Proceedings of the Society and the Board of Managers

June, 1913—June, 1916

Abstracts of Proceedings

JUNE 1913-JUNE 1916.

June 13, 1913. The following committee was appointed by the National Society to represent Massachusetts on the celebration of the 139th anniversary of the Journey of General Washington from Philadelphia to Cambridge to take command of the American Army June 23 to July 3, 1775: Henry F. Punderson, of Springfield, Chairman; (Geo. Washington Chapter originated the proposed celebration) Luther Atwood, of Lynn; Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade U. S. A. (Ret.) of Lowell; and George M. Rice, of Worcester.

July 11, 1913. Announcement was made of the death of John Adams, of Holden, one of our "actual sons" of Revolutionary sires, who died July 7, 1913, aged 99 years. He was a son of Elisha Adams, of Temple, Maine, who served in the Continental Army at West Point in 1781. It was voted that the Secretary send a letter sympathizing with his relatives in their bereavement, and expressing our high appreciation of his honorable life.

September 12, 1913. Markers for the graves of the following named soldiers of the Revolution were contributed to be placed in Holland, Mass. Benjamin Church, who had been one of Washington's Life Guard; Abel Adams, Bradley Webber; Captain Nehemiah May; Daniel Wallis, 2d, and Daniel Thompson.

FIELD DAY AT EXETER, N. H.

The annual Field Day was held October 18, 1913, at Exeter, N. H., in conjunction with the New Hampshire Society, S. A. R. On arrival at Exeter, the members with ladies assembled at the headquarters of the New Hampshire Society of the Cincinnati. The cheery fire in the great fireplace and the inspection of the quaint old house was greatly enjoyed. Equally enjoyable was an inspection of the recently restored Garrison House, the older part of which was built about 1650. Many visited the Academy buildings. Dinner was served in Unity Hall to about 100, members and guests. At its close Vice-President Frank E. Woodward introduced President Luther Atwood, who welcomed the company to his boyhood home, greeting the members of the New Hampshire Society and the representatives of other patriotic societies and briefly reviewed the historic past of Exeter. He was followed with addresses from Mrs. Charles

Knowles Bolton, of Shirley, vice-regent of the Massachusetts Society, Daughters of the Revolution; Mrs. Clinton Hatch, regent of Exeter Chapter, D. A. R.; Professor James A. Tufts, of Phillips Exeter Academy; Rev. Howard F. Hill, of Concord, Secretary of the New Hampshire Society, S. A. R., and Judge Henry A. Shute. The afternoon was spent informally. Professor Tufts escorted a party to look over the Academy buildings, and others sought various places of interest.

November 14, 1913. It was voted to add to our library a copy of the revised edition of Heitman's Historical Register of Officers of the Continental Army.

December 12, 1913. It was voted to admit to membership men of 21 years of age, who pay the regular admission fee, and to remit three-fourths of the annual dues until they reach the age of 25 years.

It was voted to invite former President Francis H. Brown, M. D. to prepare a "Hand-Book of Information," defining the objects of the Society, for general distribution. It was voted to reaffirm the approval of the Society of an Act of Congress, approved March 2, 1913, relating to the publication of military and naval records of the Revolutionary War.

WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

Since February 22, 1914 fell on Sunday, the celebration of Washington's 183rd birthday was held on Monday, February 23rd, at Hotel Vendome, Boston. Marshall Putnam Thompson gave an historical address on Lafayette, and Rev. Newton M. Hall, D.D., of Springfield, gave an address on Washington; also read several letters supposed to give an insight into the character of former President Washington. After the addresses, there was an informal luncheon. The attendance was nearly 150 members and guests. The four flags belonging to the society decorated the speaker's platform.

February 13, 1914. Upon the petition of compatriot John Blanchard, of West Acton, it was voted to incur the expense of adding the name of Luther Blanchard, the fifer of the Acton Minute-men, to the monument at Acton, provided that town would allow it to be done. Luther Blanchard was the first man wounded at the skirmish at the North Bridge, Concord, April 19, 1775, and subsequently died from the effect of the wound.

March 13, 1914. It was voted that the Society endorse the suggestion made by President-General R. Ballard Thruston, that the Society urge Massachusetts Senators and Congressmen to favor an

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appropriation be made by Congress for continuing the work now in progress for collecting and classifying, with a view to publication, the scattered military and naval records of the War of the Revolution.

It was voted to nominate President Luther Atwood for the Massachusetts Representative on the Board of Trustees of the National Society, S. A. R. In reply to a request from William C. Armstrong, of Nutley, N. J. for the places of burial of the Massachusetts Signers of the Declaration of Independence, the Secretary sent him the following:

John Hancock (1737–1793): Tomb in the Granary Burying Ground, Boston; Samuel Adams (1722–1803): Tomb in same ground; John Adams, (1735–1826): Tomb under the First Church, Quincy, Mass.; Elbridge Gerry, (1744–1814): Tomb erected by Congress in the Congressional Cemetery, Washington, D. C.; Robert Treat Paine (1731–1814): Tomb in the Granary Burying Ground, Boston.

April 10, 1914. It was voted to place a slate tablet on the grounds of the Public Library, Watertown, having the following inscription: "Washington passed this place on his way to Cambridge to take command of the patriot army, June-1775-July." It was also voted to recommend a uniform pattern of the same tablet be placed in towns through which Washington passed on his journey from Philadelphia to Cambridge June 23-July 3, 1775.

TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING, APRIL 20, 1914.

The 25th anniversary of the formation of the Massachusetts Society, falling on Sunday, the Annual Meeting was held on Monday, April 20, 1914 in the Old South Meeting House, Boston. President Luther Atwood, of Lynn, presided. The trooping of the colors by a Color Guard and the salute to the flag opened the exercises. Prayer was offered by Rev. Lewis Wilder Hicks, of Wellesley.

President Atwood delivered an address briefly reviewing the work accomplished by the society during the year; the outlook for the ensuing year was most encouraging.

Dr. Charles M. Green submitted his twenty-second annual report, which showed receipts of \$4020.13; expenditures, (including \$240 carried to the permanent fund) of \$3999.03; and a cash balance April 15, 1914 of \$21.10 in general fund. The auditing committee, Col. Ephraim Stearns, chairman, reported the treasurer's accounts were correct, and the permanent fund, amounting to \$7592, is on deposit in approved savings bank; and that the reserve fund, amounting to \$525.57, is on deposit in the State Street Trust Company. Total net assets \$8138.67. Historian Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade read the names of 52 members who had died during the year.

The following delegates to the Congress of the National Society, to be held in Syracuse, N. Y. May 18 and 19, 1914, were appointed: President Luther Atwood, (Delegate at large) Webster Bruce, Dr. W. E. Boardman, E. J. Cox, E. B. Hutchinson, H. W. Kimball, W. S. Lyon, J. W. H. Myrick, J. G. Moseley, J. E. Peirson, Dr. M. G. Parker, A. F. Powers, H. F. Punderson, David Pingree, F. Rumrill, Gen. Philip Reade, A. H. Stearns, Col. E. Stearns, Nathan Warren.

Secretary Herbert W. Kimball submitted his annual report showing a total membership of 1600, of which 54 are life members, and four "actual sons" of soldiers of the Revolution. This being the "Silver Anniversary" of the Society, the Secretary briefly reviewed some of the work it had accomplished during the past twenty-five years.

Originally organized April 19, 1889 at Tremont Temple, Boston, under the name of "Sons of the Revolution of Massachusetts," upon the formation of the National Society it became the Massachusetts Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

It was one of the earliest societies to recommend that in place of "Fast Day" the State appoint April 19th a legal holiday. Governor Wm. E. Russell favored it in a special message to the Judiciary of the Legislature, June 13, 1892. The bill substituting the 19th of April for "Fast Day," brought before the Legislature in 1893, failed of passage until its enactment the following year. Gov. Frederick T. Greenhalge gave it his support, and from him it took the name of "Patriots' Day."

This Society was among the earliest to observe the day by holding its annual meeting at Concord, April 19, 1894.

The first dinner given by the Society took place at the Parker House, June 17, 1889. The first "Field Day" was held at Concord, October 19, 1889, the anniversary of the Surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown, Va. The first observance of Washington's birthday was held at Hotel Vendome, February 22, 1901.

At the dedication of the monument at Bennington, Vt. August 19, 1891, to commemorate the battle of August 16, 1777, this Society sent a delegation of 27 members.

At the Field Day held at Marblehead, October 19, 1893, a design for an iron marker for graves of soldiers of the Revolution was adopted and fifty were ordered to be made for samples to be given to city or town authorities, who should apply for them, so that town appropriations could be voted for memorial purposes. Previous to the introduction of the iron marker, by request of the Society, many towns on Memorial Day decorated their soldiers' graves with flags.

The City of Boston appropriated \$50 for purchasing markers which were placed by a committee from the Society at graves in Copps Hill, King's Chapel, the Granary, the Common, Eustis Street, Charlestown, Forest Hill, Mount Auburn and West Roxbury burialgrounds. The Society has also placed additional markers in those cemeteries, and over 150 for Revolutionary soldiers buried in the North Dorchester Cemetery.

A bronze marker was placed October 19, 1894 at Lafayette's grave in Picpus Cemetery, Paris, France, by the late Captain Nathan Appleton, bearing the words "Lafayette: a tribute from the Massachusetts Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, 1894." Through Captain Appleton's solicitation, two great-great grandsons of Lafayette were made honorary life members of the Society, viz: Gaston de Sahune and Paul de Sahune Lafayette, of France.

Circulars were repeatedly sent to the Selectmen of every town in the State, asking for their influence to recommend appropriations of money for marking the graves of Revolutionary Soldiers and Sailors.

As early as 1897 the Society sent out circulars to the Town Clerks in Massachusetts, asking their co-operation in securing a fitting and universal observance of the Fourth of July. A "Safe and Sane" method of celebration was suggested.

The Society made liberal donations towards the preservation of the Hancock-Clarke House, at Lexington; the Royal House, at Medford, the Bellingham-Cary House, at Chelsea, Paul Revere's House, Boston, and the Shirley-Eustis House at Roxbury. It also made a generous donation towards equipping a hospital-ship for use during the Spanish war of 1898. It presented to the Paul Revere School, Boston, portraits and busts of eminent patriots, and contributed towards repairing the "Old North" meeting house. Memorial service was held December 14, 1899 in Association Hall to observe the 100th anniversary of Washington's death.

Bronze tablets have been placed at the tomb of Gen. John Greaton, in Eustis Street, (Roxbury) burial-ground; also, tablets on bowlders in North Dorchester and Walter street (Roslindale) burial-grounds, marking the burial places of unknown patriots who died in hospitals during the Siege of Boston. A tablet was placed on the Savings Bank Building, Medford, to mark the site of the home of Gov. John

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Brooks; also, on the house once the home of Capt. Jonathan Haradin, (the Naval commander), Salem; also, on a bowlder in Danvers Square to commemorate the Quebec Expedition; also, on Hotel Essex, Boston, marking, approximately, the site of the birth-place of Major General Henry Knox.

An important work done by the Society, aided by individual contributions, was the building of a "Bay" in the "Cloister of the Colonies" for the Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge. Donations were made for a tablet placed by the Daughters of the American Revolution on the Paul Jones Schoolhouse, East Boston; also, towards a tablet placed by the Malden Chapter, S. A. R., and the D. A. R. at Malden, in memory of Malden's Revolutionary soldiers; also, for the tablet placed by the Paul Jones Club of Portsmouth, N. H. to mark the site of the ship-yard where the "Ranger" was built; also, for a tablet placed on a bowlder at Lanesboro, in memory of Jonathan Smith, whose speech carried the State Convention for ratifying the Federal Constitution; also, for the tablet placed on the site of Easton's tavern, Pittsfield, by the Berkshire County Chapter, S. A. R., to commemorate the gathering place of of the patriots who planned the capture of Ticonderoga; also, for the memorial flag-staff, erected in Cambridge by the Daughters of the American Revolution; also, for the beautiful monument at Brooklyn, N. Y. erected in memory of the Prison Ship Martyrs: also, for the fund raised for the sufferers from the Great Fire in San Francisco; also, for the new building erected by the New England Historic Genealogical Society. Contributions have annually been made to the American Flag Association; the Society for the preservation of American Antiquities; and the Committee for Co-operation in Patriotic work.

Several Chapters of the Society have placed tablets marking historic places: George Washington Chapter, of Springfield, placed one to commemorate the end of "Shays' Rebellion," and another at West Springfield, marking the camp-ground of Cornwallis's captured Hessians; also, one marking the site of Parsons' Tavern. Boston Chapter has placed a tablet opposite the City Hall commemorating the protest the school-boys made to the British soldiers against spoiling their coasting-place; also, a "Washington's Journey" tablet at Waltham. Also a "Boston Massacre" slate tablet in the Granary grounds. Old Essex Chapter, of Lynn, also placed a Washington's Journey tablet opposite the Wayside Inn, South Sudbury. Our Treasurer, Dr. Charles M. Green, also placed one at Leicester. Worcester Chapter placed one in Lincoln Square; citizens of Weston placed one, all of which indicated General Washington's passing those places to take command of the Continental Army at Cambridge. Old Suffolk Chapter, of Chelsea, placed a tablet on the Boulevard, commemorating the battle of Chelsea Creek; also, it has contributed towards marking other historic sites in Chelsea, and the preservation of the Bellingham-Cary house. Old Middlesex Chapter, of Lowell, placed a tablet in Dracut in memory of its Revolutionary soldiers. Through a liberal contribution from Gen. Francis Henry Appleton, a portrait of James Otis was painted by Walter Gilman Page and loaned to the Bostonian Society. With one exception (1908, when a dinner took its place) "Field Days" have annually been held; commencing at Concord, October 19, 1889, to celebrate the anniversary of the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown, Va., an anniversary observed for several succeeding years.

OFFICERS ELECTED, APRIL 20, 1914.

President, Luther Atwood, Lynn; Vice-Presidents, Frank E. Woodward, Wellesley Hills; Vernon A. Field, Wollaston; John MacDuffie, PH.D., Springfield; Secretary and Registrar, Herbert W. Kimball, Waban; Treasurer, Charles M. Green, M.D., Boston; Historian, Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade, U. S. A. (retired) Lowell; Chaplain, Rev. Lewis W. Hicks, Wellesley; Managers for three years: James C. Peabody, Boston; Joseph E. Peirson, Pittsfield; Dr. Waldo E. Boardman, Winthrop; Herbert C. Taft, Lowell; Horace P. Williams, Roxbury.

Following the meeting, the assembly marched to the American House for the annual dinner. President Luther Atwood presided, and the speakers included Rev. Francis L. Beal of Cambridge, Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade, Marshall Putnam Thompson and Vice-President Vernon A. Field. Edwin D. Sibley gave some original humorous readings. Music was by an orchestra of ladies. In accordance with the custom, the Color Guard presented the flags for salutation and the members sang the "Star Spangled Banner." Behind the speakers' table, the National and State colors were displayed.

June 12, 1914. On motion of Mr. Webster Bruce, of Lynn, it was voted to form the "Washington Guard of the Massachusetts Society of the Sons of the American Revolution" to be organized on the plan of the New Jersey Society.

CELEBRATION OF WASHINGTON'S JOURNEY IN 1775.

"To commemorate the completion of its first quarter of a century of patriotic activity, the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution celebrated the 139th anniversary of the memorable journey of Gen. George Washington, in 1775, from Philadelphia to take his place as Commander-in-Chief of the American forces encamped at Cambridge, an army of some 18,000 patriot yeomany hastily gathered to prevent further incursions of the British army from Boston after the fights at Lexington and Concord." A committee of fifteen was appointed, three from each of the five States along the route, to carry out a plan to mark the way with appropriate tablets and to organize a pilgrimage of members of the Society to repeat the journey in automobiles, traversing as nearly as practicable the identical highways taken by Washington and his party from June 23 to July 2, 1775.

The principal objects of the celebration were to inspire the community at large with a more profound reverence for the founders of our nation, to encourage historical research in relation to the American Revolution, to arouse greater interest in the preservation of our national traditions, and to create a more active spirit of patriotism throughout the region traversed. The "Pilgrims" started from Philadelphia June 23, 1914, passing through Trenton, N. J., New York City, New Haven, Wethersfield and Hartford, Conn. On reaching Springfield, June 30, a reception was given by the George Washington Chapter. Formal presentation was made to the city of a bronze tablet, which the Chapter had placed in Court Square to mark the site of Parsons' Tavern, where Washington stopped. Leaving Springfield, July 1, the "Pilgrims" tarried briefly at Palmer, Warren, West Brookfield and Spencer; at the latter place a granite marker had been placed by the Historical Society, bearing an inscription showing that Washington had passed that place to take command of the army. Continuing on through Leicester, Worcester was reached in the afternoon of July 1. Here a reception by the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution was held, and afterwards a tablet in Lincoln Square was unveiled. The "Pilgrims" were escorted by a cavalcade of riders in Colonial costumes. In the evening a dinner at the Bancroft Hotel was attended by a large number of members and ladies. Leaving Worcester, July 2d, the first stop was at Shrewsbury, where the Gen. Artemas Ward house was visited; then at Marlboro, where the party were entertained by the D. A. R.

Chapter, and a visit made to William's Tavern, noted as Washington's stopping place, in 1789. At Weston, a marker placed in the Public Square was unveiled with appropriate exercises. At the Wayside Inn, in South Sudbury, luncheon was served. A delegation from Old Essex Chapter, of Lynn, were present, and a "Washington's Journey" tablet was unveiled. Three more tablets were dedicated; one in Waltham, and two in Watertown, one of which was erected by the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co.

At a banquet at the Hotel Somerset, on the evening of July 2, given by the Massachusetts Society, addresses were made by President-General Thruston, President Atwood, Rev. Prescott Evans of Cambridge, and Hon. Edward Robbins, of Pennsylvania.

Patriotic exercises, on Friday, July 3d, near the "Washington Elm," on Cambridge Common, completed the commemorative march. The "Pilgrims" entered Cambridge accompanied by details from the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co., the Lexington Minute-men, headed by drummer and fifer dressed to represent the picture, called "The Spirit of 76," the Fusilier Veteran Corps, and the 7th company, Coast Artillery Co.; Brig.-Gen. Charles K. Darling was chief marshal; The exercises at the tree were in charge of Albert F. Amee, with President Luther Atwood as presiding officer. They included patriotic singing by children from a public school, addresses of welcome by Mayor Good, of Cambridge; G. P. Gardner, Jr., representing Harvard College; Stoughton Bell, of Cambridge Board of Trade; and an historical address by President-General Thruston. Later in the morning the "Pilgrims" were entertained by the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co. in its Faneuil Hall Armory.

August 1, 1914. The Society removed its office from 17 Milk Street to room 439 Tremont Building, Boston. The monthly meetings of the Board of Managers are held in the "Committee Room" No. 320, same building. During the summer markers were given to be placed at graves of the following Revolutionary soldiers: James Davenport, North Dorchester; Bezaliel Bennett, Shrewsbury; Col. Jeduthan Baldwin, North Brookfield; Edmund Stedman, Newton Lower Falls; Eliphaz Thayer, East Braintree.

FIELD DAY AT SUDBURY, OCTOBER 12, 1914.

Favored by beautiful weather the annual Field Day took place at South Sudbury. About one hundred members and guests, including many ladies, arrived by carriages and automobiles at Wayside Inn

for dinner at 1 o'clock. Most of the party came to Concord by railroad and from there by automobiles and carriages to South Sudbury, passing on the way places of historic interest and stopping at Sudbury to look at the statue of the Minute-man and the ancient meeting house. A visit was also made to the monument to Captain Wadsworth, who with his men were killed in battle with Indians, in King Philips War, April 18, 1676. After the dinner, Vice-President Frank E. Woodward, introduced President Luther Atwood, whose appropriate address was followed by addresses from former President Nathan Warren, Edward R. Lemon, Mrs. Nellie Rice Fiske, regent of Wayside Inn Chapter, D. A. R., and Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade, who briefly reviewed the part that Sudbury took in the Revolutionary War; a large proportion of its men responded to the Lexington alarm, and many were in the battle of Bunker Hill and the Siege of Boston. Sudbury filled its quota of men for the Continental Army.

At the business meeting, held after the dinner, it was voted to make a change in the By-Laws, viz: Art. 1, Sec. 3. to read:

"The annual dues of a member elected between September 1, of the current year and April 15, of the fiscal year, shall continue his membership until the end of the next succeeding fiscal year."

November 6, 1914. It was voted to appoint a Color Bearer who shall on all public occasions, when the Society meets, be in charge of the Colors and of the Color Guard, the latter to be selected by the Color Bearer.

Voted to donate \$25, to aid the work of the American Red Cross Society through the Daughters of the Revolution, and \$25 to French soldiers, through Boston Chapter, S. A. R. Voted to present 100 copies of the 1913 Year Book to the Massachusetts State Library for distribution to town libraries.

WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION, FEBRARY 22, 1915.

The Society celebrated Washington's 183rd birthday with a dinner at the City Club. There was an attendance of nearly 250 members and guests. Colors were trooped and bugle calls were sounded under direction of Color bearer, Major Myrick. President Atwood was presented with the National Society's Insignia, in recognition of his devotion to the interests of the Society.

The address was delivered by Worthington C. Ford, secretary of the Massachusetts Historical Society, on "The Treaty of Ghent." Vice-President Woodward read an interesting announcement of the

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manner in which the original news of the signing of the Treaty reached Boston on Feb. 13, 1815. It was forwarded from New York immediately upon its receipt, and took thirty-two hours from New York to Boston. The charges for this "express" service amounted to \$225.

March 12, 1915. The Board of Managers voted to attend a patriotic service in the evening of Easter Sunday at Christ Church (the Old North) and to loan our flags for that occasion.

A petition from Abner L. Braley, Esq., was received asking for a Charter for a Chapter to be formed in Dukes County, and it was voted to grant the same upon receipt of the requisite number of members belonging to the Society.

April 9, 1915. It was voted to nominate Dr. Moses Greeley Parker for a Trustee of the National Society to represent Massachusetts on its Board of Trustees. A unanimous rising vote of thanks was given President Luther Atwood for his efficient official service.

TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING, APRIL 19, 1915.

The Annual Meeting was held this day at 10:30 o'clock in the Old South Meeting House, Boston. President Luther Atwood presided. The colors of the Nation, the State, and the Society were brought forward by the Color Guard, and saluted by the members standing, after which prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Rev. Lewis Wilder Hicks. In his annual address, President Atwood spoke of the prosperous and harmonious condition of the Society, and reviewed some of his official acts during the year. He said that he was often asked for what his society stood; and he said "that it taught men for one thing, to have deeper veneration for the institutions which make the people of this country what they are to-day, and if there ever was a time for the expression of true statesmanship, that crisis is now."

The annual reports of the Secretary-Registrar, the Treasurer, the Historian and the Auditors were read by those officials; Secretary Kimball reported for the year ending March 31, the membership was 1632, of whom 61 are life-members, and five are "actual sons" of soldiers of the Revolutionary War. Treasurer Green reported the receipts up to April 15 had been \$3712.88 and the expenditures \$3594.86 (of which \$494 had been added to the Permanent fund) leaving a cash balance \$118.42. The auditors found the accounts were correct, and that the net assets of the society were \$8740.24.

General Philip Reade, the Historian, read the names of 37 members who had died during the year, among them Hon. Curtis Guild, who

died April 6, 1915. President Atwood then called upon Mr. Frank E. Woodward to read the resolutions drawn on the death of Mr. Guild. "He was a man of rare gifts and used them freely in the service of his country. He distinguished himself in many fields of public service, but in none of them did he give more generously of his time and talents, nor in any were his sympathies more fully enlisted, than in the principles and ideals for which our Society stands. He was a well rounded man, with great breadth of vision and wide sympathies and blest with a great capacity for work and service."

It was RESOLVED, That this tribute to his memory be spread upon our records and that a copy be sent to his widow.

On motion of Mr. E. B. Hutchinson it was voted, that the Society set a part one day to be designated as "Church Day" and on the Sunday preceeding April 19th, appropriate services be held in some church in Boston.

The following named were appointed Delegates to the Congress of the National Society to be held in Portland, Oregon, July 19 and 20, 1915: Henry F. Punderson of Springfield; T. Julien Silsby and Charles F. Read of Brookline; Nathan Warren of Waltham; Earle S. P. Bodurtha, of Agawam and Portland, Ore., and W. O. Dustin, of Elmore, Minn.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of officers resulted as follows:

President, Frank E. Woodward, Wellesley Hills; Vice-Presidents, Vernon A. Field, Wollaston; Charles F. Read, Brookline; and Webster Bruce, Lynn; Secretary and Registrar, Herbert W. Kimball, Waban; Treasurer, Dr. Charles M. Green, Boston; Historian, Brig-Gen. Philip Reade, U. S. A. (retired) Lowell; Chaplain, Rev. Lewis W. Hicks, Wellesley. Managers for three years: Henry F. Punderson, Springfield; Alfred F. Powers, Worcester; John W. Churchill, Plymouth; George P. Tilton, Newburyport and Everett C. Benton, Belmont.

This concluded the business session, and the members, escorted by a detachment from the Veteran Fusiliers, under command of Captain Bagley, marched to the American House for the annual dinner. The guests were Hon. Samuel W. McCall, and Rev. Lee S. McCollister, D. D. of Tufts College, who took the place of Hon. Curtis Guild, who had accepted an invitation to speak at this meeting. May 14, 1915. Old Middlesex Chapter, of Lowell, requested to have a "Petition presented in Congress to establish a National holiday to be called 'Patriots' Day,' April 19th, because, in a sense, April 19, 1775 marked the beginning of the culmination of the struggles of the Colonists, as well as the present democratic form of government."

On Memorial Day, May 30, the Society contributed flags for the graves of Revolutionary soldiers buried in the North Dorchester cemetery, which were placed by Henry Clap Kendall, of Dorchester. A marker was contributed for the grave of Benoni Muzzey, in Wellesley.

June 11, 1915. It was voted to accept the invitation of George Washington Chapter to hold the regular meeting of the Managers for November, at Springfield; and the following day to meet with the Seth Pomeroy Chapter at Northampton.

It was voted to invite the National Society to hold its Congress for 1920 in Massachusetts, and Vice-President C. F. Read was authorized to extend the invitation when he attends the Portland, Oregon, Congress. It was voted to appropriate \$100 from the treasury towards the preservation of the Shirley-Eustis house, in Roxbury.

August 13, 1915. A petition was granted to members residing in Walpole, and its vicinity, to form a Chapter of the Society to be called the "Francis Lewis Chapter." A marker was contributed for the grave of Captain William Cooley, a soldier of the Revolution, buried in Granville, Mass.

September 10, 1915. It was voted to accept the invitation of Isaac Newton Lewis, of East Walpole, to attend a patriotic Field Day of the Francis Lewis Chapter, S. A. R., to be held at his residence, October 19th.

It was voted to send to the widow of Hon. John D. Long, who died August 28, 1915, a note expressing the sympathy of the Managers in the bereavement she has sustained.

FIELD DAY AT GLOUCESTER, OCTOBER 12, 1915.

Notable success marked the annual Field Day of the Society, the members of which and the ladies who accompanied them could not have asked for better weather conditions. The party left Boston on the 9:35 A. M. train for Beverly, where motors brought them along the beautiful North-Shore roads, passing many notable estates and

stopping to visit the John Hays Hammond Estate. On arrival at Gloucester, luncheon was served in Assembly Hall. After luncheon, President Woodward, in a brief address, introduced Mayor Barrett, of Gloucester, who welcomed the party, and alluded to many local historical facts connected with the Revolutionary War. An address of welcome was also made by Mrs. James R. Pringle, regent of Lucy Knox Chapter, D. A. R., who spoke of the part which Gloucester had taken in Colonial Wars; also in the Revolution, and in Wars of later dates. Addresses were made by Hon. George H. Fall, of Malden, and Charles E. Mann, of Malden, who recalled the fact that "Stage Fort Park," Gloucester, had been occupied five times for military purposes; he also spoke of Linzee's raid on Cape Ann by the "Falcon," August 8, 1775, and the heroic resistance of the men of Gloucester when the British attempted to seize a schooner in the harbor.

A vote of thanks was passed to Mrs. Hammond for her courtesy in opening "Lookout Hill" to the inspection of the party.

November 12, 1915. The monthly meeting of the Board of Managers was held this afternoon in Nayasset Clubhouse, Springfield, as guests of George Washington Chapter. Following the business session, a banquet was served in the evening. Henry F. Punderson, president of the Chapter, presided and addresses were made by President Woodward, Vice-Presidents Read and Bruce, Secretary Kimball, Historian Reade and others. From Springfield, the members of the Board, who had greatly enjoyed the hospitalities extended to them, journeyed on to Northampton, where on Saturday, November 13th, they were guests of Seth Pomeroy Chapter S. A. R. at a banquet. Dr. F. H. Smith, President of the Chapter, presided, and welcomed the guests. He was followed by addresses from Hon. Calvin Coolidge. President Woodward, Vice-President Read, H. F. Punderson, Geo. W. Cable, and others. Sunday morning, at a patriotic service in the Unitarian church, a sermon was preached by the Chaplain, Rev. Lewis Wilder Hicks, of Wellesley.

The organ prelude to the service was followed by "trooping of the colors," conducted by Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade, and the singing of "Onward Patriot Brothers." Further services were conducted by Rev. H. G. Smith, Chaplain of the Chapter, and were closed with the singing of "America."

December 10, 1915. It was voted to accept the invitation of Old Middlesex Chapter of Lowell, to attend the twentieth anniversary of its formation, on January 18, 1916, at the Spaulding House, Lowell.

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Upon the request of Reuben L. Reed, of South Acton, it was voted to buy a cane he had made, to be presented to Rev. S. J. Moulton, of Stow, in recognition of his services given at a dedication of markers placed at the graves of Revolutionary soldiers, buried in that town. At a subsequent meeting of the Managers, the cane was presented to Mr. Moulton by President Woodward. Mr. Moulton made a pleasing response.

January 15, 1916. A Resolution, offered by Vice-President Charles F. Read, upon the death of Major Horace P. Williams, was adopted by a rising vote, and the Secretary instructed to offer the sympathy of the Board to his family in their bereavement.

Charles E. Wiggin was elected to fill the vacancy in the unexpired term of office of the late Major Williams.

Dr. Moses Greeley Parker, of Lowell, was nominated to represent the Massachusetts Society on the Board of Trustees of the National Society for the ensuing year.

WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY, FEBRUARY 22, 1916.

The Society celebrated George Washington's 184th birthday at Hotel Vendome, Boston; previous to which the members attended the reception held by Governor and Mrs. McCall at the State House. Dinner was served at the Vendome at noon, and the attendance was far larger than usual on this patriotic holiday. President Frank E. Woodward presided, and among the guests were Colonel Thomas Ridgeway, of Fort Warren; Major Kessler, of Fort Strong; Captain Kelton, of Fort Banks and Captain Bunker and Surgeon Yeaman of Col. Ridgeway's Staff. At the close of the dinner, Colonel Henry L. Hawthorne, U. S. A. (retired) gave an illustrated talk upon "Modern Armament" following which, these resolutions were adopted:

RESOLVED, That the Sons of the American Revolution indorse the sentiment of a system of preparedness on the part of the Government and the people, and the guarantee of peace with honor, in accordance with the traditions and policy of our Revolutionary ancestry.

RESOLVED, That Congress be respectfully urged to provide means and erect a suitable National Archives building in which may be permanently preserved our valuable Governmental records.

During the meeting, a congratulatory message was telegraphed to the George Washington Chapter, of Springfield, which was holding its annual banquet at the same time.

March 10, 1916. The regular meeting was held at Bancroft Hotel, Worcester, by invitation of the Worcester Chapter, at 5:30 P. M. The resignation of Herbert C. Taft, as a member of the Board of Managers, was read and accepted. It was voted to appoint George L. Gould, of Malden and Topsfield, to fill the unexpired term of office of Mr. Taft.

In recognition of the long-continued and faithful services of our chaplain, the Rev. Lewis Wilder Hicks, of Wellesley, and of Dr. Frank A. Gardner, of Salem, whose labor in the field of historical research pertaining to the History of Massachusetts regiments in the Revolutionary War are appreciated, it was voted to constitute both as Life members.

Hon. Newell B. Woodworth, President-General of the National Society, was the guest of the Managers at this meeting, and made an appreciative address.

The nominating committee reported for officers to be chosen April 19th, 1916 for the ensuing year, the same who are now in office, and for Managers for 3 years: Abner L. Braley, Francis S. Beckford, Frederick H. Matthews, George H. Nutting and T. Julien Silsby. It was voted to accept the report. At the close of the meeting, the members reassembled in the ball-room of the hotel, as guests of the Worcester Chapter, and the Colonel Timothy Bigelow Chapter, D. A. R. After the dinner addresses were made by Dr. J. C. Berry, President of the Worcester Chapter, President-General Woodworth, Mrs. A. P. Howarth, Regent of the D. A. R. Chapter, Rev. A. M. McCullagh, President Woodward, Vice-President Read, and E. F. Thompson, of Worcester.

March 31, 1916. At a Special meeting of the Board, held this day, it was voted that the following named Committee be appointed to consider the proposition, to place a tablet in Roxbury to the memory of Gen. John Greaton: Charles E. Wiggin, Dependence S. Waterman, John S. Richardson and Augustus Bacon.

Marshall Putnam Thompson, who was present as a guest of the Board, spoke on the subject of aiding the Massachusetts Training School for the education of men to be available for commissions in the militia. Subsequently it was voted to donate \$25 towards the "Flag fund" for the school.

TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING, APRIL 19, 1916.

The twenty-seventh annual meeting was held in the Old South Meeting House this day at 10:30 A. M. The President, Frank E. Woodward, presided. Trooping of the colors, and salutes by members opened the exercises. Prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Rev. Lewis Wilder Hicks.

The report of the Secretary-Registrar, Herbert W. Kimball, showed a net gain in the membership of sixty-eight; 155 new members having been admitted, and the total membership on April 1, 1916, was 1700. The Society has seventy-two life members, of whom three are "actual sons"—Elisha J. Faxon, of Salem, aged 84 years; Rev. Elisha Gifford, of New Haven, Conn., aged 82 years and Cyrus A. Rockwell, of San Francisco, California, aged 77 years.

President Woodward in his annual report touched on the crisis of the hour, declaring "that un-Americanized Americans means danger, and our Society can and must do the great work of spreading historical truths and patriotism."

The Treasurer, Dr. Charles M. Green, presented his annual report, showing Receipts for the year ending April 15, 1916: \$4194.09; Expenditures (including \$682 added to the Permanent fund) \$3941.76; cash balance in General fund \$370.75. Permanent fund \$8768.00 on deposit in approved Massachusetts Savings Banks, and the Reserve fund, \$546.32 is on deposit with the State Street Trust Company. Total net assets, April 15, 1916, \$9685.07.

The Auditing Committee, George H. Nutting, Harold C. Read and Charles Norcross Breed, reported they found the accounts correct, and the books of the Treasurer in excellent condition.

Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade, the Historian, read the names of 52 members who had died during the year.

The Delegates to the Congress of the National Society, to be held at Newark, N. J. May 15-16, 1916, were: Henry F. Punderson, Dr. Moses Greeley Parker, (National delegates) Frank E. Woodward, President, and Joshua Atwood, Luther Atwood, J. Ross Bates, Dr. Waldo E. Boardman, Henry A. Booth, Webster Bruce, Chester M. Clark, Martin L. Dinsmore, Dr. Robert M. Green, Charles M. Green, M. D. Clarence E. Leonard, Paul I. Lombard, Fred. H. Matthews, Henry Smith Kimball, Herbert W. Kimball, William S. Lyon, Grenville H. Norcross, George Hale Nutting, David Pingree, Alfred F. Powers, John Graham Moseley, Charles F. Read, Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade, T. Julien Silsby, Richard H. Stacy, Luke S. Stowe, Walter K. Watkins, Nathan Warren, Chas. E. Wiggin.

On motion of Dr. Charles H. Bangs, of Lynn, it was voted that the President appoint a Committee "to consider in what way the Massachusetts Society, S. A. R. can put forth its efforts properly to com-

memorate the Landing of the Pilgrims in 1620, and to co-operate with such Commissions as may be appointed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, in accordance with the recommendation of the Governor." President Woodward appointed Dr. Charles H. Bangs, of Lynn, John W. Churchill, of Plymouth, and Hon. George H. Fall, of Malden.

Abner L. Braley, Esq., offered the following Resolve, which was unanimously adopted:

"We reaffirm our determination to support at all hazards the rights of Americans guaranteed to them by the laws of civilization, and we further assure the administration of our determination to maintain the principles of American liberty in any event, and at all hazards."

All officers of the past year were reëlected for the ensuing year, and five Managers for three years were elected, as given on page 7.

At the conclusion of the meeting the members of the Society marched to the American House, where the annual dinner was held. The speakers were former Lieut.-Governor Louis A. Frothingham, and Rev. Willard Scott, of Brookline.

May 12, 1916. It was voted that the President appoint a committee to consider the question of aiding the "American Patriotic League" in its efforts to promote a more efficient citizenship through direct training in the public schools. The Committee appointed is as follows:—George Hale Nutting, Chairman, James C. Peabody and Vernon A. Field.

Walter K. Watkins was appointed an assistant to the committee on Increase of Membership, in its correspondence and in the verification of application papers; also as assistant to the secretary.

The following Standing Committees for the ensuing year were appointed. Membership: The President, the Registrar and the Historian; Finance: Webster Bruce, Charles E. Wiggin, George L. Gould; Publication and Printing: Vernon A. Field, Fred. H. Matthews, T. Julien Silsby; Special Committees: Washington Guard, Webster Bruce, Col. E. C. Benton, F. S. Beckford, Abner L. Braley; Inspection and Safety: Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade, and Rev. Lewis Wilder Hicks; Increased Membership: Charles F. Read, Dr. W. E. Boardman, James C. Peabody and Henry F. Punderson; Memorials and Markers: Albert F. Powers, George P. Tilton, George H. Nutting and John W. Churchill; Color Bearer: Capt. Charles B. Appleton.

June 9, 1916. George H. Nutting, chairman, presented a report

of a special committee appointed to investigate the American Patriotic League's system of School Republics in its effort to promote a more efficient citizenship through direct training in public schools, and the resolutions adopted by the Managers were sent to every member of the Society by the Committee.

In accordance with an appropriation made in the annual estimate of expenses for the ensuing year, \$50 was donated to the "Fairbanks Family Association" for the preservation of the ancient Fairbanks house in Dedham.



The idea of THE WASHINGTON GUARD was first proposed to the National Society of the SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION at the Congress held at Syracuse, N. Y., in May 1914, and there adopted; and its Constitution was adopted at the Congress at Portland, Ore., in 1915. It is now a recognized recruiting adjunct to the Society OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

Massachusetts has a Commandery with two hundred and twentyfive members. Its annual meetings are held in Boston, February 22d. It is hoped that THE WASHINGTON GUARD will take a prominent part in the S. A. R. Congress, which, it is expected, will be held in Boston and Plymouth in 1920.

We quote from the Constitution as follows:

ARTICLE II — Objects.

The objects of The Washington Guard shall be to perpetuate the memory of the men and women who, by their services or sacrifices during the War of the American Revolution, achieved the independence of the American people; to unite and promote fellowship among their descendants; to inspire them and the community at large with a more profound reverence for the principles of government founded by our forefathers; to celebrate the anniversaries of the prominent events of the war; to foster true patriotism and to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom.

SEC. 3. The membership of The Washington Guard shall consist of three classes:

Guardsmen; those between ten and fifteen years of age.

Junior Guardsmen; those under ten years of age.

The right to vote and hold office shall be limited to Senior Guardsman and Guardsmen.

1. John Adams, of Massachusetts, was buried under the First Church in Quincy, Mass.

2. Samuel Adams, of Massachusetts, was buried in the Granary Burying Ground, corner of Tremont and Park streets, Boston, Mass.

3. Josiah Bartlett, of New Hampshire, was buried in the old town burying ground in the rear of the Universalist Church, Kingston, N.H.

4. Carter Braxton, of Virginia, died at Richmond, Va., in 1797; his burial place is in Mattaponi Churchyard, three miles from Newington.

5. Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, of Maryland, was buried within the chancel of the Doughoregan Chapel, Howard County, Md.

6. Samuel Chase, of Maryland, was buried in old St. Paul's ground, at German and Fremont streets, Baltimore, Md.

7. Abraham Clark, of New Jersey, was buried in Rahway, N. J., in the Presbyterian Cemetery on St. George's Avenue. The grave where his remains rest is marked by the original tombstone, and a large granite cenotaph has been erected near the center of the cemetery.

8. George Clymer, of Pennsylvania, was buried in Trenton, N. J., in Friends' yard, corner of Hanover and Montgomery streets.

9. William Ellery, of Rhode Island, was buried in the Ellery burial plat, Newport, R. I.

10. William Floyd, of New York, was buried at Westernville, eight miles north of Rome, N. Y.

11. Benjamin Franklin, of Pennsylvania, was buried in Philadelphia, Pa., in Christ Church Burial Ground, Fifth and Arch streets.

12. Elbridge Gerry, of Massachusetts, died while Vice-President of the United States. He was buried in the Congressional Cemetery, Washington, D. C.

13. Button Gwinnett, of Georgia, was probably buried in the old Colonial Cemetery at Savannah, Ga.

14. Lyman Hall, of Georgia, was buried first on his own plantation in Burke County, Ga., but he was afterward reburied in Augusta, Ga. in front of the Richmond County Court-house, where a monument stands to the three Georgian Signers.

15. John Hancock, of Massachusetts, was buried in Granary Burying Ground, Boston, Mass.

16. Benjamin Harrison, of Virginia, was buried at Berkley, Va.; Berkley is across the river from Norfolk.

17. John Hart, of New Jersey, died May 11, 1779; the date of his death as carved on his monument is wrong. He was buried first in a graveyard three miles west of Hopewell. In 1865 he was reburied in the cemetery of the First Baptist Church at Hopewell, N. J., a village thirteen miles from Trenton.

18. Joseph Hewes, of North Carolina, was buried in Philadelphia, Pa., in Christ Church Burial Ground. He died in that city in 1779, while attending the Continental Congress.

19. Thomas Heyward, Jr., of South Carolina, died and was buried at his country seat, Whitehall, St. Luke's parish, near Charleston, S.C.

20. William Hooper, of North Carolina, was buried first at Hillsboro, N. C.; but he was afterward reburied at Guilford Battleground, about seven miles from Greensboro, N. C.

21. Stephen Hopkins, of Rhode Island, was buried in the North Burying Ground, Providence, R. I.

22. Francis Hopkinson, of New Jersey, was buried in Philadelphia, Pa., in Christ Church Burial Ground, Fifth and Arch streets.

23. Samuel Huntington, of Connecticut, was buried in the old town burial ground of Norwich Town, Conn., which is a village adjoining the city of Norwich.

24. *Thomas Jefferson*, of Virginia, was buried at Monticello, near Charlottesville, Va.

25. Francis Lightfoot Lee, of Virginia, died January 11, 1797, on his estate at "Menoken," in Richmond County, Va. He may have been buried "in the yard of the parish church, or at Mt. Pleasant

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with his parents and brothers, or at Mt. Airy, the seat of the Tayloes, of whom his wife was one."

26. Richard Henry Lee, of Virginia, died June 19, 1794, was buried in the old family burial ground at Mt. Pleasant, Westmoreland County, Va.

27. Francis Lewis, of New York, was buried somewhere in Trinity Churchyard, New York City.

28. *Philip Livingston*, of New York, died in June, 1778, at York, Pa., while attending the Continental Congress. He was buried in Prospect Hill Cemetery, near York, Pa.

29. Thomas Lynch, Jr., of South Carolina, perished at sea in 1779. He and his wife sailed for St. Eustatia, West Indies, on their way to France for his health. The ship was never heard from and is supposed to have foundered during a tempest.

30. Thomas M'Kean, of Delaware, was buried in Philadelphia, Pa., in Christ Churchyard.

31. Arthur Middleton, of South Carolina, died January 1, 1788, at his home at Ashley River; was buried in his family grounds.

32. Lewis Morris, of New York, was buried in the crypt of St. Ann's Church, Morrisania, N. Y.

33. *Robert Morris*, of Pennsylvania, was buried in Philadelphia, in Christ Church, Second Street above Market Street.

34. John Morton, of Pennsylvania, was buried at Chester, Pa., in burial ground of St. Paul's Church.

35. Thomas Nelson, Jr., of Virginia, was buried at Yorktown, Va., in the yard of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

36. William Paca, of Maryland, was buried in the family burial ground at "Wye," on Paca's Island, Queen Anne's County, Md.

37. Robert Treat Paine, of Massachusetts, was buried in Granary Burying Ground, Boston, Mass.

38. John Penn, of North Carolina, was buried first in Granville County, N. C.; but he was afterward reburied at Guilford Battleground, about seven miles from Greensboro, N. C.

39. George Read, of Delaware, was buried in the graveyard adjoining Immanuel P. E. Church, in New Castle, Del.

40. Casar Rodney, of Delaware, was buried first on his farm, "Poplar Grove," a few miles east of Dover; but in 1889 he was reburied in the graveyard adjoining Christ P. E. Church, in Dover, Del.

41. George Ross, of Pennsylvania, was buried in Christ Church ground, Fifth and Arch streets, Philadelphia, Pa.

42. Benjamin Rush, of Pennsylvania, was buried in Philadelphia, Pa., in Christ Church Burial Ground, Fifth and Arch streets.

43. Edward Rutledge, of South Carolina, died in 1800, at Charleston, S. C.; was buried in St. Philip's Churchyard.

44. Roger Sherman, of Connecticut, was buried at New Haven, Conn., in the old town burial ground on Grove and High streets.

45. James Smith, of Pennsylvania, was buried at York, Pa., in the burial ground of the First Presbyterian Church, corner of Queen and Market streets.

46. *Richard Stockton*, of New Jersey, was buried at Princeton, N. J., in the Friends' Burial Ground at Stony Brook.

47. Thomas Stone, of Maryland, was buried in the family burial ground of his estate at "Haberdeventure," near Port Tobacco, Charles County, Md.

48. George Taylor, of Pennsylvania, was buried at Easton, Pa., in the burial ground of the Presbyterian Church.

49. *Matthew Thornton*, of New Hampshire, was buried at Thornton's Ferry, in the town of Merrimack, N. H., in a Colonial cemetery that originally formed a part of the Signer's farm, but now belongs to the town.

50. George Walton, of Georgia, was buried first in a country churchyard near Augusta, Ga., but he was afterward reburied in Augusta, Ga., in front of the Richmond County Court-house.

51. William Whipple, of New Hampshire, was buried in North Cemetery, the old Colonial burying ground on Maplewood Avenue, Portsmouth, N. H.

52. *William Williams*, of Connecticut, was buried in the Trumbull tomb, in the town burial ground of Lebanon, a village of Connecticut, twenty-seven miles southeast of Hartford.

53. James Wilson, of Pennsylvania, was buried in the Johnston graveyard at Hayes's Farm, Edenton, N. C., he having died at Edenton in 1798, while attending to his official duties as a judge of the United States Supreme Court. In November, 1906, he was reburied at Christ Church, Philadelphia, Pa.

54. John Witherspoon, of New Jersey, was buried in Princeton, N. J., in the College Presidents' Row, in the old graveyard of the First Presbyterian Church, corner of Witherspoon and Wiggins streets.

55. Oliver Wolcott, of Connecticut, was buried at Litchfield, Conn., in the town burial ground.

56. George Wythe, of Virginia, was buried in Richmond, Va., in the cemetery of St. John's Church, "near the original door of the church on the west."

SEAL

THE SEAL of the National Society is one and seven-eighths of an inch in diameter, and consists of the figure of a minute-man standing by the side of a plough, surrounded by thirteen stars; the whole encircled by a band three-eighths of an inch wide, upon which in raised letters is the name of the Society, with the date of organization. That of the State Society is identical with that of the National Society, except that within the name of the parent society is the motto "Massachusetts Society, organized April 19, 1889."

INSIGNIA

THE BADGE—Obverse: A gold cross of four arms and eight points, of the same size as the Chevalier's Cross of the French Legion of Honor, with white enameled arms. In the centre is a gold medallion bust of George Washington in profile, surrounded by a ribbon in blue enamel, on which is the motto of the Society in gold letters, "Libertas et Patria." Between the medallion and the points of the cross is a laurel wreath. Reverse: Like the obverse; the medallion, however, has the figure of a minute-man, surrounded by a ribbon in blue enamel, containing in gold letters the words, "Sons of the American Revolution." The cross is surrounded by an eagle in gold, suspended by a silk ribbon of blue, white, and buff.

The cross is a reproduction of the emblem of the French Order of St. Louis, with certain changes, and was adopted to commemorate the assistance given to the Colonies by Louis XVI, Grand Master of that Order. The medallion, containing the head of Washington and the figure of the minute-man, is fitly placed upon a cross of such an origin and associations.

THE ROSETTE—The rosette is a button in the shape of a raised

cup, of blue, white, and buff ribbon. It is to be worn in the upper left-hand button-hole of the coat.

The only badge now authorized by the National Congress is that described above, superseding all forms previously used. The price of the badge, or cross of St. Louis, adapted to this Society, is nine dollars. It may be obtained of Messrs. J. E. Caldwell & Co., Philadelphia, by permit issued by the Registrar-General, which will be furnished by the Registrar. The rosette may be procured of the Registrar for twenty-five cents.

THE OFFICIAL MARKER

The subject of identifying and marking the graves of Revolutionary soldiers and sailors has for some time engaged the attention of the Massachusetts Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

The General Court of Massachusetts, by an act passed in 1884, authorized towns to appropriate money for the purpose of erecting headstones or other monuments to the memory of the patriot dead.

The design adopted by the Massachusetts Society follows the insignia badge of the Society, having the letters S. A. R. (Soldier American Revolution) on three of the arms, and the figures 1775 on the fourth arm of the cross. A list of soldiers and sailors whose graves have been designated was printed in connection with the Society's Year Books of 1901 and 1904.

THE LETTERS "S. A. R." on the cross of the marker, which can stand for a Soldier (or Sailor) of the American Revolution, indicate, to some extent, that this Society placed the marker in position on the grave. This is somewhat misleading, as other patriotic societies have joined in the laudable purpose of marking the graves of Revolutionary soldiers and sailors with this marker.

The National Congress, at its session in 1894, adopted the design for its official marker, and recommended its use by all the State Societies. At the session of 1903 the changes suggested by the Massachusetts Society (a smaller marker made of bronze instead of iron) were approved.

Full information for procuring the markers may be obtained from the Registrar.

Marble headstones, suitably inscribed for marking the graves of soldiers or sailors of the Revolution, are furnished free of charge upon application to the Quartermaster General, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C.

INFORMATION

MEMBERSHIP in this Society is strictly limited by the National and State Constitutions to such persons as can *prove their descent* from well-authenticated patriot Revolutionary ancestry. Collateral descent has at no time been allowed in this body by prescribed law or otherwise. Appropriate papers and all needed information for making application for admission will be furnished by the Registrar.

APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP must be made out in duplicate; must be signed by the applicant on the second and fourth pages; must be sworn to before a justice or a notary; and returned to the Registrar with check for five dollars—which includes the admission fee and the first year's assessment. Biographical data should be given as fully as possible, and reference to authorities quoted. Care should be taken that all these requirements be carried out, as no imperfectly prepared papers can be received.

The Secretary of most of the States will make a search of the rolls and archives, and furnish an official certificate for a small sum. The Commissioner of Pensions at Washington will furnish a certificate, *gratis*, if the ancestor was a pensioner.

THE CERTIFICATE OF MEMBERSHIP issued by the National Society, handsomely engraved, and of size suitable for framing, will be furnished for the sum of one dollar in advance. Application to be made to the Registrar.

LETTERS RELATING TO THE EXECUTION OF MAJOR ANDRÉ

(Copied by courtesy of the Washington Association of New Jersey)

LETTER OF ALEXANDER H. STEVENS

NEW YORK, October 1817.

DEAR SIR,

I have read to my father, General Ebenezer Stephens, your very able vindication of the character of our illustrious Washington from the attack of Mr. Chalmers, in relation to the execution of Major André & the capture of Lord Cornwallis.

My father informs me that when General Robinson's letter to the Commander in Chief was read to Major André in presence of the Court Martial the latter declared that he considered himself a spy that he was taken in the vile garb he then wore & that General Robinson's arguments were futile. This was a statement of the circumstances universally made and credited.

During the period of Major André's confinement his table was supplied from that of the Commander-in-Chief & among other marks of attention shown to the unfortunate captive, two accomplished officers, Major Sumner* of the Massachusetts Line, & I think Capt. Hopkins* of the Connecticut Line, were assigned to be his companions with a view to afford every consolation his situation admitted of—

A Detachment from the several corps of the army amounting to about 1,000 men of which my father commanded the artillery, was present at the execution. The Gallows was erected on an eminence about one quarter of a mile in the rear of the house in which Major André resided. It could not be seen from that house by reason of the crookedness of the road to it & intervening buildings & trees— That it was not erected previous to the morning of execution General Stevens well recollects for he saw the mechanics returning with their tools from the work of raising it on his way to place of execution about 8 o'clock that morning—

Major André walked unconfined to the place of execution between

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the two officers his companions & when he reached the spot General Glover,* officer of the parade, read aloud the proceedings of the Court Martial and asked Major André in my fathers hearing if he had anything to say—

"Bear testimony" said he "that I die like a brave man" He then assisted in adjusting his neckcloth over his eyes; his arms were confined with his pocket-handerchief—It was a most solemn scene & on every face were depicted the deepest emotions of regret—After the body had hung about half an hour it was delivered to his servant who had been sent from New York with the uniform in which he was hung & by him interred—

In relation to the second charge against General Washington that he took from Lord Cornwallis his sword my father states that he was at Yorktown during the whole of its seige—He never heard that Lord Cornwallis, or any other British officer made prisoner at that time, was deprived of his Sword. In fact Lord Cornwallis was, or feigned, to be sick at the time of his surrender & did not show himself for several days.—During the ceremony my father was on the right of the American line—The British Major-General O'Hara second in command led the English troops between the French & the American lines & the latter of whom immediately struck up the tune of Yankee Doodle—In the afternoon of the same day the British returned to their former quarters & the utmost good fellowship prevailed among the English, Hessians, Americans & French, who lived almost promiscuously together—

LETTER OF CAPT. JOHN VAN DYK

JOHN PINTARD, Esq^{re}:

Sir

Agreeable to the request you made Sometime Since, I hearwith communicate to you in writeing, according to the best of my recollection, what I knew & what I had Seen, and heard respecting Major André, from the time he left the house where he was Confined, to the time of his Execution.

I was one of four Officers that accompanied him to the fatal Spot & was So near to him that I could hear & see all that Occured dureing

the time. A strong guard paraded before the dwelling house where Major André was Confined, he was attended in his room Night & day by two American officers, and Sentinals were placed around the House.

there were about Six Steps which led into the Stoop of the house, on the right of these Steps one American Officer with myself was Standing—when Major André came out of the front door of the house in Regimentals, hooking his Armes with the two American Officers* (his attendants) one on his right & left, he ran down the Steps of the Stoop as quick & lively as tho no Execution was to take place & immediately fell into the centre of the guard a place assigned him.

In this Situation the Commanding Officer gave Command, forward March. The whole marched off, Drums & fifes beating & Playing lively tunes, Major André & the two Officers keeping time, Major André Said, I am very much Surprised to find your troops under so good discipline, and your Music is Excellent

I had taken my Station close on the left of Major Andrés left hand officer & Continued in that Station the whole March—the guard marched a Short distance when they wheeld to the left turning a corner of the road, and marched a Short distance when they again wheeld to the left, in order to pass threw a fence, haveing entered a field, they marched forwards a Short distance, wheeld to the right & halted—the grown here was level—a little distance in front was a moderate assending Hill, on the top of which the gallows was Erected. In the position where thay halted, Major André was for the first time in vew of the gallows. Major André here said, gentlemen, I am desappointed, I Expected my request (which was to be shot) would have been granted—no answer was given & he continued with his arms locked with those of the two Officers.

In a few minutes the guard marched off, assended the Hill & halted, at this time Major André was about twenty feet from the gallows—when he put his hands upon hips, looked up to the gallows, then bowed his head a little down, vewed his feet, and so up, until his head rose to its natural position, biting his underlip and Shakeing his head—at which time I discovered a Small flush moveing over his left Cheek (I supposed at the time, he looked at the gallows and vewed himselfe from the feet upwards) that he was reflecting upon the untimely end he had to come to

In a few minutes the hangman let the waggon under the gallows, and the Commanding Officer then said, Major André, you will please to get on the waggon, Major André advanced to the hinder part of

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the waggon, putting his hands upon It, made a motion as the intending to Jump on, but faltering, he put his right knee on, and then raised himselfe up into the waggon, turned himself to the guard, placing his hands on his hips.

The Commanding Officer, who was on horseback, then Said, Majr André, If you have anything to say, you can now Speak, for you have but a short time to live, Major André with his hands on his hips, Said, "I have nothing more to say Gentlemen," but this, "you all bare me witness, that I meet my fate as a brave man,"the hangman then assended into the waggon, and Stood on Major Andrés right hand, when in the act of opening the noose of the halter Major André, with his right hand, made a moderate Snatch, took the halter out of the hangmans hand, took off his hat, put It down, then took off his white Neckcloth, and put It in his right hand coat pocket after which, with his forefinger of his right hand, he pushed down the coller of his Shirt & opening the knot of the halter, he put It over his head & drew the knot close on the right side of his neckhe then tied a white hankerchief over his eyes, with much apparent composure of mind-the hangman haveing secured the end of the halter to the top of the gallows, desended from the waggon-the Commanding officer directed the hangman to tie his armes Slack behind him-Major André then takeing a white hankerchief out of his right hand coat pocket, gave It to the hangman, who tied his armes as directed (this was don that he shuld not rais his armes while hanging) the Commanding Officer then gave a Signal, by the falling of his Sword, for the hangman to drive off-the hangman then led the horses from under the gallows, and Major André Swingd off he had not hung more than half a minute, neither had he as yet, made any Struggle, when the Commanding Officer, ordered a Soldier to bare down on his Shoulders, that he might not be long in agony, and he immediately died,-neither did Major André Struggle in the least-nor did he hang a guarter of the time usual In such Cases-the Commanding Officer Ordered two Soldiers to bear him up, one on each side, with one arm under his Shoulders, and one under his thigh -the Commanding Officer then cut the halter-when the two Soldiers bore him away from the gallows to the Coffin

Major André was not Suffered to fall on the ground, every attention & respect was paid to Major André, that It was possible to pay to a man in his Situation—nither did I discover any thing in either Officer or Soldier, but a deep Sorrow for Major André, and a Strong desire and wish, that the Trator Arnold, shuld have bin Executed In

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his Stead—and altho the talents of Major André as an Officer & his knowledge of the works at West Point would have been much against the American cause, had he been Spared, Still every Officer and Soldier In the Army, would have lifted both hands for the Exchange of Major André, for Genl. Arnold—This Exchange was offered by Genl Washington—but refused by Genl Clinton the British Commander In Chief In New York—so the life of a Traytor was Saved, and Major André fell a Sacrefise

when Major André was Cut down & borne by the two Soldiers to the Coffin, a short distance off, I did not follow after the Corps, but was repeatedly informed by different Officers, while I remained on the grownd, that Major Andrés Servant, that came from New York, was present takeing of his Coat and Boots, with his hat, for the purpose of Conveying them to New York—this was the general report on the ground where he was Executed, and was generally beleaved then & afterwards

I Presume It will not be amiss for me to State, that dureing the American Revolution, West Point was allowed to be a Strong place, well fortified and of grate Importance to the United States—and the key of Communication between the Eastern & Southern States— Indeed It was a Common Saying In the City of New York at the time, among the British Officers and Soldiers—that West Point was the young Gibralter. Being afraid to attempt takeing It by forse of armes—they made the attempt by bribery and Corruption.

A MASSACHUSETTS MILITIA REGIMENT IN NEW YORK

Nine regiments of Massachusetts militia were in New York, November 28, 1776, under command of Major Gen. Benjamin Lincoln. One regiment made no "Return" to Massachusetts, and was ordered to report to Gen. George Clinton, Governor of New York. This regiment was commanded by Col. Nathan Sparhawk, of Barre, and its Captains were appointed from different regiments in the Worcester County Brigade, "to enlist, or draft, men to join a regiment to be raised by Col. Josiah Whitney, or Colonel Sparhawk." It appears that Colonel Whitney had marched to Danbury, Conn., December 17, 1776, with Capt. Fortunatus Eager's company of his regiment, and was allowed for mileage (180 miles) by the Selectmen of Harvard. Captain Eager made a "Return" and was allowed for three months' services in the Jerseys.

In the "Memoirs of Major Gen. William Heath," pages 95, 97, 98 are found the following references to Colonel Sparhawk's regiment: "Dec. 30, 1776, Colonel Sparhawk's regiment of militia arrived from Massachusetts; Jan. 5, 1777, Col. Sparhawk's regiment of militia from Massachusetts, with two field pieces, marched from King's Ferry on their way to the Jerseys. Jan. 9, 1777, the remainder of Col. Sparhawk's and Col. Whitney's regiments passed over the river to join Gen. Washington."

The Public Papers of Gov. George Clinton, of New York, Vol. I, pages 536, 537, give the following correspondence of Gen. Benjamin Lincoln and Gov. George Clinton:

MASSACHUSETTS JOINS NEW YORK

Sunday (Jan.-1777.)

Dear General:---

The bearer Coll. Sparhawk commands the detachment of Militia from Massachusetts Bay, ordered to join you. I should not do you justice, should I ask your notice of him, and that you would grant

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every indulgence to his Corps, which the good of the service will admit, as that would suggest I entertained an idea that a differen mode of conduct could take place. I know I have said enough when I inform you that these troops are to be under your particular direction. That they are Lovers of freedom, & are determined to fight in support of it.

I am, dear General, with the most perfect regard and esteem

SIR,

I am this Moment favoured with Advice of your arival at Ramepough by Letter from my good Friend Genl. Lincoln. The Field Pieces I would have in or near the little Redoubt on the other side of Sydman's Bridge; at present the Men belonging to them may Quarter in the little Houses near that Place. As to your Regiment, as there are yet no Barracks finished you must gett them in the Houses on this side of Severn's Tavern where I understand you now are. I hope to have the Pleasure of seeing you Tomorrow, & am

On page 540, *Ibid*, is shown a "Return" of the Detachment of Colonel Sparhawk's regiment ordered out from Peekskill, dated Rameapo, January 8, 1777 (now in the New York State Library). It gives the names of the Captains, as follows: Jonathan Gates of Ashburnham; John Oliver of Athol; Francis Stone of New Braintree; Joseph Cutler of Western (now Warren); Aaron Kimball of Grafton; David Carlile of Lunenburg; David Prouty of Spencer; John Putnam of Sutton.

The only Captain who made a "Return" to the Council of Massachusetts was John Oliver, and he was allowed for three months' services in the Jerseys.



Address of President Frank C. Woodward

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ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

PRESIDENT S. A. R., APRIL 19, 1916

COMPATRIOTS:-

It becomes the duty as it is the privilege of your president at the close of his year's service to render an account of his stewardship. If we are to measure results by what is visible only to the eye—I cannot say that much has been accomplished. But we have not been unmindful of the principles upon which our Society was founded and have done what we could to maintain and defend American ideals whenever and wherever opportunity has offered.

Whatever may have been the measure of success or failure we have done our best. I wish especially to place on record my deep appreciation of the loyal support which your Board of Managers has given me, and to here publicly testify to their loyalty, patriotism and public spirit.

I am not unmindful of the honor and dignity which the presidency of this great patriotic society confers, but I appreciate still more, if that were possible, the warm friendships which it has been my privilege to form during the seven years I have served as an officer of this organization.

In view of the overshadowing importance of the great European war, which makes it difficult for our voices to be heard above the din of battle, your directors decided that it would be wise this year to change somewhat the established line of work.

As you know our members are scattered all over the Commonwealth. Our meetings being infrequent we do not get well acquainted; so it was decided early in the season that your board of managers would visit in a body, so far as it was possible, all the different Chapters in the state that showed any signs of life. We did so that we might in a more direct way impress our members with the thought that there was something for us all to do, that we were members of

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one great patriotic society whose influence in the community was in proportion to its unity of purpose, and its ability to act as a cohesive force. At the same time we sought their advice and counsel as to the best way to forward the ends we both had in view.

In this spirit we visited most of the Chapters of the State—viz: Lynn, Springfield, Northampton, Worcester, Lowell, Salem, Malden, Chelsea, Roxbury, East Walpole and Boston, and we have in prospect visits to Pittsfield and Taunton.

I returned home from these trips more than ever convinced of the value of Chapters as an adjunct of the Society and an element of great strength. They keep alive and active that fraternal feeling so essential to the enthusiastic support of any cause. I wish every member could belong to one. While this is not practicable at this time, there are numerous large centres of population scattered throughout the State where with little exertion by some enterprising member a chapter could be easily formed.

We have granted charters to two new Chapters this year, viz: East Walpole and Edgartown and have laid foundations for one or two more. I do not wish in what I have to say to trespass on the province of the Registrar, but I must add a word of commendation to the good work done by the committee on increase of membership. We have added 156 new members to the society this year making a total of 1700; the largest number ever admitted any one year and making the total membership larger than that of any other state in the Union.

We wish to add as many more the coming year, and ask your hearty coöperation.

WASHINGTON GUARD

There has been formed recently in some of the States, notably in New Jersey and Massachusetts an organization called the "Washington Guard"—composed of the sons and grandsons of our members who are under the age of twenty-one years. It is not confined exclusively to decendants of our members, but is open to all boys who would on coming of age be eligible to membership.

The object being to inspire a patriotic spirit in the youth of today, and to make them co-workers with us in our endeavor to preserve and maintain those national characteristics by which the liberty and unity of our country has been secured. The organization of the Massachusetts Commandery has been under the management

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of Vice-President Bruce who has given much time and thought to its development.

It now contains 150 members and is rapidly growing.

In 1920 as you are all doubtless aware will occur the 300th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth. Massachusetts proposes to celebrate that event in a manner worthy of its great importance in the development of freedom and self-government on this continent.

The Sons of the American Revolution will participate in that celebration. With that purpose in view the Board of Managers has already extended an invitation to the National Society to be our guests on that occasion. We must be prepared to give them a royal welcome.

It has been said with much truth that American ideals are in danger. They are challenged both within our own borders and from across the sea. The majority of the inhabitants of Massachusetts today are either foreign-born or children of parents who were foreignborn, whose ideas of government are in most cases far different from our own. If it were not for the force of ideals working in the mass as a leaven, our system of government would indeed be in the greatest danger. Un-Americanized America takes on a new aspect when we contemplate the possibility of our own participation in the great war across the sea. The sons of the American Revolution I believe to be one of the instruments in the hands of an over-ruling Providence helping to preserve for the next generation the fundamental principles of this great Republic.

Our Society through organization, through public meetings and through chapter meetings, is all the time exerting a powerful influence in maintaining those ideals which distinguish America from the rest of the world: ideals for which our fathers gave their blood and treasure.

But the noblest example of patriotism, perhaps the noblest the world has ever seen, is being exhibited in France today. I sometimes wonder, if after all, whether war is that unmixed evil which some have held it to be, or if there is any other process which would serve to develop those nobler virtues of self-sacrifice and obedience, so essential to national efficiency.

There are some who would get rid of the difficulties of a foreign policy in an easy fashion by declaring that all war is wrong: while others allow war only when it is just or in self-defense but condemn it when it is agressive. There are many difficulties in the way of this theory. Any arguments that are valid for the maintainance of law, courts or policemen, or prisons, are valid for the maintainance of defence, attacks from without, or for the protection of the routes of commerce. There is certainly a wide-spread feeling that self-defence is a legitimate excuse for the use of force: but self-defence is a very elastic term. We have seen a great nation invading and annexing a neighbors' territory—a neighbor with whom she had no quarrel and declaring she is doing it in self-defence.

We pass judgment upon wars often from superficial reasons or without sufficient knowledge of the larger movement behind the actual conflict. But in looking back over our own history as we can now for one hundred and forty years, we see the events of 1775 in a better perspective and even England recognizes that the establishment of a representative self-governing nation on this continent was an upward movement in civilization. But our struggle for Independence was a civil war between two sections of the same race and of the same type of civilization. There is however in the world at all times, an inevitable conflict between inconsistent types of civilization. We have one on our hands now. With human nature what it is and human governments such as they are, the conflict cannot always be kept in peaceful channels. The acquisition of territory inhabited by lower races of men has in no case perhaps been free from some harshness and ill-treatment of the natives, but it is as inevitable that vigorous and enterprising white races should overflow into other lands as it is that water should run down hill, and the state which simply shuts its eyes to what its citizens are doing in distant lands, is shirking its responsibilities under the plausible pretext of non-intervention.

We believe representative government to be the highest form of government and representing today the highest type of civilization: but representative government is the result of war. It was war that produced Washington: It also produced Lincoln. Why war should be a necessity of national and human existence is an inscrutable problem. It seems to be that state of suffering by which nations and the human race have grown to civilization and the enjoyment of liberty.

Much as we may therefore wish and hope and pray for that era of perpetual peace which never yet has come, we cannot shut our eyes to the facts which confront us, and to the unerring prophecies which history has written on its scroll. It is our province at a safe distance in time from the past to criticise and pass judgment, and with the benefit of knowing all that has happened since, it is right

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to ask ourselves how our own generation will be judged at the bar of history one hundred years hence. Will people then look back on this period as a time of doubt and feebleness, of uncertain beliefs and selfish timidity or will they be grateful to us for facing our intellectual, political, and social problems boldly and honestly? Will they be able to pardon our mistakes and our delusions because of the spirit in which we tried to leave the world,—not worse, but a little better than we found it?



Constitution and By-Laws of the Massachusetts Society



CONSTITUTION

OF THE

MASSACHUSETTS SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

As Amended April 19, 1910

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of the Society shall be THE MASSACHUSETTS SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

ARTICLE II

OBJECTS

The objects of the Society are: to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men who achieved American Independence, by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results, the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries; to carry out the injunction of Washington in his Farewell Address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall

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develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens; to cherish, maintain and extend the institution of American freedom; to foster true patriotism and love of country; and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Any man is eligible for membership who is of the age of twentyone years, and who is descended from an ancester who, with unfailing loyalty, rendered material aid to the cause of American Independence, as a soldier or as a seaman, or a civil officer in one of the several Colonies or States, or of the United Colonies or States, as a recognized patriot; provided that he shall be found worthy.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The officers of the Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Registrar, a Historian, a Chaplain, and a Board of Managers, consisting of fifteen members and the officers of the Society *ex officiis*. The offices of Secretary and Registrar may be held by one person. The Society or Managers shall also elect a Delegate-at-large, and such other Delegates as it may be entitled to by the Constitution of the National Society.

ARTICLE V

LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS

Ten or more members of the Society, resident in any locality as may be approved by the Board of Managers, may form themselves into a Chapter, to be called by such name as said members may assume. A Charter may be granted to such Chapter by the Board of Managers, upon application in writing of ten or more members of the Society, stating name to be assumed, the location, and names of its proposed members. Such Chapter may enact a Constitution and By-laws not inconsistent with those of the National Society, or of this Society.

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No person shall be admitted to such Chapter unless he is a member in good standing of THE MASSACHUSETTS SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION; and all members of this Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, resident within the territory of such Chapter, shall be eligible to membership therein. If any member of such Chapter should cease to be a member of the State Society, his membership in the Chapter shall also cease.

Membership in Chapters shall not in any way change the relations of members to the State Society, nor impair obligations of payment of dues and other requisitions of the Constitution and By-laws of said Society. Provided, however, that the Board of Managers may from time to time, by vote, authorize the return to designated Chapters, or classes of Chapters, of a portion of the annual dues paid the Society by members of said Chapters.

Every Chapter shall annually report a list of officers and members to the Secretary of the State Society on the first of April.

ARTICLE VI

QUORUM

A quorum of the Society for the transaction of business shall consist of forty members; of the Managers, five members; but a less number may adjourn.

ARTICLE VII

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution or the By-laws may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Society, by a vote of three-fourths of the members present; provided that notice of such intended alteration or amendment be borne on the notification of said meeting.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. Applications for membership must be made in duplicate on blanks furnished by the Society, and with the initiation fee and dues for the current year be forwarded the Registrar, the money to be returned in case of rejection.

SECTION 2. The applicant shall become a member after a favorable report and election by the Managers.

SECTION 3. The initiation fee shall be three dollars, the annual dues two dollars, payable in advance. The payment of twenty-five dollars at one time shall constitute a Life Member, and shall exempt from further dues. The annual dues of a member elected between September 1st of the current year and April 15 of the fiscal year, shall continue his membership until the end of the next succeeding fiscal year.

The Board of Managers shall have authority to use their discretion in remitting individual dues.

SECTION 4. The Board of Managers shall have power to drop from the rolls, after thirty days' notice has been given him, any member who shall be in arrears for dues for one year, and he may be reinstated in his membership by said Board upon the payment of his indebtedness to the Society.

SECTION 5. Members in arrears shall be debarred from the privileges of membership.

SECTION 6. The Board of Managers shall judge of the qualification of candidates for admission to the Society and vote upon the same, and they shall have full power and authority, after due notice and impartial trial, to expel any member who, by conduct unbecoming a gentleman, shall render himself unworthy to remain a member of the Society.

SECTION 7. A member may resign, if his dues are all paid, by simply notifying the Registrar in writing.

SECTION 8. Members, in good standing, may be transferred to another Society, on application from the same; and members in good standing in other Societies may, on application, be admitted to membership in this Society, by vote of the Managers.

SECTION 9. Members admitted by transfer from another State Society shall be exempt from the payment to this Society of another admission fee.

ARTICLE II

ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, and a majority shall be required for choice. Proxies shall not be allowed. The term of office shall be for one year, and until a successor shall be elected. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Managers.

SECTION 2. The Managers, consisting of fifteen in number, shall be elected at the organization meeting, November 8, 1907, and the members thereof divided into three classes of five each. The term of office of the first class shall expire April 19, 1908; the term of office of the second class shall expire April 19, 1909; the term of office of the third class shall expire April 19, 1910. At each annual meeting of the Society there shall be elected by ballot five Managers to succeed those whose terms of office expire at that time, and to hold office for three years. No member of the Board of Managers elected, as such, shall be eligible for reëlection until one year after the expiration of his term of office.

SECTION 3. The Society shall hold its annual meeting on the nineteenth of April in each year, the anniversary of the battles of Lexington and Concord, except when such date shall fall on Sunday, in which event the meeting shall be held on the following day.

SECTION 4. Special meetings shall be held on the written request

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of twenty-five members, by vote of the Managers, or on the call of the President.

SECTION 5. Notices of all meetings of the Society shall be mailed to each member at least seven days before the meeting.

SECTION 6. The following shall be the order for business for the meetings of the Society or Managers:—

- 1. Reading of the Records.
- 2. Communications, and action thereon.
- 3. Reports of Standing Committees.
- 4. Reports of Special Committees.
- 5. Reports of Officers.
- 6. Unfinished business.
- 7. New business.

This order may be changed by unanimous consent.

ARTICLE III

DUTIES OF OFFICERS, ETC.

PRESIDENT

SECTION 1. The President, or in his absence the senior Vice-President present, or in their absence a chairman *pro tempore*, shall preside at all meetings of the Society or Managers. He shall preserve order, and shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Society or Managers.

SECRETARY

SECTION 2. The Secretary shall notify all members of their election and of such other matters as may be directed by the Society or Managers. He shall have charge of the seal, certificate of incorporation, and records. He, together with the presiding officer, shall certify all acts of the Society. He shall give due notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Society or Managers, and attend the same. He shall keep fair and accurate records of all the proceedings

and orders of the Society or Managers, and shall give notice to the several officers of all votes, orders, resolves, and proceedings of the Society or Managers affecting them or appertaining to their respective duties, and generally perform the duties incumbent upon such an officer.

TREASURER

SECTION 3. The Treasurer shall have custody of all funds and securities of the Society. He shall collect all moneys due the Society. excepting initiation fees and annual dues. The life membership and initiation fees he shall invest, in a manner approved by the Board of Managers, as the Permanent Fund of the Society. The income of this permanent fund, together with the annual dues, he shall apply to the current expenses of the Society; but he shall expend no part of the Permanent Fund except by recommendation of the Board of Managers confirmed by vote of the Society. He shall deposit in a reliable bank or savings institution to the credit of THE MASSACHU-SETTS SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION all uninvested funds, and make such investments in the name of the Society as may be ordered by the Society of Managers. He shall pay to the Treasurer-General, between the first day of March and the annual meeting, the *per capita* tax required by the National Society. He shall keep a true account of his receipts and expenditures. He shall not pay out any money from the treasury, except upon the written order or approval of the President or upon vote of the Society or Managers. The fiscal year of the Society shall end on the fifteenth day of April.

REGISTRAR

SECTION 4. The Registrar shall keep a Register of the names and dates of election, transfer, resignation, and death of all members, collect all initiation fees and annual dues, and pay the same to the Treasurer forthwith. He shall keep an assessment account, crediting each member with the amount paid over to the Treasurer. He shall forward to the Registrar-General of the National Society a duplicate of all applications for membership which have been accepted, within one week after the applicants shall have been

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elected. He shall issue certificates of membership and insignia to members entitled thereto.

HISTORIAN

SECTION 5. The Historian shall have the care and custody of all historical, geographical and genealogical papers, manuscripts and documents belonging to the Society, and keep a correct list of the same. At the annual meeting he shall report the names of deceased members, adding a biographical notice, if possible. He shall endeavor to be present at all excursions of the Society, and call attention to, and give information regarding, points of historic interest.

REPORTS

SECTION 6. The Secretary, Treasurer, and Registrar shall each render an annual report to be read at the annual meeting. Such reports must be first presented to the Managers at their meeting in April.

BONDS

SECTION 7. The Treasurer and Registrar shall each give such bond for the faithful discharge of their respective duties as may be required by the Managers.

AUDITORS

SECTION 8. The Managers shall, at least one month before the annual meeting, appoint three Auditors, who shall examine and audit the books and accounts of the Treasurer and Registrar, and report at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IV

BOARD OF MANAGERS

SECTION 1. The Managers shall judge of the qualifications of candidates for admission to the Society, and vote upon the same.

SECTION 2. They shall appoint from their own number the following Standing Committees, of three members each:---

Membership—to whom all applications shall be referred.

Finance,

Publication and Printing,

and such other committees as they may deem advisable.

Their duties shall be such as usually pertain to committees of like character and such as may be defined by the Managers.

SECTION 3. They shall recommend plans for promoting the objects of the Society, and shall authorize the disbursement and expenditure of unappropriated money in the treasury for the payment of current expenses of the Society. In general, they shall watch over the interests of the Society, and suggest, from time to time, such measures as they deem conducive to its prosperity.

SECTION 4. They shall in the month of February appoint a Nominating Committee of five members, four of whom shall be outside the Board of Managers, whose duty it shall be to select the name of a candidate for each office to be filled at the ensuing annual meeting, and report to the Board of Managers in the month of March. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to mail to each member of the Society a copy of the Nominating Committee's report at least one week before the annual meeting.

SECTION 5. The Managers shall meet once in each month, except during the months of July and August, and whenever called by the President, or at the request of five of its members.
