of ambassador or minister or appointed to a position in the Department of State shall be entitled to all the benefits of the Foreign Service retirement and disability system provided by section 18 of this Act in the same manner and under the same conditions as Foreign Service officers; and there shall likewise be entitled to the benefits of said system in the same manner and under the same conditions as Foreign Service officers any ambassador or minister or any Assistant Secretary of State now in the service, who at the time of original appointment to the grade of ambassador or minister or to the position of Assistant Secretary of State was a diplomatic secretary or consular officer or who at any time prior to such appointment had served for a period of ten years as diplomatic secretary or consular officer

or in the Department of State or on special duty under the Department of State or in any or all of these capacities.

The Chief of the Division of Western European Affairs shall be entitled to participate in and have the benefits of said Foreign Service retirement and disability fund.

PERIOD OF SERVICE FOR ANNUITIES—REFUNDS FOR EARLY RETIREMENT

(p) For the purposes of this Act the period of service shall be computed from the date of original oath of office as secretary in the Diplomatic Service, consul general, consul, vice consul, deputy consul, consular assistant, consular agent, commercial agent, interpreter, or student interpreter, and shall include periods of service at different times in either the Diplomatic or Consular Service, or while on assignment to the Department of State, or on special duty, but all periods of separation from the service and so much of any period of leave of absence as may exceed six months shall be excluded: *Provided*, That service in the Department of State prior to appointment as a Foreign Service officer may be included in the period of service, in which case the officer shall pay into the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund a special contribution equal to 5 per centum of his annual salary for each year of such employment, with interest thereon to date of payment compounded annually at 4 per centum.

RECALL TO SERVICE

SEC. 19. In the event of public emergency any retired Foreign Service officer may be recalled temporarily to active service by the President and while so serving he shall be entitled in lieu of his retirement allowance to the full pay of the class in which he is temporarily serving.

PRIOR PROVISIONS OF LAW

SEC. 20. That all provisions of law heretofore enacted relating to secretaries in the Diplomatic Service and to consular officers, which are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, are hereby made applicable to Foreign Service officers when they are designated for service as diplomatic or as consular officers, and that all Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed.

CERTAIN APPROPRIATIONS MADE AVAILABLE

SEC. 21. That the appropriations contained in Title I of the Act entitled "An Act making appropriations for the Departments of State and Justice and for the Judiciary and for the Departments of Commerce and Labor for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1925, and for other purposes," for such compensation and expenses as are affected by the provisions of this Act are made available and may be applied toward the payment of the compensation and expenses herein provided for, except that no part of such appropriations shall be available for the payment of annuities to retired Foreign Service officers.

ASSISTANT SECRETARIES—DIRECTOR OF THE CONSULAR SERVICE ABOLISHED

SEC. 22. The titles "Second Assistant Secretary of State" and "Third Assistant Secretary of State" shall hereafter be known as "Assistant Secretary of State" without numerical distinction of rank; but the change of title shall in no way impair the commissions, salaries, and duties of the present incumbents.

There is hereby established in the Department of State an additional "Assistant Secretary of State," who shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall be entitled to compensation at the rate of \$7,500 per annum.

The position of Director of the Consular Service is abolished and the salary provided for that office is hereby made available for the salary of the additional Assistant Secretary of State herein authorized.

DATE ACT TAKES EFFECT

SEC. 23. That this Act shall take effect on July 1, 1924.

Approved, May 24, 1924.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 5189, OF SEPTEMBER 11, 1929

Whereas, under the provisions of the Act of May 24, 1924, the President is authorized to prescribe certain rules and regulations for administering the Foreign Service on an interchangeable basis.

Now, therefore, the President in the exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Constitution and laws of the United States, makes the following regulations:

1. Vacancies in all classes from 1 to 9 shall be filled by promotion from lower classes, based upon ability and efficiency as shown in the service.

2. All admissions to the service shall be to the grade of Foreign Service Officer, unclassified.

3. Officers and employees, after five years of continuous service in the Department of State, are eligible for appointment by transfer to any class in the Foreign Service upon the recommendation of the Foreign Service Personnel Board and with the approval of the Secretary of State as hereinafter provided.

THE FOREIGN SERVICE PERSONNEL BOARD

4. There is hereby constituted a Foreign Service Personnel Board composed as follows:

Three Assistant Secretaries of State to be designated by the Secretary of State, one of whom shall be designated as Chairman.

5. It shall be the duty of the Board:

(a) From time to time as vacancies arise, to submit to the Secretary of State lists of those Foreign Service Officers whose records of efficiency entitle them to advancement in the Service, and who are therefore recommended for promotion, and the names of those officers and employees in the Department of State who, after five years of continuous service, and because of special ability and merit are recommended for appointment by transfer to the position of Foreign Service Officer.

(b) To submit to the Secretary of State the names of those Foreign Service Officers who, in the opinion of the Board, have demonstrated special capacity for promotion to the grade of Minister. Each list thus submitted shall enumerate the names of the officers in the order of merit and shall be complete in itself, superseding all previous lists. A list shall be submitted to the Secretary of State whenever there is a vacancy in the grade of Minister or when requested by the President or the Secretary of State and in no case shall it contain more names than there are vacancies to fill. Each such list, if approved by the Secretary of State, shall be submitted to the President.

(c) To submit to the Secretary of State the names of those Foreign Service officers who are recommended for designation as counselors of embassy or legation.

(d) To recommend to the Secretary of State the assignment of Foreign Service Officers to posts and the transfer of such officers from one branch of the Service to the other according to the needs of the Service.

(e) To consider controversies and delinquencies among the Service personnel and recommend to the Secretary appropriate disciplinary measures where required.

6. Whenever it is determined that the efficiency rating of an officer is poor and below the required standard for the Service, the Personnel Board shall so notify the officer, and if after due notification the rating of such officer continues nevertheless to be unsatisfactory, his name shall be reported to the Secretary of State with a full recital of the circumstances and a recommendation of the Board for separation from the Service.

Whenever such recommendation for separation from the Service is made, the Board shall at the same time notify the officer of the action taken.

7. The members of the Board, individually and collectively, shall have authority to examine all records and data relating to the personnel of the Service.

8. All action taken by the Board shall be strictly non-partisan, and based exclusively upon the record of efficiency of the officers concerned.

9. The proceedings of the Board shall be strictly confidential, but the Chairman may, and it is hereby made a part of his duty, within a reasonable time prior to each meeting of the Board for recommending promotions, demotions, or removals, to invite the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations and the Chairman of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs or some committee member designated by the Chairman, to sit with the Board through its deliberations without, however, participating in its decisions.

DIVISION OF FOREIGN SERVICE PERSONNEL

10. There shall be in the Department of State a Division of Foreign Service Personnel to which shall be attached not more than three Personnel Officers, at least one of whom shall be a Foreign Service Officer of high rank, to be chosen by the Secretary of State upon the recommendation of the Personnel Board. The duties of the Division not inconsistent herewith shall be prescribed by the Secretary of State.

THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS

11. There is hereby constituted a Board of Examiners composed of the following members, to wit: Three Assistant Secretaries of State to be designated by the Secretary of State, one of the Personnel Officers attached to the Division of Foreign Service Personnel, and the Chief Examiner of the Civil Service Commission or such person as may be designated by him to serve in his stead. The Assistant Secretaries of State may, when necessary, designate other persons to serve for them on the Board.

12. It shall be the duty of the Board of Examiners to formulate rules for and hold examinations of applicants for commission to the Foreign Service and to determine from among the persons designated by the President for examination those who are fitted for appointment.

13. The scope and method of the examinations shall be determined by the Board of Examiners, but among the subjects shall be included the following: at least one modern language other than English (French, Spanish, or German by preference), elements of international law, geography,

the natural, industrial, and commercial resources and the commerce of the United States; American history, government and institutions; the history since 1850 of Europe, Latin America and the Far East; elements of political economy, commercial and maritime law.

14. The examinations shall be both written and oral.

15. Examinations shall be rated on a scale of 100, and no person rated at less than 80 shall be eligible for certification.

16. No one shall be certified as eligible who is under twenty-one or over thirty-five years of age, or who is not a citizen of the United States, or who is not of good character and habits and physically, mentally, and temperamentally qualified for the proper performance of the duties of the Foreign Service, or who has not been specially designated by the President for appointment subject to examination and to the occurrence of an appropriate vacancy.

17. Upon the conclusion of the examinations, the names of the candidates who shall have attained upon the whole examination the required rating will be certified by the Board to the Secretary of State as eligible for appointment.

18. The names of candidates will remain on the eligible list for two years, except in the case of such candidates as shall within that period be appointed or shall withdraw their names. Names which have been on the eligible list for two years will be dropped therefrom and the candidates concerned will not again be eligible for appointment unless upon fresh application, designation anew for examination, and the successful passing of such examination.

19. Applicants for appointment who are designated to take an examination and who fail to report therefor, shall not be entitled to take a subsequent examination unless they shall have been specifically designated to take such subsequent examination.

20. In designations for appointment subject to examination and in appointments after examination, due regard will be had to the principle that as between candidates of equal merit, appointments should be made so as to tend to secure proportional representation of all the States and Territories in the foreign service; and neither in the designation for examination nor certification nor appointment after examination will the political affiliations of the candidates be considered.

21. The Board of Examiners is authorized to issue such notices and to make all such rules as it may deem necessary to accomplish the object of this regulation.

22. New appointments to the Service shall be to the grade of Foreign Service Officer, unclassified, and no promotions to a higher grade shall be made except on the recommendation of the Foreign Service Personnel Board, with the approval of the Secretary of State, after the completion of one full term of instruction, or the equivalent thereof in the Foreign Service School hereinafter established.

THE FOREIGN SERVICE SCHOOL

23. There is hereby established in the Department of State a Foreign Service School for the instruction of new appointees.

24. The Foreign Service School shall be under the direction of a Foreign Service School Board composed of the following members, to wit: Three Assistant Secretaries of State to be designated by the Secretary of State, one of the Personnel Officers attached to the Division of Foreign Service Personnel, and the Chief Instructor of the Foreign Service School. The School Board will act in all matters with the approval of the Secretary of State.

25. The Chief Instructor shall be selected by the other members of the School Board from among the officers of the Foreign Service, with the approval of the Secretary of State.

26. Other instructors shall be selected from among the qualified officers of the Department of State, the Foreign Service, the other executive departments of the Government, and other available sources in the discretion of the School Board.

27. The term of instruction in the Foreign Service School shall be considered a period of probation during which the new appointees are to be judged as to their qualifications for advancement and assignment to duty. At the end of the term, recommendations shall be made to the Secretary of State by the Personnel Board for the dismissal of any who may have failed to meet the required standard of the Service.

28. The Secretary of State is authorized to prescribe rules and regulations for the governance of the Foreign Service School.

AUTHORITY OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE

29. The Secretary of State is authorized to prescribe rules and regulations not inconsistent herewith for the administration of the Foreign Service.

REPEAL

30. The Executive Orders of June 7, 1924, and February 25, 1928, are hereby revoked.

DATE ON WHICH FOREGOING REGULATION SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE

31. This order shall take effect on September 16, 1929.

DEPARTMENTAL ORDER NO. 484-C, DECEMBER 30, 1929

DUTIES OF THE DIVISION OF FOREIGN SERVICE PERSONNEL

Pursuant to the authority contained in the Executive order dated September 11, 1929, the following duties are hereby prescribed for the Division of Foreign Service Personnel:

- (1) To maintain contact with Foreign Service officers and employees while on visits to the United States.
- (2) To discuss with Foreign Service officers ways for the development and improvement of their work.
- (3) To confer with the geographical divisions of the Department concerning the work of Foreign Service officers.
- (4) To interview applicants and prospective applicants for the Foreign Service.
- (5) To examine and recommend for appointment applicants for positions as subordinate employees in the Foreign Service.
- (6) To collect, collate and record pertinent data relating to Foreign Service personnel.
- (7) To keep the efficiency records of all Foreign Service officers and employees.
- (8) To hold strictly confidential all personnel records of the Foreign Service, and to reveal no papers, documents, data or reports relating thereto, except to the Secretary of State and to the members of the Personnel Board.
- (9) To keep the records of the Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service and attend to all details connected with the holding of examinations for the Foreign Service.
- (10) To submit recommendations on all matters within the authority of the Personnel Board.
- (11) To attend, through the personnel officers assigned to the division, the meetings of the Personnel Board when so directed.

Departmental Orders Nos. 295 of June 9, 1924, 378 of June 16, 1926, 451 of August 11, 1928, and 466 of January 16, 1929, are hereby canceled.

DEPARTMENTAL ORDER NO. 484-D, DECEMBER 30, 1929

REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE FOREIGN SERVICE SCHOOL

The President by Executive order of September 11, 1929, having provided for the establishment of a Foreign Service School in the Department of State, the following rules and regulations are hereby made for the governance of the school:

The Chief Instructor shall have the following duties:

- (a) To prepare and submit to the school board for approval a complete schedule of work to be covered during the term of instruction;
- (b) To select instructors in the various subjects from among the qualified officers of the Department of State, the Foreign Service, the other executive departments of the Government, and other available sources;
- (c) To instruct the school in subjects selected and approved by the board;
- (d) To maintain the discipline of the school and bear responsibility therefor;
- (e) To keep a record of attendance and an impartial, confidential rating of each pupil with respect to his qualifications for the Foreign Service;
- (f) To act as a member of the school board;
- (g) To make reports on the work of the school and the individual pupils at the end of the term of instruction or whenever required by the school board or the Secretary of State.

Each term of instruction shall begin and end on dates to be fixed by the school board.

Departmental Order No. 296 of June 9, 1924, is hereby canceled.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING EXAMINATIONS FOR THE FOREIGN SERVICE,
PROMULGATED BY THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS, DECEMBER 15, 1914.

1. *Examinations for unclassified grade only.*—Examinations will be for the grade of Foreign Service officer unclassified, with the understanding that successful candidates will be assigned to the diplomatic or consular branch of the Foreign Service according to the needs of the service and the special qualifications of the candidates.

2. *Time of examinations.*¹—Examinations will usually be held once each year, upon dates to be publicly announced through the press. All persons designated for examination will be notified in writing in advance of the examination. Examinations for particular candidates on dates other than those on which the regular examinations occur will not be held except as provided in section 3.

3. *Place of examination.*²—All examinations will be held in Washington or at other places specified in the letter of notification. Candidates for examination who are employed in diplomatic missions or consular offices abroad in clerical positions may be permitted to take the written examination at their posts of duty upon a regular examination date specified by the board and the oral examination³ upon the occasion of their presence in Washington before or after the date of taking the written examination.

4. *Scope of examination.*—The examination will be in two parts, one written and the other oral, each part counting equally. The written examination will include the subjects prescribed by the President, to wit: Modern languages (French, Spanish, or German is required, and a candidate may offer, in the oral test, in addition to one of these any languages with which he may be familiar); elements of international, commercial, and maritime law; political and commercial geography; the natural, industrial, and commercial resources and commerce of the United States with especial relation to the possibilities of trade expansion and protection; American history, government, and institutions; the history since 1850 of Europe, Latin America, and the Far East, with particular attention to political and economic tendencies; and the elements of political economy. Candidates will be examined in arithmetic as used in commercial statistics, tariff calculations, exchange and simple accounting, and they will be rated in English, composition, grammar, punctuation, spelling, and penmanship as shown by their replies to questions in the written examination.

The oral examination will be designed to ascertain the physical, mental, and temperamental qualifications of candidates for the proper performance of the duties of the Foreign Service; their character, ability, address, judgment, and fitness, general education and culture, and contemporary information, experience and business ability. In this part of the examination the applications previously filed, together with all other available information concerning the candidates, will be utilized in ascertaining the pertinent facts.

5. *Method of examination.*⁴—The written examination will be conducted for the board by the Civil Service Commission and will usually occupy two days. The oral examination will be conducted by the board after the candidates shall have completed the written examination. The physical fitness of the candidates will be determined by Government surgeons in Washington or elsewhere acting in an advisory capacity to the board of examiners, in accordance with the standards prescribed by the board.

6. *Ratings.*—Examinations will be rated on a scale of 100 and no person rated at less than 80 shall be eligible for certification.

7. *Certification.*—The names of candidates who shall have attained upon the whole examination the required rating of 80 will be certified by the board to the Secretary of State in the order of their standing in the examination as eligible for appointment. No one will be certified as eligible who is not a citizen of the United States specially designated by the President for appointment subject to examination and who has not reached the age of 21 or who has already reached the age of 35.⁵

8. *Results of examinations.*—The results of the examinations will be made known to candidates as soon as the report of the board shall have been submitted to the Secretary of State, and they will be informed of the rating in each subject and the average in the written examination, the total rating in the oral examination, which includes the physical examination, and the rating on the whole examination. No information in regard to the details of the oral examination will be made public.

9. *Duration of eligibility.*—The names of eligible candidates who have not been appointed or whose names have not been withdrawn by the candidates will remain upon the eligible list for two years from the date of certification, when they will be dropped therefrom and the candidates will not again be eligible for appointment except upon a new application, designation, and examination.

10. *Failure to report.*—Candidates who fail to report for the examination for which they have been duly designated may not be admitted to a subsequent examination unless specifically designated to take the subsequent examination.

11. *Political affiliations not considered.*—The political and religious affiliations of candidates will not be considered either in examinations or certifications.

12. *Expenses of candidates.*—The traveling and other personal expenses of candidates in connection with the taking of examinations are not borne by the Government.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 4879, MAY 8, 1928

REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE SELECTION, TRAINING, AND PROMOTION OF FOREIGN SERVICE OFFICERS FOR LANGUAGE ASSIGNMENTS IN THE NEAR EAST, IN EASTERN EUROPE, AND IN NORTH AFRICA

Chapter IV-9 of the Instructions to Diplomatic Officers of the United States is hereby established:

IV-9. Regulations governing the selection, training and promotion of Foreign Service officers for language assignments in the Near East, in Eastern Europe, and in North Africa.

The following regulations shall henceforth govern the selection, training and promotion of Foreign Service officers for language assignments in the Near East, in Eastern Europe, and in North Africa:

(a) *Countries included*

For the purposes of these regulations the Near East, Eastern Europe, and North Africa consist of the following countries: Afghanistan, Albania, Algeria, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Egypt, Estonia, Ethiopia, Greece, Hedjaz, Iraq, Latvia, Lithuania, Morocco, Palestine, Persia, Poland, Rumania, Russia and Siberia, Kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes, Syria and the Lebanon, Tripoli, Tunis, and Turkey.

(b) *Application for assignment*

Any Foreign Service officer, unclassified, (\$2,500 Grade) may make application for language assignment in the Near East, in Eastern Europe, or in North Africa. Such applications shall be submitted to the Personnel Board for consideration and approval, if the applicants are believed to possess the required intellectual, moral and physical qualifications, and the assignments are considered to be in the best interests of the Service.

(c) *Probationary period*

A Foreign Service officer whose application for language assignment has been approved shall undergo a probationary period of a year and a half at a consular post in the Near East, in Eastern Europe, or in North Africa.

(d) *Physical examinations*

At the conclusion of the probationary period the candidate shall undergo a physical examination conducted by a physician of whose competence the Department shall be satisfied and who

shall certify that the Foreign Service officer is in sound health after a year and a half of residence in the Near East, in Eastern Europe, or in North Africa, and that he has no physical defect or weakness which would prevent his assignment for duty in any part of the Near East, of Eastern Europe, or of North Africa.

(e) *Mental examinations*

At the conclusion of the probationary period the Foreign Service officer shall also be examined in such form and manner and by such person or persons as the Personnel Board shall determine with reference to each particular case. No fixed standard shall be prescribed for this examination which shall be primarily an opportunity for judgment by competent persons of the seriousness of purpose and special aptitude of the Foreign Service officer.

(f) *Formal studies*

Foreign Service officers who have successfully undergone the probationary period and the examinations prescribed at the conclusion thereof shall pursue their formal studies in the languages, history, etc., of Asia and of Eastern Europe at such institution or institutions as the Department may designate in each case.

In addition to his salary each Foreign Service officer on language assignment for duty in the Near East, in Eastern Europe, or in North Africa is allowed the cost of tuition at the rate of \$350.00 per annum, but this allowance ceases upon the completion of the studies specified in this paragraph.

Foreign Service officers pursuing language study abroad shall be assigned to the consulate in the district where the institution at which the studies are being carried on is located and shall be under the control and supervision of the principal consular officer.

(g) *Period of study*

The normal course of language study shall be for three years and the languages to be presented shall ordinarily be for candidates for language assignments in the non-Slavic countries of the Near East and in North Africa: Arabic, Turkish and Persian—all three, but with special emphasis upon one only; and in the case of candidates for language assignments in the Slavic countries of Eastern Europe and the Near East: Russian. The Personnel Board may in its discretion modify the provisions of this paragraph to meet the needs of particular cases.

(h) *Proof of progress*

The examinations and diplomas of institutions at which language officers are studying shall be considered by the Department as sufficient proof of progress and accomplishment in studies and no further examinations or tests shall be required.

The principal consular officer in the district where the institution at which a language officer is studying is located shall receive from the competent authorities of such institution and shall communicate to the Department the results of the examinations of Foreign Service officers as well as any other reports concerning their progress and standing which may at the discretion of the Department or of the principal consular officer be from time to time called for.

(i) *Effect of failure in examinations*

Failure in the final examinations of any one year shall ordinarily involve the withdrawal of the Foreign Service officer from the institution at which he is studying and the termination of his candidacy for language assignment. This step shall not be taken, however, until the opinion of the competent authorities of the institution has been given in writing and considered by the Personnel Board.

(j) *Assignments during vacation period of institutions attended*

Whenever possible Foreign Service officers engaged in formal language study shall be temporarily assigned to some post in the Near East, in Eastern Europe or in North Africa during the vacation period of the institutions which they are attending.

(k) *Promotion*

A Foreign Service officer, Unclassified (\$2,500 salary group), who has successfully undergone the probationary period and who has passed the examinations prescribed to be taken at the conclusion thereof, shall be promoted to fill the first existing vacancy in the next higher salary group of Foreign Service officers, Unclassified. He shall be entitled to one further such advancement upon completing one year of formal language study and passing creditably the prescribed final examinations for that year. Upon completing the full course of study and receiving a diploma he will be eligible for promotion to fill the first existing vacancy in the class in the Foreign Service next above that in which he is at the time of completing the full course of study and receiving a diploma.

(l) *Length of service required*

It shall be the policy of the Department to assign a Foreign Service officer who has completed the course of study specified in paragraph (g) to duty in or connected with the Near East, Eastern Europe, or North Africa for a period of at least ten consecutive years.

(m) *Regional assignments*

As a temporary measure and in order to meet the immediate needs of the Service the Personnel Board may designate for regional assignments in the Near East, in Eastern Europe, or in North Africa and for study in connection therewith any Foreign Service officer who has already had experience in those parts of the world, whether in the Foreign Service or otherwise, and who can satisfactorily establish the seriousness of his desire and his qualifications for regional assignments.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 4892, MAY 26, 1928

REGULATIONS GOVERNING FOREIGN SERVICE OFFICERS ASSIGNED FOR LANGUAGE STUDY IN CHINA AND JAPAN

Amending Chapter IV-8 of the Instructions to Diplomatic Officers of the United States and establishing subparagraph (o) of that Chapter.

IV-8. Regulations governing Foreign Service officers assigned for language study in China and Japan

The following regulations will hereafter govern the assignment, training, and promotion of Foreign Service officers assigned to China and Japan for language study:

(a) *Nature and purpose of assignment*

The assignment of Foreign Service officers to China and Japan for language study is for the training of personnel for the Foreign Service in China and Japan, where an essential part of the equipment of officers is a knowledge of the Chinese and Japanese languages. Consistently with that purpose, a limited number of appointees in the unclassified grade of the Foreign Service with a salary of \$2,500 who have shown a special aptitude for acquiring languages, and who possess the other necessary qualifications will be assigned from time to time as the needs of the Service require, to China and Japan where they will be required to study the Chinese and Japanese languages and such other languages and subjects as may be required by these regulations or subsequent instructions.

(b) *Allowances*

In addition to his salary, each Foreign Service officer on language assignment is allowed \$350 per annum for tuition, but this allowance ceases upon completion of the language assignment.

(c) *Entrance on duty*

Foreign Service officers assigned for language study will report for duty to the head of the diplomatic mission in China or Japan, as the case may be, or to such other place as may be designated, and, except as otherwise provided herein, will remain there two years.

(d) *Nature of duties*

After entering upon their duties at the mission or other place designated, Foreign Service officers on language assignment will devote their time to the study of the language of the country and the other subjects listed in subparagraph (f), under the supervision of the head of the office and under the immediate direction of the language secretary or other designated officer, to the end that they may acquire the ability to read, write, and speak the language, as well as a good knowledge of the other subjects prescribed. In addition to the foregoing, such officers will be required at the same time to study the local business methods and trade practices. The study of consular regulations, and administration will be included after the first year.

(e) *Progress examinations*

Foreign Service officers on language assignment will be examined quarterly by the language officer of the mission, or other designated officer.

(f) *Examinations for promotion*

At the end of one year and again at the end of two years after entry on duty at the mission or other office, Foreign Service officers on language assignment shall be examined for promotion in accordance with the courses of study prescribed by the missions in the countries to which such officers are assigned and approved by the Department and which shall cover the following subjects:

Chinese and Japanese languages (moderately difficult conversation, official and commercial correspondence, and translation from newspapers and periodicals).

Political history and political institutions of the country.

Commercial geography of the country.

Foreign trade of the country.

Elementary knowledge of such of the laws of the country as pertain to the duties which the student may ultimately be called upon to perform.

Consular and Diplomatic regulations and administration (second year).

(g) *Method of examination*

These examinations shall be held by a board composed of the language secretary of the mission, one other Foreign Service officer, and one qualified American designated by the head of the mission. The examinations shall be both oral and written, and in order to pass officers must receive a rating of 80 on a scale of 100 on languages and an average of 80 on a scale of 100 on all other subjects.

The findings of the board, accompanied by the papers in the written examinations, and a detailed report of the special qualifications, industry, moral conduct, and dependableness of each officer will be made by the head of the mission to the Secretary of State for consideration and approval. Inasmuch as the findings of the board are not effective until approved, no information in regard to the ratings given by the board should be communicated to the candidates except upon the specific authority of the Secretary of State.

All examinations will take place at the diplomatic mission unless orders to the contrary are issued by the Secretary of State. In the event that the exigencies of the service shall not permit officers who may have been assigned elsewhere to return to Tokyo and Peking for the purpose of examination, the head of the mission may, after the preparation of the papers by the language officer, mail them in personal and sealed envelopes to the officer in charge of the post at which the candidate for examination is serving, who shall conduct the written examinations in the same manner as if they were being held at the diplomatic mission, leaving the oral part of the examination to be taken at the diplomatic mission or elsewhere when feasible, as the Secretary of State may determine in each case.

(h) *Effect of failure in examination*

If the Foreign Service officer assigned for language study shall be unable to pass either of the prescribed examinations, unless his failure arises from causes which would justify a continuation of language study, and reexamination, his assignment for language study shall be terminated and he shall be assigned elsewhere for duty.

(i) Promotion

A Foreign Service officer assigned for language study shall be promoted to fill the first existing vacancy in the next higher salary group of Foreign Service officers, unclassified, upon passing the examination required to be taken at the end of the first year of his assignment, and to one further such advancement upon passing the examination required to be taken at the end of the second year of his assignment, as set forth in subparagraph (f) of these regulations.

(j) Duties

A Foreign Service officer having thus qualified in the language shall be assigned at the discretion of the Secretary of State for duty at one of the consulates or at the diplomatic mission in the country where the language is used. Such officers are subordinate to the principal officer at the post to which they may be assigned, and it will be their duty to perform, under his direction, the work of translating and interpreting and such other duties in the office as may in the judgment of the officer in charge be necessary, including the preparation of accounts, the drafting of correspondence, the filing and recording of correspondence, the certification of invoices, notarial work, the handling of citizenship and passport cases, the coding and decoding of telegrams, and the preparation of trade reports.

Consistent with the exigencies of the service, it will be the policy of the Department to assign an officer trained in the language for an initial period of five consecutive years, exclusive of the period spent on language assignment, or periods devoted to leave, to posts in the country where he has done his language study.

(k) Performance of office work by Foreign Service officers on language assignment

Foreign Service officers attached to a mission or other office for language study may be required, in the discretion of the chief of mission, to perform some minor part of the official work of the office to the end that they may gain useful knowledge of the mode of transacting official business and of the forms and practices employed therein. In Japan work in the Consulate General at Tokyo will, as far as practicable, be substituted for work in the Embassy. The chief of mission will be careful, however, not to permit duties of the character mentioned to interfere with the duties of the officer in acquiring a thorough knowledge of the language of the country.

(l) Optional examination for promotion

No examinations for promotion other than those specified in subparagraph (f) shall be required, but any Foreign Service officer who has successfully completed the language assignment provided for in the foregoing paragraphs of these regulations may, after the expiration of a period of not less than one year, if he desires, present himself for a further examination for promotion. This examination shall cover the following subjects:

- Advanced Chinese and Japanese (conversation, composition, and translation from newspapers and current periodicals).
- Political history and political institutions of the country.
- Commercial geography, resources, and industries of the country.
- Foreign trade of the country.
- The law of the country as affecting foreigners.
- Consular and Diplomatic regulations and practice.

(m) Method of examination

The method of examination will be that described in subparagraph (g) of these regulations.

(n) Promotion

Upon successfully passing the foregoing examination, a Foreign Service officer whose efficiency record is in other respects satisfactory will be eligible for promotion to fill the first available vacancy in the class in the Foreign Service next above that in which he is at the time when he presents himself for examination. The rule now followed, that no officer will be recommended for advancement before the expiration of eighteen months after his most recent promotion shall not be applicable in making the promotion provided for in this paragraph.

(o) Regional assignments

In order to meet special needs of the Service, the Personnel Board may designate for regional assignments in China and Japan and for study in connection therewith any Foreign Service officer who has already had experience in those parts of the world, whether in the Foreign Service or otherwise, and who can satisfactorily establish the seriousness of his desire and his qualifications for regional assignments. Subparagraphs *(i)* and *(n)* of these regulations will not apply to officers designated for regional assignment and study under this subparagraph. Subparagraphs *(i)* and *(n)* apply only to those officers in the unclassified grade with salary of \$2500 selected under the provisions of subparagraph *(a)*. Officers designated for regional assignment and study under this subparagraph will be promoted in such manner and at such times as may be considered equitable by the Personnel Board due regard being had to their previous record, their progress in their studies, and their relative standing as compared with other officers.
