#### PREFACE.

The Register of Bishop Edmund Stafford is comprised in two folio Volumes, written on vellum. They are in excellent preservation and practically perfect, for, although some of the leaves have been injured by damp, the margins are happily so ample that only a few unimportant words have perished.

Vol. I., the "Registrum Commune" or General Record of the Acts of the Bishop, consists, nominally, of 334 folios, but really of only 324: the numbering of the folios, (contemporaneous as far as CCXLVIII), passes from CXLIX to CLX by a clerical error which fortunately occurs in the middle of a sentence, so that it is quite certain that the leaves have not been lost. The General Title is as follows:- "Registrum Vencrabilis Patris, Domini Edmundi de Stafforde, Episcopi Exoniensis, qui consecratus fuit in Capella Manerii de Lamhith, Wyntoniensis Diocesis, per Reverendissimum in Christo Patrem et Dominum. Dominum Willelmum Courtenay, Archiepiscopum Cantuariensem, die Dominica videlicet vicesimo die mensis Junii, Domini Millesimo CCC<sup>mo</sup> Nonagesimo Anno Literarum Apostolicarum subscriptarum, assisauctoritate tentibus eidem Reverendis Patribus, Roberto Londoniensi, et Johanne Sarumensi, Episcopis." The said "Letters Apostolick," eight in number, together with a copy of the Oath taken by the Bishop-Elect, occupy ff. 1-3. The actual Register commences, at fol. 4, with a "licencia absentandi ab ecclesia," in favour of John Hacche, Rector of South Molton, dated at

the Bishop's House in London, 14th July, 1395; and it ends on fol. 248, with Letters-Dimissory granted to one Peter Sturte, 3rd September, 1419—followed by the first line of another intended entry:—"Noverint universi quod nos, Edmundus, miseracione Divina Exoniensis Episcopus, ex—; but here the record of the Bishop's work was cut short by his death.

The remainder of the volume is taken up with a complete and valuable Register of all the Ordinations held by Bishop Stafford and by his Suffragans (ff. 249——299), followed by a very interesting series of Wills, sixty in number (ff. 300——334). The back of folio 334 and a fly-leaf at the end are occupied by a rude attempt at an Index,—Notanda in hoc Registro"—written at different times and by several hands, and of no value whatever.

Vol. II. is commonly known as the Register of "Institutions," with which it is mainly concerned; but its contents are of a somewhat miscellaneous character. It comprises 364 folios, nominally, but really there are only 352; and it commences with the Institutions by the Vicars-General of the Diocese, during the Bishop's prolonged residence in London. The first Vicar-General was Ralph Tregrisiou, Dean of Exeter, and his Register occupies ff. 1.——15. Its General Title is as follows: - "Registrum Reverendi Viri Magistri Radulphi Tregrisiou, Legum Doctoris, Decani Exoniensis, Venerabilis in Christo Patris et Domini, Domini Edmundi, Dei Gracia Exoniensis Episcopi, ipso Venerabili Patre in remotis agente Vicarii in Spiritualibus Generalis, de Presentacionibus et Institucionibus, virtute et auctoritate cujusdam Commissionis sibi facte et inferius descripte: xiij die mensis Julii, Anno Domini Millesimo CCCmo nonagesimo quinto, prefatus Magister Radulphus Commissionem dicti Venerabilis Patris recepit, in hec verba." The document referred to is dated London, 5 July; and the first

Institution under its authority was that of John Noble, priest, to the Rectory of Horwood, on the 30th of the same month; the last that of Thomas Prydel, priest, to the Chantry of St. Leonard at Ralegh, 12th March, 1399-1400. "Et sic finiunt Instituciones et Commissiones tempore prefati Magistri Radulphi Tregrisiou, Vicarii-Generalis antedicti." Tregrisiou was succeeded by Robert Rygge, S.T.P., Chancellor of the Cathedral, whose Commission (fol. 15) is dated Crediton, 27th September, 1400, and his Register commences, on the same page, with the Institution of John Lucas, chaplain, to the Vicarage of Tavistock, on the 17th of October in the same year. is followed by three Institutions; after which this Register becomes a "Registrum Commune," occupying ff. 16-26, and containing Institutions and Exchanges, Dispensations and Letters-Dimissory, arranged in chronological order from 8th October, 1400 to 20th March, 1402. Contemporaneously with this record of the Acts of the Vicars-General, kept at Exeter, a separate Register of Institutions by the Bishop himself was kept in London and elsewhere, and continued throughout his Episcopate. It occupies ff. 27-205; commencing with the collation of John Candlesly, clerk, to a Canonry and Prebend in the Church of Ottery, 5th July, 1395, and ending with the collation of Michael Lercedekne to a Canonry and the Prebend of Karswelle in the Church of Crediton, 3rd September, 1419, (See pp. 161, 2, infra).

At this point a gap occurs, more than half of fol. 205 having been cut away, as well as the three following leaves (206—208). It is probable however, that we have no loss to lament here; at any rate there is no apparent break except in the numbering of the folios.<sup>1</sup>

The next section, extending from fol. 209 to fol. 268 consists of a series of Commissions. They commence with the Commission to Dean Tregrisiou as Vicar-General, dated 20 June, 1395, and end with a Commission of Enquiry as to the vacancy and right of patronage of the Rectory of St. Leonard's, Exeter, issued 24 Aug., 1419. And here again the spare leaves two in number, have been excised since the Book was bound, and the paging passes from 268 to 271.

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attempted on the fly-leaves, which have been much mutilated: it is, however, quite valueless.

It would seem that Richard Tyttesbury was Registrar—"actorum nostrorum scribam et registrarium (i, 14b)—from the beginning of Stafford's Episcopate till some time in May, 1409. His name occurs for the last time on the 2nd of May, and his Will was proved on the 7th of June. Roger Bolter succeeded him, and was holding the Office at the time of the Bishop's death.

The name of Tregrisiou's Registrar does not occur; but John Whyteway, a notary-publick, is twice mentioned by Rygge, his successor in the office of Vicar-General, as serving in that capacity. Both volumes are, with slight exceptions, written with great clearness and precision throughout; and their Latinity is, perhaps, above the average.

Edmund de Stafford—I quote the late Dr. Oliver's "Lives of the Bishops of Exeter"2—was descended from a family rivalling the most antient and illustrious within the realm of England." He was the second son of Sir Richard de Stafford Knt. (who was summoned to Parliament as Baron Stafford of Clifton in 1371), by his first wife—Isabel, daughter of Sir Richard de Vernon, of Haddon and Harleston, by Maud eldest

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daughter and coheir of William de Camville, of Clifton, Staffordshire. Entering Holy Orders he was, at an early age, marked out for rapid advancement: from 1369 (in which year he was instituted to the Rectory of Worthen, Salop), to 1377 he was Prebendary of Ufton, and from 1377 to 1395 of Weeford, both in the Cathedral-Church of Lichfield: he was, also, Prebendary of Welton-Paynshall in Lincoln Cathedral, and of Knaresborough cum Bickhill in York Minster, as well as Dean of York, at the time of his promotion to the See of Exeter in January, 1395. He was consecrated by Archbishop Courtenay on the 20th of June in that year, the Bishops of London and Salisbury (Robert de Braybroke and John Waltham) assisting. Several years elapsed before the new Bishop visited his Diocese. Appointed Lord Chancellor on the 23rd of October, 1396, he retained that high Office till the abdication of Richard the Second, shortly after which event we find him at Bishop's Clyst on the 23rd of March, 1399-About a month later he commenced his Primary Visitation, which was held almost continuously, and in no less than thirty-eight places in Devon and Cornwall. Returning to London in January, 1400-1, he became Lord Chancellor again in March, and held the Office till February, 1402-3. On the 29th of March we find him at Clyst; and his Register shews that, except on rare occasions, and for a few days only at a time, he never again left his Diocese; and it attests, as his Biographer justly observes, his diligence as an administrator, and his zeal for the good government of all classes of men committed to his charge. His second Visitation commenced in June, 1404, and was held in twenty-one places. The third Visitation was held in twenty-five places, during the months of May and October, 1411. In 1414, he left Clyst at the end of April, proceeding to Ilchester, Bruton, Chipping-Norton, Leicester, Lutterworth, Daventry, Warminster, Chard, and xiv PREFACE.

Honiton, and returning to Clyst on the 14th of June. From this time until his death on the 3rd of 3eptember, 1419, the active work of the Diocese at large was committed almost entirely to Suffragans, the Bishop residing in his Manor-Houses of Clyst, Crediton, and Chudleigh, and chiefly at Clyst. His bodily strength had, probably, failed him. But his work at home was incessant until the end, as the record of his acts, in an almost continuous series, amply proves. He died "in harness" at the age of 75, having instituted on the same day a Rector of Blackawton and a Canon of Crediton.

I have compiled an "Itinerary" of the Bishop, after careful collation of all the dated entries in the two volumes of the Register. It will be found, I hope, of much service to Students, affording, as it does, the means of ready reference to the place where every recorded act of the Bishop was performed.

The plan of my Work needs but little explanation. It is no mere "Index," for I have given a full abstract of every important document. The "Institutions" are indexed continuously under one head, for obvious reasons of convenience; and, for the sake, especially, of the Genealogical Student, I have dealt in like manner with the interesting and valuable series of Licences for Domestick Chapels and Oratories. The "Wills" and the "Ordinations" are, also, kept separate, as in the Register itself; and to the latter, as their necessary complement, I have added the numerous "Letters-Dimissory," which are entered

in the order of their dates in the "Registrum Commune." The Index-proper is concerned with everything not included under the above heads, and comprises that great desideratum in works of this kind—a series of cross-references, which I have done my best to make complete. I have refrained from burdening my pages by needless repetitions of dates; they will not be found, therefore, in the cross-references; but all the dates are given somewhere, and, as a general rule, under the names of places. I may add that I have quoted the ipsissima verba of my MS. wherever, for any reason, it seemed desirable to do so. In the case of all Names of Persons I have preserved throughout the variable spelling of the Register; of the Names of Places I have, as a rule, given the modern spelling, adding within brackets every variation of importance.

The pleasing duty remains of thanking the late Bishop of the Diocese and the Deputy Registrar, Mr. Burch, for the ready help and encouragement afforded to this undertaking from the first,<sup>3</sup> as well as the many friends who have enabled it to be accomplished by their generous subscriptions to its cost, or who, as experts, have assisted me in its preparation for the

Tanner states that it was largely endowed 26 Henry VIII (1534-5), surrendered in 1536, was refounded by the King in 1537, (for a mitred Abbot and fifteen Benedictine monks), and finally dissolved in 1539 !—The Montacutes were long patrons of this Rectory; and it appears that the Rectors were patrons of the Vicarage, which is now in the gift of Crown.

The Bishop was to take all usual and necessary steps, and inform the Court thereof; but he handed over the entire business to the Court, alleging that he was hindered from attending to it aliis negotiis arduis, multipliciter; and no wonder, for he had been Lord Chancellor since 23 Oct., 1396, the Diocese being administered by his Vicar-General.

Mandate addressed by the Bishop of Exeter to Peter, the Sacristan, and to John Heynon, one of the Vicars, in the matter of the sequestration of the revenues of the Vicars of Canons Thomas Cook and Richard Courtenay (20 June,

1397), i, 12b.

Mandate addressed by the Bishop to Peter, the Sacristan, for the Visitation of the Chapel. The King had informed the Bishop (2 June, 1398) that it was reported that much disorder prevailed, that the goods of the Church were being wasted, and that the Canons and other ministers were neglecting the Divine Offices and leading a dissolute life: and he commanded him to visit the Community, in person if possible, and to apply a remedy. The Bishop appointed Sept. 15 for his Visitation, when all members of the Community

were to appear before him in the choir (8 June, 1398), i, 19.

The Visitation actually commenced on the 18 Sept.; and the Bishop, after consulting the Dean and Chapter of Exeter, and with the approval and consent of the Sacristan and Cannos of Bosham, took vigorous measures for the reformation of the Community. His statutes, including minute directions for the conduct of the services, the vestments and the ordinary apparel of the Ministers, and like matters, are set forth at large in a document which was sealed with the Episcopal Seal, at the Bishop's House, in London, 12 June, 1399; with the Seal, also, of the Dean and Chapter of Exeter, in their Chapter-House, 5 Jan. 1399-1400. The Bishop wrote to the Sacristan, on the 25 Jan., requiring the said statutes to be promulgated in the Chapel within fifteen days from the receipt thereof, and once in every quarter, afterwards.—ii, 271-2749.

On 11 Feb., 1398-9, a warrant was applied for, for the arrest of William Maundevyll (late vicar of Nicholas Braybrok, prebendary of Funtington), who had contumaciously refused to appear before the Bishop, i, 25<sup>b</sup>.

Ralph Waterman, Sacristan, was commissioned 6 May, 1401, to exact, and account for, certain moneys payable to the Bishop, as Ordinary, ii, 228.

The Chapel of the B.V.M. at Funtington was dependent on this Collegiate Church. It appears that William Scardevyle, John Groffham, Thomas Cokwelle, and others, inhabitants of the villages of Funtington and East and West Ashling, represented that the said Chapel was distant two miles or more, from the Mother Church, and had been used, from time immemorial, for all sacraments, services, etc., save only for the burial of the dead, a fit Chaplain being provided there by the Prebendary of Funtington and by the said Collegiate Church; that it sometimes happened that, in consequence of the long and tedious journey and the roughness of the sea, they could not reach Bosham for two or even three days; that, being mostly engaged in agriculture and poor, they could not afford so much time; and, therefore they begged for leave to bury in the said chapel and in its cemetery. The Bishop, after consulting all the parties concerned (viz. the Dean and Chapter of Exeter, John Makworth, William de Laugeton, Laurence Haukyn, William Sutton, and Richard Gabriell, Canons of Bosham), and especially John Makworth, the Prebendary of Funtington, John Lamburne, the Sacristan, and John Yonge, the Perpetual Vicar, assented to their petition, with permission to Robert, Bishop of Chichester, or any other English Bishop, to dedicate the same; certain fees, etc., being reserved to the Mother Church, and provision made for preventing all manner of abuse of the concession. Dated at Crediton, 13 Sep.; by the Exeter Chapter, 14 Sep.; by the Canons of Bosham, 21 Sep.; by the Prebendary of Funtington and the Petitioners, 23 Sep, 1408.—ii, 280-281b.

Their petition was granted, with the usual conditions and reservations. The parishioners had represented to the Bishop that their Church was in a ruinous condition and notoriously clumsily constructed: they desired to rebuild it on a larger scale, and in a different part of the Cemetery; and to this the Bishop consented, on condition that they engaged to complete the new church within two years from the pulling down of the old one, and sooner if possible. In Sept., 1412, the Bishop commissioned Archdeacon Hunden to investigate the matter; before whom appeared the parties immediately concerned, viz: the Abbot and Convent of Tavistock, the Rectors (by their proxy, John Twyford), and Thomas Bost, the Vicar, who disputed the liability, while the Rectors alleged and produced the Letter of Thomas, the late Bishop, duly sealed with his oblong seal, which the Vicar acknowledged to be true and authoritative. This document is given at length; it is dated 24 Sep., 1390, and sets forth that, on searching the Register of Bishop Walter de Stapyldon, it was ascertained that, by the ordination and taxation of the parish, the Sanctuary, and all the land held by the secular Rector, ought to be enjoyed by the Vicars, together with all buildings thereon, as well as all the small tithes, oblations, etc., including the tithe of hay, and all mortuary offerings; they were to pay procurations to the Archdeacon, and also all synodals, etc., and they were to keep the chancel in repair, and the books and ornaments thereof (which the Rectors had been accustomed to maintain), after the same had been put in proper repair, once for all, by the Abbot and Convent of Tavistock. Moreover, they were to pay to the said Religious, every year, at Easter, seven shillings "de fructibus altalagii": but the latter were to defray all extraordinary expenses and burdens. The Abbot and Convent, also, produced witnesses, who were examined on oath; and, both parties assenting and so requiring, the Bishop's Commissary, complying with the terms of their petitions herein, did, on the 19th May, 1412, in the chapel of St. Gabriel, near the Bridge, at Clyst, where the Bishop was, at that time, in residence, decide and decree, in due form of law, as follows :-

"That it was evident that the Abbot and Convent of Tavistock, being Rectors of the parish of Burrington, save and except the pension belonging to the Vicars thereof, were required by Bishop Stapyldon's 'Ordinacio' to put the chancel in proper repair, together with its books and ornaments, once for all, at their own charges. That both sides had been heard; and that it appeared that the liability for such repairs, now and in the future, fell on the Vicar for the time being, and that the said Religious were free from such liability; that they were entitled to demand of the said Vicar the said pension of seven shillings annually, which at Easter last past the said Thomas Bost had failed to pay, and for which default they sought a remedy. That the said Thomas Bost, in order to avoid further proceedings and expense, confessed that the said annual payment was due from him. The Commissary, accordingly, pronounced judgment against him, ordering him to pay the money forthwith, which he consented to do; and, presently, putting his hand into his purse (marsupium), he produced and paid over the said seven shillings, and a Deed was duly executed, to give effect to the above provisions, in the presence of John Colkyrk (notary-publick), and Walter Bowhay, clerks, and John Uppecote.

The Bishop refers to the fact that Holy Scripture requires the ordinances of Religion to be celebrated in buildings dedicated to God, except in cases of necessity, and states that he had received a Petition from John, Prior of Cowick, and the manks there, and also from the parishioners of that place, setting forth that in the Chapel of St. Thomas of Canterbury, situated at the end of Exe-Bridge, the V. for the time being had continued, and from time immensorial, to perform all parochial functions (the burial of the dead only excepted), until it had been sweet away by an inundation of the river, whereupon the said Prior and Monks, Patrons of the Vicarrage, and the parishioners—the Faithful elsewhere contributing their alms—had built a fair Basilica, in honour of the said glorious Martyr, on a piece of ground called "Pyryhay" (well removed from the river and from all risk of inundations), the property hitherto of the said Priory, and of their church at Cowick. Now monks, secundum ethimologiam nominis, ought to serve God apart from the common intercourse of the people, and the said Mother-Church, moreover, was quite at one end of the parish, and the new Basilica in its midst, so that the latter was, in every way, more convenient and suitable for the Parish Church. The Bishop consented to the prayer of the Petition, that he would consecrate the new church and its cemetery, having first consulted, and obtained the consent of, the Dean and Chapter, the said Prior, the Vicar (John Alkebarwe), and the parishioners at large, represented by Richard Holand, John Floyer, John Brycon, John Kyte, John Farthehill, Hugh Benyn, William Chedder, and Peter Hode—the right of continuing to bury in the cemetery of St. Michael's chapel being reserved for those who preferred it. All duties pertaining to the Rector were to be performed by the Prior and monks, except cure of souls, for which the Vicar would continue responsible; the parishioners to fulfil their customary duties, including the maintenance in good order of the said antient cemetery of St. Michael. The Bishop dedicated and consecrated the new Church on Tuesday, 4 Oct, 1412, and the mensa and High Altar, together with the cemetery, on the following day, and ordered that the Feast of Dedication should always be solemnly observed, and in the same manner as Christmas Day. This "ordinacio" was sealed by the Bishop, the Dean and Chapter, and the Prior and Convent; also by the Dean of Kenn (within whose Deanery the Church stands), at the request of John the Vicar; and by the Dean of Christianity, at the request of Richard Holand and the seven other parishioners named above, and on their behalf, because they had no common scal of their own."—ii, 287-288. revenues of the living was to be diverted from the Vicar (2 April, 1411), i, 122.

Referring to the Commission (of the 7th of March, 1411), in the matter of the dilapidations left by John Caynok, the Bishop declares that the said dilapidations had been assessed in not less than £6 1ls. 1ld., and that Fayrforde had represented that, unless the amount could be recovered at once, the property of the deceased would probably be made away with. So he directs sequestration thereof till the said sum be paid (17 April, 1411), ii, 241b.

The controversy between this Vicar and his parishioners at Cofton seems to have been patched up, but not settled, soon afterwards; for on the 11th of August, 1411, he was licensed to celebrate in "the Chapel of St. Maryl" (on the Feast of her Assumption only), and on the 30th of August "in capella Beate Marie de Cokton," on the Feast of her Nativity, i, 131, 133b.—

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#### Exeter Cathedral.—

"The Bishop writes to the President of the Consistorial Court, the Archdeacons, the Deans Rural, etc., granting an Indulgence to the Faithful who should contribute to the completion, decoration, and maintenance of the Cathedral church, which he describes as "vestra mater et magistra omnium ecclesiarum nostre Diocesis." Collections were to be made every Sunday in Lent and even up to the Octave of Easter, "usque ad consummacionem dicte fabrice et claustri eidem annexi, ac refeccionis corundum; cum eandem ecclesiam matrem suam saltem semel in anno venerari actualiter teneantur, et absque Christi fidelium elemosinarum largicione facultates ad fabricam ecclesie et chaustri prescripti, ut ex testimonio fidedignorum accepinus, non sufficiant." The Bishop orders the collections to be confined to this work—"aliis questoribus quibuscumque pro codem tempore dumtaxat exclusis." All moneys so raised were to be paid in immediately after Easter every year, under pain of the greater excommunication if any portion thereof were kept back (3 Feb., 1393-9), i, 25.

"Disautenticacio sigilli Domus Sancti Nicholai Exoniensis" :-- On the 3rd of December, 1400, the Bishop, being at Chudleigh, wrote to John Westecote, R. of St. Petrock's, Exeter, and to the Dean of Christianity, informing them that, on the 8th of November, some iniquitous persons had stolen a case containing the seal of the Priory, which had been incautiously left lying about in their Chapter-House, contrary to the will of William Mersshe, the Prior, who earnestly be sought the Bishop to apply a remedy, as they were in danger of loss from forged and fictitious deeds which the thieves might fabricate, and seal with the said seal; which is thus described,—"rotundum fuerat, habens in medio insculptum ad instar et similitudinem castri quadrati habentis in sui medio unam turrim excelsam, et in angulis suis alias turres bassiores et propugnacula, et supra castrum hujusmodi in una parte vetus scutum armorum Regis Anglie videlicet cum tribus leopardis, et in alia parte gladium erectum, et in ejusdem gladii cuspide, sive punctu, coronam regiam, et subtus castrum draconem gradientem, insculpta. In circumferencia vero, sive circulo, ejusdem sigilli scriptum erat sic: S. Ecclie Sancti Nichi Exon." The Bishop's official had decreed, and the Bishop confirms the decree, that the said seal should be regarded as "disautenticatum, dampnatum, et annullatum," and of no force at all, in the case of all deeds sealed therewith since the said \$th of November; and that it was never again to be accounted the authentick seal of the Priory, but that another seal should be at once prepared "cum diversa sculptura et de alia The thieves were to be threatened with excommunication unless, within fifteen days, the seal were restored to the Priory, to be destroyed and broken up1, i, 51.

Dr. Oliver, in the Monasticon, gives an engraving of this seal, from a deed dated 1 April, 1387; it corresponds accurately with the description given above, except that the inscription is in a less abbreviated form than in the text of the MS.—"Sigillum Eccle Sci Nicholai Exonie." He gives another circular seal, of similar design; but in this a second shield of arms occu-

Robert Rychard¹ appeared before the Bishop at Crediton, craving absolution from the sentence of the greater excommunication, incurred by reason of a murderous assault, committed on one Oliver Lange, in this parish Church, even shedding his blood and polluting the Church, which had to be reconciled at the charges of the patishioners. The Bishop acceded to his petition, and committed the business to his Chancellor, William Hunden, who (having ascertained the amount of the fees paid by the parishioners, and ordered full satisfaction to be made to them), assigned to him the following penance: after the manner of a penitent, stript off all his garments—"braceis et camisia duntaxat exceptis," he was to undergo, at suitable hours on appointed days, three "fustigaciones corporales" through the market place at South Molton, and the like mumber through the church of Filleigh, carrying a wax candle, half a pound in weight, and on the last of the appointed days delivering the said candle into the hands of the priests, who should be saying High Mass in the said Church (22 Dec., 1410), i, 110<sup>b</sup>.

On the same day, the Bishop wrote to the Deans of Barnstaple, [South] Molton, and Shirweil, requiring them to cause this sentence to be proclaimed in the

usual manner, i, 111.

At this Visitation, the Prior, John Pynnok, was found to have grievously wasted the goods of the Priory, reducing it almost to a state of desolation : but, submitting himself to the Bishop,—" pure, sponte, et absolute, alte et basse, solempniter se submisit,"-he was dealt with mercifully. He was punished, however, by suspension from the administration of the temporalities of the Priory, and Thomas Rede, one of the Canons, was entrusted therewith during the Bishop's pleasure, The Bishop required monthly accounts to be kept, and the state of the House reported annually to himself; and he appointed two other Canons to assist in this work, viz., Adam Prode and David Beff, restraining them from interfering in other respects with the Prior, whom he bound to obedience on pain of deprivation. In order to free the Priory from the debts caused by Pynnok's improvidence, and as part of the penance to be imposed on him, the Bishop ordered him not to take his meals in the great Hall—"'alla Prioris' vulgariter ibidem appellata "--but to resort to the Refectory with the rest, unless honourable and bona fide guests should happen to arrive—"tunc enim in camera sua, aut alia camera Hevytre nuncupata, cum hospitibus hujusmodi, se reficere, ac prandere, et cenare valeat "-but that was not to be an event of too frequent occurrence, so as to evade the Bishop's order. He made restrictions, also, as to clothing and the number of the servants, allowing but one servant to the Prior, and a quarterly allowance of 40s, for clothes, wine, and other necessaries, to be paid him by the administrator. Also, he ordered an inventory of all the goods of the Priory to be prepared before Christmas, and submitted to the Bishop before Epiphany; and in like manner a list of the Prior's debts, with names and amounts, and stating why they were incurred. Also, he ordered that the Divine offices be duly said by day and by night; and that the Brethren abstain from all idle wandering up and down, from hunting, and the like; observing their rule strictly; and giving attention to reading, etc., in the church, the cloister, and elsewhere; abstaining from festivities publick and private, and from all drinking in improper places or at unsuitable times, especially after compline—matters in which the Prior was bidden to remember that it was his duty to set an example to the rest and to devote himself to the Divine Mysteries, and to his Convent, night and day. None of their land, or other property, was to be put out to farm, or sold, during the administration of the said Thomas, without the Bishop's special licence. And severe punishment was threatened in case of disobedience or rebellion.—The Bishop's mandate was formally communicated to the Prior and Convent, 6 December, 1400; and 4 January, 1400-1, the inventory was sent to the Bishop, together with the Prior's formal undertaking to submit to the Bishop's decrees—"per omnia humiliter et reverenter parui, pareo, et parebo," i, 53. The Prior and Convent were, of course, returned as in heavy arrears on account of the Procurations due to the Pope's Collector, i, 105, 110.—

Election of Prior,—

On the 8th of May, 1417, the Bishop received notice of the election of Thomas Rede. The formal documents are given at length; from which it appears that the late Prior, John Pynnok, died on the 19th of March, and was buried on the 21st; that on the 22nd of April the Convent met in Chapter and fixed May the 4th for the election. The electors were William Ford, senior Canon and President, Thomas Rede, Walter Whytbe, and James Dunham, Canons of Frithelstock; also, Philip Tone, Abbot, and Gentian Mantyngho, Canon, of Hartland (who had a right to attend and to vote). After the usual formalities, the election of Thomas Rede was confirmed; and the Mandate for his installation was issued by the Bishop at Clyst, 18 May, 1417; ij, 183, 185b.

On the 28th of June, 1403, the Bishop, being at Clyst, was certified by the Provost and Chapter that they had received his Mandate (which they recite at length). The Bishop, at his recent Visitation (4 Sep., 1400), had found certain things requiring correction, and admonished them accordingly; directing (I) That all Vicars and inferior ministers found guilty of neglect or irreverence in saying the Divine offices be punished by the Provost, or (in his absence) by the Sacristan, in open Chapter, "non cameraliter aut privatim." (2) That no Canon should hinder any Vicar from doing his proper duty by imposing upon him "aliquod officium famulare," under penalties to be inflicted on the Canon offending and on the Vicar complying: and whereas the Bishop had ascertained that, through the laxity of the Provost, the Vicars, etc., had been suffered to absent themselves and scandalously neglect their duties, he laid down strict rules as to granting

leave of absence. (3) That the Canons, etc., should be present in their proper habit at the Divine offices and at Mass, as the statutes require; the Vicars saying their private masses at such times as not to interfere with the recitation of the Hours in the Choir, which they were themselves bound to attend; and that none of them, whether in their habits or not, presume to walk about the Church, or its precincts, in service-time. (4) That, forasmuch as he only should live of the altar who serves the altar—"cum omnia beneficia ecclesiastica propter officia dentur et fuerint instituta "-the Canons in residence should regularly, in succession, week by week, say High Mass at the High Altar, or, in case of illness or other hindrance, make provision for the same, (5) That the common seal be kept securely under three keys, one in charge of the Provost (or his locum tenens), the others of two of the Canons; the said seal never to be used without the assent of the majority of the (senior) Canons. (6) That the Sacristan, by his clerk, attend carefully to ringing the bells for the services, and to closing the doors in good time, lest damage happen to the Church or scandal to its ministers: that he provide bread and wine ("purum, non acetosum"), daily, for Mass, and cleanse the vessels used at the Altar; the said Clerk, in case of negligence herein thrice repeated, to be dismissed (after a month's notice) by the Sacristan, and a successor to be forthwith appointed, or the appointment to lapse to the Provost. It had been represented, moreover, to the Bishop, at his said Visitation, that the Church wanted repair, and that it was still incomplete-" super restauranda et sustinenda fabrica ipsius ecclesie, ac novo opere complendo, et precipue de choro ipsius et ejus alis arcuandis et voltandis "-- and that the sum of 26s, per amum contributed (according to antient custom) by all the prebendaries was insufficient for the purpose : but it appeared that all were anxious to help forward the work, and had agreed to devote to it the whole of their stipends for one year, from Michaelmas next ensuing; the stipends of Geoffrey Carow (the Sacristan), and John Raff, one of the Canons, alone excepted, because they alone of the Community enjoyed no benefices outside the College, while the former was bound to perpetual residence and to take the place of the Provost in his absence, and dispense hospitality; but the said Sacristan would be content to receive for the year, instead of his prebend, £20 in quarterly payments, and the said John Raff was ready to take ten marks, to be paid in like manner. These and other like arrangements, made for so good a purpose, the Bishop approved and sanctioned, and appointed to be Receivers Alan Treles, "Rectorem de Pontel," and Thomas Trefuthon, one of the Vicarschoral, who were to lay out the money with the advice and help of Edward

Dauntesey, Archdeacon of Cornwall, and Canon Matthew Bodrigi.

In Pole's Collections I find, under "Lomen or Uplomen" (p. 212), that it "was ye enheritanc of a famyly of yt name . . . . in Kinge Henry 2 tyme, Willam de Lomen, or Lumine ; Will<sup>a</sup>m de Lomen, K<sup>t</sup>, his sonne ; S<sup>r</sup> Richard, sonne of Sr Willam; and Sr Richard de Lomen, the last; after whom followed Sr John de Willington." He makes no mention, in this place, of the Wroths; out, under Aderington (p. 422), I find that "Jordan de Chambernun" of Umberlegh in that parish, "had issue William, weh by Eva his wief had issne the Lady Jone, wife of Sir Ralph de Willington issue Sr Ralph de Willinton (sic)" who "by Julian (wch I take to bee daughter and heire of Sr Richard de Lomene, for all the lands of Lomen descended in her issue) had issue Sr John," whose descent is given, through several generations, to "Margaret, wief of John, son of Sr John Wrothe, and Isabell, wief of Willam Beaumont. John Wrothe," he adds, "by ye said Margaret had issue Elizabeth wief of Sr Willam Palton, by whom hee had Umberlegh; Sr Willam, sonne of Sr William and Elizabeth, had issue Sr Wm Palton, of Umberlegh, which maried Anne, daughter of Sr Phillip Courtenay, and died wthout issue, by weh meanes Umberlegh, and the rest of Willington's lands, fell unto Sr Thomas Beamont, sonne of Willam Beamont and Isabell Willington." It will be observed that Pole makes no mention of John, the minor referred to in the Register, as (in 1397) the son and heir of Sir John Wrothe, and afterwards (in 1406) as the son and heir of Margaret his He died a minor, and without issue, when all the lands passed in the female line to the Beaumonts of Shirwell (Esq. 13 H. IV. No. 25). Thus it is plain to see how the parish of 'Lomen' came to be called "Wellyngton Lamon" in 1411; a fact which I have not seen stated, however, in any book of reference to which I have access.

The Bishop's Ordinacio between the R. of Churchstow and the parishioners of

Kingsbridge on the dedication of their Chapel and Cemetery :-

Referring to a petition from Roger Saunder, John Veel and Wm. Surmound and others, parishrs, of Kingsbridge, setting forth (1) that their Chapel of St. Edmund, K. and Martyr, had been built long ago, and on a magnificent scale; (2) that they had always been exempt from all liabilities as to the Mother-Church, but were bound to maintain their own Chapel and also the Chancel thereof, and the books and necessary ornaments (because it had been granted to them for their own sole convenience), though they were not charged with the support of their Chaplain, or with the provision of bread and wine for the Eucharist, which burdens fell on Roger Bacheler, Rector of Churchstow, who was also bound, as his predecessors had been, to provide for all sacraments and sacramentals in the said Chapel, save only for the burial of their dead, which only could take place at the Mother-Church at Churchstow, a fee of one denarius being payable for the same; (3) that the said Chapel stood in a valley near the sea-shore, and a long way from the said parish church, which was built on the top of a lofty mountain [in cacumine montis excelsi], the road to it, along which funerals had to pass, being by a long and tedious ascent of the said mountain, both dangerous and difficult; (4) that they, the said parishrs, of Kingsbridge, were some of

them sailors or shipmasters, while some were tradesmen and merchants, and others artificers and mechanicks, making a living by the labour of their hands, and devoting themselves to works of publick utility, so that they could with difficulty attend to even the burial of the dead, when so long and tedious a journey was necessary; and supplicating the Bishop to consecrate their Chapel and its Cemetery, and to grant them rights of interment therein; the Bishop declares that he had looked into the whole matter carefully, consulting the Abbot and Convent of Buckfast, on whose land the said Chapel and Cemetery stood, as well as Roger Bacheler, the Rector of Churchstow, and certain of his parishioners there, viz., Robt. Hulle, jung, John Hacche, Robt, and John Holdyche, John Wordell and Walter Legh, and also the Dean and Chapter of Exeter; and had found that all the statements in the said petition were true; and that, accordingly, he was prepared to consecrate the said Chapel and Cemetery, reserving all the rights of the mother Church intact, and subject to certain conditions as follows—(1) Every adult parishioner of Kingsbridge, being married and a householder, was to hear Mass every year, on the local Feast Day, viz., the Assumption of Blessed Virgin Mary, in the Mother Church, and for himself and family to make an offering of one denarius to the R. (2) Every unmarried parishioner, male or female, being a householder, was to do the same, and pay one obolus; and on the Day of the Dedication of the said Mother-Church (Sept. 5), all such were bound to attend their own Chapel and keep the Day as a Double Feast, abstaining from servile work, as well as on the Day of the Dedication of the said Chapel, viz., St. Edmund's Day, and to make an offering of one obolus there, for the use of the said Rector. (3) The executors or friends of any person buried there were to pay one denarius to the R., as if the interment had taken place at Churchstow. (4) Every innkeeper or brewer of beer for sale, was to pay the sum of one denarius in lieu of the flagon of ale which, after the manner of tithes in kind, the Rector had been accustomed to receive pro qualibet pandoracione: (5) And whereas there are always some who, from avarice and malice, are wont to defraud the Church and the Clergy, using at funerals the lights commonly called fraternalia, and, against the will of the Curates, erecting lofty tombs of stone, all men were forbidden so to employ the tapers belonging to any fraternity, in the said Chapel or its Cemetery, unless they first indemnified the Rector by paying him two denerii, or to set up such great monuments of stone therein without first paying him six denarii; but modest tombs, level with the ground and offering no obstacle to passengers, erected solely in memory of respectable men and women, and inviting prayers for their souls, were in no wise prohibited; but in both cases the said Rector was to be consulted. And as to other lights, not "fraternalia," those that were carried, with the bodies of the dead, into the Cemetery were to be given to the said Rector for his own use; but those that were only used outside the Cemetery were to remain, as formerly, at the disposal of the executors and friends. (6) The trees and the herbage (or grass) in the said Cemetery were to belong to the said Rector. (7) In case of any resistance to these provisions or violations of them, if the majority of the adult parishioners were to blame, and after eight days' notice, given on a Sunday during Mass, they remained rebellious, all right of sepulture in the Chapel and Cemetery would be forfeited, and would return to Churchstow until their submission; but if the minority or any individual parishioner were in fault, the Rector was to proceed according to law, in the usual manner.

The Chapel was dedicated by Bishop Stafford on 25 Aug., 1414, and the Cemetery on the following day; and he signed an sealed the Ordinacio at Chudleigh on the 30th of August. The 12-m and Chapter of Exeter had done so on the 20th of July, in their Chapter-House; the Abbot of Buckfast, in the Chapter-House there, on July 23; Roger Bacheler, the Rector, using the seal of the President of the Consistory Court of Exeter, at Churchstow, on the 22 July; the above-named parishioners of Churchstow, using

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the seal of the Dean of Woodleigh, at Kingsbridge, on July 24; and Roger Saunder, John Veel, John Torryng, Wm. Surmound, Andrew Blakhall, John Redewyll, Rd. Lockyngton, Roger Dyer, Thos. Lever, Robt. Bold, David Ryder, Robt. Blake, Thos. Ordinacio touching the Chapel and the new Cemetery there; in which Richard Hals, Treasurer and Official Principal, sets forth that Pope Boniface IX. had lately conceded to the inhabitants of this village or hamlet the right of sepulture in the said Chapel, dedicated to St. James the Apostle, and in a cemetery annexed thereto as soon as dedicated, and he quotes the Letters Apostolick at large. They had complained that the bodies of the dead had to be carried all the way to Ermington, at great inconvenience, although their children had been baptized, and the Sacraments and all Sacramental rites administered in their said Chapel, from old time. Accordingly permission was granted for the enclosure of a cemetery, and for its dedication, the rights of the Mother-Church being saved.—[Dat. at Rome, at St. Peter's, iij Non. Febr., ann. Pontificat. XII.] Subsequently, on 10 May, 1402, the parties appeared before the said Rd. Hals in the Consistory Court, at Exeter, viz., Richard Tyttesbury, R. of the Mediety of Ermington, represented by Ralph Dolbeare, literate, and the parishioners of Ermington by Rd. Pyperell and John Dyminok, together with Thos. Row, Vicar of Ermington, on the one part, and the inhabitants of Kingston, represented by Thus. Cotenor and Thos. Whyteway, their proctors, on the other—and settled the terms of an agreement herein, thus:—The inhabitants of Kingston were to resort, as before, to the Mother-Church on the Day of the Dedication thereof, viz., 5 Feb., and on the local Feast Day, viz., the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul, every year, observing both after the manner of Double Feasts, but not of necessity bound to pay the accustomed dues : their Chaplain, also, was not to say Mass in their Chapel, on the said Feast of Dedication, unless there were a corpse there to be buried the same day. They were bound for ever to contribute to the renewal and repair of the nave of the Mother-Church, and the books, vestments, ornaments, and other burdens belonging to the parishioners, whenever the parishioners should will to make a levy for the said purpose; they were to have a vote in the matter, being represented by two of their members, with appeal to the Bishop in case of disagreement; but in the absence of their representatives the parishioners of Ermington could proceed without them, and enforce payment. They were bound also to keep up, at their own cost, part of the cemetery at Ermington as of old, viz., the part on the S. and E. of the church between the two stiles (scansilia), measuring in length 12 rods and 10 feet. Also they were to pay yearly, on the Feast of St. Nicholas the Bishop, twelvepence, to maintain two processional candles in the Church of

A clerical error apparently; he is elsewhere called William.

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Ernington, to be paid to the wardens of the said Church of St. Peter, according to immemorial custom; but whenever they brought their dead to Ermington to be buried, they were to have the use of the said candles (without requiring to ask permission of the parishioners of Ermington), to be lighted as soon as the body is brought into the Church, and kept burning till it is carried forth to the burying. The parishioners of Ermington were to have quiet possession of the lands, tenements, &c., called "Peteryslonde at Hacche" (situate within the parish of the said Chapel) for the use and service of the Mother-Church, as from time immemorial. And as their Chapel was built and is continued for their convenience, they were to keep it in repair, not the nave only, but the chancel also, with all books and ornaments whatsoever; but the V. was to provide and maintain a fit chaplain to minister therein. Also the parishioners of Kingston were to give yearly, on the Feast of the Dedication of their Chapel, to the Vicar of Ermington one layeng of wine, or the estimated value thereof, in acknowledgment of their liberty of sepulture therein, and to the R. and V. thereof their tithes, great and small, as aforetime, together with all dues and offerings, under certain pains and penalties in case of default. This Ordinacio was duly ratified, &c., &c., in the presence of Rd. Wykeslond, Rd. Talbot, John Lydeford, junr., and Thomas Tredowar, advocates, and Wm. Knyght and Wm. Combe, proctors, on the day and in the year above-named.

To Richard Peryn, V., the Bishop wrote, 31 Jan., 1410-11, with reference to the complaint of certain parishioners (viz., Sir Ralph Botreaux, knt., John Labe, John Carkyk and others) that, whereas they had subscribed to maintain a priest, to celebrate in their parish-church, without prejudice thereto, or to the Vicar, the latter had prevented his ministrations, with no reasonable cause. The Bishop ordered the Vicar to admit the said priest forthwith, or, failing to do so, to appear before him and show cause for his refusal, i, 113b. Appropriation to the College of Slapton of this Rectory— The Bishop states that he had received Letters Apostolick from Pope John XXIII. on behalf of the Rector and College of Slapton; which he recites at large. The Pope had received a petition from the College, setting forth that, formerly, the Church of Loddiswell, of which they were Patrons, had been assigned to them (on the strength of a Letter from P. Boniface VIII.), for the support of the Rector, 6 priests and 4 clerks (the number then; since much the said Pope, on xi Kal. Jan. Anno Pontif. XIV., had quashed all appropriations made by hinself which had not already taken effect—[See fol. 284] ad finem]. They pleaded, however, for an exception in this case, as the income of the College was insufficient for its maintenance, not exceeding 160 marks, while the revenue of Loddiswell did not exceed 60 marks; and the Pope granted their request, reserving for the Vicar who should serve the said Church a competent stipend [Dat. at Rome, at St. Peter's, xiiij Kal. Feb., in the 3rd year of his Pontificate-i.e. 1413]. The Bishop, accordingly, proceeded to assign the said Vicar's portion, having summoned to appear before him all parties interested, and especially Sir Peter Holdyche, Rector of Loddiswell; and after obtaining a return of the fruits and profits of the benefice, and of the glebe lands, buildings and enclosures, and also of the Episcopal dues, and of all burdens ordinary and extraordinary, he made division between the College and the Vicars, as follows :- The College was to have all the great tithes of the whole parish, that is to say "decimas garbarum sive granorum frumenti, ordei, siliginis, avenarum, fabarum, pisarum, vescarum et omnium aliorum bladorum sive segetum cujuscumque generis fuerint aut nature," from all fields, meadows, &c., under cultivation, and from the gardens of the parishioners; while

the great tithes arising from the Sanctuary (de Sanctuario) of the said Church were reserved for the Vicars, whether they kept it in hand or no. Moreover the College was to hold, for the storing of their crops, and for the accommodation of themselves, their agents, and their beasts, whenever they might need to be there, the barn lately built there, "una eum area et parietibus suis," where, lately, were cattle houses, commonly called "boveria," and other buildings, recently pulled down (just outside the wall or enclosure of the inner manse of the Rector), which had been constructed to shelter the cattle and other beasts, and which the College was to rebuild, in the antient or in another form, as might seem best, at their own cost. They were to have also a certain "park" commonly called "Movhay," together with a certain close, on the west side of the said barn, commonly called "Fursepark," with free ingress and egress to and fro-"ad ea et ab hiis"for ever. But the hedges and banks of the said close "of Fursepark," with the trees and plants growing therein, the College was to have and keep up the trees and plants growing therein, the College was to intee and keep up on the side where the pool or ditch—"alvous, fossa, sive fossata"—adjoins "Fursepark," whereas on the side where it adjoins the Sanctuary and glebe lands the Vicar was to maintain them. To provide against loss and injury befalling himself or his successors, in consequence of this transaction, the Bishop assigned an annual pension of 20s., to be paid by the College, at the Palace at Exeter, every year, on Michaelmas Day from the date of the cession, or decease, of the present Rector, and their entering on quiet possession, Moreover, to augment the Vicar's stipend the College was to pay him annually xls, in four quarterly payments on the Quarter Days; and for the relief of poor parishioners, according to statute, xs., on the Feast of the Translation of St. Thomas the Martyr of Canterbury, to be distributed in the Church of Loddiswell, year by year, as long as this Further the Bishop decreed, as to the right appropriation should endure. of presentation to the vicarage, that, on the cession or decease of Sir Peter Holdyche, the Rector of Loddiswell, the College should be bound to present to the Bishop, within six months, a suitable parson; and he confirmed this right of presentation to the College for ever, on the understanding that the Vicar's portion and the lands, etc., of the Church of Loddiswell, "which, in the Diocese of Exeter we call vulgariter the Sanctuary," be secured to him, and the tithes of the said Sanctuary, and the whole altilage and the tithe feni, and all the small tithes of the parish, and all emoluments pertaining to the Church, and the pension of xls., together with the hall, chambers, kitchen, and all other buildings, enclosures, etc., belonging to the Church, save only the great tithes and the barn, the court, and its fences, and the Movhay and Fursepark, above-mentioned. To prevent disputes, such as are apt to rise between appropriators and viears as to the apportionment of tithes in cases of change in the mode of cultivation of meadows and orchards, the Bishop ordered that notwithstanding any change of culture, such as converting arable land into pasture or garden ground, or vice versa, there should be no change in the tithes on that account, as to the mode of dealing with them; but all great tithes, howsoever arising, should belong to the College, and all tithes feni, or other small tithes to the Vicar. Rules were prescribed touching the onera to be borne by both parties; and with regard to the Vicars, in order to prevent mistakes and disputes in the future, the Bishop thought it expedient to decree that over and above the entire cure of the souls of the parishioners, the Vicar should be bound to maintain in proper order and repair, and to renew when necessary, the whole Chancel with its windows, and the eclatura over the High Altar, the Office books also, and one Psalter; also, to pay the tenths—payable to the King or any other, and a pension of 6s. 8d. paid by the said Church, from antient times, to the Prior and Convent of Totnes, and all Synodals, &c., and all dues payable to episeopal legates and nuncios of the Apostoliek See, to the Archbishop, the Bishop, and their Officers and Commissaries and to the Archdeacon; -viz., procurations, subsidies, and the like—and he was to serve as Dean-Rural in his turn—"ac eciam Decani-Ruralis

officii excercicium cum acciderit." He was to provide, also, incense and lights for the Chancel, and in short all onera whatsoever (save only the three pensions of xxs. xls. and xs. aforesaid, and those which pertain to the parishioners) and this, on the ground that the Bishop had assigned, not only a sufficient, but even a superabundant portion to the said Vicar. And the Bishop specially reserved to himself and his successors the power of summary sequestration alsague strepitu et figura judicii, in case the vicar should give any trouble to the College herein, or interfere with their rights as laid down by these presents.—Executed by the Bishop at Clyst, 19 Oct., 1413.—by the Rector, Priests and Clerks of the College, in their Chapter House at Slapton, on the 15th February, 1413-14—and by Peter Holdyche, (hitherto Rector, but from that time) Vicar of Loddiswell, on the 12th day of the same month, in the Bishop's presence, at Clyst, using the seal of Wm. At the last vacancy, Sir Rd. Stapyldon, knt., on the death of Walter Wollecomb, immediate predecessor of John Sergent, presented the said John Sergent, and because the said Sir Rd. was an outlaw at the time, on the suit of Sir Peter Veel, knt., K. Richard presented William Orbyry, clerk, and thereupon issued a writ of *Quare impedit* against Richard Stapyldon and John Sergent, and forthwith the said outlawy terminating, the said Richard Stapyldon recovered his right to present. Chebeseye, chapman, and John Fromeasten, chapman, concerning the Manors of Cadelegh, Numeham Courtenary, Whitewell and Huntbeur, and certain rents in Milton Damarel, and the advowsons of Woodleigh, Stoke Damarel, Milton Damarel, and St. Leonard's in the suburbs of Exeter, in Devonshire; the Manor of Hull in Dorset, and a medicity of the Manor of Crewkerne in Somersetshire.—The Earl acknowledged the rights herein of the said Wm. and John, and they, in their turn, conceded the same to the Earl and Margaret his wife (the manors, rent, and mediety to the Earl and the said Margaret and to his heirs whatsoever, and the advowson to the Earl and the said Margaret and their heirs; to have and to hold of the King and his heirs, by customary service for ever. Moreover, the said Wm. and John granted the said Manor of Hull, which Clarice, wife of Sir Rob, de Hull held at

the time of her death, and which ought to have reverted to the said Wm. and John, to remain to the said Earl and Margaret and the heirs of their bodies in like manner. Provided that, if the said Earl and Margaret should leave no heir, the said manor of Hull and the said advowson should remain to the direct heirs of the said Earl for ever. This settlement was made by the King's command, and they say that Edward Courtenay is the heir of the said Hugh and Margaret, being son of Sir Edw. de Courtenay, knt., who was son and heir of the said Hugh and Margaret, to whom accordingly belongs the right of presentation to Milton Damarel for this turn.—The living was free from pensions, portions, &c.—and was taxed at xx marks,—the Clerk presented was of good repute, and in every way fit; in priest's orders, and over 40 years old. He was R. of the Parish of Northill, and Preb. of Glasney. Richard Courtenay had presented one Rob. Osan, clerk, but on investigation it was decided that the said Richard had no right to present, as indeed Osan had himself confessed. Okehampton and Cowick, Ordinacio concerning, by Bishop Stafford—The Bishop sets forth that between the Prior and Monks of Cowick, appropriators of the Parish-Church of Okehampton [Okhampton, alias Okementon], on the one part, and John Newcomb, Vicar, thereof, on the other part, grave differences had lately arisen, touching the repairs of the Chancel and the provision of office-books therein, and that the said Prior, &c., by their proxy, John Hethfeld, chaplain, and the said Vicar in person had appeared before him at Clyst, 3 June, 1417, and had stated their case, the former alleging that by Bishop Briwere's Ordinacio, and by custom, the Vicar was liable, and the said Vicar maintaining the contrary view. With the consent of both parties, the Bishop settled their differences thus:—"The said Vicar and his successors were to keep up both the Chancel and the office-books; and by way of compensation it was agreed that in the case of any subsidy to be paid by the Vicar, and in the case of procurations payable by him on account of Archiepiscopal and Episcopal visitations, the Prior, &c., should pay one entire moiety of the same. Also the Prior and Convent agreed

remit 6s. 8d. per ammun out of an annual pension of two marks payable to them by the Vicar, reducing the said pension to 20s. per annum. This settlement the Bishop declared to be just and fair, and he confirmed the same accordingly. Bishop Briwere's Ordinacio, mentioned above, is quoted in full, granting to the Prior and Convent of Cowick the Church of "Okementon" and the Chapel in the Castle there, with the consent of Courtenay [de consensu de Curtenay, evri patroni], reserving to the Vicar all the obventions of both, the glebe [sanctuarium] and the court and buildings thereon, and the tithes, great and small, therefrom; save that the Convent was to enjoy the tithes garbarum both of the whole parish and of the tenates of the glebe, together with a suitable space adjoining the Vicar's court, and a barn; with two silver marks yearly at Michaelmas. The Vicar was to be liable for omnia onera debita et consucta Episcopalia, ctiam Archidiaconatia, dictam ceclesiam et dictam capellam contingencia [these were the disputed words], and to provide for Divine service daily in the said Chapel. It was dated at Exeter, die Martis, in Easter week, 1239.—The date of this Ordinacio was as given above, "at Clyst, &c." The Prior, &c.. signed it on 7 June, in their Chapter House; the Vicar, at Clyst, on the same day, ii, 2929, 2938.

Oldcastel, Sir John: Certificatorium super execucione Literarum
Domini Cautuariensis contra Dominum Johannem Oldcastel.—Certain
charges of heresy had been brought against Sir John in Convocation, and it
was determined to make representation thereon to the King; at whose
instance further proceedings were stayed for a time, that he might be
induced to recant his errors. The King's efforts proving of no avail,
the Archbishop attempted to cite him by means of one John Boteler, who
proceeded to his castle of Coulyng for that purpose; but Oldcastel declined
to be served. The Archbishop accordingly caused him to be publickly
cited to appear before him on Sept. 11th, in his Castle of Ledys, and as he
failed to appear, he declared him contumacious and excommunicate. He
was again cited to appear, on the Saturday next after St. Mathew's Day
(Sept. 23), on which day, having been apprehended, he was brought
before the Archbishop and the Bishops of London and Winchester, in St.
Paul's Cathedral, in custody of Sir Robert de Morley, knt., Keeper of the
Tower. The Archbishop declared to him the charges alleged against him
and told him that he had been pronounced excommunicate for contunacy;
but he refused absolution, and, taking from his bosom a certain Indenture
containing the profession of his faith, he read it aloud, and then handed it
to the Archbishop as follows:—

"I, Johan Oldcastell, knyght, Lord of Cobham, wole that alle Cristen men wyte and vuldrstonde that I clepe Almyghti God in to witnesse that it hath ben, now is, and ever with the help of God schal be myn entent and my wille to bileve feithfully and fully alle the sacraments that ever God ordeyned to be do in holichurche, and more over for to declare me in these foure poyntis. I bileve that the most wurschupfull sacrament of the auter is Cristys body in fourme of breed, the same body that was born of the blessid Virgyne oure Lady Seinte Marie, doon on the cros, deed ant bured, the thridde day roos for deeth to lyi, the whiche body is now glorified in Hevene. Also, as for the sacrament of penance, I bileve that it is nedefull to everyman that schal be saved to forsake synne and do duhe penaunce for synne bifore doon, with trewe confession, veray contricion, and duhe satisfacion, as Goddis lawe limyteth and techeth, and ellys may he not be saved; which penance I desire alle men to doo. And as of ymages Y undirstonde that they be not of bileve, but that they were ordeyned syth the bileve was 5ive of Crist, by

suffrance of the churche, to be kalenders to lewed men, the represente and brynge to mynde the passion of oure Lord Ihu Crist, ant martirdoom and good lyvyng of other seyntes; ant that who so it be that doth the wurschup to dede ymages that is duhe to God, or putteth feith, hope, or trust in help of hem, as he schulde doo to God, or hath affeccion in oon more than in an other, he doth yn that the grete synne of Mawmetrie. Also, I suppose this fully that every man in this erthe is a pilgrym toward blisse or toward peyne; and that he that knoweth not, ne wole not knowe ne kepe, the holy commandements of God in his lyvynge here, al be it that he goo on pilgremage to all the world and he dye so, he schal be dampned, and he that knoweth the holy commaundements of God and kepeth em to his ende, he schal be saved, though he never in his lif go on pilgremage, as men use now, to Canturbury or to Rome, or to any other place."

The Archbishop acknowledged that this profession contained many things which were both good and Catholick, but further questioned him on certain points. He refused to answer further, and was warned by the Archbishop that if he persisted in refusing, he would be condemned as a heretick; and he expounded to Sir John the doctrine of the Church on the points at issue, the latter replying that he believed what the Church taught and God's word declared, but not what the Pope and Cardinals and Prelates of the Church maintained. The Archbishop, pitying him, gave him the following statement of doctrine, in English, that he might consider it with greater deliberation, and appointed the following Monday (Sept. 25) for his final answer:

"The faith and the determinacion of holichurche touchyng the blisful sacrament of the auter is this, that after the sacramental wordis ben sayd by a prest in his masse the materiel bred that was bifore is turned into Cristes veray Body and the materiel wyn that was bifor is turned in to Crystes verray Blood, and so ther leveth in the auter no material breed ne material wyn, the whiche were there bifore the seyinge of the Sacramental wordis. How lyve 5e this article? Holichurche hath determyned that every cristene man lyvynge here bodilich in erthe oughte to be schryve to a prest ordred by the Churche, if he may come to hym. How feele 5e this articule? Criste ordevned Seynt Petir the apostell to ben his vicaire here in erthe, whos see is the churche of Rome, ordevnyng and grauntyng the same power that he 5af to Petir schulde succede to alle Peters successours, the whiche we callen now Popes of Rome: by whos power in churches particular special ben ordevned prelatis as Archebischopis, bischopis, curatis, and other degrees to whom cristen men oughte to obbeye after lawes of the Churche of Rome. This is the terminacion of holychurche. How feele 5e this article? Holichur (sic) hath determyned that it is needefull to a cristen man to goo a pilgremage to holy places, and there specially to wurschupe holy reliqes of seyntes, apostelys, martirs, confessours, and alle seyntes approved by the Church of Rome: how feele 5e this article." On the day appointed the same Prelates sat again, with the addition of Benedict, Bishop of Bangor and certain others, viz., Henry Ware, the Archbishop's Official, Philip Morgan, Howel Kiffyn, John Kempe, Wm. Carleton, John Wyttnam, Thomas Palmere, Rt. Wombewelle, John Whitheed, Robert Chamburlayn, Rd. Dodyngton, Thomas Walden; and Jas. Cole, and John Stevenys, notaries public. Oldcastel was again brought before the tribunal, by Sir Robert de Morley; but he refused to ask for absolution except from God; and, having been invited to say what answer he could give as to the points which had been submitted to him, he made a full statement of his opinion as to the Holy Eucharist, the Sacrament of Penauce, the adoration of the Cross, and the Power of the Keys, concluding by warning the bystanders in a loud voice against his Judges, who were deceiving both them and their own selves. Again the Archbishop exhorted him; but, as he refused to give way, he solemnly and in the Name of God adjudged him guilty of heresy, and directed the Bishop of London, and through him all the Suffragans of the Province of Canterbury, to provide for publishing the sentence in every church "in a loud and intelligible voice, and in the mother tongue." His letter was dated at Maidstone, 10 Oct., 1413, and the Bishop of London's to Bishop Stafford, in accordance therewith, and containing a copy thereof, at Hadham, on 23 Oct., following; i, 191-193b.

The Receivers were to see to the due observance of the obit of Nicholas Braybrok, in the Cathedral, on the same 2nd day after the Epiphany, and to rennunerate the priests and clerks. They were to provide a strong chest, to be kept in the Treasury at Ottery, for the safe keeping of all moneys, each of the two receivers to hold a key. If any of the beneficiaries were non-resident, except on College business, or being resident absented himself from his duties, unless sick, he should forfeit his allowance.

The election of Receivers was to take place annually on the vigil of St.
Michael the Archangel, one Canon and one Vicar being chosen by the
College. Rules were laid down for their guidance. Provision was made

John Hamond, Sacristan, accused of certain grave offences, appeared before the Bishop's commissaries, and was convicted. St. German's Priory, John Averay (Aneray, Oliver), Prior of,—

The Bp. visited St. German's in this Prior's time, 3 Sept., 1400, and found that John Pengelly, Nicholas Julyan, John Brystowe, and Burnard Page (alias Skelly), canons, had been guilty of scandalous and immoral conduct. He commanded each of them to be put to open penance. Pengelly was to sit on the floor in the middle of the Refectory, at meal time, and have nothing but bread and water, once in the day, every Friday for seven weeks; for a whole year he was to confine himself strictly to the choir and cloister, and not to walk about the nave or speak to any women (whether of doubtful character or not), unless he had a trustworthy Brother in his company : he was not to undertake any manner of office within the said Priory throughout the year; and he was to forfeit out of his allowance for clothing one noble, to be expended on the fabrick of the Church : should be rebel, the Prior was to shut him up in ergastulo insius Prioratus for eight days, and allow him no flesh meat. Julyan was also condemned to sit on the floor of the Refectory "duabus sextis feriis, inchoando die Veneris proximo post festum Sancti Michaelis Archangeli, and to have only bread and water once in the day; for a quarter of a year "a festo Sancte Fidis;" he was to be confined to the cloister and choir; and to forfeit 40d. out of his allowance for clothing, to be applied to the fabrick of the Church; moreover, he was to sleep in the common dormitory. The same penance was assigned to Brystowe; and Page was to abstain from fish and wine for two successive Fridays, and contribute 40d. to the fabrick-fund. The Bishop wrote to the Prior (from Launceston Priory), 18 September, requiring him to see to the execution of the sentence in each case, "in virtute obediencie nobis prestite," i, 48.

This Prior was collector in Cornwall of the moneys granted, 2 March, 1397-8, by Convocation to the King: the Bishop threatened the contumacious with ex-

communication (3 Feb., 1398-9), ii, 222b.

The Priory being vacant, by Averay's death, 8 Sept., 1404, the Sub-prior and Convent, on the 11th, obtained the Bishop's licence to elect a successor, Noel Patreda, the Bishop's steward in Cornwall was made guardian of the Temporalities; and on the 23rd John Pyper, one of the Canons was John Waryn, V. of Liskeard, was commissioned to proclaim the election in due form and to certify accordingly on the 27th. Pyper had been accused of adultery, and was required to attend, and purge himself from the said charge, in the Cathedral, on the 1st Oct., before Hugh Hyckelyng, Precentor, Rob. Rigg, Chancellor, and John Lideford and John Schillyngford, canons; this he did, and his election was confirmed at Coventry, ii, 78b. Six years later (2 July, 1410), a Commission was directed to Archdeacon Hunden, Chancellor of the Diocese, to receive him in Liskeard Church, that he might purge himself from certain charges brought against him, ii, 232b.—On 17 Sept., 1410, he was found in heavy arrears to the Pope's Collector, i, 105,— Licensed, 5 Oct., 1411, to celebrate in private oratories, within all manors etc. belonging to the Priory, i, 135.

Forbidding the Bishop to present by lapse "jure ordinario," 12 Feb., 1403.4; iii. 315.—John Basset had appeared at Westminster, in Hilary Term; and it was alleged, on the King's behalf, that Sir Wm. Basset, 'chivaler,' was seized of Tehidy [Tihidy, MS.]—to which the advowson of this Church belonged—and held the same of K. Richard II., as of the Duchy of Cornwall, by military service; that he presented one Thos. Cotford to the said Church, who was inst. in time of peace, in K. Richard's time; and that, later on, the said Wm. Basset conceded the said Manor, but not the said advowson, to Thos. Chambernon, Otho Bodrigan, John Colyn, Thos. Cotford, and Jas. Gervays, for the term of their natural lives, with reversion to Wm. Basset—his heirs, &c.; that the said Wm. Basset died, and so the reversionary right on the death of the persons above-named, together with the advowson, had descended to John, the said William's son, a minor; so that the King [Richard II] was seized both of the body of the said minor and of the said advowson during his minority; that, afterwards, the Church became vacant, on the death of Thos. Cotford, while John Basset was still a minor, and the King thereupon

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presented Wm. Styward, who was duly inst.; that, soon after, Styward also died, and the right to present was claimed by the King [Henry IV.] John Basset traversed these pleas on various grounds, and claimed judgment in his favour (8 May, 1404), i, 3159.—See 'Institutions."

St. Issey:

This parish was antiently called "Egloscruc;" by which Oliver supposed that the parish of "Egloskerry" was meant (Monasticon, p. 438); and he identified "Eglosros" with St. Issey in one place (p. 438), and with Philleigh in another (p. 439); whereas it is, undoubtedly, the antient name of the latter parish, which is, in "Roseland," and of that only. The references which he gives from the Registers of Brantingham, Stafford, and Vessy, belong—not to Egloskerry that to St. Issey; and so, of course, does the Dedication "Sanctorum Ide et Lyddy de Egloseruc," or, simply, "Sancta Ida."—It may be expedient, therefore, to give in full the two documents referring to this parish which are found in Bisloon Stafford's Register: a

There is no record of his institution, but it seems that it was accidentally omitted; for at ii, 48°, in the margin, I find the following memorandum:—
"Hic deficit Institucio Vicarii de Egloscruk." 1 The date must have been 23 July, 1400; and Henry Nanskelly was, doubtless, intended; but he is not mentioned by name. John Nanskelly, the resigning Vicar, was instituted, by Bishop Brantingham, 26 April, 1382; he was V. of Launcells, and exchanged with Rd. Doty, who is described as Vicar of the Church "Sanctorum Ide et Lydi de Egloscruk."

St. John of Jerusalem, Hospital of,—

The Bishop addresses the Archdeacons, Deaus-Rural, and Clergy generally, concerning the Letters of Pope Alexander V. on behalf of the said Hospital; granting an Indulgence to the Faithful who should contribute to its support (10 March, 1410-11), i, 117<sup>b</sup>. And again, 16 March, 1410-11), i, 120<sup>b</sup>.

it was found that that Prelate "die Jovis post Festum Assumpcionis Beate Marie, 1270," assigned to the V. the whole altilage of the Mother-Church, and of the Chapels of Kenwen [hodie Kenwyn] and Tregeufedon [Tregavethan ?], "exceptis decimis fabarum et pisorum in campis crescencium." He was, also, to have all the buildings, with the whole "sanctuary," pertaining to the said church and chapels; to pay £3 yearly to the Canons of Glasney, and to bear all burdens whatsoever (10 Nov., 1416.); 128.

Bray, V. ; Mandate to appear before the Barons of the Exchequer at Westminster. to make answer concerning certain goods and chattels of his-viz., 1 portiforium, worth 40s.; 2 horses, worth 10 marks; 3 beds "cum capitalibus," worth 30s.; 3 pairs of "blankettes," worth 20s.; 4 pairs of sheets (lin-thiaminum), worth 26s. 8d.; 3 togas, worth 60s.; 2 baselardi harnesiati in silver, worth 5 marks; 2 silver belts, worth 40s.; 3 bankers; 6 cushions (quyssons), worth 13s. 4d.; 2 tables (tabule mensales), and 2 pairs of trestles (trestularum), worth 10s.; 3 forms with one chair (cathedra), worth 5s.; 3 table-cloths (mappe mensales), and 3 napkins (manutergia), worth 20s. ; 2 washbasins (lavatoria) with 2 ewers (pelves), worth 10s.; 3 brazen pots (olle) and 3 small dishes (patelle), worth 30s.; 20 plates of tin, worth 6s, 8d.; 1 silver cup (ciphus), worth 20s.; 12 silver spoons (cocliaria), worth 26s. 8d.; 3 chests, worth 13s. 4d.; and other goods and chattels and divers utensils for household use to the value of £10, all forfeit to the King, the said Wm. having been outlawed 29 Sept., 7 Henry IV. (1405), at the suit of the Abbot of Beaulieu. Also, concerning all the revenues of the Vicarage from the said 29 Sept., ii, 360<sup>b</sup>. [Breve Regium—28 April, 1417]—Mandate to the Bishop, to relax the sequestration of the said goods and chattels, ibid.

It was found that Nicholas Arthur, of Tintagel, had been presented to the said Vicarage by W. de Tothale, Prior of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England, and that he had been duly admitted and instituted. That Bishop, at the same time, determined the Vicar's portion; giving him the entire Sanctuary, with the house of residence thereon, and also the whole altilage cum decima He was to entertain in the said house the Prior, and any of the Brethren who might visit the parish; but at their own expense. The Vicars were to pay procurations and Synodals, and keep up the books, vestments, and other ornaments of the Church pertaining to the Rectory thereof, as well as the glass of the windows in the chancel and the chancel roof, after they had once for all been put in thorough order by the said Religious, who were to bear all other ordinary and extraordinary burdens in connection with the said chancel. At Pentecost and at All Saints, the Vicar was to pay, yearly, to the said Religious in the said parish-church a pension of four marks, in equal sums; the Vicar above-mentioned having sworn, after his institution, that he would faithfully pay the said pension. The Bishop reserved to himself and his successors the right to augment, diminish, or vary the Vicar's portion, at discretion. This Taxation is dated London, 3 Id. Marcii, 1309; and Bishop Stafford's "Scrutinium," 12 March, 1414-15; i, 208b.

The Bishop having been informed of serious dilapidations in the chancel of the parish church, the buildings, and enclosures, through the neglect of Wm. Hendre, the late R., directed a Commission to Benedict Canterbury, R. of Camborne, to ascertain what moneys Wm. Hendre had received from his predecessor, how they had been laid out, and the extent of the existing dilapidations; also, the estimated cost of repairs, etc., and who was liable for the same (1 Aug., 1410), ii, 233.—Wm. Brynchele, Judges, for that, having been imprisoned on account of a certain alleged felony, he had feloniously broken out of gaol, by night, on the Feast of the Epiphany, 18 Ric. II., and made good his escape. "Unde idem Johannes, occasione cujusdam Inquisicionis juratorum laicorum, per prefatos Justiciarios tanquam reus criminis predicti dampnatus, privilegio dericali se protegens juxta Ecclesiasticam libertatem et Regni Anglie consuetudinem, nobis et carceri nostro Exoniensi extiterat liberatus." It was asserted that he was innocent, and on his humble petition that he might be permitted to clear himself of the charge the Bishop issued this Commission. Full enquiry was made, both in the neighbourhood, the prison, and at his birthplace; and trustworthy persons, who knew him well, testified that from the day of his birth, and especially at the very time when he had been charged with the said offence and thrown into prison, his life and reputation, his manners, and his conduct, were and had been uniformly good, and the Commissioners pronounced him innocent, "juxta modum et formam canonice purgacionis," and certified the Bishop accordingly (28 Oct., 1396); i, 10<sup>b</sup>.

The "Ordinacio" of his Chantry in the Cathedral:

The Bishop addressing all sons of Holy Mother Church to whom these presents should come, refers to the uncertainty of life, and to his desire to prepare for the last days of his pilgrimage. King Henry IV., by his Letters Patent had granted a special licence to William Ekerdon and Edmund Elyot, clerks, and to Robert Grey, enabling them to convey to the Dean and Chapter of Exeter the Manors of Wynterborn Wast, Bokhampton, and Swanwych, in the County of Dorset, and the advowson of the Church of Winterborn, to find 3 chaplains to celebrate daily in the Cath. Church for the King himself and his sons in life, and for their souls after death, and also for the Bp. himself, and Sir Humphrey de Stafford, knt. his kinsman, and for all the faithful departed. Subsequently, the said Wm, Ekerdon, Edmund Elyot and Rt. Gray, conveyed the said estates accordingly; and the Bishop proceeded to this ordinacio-which provided (1) that the Dean and Chapter with the revenues of these estates (which he had purchased "in rei veritate nostris industria et laboribus mediantibus, de et cum bonis patrimonialibus et de peculio nostro ad utilitatem nostram") should provide 2 fit priests to be called the annivellarii of Edmd. Stafford, Bishop, who should hold no other benefice or receive other stipend, and should serve continually at the altar of St. John Evan., adjoining the Lady-Chapel, for the Bishop himself, and for Sir Humphrey de Stafford and Elizabeth his wife; also for Sir Rd. de Stafford, knt. and Isabella Stafford, the Bishop's father and mother, and for his uncle Ralph de Stafford, Earl of Stafford; and, lastly, for King Henry IV .. - for all these whether living or departed, and for all the faithful departed; the said priests to do their duty well, or be punished for their negligence. They were to be subject to the Dean and Chapter. Rules were laid down to provide for vacancies. Each priest was to receive annually 100s, in quarterly payments and a share in the obits. The Dean and Chapter were to find and keep up the missals, chalice, vestments, and the ornaments of the altar; also bread and wine and lights; except in the first instance, when the Bishop himself would provide what was necessary; and the priests, at their admission, were to give security for the safe keeping of Having regard to the fact that in his Cathedral Church of all such things. Exeter there were fewer obits kept about the time of the Feast of St. Lambert than at other times, he ordered that these obits should be kept on that day. He ordered that the Dean and Chapter should pay to every Canon who should be present thereat the sum of 12d.; to every vicar, 6d; to every annuellar priest, 3d.; to every chorister boy, 2d.; and like sums to sundry other officials; to the Treasurer, also, for wax candles and other lights, 8d. It was further provided that during the lifetime of the Bishop and others named above who were still alive, a Mass of the Holy Trinity should be said on St. Lambert's Day, and the same payments made to those who should assist as in the case of the obits. The Dean and Chapter were to be held harmless in case of losses from any cause except their own The Bishop states that the advowson of the Church of Winternegligence. born Wast had been purchased by Sir Humphrey de Stafford, and he decreed that as soon as the Dean and Chapter came into quiet possession of the revenues thereof, they should, after paying a competent stipend to the vicar, provide a third chaplain, to be called Humphrey de Stafford's, and to serve at the same altar, in like manner, for the whole state (living or departed) of the Bp, himself and of the said Humphrey and of the Bp,'s relatives, Ralph and Hugh de Stafford, formerly Earls of Stafford, and of Sir John and Margaret de Stafford the parents of the said Humphrey; for the king, and for all the

faithful departed — and payments were to be made, as above, to those who should assist at these obits. The Treasurer was to provide two lights for the tomb of Sir Hunphrey, if he were buried in the Cathedral, if otherwise, then circa formulam (covered with a pall), to be placed on the pavement near the Bishop's tomb, in his memory. In case the said revenues from the Church should fail no deduction was to be made from the stipends of the two former priests for the benefit of the third. The priests were to have a copy of this "ordinacio" to be written on the fly-leaf at the beginning or end of the missal. Eldest son of John Wytbery, jun., when a child, under 11 years, had been handed over against his will to the Friars Minors at Exeter, by his father, in order (as was supposed) to exclude him from succeeding to his inheritance; and, fearing his father's threats, he had actually assumed the habit and tonsure before his 11th birthday. The Friars themeselves were in some difficulty, fearing that he might escape to his friends; so they kept moving him about "like a vagabond" for six months or more, and at length conveyed him into Wales to their house at Carmarthen. Here he told his story to the Superior, and begged to have his ordinary clothes returned to him, with permission to return to the world, even though he went naked. But the Superior was angry, and shut him up closely till the end of his year of probation. Then the said Superior summoned him to his presence, and endeavoured to persuade him to profess, when he declined to do so, and again begged for leave to return to the world. But the Superior threatened to punish him with the utmost severity if he deserted the Order, and kept him shut up more closely than ever, not delaying to put his threats into execution, and at last resorting to a stratagem to effect his purpose, Henry did not understand Latin, and the Superior, knowing this, gave him the "Profession" written in Latin to read, and compelled him to do so, though he was most unwilling. On the strength of this device they announced that he was a professed Minorite, and when he was in his 15th year, by threats of imprisonment and by bodily tortures, they forced him to take the Order of Sub-Deacon against his will. Nevertheless, Henry never ceased to protest against the treatment that he had received, and to declare that he would seize the first opportunity of returning to the world. This he at last succeeded in doing, and petitioned the Pope for redress and remedy. The Bull of Alexander V., reciting the above facts, is given at length; therein the Pope commands strict enquiry to be made into the circumstances, and that Henry, if his story turned out to be true, should be permitted to return to the world, and also to marry if he pleased. This is followed by a copy of a 2nd Bull, of the next Pope, John XXIII., reciting the 1st Bull, and stating that (in consequence of the death of Alexander) the latter had never been Henry, however, had renewed his petition, and Pope John granted his request. He appeared in person before the Bishop, at Crediton, on 20 August, 1411, and presented both Bulls, and on August 25, Stafford issued a Commission to the Archdeacon of Exeter, to Thos. Noel, LL.B., Sub-Dean in his Cathedral Church, Rd. Olyver, Judge of the Consistory Court, and Walter Robert, Canon of Glasney, to make inquisition in the matter, and to act accordingly with his authority, in consequence of his own absence on urgent business making it impossible for him to do so.—i, 131b.

WM. FALEWELL, Rector of the Mediety of the Church of Ermington; Canon of Windsor. i, 300.

Dated at Windsor Castle, in testator's house there, 23 March, 1398-9. i, 300.

He commends his soul to Almighty God, Blessed Mary, and All Saints, and orders his body to be buried in the Church of St. John Baptist, Windsor, if it can be done conveniently; and if not, then in the church of the parish where he may happen to die. For the fabrick of the nave of such church he leaves 20s.; and for masses for two years, to be said therein for his soul, and for his parents and benefactors, £10 13s. 3d.; also for 4 trigintalial for his own soul, 10s. For the poor, on the day of his funeral, 40s.; for prisoners, 20s.; for poor bedridden folk, unable to make their living, 20s.; for all other expenses on the occasion, 40s. Not more than five wax lights to be burnt around his body. To the mave of Northmolton Church he leaves 40s; and believing, on his conscience, that, after all he had laid out on the repairs of his church and manse, the sum of £10 ought to content his successor, especially as he had not received a penny from his own predecessor on account of dilapidations, he leaves that sum to the next Rector, but solely on condition that he gives a full discharge therein to his executors, and makes no further claim upon them. To the poor of Northmolton he leaves 40s. To the ministers of All Saints', Derby (to keep his exequies), 20s. To his sister Matilda 40s, and one of his best garments. For the fabrick of the nave of Raunds Church, 40s. For the poor there, 40s. To Thomas Aynho 20s. The residue of his estate, after paying his debts, to be devoted to pious uses.

Executors: - Thos. Marton; John Massyngham; and Thos. Laurence (to each of whom he leaves 40s. over and above their necessary expenses).-Witnesses: - The said executors ["Lorence" here in MS.], and John Page, John Chiselet, John Hull, and others.—Proved 8 February, 1399-1400, before the Dean of Windsor, in the Chapter House there; registered at Clyst, 14 April,

The residue, after payment of her debts and execution of her Will, she bequeaths to her servants, to be divided among them all.

He commends his soul to God, his Maker and Saviour, beseeching Him Who bought his soul and the souls of all the faithful with His Precious Blood, to deal with it according to His Mercy, when it should have passed from this vale of misery, of His exceeding great kindness and goodness ineffable. He orders his body to be buried in the Cathedral, on the north side of the Choir, in a place selected by himself, and lately assigned to him by the Dean and Chapter. He leaves £20 for his anniversary, to be observed for 20 years continuously after his decease; the money (which he desires should be kept in the Treasury of the Cathedral, or other safe place) to be distributed on each occasion among the canons, vicars, annuellars, secondaries, and chorister-boys, who shall join in saying Placebo and Dirige at night, and the Mass of Requiem on the morrow; viz., to each Canon 4d.; to each Vicar and Annuellar 2d.; to each Secondary 1d.; and to each choristerboy ob.; the clerk of the Treasury, each year, to have 4d. for his trouble in the distribution. If any portion of the sum allotted for the year remained over it was to be replaced, except some ten, eight, or six pence, to be reserved for the poor and needy mendicants present in the Church. Every canon and other priest, sharing in this distribution, to perform strictly the stipulated services. If any preferred to commemorate testator at their own Masses, they were to do so on the day of their proper turn, or on the nearest possible day. If his rules were infringed by the Stewards of the Treasury, or by any other person, the anniversaries were to be suspended, and the £20 applied to other pious uses. Immediately after his death, his executors were to engage two priests, of good conversation and reputation, and pay them a sufficient salary, to say Mass daily (apart from lawful impediment), for a year, for testator's soul, and for Rob. Herward and Edw. Loveworth, at the altar of St. John the Evangelist, on the north side of the Lady Chapel (with the sanction of the Dean and Chapter), and also the service for the dead, Placebo and Dirige, with the usual commendations. He leaves four trentals (trentella), for four priests, with the like intent. To the Church of Ide he bequeaths his chalice, gilt within and without (which he had been accustomed to use in his own chapel at Exeter); also his beautiful large noted Breviary, to remain there for ever, for the use of the parish presbyters and the parishioners; the officiating presbyter and the parishioners, on Sundays and other Feasts, to make special mention of his name in the Mass among the benefactors; also, his third set of vestments, with a chasuble of crimson cloth de Blodio stragulato; on condition that the executors are, first, promised that testator's condition will be fulfilled. To the poorer parishioners and his tenants there, he leaves 40s., to be divided at the discretion of his executors; and to Matthew Stoke the same sum, and his new long crimson coat, furred with pelury (eum pellura furratam), and a large hood of the same suit, well furred. To James Carislegh, his clerk, £10 to help him in his scholastick studies. To John Holeway, his clerk, 12 marks, and a bed suitable to his station, viz., the bed with tapestry which testator bought of Robert, his Vicar. To Sutton, his cook [eoeo meo] 60s.; to Thos. Walter, 60s.; to Wm. Carislegh, 40s.; to John Page, 40s.; to John Langman, 20s.; to his dear friends, John Gorewyll, Ll.D., and his brother, John the younger, Mauger Parys, Rd. Mark, Rob. Lyngham (R. of St. Mary [Major] at Exeter), John Holond (R. of St. Pancras), John Govys, Rob. Langman (his Vicar), Rd. Marschell (his chaplain), Peter Hopere, Win. Haylord, John Deyman, and John Beawfys (chaplains), 20s. each; entreating

them all to remember him in their Masses, etc., and trusting in God to deliver him more speedily and easily from Purgatory by reason of their prayers and merits. To the Friars Preachers of Exeter (to which Order he had himself been admitted), To the Friars Minors (to whom also he belonged), he leaves no money, but simply refers them to the engagement to pray for his soul and keep his anniversary, into which they had entered, according to their custom, when he was admitted; his executors to attend to the matter immediately after his death. To Rob. Lyngham, before mentioned, 20s. in addition to the former legacy, and his black cup of maple (de maserio note nuncupatum) gilt, with a cover silver-gilt (wherefrom testator had drunk much good wine); entreating him to pray for him, and to assist his executors. The residue, after paying his debts (que pauca sunt, ut spero) his executors were to bestow on his poor relations and other indigent persons; and he desires that their names should be ascertained diligently; also, that poor penniless people, bedridden, and confined to their huts and cottages (in lectis et tugurriis et easis suis cubantes), unless they were really able to work, should be remembered; and that frequent Masses should be said for his soul, by chaplains of good repute, and for his parents and friends, especially for Rob. Hereward (formerly Archdn. of Taunton), John Stapeldon (late Prior of Abingdon), and Edw. Loveworth (formerly a Vicar in the Cathedral), Nicholas, Rector of Crawley, and Thos. Rector of St. Maurice, Winchester; and for all the faithful dead, specially those who had done him service. He leaves £10 for the repair of the more necessary bridges and roads near Exeter. As to his funeral expenses, he charges his executors to do their utmost to keep them within reasonable bounds, avoiding superfluity and pomp and every kind of excess; and he absolutely prohibits all banqueting on the occasion, on the part of the Canons and other Ministers; only his executors and those actually engaged in the necessary work of burying him, and a goodly number of the very poor, chosen by his executors, were to be feasted; all customs to the contrary, when Canons of Exeter depart this life, notwithstanding; but he desires that priests attending his funcral, and celebrating then, or on the following day, shall have a repast and the sum of 3d. and no more. His executors were not to allow any exchanges, or re-arrangements of his legacies; but distribution was to be made as he had directed. He leaves to the poor and sick inmates of the Hosp. of St. John, Exeter, half a mark, and the same amount to poor scholars and clerks therein, to be faithfully divided by the Prior; and each of them is to say unum Psalterium [" Spalterium, MS."] for his soul.

Executors:—The afore-mentioned Rd. Mark, John Holond, and John Govys; to the first of whom he leaves 40s, besides his legacy of 20s.; also his fair Bible, and a silver cup de les plat pycys, with cover; a long table cloth of Parisian work (de opere Parisius) and a long twellum. To John Holond he gives 40s, in addition to the former 20s., his fair, new, Legenda Sanctorum et Temporalis in two volumes, and a silver cup de les plat pycys. To John Govys he gives his red bed, embroidered, with tapestry, and canopy, and three curtains to match, in addition to the 20s. mentioned above, and a silver cup de les plat pycys.¹ and its cover; also a table-cloth and a tuallum of Parisian work, in middling condition, not his best; also six spoons of the small set and pattern, and a dozen (unum dosyne) new vessels of tin, garnegsy. He hoped there would be no contention or quarrelling [briga] between them, but that they would do their best to carry out his Will and certain directions written on a separate sheet of parchment for their guidance. He concludes with an Anathema on those who should change or hinder his directions and consideration of these who fulfill them.

He commends his soul to God, and his body to ecclesiastical sepulture.—To Walter Manston, to celebrate in Okehampton church for three years for the health of his soul, and for his exequies daily, he bequeaths thirteen pounds of silver; and to the principal store of the said church 20s., that his anniversary may be kept for ever. On the day of his burial the sum of 40s, was to be given to the poor. To Walter Manston, chaplain he leaves 20s. and his second best doublet.—To Thos. Wyke, and to Walter Petheler, he leaves a cow each.—To Adam Toker a cow and half a quarter of wheat. -To John Row, his servant, a heifer. -To John Gavet, his servant, 6s. 8d. To John Weryng, chaplain, his third-best doublet and 6s. 8d.—To Thos. Estebrok, Joan Hore, and Edith, wife of Rob. Wyke, three brass pots and a sancepan,2 viz., to Thomas his best pot, to Joan his second best, and to Edith his thirdbest and a saucepan2—if the residue sufficed to pay his debts and legacies; if not,

the articles were to be sold.—To each executor who should act, he leaves 20s,

He leaves to the store of the church of St. Laurence of Bigbury, 40s.; also, the better of his two Breviaries there, for use on the north side of the choir for ever, never to be otherwise used or alienated; also, a large dossal embroidered with the birds called *popardys*, to spread before the High Altar' on Feast-day.—To the store of the chapel of St. Michael-de-la-Burgh, 5 he leaves 20s.; and to the store of the Chapel of St. Milburga, 6 13s. 4d. To John Holecombe, chaplain (or to some other fit priest, if the said John be unable, or unwilling, to undertake the duty), he leaves £4 13s. 4d., yearly, for four years, to say Mass for his soul, and for his parents, and next-of-kin ;-also, for Sir Wm. de Bykebury, his progenitors and descendants, -in the Church of Bigbury and in the chapel de-la-Burghe afore-mentioned : and twice a week, at least, in the said chapel.—Also 20s., to be divided among the priests who should say *Placebo* and *Dirige* and Masses, at the time of his decease, or as quickly as possible afterwards; and 10s, among Christ's poor, on the same day, that they might pray for him. He directs that the dignity and customs of the Cathedral of Exeter, as to exequies, singing the Psalter, and the whole manner of sepulture, be observed. - He leaves £20 in money (which will be due to his estate after his death, on account of residence), to keep his anniversary in the Cathedral as long as the money lasts; directing that every year, on the day of his obit, 13s. 4d., part thereof, be distributed among the Canons, Vicars, and other Ministers of the Cathedral, according to their degree and the custom of the church; also to the two clerks of the Treasury he leaves 13s. 4d.—To the parish-church of Ponndstock he leaves his new Missal, and, if the parishioners are willing, 20s., to maintain his anniversary, and that of his parents, &c., for ever; if not, the Missal to be sold, and (with the 20s.) applied to pious uses.

To the Priory of St. John, in Exeter, he leaves 13s. 4d.—To the Friars Preachers there, 6s. 8d.; and weekly, "post tricennalem diem quatuor panes canonicales de residencia mea post mortem meam debendos." He leaves the like begnest to the Friars Minors of Exeter.

Any residue, after payment of his debts and funeral expenses to be applied to pious uses, and works of charity, especially among the poor tenants of the Dean and Chapter of Exeter, and his own parishioners of Bigbury—for the souls of himself, Sir Wm. Bykebury, knt., his parents, &c.: but subject to the fulfilment of further instructions in a Codicil (which is not given in the Register).

Proved 8 February, 1413-14, by all the executors except Thos. de Plymmeswode; who appeared before the Bishop, separately, at Clyst, 17 February, together with John Bykebury, his surety in the sum of 100s.; the said Thomas belonging to "an alien Diocese."

### XL. WILLIAM LANGETON, Canon of Exeter.

Duted at the Bishop's Manor of Clyst, 29 January, 1418-14. i, 322. He commends his soul to God, His Almighty Creator; and desires to buried in the Cathedral, either on the right, or to the left of the tomb of Bishop Stafford

[erected by the Bishop in his lifetime,]

He leaves to the Cathedral his Corpus Jovis Civilis, in five books, given him by Thos, Stafford, to be placed in the Library, and secured by a chain; there to remain for ever. To the Church of Wells [Wellys, MS.], near Walsingham (Dioc. of Norwich), he leaves a Missal, an Ordinal, and a copy of the Pupilla Ocult; also, a set of vestments, for priest, deacon, and subleacon, with a cope to match—all to be bought by his executors at a cost of \$10\$. To the Church of Rokeby (Dioc. of Coventry and Lichfield), he leaves a set of vestments for the priest only, to cost 40s.; and the like to the Churches of Warbleton [Warbylton, MS.], Boslam, and Wisborough [Wysbergh, MS.], all in the Dioc. of Chichester; and, also, to the Church of Ottery, if his executors are not asked to provide the cope required by the statutes on account of his Prebend therein. For the fabrick of the nave of the Collegiate Church of Crediton—"jam fere ad terram prostrate"—he leaves all rents, profits, &c., coming to him at the time of his death, on account of his Prebend of Prustecomb therein, over and above anything due to the said College, according to the statutes, on account of his said Prebend. To the Church

of South Pool he leaves a set of vestments for the priest and a cope, to cost 66s, 8d. To the poor at Wells, 66s, 8d.; to those at Wisborough, 20s.; at Westbrook (his Prebend), 20s.; at Apuldram (formerly his Prebend), 20s.; at Warbleton, 20s.; at South Pool, 20s. To Wm. Pole he bequeaths a silver cup with its cover, having three feet fashioned after the similitude of lions. To John Wylle, chaplain, to pray for his soul and for all the faithful departed, 20s.; also a doublet with hood. To the chaplains, clerks, and boys of the Bishop's Chapel at Exeter, 100s. To the other members of the Bishop's household, 100s. To John Arderne a silver cup and cover, with testator's arms engraved on the top of the cover. To Margaret, wife of John Arderne, a scarlet robe, with its fur.

The residue he leaves to his executors, directing them, first, to send Wm. Portour, his godson [tiliolo meo], to school for two or three years, and to apply

the remainder to pious uses, for his soul.

Executors: —John Schute, V. of Paignton; and John Arderne, Esquire.

To the Precentor, Canons, and other Ministers of the said church she leaves 13s, 4d. for Placebo and Divige, Commendation, and Mass, on the day of her burial. To the Dean of Crediton, 10s., viz. 5s. of the goods of her "Master," and 5s. of her own goods; to pray for their souls. To each Vicar, 8d.; to each Annuellar 6d. To her sister Margery she bequeaths goods worth 40s.; to her son William her best silver cup, her best goblet (mascr), and half her vessels of brass, pewter, and wood, the cups excepted. To Agnes, wife of Wm. Prous, she leaves her horse, viz. Anelere, 2 or his value in money. To each of John More's boys, living at the time of her death, 20d. To each Agadeojulus in the Church of Crediton 2d. To all her servants at the time of her death, 2s. to be distributed among them. To Agnes Rooch, 20d. To John Rooch and Agnes his wife, 20d. To Walter, Robert, and Joan Rooch, 12d. each. To Nichoka Aleyn, 12d. The residue of her estate she leaves to such poor persons as are most in need of the bar and for pricets willing the servants are Moster's Moster's and housely in need of the part of the residue of her estate she leaves to such poor persons as are most in need of the new declaration.

XLII. RALPH TREGRISIOW, Dean of Exeter.<sup>3</sup>

i, 323. He commends his soul to God and to Blessed Mary His Mother; his body to be buried in the Cathedral, should he happen to go the way of all flesh in the County of Devon [si in Comitatu Devonie humanitus mihi contingut;] but should he die in Cornwall, then either in the Church of St. Crida the Virgin [i.e. Creed], or in that of St. Kyby, Duloe. If he happened to die in any other County, his executors were to bury him in the Church of the parish where

death met him, unless they had just cause for not doing so—a matter which he leaves to them.

To the fabrick of the Cathedral he bequeaths 100s.; to that of Crediton Church 100s.; to that of Creed—"ubi fui oriendus"—40s., to buy a store [instaurum] for the said Church; the parishioners to undertake that prayers should be said for his soul, &c. every Sunday, for ever. He, also, leaves to Creed a silver cup (cupam) and cover, with the arms of the See (cum armis Petri et Pauli) engraved thereon.—To the

fabrick of Duloe Church he leaves 100s., to buy a store for the use of the said Church, on the like conditions as to prayers for his soul. To the Vicars of the Cathedral he leaves 20s. to pray for his soul and for that of Steph, Penpel. He leaves £40 for the poor on the day of his burial, and orders that his funeral expenses shall, on no account, exceed £10. He desires to be buried within three days of his death, or on the morning of the fourth day, at latest; and, after his burial, his executors were to distribute alms, as their conscience should dictate, for his soul and that of his uncle, Step. Penpel. To Rd. Drayton he leaves ten marks, and the like sum to Benedict Caunterbery. His "Corpus Juris Civilis et Juris Canonici cum corum Doctoribus," he leaves to clerks and scholars—"de cognacione mea, vel de cognacione predicti Magistri Stephani"-but on condition that none of them should alienate, sell, or pledge the same, but that they should always so remain: and if no such clerks could be found, then the books to were be lent to fit scholars or clerks in the county of Cornwall, for a time. To Ralph Reskemner he bequeaths his best ewer and silver basin; his best silver drinking-cup (potellum), and six of his best silver spoons; his best bed, with canopy and curtains of red materials; his best set of vestments; and six more of his best silver spoons; making a dozen in all. To Benedict Canterbery he leaves a silver cup, and cover with his arms. To Isabella, relict of James Gerwes a silver cup and his best robe with fur of vair (cum foruris de variis). To Joan de Hellond a silver cup. To Joan, wife of John Hylle, his second-best robe, also with fur of vair, and a silver cup.—To the Ch. of St. James, Tregony [de Tregonia] his large Missal; formerly the property of his said uncle, the Dean of Wells. To Ida, wife of Belion, he leaves his third best robe, with fur of vair, and a silver cup. To Thos. Gvynov his small Breviary, the gift of his uncle, the Dean of Wells. To Dame Alice Reskimer ("sorori de Bokdond"), his consin, 20s. To the convent of Polsho, 20s. To the Canons of the Cathedral attending his funeral, 6s. 8d. each; to every Vicar so attending 40d.; to every Annuellar 20d.; and to every Secondary 12d. To each of his executors, consenting to serve, 100s. To John Canon, baker, 20s. The residue of his estate to be devoted to pious uses for the soul of testator, the above-named Stephen, and his parents and heirs, his benefactors, and all others who in any way had benefited him.

Executors:—John Mulys and James Halap; and they were charged to treat and agree with the Prior and Conv. of Merton for the Rectory of the Church of Tregony, in Cornwall, and all other their possessions near Tregony, for a certain sum of money, with a view, to buying certain possessions near Merton, in exchange for those of the said Prior and Convent near Tregony. Also, his executors were to keep his anniversary in the Cathedral for 40 years, and to pay 6d. to each Canon present at Placebo, Dirige, the Commendations and the Mass; 3d. to each Vicar;

2d. to each Annuellar; to each Secondary 1d.

Dated in testator's house in Exeter, 16 June, 1411.

Proved 26 July, 1415, before the Bishop, at Clyst.

# XLIII. Walter Robert, Rector of the Principal (i.e. Pitt) Portion in the Church of Tiverton.

Dated, 12 July, 1414.

He commends his soul to God and his body to holy sepulture.

To the Church of Northill he leaves the Breviary which he received from his
"Master," William Colmpton, for the use of the R. of Northill alone, the
parishioners to have no right to the same. Poor parishioners there, who owed him
very small sums on account of tithes, were to be relieved from payment thereof,
in part or altogether, at the discretion of his executors. To the Prior and Convent
of Launceston he bequeaths 20s., to pray for him and for his benefactors. For
the fabrick (or repair) of the church of Tiverton 20s. To his mother he leaves 3d.
a week, so long as she survives him, pro pota recenti sibi providendo. To his
sister Joan his best robe, with hood and fur; also 6 of his small silver spoons,

and a silver cupl which she had in her possession; also a table-cloth and a towel of second best quality, and one pair of sheets; also the silver girdle which she had in keeping. To a young 2 and respectable chaplain he leaves 8 marks, to celebrate in Tiverton Church (and not elsewhere) for testator's soul, and for the souls of Rd. Wykeslond, Wm. Halyet, late R. of Roseash, 3 and John Stykerygge, and for the good estate of Wm. Colmpton, his "Master," or (if decased) for his soul. To John Robert and his wife he leaves half a mark, and remits all the debt that they owed him; also he leaves them one pair of sheets. To Thomas Frist, of Morchard Cruwys, he bequeaths 13s. 4d. and forgives him a debt.

And whereas, a little time ago, testator brought an action at law against Stephen Tournere, and recovered from him 10 marks, and perhaps went beyond the bounds of moderation and made haste to revenge himself in the said action; and because the said Stephen is a poor man,—"athough he brought a false charge against me,—and that he did so God knoweth,—nevertheless, as in the fear of God, I leave him 20s.; but, then, he must give up the rancour he nourishes towards me in his heart, and keep a decent tongue in his head for the future, a thing which he has

never been accustomed to do, or, at any rate, rarely.

To Joan, his brother's daughter, he leaves a single robe with hood, at the discretion of the executors; and he gives her 40d, and remits the sum she owed him. To Richard, his brother's son, he leaves 6 marks, to keep him at school, the money to be advanced to him, as he requires it, by Walter Colle. To Walter Haydurer, chaplain, to pray for his soul, he leaves 10s. Also to John Fax half a mark; to Rd. Weryng, 20s.; and to "Littlet Walter," his servant, 40d. To his successor in his Portion at Tiverton he bequeaths a large-sized brass pot, and one of his best dishes; also a mortar and a good iron spit, the chaldron (caldarium) which stands in the kitchen, 4 pipes and 2 hogsheads"—empty, and the vessels used for brewing; also 6 silver spoons, and a silver cup and cover in the keeping of John Fax; also, a surplice with an amice of black cloth furred with gris; subject to this condition, that he personally reside on his benefice, and settle quietly any claim he may have on the executors on account of repairs at Tiverton; else he was to have none of these things.

And, whereas Thomas Hendeman owed testator 10 marks, he was willing, if be paid the executors 5 marks without giving any trouble, to remit the rest; but he was to do so within fifteen days after demand or be made to pay the whole. To Margery, his brother's daughter, he leaves half a mark. And all the the residue of his estate (except the legacies mentioned above or in a codicil), he leaves to Walter Colle, his sister's son, to be applied to pious uses, and specially in providing food and necessaries for testator's "Master," William Colmpton, as long as he lived, and to bury him decently; and to provide, if necessary, for his brother,

Wm. Colle.

Executors:—The aforesaid Walter Colle; Matthew Doune; and John Whyteway, notary-publick. To Matthew Doune, for his trouble, he bequeaths all his utensils at Morchard-Cruwys, and remits the money due to him for things which the said Matthew had bought of him from time to time. To John Whyteway he leaves 20s.

Memorandum at the end of the Will:—"Isabella Payton owes me, for debts incurred by Vincent Wryght, her husband, 10s. and two marks: also six marks on her own account, and 9s. 11d., of which sums if she pay my executors the 6 marks which she borrowed of me to buy wine with, after her said husband's

Also, my Lord, the Earl of Devon, owes me £20 (as John Guine well knows), but if the said Earl means to be a good Lord etc. (sit eis bonus Dominus etc.) to my executors, and not give them trouble in the execution of my Will, I remit the whole debt, as well as 5 marks which the Lady Matilda, his Countess, owes me otherwise I hold him accountable before the Most High God.—Also, Walter Schanke owes me 6 marks, and I have a Catholicon and a Book of Brito¹ in pledge; let him pay, and the books be restored. Also he owes me 8 marks (a loan), and one mark; and I have m pledge a silver cup, now in Exeter. Also he owes, for his expenses in the case of John Jacob, I know not how much. I remit the 8 marks, the 1 mark, and the said expenses; and, over and above this, I leave him 5 marks, in recompense for a large book of Mattins, which he gave me gratis. Also I leave him the Breviary which he has in his possession. And my will is that his silver cup, which I have in Exeter, be restored to him."

XLIV. WILLIAM HUNDEN,<sup>2</sup> clerk, Archdeacon of Totnes, Canon of Exeter, etc.

Dated, at the Archdeacon's House, in the Close; 27 January, 1415-16. i, 324b. He commends his soul to God, Blessed Mary and All Saints; his body to hely

sepulture, where God shall please.

He leaves to poor decrepit persons and to prisoners £10, and more if necessary, at the discretion of his executors. Also, to mend the publick roads and bridges in the Archdeaconry of Totnes, 40s.; and the like amount for the same purposes in the Archdeaconry of Rochester. To three chaplains, for a year (or to one chaplain for three years, if three cannot be procured), £20, viz. 10 marks each per annum, to say Mass daily for his soul, and for John and Joeta, his parents, Thos. Opton, John Dangy, John Tayllour, Edith Foot, John Snape, and Wm. Brydbrok. To the Abbot and Convent of Lessness [Lesenes, MS .- Dioc. of Rochester], a pair of gilded ewers (weighing 10 lib. de troy 8 oz. and over—never to be sold or alienated); for the Canons there to say a collect at Mass, every day, for ever, for his soul, and to keep up his anniversary. To the Ch. of Longfield [Langefelde, MS.] in the same Diocese, a vestment of cloth of gold de luca. To John Hunden, his brother, a bed, draped with red worstede, with curtains, and everything to match for a bedchamber; also one of his best suits, to wit a tunic (collobium), trimmed with fur of menyvere (i.e. de menu vair), with fur hood; also another tunic; also a set in green and red worstede for the hall; one best pair of sheets, 6 silver cups called Gobelettes, one bowl (maser) gilt, with cover, and 12 silver spoons parcel-gilt (deaurata in parte); also pixidem deauratam pro pulvere;3 one of his best table-cloths, a towel, and 2 hand-napkins (sauenapys); and he gives up to the same John £20 which he had borrowed. To Margery, his sister, a pallet-bed (unum lectum palet) of white, green, and red worstede, with three curtains, complete, for her bed-chamber; 2 silver cups, on the cover of one of which was engraved-"Ihr est Amor meus;" a robe furred, hood, and a second double hand-napkins. To Wm. Scheldrake £10, to put him to school; and to his cousin Alice, dau. of John Scheldrake, £10, to enable her to marry. To

Henry Boyck, LL.D., flourished in Lower Brittany about the year 1390 (Oliver.) It is interesting to see the names of these two volumes "Prima Pars Henrici Bowyck "and "Secunda Pars," in the Inventory of this Library made in 1506 ("Secundus Descus," and another copy in "Sextus Descus.") Only nineteen out of the whole number (359), Dr. Oliver tells us, remained in 1752!

Barton and his successors, Archdeacons of Totnes, he leaves omnia lecta de tabulis ac formulas tabulas pro restimentis conservandis in eisdem, that may be found in any chambers in the Archdeacon's house in Exeter; also, tabulam principalem secundariam cum trestallis et scabellis omnibus in eadem aula existentibus cum uno novo scrune et copborde erected therein; also the tables, etc., used in the buttery, and all tables and trestles in the kitchen; also, all the timber prepared for the construction of the hall-roof on the garden side. But the said Wm. Barton and his successors were not to alienate any of these things : and the roof was to be put up within a reasonable number of years, or the executors were to sell the whole, and apply the money to pious uses. The residue he bequeaths to his brother John, Rd. Penels, John Swayn and John Mychel, chaplain, to be used for the good of his soul; and he appoints them his executors.

XLV.—Hugh de Hyckelyng, Precentor of Exeter.

Dated in the Precentor's Manse in the Close, 8 August, 1415. i. 325b. He commends his soul to God, his Creator and Redeemer; his body to be buried in the Cathedral, near the altar of the Chantry of Thomas [Branting-ham] the late Bishop. To the fabrick of the Cathedral he leaves 100s. As to his funeral rites, he desires everything to be done with due regard to the honour of the Church, but without any herse (absque hercia), or any general feasting save only for the Canons and Ministers of the Cathedral taking part in the ceremonies; avoiding excessive expenses, que magis tendunt ad pompam mundi quam ad salutem anime. To every Canon present at his funeral he leaves 40d.; to every Vicar 20d.; to every Annuellar 12d.; to every Secondary 6d.; to every Chorister 4d. The Canons present in die tricennali, at Placebo and Dirige, Commendation and Mass, were to have 20d. each; the Vicars 12d.; the Annuellars, 8d.; the Secondaries, 4d.; the Choristers, 3d. He leaves £27 to maintain his obit in the Cathedral for 20 years from his burial, viz., 27s. on each day of his obits in the 20 years, according to the use of the said Cathedral; each Canon to rethe 20 years, according to the use of the san Cathedral; each Canol of receive at least, 4d., if present at Placebo and Divige, and the same for Commendation and Mass; the Vicars and Annuellars, 2d. each; and each Secondary and Chorister 1d. The bellingers to be paid according to the custom of the said Church. If any part of the 27s, were not spent, the money was to be added to the fund. He leaves for distribution on each of these days, among poor, lame, and infirm people, unable to work, 5s. Also £16 for three worthy priests, to say Mass for his soul, and for his parents, friends, etc., in the Cathedral Church, at the altar of the tomb of Thos. Brantingham, the late Bp., for the year immediately following testator's death; each to receive eight marks; and also 13s. 4d. to provide a light, and wine and bread, during the year. Moreover each of these priests was to say Placebo, Dirige, and the Commendations daily throughout the year. He leaves also, 40s., for 16 trentals, to be said immediately after his death. To the fabrick also, 408., for 10 trentals, to be said immediately after his death. To the rabriek of the Colleg. Ch. of Glasney (where he had been Canon), he leaves 408. To each Vicur and Annuellar in the Cathedral, taking part in his exequies on the day of his burial, 6s. 8d., to pray for his soul, etc., specially, for a year after his death, every day, when they say Mass and use other prayers and suffrages. To the Friars Minors of Exeter, the Friars Preachers there, and the Hosp. of St. John, 200. to each and to the configuration of the con 20s. to each; and to the poor infirm folk of St. Mary Magd., near Exeter, 13s. 4d. To John Boterel, chaplain, he bequeaths £6 13s. 4d., a large Breviary and an Ordinal. To the Ch. of Crediton 20s. for his obit there, within a monor of the death. The rest of his goods his executors were to dispose of, for the good of his soul, among the parishioners of Paignton, Chudleigh, and Saint Mary Church, and other poor persons, especially parishioners and tenants of the Dean and Chapter.

His executors desiring to acquire any of his goods, at a just value, to have preference over outsiders, and each who consented to act, 13s. 4d. for his trouble. Executors: Laurence Haukyn, clerk; Henry Foleford; Rob. Lyngham, clerk; Rd.

Skynner, clerk; Rob. Dunnyng, clerk; and Rob. Hyckelyng, Esquire.

If any of the legatees mentioned in this Will, or in the Codicil thereto, should resort to litigation, their legacies to be forfeited. All the legatees, on receipt of their said legacies, to give the executors full discharge. The executors were on no account to lend any portion of the testator's goods to anyone, but to distri-

bute the same immediately.

The Codicil, dated 8 August, 1415 :- Testator's best robe of scarlet cloth, or another in good condition, with all its fur, to be sold, and the money spent in purchasing a comely vestment for the Lady-Chapel in the Cathedral, to remain therein while it lasts. To Alice, his sister, he leaves £6 13s. 4d. To John de Stapulforde, his nephew, 100s. To Rob. de Hyckelyng, his consin (cognato), 40s., a bed, and the cup of silver gilt which testator bought of Robert's mother, together with its cover. To John, son of Wm. Hickelyng, for a marriage portion, £26 13s. 4d. To his servant John Stapuldon (after repaying the 40s. which he owes) To his servant, Wm. Stokys, £6 13s. 4d., and two oxen. desires his executors to return (paying all expenses) to the Prior and Convent of Haltemprice [Hautemprys MS.], Dioc, of Ebor, two books which they lent him in his youth, to wit Digestum Vetus and Inforciatum: he leaves them 40s., to pray for his soul. To his servant, Rob. Weryng, 20s., an ox, and 20 sheep, then at Ugbrooke. To his servant, John Weryng, an ox and 20s. To Rd. Skynner, chaplain, 100s., a book called Pars oculi, and a robe trimmed with fur; that he may remember him in his prayers; also, a Breviary. To Wm. Broun, V. of Sidbury, 13s. 4d. He bequeaths some tapestry (novum doser meum de opere tappesterie), for the High Altar of the Cathedral: and two side-hangings (costres) to match, for the Lady-Chapel. To his poor tenants, et nativis pauperibus at Paignton he leaves £3 6s. 8d., to pray for him; and 60s. to his poor parishioners there; the same at Chudleigh. To Edw. Galbrygg, his servant, 40s.; to John Harry, another servant, 26s. 8d.; to Rob. Sutton, another, 26s. 8d.; to John Chamberleyn, another, 20s. To Rd. Sterlyng, his succentor, 40s. over and above his fees. To Hugh, son of Rob. Hyckelyng, his godson, £10. To John West, his secondary, 20s. To Benedict, his cup-bearer (servienti pincerne), 20s. To Walter, cousin of John Boterell, 20s. To Thos. Dyrell, his chorister, 20s.<sup>2</sup> To the Prioress and Nuns of Polslo, for his soul, 40s. To Rob. Lyngham, R. of St. Mary-Major, Exeter, his new Psalter.

Proved, in the parish-church of St. Leonards without the South Gate, 28 March, 1416, before Roger Bolter, Can. of Exeter, the Bishop's Commissary. Sealed, at Clyst, 30 March. The inventory was produced, at Clyst, 6 April.

XLVI. THOS. BARTON, Can. of Exeter, R. of Ilfracombe, etc.

Dated, at Exeter, 27 June, 1415.

He commends his soul to God, His Mother the Glorious Virgin Mary, and All Saints; his body to holy sepulture in the Cathedral, near the tomb or oratory of Thomas [Brantingham] the late Bishop, on its south side, under a marble slab. One half of the Vicars, Annuellars, Secondaries and Choristers to celebrate Placebo and Dirige, daily, in turns, while his body lay at his house; each Vicar and Annuellar to receive 2d., each Secondary 1d., each chorister a halfpenny. Two wax lights, each weighing three pounds, to burn at his head and feet, while his body remained in the choir. Sixteen poor men, clothed in black cloth or russet, to carry four torches, each of 7 or 8 pounds of wax, and 7 tapers, each weighing 2 pounds of wax. And twelve poor persons, wearing black cloth, were to carry 12 wax-lights, not burning, each weighing 1 pound, for the 12 Altars in the Church, to be lighted on the said altars at the time of his exequies. Also 20 torches, each weighing about 7 or 8 pounds, were to be provided for 20 churches, or chapels-in-charge, in Exeter and

the suburbs, to be lighted daily at the elevation of Christ's Body, while they lasted; and every clerk belonging to the said churches and chapels, vested in his surplice, was to carry a lighted torch before the corpse, from testator's house, and through the midst of the town, to the Broad Gate of the Close, and from thence to carry it, extinguished, each to his own church, for rendering this service. His funeral expenses to be regulated by the executors, at their discretion; but no Canon or citizen was to be invited except such as had actually to assist at the service : and 200 poor persons were to be fed, the same day, in a suitable manner, on baked meats and roast (de coctis et assatis) with spiced drink (cum pota subtili), not more than enough for poor men of that sort; lest they should gorge themselves. Ordinale, according to the use of Sarum, and his large Breviary, bought of the executors of the late Bishop, to be chained with iron chains to the table to which the Catholicon, and Lira Super Quatuor Evangelistas are chained; the clergy generally to have all reasonable access thereto. His exequies to be celebrated in the choir; each Canon present to have 2s., each Vicar 12d., each Annuellar 6d., each Secondary 4d., each Chorister 2d., and the same on the 30th day with payments to about the same amounts; also in the Churches of Crediton and Ottery; in St. Mary-Major, by the clergy of the City; and in the Priory Churches of St. Nicholas, St. John, Cowick, &c., with like payment in each case. On the day before his funeral, or on the day itself, there was to be a general distribution of alms to beggars and indigent people-1d, to each; but to the decrepit, the blind, and the helpless, unable to make a living, in Exeter, Crediton and Ilfracombe [Ilford, MS.], 4d. each. His exequies were to be kept in Hfracombe Ch., on some convenient day after his funeral, and 40s, distributed among poor parishioners. Also, he makes provision for the celebration thereof for an octave after his death, by the Fellows of the Hall in Oxford called "Stapyldon Halle" and they were to divide 40s, among them; those that were priests to say Mass, the others the Psalter. The Friars-Preachers of Exeter were to keep his auniversary for a year, and to receive 5 marks. A fit priest to the prior of the prior was to say Mass in Ilfracombe Ch., after his death, for 7 years. Another priest was to celebrate, and pray, at Bishop Brantingham's altar, for 7 years, for testator's soul and the Bishop's, and for all their benefactors. The sum of £26 13s. 4d., English money (due after his death on account of residence), to be placed in safe keeping in the Treasury, for distribution, year by year amongst those present at his obit. And the sum of £20, in gold, was to be deposited in the Archives of the Church of Crediton, to maintain the late Bishop's anniversary, and his own. To the Priory of Cornworthy, on account of its extreme poverty (pauperima domus), he leaves 20s., each nun to have 12d. to celebrate his exequies, and every priest there 8d.; the rest to go to the nuns in common.

For the construction of a new window, the raising of the walls," and for timber for the roof of the north transept (yabuli borealis) of Crediton Church, in which John Sully, knt., lies, he leaves £20, if other Canons, or the parishioners are willing to contribute to the same, so that it may be completed to correspond with the other transept; else, the money was to be spent about the High Altur, to enclose the presbytery and the walls with columns in comely fashion, and to provide 2 small tablets of alabaster, decently painted, for the two small side-altars in the choir (pro altaribus parvis in choro collateralibus). He leaves 100s. for the construction of a bridge adjoining the mill called "New Mill" [Nyewemylle, MS.], near Crediton, with 2 arches of stone, if the inhabitants are willing to contribute, and complete the work within a year; else the money is to be given to the poor, or laid out on the roads, where most wanted. Also, he leaves £10 towards rebuilding the bridge at Thorverton, with arches of stone, if the inhabitants set about the work in earnest within a year, and persever with it; otherwise the money to be devoted to pious purposes. To each of his executors he leaves 40s., besides their legacies and expenses. The residue, whether in possession or owing, to be expended on works of piety, or according to the directions in a Codicil.

Codicil :- To Laurence Hawkyn, he leaves a pair of rosaries, etc. (unum par oraculorum nigrorum cum gaudiis de auro, et anulum aureum cum signaculo vertibili de petra blodia ex parte una, et aquila cum duobus capitibus ex altera, et botellum de argento semiplenum de balsamo puro). To Rd. Gabryell, besides a girdle already given to him, he leaves his purse, called a Gipsier, and a ring of silver-gilt. To Rd. Penels he leaves his girdle of black silk, with buckle and ornaments of silver gilt, a baslard, et unum par oraculorum de Ambre with a gilt cross, and a buckle with an image of St. Katherine. To John More his large bed, de rubio Werstede, videlicet coopertorium tapetis eum dimidia celatura et 3 Ridellis; also, his portiforium plenarium according to the use of Sarum (on fol. ii, Veni, Domine), directing him to give it, when about to die, to a worthy priest, who will use it and hand it on to another; and so on as long as it lasts. To John Duffelde a small round goblet (masser) and a silver cup worth about 30s. To Elias Stoke his overcoat (supertunicam) of green (cloth, with a cloak and hood of green Tartaryn. To Rd. Mark an overcoat with hood de horegrene; and a book of sermons, bound in red leather (already in his possession), subject to the same conditions as the other books. To John Mathew, V. of Broadelyst, a pamphlet (pamfilium), of the late Bishop's, entitled Lucidarium, with sermons and other good treatises and discourses; that he may pray for the Bishop's soul. To Thos. Baker, R. of Kentisbury, his bed de blodio worstede cum tapete, dimidia celatura de odium,1 et iijbus Ridellis de blodio carde2; he was also to have some jewel of silver if he were diligent in getting in the money owed to testator at Ilfracombe. To John Wolston a silver cup (peciam) and cover, worth about 26s. combe. 10 John Motston a silver cup (pecuam) and cover, worth about 20s. 8d. To John Cutyvpe a long scarlet robe jibulation cum una furraura grisia de Scache: (in check fashion?), and a small book called "Raymond." To John Wydeslond, V. of Heavitree, unum supertunicum de nityro blodio, furratum de bise, cum capicio duplicato de culem; also a small goblet (muser), black, bound with silver and gilt. To Win. Baker (who was with the Bishop of Bath), a silver cup, not engraved, worth about 20s. To John Holond a cloak of violet (clamidem de violet) without fur, and an overcoat of the larger size, with hood to match. To John Cowyk, some of his utensils at Ilfracombe, viz., 2 iron spits, 2 ranges (racke5) of iron, 2 brass pots, one brass chaldron (cacabum), one of his better dishes, the cooking vessels of tin, and a table-cloth of Parisian work; also a Breviary, once the property of Walter de Redeness, on the same conditions as the other books. To Thos. Horelock, his priest at Ilfracombe, he leaves other of his utensils there, to the value of 26s. 8d., a proper valuation having first been made. To John Copleston, junior, he bequeaths his long silver-gilt cup. standing on 3 lions, with a cover enamelled on the knob (cum cooperculo aymelato in pomello), which had been bequeathed to testator by Alexander Merle; hoping that he would stand by his executors, and assist and protect them in every way in his power. To John Wille, a poor clerk, 40s., if he continue in the schools at Oxford. To Geoffrey Langdon 66s. 8d. To John Wyke, certain utensils worth 20s. To Elias Bear the cup of maser-wood, bound with silver, not already bequeathed, and 20s., or the value thereof. To the anchorite enclosed at St. Leonard's a robe of black cloth or russet, and 20s, towards his maintenance. His servants, at the time of his death, to be continued in their service for 30 days, and rewarded according to length of service and diligence in work, at the discretion of the executors. If Rd. Gabriell remained in testator's house, or elsewhere within the Close, he was to have the tapestry embroidered with figures of men (aulam [i, q. aulæum] enbrowdeatam cum hominibus), which belonged to the late Bishop; also testator's mirror,3 and his new table; but the money left him in the Will testator

withdraws, as he does not need money. All his personal attire (vestimenta mea pro corpore), except his garments of scarlet cloth, of great value and trimmed with fur, testator bequeaths to respectable and poor Rectors, Vicars, and priests, in the city of Exeter and the neighbourhood, especially those belonging to St. Gabriel's Chapel at Clyst. To the Hosp. of St. John Baptist, Exeter, he leaves 20 marks for the support of one priest, to say mass for two years, in their Church, if it please them, for the souls of the late Bp. Brantingham, Robert his brother, and Henry Blakeburne. To St Mary's Chapel at Crediton he leaves 2 curtains (ridelli) and a frontal of crimson silk (frontale de rubio et blodio tartarin) with the Crucifix and Mary and John embroidered thereon. He orders a chasuble to be made of cloth of gold, red, cum orfreis de precioso auro, velluet, et aliis peciis remanentibus in Capella mea, and given to the Church of Bampton : if any materials were left they were to be made into receptacles for corporals (repositoria pro corporalibus), and given, by way of charity, to poor churches. In like manner towels, made of different kinds of materials, were to be given to the poorer Churches appropriated to the Dean and Chapter of Exeter. To Rd. Reve, R. of Roseash, [Esse Ravff, MS.], he leaves an overcoat and hood, which he bought of the wife of John Schapplegh; and to J. Wigwar his larger overcoat with hood to match. All his coverlets (lodices) or blankets, and sheets, (linthiamina usitata de canvass), at Exeter or at Ilfracombe, he gives to the decrepit and the bedridden, to prisoners, and to infirm and poor persons not remembered in his Will. To the altar of St. Michael in the Church of Crediton he leaves his alabaster tablet. beautifully painted; unless the parishioners of Ilfracombe are willing to contribute 40s, over and above the sums in the hands of Thos, Baker, collected from the executors of persons buried in the nave of their Church. To Thos, Barnard, his godson, (filio meo levato de sacro fonte) he leaves 26s, 8d., if he continue to attend school. His larger silver-gilt chalice, and his sheets de panno de Reynes, he orders to be sold, and the money laid out for the repose of the soul of Wm. Swynflete, his cousin. The aforementioned John Cowyk to have 2 round cups of silver, called bowls (bollys), a purse (gipcier), a silver ring, and 6 small silver spoons. None of his goods to be delivered up, lent, or alienated in any way whatsoever, till they had been properly valued, and the price paid to the executors. All legacies to lapse unless the legatees survived him. His executors might purchase any articles at a fair and duly attested price. He expresses an anxious wish that the gold deposited with the Prior of St. John Baptist, Exeter, and the proceeds of the sale of his goods and the recovery of debts, be distributed among the parishes of Devon and Cornwall, at the rate of 6s. 8d. each, any residue to be reserved for priests at Exeter, Oxford, and Ifracombe willing to say Mass for the souls of his benefactors; for poor clerks of Devonshire studying at Exeter (Exonic scolatizantibus); and for other works of piety. Directions are given for distributing among the Canons, &c., of the Cathedral present at his anniversary the forty marks laid up for that purpose in the Cathedral Treasury; and for the distribution of the £20 laid up in the Archives at Crediton for the anniversaries of Bishop Brantingham and of testator. Also, all his interest in his house at Exeter, called "Kellyysynne," with remainder to John Copleston junior, if she died before the determination thereof; also all his growing corn (blada mea) and hay for the year at Symston Lake and Wallen. To John Hacche 20s. and Tercios meos de Lege, formerly the property of John Wynkankton; also his best bow. To Robert [Pytman], Parson (persone) of the Church of Hollacombe, for tithes forgotten, 40d. To Walter Colyn a bullock. Four priests were to be found, to say Mass, at Holsworthy, for his soul, for two years after his death. To Roger Horne he leaves 3 sheep. To John Hond, chaplain, his worsted coat. To Thos. Lyle a heifer. To John Holand, Parson (persone) of St. Paneras' Ch., on account of oblations forgotten, 40d. To the store of St. Paneras' Ch., 40d. Any residue

to be devoted to works of piety.

\*\*Executors: — John Grymston, Parson (personam) of Holsworthy; Joan, testator's wife; John Copleston, junior: Thos. Noreys; and Robert atte Wode; each to receive 40s, for his trouble.

Proved 24 August, 1418, before the Bishop, at Clyst.

Summa bonorum :- £419 5s. 4d.

### LVI.—RICHARD PENELS, Canon of Exeter.

Dated in the Close, Exeter, 28 December, 1418.

He commends his soul to the Most High and Undivided Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, beseeching the Son of the Most Glorious Virgin Mary that, even as with His Precious Blood He redeemed it on the Altar of the Cross, so He would vouchsafe to keep, and defend, and save it from every spirit of evil. He desires that his body may be buried in the Cathedral; and to every Canon present on the occasion he leaves 20d.; to every Vicar 12d.; to every Annuellar 8d.; to every Secondary 6d; to every Chorister 3d. For the Nave of Credition Ch. he leaves £20; for the bridge at Chudleigh, 100s., on condition that the piers are built of stone; and for the new campanile of the Church of Moreton [Hampstead] 100s. His poor parishioners there to have 100s. to pay for his soul. Should the Bishop

confer testator's Prebend of Crydy on John Schute, the said John was to have an antient chalice, and a small brass pot, which testator had, himself, received by the gift of John Sutton. To every poor priest in the Hospital of St. Gabriel at Clyst he leaves a coat. Forty marks to be divided among blind, lame, infirm, and poor persons in the Archdeaconry of Totnes, and that with all possible speed, employing trusty persons at testator's cost; he appropriates two marks thereof to the poor of Brixham. To the executors of Rd. Holrygge, late V. of Brixham 20s, for tithes due to them. Immediately after his death a thousand Masses to be said for his soul, &c., as quickly as possible, with the Collect Deus Cui proprium major. To Henry Webber 14 marks, to say Mass for his soul, (if he be promoted to the priesthood within the three terms of the year next after testator's death), and 20s. for the expenses of his Ordination; also, "Sextum meum Decretalium cum uno Doctore; Innocencium meum; et antiquiora mea Decreta;" also, the use of his Breviary, which was not to be alienated, but bequeathed to some poor priest, who would pass it on in like manner. To Rich. Chichestre his Digestum retus, a small volume, et Codicem meum (and, as the said "Codex" [Justinian] was of small value, his executors were to buy another, suitable for the use of a scholar); also, "Decretales meos;" and he left him 100s., so that for three years he might have five nobles a year, and more if the executors saw fit and he continued in the schools. To his elder brother, Nicholas, testator leaves his second-best silver cup with the cover, the better of his two brass pots, and a dozen of his tin vessels. To his brother Thomas his third cup with its cover, and the 20s. which he owed. To his sister Joan his best cup and cover, 6 silver spoons, his red bed, with its curtains, - the last that he bought,-also 2 blankets, a pair of sheets (of those in good condition), a mattrass, and a canevas; also, five marks in money, and two small pots, his new ones of brass. To Rd. Marke, for tithes forgotten, and to pray for his soul, 13s. 4d. To Helias Stoke and Rob. Lyngham, 6s. 8d. each, to pray for his soul. To the Prior, &c., of the Hosp. of St. John, 13s. 4d. To the lepers (leprosariis) of St. Mary Magd. 6s. 8d.; to the poor boys of the Hosp. of St. John 6s. 8d. To John Sarger, chaplain, 3s. 4d. To Ralph, cousin of Rd. Mark, Thos. Hogge and John Cabyn, 3s. 4d. each. To the Prioress of Cornworthy two marks, viz., 13s. 4d. for herself, and 13s. 4d. among the nuns. To the R. of the Chapel of the Blessed Mary of Slapton 6s. Sd., and to the Brethren there 13s. 4d. among them, according to their rank. To John Hoper, chaplain, 40s., and the coat which testator bought against next Christmas—to pray for his soul. To John Seymere, chaplaiu, 13s. 4d. To John Whyteway 26s. 8d. To John Lydeford and his wife 6s. 8d. To Andrew Taylour 3s. 4d. To John Schute his silver salt-cellar and cover. To Thos., his Vicar-Choral, his cope (capam). To Roger Bolter his Liber Decretorum (if he consented to be overseer to his estate and to assist his executors.) To Wm. Trebel 6 silver spoons and a book called "Jon Aton," and his executors were not to demand the money that was between them, but the said William was to give it, himself, to the poor. To John Hytte, junior, and Wm. Dygher, he leaves 3s. 4d. each. To each boy of the Bishop's Chapel 12d. To John Befe the coat and hood which testator had of the livery of the Prior of Plympton (quem habui, isto anno, de liberata Prioris Plymptonie) and 6s. 8d. To John Bele his brown riding coat (jupam equitalem brunei coloris). To William, senior in the Bishop's kitchen 6s. 8d.

Executors:—His brother William (with 40s. and his two old silver cups, worth by weight 40s., for his trouble), and John Lane (to whom he leaves four marks.)

Proved, 23 January, 1418-19, before the Bishop, at Clyst.

LVII.—LAURENCE HAUKYN, Precentor of the Cathedral, &c. Dated at the Bishop's Manor of Clyst, 6 April, 1418.

He commends his soul to his Creator, Who redeemed it with His Precious Blood; his body to sacred sepulture where God might please, i.e. near the place where he chanced to die; if in the Diocese, then in the midst of the Choir at Crediton, in the space between the choir-stalls; but if beyond the Diocese, as his

executors, or any one of them, being present there, might determine, or as his

friends should arrange. His funeral expenses were not, through worldly vain-glory,

to exceed the bounds of moderation.

To his well-beloved lord, Edmund, Bishop of Exeter, he leaves his white satin vestment with corporal to match, and all the furniture of the altar, to wit 2 frontals, and 2 curtains of silk (Tartaryn), red and white, 2 consecrated towels of white linen; also a tablet (Tabelletam) of gold with the image of St. Peter. To Roger Bolter a silver cup called le Brendelle Kow (a legacy from Wm. Broun); also his best silver salt-cellar and cover. To Rd. Palmer an Antiphonar, quod incipit in secundo folio, "Periculis;" to be used by himself as long he pleased, and then handed on to other worthy priests, as long as it lasted; also a silver cup and cover—eum coopereulo baterez eum stellis et aymelato eum L. S. D. in summitate cooperculi; also a pair of rosaries of coral (par precularum de Coraill), with a gold ring enamelled all round with divers images (cum uno anulo circum diversis ymaginibus aymelato). To Rd. More, his nephew, a silver cup, the cover engraved with a vine; his best macer; 1 12 of his best silver spoons; his Legenda Aurea, que incipit in secundo folio, "De Festivitate," to use till his death, the book to be passed on to other worthy priests, as long as it lasted; and he was to pray for the soul of John Clive<sup>2</sup> and for testator. To Sir Edw. Courtenay, knight, eldest son of the Earl of Devon, he eaves six silver goblets, with covers. To John Shute a Breviary, quod incipit in secundo folio "peccato nos custodire;" to use for life, and pass on as in the other cases; also a great silver bowl (bolle) and cover, with a silver pix (cum una pixide vocata Povder Box). To John Worthyn a silver cup and cover, with Benedictus Deus inscribed round the latter, and 12 of his second-best silver spoons. To John Arderne, Esquire, 100s. To John Wolston, clerk, 100s. His executors were to remunerate his servants at their discretion, according to grade and length of service, and the residue was to be disposed of for pious purposes as they should see fit.

Executors: -John Shute, clerk; John Arderne, Esquire, and John Wolston,

clerk : with Roger Bolter and Rd. Palmer as Overseers. Proved 3 February, 1418-19, before the Bishop at Clyst.

# LVIII.—Thomas Clyfford, Canon of Exeter.

Dated on the Sunday next after the F. of St. Lucy the Virgin, i.e. 18 December 1418.

He commends his soul to Almighty God; his body to buried in the Cathedral. To St. Andrew's, Stokeinteignhead, he leaves a set of vestments of red velvet (felwet). To Rd. Clyfford a silver cup, with a cover having a small bolle on the top. To Matth. Stoke a silver cup, with a knop (knappe.) To John Clyfford, his brother, the fellow to the same (sociam cjusslem pecit.) To Wm. Clyfford, his brother, 20s. To Alice Lavoy a silver sait-cellar and cover; his best brass pot; and an iron spit (breche de ferro.) To Alice Clyfford, his sister, his best robe; to the aforesaid Alice Lavoy, his second-best; and to Isabella Bremely, his third and fourth. To Gunneta Gybbys, his fifth. To Rob. Parker, 40d. Holever, 6s. 8d. To Rd. Marke, 6s. 8d. To the Sub-Dean of Exeter, 6s. 8d. Wm. Bere, 2s. To Thos. Clyfford, his second brass pot. To John Stoke, 5s. residue, after paying his debts, to be devoted to pious uses.

Executors: -John Clyfford, his brother; and Matthew Stoke. Proved 28 February, 1418-19, before the Bishop, at Clyst.

# LIX.—SIR RICHARD CHAMPERNOUN, Knight.

Dated 26 February, 1418-19.

i. 333b. He commends his soul to God, and his body to sacred sepulture in his parish-

church of Dodbrooke, by the side of the body of Katherine, his wife.

To his son Richard he leaves a plough, with eight oxen and all appurtenances thereof in Dodbrooke, and the half of all his sheep on the said Manor; also, a bed, one of his best silver cups, with cover, twelve of his best spoons, and a fourth part

of his pots, dishes, and all his other utensils in London, stored in a certain cask or casks (utcnsilium Londonie in quadam pipa sive in pipis existencium.) To his son John he leaves another plough, with eight oxen, and all appurtenances at Innesworth, and half his sheep on that Manor; also another bed, and the third part of all his pots, dishes, and other utensils in London (as above). To the Wardens of his parish-church of St. Thomas of Dodbrooke he bequeaths a set of red vestments, of good quality, complete; also, a red cope; the parishioners of Dodbrooke to pray for his soul, for his wives and sons, and for all benefactors: also, his best Breviary. To John Kaynysham, his cousin, 20s. To John Kenylyon, his chaplain, 20s. To Wm. Colver 6s. 8d. The residue, after paying his debts, to be given to a priest, or priests, to say Mass in Dodbrooke Church, and receive for their stipend eight marks a year, provided that Mass were always said for his anchorite, giving herself continually to prayer, (Anacorite mee continuo oratrici), and that his servants were remembered according to their deserts and length of service.

Executors: -Rd. Champernoun, his son; Rd. Vaysy, R. of Bridford; Rd.

Tryby, R. of Newton Ferrers; and Henry Drewe. Proved, 3 April, 1419, before the Bishop, at Clyst.

Summa bonorum: £200 4s. 2d. ob.

LX.—RICHARD PALMER, Canon of Exeter, and R. of Ugborough-Dated at Clyst Episcopi, 2 May, 1415.

He commends his soul to God Almighty, Who redeemed it with His Precious Blood; his body to sacred burial. To his parish-church of Ugborough he leaves a new Missal, a new Gradual, and another of some age; also, a new Manual, a book called Pars Oculi, a Legenda Sanctorum, and two Processionals, to be kept in the Church, for use in Divine Worship, as long as they should last. To John Palmer, his brother, residing in the parish of Clyfton (Dioc. of Lichfield), he bequeaths 100s. To Thos. Waddon, his clerk, 40s. To each executor, if willing to serve, six marks; and they were to devote to pious uses any residue.

Executors :- Roger Bolter, and John Schute, chaplains.

Witnesses: -Walter Boway, notary-publick, R. of St. John-in-Cornwall: Thos. Greyston, R. of Farringdon; and Robert atte Wylle, clerk.

Proved, 17 April, 1419, before the Bishop, at Clyst.

#### ADDITIONAL NOTES TO THE WILLS :-

No. III., p. 379 (note 2).—It is possible that 'ovis' is a clerical error for 'ovi' (in which case vocat' would, of course, stand for 'vocati'). Mr. Greenfield sends me the following extract from the Will of John Hille, of Spaxton, dated 21 Oct., 1434 :- "Item, Johanni, filio et heredi meo, unum ciphum de uno ovo vocato a Grypeseg, cum coopertorio de argento et deaurato."

No. IX., p. 383.—"unum quaternum optimum de organis'." This is obscure.
Perhaps it means "an excellent quire of Organ-musick." I find "Liber Organicus'

in the Inventory of 1506.

No. X., p. 384, line 5.—"vnam govnam de frise vocat' Mouster Villers." This word appears as 'musterdevyllys' in the will of Wm. Holcombe (Redmayne's Registr. fol. 27), quoted by Oliver; who states, in a note, that it "sometimes takes the grotesque form of mustard-devils, and is said to be a corruption of moitie-develours." "It has been plausibly derived," he adds, "from Montivilliers in Normandy (called Monstier Villiers in the 15th Century), the seat of a supposed manufactory" (Monasticon, p. 278, note). Line 21—"de liberata," i.e. "of the livery" (see p. 400, line 5, and p. 421, ad fixem). Line 40—"de carde"; see p. 413, note 2. Line 44—"de Curie," i.e. "on Cookery." (W. D. M.) No. XLII., p. 405.—" volo quod faciant me sepeliri infra triduum post mortem mann, vel quarto die de mane, ad ultimum." It is singular that Tregrisiow, who alone of our Testators gives instructions in his Will for a speedy burial, should be the only person of whom it is recorded in this Register that he was suffered to remain unburied for an unprecedented length of time. He died 25 July, 1415 (ij. 167<sup>b</sup>, 257)—" defuncto . . . . mensis Julii die vicesima quinta; ipsiusque corpore decimo nono ldue mensis Augusti ex tune proximo sequenti reverenter ecclesiastice traditio sepulture" (ii, 168<sup>b</sup>). Apparently "decimo nono" is a mistake for "nono," on which day (see ii, 167<sup>b</sup>) the petition for the Election of a Dean was presented to the Bishop and granted; and the above record proceeds thus—"licenciaque postmodum eligendi Decanum . . . . petita et obtenta, subsequenter, vicesimo tercio die ejusdem mensis Augusti"—the Chapter proceeded to the Election. Even then the interval would be a fortnight!

No. XLIV., p. 409, ad finem-" Item Janyn de coquina; cf. p. 420, line 18.

No. XLVIII., p. 416, line 8—toutdys en ioye; perhaps these words were worked on the hangings—a kind of motto, "always happy." Line 18.—"Pavele is perhaps a mis-spelling of paille, which in old French is sometimes spelt poele Line 33.—For casu read cas'; perhaps, "in uno castulo."— (W. D. M.) This Testator was a daughter of Sir Giles Daubeney, knt., of Baryngton, Somerset, who died 24 June, 1386. She was thrice married: 1st to Sir Wm. Percehay of Kyton, in the parish of Holcombe-Rogus, son and heir of Sir Henry Percehay, knt., one of the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas. She was his second wife, and he died, s.p., between Feb., 1383-4, and Feb., 1386-7; 2nd, before April, 1390, to Sir John Hulle, knt., one of the Justices of the Court of C. P., by whom she had issue two sons and a daughter. She was his 2nd wife, and he died 24 June, 1408; 3rd, before Sept., 1412, to Sir Rob. Latimer, knt., of Duntish, Dorset, as his second wife, by whom she had no issue. Her 'sister Chambernon' was Katherine, who married Sir Rd. Champernowne, of Modbury .--Rd. Mille was one of the feoffees of Sir Rob. Latimer of his manors of Dewlish and Child-Okford, on his marriage with Matilda, to hold to their joint issue, with remainder to his right heirs.—Wm. Jewe, of Canonlegh, Devon, was an executor of the will of Sir John Hulle, Matilda's former husband, who settled on her the manors of Wellysford and Bickleigh (B. W. G.)

<sup>\*</sup>Sir William Pole includes William Wilford among the "men of best note, and wch have either in warre or peace bine employed in this countye," and tells us (p. 83) that he "made saile into Britaine wth div's ships of Devonshire, and in revenge of the harmes done by the Lord Cassils, hee tooke fortiel ships laden wth oyle & wine, beside other exployts done by him, 4 of H. 4." Robert Wilford, his Father, was Mayor of Exeter no less than twelve times in the course of the years 1375—95; and William himself was Mayor in 1401 and four times afterwards, John was never Mayor; but he was one of the four Bailiffs (elected annually with the Mayor) in 1399, 1401, 1404, and 1412. It is curious that in these two contemporaneous Wills the Family Name should be given in two distinct forms—William Wilford—John Wilsford. Lacke, in his Antiquities of Exeter, adopts the latter form. So does Jenkins; but he only copied Izacke, I suppose Izacke must have seen these St. Kerian MSS., in another of which (dated 1344) Robert Wylsford (120) occurs, and in yet another (dated 1398), William Wilforde (2ic,). In all other instances, so far as I can learn (and the name occurs frequently), it is spelt Wilford. The "s" in these St. Kerian MSS. is exceedingly clearly written; but I cannot help thinking, though Isacke accepted it, that it must have been a clerical error.

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
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
