JOHN ALDEN (1599–1687) of Plymouth, Massachusetts, last surviving signer of Mayflower Compact; Member under arms of Captain Myles Standish's Duxbury Company, 1643; Assistant, 1633–41; 1650–'86; Deputy, 1641–'42, 1643–'49; Deputy Governor, 1666; Member of the Council of War, 1646, '53–'60, '67, '71, '75–76.

ROBERT TREAT (1622–1710) of Milford, Connecticut; Major commanding Connecticut Forces at the Great Swamp Fight and at the battles of Hadley and Springfield; Deputy Governor, 1676–'86; Governor, 1686; at Battle of Bloody Brook, 1675, where his arrival with the Connecticut Troops turned the tide.

RICHARD LAW (——) of Stamford, Connecticut; Deputy to the General Court from Stamford, Connecticut, 1641–'64; Assistant, 1647.

RICHARD TREAT (1584–1669) of Wethersfield, Connecticut; Deputy to the First General Court, 1637–1644 and annually to 1657; Assistant, eight times, 1657 to 1665; named

in the Royal Charter, one of the Patentees for Connecticut Colony, 1662.

JOHN PORTER, JR. (1621–1688) of Windsor, Connecticut; Member of the first Troop of Horse, Connecticut Colony, 1658; served as trooper in King Philip's War, 1675–76.

EDWARD STEBBINS (—— 1663) was an original proprietor of Hartford, Connecticut; was Deputy to the General Court various times, from 1639 to 1656.

THOMAS STANLEY (—— 1645) of Hartford, Connecticut; Deputy to the General Court of Massachusetts Bay, 1635.

WILLIAM GAYLOR (1585–1673) of Windsor, Connecticut; Deputy to General Court of Massachusetts Bay, 1635–'36, 1638; Deputy to General Court from Windsor, Connecticut, 1639, and forty-one times at semi-annual elections.

JOHN PORTER (—— 1648) of Windsor, Connecticut; Deputy to General Court from Windsor, Connecticut, 1646–'47.

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
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
