
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
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

OBJECTS OF THE SOCIETY.

It being evident from a steady decline of a proper celebration of the National holidays of the United States of America, that popular concern in the events and men of the war of the Revolution is gradually declining, and that such lack of interest is attributable, not so much to the lapse of time and the rapidly increasing flood of immigration from foreign countries, as to the neglect on the part of descendants of Revolutionary heroes to perform their duty in keeping before the public mind the memory of the services of their ancestors and of the time in which they lived; therefore, the Society of the Sons of the Revolution has been instituted to perpetuate the memory of the men, who, in the military, naval and civil service of the Colonies and of the Continental Congress, by their acts or counsel, achieved the Independence of the country, and to further the proper celebration of the anniversaries of the birthday of Washington, and of prominent events connected with the war of the Revolution; to collect and secure for preservation the rolls, records and other documents relating to that period; to inspire the members of

the Society with the patriotic spirit of their forefathers; and to promote the feeling of friendship among them.

Any male person above the age of twenty-one years, of good character and a descendant of one who, as a military, naval or marine officer, soldier, sailor or marine, in actual service, under the authority of any of the thirteen Colonies or States or of the Continental Congress, and remaining always loval to such authority, or a descendant of one who, as a member of the Continental Congress or of the Congress of any of the Colonies or States, or as an official appointed by or under the authority of any such legislative bodies, actually assisted in the establishment of American Independence by services rendered during the war of the Revolution becoming thereby liable to conviction of treason against the government of Great Britian, but remaining always loval to the authority of the Colonies or States, shall be eligible to membership in the Society.

Paul Brandon Barringer.

Great grandson of Gen. Joseph Graham. A brave, distinguished and intelligent officer in the Revolutionary War, and in various campaigns from May, 1778, to November, 1781.

James Blakey.

Great grandson of Angus Rucker, Captain in Gibson's Regiment from that portion of Culpeper County now Madison County.

Great grandson of Zachariah Johnson, who bore arms and was a member of the House of Burgesses.

James Alston Cabell.

Great grandson of Col. William Alston. Member of Committee of Safety for Halifax, December 21st, 1774. Member of Provincial Congress at Halifax, April 4th, 1776. Lieutenant-Colonel of Third Regiment of Continental Troops. Served at the North under General Washington and came South with General Gates.

Great grandson of Maj. Andrew Hamilton, Captain and Major in Continental Line.

Great grandson of Col. Nicholas Cabell—Captain of one of the first companies of Minute Men that went to Williamsburg at the time of the disturbance with Lord Dunmore. Colonel of State troops during the Revolution Served under Lafayette at Yorkrown—Member of Assembly of Virginia, 1779280

Julian Mayo Cabell.

Great grandson of Col. William Alston. Member of Committee of Safety for Halifax, December 21st, 1774. Member of Provincial Congress at Halifax, April 4th, 1776. Lieutenant-Colonel of Third Regiment of Continental Troops. Served at the North under General Washington and came South with General Gates.

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Charles Washington Coleman.

Great great-grandson of Thomas Coleman, (1725—1793) member Virginia House of Delegates, 1777, 1778, 1784

Great great-grandson of William Holt, (17—1791), Quartermaster to Virginia forces; member of Virginia Court of Admiralty 1777, 1778, 1779.

Great grandson of Baylor Hill (1760-1805), cornet First Continental Dragoons, Dec. 4, 1776; lieutenant, 1777; captain, 1780.

Great great-grandson of Col. George Brooke (1728—1782), member Virginia Conventions of 1775 and 1776; Paymaster First, Second, Seventh and Eighth Virginia Regiments, 1776; Paymaster of the Army.

Great grandson of St. George Tucker (1752—1827), aide-de-camp to Gen. Nelson, 1779; major Virginia militia.

Feb. 25, 1781; lieutenant-colonel, Sept. 12, 1781; member of the staff of Gov. Nelson at the seige of Yorktown; member Virginia Privy Council of State, 1781.

Great great-grandson of Francis Smith, ensign Sixth Virginia Regiment, 1780.

Great great-grandson of James White (1737–1815) of the North Carolina line.

George Brooke Coleman.

Great great-grandson of Thomas Coleman (1725) 1794), member Virginia House of Delegates, 1777, 1778, 1784.

Great great-grandson of William Holt, (17— + 1791.) Quartermaster to Virginia forces; member of Virginia Court of Admiralty 1777, 1778, 1779.

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Great-great-grandson of Francis Smith, ensign Sixth Virginia Regiment, 1780.

Great great-grandson of James White (1739—1815) of the North Carolina line.

James R. V. Daniel.

Great grandson of Edmund Jennings Randolph. Aidede-camp to General Washington in 1775–'76. Muster Master general Southern Department, March 25th, 1776. Resigned April 26th, 1776, to become member of the Virginia Convention May 6th, 1776. He was elected Attorney General of Virginia, 1776. Elected to Continental Congress in 1779. Resigned Oct. 5th, 1779.

Richard Thomas Walker Duke.

Grandson of Clevears Duke, Jr., private in Capt. Anderson's company, Fifth Regiment Virginia Line, Continental Establishment.

Grandson of Capt. Thomas Walker, Jr., member of the Albemarle company commanded by Capt. Geo. Gilmer, which went to Williamsburg; and Captain in Ninth Virginia Line Continental Establishment.

Great grandson of Dr. Thomas Walker, member of the Committee of Safety Virginia House of Burgesses, 1775.

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Great grandson of Clevears Duke, Jr., private in Capt. Anderson's company in Fifth Regiment Virginia Line, Continental Establishment.

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Great great-grandson of Dr. Thomas Walker, member of the Committee of Safety, Virginia House of Burgesses, 1775.

Horace S. Hawes.

Great great-grandson of Col. Samuel Pierce. He received on the same day a commission from the Crown appointing him a Captain in the royal army and from the Continental Congress a Colonel's commission in the American Army. He accepted the latter and served with distinction throughout the Revolutionary War.

He also descended from Jesse Hawes, of Dorchester, Mass., born 1758, died 1807; served throughout the Revolutionary War as a sergeant.

He also descended from Wm. Sterling Smith, of Olney, Henrico County, Va.; was a captain in Continental Army and served throughout the war.

Alexander Randolph Holladay.

Great great-grandson of Lieut. Lewis Holladay, Lieutenant in the Spottsylvania military company, October 5th, 1775.

Great-great-great grandson of Col. Everard Meade.

Heth Lorton.

Great grandson of Col. William Heth of the "Culpeper Minute Men."

William Chase Morton.

Great grandson of John Clarke, First Lieutenant Eighth Virginia Regiment, January, 1777. Taken prisoner at Germantown October 4th, 1777; exchanged October, 1780. Captain February 14th, 1781, and served to———

W. C. N. Randolph.

Great grandson of Thomas Jefferson. Governor of Virginia, 1779; member of Continental Congress; Author of the Declaration of Independence; Author of the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom; President of the United States.

John F. Slaughter, Jr.

Great grandson of Charles Slaughter, of Culpeper Co., Va. Member of Continental Cavalry; served to the close of the war.

Willie B. Smith.

Great grandson of Lieut. William Smith, of Montrose, Powhatan County, Va. Lieutenant in the Revolutionary War, Sixth Regiment Virginia troops. Appointed September, 1778, and served at least three years.

Francis Lee Smith.

Great grandson of Capt. John Hawkins. Ensign, Lientenant, Adjutant and Captain in the Third Virginia Regiment Continental Army.

Lyon Gardiner Tyler.

Grandson of John Tyler, member County Committee Charles City County, 1775; Captain in militia, 1775; Judge of Admiralty Court, 1776; Speaker House of Burgesses, 1778-'86.

Arthur Skelton Wily.

Great grandson of William Murray, private in Virginia State Line for three years.

Edmund Randolph Williams.

Great great-grandson of Edmund Jennings Randolph. Aide-de-camp to General Washington, August 15th, 1775, to March 25th, 1776; Muster Master-general Southern Department, March 25th, 1776; Member of the Virginia Convention, May 6th, 1776. Attorney-General of Virginia, 1776. Elected to Continental Congress in 1779. Re-elected in 1780.

Robert Lancaster Williams.

Great great-grandson of Edmund Jennings Randolph. Aide-de-camp to General Washington, August 15th, 1775, to March 25th, 1776; Muster Master-general Southern Department, March 25th, 1776. Member of the Virginia Convention, May 6th, 1776. Attorney-General of Virginia, 1776. Elected to Continental Congress in 1779 Re-elected in 1780.

Robert Findlater Williams.

Great great-grandson of Lewis Burwell, of White March, Va. Member of House of Burgesses 1769–'74; Member of Williamsburg Convention, 1775–'76.

John Skelton Williams.

Great great-grandson of Edmund Jennings Randolph. Aide-de-camp to General Washington, August 15th, 1775, to March 25th, 1776; Muster Master-general Southern Department, March 25th, 1776. Member of the Virginia Convention, May 6th, 1776. Attorney-General of Virginia, 1776. Elected to Continental Congress in 1779. Re-elected in 1780.


