## WEST POINT

#### IN THE OLDEN TIME.

I.

THOSE OF MISS BETSY COX.

The family of Miss Betsy Cox are a long-lived race. Her mother lived to be nearly one hundred, and her uncle, Beverly Garrison, was in his ninety-second year when he died.

Through them, and through her great-grandfather, Daniel Coovert, one of the old Dutch settlers in New York, Miss Cox is able to go back to a very remote date in her reminiscences of West Point and its neighborhood.

In 1723, Charles Congreve obtained by royal letters-patent a grant of . 1,463 acres, comprising the northern portion of West Point. About the middle of the century, a Mr. John Moore, commonly called Colonel Moore, by the purchase of this patent, added to an original grant to himself of 330 acres lying to the southwest of it, came into possession of a large part of the territory now within the limits of the ceded district, and a great extent north and west of it.

This property was laid out, so far, that is, as the rugged nature of the soil would permit, in small and scattered farms, and Daniel Coovert was Colonel Moore's farmer. He lived in a house, considered a very fine one in those days, which Colonel Moore had built in Washington's Valley. The land though neither as extensive nor as level as now was at that time a pretty good sized cornfield, and Miss Cox's grandmother used to tell her grandchildren of the fright which she received, one evening, when, coming up from the valley to drive home the cows, she saw a wild cat in a tree, probably one of the old elm trees, on the plain.

Moore's house in Washington's Valley was occupied from the 25th of July to the 28th of November, in the year 1779, as the headquarters of the Commander-in-Chief. It was from these headquarters that Washington published the following order, than which few more beautiful, and certainly none more creditable was ever issued by a military commander:

> HEADQUARTERS, MOORE'S HOUSE, [WEST POINT] JULY 29, 1779. 5

"Many and pointed orders have been issued against that unmeaning and abominable custom of swearing, notwithstanding which, with much regret, the General observes that it prevails, *if possible*, more than ever; his feelings are continually wounded by the oaths and imprecations of the soldiers whenever he is in hearing of them.

"The Name of that Being from Whose bountiful goodness we are permitted to exist and enjoy the comforts of life, is incessantly imprecated and profaned, in a manner as wanton as it is shocking. For the sake therefore of religion, decency, and order, the General hopes and trusts that officers of every rank will use their influence and authority to check a vice which is as unprofitable as it is wicked and shameful.

"If officers would make it an unavoidable rule to reprimand, and if that does not do, punish soldiers for offences of this kind, it could not fail of having the desired effect."

A few weeks since, this order was repeated to me verbatim by the venerable Professor Weir, now in his eighty-third year, and I have seldom heard anything more impressive than those weighty words falling from the lips of this patriotic old man. He had learned them by heart from the original manuscript order book in Washington's own handwriting, which the professor possessed until a few years since, when for its surer preservation he parted with it to the Government.

A little later than the issue of the above order, and no doubt from the same headquarters, at Moore's house in Washington's Valley, the Commanderin-Chief penned the following playful invitation to his friend, Dr. Cochran:

#### "Dear Doctor:

#### "WEST POINT, 16TH AUGUST, 1779.

"I have asked Mrs. Cochran and Mrs. Livingston to dine with me to-morrow; but am I not in honour bound to apprize them of their fare? As I hate deception, even where the imagination is concerned, I will. \* \* \* \* \* Since our arrival at this happy spot, we have had a ham, sometimes a shoulder of bacon to grace the head of the table; a piece of roast beef adorns the foot; and a dish of beans or greens, almost imperceptible, decorates the centre. When the cook has a mind to cut a figure, which I presume will be the case to-morrow, we have two beef-steak pies, or dishes of crabs, in addition one on each side of the centre dish, dividing the space, and reducing the distance between dish and dish to about six feet, which without them would be nearly twelve feet apart.

"Of late he has had the surprising sagacity to discover that apples will make pies, and it is a question, if, in the violence of his efforts, we do not get one of apples, instead of both of beef-steak.

"If the ladies can put up with such entertainment, and will submit to partake of it on plates once tin, but now iron, (not become so by the labour of scouring), I shall be happy to see them; and am, dear Doctor,

#### Yours,

One of the ancestors of Miss Cox, to whom she is indebted for many an interesting story of these remote times, was Beverly Garrison, named for Colonel Beverly Robinson, in whose employ his father had served, and for whom the elder Garrison entertained a great respect and admiration. Beverly was a lad of fourteen when the British made their attack upon Forts Montgomery and Clinton. His father was wagonmaster at Fort Montgomery, and while engaged with his son in strengthening the defences, they both were made prisoners. The boy, owing to his youth, was allowed to go free.

Three years later he stood on the ramparts of Fort Montgomery, and watched Arnold's barge as it was rowed swiftly down the river by six strong oarsmen. Beverly recognized the General, but without a suspicion that he saw in him a traitor and a foe fleeing to the British sloop Vulture to escape the consequences of the discovery of his crime which was at that moment being made by General Washington, at Arnold's headquarters. Garrison also recognized Larvey, the man who acted as coxswain on this occasion, and who often declared to him that had he been aware of Arnold's design he would have steered to Verplanck's Point, even if the traitor had threatened to blow his brains out. The oarsmen were equally unsuspicious of the nature of Arnold's errand. Upon stepping into his barge he promised them two gallons of rum if they would row with utmost speed, as he was going on board the Vulture with a flag, and must make all possible haste in order to return to his headquarters, the Beverly Robinson house, in time to meet the Commander-in-Chief, who was expected to arrive there that day.

When they had reached the vessel, and "Arnold had held an interview with the officers in the cabin, he came on deck and said to his barge-men: 'My lads, I have quitted *the rebel army*, and joined the standard of his Britannic Majesty. If you will join me, I will make sergeants and corporals of you all, and for you, James, I will do something more.' Indignant at the offer, Larvey promptly replied, 'No, sir, one coat is enough for me to wear at a time.' Two only of the crew remained, and they were British deserters. The brave corporal with the remainder of the men returned; not however, in the barge; Arnold had the meanness to retain that for his own use, giving them a miserable boat in exchange."\*

Dr. James Thacher, from whose journal the above extract is made, was a surgeon in the American army from the breaking out of the Revolution until its close. He was stationed with the troops at West Point, and on the opposite side of the river, (Nelson's Point, now Garrison's), in 1778, and at different periods of longer or shorter duration between that date and the close of 1782.

Surgeon Thacher gives an interesting description of the old Beverly Robinson house, which was established as a hospital for the American troops early in 1778 and placed under his charge. "The house," he relates, "was built by Colonel Beverly Robinson, a respectable gentleman from Scotland, for his summer residence; but being induced to adhere to the British interest, he has with his excellent family removed to New York, and thereby forfeited his large estate. This is a spacious and very convenient building, situated on the east bank of the Hudson, about two miles from West Point, which is on the opposite shore. Robinson's house, with the outbuildings, is found very convenient for a hospital; the farm and gardens are very extensive, affording excellent pasturage for horses and cows, and containing three or four large orchards abounding in fruit of various descriptions."

After the defection of Arnold, Dr. Thacher was on duty with the troops at West Point during the severe winter of 1780-81. The men arrived on the evening of the 8th of October and were encamped for a time on the plain near the bank of the river. General Greene was in command of the garrison, and good order had taken the place of the confusion occasioned by Arnold's elopement.

On November 21st the Doctor records a review by the Marquis de Chastelleux of a large detachment of troops under General Stark at Nelson's Point. After the review the Marquis crossed over to West Point where he was received by a salute of thirteen cannon, "the number of the United States."

In December the brigade to which Dr. Thacher was attached was ordered into the woods in the rear of West Point, where they were to build log huts for the winter. Before they could erect these the weather became extremely cold. The troops encamped in canvas tents in the locality now known as the "Public Meadows," not only suffered from the intense cold, but also from lack of provisions. "Almost half the time," Dr. Thacher states, "the men were kept on half allowance of bread, and entirely without rum." He himself complains, under date of December 10th, that for three days he had not been able to procure food enough to appease his appetite. A little later in the month the troops were exposed for ten days to almost continuous storms of rain and high winds, against which their canvas dwellings afforded but little protection. They were frequently rent asunder, and the encampment almost overwhelmed with inundation.

With the opening of the new year, 1781, the condition of affairs became greatly improved. On the 3d of January Thacher's brigade took possession of their winter cantonments, which consisted of log huts, scattered along at different points from the foot of Crow's Nest Ravine down through its continuation to Washington's Valley.

When rambling through the ravine in search of orchis, blood root, yellow violets, and other of the lovely spring wild flowers which abound there, I had often wondered what certain cairns of stones, and ruins that had the appearance of having once been the foundations of some small and rude structures, could mean. A few years since a friend suggested that American troops having been encamped in this locality during the Revolution, these doubtless were-the remains of their cantonments. From that moment imagination lent an added charm to the natural beauty of the old ravine, and when I came across the following description in Thacher's journal, my satisfaction was complete. Writing under date of January 3d, 1781, he notes, "Our brigade took possession of our huts for the winter in the woods, about two miles in the rear of the works at West Point. Our situation is singularly romantic, in a highly elevated spot, surrounded by mountains and craggy rocks of a prodigious size, lofty broken clefts, and the banks of the beautifully meandering Hudson affording a view of the country for many

miles in all directions." Could words better describe the scenery of the Crow's Nest Ravine in its extension from the foot of the mountain downward to the valley?

The new quarters proved highly satisfactory. The Doctor writes: "We have now no longer reason to complain of our accommodations; the huts are warm and comfortable, wood in abundance at our doors, and a tolerable supply of provisions. On St. Valentine's day this satisfaction was increased by the arrival of General Warner and Colonel Ashley of Massachusetts, who distributed among the men of the Massachusetts' line, twentyfour dollars in specie to each soldier as a gratuity from the State."

In April of this year, the Doctor records, that one hundred and eightyseven of the members of his regiment were under inoculation for small-pox. In this connection he mentions the discovery which had recently been made of the extract of the butternut, *(juglans cinerea)*, as a substitute for jalap and calomel. He writes: "The discovery of this article is highly important, and it may be considered a valuable acquisition to our materia medica." The extract of butternut, made by boiling down the inner bark of the tree, had been in common use among the country people for some time previous, and now its employment in the treatment of small-pox received the sanction of the celebrated Dr. Rush, "who was," Dr. Thacher states, "for a short period at the head of the hospital department." Butternut trees abound in our woods, and are nowhere more abundant than in the region of the Crow's Nest Ravine and Rugertown, so that this useful domestic medicine could be furnished at a very small expense to the troops at West Point.

To Dr. Thacher we are indebted for an interesting account of the celebration held at West Point in honour of the birth of the Dauphin of France, on the last day of May, 1782. A few days previous, General Washington had issued from the headquarters at Newburgh, the following orders :

> "HEADQUARTERS, NEWBURGH, TUESDAY, MAY 28TH, 1782. 5

"The Commander-in-Chief is happy in the opportunity of announcing to the army, the birth of the *Dauphin of France*; and desirous of giving a general occasion of testifying the satisfaction which he is convinced will pervade the breast of every American officer and soldier on the communication of an event so highly interesting to a monarch and nation, who have given such distinguishing proofs of their attachment, is pleased to order a *feu-de-joie* on Thursday next; and requests the company of all the general, regimental, and staff officers of the army, who are not necessarily detained by duty, at West Point, on that

day at four o'clock. Commanding officers of brigades and corps will receive particular instructions for their government."

Among these "instructions" was the following:

"After the *feu-de-joie*, the officers commanding corps, will with an audible voice, pray to God to bless the Dauphin of France, and grant him long life and happiness, and the troops give three cheers."

To the order was appended a

#### "MEMORANDUM.

"The Commander-in-Chief desires his compliments may be presented to the officers' ladies, with and in the neighborhood of the army, together with a request that they will favour him with their company at dinner on Thursday next, at West Point."

The carrying out of the above orders resulted in the most brilliant fête day ever known in the annals of West Point. No pains were spared to make the occasion "in honour of our great and good ally" as splendid and joyful as possible.

On a slight elevation in the rear of old Fort Clinton, a little northeast of the site of the present encampment ground, and commanding a fine view of the plain, the fortifications on the surrounding hills, and the encampments of the troops, was erected a magnificent arbor or colonnade. The work was executed under the direction of Major Villefranche, an able French engineer officer, and employed the labor of one thousand men for ten days. The following description of the arbor is taken from Dr. Thacher's Journal:

"This curious edifice was composed of the simple materials which the common trees in the vicinity afforded, being about six hundred feet in length, and thirty feet wide, supported by a grand colonnade of one hundred and eighteen pillars, made of the trunks of trees. The covering of the roof consisted of boughs, or branches of trees curiously interwoven, and the same materials formed the walls, leaving the ends entirely open. On the inside, every pillar was encircled with muskets and bayonets, bound round in a fanciful and handsome manner, and the whole interior decorated with evergreens, with American and French military colours, and a variety of emblems and devices adjusted in such style as to beautify the whole interior of the fabric.

....

This superb structure in symmetry of proportion, neatness of workmanship, and elegance of arrangement, has seldom, perhaps, been surpassed on any temporary occasion. \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* Several appropriate mottoes decorated the grand edifice, pronouncing benedictions on the Dauphin, and happiness to the two allied nations. The whole army was paraded on the contiguous hills on both sides of the river, forming a circle of several miles in open view of the public edifice."

The cannon employed for the execution of the *feu-de-joie* were as follows: A park of artillery (consisting of thirteen guns) on the plain; six guns at Fort Sherburne (now Trophy Point); three at the South Redoubt, and thirteen at Gee's Point, (then called Stony Point). The discharge of the pieces was succeeded by a fire of musketry.

Thacher's Journal contains a further account of the incidents of this brilliant fête as follows: "At the given signal of firing three cannon, the regimental officers all left their commands, and repaired to the building to partake of the entertainment which had been prepared by order of the At five o'clock, dinner being on the table, his Excel-Commander-in-Chief. lency General Washington and lady and suite, the principal officers of the army and their ladies, Governor and Mrs. Clinton, and a number of respectable characters from the States of New York and New Jersey, moved from Major-General McDougal's quarters through the line formed by Colonel Crane's regiment of artillery to the arbor, where more than five hundred gentlemen and ladies partook of a magnificent festival. A martial band charmed the senses with music, and while the appetite feasted we gazed with admiration on the illustrious guests, and the novel spectacle exhibited to our view. The cloth being removed, thirteen appropriate toasts were drunk, each one being announced by the discharge of thirteen cannon, and accompanied by music. The guests retired from the table at seven o'clock, and the regimental officers repaired to their respective commands.

"The arbor was, in the evening, illuminated by a vast number of lights, which, being arranged in regular and tasteful order, exhibited a scene vying in brilliancy with the starry firmament. The officers having rejoined their regiments, thirteen cannon were again fired as a prelude to the general *feude-joie*, which immediately succeeded throughout the whole line of the army on the surrounding hills, and being three times repeated, the mountains-resounded and echoed like tremendous peals of thunder, and the flashing from thousands of firearms in the darkness of the evening, could be compared only to the most vivid flashes of lightning from the clouds. The *feu-* *de-joie* was immediately followed by three shouts of acclamation and benediction for the Dauphin by the united voices of the whole army on all sides. At half-past eleven o'clock the celebration was concluded by the exhibition of fire-works very ingeniously constructed of various figures. His Excellency General Washington was unusually cheerful. He attended the ball in the evening, and with a dignified and graceful air, having Mrs. Knox for his partner, carried down a dance of twenty couples in the arbor on the green grass."

Among the guests were Governor and Mrs. Clinton, Generals Knox and Hand with their ladies, Mr. Benson (the attorney-general), Mrs. Livingstone (of the Lower Manor), Mrs. Montgomery, widow of the hero of Quebec, and a great number of ladies and gentlemen from the States of New York and New Jersey who came in their barges to West Point to take part in the festivities.

If in the midst of these extravagant rejoicings over the birth of the young prince, a presentiment of the approaching fate of the royal family of France could have flashed into the minds of that gay company, how would all their hilarity and mirth have been quenched in the very depths of horror and gloom.

Those who amid these bright hopes and anticipations both in the old world and the new, prayed for long life and happiness for the young child, little thought that heaven's best blessing would be conferred upon him by an early death. In June, 1789, before he had reached his eighth birthday he "was taken away from the evil to come." A little later and the storm of the French Revolution had burst upon his unhappy country. The amiable and excellent Louis XVI, and his queen, the lovely Marie Antoinette, laid their heads upon the scaffold, while for the then Dauphin of France, the unhappy Louis XVII, was reserved a more cruel fate than death.

The terrible sufferings inflicted upon this child of tender years, reduced him to a condition of idiocy. In 1795, the report was spread abroad that he had died of scrofula in his prison house, but strange revelations which were made in the year 1851, raise in the minds of those who have examined them, strong doubts as to the truth of this story. From the facts which then came to light it appears extremely probable that the Dauphin did not die in the Temple in 1795 as was alleged, but that through the connivance of friends he was conveyed into the Low Countries, and afterwards to America where he was brought up among the Oneida Indians. That at about the age of thirteen while bathing in Lake George, he climbed with the fear-

lessness of idiocy to the top of a high rock, and plunging head foremost into the lake was taken up insensible, and when brought to consciousness his mind had recovered its reason.

The story of Eleazer Williams, the name he bore in the Indian family in which he was brought up, is graphically told in an article in Putnam's Magazine for February, 1853, (Vol. I, p. 194). He became a clergyman in the Episcopal Church, and a devoted missionary to the St. Regis Indians. I once met the Reverend Eleazer Williams at the house of friends much interested in his story, and was struck by the decidedly French character of his physiognomy. He at once recalled to my mind the type of old-fashioned, middle-aged French gentlemen whom I had often met in my childhood at my uncle's house in New York. But what impressed me most about him was the testimony given by every word and action that he regarded his calling and work as a minister of God of higher interest than any earthly good. Clearly in his mind

for when one requested him to give her his autograph with the highest title which he claimed, he wrote this verse from Scripture: "Giving thanks unto God who hath made me meet to be a partaker of the inheritance of the saints in light;" and beneath it the subscription, "Eleazer Williams, Missionary to the St. Regis Indians."

We must now return from this very long and wide digression to the more personal reminiscences of Miss Betsy Cox.

During the Revolution, Mr. Isaac Garrison, Miss Cox's grandfather, had the charge of supplying provisions of all kinds to the troops stationed in this region from Fort Montgomery to West Point. It was his teamsters who brought the links of the great chain, as fast as they were finished, from the Stirling iron works, twenty-five miles distant, to West Point. In the space of six weeks the entire structure had been transported, and on the first of May,-1778, it was stretched across the river. It was attached to huge blocks, at each end, and under cover of batteries on either shore, and extended from the "Chain Battery," a little west of Gee's Point, across to the little cove just above the present boat-house on Constitution Island.

Mr. Isaac Garrison, and Mr. Dunlap, Mr. S. D. Morrison's grandfather, established, for the convenience of the troops stationed at West Point, a store-house of commissary supplies at that post. This store house stood a

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few feet west of the site now occupied by the Post-office Cottage, and was a large and commodious building, used subsequently as an artillery barracks.

Besides Colonel Moore's house in Washington's Valley we have traces of several other more or less pretentious dwellings existing at West Point prior to the Revolution. Of what was so long known as the old Thompson house, Mrs. Davies relates that she had heard, in her childhood, that it had been built long before the war by an English gentleman as a sort of country seat or hunting lodge. Writing under date of November 24th, 1778, Dr. Thacher says: "I accepted an invitation to dine with Captain Carter at West Point. He is a gentleman of independent fortune, and lives in splendid style." Possibly the residence at which Captain Carter dispensed his generous hospitality may have been the confiscated property of the English sportsman.

Another dwelling of large size and beautiful for situation (on the bank of the river a little northeast of the present executive building), was the old North or Gridley House, as it was called in later days.

From General Heath's diary, given in his memoirs, we extract the following entry made under date of December 27th, (Saint John the Evangelist day), 1780: "The Free and Accepted Masons of Washington Lodge celebrated the feast of St. John at '*Starkean Hall*,' at West Point." No hint is given as to its location, but it was probably named for John Stark (of the battle of Bennington fame) who was stationed here, or at Nelson's Point, during the Revolution.

Among the charges upon which General McDougal was tried by courtmartial in August, 1782, appears that of "making additions and erecting buildings at West Point, without the knowledge or consent of the Commanding General, particularly the addition to the house in which General McDougal quarters, and the building for the provost guard."

Concerning this charge the Court gave it as their opinion "that from constant use of commandants at West Point, never yet interdicted, General McDougal is justifiable in making additions to the house in which he quarters."

Taking these facts in connection with the references made in the diary of Dr. Thacher to the headquarters of Generals Heath and McDougal, and the quarters of General Patterson, General Glover, Colonel Malcolm, and Dr. Eustis, we may conclude that there were at West Point quite a number of more or less permanent structures erected before and during the Revolution. Thacher states that the name of New Boston had been given to the

huts built by the soldiers of the Massachusetts line in the winter of 1781, and, under date of December 19th in the following year, he mentions having partaken of an entertainment "at Dr. Eustis' quarters, New Boston."

From this we may infer, that the doctor, at least, and perhaps Colonel Malcolm, and other officers stationed here lived only in some commodious kind of hut a little larger and better built, it may be, than those for the soldiers.

Our choice for the headquarters of the general officers must lie among four large and well-built houses, which, together with Moore's house in Washington's Valley, tradition assigns to dates prior to the Revolution, and which were all existing in excellent condition when Colonel Mansfield came to West Point in 1802. These are as follows: A large frame dwelling a little south of the site of No. 5; another, equally if not more spacious, near the present No. 33; the old Thompson house, and the old North house.

A more detailed description of these quarters and their occupants will be given when we come down to Mrs. Davies' recollections in 1815.

We now pass to the year 1802.

#### II.

## REMINISCENCES OF COLONEL JARED MANSFIELD, RECEIVED THROUGH HIS DAUGHTER, MRS. DAVIES.

From how feeble a germ has come the outgrowth of our Military Academy is apparent from the fact that when Colonel Mansfield arrived at West Point on the third of May, 1802, the entire establishment consisted of one officer,—Major Jonathan Williams, the superintendent; two instructors, Captains Barron and Mansfield, assistant professors of mathematics (the professorship was not created until 1812); and four cadets.

General Cullum in his admirable address at the unveiling of the Thayer statue, at West Point, in 1883, has given so clear, exhaustive and thoroughly interesting a history of the foundation and growth of the Military Academy that nothing remains to be told in this connection.\*

I pass therefore to more personal reminiscences, after dwelling for a

moment upon the appointment and administration of our first superintendent, Major Jonathan Williams.

The law passed in 1802 for the organization of the institution required "the principal engineer, or, in his absence, the next in rank to be the Superintendent of the Military Academy." Major Williams, having been appointed, by President Jefferson, Chief Engineer, assumed, in virtue of his office, the charge of the newly-founded establishment, arriving at West Point, with the officers above mentioned, in the spring of 1802.

Major Williams felt very keenly the difficulties of his new position. These arose, in great measure, from the uncertain basis upon which the establishment was founded. There was exemplified what he described as "the incongruity of a stationery and an errant existence;" for while the Corps of Engineers constituted the Military Academy, its members were liable to be called to duty along our coast from one extremity of the United States to the other.

A report made by him on the condition of the institution some six years later, concluded with these words:

"In short, the Military Academy as it now stands, is like a foundling barely existing among the mountains, and nurtured at a distance, out of sight, and almost unknown to its legitimate parents. Had it been so attached to the Government (its real and only parent) as to be always with it, always in sight, and always in the way of its fostering care, it would probably have flourished, and have become an honourable and interesting appendage to the national family."

Colonel Williams did not live to see the conditions which he so fondly desired for his protégé exist as actual realities. He resigned from the army in 1812, and died three years later. It would have cheered his generous heart could he have foreseen that the neglected "foundling" in which he took so lively an interest would become what it is, in fact, to-day the favored and cherished ward of the "national family."

Major Williams was a grand-nephew of Dr. Franklin, and had been brought up and educated by his distinguished relative chiefly in Paris. It was there that, in 1784, he had made the acquaintance of Mr. Jefferson, who conceived so high an opinion of his ability and character, that, eighteen years later, he appointed him, as we have seen, Chief Engineer, and sent him to West Point as first superintendent of the Academy.

During Dr. Franklin's mission to France, Williams acted as the Minis-

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ter's private secretary. He was an able engineer, a man of high attainments as a scholar, and an amiable and polished gentleman.

His wife was a Scotch lady, and a very highly accomplished woman, as was also his daughter. During their residence at West Point, they occupied the frame-house standing in the then southwest corner of the Post, a little south of the present No. 5. Colonel Williams here cultivated a fine garden, and was very liberal in the distribution of the vegetables, fruit, and flowers which it produced. They were a hospitable family, and the cadets, then only sixteen in number, often dined at their house.

Besides the small group of officers and cadets who formed the nucleus of the Military Academy, there were at West Point in 1802, and for some years later, detachments of soldiers who were quartered in different localities on the Post—some in the old Long Barracks, near the site of the present hotel; others in Mr. Garrison's store house, which had been converted into a barracks, and others again in a wooden structure which stood on the site of the present No. 41.

These soldiers, always spoken of in my childhood as the old bombadiers, belonged to the corps of artillerists and engineers which had been organized and stationed at West Point in 1794. They were under the command of Major George Fleming, who had succeeded General Knox when the latter became Secretary of War in 1785.

Major Boynton relates that for the instruction of this corps, in the year of its organization, and chiefly "through the instrumentality of President Washington," a school had been established in a two-story stone building called "The Old Provost," which stood on the northwest side of Execution Hollow. Two years later this house was burnt down and the school abandoned.\*

No doubt this was the building, the erection of which for the Provost Guard had been one of the charges brought against General McDougal.

Major Fleming remained at West Point until some time after the establishment of the Military Academy. After the war there had been left at this Post and in the vicinity a large number of guns and military supplies of all kinds. In the magazines at Fort Putnam, and on Constitution Island, were stored immense quantities of powder, and to Major Fleming was committed the custody of all these munitions of war, as well as the charge of superintending the repairs which had been commenced upon Forts Clinton and Putnam. Colonel Vincent, a French engineer, engaged on these works in 1794, speaks in high terms of this officer's efficiency and skill.

When Colonel Mansfield came to West Point, Major and Mrs. Fleming and their niece, Miss Moffat, were living in the old Thompson house, and were, with Mrs. Mansfield, and Mrs. Osborn, the wife of an officer stationed here, the only ladies on the Post in 1802.

At the close of 1803 Colonel Mansfield having been made Surveyor-General of the Northwestern Territory, removed to Ohio, where he resided until 1812, when receiving the appointment of Professor of Natural and Experimental Philosophy at the Military Academy, he returned to West Point.

We will pass therefore from 1803 to the year 1814.

#### III.

#### THE REMINISCENCES OF MRS. CHARLES DAVIES.

Mrs. Davies, the only daughter of Colonel Jared Mansfield, came with her parents to West Point at the age of seven years. Her brother, the late Mr. E. D. Mansfield, of Ohio, (so long the "Veteran Observer" of the *New York Times*), accompanied them. The party landed at noon, on the twentieth of August, at the old North Dock.

At the time of the Revolution the boat landing was at Gee's Point, so named after Captain Gee, the maternal great-grandfather of Mr. William Ward, and who was one of the early skippers on the North River.

Captain Gee lived just above the Point, where the traces of the foundation of his dwelling may still be seen. Singularly enough, years after, his granddaughter married Mr. Bryan Ward, the Adjutant's clerk, and lived in a little cottage on the rocks only a few rods higher up, under the angle of Fort Clinton.

This house was removed, I think, more than thirty years ago, but there still linger the lilach bushes, and other hardy blooming plants, which once graced the pretty garden surrounding the cottage.

The Mansfield party came in a sloop the entire journey from New Haven, taking between three and four days to accomplish the trip. Colonel Mansfield navigated the vessel up the Hudson, the captain never having sailed on that river before. They brought with them a white horse, which

Miss Cox believes was for several years the only horse that had been seen at West Point. Nor did this one remain any length of time, for finding no convenience for keeping him here, Colonel Mansfield had his little establishment of horse and chaise transported across the river to Garrison's, and from this point, when the summer vacations came round, he would take his carriage, and driving across Westchester county, via Peekskill and Danbury, Connecticut, visit his old home at New Haven.

For such as could not walk at West Point, and they were the few in those days, other means of locomotion had to be devised. Mrs. Davies remembers the year after their arrival looking out of the window, and having her curiosity excited by the sight of a strange kind of conveyance borne along by men. She was told that it was a palanquin or litter, in which my great-grandfather, Philip Ten Eyck, an old Hollander who came to West Point in 1815, with my grandfather Nichols, was being carried up the hill from the north dock. He was a very aged man and an invalid. The general conveyance at that date, however, was an ox-cart. For many years later, I believe, oxen were the only draught animals used at the Post. Among the most vivid recollections of my childhood is the picturesque appearance of a weather-beaten soldier, one of the old Bombadiers, equipped in a long, loose, blue overcoat, and short shoulder-cape, breaking with a team of oxen attached to a clumsy sledge or drag, the almost impassable drifts after a winter snow-storm. Professor Weir has preserved in one of his admirable sketches, this unique picture, which, however, by those who know only the West Point of to-day, might be mistaken for some scene in Siberia.

But to return. Our little party ascended the hill by a rude foot-path, bordered and encroached upon by wild roses and sweet brier,—for these were the days when Mrs. Walsh described West Point, at a fashionable dinner-party in New York, as "a dear little world of its own, hedged in by a wild sweet-briery fence." But August is not the season of bloom for wild roses, and it is not likely that Miss Mansfield noticed at that moment, this beautiful feature of her new home.

The first houses which came in view as they climbed the hill were two cottages standing pretty nearly where the eastern wall of the Laboratory now stands; the one occupied by Chaplain Empie, and subsequently by Major Burton, father of the late General Henry S. Burton, and the other by Mrs. Thompson and her daughters. A few steps from the base of Monument Hill, on the north, just without the present west wall of the Laboratory, was a frame building known as Major Burton's store. It represented pretty much all the commissary department then at West Point.

Passing this building, they saw on their left, at the eastern base of what was so long known as Monument Hill, a small dwelling occupied by a soldier named Blane, who before the establishment of a regular tailor at West Point, was employed to make the needed repairs of the cadets' clothes. In 1814 the hill was a natural green mound, with nothing standing upon it. Subsequently the flag-staff was placed there, and stood on the hill as late as 1820. The date of its removal Miss Cox does not remember, but thinks that it was probably at the time when Wood's monument, which had previously stood on the plain, in front of the old Academy of 1815, was transferred to this spot. When I asked Miss Cox whether she supposed there was any reason for believing Monument Hill to be an artificial mound, she rejected the idea at once, not only on the ground of no such tradition having existed in her day, but also because there was at that time neither men nor money save what barely sufficed for the needful work of the Post.\* А great deal of the labor now performed by horses and mules had to be done by men, and Miss Cox relates that, during the Revolution, her uncle, Beverly Garrison, had often seen men engaged in rolling barrels of pork from the North Dock up into Fort Putnam.

At some little distance northwest from Monument Hill, and a little west of the site of the post-office, stood Garrison's old store-house of the Revolution which had been, as before mentioned, converted into an artillery barracks for the Bombadiers.

Miss Cox's father, who was an engineer soldier, came to West Point in 1811, and occupied a portion of these quarters. In 1814 he was ordered to the Niagara frontier, and died in that same year, at Buffalo, just after the sortie from Fort Erie in which fell the brave Colonel Wood. His widow was allowed to remain in the quarters and lived there until after her second marriage to Mr. English, then the government tailor. Towards the close of 1815 this building being required for soldiers' quarters, Mr. English was advised by Captain Alden Partridge, then in command at West Point, to build for himself on the government land. The site selected was that on which Mr. Erwin's house now stands. Mr. English bought the lumber for his new dwelling, and built it entirely at his own expense. Subsequently Captain Partridge was called quite severely to account for having permitted

a civilian to build on government property, but was exonerated on the ground that Mr. English was then in government employ, and, moreover, had not spent a dollar of public money in the erection of his house. When in 1844 Mr. English removed to the Falls he was allowed to take his building with him, and it still stands there near the banks of the Eagle Valley stream, one of the best built, and best preserved old houses in the village of Highland Falls. But to return from this digression to the year 1814 and the Mansfietd party. The first view in landing at the north dock presented rather a wild and forbidding aspect to the children, hitherto accustomed to a much more level country, and the toilsome ascent of that north dock hill in a mid-day August sun was very disheartening.

When, however, they reached the summit, and saw the plain, albeit then diversified with hollows, and by no means of the same beauty and extent as now, they were much delighted and quite forgot the fatigues of the climb.

The house which Colonel Mansfield was to occupy, must have been the first which appeared in sight. It was a large, yellow, frame dwelling, standing on an elevation a very little to the southwest of the present No. 33. It has been mentioned before as one of those built prior to the Revolution, and occupied by Colonel Mansfield when he was here in 1802. The house was a double one divided by a hall. It faced the east, had dormer windows, and six chimneys. It was entered by the front door from the east, and on the right hand side lived the surgeon, Dr. Walsh, while the Mansfields occupied the left or south portion of the house. Subsequently my father and mother shared these quarters with Dr. and Mrs. Walsh, and here, our eldest sister Georgiana Walsh was born.

The Walshes had open wood fires, bright brass andirons, and a green striped Venetian carpet, the last not so common in those days as to escape the observation of the little girl.

We will begin our survey of the Point as it appeared in 1814-15 from this locality.

A ledge of rock stretched between the house just described and "the Academy," which stood very nearly on the site of the Superintendent's present quarters. It was a wooden building used both for recitations and chapel. Mr. Empie officiated here in 1815. At one time Mrs. Kinsley lived there and boarded a few cadets, probably during a portion of Mr. Z. D. Kinsley's cadet-days. In 1816 a dancing school was held in this building. The teacher was Pierre Thomas, the first sword or fencing master at the Academy. He was a Frenchman, notwithstanding his very English

surname. The first waltz which Miss Mansfield ever saw was danced by this gentleman and Madame Crozet in the dancing room of the old Academy.

Next to the Academy stood a small yellow house, known as Captain Partridge's "salt box," on the north edge of a hollow in what is now the croquet ground of the Superintendent's quarters. In the centre of the hollow was a small grassy mound upon which Colonel Thayer planted a fine horse-chestnut tree. The hollow remained until about 1870 or 1872 when it was filled up. West of it stretched quite a large sheet of water, or pond, which, however, disappeared (probably drained and filled up) long before the hollow. This pond furnished the ice-supply for the Post at one period, though, probably, a brief one, in those primitive days.

On the plain, in front of the Academy, existed another smaller hollow which, in 1814, was filled with bushes of the May-rose, according to Professor Ellicott, the native wild rose of this region.

In 1814 the small dwelling known as Captain Partridge's "salt box" was occupied by that officer, who was then acting as Commandant of the Military Academy, and keeping bachelor's hall there had two or three cadets living with him.

Not far south of these quarters stood what was undoubtedly the oldest house on the Point, known to modern West Point people as the Thompson house, but to an earlier generation as Colonel Snowden's quarters, that gentleman having, I believe, succeeded Major Fleming in his quarters as well as in his office of Military Storekeeper. In 1814 the Snowden house existed intact, having both wings, and was occupied by Mr. Isaac Partridge, an uncle of Captain Partridge, as a mess hall. Mrs. Partridge, maternal grandmother of General Burton, wrote, on one occasion, a poem, dedicated to the cadets when they departed for the winter, and again when they returned in the spring. For in those days, in the year 1814-15, at least, the cadets had their furlough in the winter, going off on the tenth of December and getting back about the first of April.

South of the Snowden house, near the site of No. 7, stood a yellow frame house, occupied in 1814 by Professor Ellicott, then the Professor of Mathematics. Professor Ellicott served at the Military Academy until his death in 1820, and was the first professor whose remains repose in our cemetery. He was the grandfather of Colonel Henry Douglas.

A small house, standing a little to the northwest of Professor Ellicott's,

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was occupied for several years by a barber named Spencer, and I remember attending an infant school held in it when I was a child.

Next came the yellow (they seem to have known no other color in those days) frame house before alluded to as occupied by Major Jonathan Williams during his administration as Superintendent. Next to the Thompson house, this was the oldest dwelling on the Post, having been built, probably, about the middle of the preceding century. At a little distance from it, nearly on the site of the present Cadet Commissary building, lay an old burying ground.

When Miss Mansfield came to West Point in 1814 this house was occupied by Mr. Masson, the teacher of French at the Military Academy from 1808 till 1815. Mr. Masson had a West Indian wife, and a large family of children. Mme. Masson, utterly unused to northern house-keeping, had a hard time of it at West Point. Her affairs were always in confusion, and it was a happy day for her, poor lady, when, by rare good fortune, they recovered their property lost during the San Domingo troubles, and returned to the West Indies. This old house was occupied successively by Mr. and Mrs. Partridge; the Burtons; by General Swift during the winter of 1816-17; then in 1818 by the chaplain, Mr. Picton. In 1823 or '24, Major Leslie, a brother of Sir Charles Leslie, the eminent artist, lived there, and his sister, Miss Eliza Leslie, author of a cookery and house book, very celebrated in its day, was a member of his family. The Leslies were the first to use Lehigh coal, the fuel previously burned at West Point being wood. I well remember the large kitchen fire-place with its cranes, the shining Dutch oven and baking pots. The old yellow house had disappeared before the Mrs. Davies' last recollection of a visit there was on that bitter vear 1830. night in December, 1835, when the great fire in New York City occurred. She had gone with the Misses Thompson on that evening to a little sewing circle which was to have met there, but the house, notwithstanding its sheltered position, was so exceedingly cold that the ladies were obliged to disperse immediately after assembling.

Between this and the old North house, in the space now occupied by the cadet barracks, academy, chapel, etc., there were no buildings. The boundary wall which began just beyond the present No. 41, ran along the base of the hills back of the present gardens of the professors and officers and the southwest yellow cottage; then turning east it was carried through waste land, partly hollows, partly fields, interspersed with frequent graves, as was also the plain near the site of the present encampment, until it reached the bank of the river about where the library now stands.

Among the graves scattered over this portion of the plain, was one which has a peculiar interest from the circumstance that General Washington accompanied the little funeral procession which bore the remains of the young soldier who was there interred. Under date of November 10th, 1782, Dr. Thacher in his Military Journal, mentions the death of Ensign Trant, a young Irish gentleman who had come over in 1780, and warmly espoused the American cause. He received an appointment in the regiment to which Dr. Thacher was attached, and by his military ability and engaging social qualities endeared himself to all with whom he came in contact. After a long and very painful illness, borne with the utmost fortitude and resignation, he died in the autumn of 1782, at the early age of twenty years.\* "His remains," the doctor notes, "were decently interred in the garrison at West Point, and were followed to the grave by His Excellency General Washington, and a very respectable procession."

A little south of the present Library, between it and the Executive Building, stood the old house known as North or Gridley's Tavern. It had existed from Revolutionary times. Mr. North lived there in 1814. He married the widow Denton, the grandmother of Mr. John Denton. After North's death the property was sold to a man of the name of Gridley who also kept a tavern there. Gridley had lived at West Point in 1803; he afterwards removed to Ramapo, but returned in 1816, purchased the North property, and enlarged the house. In 1824 the Government bought the Gridley farm for ten thousand dollars.

In this house I attended my first school. It was kept by Mrs. Whealdon, an English lady, whose daughter, Miss Susan, assisted her in teaching. Miss Whealdon married Professor Charles Hackley of Columbia College. Among my schoolmates were Miss Mary O'Maher, afterwards Mrs. Gillmore; the elder daughters of General Scott, and Miss Maria Wheaton. About the year 1840, the main portion of the old North house, which, after its purchase, had been used successively for a hospital, a school, and officers' quarters, was removed to its present location south of the new cadet hospital, where it still stands, being occupied by Mr. William Ward.

From North's house, or rather from the termination of the boundary wall just north of it, round to the site of the present West Point Hotel,

there were various points of interest. The partly natural, partly artificial grotto, known as Kosciuszko's garden, lay about midway between the brow of the hill and the river, and just above it stood a little cottage at one time occupied by Wyllis, the first band-master, whose Kent bugle delighted all who heard it. Old people say that no music has ever seemed half so ravishing to their ears, as the strains from this exquisite instrument when played by the master's hand, especially amid the stillness and beauty of a moonlight night in summer.

On the edge of the plain loomed up a huge rock, and near it stood a small octagonal brick building known in my younger days as Castle Harris, being the quarters of an instructor in tactics of that name. In after years this officer resigned from the army, and entered the ministry of the Episcopal Church. He was exceedingly strict as a tactical officer with the cadets, and I have been told by his brother-clergyman that the late excellent and much-esteemed Reverend N. Sayre Harris was considerably of a martinet in the church.

In the record of the Association of the Graduates just published, (June, 1886), a touching incident is related of the closing hours of this good man, showing how when memory and affection reverted to his military career, and that amid the decay of the mental faculties the instincts of the soldier alone remained strong and constant to the last.

Some distance beyond the rock, and north of the present encampment ground, lay the ruined earth-works of old Fort Clinton, the road running through the Fort, instead of around it as at present. Before the treason of Arnold, this work was called "Fort Arnold," but from that date, says the biographer of Colonel John Lamb, "every memento of the traitor's name was expunged from the garrison which he had so basely undertaken to betray, and 'Fort Arnold,' the original appellation of the first fortifications erected at West Point, is unknown in history, and only to be found in the military correspondence and garrison orders of that day." In these old earth-works was built the Black Hole, a place of incarceration for refractory soldiers.

Northwest of Fort Clinton, well around the Point, between the site of the present hotel and Trophy Point, stood the old Long Barracks. It was a two-storied, picturesque, building of wood, having steps ascending from the outside. It faced the south, and had a piazza to each story. It had been built during the Revolution, and when the Military Academy was *started* at West Point, (one can hardly use the word *organized* in connection with so small a beginning), the upper story of the old Long Barracks was appropriated to the use of a few cadets who composed the corps at that time, and the lower story was occupied by the small detachment of artillery soldiers.

When the South Barracks was finished, in 1815, the cadets moved into it and the Long Barracks was given up entirely to the "Bombadiers," as this detachment was called. On the night after Christmas, in 1825, this old revolutionary structure was destroyed by fire.

At the Long Barracks terminated the only artificially constructed pathway which West Point possessed. It was a brick-laid walk extending diagonally across the plain from the old Snowden house to the above mentioned barracks. As tradition relates that one wing of this old mansion had been used by General Washington as temporary headquarters, perhaps this walk may have been laid out for the Commanding General's convenience.

Turning now to our starting point, the double, yellow house, standing a little west of No. 33, Colonel Mansfield's quarters in 1815, we find between it and No. 41, only a stretch of wild, rocky, open ground, with undulating surface, and having a few scrubby pear and apple trees scattered here and there upon it. The old barracks of 1802 had disappeared. In what must have been the barrack-yard there still existed a very fine spring of water for many years; in fact I remember it as late as 1848.

West of the site of No. 41, and from about the same point as now, started the old road to Buttermilk Falls. It ran southward over the hill through which the deep cut is now made for its passage, and a little to the east of the present road, until reaching Mr. Kinsley's line, when it turned considerably to the west, running through Mr. Kinsley's fields and woods and the Drew place, and coming out into the Eagle Valley road about where the upper bridge now stands.

The name of Eagle Valley was given to this romantic and beautiful pass by Mr. Gimbrede, one of the first teachers of drawing at the Academy, who purchasing property there gave it the name of his birth-place in France. He attempted the cultivation of grapes on the rocky slopes of the little valley, but either from lack of means to carry them on, or from the inadaptability of the soil for grape culture, his experiments were soon abandoned.

When Colonel Mansfield came to West Point in 1814, they were building the old Mess Hall, and had the walls of the South Barracks nearly completed, but none of the other public buildings nor any of the brick and stone quarters had been even begun. The following is, as nearly as Mrs. Davies can recollect, the order in which these stand as regards the date of their erection:

The first quarters finished were Nos. 3 and 7. The former was occupied by Captain Crozet, Professor of Engineering, who came to West Point in October, 1816, and took possession of his new quarters in March, 1817. Captain Claude Crozet was a graduate of the Polytechnique School in Paris, and an artillery officer in the army of Napoleon. After the fall of the Empire he emigrated to this country, and was appointed in the service of the United States, first as Assistant Professor, and a few months later full Professor of Engineering at the Military Academy. He was an able instructor of military science and has been called the father of Descriptive Geometry in America.

Nos. 15 and 17, long known as the "Philosophical House," because built for Colonel Mansfield, the first Professor of Natural Philosophy at the Academy, was finished in 1816 or early in 1817. Colonel Mansfield moved into it in September of the last named year. The Superintendent's, Professor Bass', and the Commandant of Cadets', (Nos. 21, 23 and 25), were all built about the same time, probably in the years 1819 and 1820.

Of the stone houses beyond the north corner of the Post, Nos. 39 and 41 were the first erected. Professor Gimbrede, who came in 1819, and at first quartered in the small Spencer house, was living at No. 41, in 1822. I infer therefore that these quarters, and No. 39, in which I was born two years later, must have been built about the year 1820 or 1821.

The next quarters finished and occupied, all of them by the summer of 1829, were the present Nos. 35 and 37 and Nos. 31 and 33. The material for these houses was procured from the rocky ledge, eight or ten feet high, which covered the site where now stands Nos. 27 and 29.

The first chaplain who occupied No. 31 was the Reverend Thomas Warner, who came to West Point on the first of January, 1828. He was exceedingly fond of flowers, and his spacious garden was the marvel and admiration of all who saw it. As well it might be, for it cost almost incredible pains, labor, and skill, together with infinite patience to convert that ledge of rock,—a continuation of the same which to-day stretches down from the brow of the hill opposite No. 31 to the river,—into parterres of roses and choicest flowers.

Mr. Warner's predecessor, the Reverend C. P. McIlvaine, afterwards ' the Bishop of Ohio, was one of the dwellers in No. 3, and the Reverend Thomas Picton, who preceded him, lived in the present No. 21. The first chaplain, the Reverend Adam Empie, from 1813 till 1817, lived as we have noted in one of the cottages on the site of the Ordnance Laboratory. Church service was first held in the old wooden Academy, on the site of the Superintendent's present quarters. It was afterwards transferred to the Mess Hall, and subsequently to a room in the Academy of 1815, which was used as a chapel until the present one was built. When my father came to West Point, in 1815, evening prayer was said by the chaplain on the plain after parade, and just before the battalion was dismissed.

The public buildings which had been already begun when Mrs. Davies came to West Point, or which were erected within the next four years, were the Academy, the Mess Hall, the South Barracks, and the North Barracks. The Academy completed in 1815 was a two-story building of stone. On the ground floor in the center of the building was the chapel, and the library was in the room above it. West of the chapel was the chemical laboratory with the philosophical room above. Adjoining the chapel on the east was the engineering department with the Adjutant's office in the room over it. The destruction of this building by fire on the night of February 19th, 1838, was one of the most disastrous events that has ever occurred in the annals of West Point. All the archives, all the records, every paper pertaining to the previous history of the Military Academy were destroyed. From the foundation of the institution in 1802 until 1838, a period of thirty-six years, we have nothing to go upon, more certain or authentic than the memories of the few, now surviving, who knew West Point in those days.

The Mess Hall, also completed in 1815, was first occupied by my grandfather, Mr. Robert Nichols, who was induced to come to West Point and take charge of it by his friend, General Swift, whom he had long known in Brooklyn. Singularly enough one of the chief inducements which General Swift held out to my grandfather, was the extreme healthfulness of West Point. "Nobody ever died there," was his remark to Mr. Nichols, when urging upon him the advantages of a residence here. And yet, in less than two years from his coming to West Point, my grandfather was laid in his grave.

A very worthy gentleman from Connecticut, of the name of Phelps, succeeded Mr. Nichols. The year previous to his taking charge had been one of great scarcity. Mr. Phelps had taken the contract at a very low figure, and being obliged to give sixteen dollars a barrel for the best Richmond flour, and other articles of food being proportionably dear, he became involved financially, and after making every effort to avoid such a misfortune, finally became bankrupt.

Mr. Divin, the proprietor of a public house, or tavern, as they were called in those days, at Peekskill, then took the contract at a much higher rate, and kept it until 1821, when Mr. William B. Cozzens underbid Mr. Divin, and, taking the Mess Hall, combined with it, as far as the accommodations of the building would allow, a hotel for visitors from abroad.

Mr. George Ticknor, the celebrated historian, was a member of the Board of Visitors in 1826, and writing to his wife under date of June 5th, says:

"It is better you did not come with me. There is no house but that of our old friend, Cozzens, where ten rooms are, indeed reserved for the Board of Visitors, and they are made as comfortable as they can be in such a place; but where the floors of the parlours, that are kept empty for them during the day, are literally covered with the beds of the strangers that crowd here at this moment." Mr. Ticknor was himself the guest of Colonel Thayer, who was his early friend and college classmate, and he writes: "The quiet and comfort at Thayer's forms a most luxurious contrast to what is going on at Cozzens'; where, in fact, I think affairs would hardly go on at all if Cozzens were not one of the best tempered and most obliging creatures in the world, and if his wife were not all efficiency and activity."

Prior to the year 1811-12 the cadets boarded about individually, or in squads wherever they could find accommodation. Miss Cox tells me that one such squad, which included General R. E. De Russy, and a cadet of the name of Williams, messed with an eccentric Irishman called Clog Hamilton, who lived in a shanty on the site of the old North Dock. As De Russy was of French extraction, and Williams an English lad, the former was elected to "rule the roast" and the latter to "rule the boil." The efforts of these amateur "chefs" however were *not* so successful as to "leave nothing to be desired," and the corps was well pleased when, in 1811, Mr. Isaac Partridge established something like a regular mess for cadets located, as we have before noted, in the old Thompson house.

Mrs. Thompson, the widow of a revolutionary officer, who was also captain of the corps of artillerists and engineers stationed at this Post, was allowed after her husband's death to board twelve of the cadets. She and her daughters lived to a good old age, and constituted for many years an interesting link between the old times and the new at West Point.

#### IV.

Passing over a period of ten years from the date of Mrs. Davies' early reminiscences, we find the aspect of the Point somewhat changed, especially in certain localities.

In the rear of the old Mess Hall, and on the site of the present Cadet Barracks, lay a cadet-garden, (a sort of supplement to the larger one at German Flats), barns and outbuildings, the bakery, and the sutler's store and residence. The latter was an L-shaped building, and the large and beautiful elm now in front of the sally-port stood not three feet away from the doorstep.

After the purchase of the Gridley property, and before the erection of the Library building, there stood on its site gun sheds and a laboratory. These structures stood parallel to each other about one hundred feet apart and facing north and south. The gun shed consisted of brick pillars, perhaps twenty or thirty in number on either side and about twenty feet apart. Between these pillars were folding-doors, which could be thrown open to allow the gun-carriages to be drawn out and returned to the shed.

The Laboratory likewise consisted of two parallel rows of brick pillars, having alternate doors and windows between them. The building was partitioned into small rooms, used for the manufacture of pyrotechnics; for the instruction of cadets, and other purposes, similar to those for which the present Ordnance Laboratory is employed. When the present Library was built, the above-mentioned structures were carefully removed, stored for awhile at Fort Clinton, and subsequently the wooden portions taken down and re-erected in what is now the basement of the Soldiers' Chapel, and in the old Artillery Barracks. The removal took place about the time that the erection of a new Cadet Barracks was contemplated. I am told that a Board being then strongly disposed to recommend the area within Fort Clinton as a site for the new barracks, the material of the gun sheds, etc., was stored there to be used in the construction of work-sheds for the convenience of the laborers engaged on the new building.

In 1828 a monument to the Polish hero, General Thaddeus Kosciuszko, was erected at the northeast angle of Fort Clinton, overlooking the river. The monument had been designed by Mr. J. H. Latrobe, a talented and distinguished member of the class of 1822. Each cadet contributed twentyfive cents from his monthly pay towards the erection, and the small surplus which remained from the fund was appropriated to the marble basin in the grotto known as Kosciuszko's garden.

The interchange of the literatures of England and America was not as frequent in those days as now, and "The Pleasures of Hope," written in 1799, was probably not very widely known on this side of the ocean in 1820. If the poem had been then as familiar and popular as it afterwards became, Campbell's verse

> "Hope for a season bade the world farewell, And Freedom shrieked when Kosciuszko fell,"

might have suggested a fitting inscription for the monument. The memory of Kosciuszko was held in high honour at West Point in the early part of the century. The elders of that generation were not so very far removed from the times of the Revolution as to have forgotten the special services which this able Pole had rendered in the construction of the fortifications at They had heard the story of his coming upon the scene, when this place. the Frenchman Radiere, although a distinguished engineer, had failed, through his impatience of obstacles, and his irascible and unconciliating disposition, to accomplish any effective result, and of the happy change when Kosciuszko's excellent temper, as well as consummate skill was brought to bear upon the work and the workmen. Sparks, in his Life of Washington, states that Radiere's successor arrived at the Post about the end of March, 1782, and "from that time," he continues, "the works were pressed forward with spirit. To the scientific skill and sedulous application of Kosciuszko, the public was largely indebted for the construction of the military defences at West Point."

The year following the erection of Kosciuszko's monument, in 1829, the West Point Hotel was built, a fund for the purpose having been obtained by the sale of wood, principally hoop poles, cut from the public lands.

Turning now to the south end of the Post, the road, which was little more than a pathway, ran in front of Gridley's tavern, on through what is now the site of the old Cadet Hospital (Nos. 12, 14, 16 and 18) and back of Nos. 22, 24 and 26, etc., and so on over the hill near Mr. Kinsley's residence. South of the present Academy and running westward was a green lane, at the end of which stood a small one story attic cottage with green blinds and doors, presenting a very picturesque appearance. This cottage was subsequently removed to the ledge of rocks above, and enlarged into a

very comfortable set of quarters. At the base of the rocks stood the public barns. Further down on the site of No. 24 was a farm-house; beyond extended thick woodland through which a rough foot-path led to the old mill at Buttermilk Falls.

On a pretty plateau on the bank of the river about half way between the present south gate and the village of Highland Falls was the residence of Mrs. Kinsley, the grandmother of Mr. E. V. Kinsley. It was a fine old mansion; many a pleasant memory and association is connected with the house and the family in the minds of cadets and officers living here some fifty years ago.

At the northern extremity of the Post some additions and improvements had been made during these years. A white picket fence had been put up, and a convenient sidewalk laid out from the point where stood the old north gate (just beyond No. 45) around to No. 5. Facing the sidewalk at the north end of it, stood a small wooden cottage which might have been called "The Generals," having, in later years, been occupied in succession by so many officers who subsequently attained that rank. But when first erected it was not used for officer's quarters.

It was built by Colonel Thayer for an ex-soldier named Lane, who was employed at West Point as a sutler to sell certain grocery supplies to the enlisted men and other employèes about the Academy. Lane was also required to act as a kind of outpost towards the north gate, which stood then just beyond his cottage and marked cadet limits in that direction. These Lane was to see that no cadet transgressed. When I recall the easy good nature of this man and his family, I cannot but doubt his efficiency in the last mentioned requirement, and question much if any cadet ever found it difficult to elude the vigilance of such a sentinel.

The first officer I remember as living in this cottage was Lieutenant Mather, who was an assistant in Chemistry between the years 1829 and 1835. Then, if my memory serves me rightly, Generals C. F. Smith and Robert Anderson occupied the cottage together between 1835 and 1837. General Sidney Burbank lived there, I think, in 1839, and General Vogdes in 1841-2. Subsequently General H. G. Wright and General Rosecrans, and, for a short time General Terrell had these quarters. The last officer who lived in them, I believe, was General Howard. They were finally assigned to the sword-master, who occupied them until the cottage was removed, in 1874, to make room for the spacious set of quarters at Nos. 43 and 45. The beautiful elm tree, just within the iron railing of the court-yard of No. 45,

stood at the threshold of the south door of the little cottage, and was so large even in 1842, that its wide-spreading branches nearly overshadowed it.

Another fine elm among the many which beautify the Post, is interesting because of the incident connected with its planting. One day in April, in the year 1833, an old man of the name of Cronk presented himself, with an elm-tree sapling in his hands at Colonel Thayer's office. He belonged to a family who were very ancient settlers in these mountains and chiefly engaged in farming and in supplying wood to the Government at West Notwithstanding Colonel Thayer's stately dignity of carriage, he Point. was, in truth, the very soul of courtesy, and this won for him the respect and confidence of men of every degree and station with whom he came in The old man was received by Colonel Thayer with his wonted contact. politeness, and after expressing his regret that the superintendent was about to resign the charge of the Military Academy, he added: "You are about to leave us; I am an aged man and must soon quit these scenes forever, and I have come, now, to ask you to allow me to plant this tree at West Point; that it may live and flourish long after we have gone as a memento Colonel Thayer responded to his request, with, I suspect, a of us both." degree of warmth added to the usual courtesy of his manners. The spot selected for the planting of the sapling elm was much frequented in those days, for it was one passed and repassed in going to and from the boatlanding at the North Dock. Colonel Thayer offered to send soldiers to dig the earth, but the old man declined, saying that he wished to plant the tree entirely with his own hands. It stands to-day in all the glory and beauty of its growth of half a century in the little triangular park in front of the postoffice cottage.

To return now to our general view of West Point at this period, we find that there had been changes in various portions of the Post since 1815. Somewhere about the year 1825, probably, one of the wings of the Thompson house was removed, and planted about thirty feet northwest of the present location (No. 9) and occupied as a school house. There it stood during my school days, and in fact until space was required for the erection of the present quarters, (Nos. 11 and 13), when it was shifted some thirty feet to the south and east. It was to this building that in about the year 1833-34 Mrs. Whealdon removed her little school from the old North house, and the most vivid recollections of my childhood centre within its walls. The eleventh of February never comes round without my recalling the very bench whereon I sat in the year 1835, working in the date which marked the completion of my sampler. That old-fashioned sampler which wound up with a sentence, wrought in such small letters, and consequently taking so much time and pains in the execution, that the words have remained impressed upon my memory for more than half a century. It ran thus: "Nothing can atone for the want of modesty; without which beauty is ungraceful, and wit detestable."

Among my school-fellows of these early days, besides those already mentioned as fellow-pupils in the school which began in the North house, were Mr. Edward V. Kinsley; the Messrs. John, Silvanus and Theodore Cozzens; their sister Mary Jane, afterwards Mrs. Stockton; the daughters of General Worth—Mary, who married General Sprague, and Maggie; and the elder children of General De Russy—John, Clara and Emily.

Among the interesting associations connected with the old school house is the memory of a very gifted and charming woman, Mrs. Maria Gowan Brooks, known in the world of letters as Maria del Occidente, who lived there for a short time between the years 1836 and 1839. Her son, afterwards Colonel Horace Brooks, was then a lieutenant, stationed at West Point, and had his quarters in the second story of the old school house. The front door opened upon a small square passage, and narrow flight of stairs leading directly to the rooms above, while a door to the right opened into the school room. In these humble quarters dwelt for a time this beautiful and accomplished lady whom Southey declared "the most impassioned and most imaginative of poetesses," and of whose poetic masterpiece "Zophiël," Charles Lamb exclaimed, as he rose from its perusal, "Southey says it is by some Yankee woman, as if there had ever been a woman capable of anything so great."

Maria Gowan was born at Medford, in Massachusetts. When little more than a child she was married to a wealthy Boston merchant "of at least thrice her own age, and as little suited to her in other respects as in years." After her husband's death in 1823 she went to reside with a brother in Cuba. This maiden of Welch descent, and Massachusetts birth, must have had something essentially tropical in her nature, for in the West Indies she rapidly developed into a true child of the south, not only in the characteristics of her genius, but in respect to her tastes, her modes of living, her manners, and her dress. The Passion Vine was her favorite flower, and when in Cuba, it was the only ornament worn in her hair. She always dressed in white, even to white silk stockings and slippers. Her white raiment, the soft draperies of Spanish lace falling around a very beautiful

form, the transparent sleeves through which were seen her finely rounded arms, the simple cross worn upon her breast, which, as I remember, was her only ornament, all combined to fascinate my childish imagination, and I share the feeling of her niece, Mrs. Parker, who writes, "to my girlish vision she always appeared a being of the most romantic loveliness and grace." I especially liked to go with her to church, at which she was a very constant attendant, and where her earnest and devout behavior during the service always impressed me.

In the spring of 1831, Mrs. Brooks visited Robert Southey in his home at Keswick, and it was under his patronage and through his warm interest that her poem of Zophiël was first published entire. Colonel Brooks speaking of this visit to England, says: "She was there introduced to LaFayette who was so pleased with her that he urged to know if he could be of any service to her. 'Yes,' said she, 'you can get my son into West Point.' Upon this LaFayette wrote to Bernard, our then Chief Engineer, and the appointment of a cadet came to me."

Very little is known of the personal history of Mrs. Brooks. Her son writing in 1872 to one who was very desirous to learn fuller particulars and incidents of her life than had been given to the world, says: "I have no papers of my mother's near me, nor can I at present get at them. \* \* \* When I was in Cuba in 1846, the little dilapidated temple (built to gratify my mother by her brother) on the San Patricio coffee estate, in which most of Zophiël was written, was still standing, also a monument—a granite base surmounted by a marble cross—at Limonal, not far from Matanzas, erected by me, at mother's request, over my two brothers. There is her restingplace by their side. I cut her name upon the marble with my own hand, to correspond with the inscription which mother placed over her sons."

And later, Colonel Brooks writes to this same correspondent: "The little temple was built in 1825. \* \* \* It stood at the end of a beautiful avenue, four rows deep of palms, interspersed with orange trees and many other tropical plants. It was a charming spot and illustrates mother's admiration of the picturesque. Whatever charm there may be in Zophiël, and whatever talent it may portray, much undoubtedly is due to the surroundings of the miniature temple where the poem was imagined and its verse constructed by a nature as passionate as the name of the flower would indicate which she always wore in her hair, the only simple adornment of naturally thick and beautiful tresses."

It was in this pretty Grecian temple at Cafetal Hermita, which, with

the exception of her visit to England and her brief residence at West Point, had been her home for twenty years, that the spirit of this gifted poetess and lovely woman passed away, about the year 1845.\*

# V.

# CAMPTOWN.

It is a little singular that this portion of the Post should have derived its name from the poorest, and, in some respects, perhaps, the most "no-account" person who ever lived in it. Having heard much of Camp's house and Camptown, in my childhood, I had always supposed that the proprietor was a man of substance who had, in those easy-going times, been permitted to purchase property of the Government, and had built his house thereon.

I was, therefore, greatly surprised and amused when I heard the true story of Camp, which is as follows:

A poor but worthy Bermudan girl, who had been brought up by a New York lady residing in the West Indies and who subsequently accompanied this lady to the States, had become acquainted with Mrs. Cox when the latter was living in New York, before her removal to West Point. This girl married, and shortly after became a widow. Finally by that mysterious influence which so often leads a bright and clever woman to link her fate with that of a "ne'er do weel," she married William Camp. He was exceedingly poor, and whether because of his wife's acquaintance with Mrs. Cox, or from some other unexplained leading, he came to West Point in search of employment.

Mr. English, who had then married the widow Cox, gave them shelter for a time, and afterwards persuaded the then sword-master, Mr. Thomas, to let them have an old barn which he possessed, and for which he had no use. Camp and his family moved into it and proceeded to make it in a measure habitable. When Mrs. Davies saw it in 1815 she describes it as little better than a hut, and a very smoky hut at that. Subsequently however it was repaired and put into good condition, and the Camp family lived there until

1829. This dwelling which stood nearly opposite the present Soldier's Hospital, beginning its existence as a barn, converted into a hut, and finally made into a tolerably good house, has given its possessor's name to that locality quite as securely as though the owner had been one of the proud ones of the earth, who, designedly, "call their lands after their own names."

In those early days the site of Camptown was a green meadow in which cows were pastured; in some spots it was low and marshy. The first house which Miss Cox remembers as standing in this meadow in her childhood, (she came to West Point in 1811 when about three years old), was one occupied by a Dr. Watson, the first physician on the Post, and by Dr. Perkins who succeeded him. Afterwards this house was assigned to Pierre Thomas, the sword-master, whose barn as we have seen, became the nucleus of the settlement now called Camptown.

In 1820 Mrs. Morrison who, after her husband's death had come up from Buttermilk Falls, and built a house on the North Dock, removed it to this locality where the family lived for many years. Her son, Stephen Decatur, was born at Highland Falls in the autumn of 1812. On the night of his birth a sloop came up the river bearing the news of Commodore Decatur's victory over the British ship Macedonian near the island of Madeira, and the new-born son was named in honor of the great naval hero of the day and of the country.

Below Mrs. Morrison's house, or rather beyond it, and higher up on the slope, stood the old powder magazine. Mr. Alexander Mearns, whose death occurred in 1885, at the advanced age of ninety-eight, brought the materials for the building of the magazine to West Point in 1807 or 1808.

One day early in September of the former year, Mr. Mearns, then a young man, was on board of a sloop in Rondout Creek, when a negro came, running from the mouth of the creek, in a state of great excitement, declaring that he had seen the devil coming up the river. The object which had so terrified his imagination was Fulton's steamboat, the "Claremont," which on that day made its first trip up the Hudson. It may have been that Mr. Morrison was at that very time engaged in shipping the brick for the powder magazine at West Point.

Beyond the magazine and nearer the river stood some windowless, barn-like buildings used as store-houses. These were five in number. Two small ones between what is now the Engineer Barracks and the Guardhouse, and below these two larger ones, in one of which was kept the chain (then complete) which had been stretched across the river to prevent the ascent of the British.

Subsequently many of the links of this chain were taken away and distributed to various places. Some were given to the headquarters at Newburgh, and all that now remain are the links which surround the big gun at Trophy Point. Other Revolutionary relics stored in these buildings were sold at auction in 1814.

At that time there were three or four old cannon lying on the shore of the river below Camptown, between the present hospital and the commissary building. These were some of the pieces that had been spiked by Arnold, when he was preparing for the surrender of West Point into the hands of the British.

East of the store houses, between the old chestnut trees and the river, stood a yellow frame house used as a hospital. In 1814 the hospital steward and his wife, the matron, were a Mr. and Mrs. Burke, the grand-parents of Miss Mary O'Maher, afterwards Mrs. Quincy A. Gillmore; her father, Mr. Timothy O'Maher, for so many years the faithful and efficient clerk in the Treasurer's office, married a daughter of Hospital Steward Burke. The Burkes after leaving West Point lived for many years at Cold Spring.

With the exception of the few houses above mentioned, Camptown was a smooth green, and beyond it where Logtown now stands was dense woodland.

This last place takes its name from the fact that the quarters first built there for the soldiers were simply log-huts. They were, I believe, eight in number. The name is retained to the present day, although in 1839 frame buildings replaced the log dwellings, and since then these have been enlarged and increased in number, the street widened, and many other improvements effected.

# VI.

## THE CEMETERY.

When Captain Thompson, an old Revolutionary officer, died in 1809, he was buried in a little enclosure on the plain. Here too was interred a young son of Colonel Mansfield's, who died in 1816.

There was for many years at West Point no marked "city of the dead to remind one of generations past." When Mr. E. D. Mansfield came here as a cadet in 1816, he writes: "On the mountain stood old Fort Put, and at its base lay the lonely graves of the Revolution, unknown to the present generation, but which I knew and found beneath the shade of the rocks and cedars. There the trees grew green o'er the homes of the dead who had fought with Washington and Wayne. Old Fort Putnam is the only witness of their burial."

Dr. Vangilder, a physician from New York, who visited West Point very early in the century, alludes to the graves in some very pretty stanzas which were suggested by the ruins of Fort Putnam, then, however, in a much more perfect state of preservation than now.

> "But where are the heroes whose home was once here; When the legions of tyranny ravaged our shore! Who here raised the standard of freedom so dear, And guarded their homes mid the battle's fierce roar.

They sleep in yon vale their rude fortress below. Where darkly the shade of the cedar is spread, And shrill through the valley the mountain winds blow, Where lowly they lie in the sleep of the dead.

The flowers of the forest have brightened that spot. The wild rose has scattered its bloom on the ground, "Where lowly they lie, now forgetting-forgot. Unwaked by the mountain storm thundering around."

As years wore on, bringing with them the usual incidents of mortality, a little spot of earth was assigned for the burial of the dead. It lay a little to the southeast of the present No. 3. There was buried my grandfather Nichols who died in 1817, and there also the children of General Knox.

These remains together with those of Ensign Trant and others interred on the plain, and in various localities, were subsequently removed to the present Cemetery, which was laid out in 1817 on the land known as the German Flats. This name was given to the spot because it had been the site of an encampment of German troops at one period during the war. These soldiers were not of the "hireling Hessian hordes" so detested by the patriots of the Revolution, for the latter fought, I believe, exclusively on the side of the British.

They were probably a detachment of Pennsylvania Germans, or a handful of the "one hundred and fifty thousand German emigrants," who,

Lossing informs us, "were found in the American colonies at the breaking out of the Revolution, and most of whom took sides with the patriots."

It is a singular and pleasing fact, that a wild flower, the Linaria, more commonly known as "Butter and Eggs" and "Snap Dragon," is the only trace which the hated Hessians have left behind them in this country. The seed of this plant was brought over in their forage, and first disseminated in the neighborhood of Philadelphia. Thence it followed the track of the Hessian troops through New Jersey to New York, and after the battle at Fort Montgomery in which they participated, the "Hessian weed," as it was and still is called by the country-people in that region, was found growing on the banks of the Hudson, and has now become one of the commonest of our field-flowers.

But we have wandered far from the Cemetery. To return.—In 1817 Miss Cox attended the first burial there, that of William Burton, the little son of Mr. Oliver Burton and grandson of Mr. Isaac Partridge.

On New Year's day of 1817 a young cadet, Vincent M. Lowe, was sitting on the piazza of the old Thompson house, with the late Professor Davies, chatting, and regaling themselves with a simple lunch of cider and cakes. It was then the custom to fire a salute at noon on New Year's day, and Mr. Lowe was on the detail for that duty. As the hour approached the two friends walked together along the sidewalk, and parted on the spot about where the present No. 25 now stands. A very few minutes later Mr. Davies heard the single discharge of a cannon. Hastening across the plain he found the body of his young friend lying dead upon the ground, killed by the premature discharge of the piece he was preparing to fire.

As no suitable preparations for the interment could be made at West Point, Mr. Davies and a companion went to Newburgh to make the required arrangements. Although the first day of January, the season was so exceedingly mild, that these young gentlemen rowed, without overcoats, in an open boat from West Point to Newburgh. In 1818 the handsome monument in the northeast corner of the cemetery was erected to the memory of Cadet Lowe. Panels were cut in relief on the circular column of the monument, and on these are inscribed the names of many of the cadets who since that date have died at West Point or elsewhere, before graduation.

For many years the Cemetery was sadly neglected, and therefore, notwithstanding the beautiful location it was not an attractive spot. The entrance to it for many years lay through the cadet's garden, and the graves were overgrown with tangled grass, burdocks and thistles. About

the year 1839 or 1840 the pathway through the cadet's garden was abandoned, and a good road constructed. Subsequently under General Delafield, the fine stone wall and handsome iron gateway were added.

It was not however until after the war, during the administration of General Pitcher as Superintendent, and the Quartermastership of Major McCrea, that attention was turned to the care of the graves, and the ornamenting of the grounds with shrubbery and flowers. Since this time it has continued to improve in beauty and attractiveness, until now, although there may be many grander there are few prettier cemeteries than this.

And here in this lovely and secluded spot where lie entombed the honored dead of every rank from Generals Scott, and Anderson, and Thayer, down to the humble grave of old Bentz, the Bugler, we bring to a close our reminiscences of West Point.

Graduates are earnestly requested to point out any errors, and to supply deficieneies in the following Register.
