# Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL'S OFFICE, February 29, 1856.

### To the Honorable CHARLES A. PHELPS, Speaker of the House of Representatives :---

SIR:—I have the honor to transmit through you, to the legislature, my Annual Report of the criminal business of the Commonwealth, for the year 1855, so far as the same is embraced in the official action of the Attorney-General and the prosecuting officers of the several districts.

In transmitting this Report, with the accompanying Abstrac of the Returns made to me by the District-Attorneys, it is m the duty of the Attorney-General to submit to the legislat, "such observations and statements, as in his opinion the criminal jurisprudence, and the proper and economical administration of the criminal law shall warrant and require."

In compliance with this requirement of the statute, I deem it my duty to call the attention of the two Houses to the significant fact, disclosed in these Returns, that of the great increase in the criminal business of the Commonwealth which they compel us to contemplate and deplore, a very large proportion has arisen out of the efforts that have been made to enforce the prohibitory liquor laws of 1852 and 1855, in th several counties of the State. Of the unprecedentedly larg number of cases which have been carried from the Court c Common Pleas, and the Municipal Court of Boston, to th

...cial Court, upon bills of exceptions, and motions cress of judgment, and which have been argued by the orney-General, nearly two-thirds have grown out of prosecuons for alleged violations of the provisions of these statutes. )f the whole number of offences embraced in the Returns of e District-Attorneys, making a total of five thousand one huned and fifty-one, more than two thousand, or nearly a moiety all the criminal prosecutions for the year, . ch have ched the Court of Common Pleas and the Municipal Court, of the same class. Of a total of one hundred and eight asand dollars of taxed costs, embraced in these Returns, e than thirty-seven thousand dollars have been expended n these prosecutions. These statistics, however, it should added, furnish a very inadequate view of the expense to the Commonwealth, arising out of the efforts on the part of the public officers to enforce these laws. Probably a much larger sum than this has been taxed in the several Police Courts, and by Justices of the Peace, before whom prosecutions have been final; and in addition to these, large drafts have been made upon the treasury to indemnify officers in the various counties, who had acted under the seizure clauses of the law of 1852, since adjudged unconstitutional by the Supreme Judicial Court.

In view of these facts, it is worthy of the serious consideration of the legislature, whether the results of these prosecuons, either in their reformatory, disciplinary or punitive pects, have been at all commensurate with the means and the achinery which have been found necessary to be applied to them, in the existing state of public sentiment on this subject. My own deliberate judgment is that it has proved an expensive failure; and that new legislation is required, to meet the enormous evil which these statutes were hopefully designed to remedy. The character of that legislation it is not my province or my purpose to discuss. It is undeniable that the people of Massachusetts are earnestly desirous of doing, through the agency of the law, all that it is practicable for government to do, by wise and considerate legislation, to arrest the progress of intemperance. But a system which utterly fails to accomplish this beneficent purpose, while it adds in so large a measure to the public burdens, cannot, with an intelligent and practical people, be a permanent or a satisfactory one.

At the last session of the legislature a bill passed the House of Representatives, but failed in the Senate, which a recent decision of the Supreme Judicial Court seems to render important to be again called to the attention of the legislature. By an early decision of that court it was held, that a person committing a larceny in another State of the Union, and being found with the stolen property in his possession in this State. was liable to conviction and punishment for larceny here. A scent case occurred of a larceny committed in the ner hborg Province of Nova Scotia, the perpetrators of which made ir escape with their booty, and sought refuge in this State. ey were prosecuted and found guilty by the jury, but the dict was set aside, and the prisoners discharged, by the preme Judicial Court, upon the ground that the existing w did not extend to, and cover, the case of a larceny originally amitted beyond the limits of the United States. As it was and that the international treaty with Great Britain, for the tradition of fugitives from justice, did not reach the case. ese felons obtained entire impunity, by making Massachusetts e depot of their stolen goods, and converting our territory to a modern Alsatia for fugitive criminals. 'The courts of me of our sister States,-Vermont, for example,-have held contrary doctrine, and applied to the neighboring British rovinces the same rule that obtains with us respecting the inited States. New York has done the same, by legislation and the bill before referred to was designed to meet and remed the mischief which may grow out of the decision in this cas when it shall become known that the criminals of a fore; jurisdiction can find impunity for themselves, and protee for their plunder within our borders.

The diversified duties which attach to the office of Att/ General, and the very great increase of his labors from y year, arising out of the extended business of the Con. wealth in all its departments, make it proper that I should the attention of the legislature to the necessity of some leg lation respecting this office. I prefer to do this frankly, throu this medium, rather than to resort to the solicitation of t support of individual members of the legislature to sor specific measure of relief; not only because I regard it as morfitting to the relation which I hold to the two Houses, but

because the Commonwealth is more interested in the matter than any individual incumbent of the office can be.

In addition to the criminal business which requires the services of the Attorney-General, the accompanying schedule of cases conducted and argued by him, will show that important civil causes are confided to his management in the courts. Among those now pending is the Bill in Equity, to determine the boundary between Massachusetts and Rhode Island, in the Suprine Court at Washington. His labors in this cause a performed without any compensation additional to his sala under the existing law, although, in the general increase the salaries of the public officers, his has remained as it originally established. Indeed, the present rate of compe. tion presents the somewhat anomalous proportion, between salaries of the Attorney-General and the County-Attorney Suffolk, of the former being five hundred dollars less than latter; while the one has no duties out of his own county, : the other incurs a large amount of travelling expenses,-al which, within the State, are paid out of his salary. The s vices of the County-Attorney, constant and laborious beyc those of almost any public officer, are cheaply obtained by Commonwealth at the salary which attaches to his office. I the duties of the Attorney-General are so various, that presence is often required at the same time in different cou ties; and the calls upon him for written opinions, consult tions and advice, by the several departments of the governnent, committees of the legislature and public officers, render indispensable that he should be authorized, as exigencies w require, to employ such assistance, professional and cleri as the public interests demand. At the last session of the lature a Resolve passed the House of Representatives, rizing him to employ such clerical assistance as the tch of the public business in his office might require. t it was amended in the Senate by inserting a limitation of he annual expense of such assistance to the sum of two hunred dollars. This limitation, it is obvious, rendered the proision practically of little value. I respectfully submit, that in , matter of this nature, a certain degree of confidence must be reposed in the discretion of such an officer, and that his judgment and character can safely be relied upon, that it will
