






1. ORGANIZATION OF THE DEPARTMENT

THE SECRETARY OF STATE

The Secretary of State, who is the highest ranking Cabinet member, is charged, under the direction of the President, with the conduct of negotiations of whatever character relating to the foreign affairs of the United States, and has charge of the correspondence with the diplomatic and consular representatives of the United States and with the representatives of foreign powers accredited to the United States. The Secretary of State grants and issues passports to nationals of the United States. Exequaturs to foreign consuls in the United States are issued through his office. He prescribes, promulgates, and administers regulations under treaties and laws governing international traffic in arms. He has custody of the seal of the United States, of current records relating to Presidential electors, and of the originals of acts and resolutions of Congress subsequent to the sixty-seventh Congress, and treaties, conventions, protocols, and other international agreements to which the United States is a party and proclamations thereof by the President. He certifies the adoption of amendments to the Constitution of the United States. He publishes the acts and resolutions of Congress, territorial papers, treaties and other international acts of the United States, and papers relating to the foreign relations of the United States.

OFFICE OF THE LEGAL ADVISER

Drafts and interprets treaties, conventions, protocols, and other international agreements; deals with questions of municipal, foreign, and international law, and handles diplomatic claims of American citizens against foreign governments; claims of foreigners against the Government of the United States, including the preparation and presentation of the former class of cases to international arbitral tribunals and the defense of the United States before such tribunals in cases of claims made by foreign governments; questions of personal and private rights of aliens in the United States and of American citizens in foreign countries, such as acquisition, inheritance, and transfer of property; arrest, detention, fines, imprisonment, personal injury, acts of insurgents, taxation, breach or annulment of concessions or other contracts; failure to pay interest or principal on Government obligations, sequestration or confiscation of property; complaints regarding action of executive, legislative, judicial, or military authorities; questions concerning the rights and privileges of American diplomatic and consular officers abroad and of foreign diplomatic and consular officers in the United States, and concerning the rights and immunities of sovereigns and public property; questions relating to the jurisdiction over and control of public or private vessels; questions relating to citizenship, naturalization, expatriation, extradition, and extraterritoriality; questions relating to the acts and rights of belligerents, neutrals, and insurgents on land or sea; and a large number of miscellaneous legal questions not included in the above classification.

BOARD OF FOREIGN SERVICE PERSONNEL

The duties of the Board of Foreign Service Personnel, under Executive Order No. 5642 of June 8. 1931, are: to submit to the Secretary of State for approval lists of Foreign Service officers in which all Foreign Service officers shall be graded in accordance with their relative efficiency and value to the Service; to recommend promotions in the Foreign Service, and to furnish the Secretary of State with lists of Foreign Service officers who have demonstrated special capacity for promotion to the grade of minister; to submit to the Secretary of State for his approval and for transmission thereafter to the President, the names of those officers and employees of the Department of State who, after five years of continuous service in an executive or quasiexecutive position, are recommended for appointment by transfer to the position of Foreign Service officer; to submit to the Secretary of State the names of those Foreign Service officers who are recommended for designation as counselors of embassy or legation; to recommend to the Secretary of State the assignment of Foreign Service officers to posts and the transfer of such officers from one branch of the Service to the other; to consider controversies and delinquencies among the Service personnel and to recommend to the Secretary of State appropriate discipli nary action where required; to determine, for submission to the Secretary of State after considering recommendations of the Division of Foreign Service Personnel, that the efficiency rating of an officer is unsatisfactory, thereby meaning below the standard required for the Service, in order that the Secretary of State may take appropriate action.

The duties of the Division of Foreign Service Personnel are: to maintain contact with Foreign Service officers and employees while on visits to the United States; to discuss with Foreign Service officers ways for the development and improvement of their work; to confer with the divisions of the Department concerning the work of Foreign Service officers; to interview applicants and prospective applicants for the Foreign Service; to examine and recommend for appointment applicants for positions as subordinate employees in the Foreign Service; to collect, collate, and record pertinent data relating to Foreign Service personnel; to keep the efficiency records of all Foreign Service officers and employees; to hold strictly confidential all personnel records of the Foreign Service, and to reveal no papers, documents, data, or reports relating thereto, except to authorized officials; to keep the records of the Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service and attend to all details connected with the holding of examinations for the Foreign Service; to submit recommendations on all matters within the authority of the Personnel Board; to attend, through the personnel officers assigned to the division, the meetings of the Personnel Board when so directed.

The Provinces of Kwangsi and Kweichow and that portion of the Province of Kwangtung west of 115° east longitude.

Chefoo, Shantung

That portion of the Province of Shantung northeast of a line drawn along the northeast shore of the embayment of Tingtzetsui Kow to the mouth of the Wulung Ho, thence in a northwesterly direction across the peninsula to the mouth of the Kiao Ho, through the towns of Chuhkow and Shaho (both included in this district).

Dairen, Manchuria 1

The Japanese leased territory of Kwantung.

Foochow, Fukien

All of the Province of Fukien except four prefectures forming the consular district of Amoy.

Hankow, Hupeh

That portion of the Province of Honan south of the Yellow River, and all of the Provinces of Hupeh, Kiangsi, Hunan, Szechwan, Shensi, Kansu, Chinghai (Kokonor), and Sinkiang (Chinese Turkistan).

Harbin, Manchuria

All of the Province of Heilungkiang; and that part of the Province of Kirin lying to the north of the parallel of 44° north latitude, including the following places which are open to trade: Harbin, Ninguta, Sansing, and Suifenho.

Hong Kong 2

The British colony of Hong Kong and the Portuguese colony of Macau.

Mukden, Manchuria

All of the Province of Liaoning (Fengtien) except the leased territory of Kwantung; and that part of the Province of Kirin lying to the south of the parallel of 44° north latitude, including the following places which are open to trade: Changchun (Kwanchengtze), Hunchun, Kirin, Lungchingtsun, Towtaokow, Wangching (Paitsaokow), and Yenki (Chützuchieh).

Saigon, French Indochina

All of French Indochina.

Shanghai, Kiangsu

The Provinces of Anhwei, Chekiang, and Kiangsu.

Swatow, Kwangtung

That portion of the Province of Kwangtung east of longitude 115°.

Tientsin, Hopeh

The Provinces of Hopeh (Chihli), Ninghsia, and Shansi, that portion of the Province of Honan north of the Yellow River, and all of Mongolia including the [special] administrative districts of Suiyuan, Chahar, and Jehol.

Tsinan, Shantung

That portion of the Province of Shantung west of a line which follows the Kiao Ho southward from its mouth to its source, thence to the nearer source of the Taolin Ho and along the Taolin Ho to the sea.

Tsingtao, Shantung

That portion of the Province of Shantung lying between the Chefoo and Tsinan consular districts.

Yünnanfu, Yunnan

The Provinces of Yunnan and Sikang (Chwanpien), and Tihet.

COLOMBIA

Barranquilla

The Prefectures of Osaka, Wakayama, Nara, Kyoto, Shiga, Fukui, and in the Prefecture of Hyogo, the gun (county) of Kawabe, and that part of the gun (county) of Muko comprising the city of Amagasaki, the mura (villages) of Osho, Muko, Ryogen, Koto, Kawaragi, Naruo, the city of Nishinomiya, and the mura (village) of Seido.

Taihoku, Taiwan

All of Taiwan (Formosa), and the Pescadores Islands.

Tokyo, Japan

The Prefectures of Yamanashi, Chiba, Tokyo, Saitama, Ibaraki, Gumma, Tochigi, Niigata, Fukushima, Yamagata, Miyagi, Akita, Iwate, Aomori, and in the Prefecture of Nagano the gun (county) of Kitasaku (the principal cities of which are Iwamurata, Karuisawa, and Komoro); Hokkaido and the adjacent islands to the north; and the islands in the North Pacific Ocean to the administration of which by Japan, pursuant to a mandate of the League of Nations, the Government of the United States consented, subject to the provisions of the treaty with Japan concerning the island of Yap concluded February 11, 1922.

Yokohama, Japan

The Prefectures of Shizuoka and Kanagawa.

LUXEMBURG

Luxemburg

All of the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg.

MEXICO

Agua Prieta, Sonora

That part of the State of Sonora lying north of latitude 29° and east of 110° west longitude, but excepting the territory immediately tributary to the Cananea-Naco Railway.

Chihuahua, Chihuahua

That portion of the State of Chihuahua lying to the south and east of a line drawn from the Sonora boundary through Madera to Sauz (both towns included); thence northeastwardly through, and excluding, San Antonio on the Rio Grande.

Ciudad Juárez, Chihuahua

That part of the State of Chihuahua lying to the north of a line drawn through Madera to Sauz (both towns excluded); thence northeastwardly through, and including, San Antonio on the Río Grande.

Durango, Durango

That part of the State of Durango lying west of a line drawn due south from the Chihuahua boundary to Descubridora, thence in a southeasterly direction from Descubridora (excluded) to the intersection of the meridian of 103°30' west longitude with the Durango State boundary; that part of the State of Zacateeas lying to the west of the meridian of 103°30' west longitude, and that part of the State of Jalisco lying north of latitude 22° and west of the meridian of 103°30' west longitude.

Ensenada, Baja California

That part of the northern territory of Baja California (north of latitude 28°) lying to the south and west of a line drawn from the international boundary at Tijuana (included) to a point at 32° north and 116° west, and thence to a point on the Gulf of California in latitude 30° north.

Guadalajara, Jalisco

Those parts of the States of Jalisco and Zacatecas lying to the south of latitude 22°; and the State of Colima.

Guaymas, Sonora

That part of the State of Sonora lying south of latitude 29°, and the southern territory of Baja California (south of latitude 28°).

Matamoros, Tamaulipas

That part of the State of Tamaulipas lying north of latitude 24°, and south of a line drawn east and west just to the north of Mier on the Río Grande.

Mazatlán, Sinaloa

The States of Sinaloa and Nayarit.

Mérida, Yncatár

The States of Campeche and Yucatáu and the territory of Quintana Roo.

Mexicali, Baja California

That part of the northern territory of Baja California lying to the north and east of a line drawn from the International boundary at Tijuana (excluded) to a point at 32° north and 116° west, and thence to a point on the Gulf of California in latitude 30° north; also that part of the State of Sonora lying west of 113° west longitude.

México, D. F.

The States of Querétaro, Hidalgo, Puebla, Tlaxcala, Morelos, México, Michoacán, Guerrero, and the Federal District; and that part of the State of Oaxaca north and west of a line drawn due east from the Guerrero boundary to Yautepec (San Carios Yautepec) passing through and including Ejutla, thence northeastwardly from and including Yautepec to the Río La Trinidad

at the point where it first touches the Oaxaca-Veracruz boundary, the town of Tuxtepec, Oaxaca (near the Voracruz State boundary), however, being excluded from the México, D. F., district

Monterrey, Nuevo León

That part of the State of Nuevo León lying south of a line drawn through and including Golondrinas, in a direction slightly south of east through Parás (oxcluded); and excepting also that part of Nuevo León to the west of a line connecting the two southeastern points of the State of Coahuila.

Nogales, Sonora

That part of the State of Sonora lying north of latitude 29°, east of 113° west longitude, and west of 110° west longitude and including the territory immediately tributary to the Cansnea Naco Railway.

Nuevo Laredo, Tamaulipas

That part of the State of Nuevo León lying north of a line passing through, but excluding, Golondrinas, in a direction slightly south of east through Parás (included); and that part of the State of Tamaulipas to the north of a line drawn east and west just to the north of Mier on the Río Grande.

Piedras Negras, Coahuila

That part of the State of Coahuila lying to the north and east of a line drawn on the parallel of 28° north latitude from the Chihuahua boundary due east as far as La Fé; thence southeastwardly from La Fé (excluded) to Cuatro Cienegas (included); thence directly east through a point just south of Monclova to the Nuevo León boundary.

Saltillo, Coahuila

That part of the State of Coahuila lying to the south of a line drawn from, but excluding, Cuatro Cienegas eastwardly to the Nuevo León boundary, through a point just south of Monclova, and to the east of a line drawn from Cuatro Cienegas southwardly to, but excluding, Parras, and thence southeastwardly to the Zacatecas boundary at a point directly north of Mazapil, Zacatecas; that part of the State of Zacatecas lying to the east of a line drawn north and south through, and including, Mazapil; that part of the State of Nuevo León lying to the northwest of a line connecting the two southeastern points of the State of Coahuila.

San Luis Potosí, San Luis Potosí

The State of San Luis Potosí, except that portion lying to the cast of a line drawn due north and south through, but excluding, the town of Tamazopo (approximately in longitude 99°25′ west of Greenwich); the States of Aguascalientes and Guanajuato; that part of the State of Zacatecas lying to the south of the Tropic of Cancer, to the east of the meridian of 103°30′ west longitude, and to the north of the parallel of 22° north latitude; and that part of the State of Jalisco lying to the north of latitude 22° but east of the meridian of 103°30′ west longitude.

Tampico, Tamaulipas

That part of the State of Tamaulipas lying south of latitude 24°; that part of the State of Veracruz lying north of the Río Cazones; and that part of the State of San Luis Potosí lying to the east of a line drawn north and south through, and including, the town of Tamazopo (approximately in longitude 90°25′ west of Greenwich).

Torreón, Coahuila

Those parts of the States of Coahulla, Durango, and Zacatecas lying within the following boundaries: The parallel of 28° latitude from the Chihuahua boundary due east as far as La Fé, Coahulla (included); thence southeastwardly to Cuatro Cienegas (ex-

cluded); thence southwardly to Parras, Coahuila (included); | thence southeastwardly to the Coahuila-Zacatecas boundary at a point directly north of Mazapil, Zacatecas; thence directly south on a line through Mazapil (excluded) to the Zacatecas-San Luis Potosf boundary; thence southwestwardly on the Zacatecas-San Luis Potosi boundary to the Tropic of Cancer; thence due west on the Tropic of Cancer to 103° 30' west longitude; thence northwardly on the meridian of 103°30' west longitude to the Zacatecas-Durango boundary; thence by a straight line in a northwesterly direction to Descubridora, Durango (included), intersecting the railroad between Torreón and Durango so as to leave the towns of Pedriceña, Agua Vieja, and Pasaje in the Torreón district: thence directly north by a line through Descubridora to the northern boundary of Durango; thence eastwardly by the Durango-Chihuahua boundary and northwardly by the Coahuila-Chihuahua boundary to latitude 28°.

Veracruz, Veracruz

The States of Chiapas and Tabasco; that part of the State of Veracruz lying to the south and east of the Rio Cazones; that part of the State of Oaxaca lying south and east of a line drawn from the Guerrero boundary directly east to Yautepec (San Carlos Yautepec) passing through but excluding Ejutla, thence northeastwardly from, but excluding, Yautepec to the Rio La Trinidad at the point where it first touches the Oaxaca-Veracruz boundary; the town of Tuxtepec, Oaxaca, near the Veracruz State boundary, is also included.

MOROCCO

Casablanca

The zone of the French Protectorate in Morocco.

Tangier

The international zone of Tangier, and the Spanish protected territory in Morocco, as well as Ceuta and Melilla.

NETHERLANDS AND POSSESSIONS

(Netherlands)

Amsterdam

The Provinces of North Holland, Drenthe, Friesland, Gelder land, Groningen, Overijssel, and Utrecht.

Rotterdam

The Provinces of South Holland, Limburg, North Brabant, and Zeeland.

(Possessions)

Batavia, Java, Netherlands Indies

In Java, the western half (west of administrative political boundary lines approximately 110° east of Greenwich), comprising: the Province of West Java (the Residencies of Bantam, Batavia, Buitenzorg, Cheribon, and Priangan); and in the Province of Middle Java, the Residencies of Pekalongan, Banjoemas, and Kedoe. In Sumatra, the southern half (south of administrative political boundary lines which approximate the Equator) and islands adjacent to southern Sumatra, comprising: The Residencies of Sumatra's Westkust, Benkoelen, the Lampongs (Lampoengsche districten), Palembang, Djambi, Riouw and dependencies (Riouw en Onderhoorigheden), and Bangka and dependencies (Bangka en Onderhoorigheden), and the autonomous Subresidency of Billiton. In Borneo, the Residency of the Western District (Residentie Westerafdeeling).

Medan, Sumatra, Netherlands Indies

In Sumatra, the northern half (north of administrative political boundary lines which approximate the Equator) and islands adjacent to northern Sumatra, comprising: The Governments of Achin and dependencies (Atjeh en Onderhoorigheden) and Sumatra East Coast (Oostkust van Sumatra), and the Residency of Tapanoeli.

Surabava, Java, Netherlands Indies

In Java, the eastern half (east of administrative political boundary lines approximately 110° east of Greenwich), comprising: The Province of East Java (the Residencies of Besoeki, Bodjonegoro, Kediri, Madioen, Madoera [island], Malang, Probolinggo, and Soerabaja [Surabaya]); the Government of Soerakarta; the Government of Jogjakarta; and in the Province of Middle Java, the Residencies of Djapara-Rembang and Semarang. In Borneo, the Residency of the Southern and Eastern Districts (Residentie Zuider-en Oosterafdeeling). All Netherlands possessions east of Java and Borneo, comprising the Residencies of Bali and Lombok (Bali en Lombok), Timor (together with Portuguese Timor, informally) and dependencies (Timor en Onderhoorigheden), and Manado (in Celebes), the Government of Celebes and dependencies (Gouvernement Celebes en Onderhoorigheden), and the Government of the Moluccas (Gouvernement der Molukken) which includes Netherlands New Guinea.

NICARAGUA

Managua

That part of Nicaragua lying to the west of a straight line passing through a point on the Río Segovia (Wanks River) in longitude 85°30' west and a point on the Río San Juan in longitude 84°30' west.

Puerto Cabezas

All of Nicaragua not included in the Managua consular district.

NORWAY

Bergen

The Provinces of Hordaland, Sogn og Fjordane, and that portion of the Province of Møre known as Sunnmøre.

Osla

The Provinces of Akershus, Aust-Agder, Buskerud, Finnmark, Hedmark, Nordland, Nord-Trøndelag, Opland, Rogaland, Sør-Trøndelag, Vest-Agder, Vestfold, Telemark, Troms, Østfold, and that portion of the Province of Møre known as Nordmøre; the island of Jan Mayen and the Archipelago of Syalbard (Spitsbergen).

PORTUGAL AND POSSESSIONS

Lishon

The administrative districts of Beja, Castelo Branco, Évora, Faro (Algarve), Leiria, Lisboa, Portalegre, Santarém, and Setubal; the Cape Verde Islands; and in Africa, Portuguese Guinea, Angola, and the Portuguese possessions of St. Thomas Island (São Tomé), and Prince's Island (Principe).

The Madeira Islands.

Lourenco Marques, Mozambique

Mozambique (Portuguese East Africa).

St. Michael (São Miguel), Azores

The Azores (Acores).

SPAIN

Barcelona

The Provinces of Barcelona, Gerona, Huesca, Lérida, Tarragona, Zaragoza, and the Balearic Islands; in Africa, the Spanish territory comprising Rio de Oro, Ifni, and Rio Muni, and the islands of Fernando Po. Great and Little Elobey. Corisco, and Annobon; and the Republic of Andorra.

Tarragona (consular agency): The Province of Tarragona.

The Provinces of Alava, Burgos, Logroño, Navarra, Vizcava, Guipúzcoa, Palencia, and Santander.

Las Palmas, Canary Islands

The Transvaal; Orange Free State; Swaziland; Southern Rhodesia; Northern Rhodesia; and Nyasaland Protectorate.

7. TARIFF OF UNITED STATES CONSULAR FEES 1

The following Tariff of United States Consular Fees is prescribed by the President under authority of section 1745, Revised Statutes, as amended by the acts of April 5, 1906 (ch. 1366, secs. 7, 8, and 9, 34 Stat. 101), and June 4, 1920 (ch. 223, secs. 1 and 2, 41 Stat. 750), to be charged by consular officers for official services. All charges for such services must be in strict accordance with this tariff, and be collected in the coin of the United States or at its representative value in exchange. No fee or compensation will be collected for any service not covered by this tariff.

The fees in this tariff are not prescribed for American vessels and seamen, because they are exempted by law from the payment of consular fees. Consular agents will make the fees in this tariff a basis of collection from the Treasury for services to such vessels. Foreign-built vessels, unregistered, owned by American citizens, and vessels documented under the laws of the Philippine Islands are not exempt from the payment of the fees prescribed herein.

Services, except those for which fees are fixed in items 8, 9, and 10, under this tariff shall be rendered free of charge when performed: (a) In connection with the settlement of the estate of any employee of the United States dying abroad while on official duty; (b) for the use of any person in the collection of claims from the United States or from any State for compensation, pensions, back pay, bounty, bonus, property loss in the service of the United States; (c) for obtaining the return of property held by the Alien Property Custodian; and (d) for the official use of the United States Veterans' Administration.

Consular officers must require all fees to be paid in advance and before the stamps are canceled, except in case of attendance out of office or of commissions, when the amount cannot be determined until the service is performed. Advance deposits to cover fees in such latter cases may be accepted but in no other.

This tariff is effective July 1, 1929, and should be posted in a conspicuous place in consular offices as required by section 1731, Revised Statutes.

8. DISPOSITION OF FEES AND COMPENSATION OF CONSULAR AGENTS AND VICE CONSULS

The act for the reorganization of the consular service of the United States, approved April 5, 1906 (34 Stat. 101), provides:

Sec. 8. That all fees, official or unofficial, received by any officer in the consular service for services rendered in connection with the duties of his office or as a consular officer, including fees for notarial services, and fees for taking depositions, executing commissions or letters rogatory, settling estates, receiving or paying out moneys, caring for or disposing of property, shall be accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the United States, and the sole and only compensation of such officers shall be by salaries fixed by law; but this shall not apply to consular agents, who shall be paid by one-half of the fees received in their offices, up to a maximum sum of one thousand dollars in any one year, the other half being accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the United States.

The act of February 23, 1931 (46 Stat. 1209), amends the act of April 5, 1906, as follows:

Sec. 18. That the provisions of sections 8 and 10 of the Act of April 5, 1906, relative to official fees and the method of accounting therefor shall apply to diplomatic officers below the grade of minister and to consular officers.

Section 25 of the act of February 23, 1931, provides as follows:

Sec. 25. That for such times as any Foreign Service officer shall be lawfully authorized to act as chargé d'affaires ad interim or to assume charge of a consulate general or consulate during the absence of the principal officer at the post to which he shall have been assigned, he shall, if his salary is less than one-half that of such principal officer, receive in addition to his salary as Foreign Service officer, compensation equal to the difference between such salary and one-half of the salary provided by law for the ambassador, minister, or principal consular officer, as the case may be.

# 18. REGULATIONS CONCERNING PRECEDENCE OF DIPLOMATIC AGENTS

The rules on this subject which have been prescribed by the Department are the same as those contained in the seven rules of the Congress of Vienna, found in the protocol of the session of March, 9, 1815, and in the supplementary or eighth rule of the Congress of Aix-la-Chapelle of November 21, 1818. They are as follows:

ARTICLE 1. Diplomatic agents are divided into three classes: That of ambassadors, legates, or nuncios; that of envoys, ministers, or other persons accredited to sovereigns; that of chargés d'affaires accredited to ministers for foreign affairs.

ART. 2. Ambassadors, legates, or nuncios only have the representative character.

ART. 3. Diplomatic agents on an extraordinary mission have not, on that account, any

superiority of rank.

ART. 4. Diplomatic agents shall take precedence in their respective classes according to the date of the official notification of their arrival. The present regulation shall not cause any innovation with regard to the representative of the Pope.

ART. 5. A uniform mode shall be determined in each State for the reception of diplomatic agents

of each class.

ART. 6. Relations of consanguinity or of family alliance between courts confer no precedence on their diplomatic agents. The same rule also applies to political alliances.

ART. 7. In acts or treaties between several powers which grant alternate precedence, the order which is to be observed in the signatures shall be decided by lot between the ministers.

ART. 8. . . . It is agreed that ministers resident accredited to them shall form, with respect to their precedence, an intermediate class between ministers of the second class and charges d'affaires.

# 19. ORGANIZATION OF THE FOREIGN SERVICE

# GENERAL INFORMATION

# CONDUCT OF FOREIGN RELATIONS

The President is charged under the Constitution with the responsibility of conducting the foreign relations of the United States. The Secretary of State is his adviser in such matters and acts as the agent through whom he issues his instructions to the Foreign Service, which forms the field force through which the necessary contacts with foreign governments are established and maintained

## REPRESENTATION IN FOREIGN COUNTRIES

The United States maintains embassics and legations at the capitals of some 56 foreign countries, and consulates general, consulates, and vice consulates in some 255 of the leading cities of the world. Each embassy or legation is headed by an ambassador or minister appointed by the President by promotion from the ranks of the Foreign Service or by selection from outside the Service. Each such chief of mission is assisted by a staff of diplomatic secretaries, clerks, and subordinate employees. Consular offices are headed by consuls general, consuls, or vice consuls, who have staffs of subordinate officers and employees.

# FOREIGN SERVICE OFFICERS

Foreign Service officers, the body of permanent officers of the Foreign Service embracing all counselors of embassy or legation, diplomatic secretaries, consuls general, consuls, and vice consuls of career, are appointed after examination. These officers deal with every problem that enters into the relations of the United States with foreign countries, whether it be political, commercial, administrative, or social. They protect the interests of the Government as well as the interests and persons of Americans traveling in foreign countries. Some conception of the range of the duties of Foreign Service officers may be obtained from the following outline.

The efficient Foreign Service officer-

Creates good will and common understanding, and, with restrained and critical leadership born of mature experience and profound knowledge of men and affairs, uses these as instruments for enhancing international confidence and cooperation among governments and people.

Adapts himself, his conduct, and his mode of living, appropriately to climate and surroundings in the country to which he is assigned.

Learns to speak the language of the country in a manner that reveals a background of intelligence and cultivation.

Comprehends his own country, and with unremitting endeavor comes to understand deeply the foreign country where he is stationed.

Furthers accurate knowledge and friendly understanding of the United States, in foreign countries; and, also, of the foreign countries, in the United States.

Promotes and protects the interests of the United States and of its citizens.

Makes effective representations to the authorities of foreign governments concerning the protection of American citizens, their rights, and their property, in accordance with international law.

Advises and assists Americans traveling abroad for business or other purposes with wise counsel and accurate information.

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Negotiates, with tact, sound judgment, and intimate knowledge of conditions at home and abroad, protocols, conventions, and treaties, especially regarding international intercourse, tariffs, shipping, commerce, preservation of peace, etc., in strict conformity to Government instructions.

Cooperates and counsels with superior officers and colleagues in Government service, on all matters relating to his official duties.

Establishes and effectively utilizes personal contacts in farsighted ways for the benefit of his Government and of American citizens.

Analyzes and reports on political and economic conditions and trends of significance to the United States.

Analyzes and reports on market conditions, statistics of trade, of finance, of production, of labor, etc., in foreign countries, so far as they are significant to the United States and to its people.

Analyzes and reports on crops and other agricultural, forest, fishing, and mining resources, so far as they may affect similar American interests.

Analyzes and reports on shipping practices, shipping legislation, freights, charters, pools, etc., so far as they vitally affect any American interests.

Reports on all legislation of interest to the United States.

Reports on tariffs, both laws and practices.

Reports on vital statistics of Americans abroad.

Replies to individual trade and other inquiries from American citizens in ways to promote good will and help both present and future trade relations.

Exercises skill in following prescribed form and routine procedure when possible; and displays discriminating judgment, as may be necessary in more complicated situations requiring investigations, careful accumulation of information, or professional understanding of laws, customs, conditions, etc.

Issues passports to American citizens, registers citizens, and advises on questions relating to citizenship generally.

Issues bills of health, makes sanitary reports, and supervises disinfection of merchandise.

Certifies invoices of all goods shipped to the United States and reports on undervaluations for protection of revenues.

Visas alien passports and issues immigration visas under immigration laws.

Enters and clears American ships and airships, administers relief of seamen, signs on and discharges seamen, settles disputes between masters and seamen, and takes charge of shipwrecked vessels.

Assists in prevention of importation of prohibited articles.

Administers regulations relating to plant and animal quarantine.

Takes custody of and with sagacity administers and settles estates of American citizens

Maintains records of business and files of correspondence received and sent.

Estimates needs of office and plans budget expenditures for present and future activities.

Receives, cares for, and accounts for public property in accordance with Government regulations.

Collects and properly accounts for fees for services rendered under law.

Disburses funds received from the Treasury of the United States for salaries, wages, and contingent expenses; makes up required returns and accounts; and remits surplus funds to Treasury.

During an officer's career in the Service he is expected to serve where he is needed or where he is deemed best qualified to serve, whether that be in a consular office, a diplomatic mission, or the Department of State in Washington. Officers are utilized interchangeably in consulates, diplomatic missions, and the Department.

# EXAMINATIONS

Applicants should read carefully the information given under the heading "Applications" on page 359.

Applications for designation must be filed not later than 40 days before the date set for the written portion of the examination. When designated, applicants are notified by letters of designation which furnish all information necessary as to the date and places of the examination. These letters are mailed shortly before the date when designations are closed.

The written examinations are held by the Civil Service Commission in Washington, Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Denver, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis, St. Paul, San Francisco, and Seattle.

Candidates who succeed in obtaining sufficiently high marks in the written tests to indicate probable qualifications for the work of the Foreign Service are informed of the date on which they may appear before the Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service in Washington for an oral examination, the object of which is to ascertain the extent to which candidates are qualified for the proper performance of the duties of the Foreign Service from the point of view of their character, address, judgment, general education and culture, contemporary information, practical experience, and apparent business capacity. Their physical fitness is determined by Government surgeons in Washington or elsewhere acting in an advisory capacity to the Board of Examiners. Those candidates who receive a passing mark on the whole examination are certified to the Secretary of State as eligible for appointment, and as vacancies occur in the Foreign Service their names are drawn from the eligible list in the order of their examination marks.

Candidates successful in an examination are not assured of appointment, that being a matter which depends necessarily upon the number of eligibles obtained as the result of an examination and the vacancies occurring during the life of the eligible list, which is 2 years. Candidates are not examined with reference to their possible appointment to a particular post or part of the world, the assignment of officers being made as their qualifications indicate and the needs of the Service require.

Many colleges and universities furnish courses covering the subjects given in the Foreign Service examination. The Government does not recommend any particular educational institution to persons wishing to prepare themselves for the Foreign Service examination, nor does it prescribe any course for them to follow. Persons wishing to make special preparation should correspond, with respect to courses of study, direct with such educational institution as they may wish to attend

Applicants for examination are referred to the pertinent sections of the act of February 23, 1931, beginning with section 7, on page 361, and to the regulations of the Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service beginning on page 369.

No one will be certified as eligible for appointment as a Foreign Service officer who is under 21 or over 35 years of age, except as provided in section 8 of the regulations mentioned above.

## FOREIGN SERVICE OFFICERS' TRAINING SCHOOL

After appointment by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, officers are given probationary assignments to the field for preliminary training under the direction of experienced officers. There they perform, under supervision, some of the usual duties of a career officer. After experience of this character they are assigned to the Department of State for a course of instruction in the Foreign Service Officers' Training School. Only persons who have been successful in the examination and have been duly appointed Foreign Service officers are admitted to this School. After several months in the School, officers are assigned to the field for duty in consular offices as vice consuls.

# SALARIES

The entrance salary of Foreign Service officers is \$2,500 a year, the classes and the salaries in each class being as follows:

In addition to the salaries to which members of the Foreign Service may aspire, their necessary expenses of transportation and subsistence, when traveling upon public business, are paid, and each officer receives, when in the field, an allowance for rent, heat, and light of living quarters.

# EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

It is not required that a candidate for examination have a college education. However, of the Funcian Service officers now in the Service, about 75 percent are college graduates; a little over 17 percent attended college but did not graduate; and only about 8 percent have had no college training. As experience with the Foreign Service increases, the conviction grows that the broader the education of an officer upon his entry into the Service, the better his opportunity of success.

# ADVANCEMENT ON MERIT

The admission, the advancement, and the assignment of officers depend upon their own ability and merit so far as the agencies designated by the President and the Department of State are able to letermine those qualities. Thus, a young man may enter the Foreign Service and advance in the course of time through the Service classes to the position of counselor of embassy or consult general. The opportunity for advancement for the officer of outstanding ability and worth does not cease with the attainment of class 1. The law requires that the Secretary of State shall recom-

served 30 years receives 60 percent; an officer who has served 27 to 30 years receives 54 percent; an officer who has served only 15 to 18 years receives 30 percent of his average annual basic salary for the 10 years next preceding his retirement. On the other hand, an officer may voluntarily retire at the end of 30 years' service and receive an annuity based upon the length of his service and his average annual salary for the 10 years preceding his retirement. This makes it possible for an officer who enters the Service at the early age of 25 years to retire valintarily when he shall have reached the age of 55.

Employees in the Foreign Service who are American citizens are subject to the Civil Service Retirement Act in the same manner as civil-service employees in the United States.

# APPLICATIONS

Persons seeking designation for the examination for the career service, or appointment to a clerkship, may obtain forms of application from the Department of State. Applications and all correspondence should be addressed to the Secretary of State. Washington, D. C.

Married applicants for appointment as Foreign Service officer of career are required to submit with their applications certified copies of the birth certificate or other documentary evidence of American citizenship of husband or wife inasmuch as no person married to an alien may be designated for entrance examinations for the Foreign Service.

Applications must be filled out completely in the handwriting of the applicant and accompanied by five endorsements in the form of letters from competent and responsible persons, attesting the moral character, integrity, good deportment, and ability of the applicant, his business experience, and his qualifications as set forth in the application. It is desirable that at least three of these letters be obtained from teachers or employers of the applicant. The originals of all endorsements listed in the application must be filled therewith; copies are not acceptable. Endorsements remain a part of the Government records and may not be withdrawn while a person remains an applicant or while he is an officer or employee of the Department of State.

Applicants submitting both forms of application need to furnish only one set of the documents required by the forms—that is, one birth certificate, one photograph, and five letters of endorsement.

Applicants in their correspondence with the Department should always sign their names as given in their applications, without enlargement or contraction, one given name at least being used.

An applicant should be particularly careful to give his legal residence correctly.

An application is considered as pending for a period of 2 years. After such period has elapsed another application with one or two commendatory letters covering the applicant's activities since the date of his expired application will be necessary to obtain further consideration.

The Department does not furnish information regarding vacancies or possible vacancies in the Foreign Service.

The procedure followed in making appointments to the Foreign Service is different from that which obtains in the matter of appointments in the Department of State in Washington. Practically all positions in the domestic service of the Department are filled by persons having a Civil Service status. Information concerning the method of acquiring such a status may be obtained from the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

## CLEEKS

No formal examination is required for appointment to a clerkship; the Department, however, reserves the right to examine an applicant in any particular it may deem advisable. Persons sent abroad as clerks in the Foreign Service receive initial compensation from \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year. Compensation begins upon the date of departure for the post to which they are assigned. Transportation expenses are paid by the Government, under certain regulations. Appointees are expected to remain in the Service for at least 2 years, and their transportation expenses in returning to the United States in case of resignation are not payable unless they have served for that region. They are, furthermore, expected to accept such assignments or transfers as the Department may deem desirable in the best interests of the Service. No appointments can be considered for special conntries, although a statement as to preference of assignment may be submitted. consist of such work as may be assigned to them by the officers in charge. It is desirable that clerks should be stenographers and possess a knowledge of the language of the country in which they are to be employed.

Appointments are restricted to those who are unmarried and without dependents.

The employment of citizens or subjects of foreign powers as clerks in diplomatic offices is prohibited by law.

Women are equally eligible with men for clerkships in the Foreign Service. However, the climatic and social conditions at many posts render it impossible for women to serve at them with satisfaction to themselves and advantage to the Government.

No one who is under 21 or over 35 years of age or who is not in excellent physical condition will be considered for these positions. The Department may require the applicant to undergo a physical examination.

Applicants for clerkships should read carefully the information on page 359 under the heading "Applications", and also sections 1 to 6, inclusive, of the act of February 23, 1931, *infra*.

# NONCAREER VICE CONSULS

It is the practice of the Department to commission clerks as noncareer vice consuls only when a need exists at the office to which they are assigned, and not until they have served for a sufficient period to judge of their abilities and conduct and whether they merit such recognition. Clerks commissioned as noncareer vice consuls are not eligible for promotion to the grade of Foreign Service officer without undergoing the prescribed examinations. A commission as noncareer vice consul does not carry with it an increase in compensation.

# TRANSLATORS AND INTERPRETERS

Many of the clerks in the Foreign Service are qualified to translate and interpret the language of the country in which they are stationed, and persons are not sent abroad to fill positions as translators and interpreters, as such.

# ATTACHÉS

Military, naval, and commercial attachés are officers of the War Department, Navy Department, and Department of Commerce, respectively. Information concerning appointments to these positions may be obtained from the departments concerned.

## LAWS AND REGULATIONS

# ACT OF FEBRUARY 23, 1931 1

[Public-No. 715-71st Congress H. R. 9110]

An Act For the grading and classification of clerks in the Foreign Service of the United States of America, and providing compensation therefor.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the clerks in the Foreign Service of the United States of America shall be

# ADDITIONAL COMPENSATION OF CLERKS AT CERTAIN POSTS

Sec. 3. That the Secretary of State is hereby authorized, at posts where in his judgment it is required by the public interests for the purpose of meeting the unusual or excessive costs of living ascertained by him to exist, to grant compensation to clerks assigned there in addition to the basic rates herein specified, within such appropriations as Congress may make for such purpose: Provided, however. That all such additional compensation with the reasons therefor shall be reported to Congress with the annual Budget.

# CITIZENSHIP OF CLERKS IN EMBASSIES AND LEGATIONS

SEC. 4. No clerk who is not an American citizen shall hereafter be appointed to serve in a diplomatic mission.

SEC. 5. The President is hereby authorized to prescribe regulations for the administration

of the foregoing provisions.

SEC. 6 Section 5 of the Act of April 5, 1906, entitled "An Act to provide for the reorganization of the Consular Service" (United States Code, page 646, section 57), is hereby repealed.

# REORGANIZATION AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE FOREIGN SERVICE

Sec. 7. That the Act (Public Numbered 135, Sixty-eighth Congress) approved May 24, 1924. entitled "An Act for the reorganization and improvement of the Foreign Service of the United States, and for other purposes," be, and the same is hereby, amended to read as follows:
"Sec. 87 That hereafter the Diplomatic and Consular Service of the United States shall be

known as the Foreign Service of the United States.

# OFFICERS: DESIGNATION-PROMOTION-ASSIGNMENT

"Sec. 9. That the official designation 'Foreign Service officers,' as employed throughout this Act, shall be deemed to denote permanent officers in the Foreign Service below the grade of minister, all of whom are subject to promotion on merit and who may be appointed to either diplomatic or consular positions or assigned to serve in the Department of State subject to section 21 of this Act, at the discretion of the President.

# OFFICERS: CLASSIFICATION—SALARIES

"Sec. 10. That the officers in the Foreign Service shall hereafter be graded and classified as follows with the salaries of each class herein affixed thereto, except as increases in salaries are authorized in section 33 of this Act, but not exceeding in number for each class a proportion of the total number of officers in the service represented in the following percentage limitations:

"Ambassadors and ministers as now or hereafter provided: Foreign Service officers as follows: Class 1, 6 per centum, \$9,000 to \$10,000; class 2, 7 per centum, \$8,000 to \$8,900; class 3, 8 per centum, \$7,000 to \$7,900; class 4, 9 per centum, \$6,000 to \$6,900; class 5, 10 per centum, \$5,000 to \$5,900; class 6, 14 per centum, \$4,500 to \$4,900; class 7, \$4,000 to \$4,400; class 8, \$3,500 to \$3,900; unclassified, \$2,500 to \$3,400: Provided, That as many Foreign Service officers above class 6 as may be required for the purpose of inspection may be detailed by the Secretary of State for that purpose.

# APPOINTMENTS AS SECRETARIES OR CONSULS

"Sec. 11. That all appointments and promotions of Foreign Service officers shall be made by the President by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and such officers may be commissioned as diplon atic or consular officers or both: Provided, That Foreign Service officers now or hereafter appointed or promoted during a recess of the Senate shall be paid the compensation of the position to which appointed or promoted from the date of such appointment or promotion until the end of the next session of the Senate if they have not theretofore been confirmed by the Senate, or until their rejection by the Senate before the end of its next session: Provided further, That if the Senate should reject or fail to confirm the promotion of a Foreign Service officer during the session following the date of such promotion, the Foreign Service officer shall auton atically be reinstated in the position from which he was promoted, such reinstatement to be effective, in the event of rejection of the nomination, from the date of rejection; and in the event of failure of the Senate to act on the nomination during the session following a promotion, from the termination of that session: And provided further, That all official acts of such officers while serving under diplomatic or consular commissions in the Foreign Service shall be performed under their respective commissions as secretaries or as consular officers. 1

Examination—Probation—Transfer from Department—Citizenship—Reinstatement—Appointment to Class, not Post—Transfer—Present Commissions Valid

"Sec. 12. That hereafter appointments to the position of Foreign Service officer shall be made after examination and officers so appointed shall serve a suitable period of probation in an unclassified grade or, under such rules and regulations as the President may prescribe, after five years of continuous service in an executive or quasiexecutive position in the Department of State, by transfer therefrom, Provided, That no candidate shall be eligible for examination for Foreign Service officer who is not an American citizen and who shall not have been such at least fifteen years: Provided further, That reinstatement of Foreign Service officers separated from the classified service by reason of appointment to some other position in the Government service may be made by Executive order of the President under such rules and regulations as he may prescribe. Except that the number of such officers reinstated shall not affect the number of the percentage of the class provided in section 10.

"All appointments of Foreign Service officers shall be by commission to a class and not by a commission to a particular post, and such officers shall be assigned to posts and may be transferred from one post to another by order of the President as the interests of the service may require: Provided, That the classification of secretaries in the Diplomatic Service and of consular officers is hereby abolished without, however, in any wise impairing the validity of the present commissions

of secretaries and consular officers.

REPORTS TO PRESIDENT AS TO EFFICIENCY-PROMOTION AND APPOINTMENT FOR EFFICIENCY

"Sec. 13. That section 5 of the Act of February 5, 1915 (Public, Numbered 242), is hereby

repealed.

"Sec. 14. That the Secretary of State is directed to report from time to time to the President, along with his recommendations, the names of those Foreign Service officers who by reason of efficient service have demonstrated special capacity for promotion to the grade of minister and the names of those Foreign Service officers and clerks and officers and employees in the Department of State who by reason of efficient service, an accurate record of which shall be kept in the Department of State, have demonstrated special efficiency, and also the names of persons found upon taking the prescribed examination to have fitness for appointment to the service, and any Foreign Service officer who may hereafter be promoted to a higher class within the classification prescribed in section 10 of this Act shall have the status and receive the compensation attaching to such higher class from the date stated in his commission as the effective date of his promotion to such higher class.

CONSULAR ASSISTANTS ABOLISHED

"That the grade of consular assistant is hereby abolished.

# ALL OFFICERS TO BE BONDED

"Sec. 15. That sections 1697 and 1698 of the Revised Statutes are hereby repealed.

"Sec. 16. Every secretary, consul general, consul, vice consul of career, or Foreign Service officer, before he receives his commission or enters upon the duties of his office, shall give to the United States a bond, in such form as the President shall prescribe, with such sureties, who shall be permanent residents of the United States, as the Secretary of State shall approve, in a penal sum not less than the annual compensation allowed to such officer, conditioned for the true and faithful accounting for, paying over, and delivering up of all fees, moneys, goods, effects, books, records, papers, and other property which shall come to his hands or to the hands of any other person to his use as such officer under any law now or hereafter enacted, and for the true and faithful performance of all other duties now or hereafter lawfully imposed upon him as such officer:

# REPRESENTATION AND POST ALLOWANCES

"Sec. 19. That under such regulations as the President may prescribe, and within the limitations of such appropriations as may be made therefor, which appropriations are hereby authorized, ambassadors, ministers, diplomatic, consular, and Foreign Service officers may be granted allowances for representation; and also post allowances wherever the cost of living may be proportionately so high that in the opinion of the Secretary of State such allowances are necessary to enable such diplomatic, consular, and Foreign Service officers to carry on their work efficiently: Provided, That all such allowances shall be accounted for to the Secretary of State in such manner and under such rules and regulations as the President may prescribe and the authorization and approval of such expenditures by the Secretary of State, as complying with such rules and regulations, shall be binding upon all officers of the Government: Provided further. That the Secretary of State shall report all such expenditures annually to the Congress with the Budget estimates of the Department of State.

# PRIVATE SECRETARIES TO AMBASSADORS

"Sec. 20. Appropriations are authorized for the salary of a private secretary to each ambassador to be appointed by the ambassador and hold office at his pleasure.

# Assignment to Department of State-Detail to Conferences, etc.

"Sec. 21. That any Foreign Service officer may be assigned for duty in the Department of State without loss of class or salary, such assignment to be for a period of not more than three years, unless the public interests demand further service, when such assignment may be extended for a period not to exceed one year. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 1742 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, any ambassador or minister or any Foreign Service officer of whatever class detailed for duty in connection with trade conferences or international gatherings, congresses, or conferences, or for other special duty not at his post or in the Department of State, except temporarily for purposes of consultation, shall be paid his salary and expenses for travel and subsistence at the rates prescribed by law.

# LEAVE OF ABSENCE

"Sec. 22. That the Secretary of State is authorized, whenever he deems it to be in the public interest, to order to the United States on his statutory leave of absence any Foreign Service officer or vice consul of career who has performed three years or more of continuous service abroad: Provided, That the expenses of transportation and subsistence of such officers and their immediate families, in traveling from their posts to their homes in the United States and return, shall be paid under the same rules and regulations applicable in the case of officers going to and returning from their posts under orders of the Secretary of State when not on leave: And provided further, That while in the United States the services of such officers shall be available for trade conference work or for such duties in the Department of State as the Secretary of State may prescribe, but the time of such work or duties shall not be counted as leave.

"The Secretary of State is authorized, in his discretion and subject to such regulations as may be issued by the President to grant to any officer or employee of the Foreign Service not to exceed sixty days annual leave of absence with pay. If such officer or employee returns to the United States, the leave of absence granted under the provisions of this section shall be exclusive of the time actually and necessarily occupied in going to and from the United States, and such time as may be necessarily occupied in awaiting sailing. Any portion of sixty days annual leave not granted or availed of in any one year may be cumulative, not to exceed exclusive of time in transit and awaiting sailing, one hundred and twenty days in three years or one hundred and eighty days in four years: Provided further, That employees, not American citizens, may be granted not to exceed thirty

days leave of absence with pay in any one year.

The Secretary of State is also authorized to grant to any officer or employee of the Foreign Service on account of personal illness or on account of exposure to a contagious disease which would render presence at a post of duty hazardous to the health of fellow employees, sick leave of absence with pay at the rate of fifteen days a year, the unused portion of such sick leave to be cumulative not to exceed one hundred and twenty days: *Provided*, That during the first year of operation of this act not to exceed thirty days of additional sick leave of absence with pay may be granted.

"No Foreign Service officer shall be absent from his post with pay for more than forty-eight

hours without permission, except as provided herein.

"Section 1742 of the Revised Statutes is hereby repealed.

## Counselors of Embassy or Legation

"Sec. 23. That the part of the Act of July 1, 1916 (Public, Numbered 131), which authorizes the President to designate and assign any secretary of class 1 as counselor of embassy or legation, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"'Provided, That the President may, whenever he considers it advisable so to do, designate

and assign any Foreign Service officer as counselor of embassy or legation,'

FOREIGN SERVICE OFFICER AS COMMISSIONER, CHARGÉ, MINISTER RESIDENT, DIPLOMATIC AGENT—SALARY AS CHARGÉ OR CONSUL IN CHARGE

"Sec. 24. That within the discretion of the President, any Foreign Service officer may be assigned to act as commissioner, chargé d'affaires, minister resident, or diplomatic agent for such period as the public interests may require without loss of grade, class, or salary: *Provided, however*,

That no such officer shall receive more than one salary.

"Sec. 25. That for such times as any Foreign Service officer shall be lawfully authorized to act as chargé d'affaires ad interim or to assume charge of a consulate general or consulate during the absence of the principal officer at the post to which he shall have been assigned, he shall, if his salary is less than one-half that of such principal officer, receive in addition to his salary as Foreign Service officer, compensation equal to the difference between such salary and one-half of the salary provided by law for the ambassador, minister, or principal consular officer, as the case may be.

#### RETIREMENT SYSTEM

"Sec. 26. The President is authorized to prescribe rules and regulations for the establishment of a Foreign Service retirement and disability system to be administered under the direction of the Secretary of State and in accordance with the following principles, to wit:

#### REPORT OF FUNDS-APPROPRIATIONS

"(a) The Secretary of State shall submit annually a comparative report showing all receipts and disbursements on account of refunds, allowances, and annuities, together with the total number of persons receiving annuities and the amounts paid them, and shall submit annually estimates of appropriations necessary to continue this section in full force and such appropriations are hereby authorized: Provided, That in no event shall the aggregate total appropriations exceed the aggregate total of the contributions of the Foreign Service officers theretofore made, and accumulated interest thereon.

#### RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY FUND

"(b) There is hereby created a special fund to be known as the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund.

#### FIVE PERCENT DEDUCTION-BASIC SALARIES

"(c) Five per centum of the basic salary of all Foreign Service officers eligible to retirement shall be contributed to the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund, and the Secretary of the Treasury is directed on the date on which this Act takes effect to cause such deductions to be made and the sums transferred on the books of the Treasury Department to the credit of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund for the payment of annuities, refunds, and allowances: Provided, That all basic salaries in excess of \$10,000 per annum shall be treated as \$10,000.

#### AGE OF RETIREMENT

"(d) When any Foreign Service officer has reached the age of sixty-five years and rendered at least fifteen years of service he shall be retired: Provided, That if any such officer shall have served thirty years he may be retired at his own request before reaching the age of sixty-five years: Provided further, That the President may in his discretion retain any such officer on active duty for such period prior to his reaching seventy years of age, as he may deem for the interests of the United States.

#### ANNUITY CLASSES

"(e) Annuities shall be paid to retired Foreign Service officers under the following classification, based upon length of service and at the following percentages of the average annual basic salary for

#### REFUNDS FOR EARLY RETIREMENT

"(f) Those officers who retire before having contributed for each year of service shall have withheld from their annuities to the credit of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund such proportion of 5 per centum as the number of years in which they did not contribute bears to the total length of service: Provided, That no deductions shall be made from the annuities of officers who have contributed thirty years, and no officer shall be required to contribute more than thirty years in any circumstances.

# INVESTMENT OF RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY FUND

"(g) The Secretary of the Treasury is directed to invest from time to time in interest-bearing securities of the United States such portions of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund as in his judgment may not be immediately required for the payment of annuities, refunds, and allowances, and the income derived from such investments shall constitute a part of said fund.

### FUNDS NOT ASSIGNABLE OR SUBJECT TO LEGAL PROCESS

"(h) None of the moneys mentioned in this section shall be assignable either in law or equity, or be subject to execution, levy, or attachment, garnishment, or other legal process.

#### DEATH OF ANNUITANT

"(i) In case an annuitant dies without having received in annuities an amount equal to the total amount of his contributions from salary with interest thereon at 4 per centum per annum compounded annually up to the time of his death, the excess of said accumulated contributions over the said annuity payments shall be paid to his or her legal representatives; and in case a Foreign Service officer shall die without having reached the retirement age the total amount of his contribution with accrued interest shall be paid to his legal representatives.

# RETIREMENT FOR DISABILITY-PHYSICAL EXAMINATION-RECOVERY

"(j) That any Foreign Service officer who, before reaching the age of retirement becomes totally disabled for useful and efficient service by reason of disease or injury not due to vicious habits, intemperance, or willful misconduct on his part, shall, upon his own application or upon order of the President, be retired on an annuity under paragraph (e) of this section: Provided, however, That in each case such disability shall be determined by the report of a duly qualified physician or surgeon designated by the Secretary of State to conduct the examination: Provided further. That unless the disability be permanent, a like examination shall be made annually in order to determine the degree of disability, and the payment of annuity shall cease from the date of the medical examination showing recovery.

"Fees for examinations under this provision, together with reasonable traveling and other expenses incurred in order to submit to examination, shall be paid out of the Foreign Service

retirement and disability fund.

"When the annuity is discontinued under this provision before the annuitant has received a sum equal to the total amount of his contributions, with accrued interest, the difference shall be paid to him or to his legal representatives.

## UNHEALTHFUL POSTS

"(k) The President is authorized from time to time to establish, by Executive order, a list of places which by reason of climatic or other extreme conditions are to be classed as unhealthful posts, and each year of duty subsequent to January 1, 1900, at such posts inclusive of regular leaves of absence, of officers already retired or hereafter retired, shall be counted as one year and a half, and so on in like proportion in reckoning the length of service for the purpose of retirement, fractional months being considered as full months in computing such service: Provided, however, That the President may at any time cancel the designation of any places as unhealthful without affecting any credit which has accrued for service at such posts prior to the date of the cancellation.

# SEPARATION FROM THE SERVICE

"(l) Whenever a Foreign Service officer becomes separated from the service except for disability before reaching the age of retirement, or under section 33 of this Act, the total amount of contribution from his salary with interest thereon at 4 per centum per annum compounded annually up to the date of such separation, shall be returned to him.

## EXPENSES

"(m) The Secretary of State is authorized to expend from surplus money to the credit of the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund an amount not exceeding \$5,000 per annum for the expenses necessary in carrying out the provisions of this section, including actuarial advice.

### AMBASSADORS, MINISTERS, OFFICERS OF THE DEPARTMENT

"(n) Any diplomatic secretary or consular officer who has been or any Foreign Service officer who may hereafter be promoted from the classified service to the grade of ambassador or minister, or appointed to a position in the Department of State, shall be entitled to all the benefits of this section in the same manner and under the same conditions as Foreign Service officers: Provided, That any officer now included under the Act of May 24, 1924, and the amendment thereto of July 3, 1926, shall be entitled to the benefits of this section.

#### PERIOD OF SERVICE FOR ANNUITIES

"(o) For the purposes of this Act the period of service shall be computed from the date of original oath of office as diplomatic secretary, consul general, consul, vice consul, deputy consul, consular assistant, consular agent, commercial agent, interpreter, or student interpreter, and shall include periods of service at different times as either a diplomatic or consular officer, or while on assignment to the Department of State, or on special duty or service in another department or establishment of the Government, but all periods of separation from the service and so much of any period of leave of absence without pay as may exceed six months shall be excluded: Provided, That service in the Department of State or as clerk in a mission or consulate prior to appointment as a Foreign Service officer may be included in the period of service, in which case the officer shall pay into the Foreign Service retirement and disability fund a special contribution equal to 5 per centum of his annual salary for each year of such employment, with interest thereon to date of payment compounded annually at 4 per centum, provided that such special contribution shall be subject to the limitations established by subdivision (f) of this section.

# RECALL TO SERVICE

"Sec. 27. In the event of public emergency any retired Foreign Service officer may be recalled temporarily to active service by the President, and while so serving he shall be entitled in lieu of his retirement allowance to the full pay of the class in which he is temporarily serving.

# PRIOR PROVISIONS OF LAW

"Sec. 28. That all provisions of law heretofore enacted relating to diplomatic secretaries and to consular officers, which are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, are hereby made applicable to Foreign Service officers when they are designated for service as diplomatic or consular officers, and that all Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed.

# CERTAIN APPROPRIATIONS MADE AVAILABLE

"Sec. 29. That the appropriations contained in Title I of the Act entitled 'An Act making appropriations for the Departments of State and Justice and for the Judiciary and for the Departments of Commerce and Labor for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1932, and for other purposes,' for such compensation and expenses as are affected by the provisions of this Act are made available and may be applied toward the payment of the compensation and expenses herein provided.

# LEGAL ADVISER IN THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE

"Sec. 30. That there is hereby established in the Department of State the office of legal adviser (in lieu of the Solicitor of the Department of State, which office is hereby abolished). The legal adviser shall be appointed by the President by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and shall receive the same salary as Assistant Secretaries of State.

not be eligible for recommendation by the Board of Forcign Service Personnel for promotion to the grade of minister or ambassador during the period of such assignment or for three years thereafter, nor shall such officers be given any authority except of a purely advisory character, over promotions, demotions, transfers, or separations from the service of Foreign Service officers.

# DUTIES OF THE DIVISION OF FOREIGN SERVICE PERSONNEL

"Sec. 32. The Division of Foreign Service Personnel shall assemble, record, and be the custodian of all available information in regard to the character, ability, conduct, quality of work, industry, experience, dependability and general availability of Foreign Service officers, including reports of inspecting officers and efficiency reports of supervising officers. All such information shall be appraised at least once in two years and the result of such appraisal expressed in terms of excellent, very good, satisfactory, or unsatisfactory, accompanied by a concise statement of the considerations upon which they are based, shall be entered upon records to be known as the efficiency records of the officers, and shall constitute their efficiency ratings for the period. No charges against an officer that would adversely affect his efficiency rating or his value to the service, if true, shall be taken into consideration in determining his efficiency rating except after the officer shall have had opportunity to reply thereto. The Assistant Secretary of State supervising the Division of Foreign Service Personnel shall be responsible for the keeping of accurate and impartial efficiency records of Foreign Service officers and shall take all measures necessary to ensure their accuracy and impartiality. Not later than November 1 at least every two years, the Division of Foreign Service Personnel shall, under the supervision of the Assistant Secretary of State, prepare a list in which all Foreign Service officers shall be graded in accordance with their relative efficiency and value to the service. In this list officers shall be graded as excellent, very good, satisfactory, or unsatisfactory with such further subclassification as may be found necessary. All officers rated satisfactory or above shall be eligible for promotion in the order of merit to the minimum salary of the next higher class. This list shall not become effective in so far as it affects promotion until it has been considered by the Board of Foreign Service Personnel hereinbefore provided for and approved by the Secretary of State Provided. That this list shall not be changed before the next succeeding list of ratings is approved except in case of extraordinary or conspicuously meritorious service or serious misconduct and any change for such reasons shall be made only after consideration by the Board of Foreign Service Personnel and approval by the Secretary of State, and the reasons for such change when made shall be inscribed upon the efficiency records of the officers affected. From this list of all Foreign Service officers recommendations for promotion shall be made in the order of their ascertained merit within classes. Recommendations shall also be made, in order of merit, as shown by ratings in the examinations for appointment to the unclassified grade, with commissions also as diplomatic secretaries and vice consuls, of those who have successfully passed the examinations. All such recommendations shall be submitted to the Secretary of State for his consideration and if he shall approve, for transmission to the President.

"The correspondence and records of the Division of Foreign Service Personnel shall be con-

"The correspondence and records of the Division of Foreign Service Personnel shall be confidential except to the President, the Secretary of State, the members of the Board of Foreign Service Personnel, the Assistant Secretary of State supervising the division, and such of its employees

as may be assigned to work on such correspondence and records.

Increase in Salary for Satisfactory or Meritorious Service—Retirement on Account of Unsatisfactory Service—Separation for Malfeasance in Office

"Sec. 33. That notwithstanding the provisions of section 10 of this Act all Foreign Service officers having a rating of satisfactory or better who shall have been in classes 5, 6, 7, or 8 for a continuous period of nine months or more, shall, on the first day of each fiscal year receive an increase of salary of \$100, except that no officer shall receive a salary above the maximum of his class and all such officers in classes 1, 2, 3, or 4 shall in the same circumstances receive an increase of \$200: Provided, That the Secretary of State is authorized to fix the salaries of Foreign Service officers in the unclassified grade within the salary range specified in section 10 of this Act; and, within the limits of appropriation therefor, to grant to Foreign Service officers in any class additional promotion in salary within the salary range established for the classes in which they are serving, based upon especially meritorious service. Increases in salary under the terms of this section shall be paid to Foreign Service officers only as the right to such increases accrues after the effective date of this Act. The President is hereby authorized to establish by Executive order, regulations providing for the separation of Foreign Service officers from the Foreign Service with the conditions herein after prescribed. Foreign Service officers so separated from the Foreign Service shall be retired from the service, after a hearing by the Secretary of State, upon an annuity equal to 25 per centum of his salary at the time of retirement, in the case of officers over forty-five years of age with a bonus of one year's salary at the time of

his retirement, either annuity or one year's salary to be payable out of the Foreign Service officers' retirement and disability fund and except as herein provided, subject to the same provisions and limitations as other annuities payable out of such funds; but no return of contributions shall be made under paragraphs (i) or (l) of section 26 of this Act in the case of any Foreign Service officer retired under the provisions of this section. Whenever it is determined that the efficiency rating of an officer is unsatisfactory, thereby meaning below the standard required for the service, and such determination has been confirmed by the Secretary of State, the officer shall be notified thereof, and if, after a reasonable period to be determined by the circumstances in each particular case, the rating of such officer continues to be found unsatisfactory and such finding is confirmed by the Secretary of State after a hearing accorded the officer, such officer shall be separated from the service with the annuity or bonus provided in this section, but no officer so separated from the service shall receive the said annuity or bonus unless at the time of separation he shall have served at least fifteen years. He shall, however, if he has not served at least fifteen years have returned to him the full sum of his contribution to the annuity fund, with interest thereon at 4 per centum compounded annually. The benefits of this section, except at the option of the Secretary of State the return of an officer's contribution to the annuity fund, shall not be given to Foreign Service officers separated from the Foreign Service on account of malfeasance in office.

## SALARY NOT TO BE REDUCED UPON PROMOTION TO A HIGHER CLASS

"Sec. 34. That nothing in this Act shall be construed to reduce the salary of any Foreign Service officer upon promotion to a higher class.

## DISTRICT ACCOUNTING AND DISBURSING OFFICES

"Sec. 35. That the President is hereby authorized, whenever the necessity for such office with a view to effecting economies in accounting procedure is apparent, to prescribe certain fiscal districts or areas and to establish within each such district as a part of the Department of State service, a district accounting and disbursing office to exercise control over the accounts and returns of all diplomatic missions and consular offices within the district in such manner as the President may direct. To each such office may be assigned the administrative accounting responsibility for receipts and expenditures of the diplomatic missions and consular offices within the district. Each district office shall be in charge of an accountable officer, to whom all fees, and other official monies, received by any diplomatic, consular, or Foreign Service officer may be accounted for, under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of State, all such fees and monies, or the residue thereof after the payment of salaries, allowances, and current expenses of the diplomatic missions and consular offices within the district, to be paid by the district accounting and disbursing officer into the Treasury of the United States. Such district accounting and disbursing officers accountable for public monies may entrust monies to other bonded officers for the purpose of having them make disbursements as his agent, and the officer to whom the monies are entrusted, as well as the officer who entrusts the monies to him, shall be held pecuniarily responsible therefor to the United States. All diplomatic, consular or Foreign Service officers on duty within the area covered by such district offices may be required to render accounts of their disbursements to the officer in charge of such district office to be included in his accounts. Said district accounting and disbursing officers and their agents shall be bonded respectively to the United States for the faithful performance of their duties in such penal amounts as the President may require.

"Provided further, That the Secretary of State is authorized to appoint such district accounting and disbursing officers and their assistants in the same manner as clerks in diplomatic missions and consular offices are appointed.

"Section 3622 of the Revised Statutes of the United States (U.S.C., title 31, sec. 496), and any other existing statutes, in so far as they conflict with this section are hereby amended.

# REGULATIONS GOVERNING EXAMINATIONS FOR THE FOREIGN SERVICE PRO-MULGATED BY THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS JULY 1, 1931

The Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service, in the discharge of the duty entrusted to it by the order of the President dated June 8, 1931, of formulating rules for and determining the scope and method of examinations of applicants for admission to the Foreign Service, prescribes the following regulations:

1. Examinations for unclassified grade only.—Examinations will be for the grade of Foreign Service officer, unclassified, with the understanding that successful candidates will be assigned to the diplomatic or consular branch of the Foreign Service according to the needs of the Service and

the special qualifications of the candidates.

2. Time of examinations.—Examinations will be held as the needs of the Service require and as the Board of Examiners may deem necessary, upon dates to be publicly announced through the All persons designated for examination will be notified in writing in advance of the examination. Examinations for particular candidates on dates other than those on which the regular

examinations occur will not be held except as provided in section 3.

3. Place of examination.—All examinations will be held in Washington or at other places specified in the letter of designation. Candidates for examination who are clerks and employees in the Foreign Service and private secretaries to chiefs of mission may be permitted to take the written examination at their posts of duty upon a regular examination date specified by the Board and the oral examination upon the occasion of their presence in Washington after the date of taking the written examination. This oral examination, for subordinates in the Service and private secretaries to chiefs of mission only, will be held on the second Tuesday of February, April, June, August, October, and December of each year.²

4. Designations.3—No one shall be designated to take an examination who is under 21 years of age at the time of the examination or who will reach the age of 35 before the completion of the examination for which he seeks designation (except American clerks and employees in the Foreign Service who may be certified as eligible for appointment under the provisions of section 8 of these regulations); who has not been a citizen of the United States for at least 15 years; who is married

to an alien; and who is not of good character and habits.

No designations will be made within the 40 days immediately preceding the date set for the

holding of the written portion of an examination.

5. Scope of examination.—The examinations shall be both written and oral, except that American clerks and employees in the Foreign Service who have rendered satisfactory service in such capacities for the 5 years immediately preceding application for appointment as Foreign Service officers shall be exempted from the written examinations prescribed for other candidates. examination will include the subjects prescribed by the President, to wit: elements of international, maritime, and commercial law; arithmetic as used in commercial statistics, tariff calculations, exchange and simple accounting; modern languages (French, Spanish, or German is required, and a candidate may offer, in the oral test, in addition to one of these any languages with which he may be familiar); elementary economics, including the natural, industrial, and commercial resources of the United States; political and commercial geography; American history, government, and institutions since 1776; and history of Europe, Latin America, and the Far East since 1776. Candidates will also be examined in political economy, and they will be rated in English, composition, grammar, punctuation, spelling, and penmanship as shown by their replies to questions in the written examination.

The oral examination will be designed to ascertain the physical, mental, and temperamental qualifications of candidates for the proper performance of the duties of the Foreign Service; their character, ability, address, judgment, fitness, general education, culture, contemporary information, experience, and business ability. In this part of the examination the applications previously filed, together with all other available information concerning the candidates, will be utilized in ascer-

taining the pertinent facts.

6. Method of examination.—The written examination will be conducted for the Board by the Civil Service Commission and will usually occupy 3 days. The oral examination will be conducted by the Board after the candidates shall have completed the written examination. Candidates attaining an average below 70 in the written examinations will not be admitted to the oral examination. The physical fitness of the candidates will be determined by Government surgeons in Washington or elsewhere acting in an advisory capacity to the Board of Examiners, in accordance with the standards prescribed by the Board. Candidates who attain a passing mark in the

combined written and oral examinations, but who are rejected as a result of their physical examination, may take a subsequent physical examination to determine whether the defects found in the first examination still exist. This subsequent physical examination shall be taken within 4 months

from the date of the original examination.

7. Ratings.—The written and oral examinations shall each be rated on a scale of 100, and no person receiving an average of less than 80 on the combined ratings of the two examinations shall be eligible for certification. American clerks and employees in the Foreign Service who have rendered satisfactory service for 5 years immediately preceding application for appointment as Foreign Service officers and are therefore exempted from the written examinations prescribed for other candidates must receive a rating of 80 on the oral examination in order to be certified as

eligible for appointment.1

8. Certification.—The names of candidates who shall have attained upon the whole examination the required rating of 80 will be certified by the Board to the Secretary of State, in the order of their standing in the examination, as eligible for appointment. No one will be certified as eligible for appointment who is under 21 or over 35 years of age (except American clerks and employees in the Foreign Service under 45 years of age on the date of certification who were, or are hereafter, appointed before reaching the age of 35, and American clerks and employees in the Foreign Service on July 1, 1931, who are certified for appointment before reaching the age of 45 years); 2 who has not been an American citizen for at least 15 years before date of certification; who is not of good character and habits; who is not physically, mentally, and temperamentally qualified for the proper performance of the duties of the Foreign Service; and who has not been specially designated by the President to take the prescribed examinations to determine eligibility for appointment.

9. Results of examinations.—The results of the examinations will be made known to candidates as soon as the report of the Board shall have been submitted to the Secretary of State, and they will be informed of the rating in each subject and the average in the written examination, the total rating in the oral examination, which includes the physical examination, and the rating on the whole examination. No information in regard to the details of the oral examination will

be made public.

10. Duration of eligibility.—The names of eligible candidates who have not been appointed or whose names have not been withdrawn by the candidates will remain upon the eligible list for 2 years from the date of certification, when they will be dropped therefrom, and the candidates will not again be eligible for appointment except upon a new application, designation, and examination. Eligible candidates who have been appointed and who do not accept appointment will not again be eligible for appointment except as hereinbefore provided.

11. Failure to report.—Candidates who fail to report for the examination for which they have been duly designated may not be admitted to a subsequent examination unless specifically designated may not be admitted to a subsequent examination unless specifically designated.

nated to take such subsequent examination.

12. Political affiliations not considered.—The political and religious affiliations of candidates will not be considered either in examinations or certifications.

13. Expenses of candidates.—The traveling and other personal expenses of candidates in con-

nection with the taking of examinations are not borne by the Government.

14. Previous regulations revoked.—The regulations governing examinations for the Foreign Service promulgated by the Board of Examiners December 15, 1924, and amendments thereto, are hereby revoked.
