REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

WILLIAM MARSH RICE UNIVERSITY
HOUSTON, TEXAS

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To the Board of Governors and Friends of Rice University

This report covers the three fiscal years ending June 30, 1969, 1970, and 1971.

Dr. Kenneth S. Pitzer announced his resignation as President of Rice University on August 22, 1968 to become President of Stanford University effective December 1, 1968.

The University's Board of Governors immediately appointed an Executive Committee with full authority to handle administrative matters pending the selection of a new president. Dr. W. E. Gordon, Dean of Science and Engineering and Professor of Electrical Engineering and Space Science became Chairman of the Executive Committee. Other members included: Dr. Carey Croneis, Chancellor and Harry C. Wiess Professor of Geology; Dr. Virgil W. Topazio, Dean of Humanities and Social Sciences and Professor of French; and Dr. James R. Sims, Professor of Civil Engineering and Campus Business Manager.

On March 20, 1969, the Board of Governors appointed Dr. Frank E. Vandiver, Harris Masterson, Jr. Professor of History and Chairman of the History Department, as Acting President. The Board also created four vice presidencies for the University's top administrative structure. They were Drs. Gordon, Topazio, Sims, and Alan J. Chapman, Professor of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering, who became Vice President for Administration.

On April 17, 1970, the Board of Governors announced my acceptance of the presidency, effective September 1, 1970.

**NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
June 30, 1971**

- (1) The statement of assets and liabilities does not include the assets (campus land, buildings and improvements, and other educational property), of the educational plant funds totaling \$67,705,640.
- (2) Educational and general income for 1971 does not include net gain on sale of investments (\$2,009,903), net receipts from certain oil and gas properties (\$2,654,661), gifts and bequests (\$4,059,495), and other receipts (\$475,839) not available for current fund purposes. Such receipts are added to the appropriate fund principal.
- (3) As a result of reorganization of the University's development department, a policy was adopted in 1971 of soliciting sustaining gifts from Alumni and others on a June 30 fiscal year basis. This policy had the effect of deferring to fiscal year 1972, \$436,060 of gifts received prior to June 30, 1971, which otherwise would have been reflected as 1971 current fund income.

Students in the Classes of '69, '70 and '71 continued the fine record of earlier classes in obtaining graduate fellowships and awards. 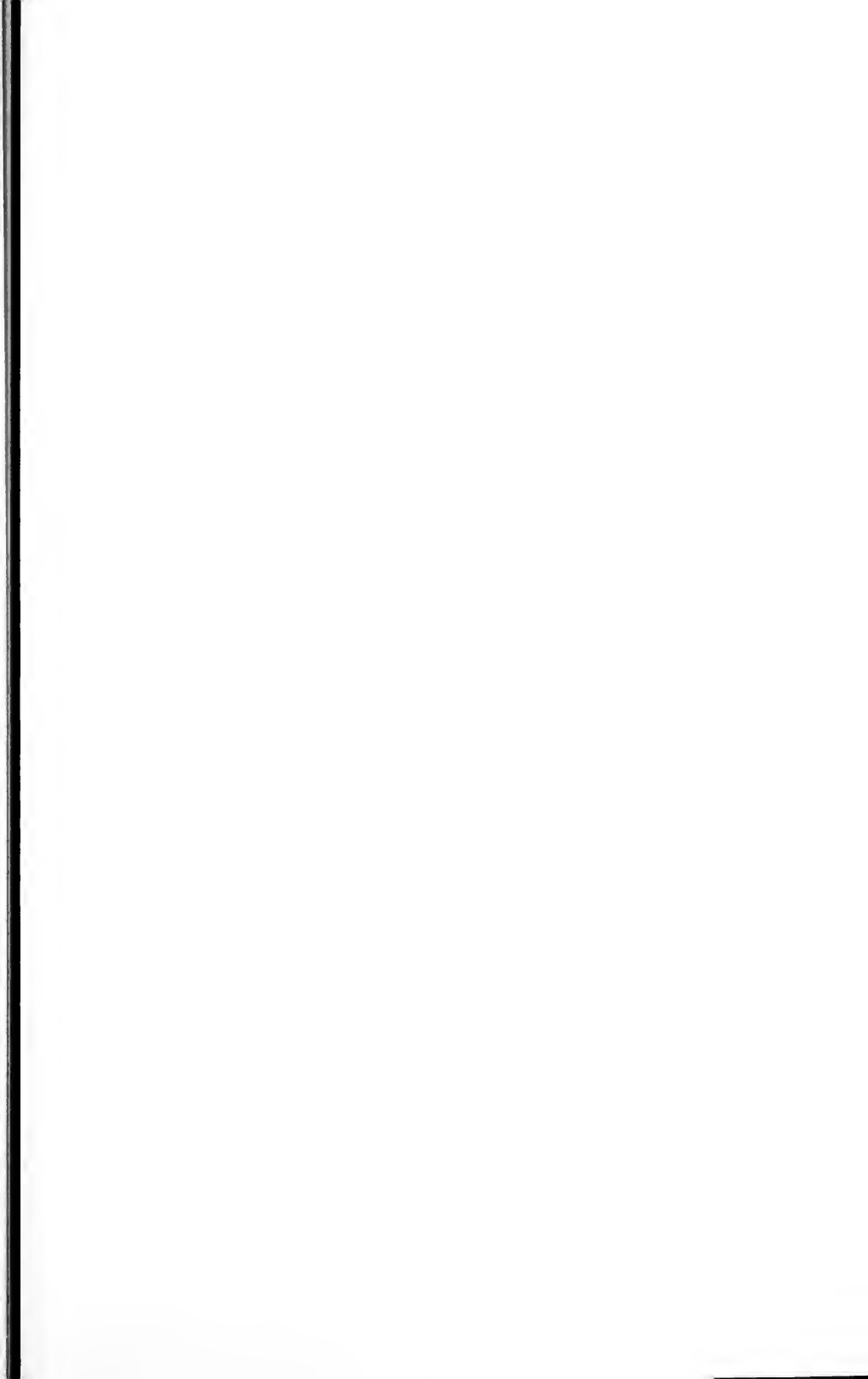
