Saint Monica's Home

In presenting this report of the twentieth year of St. Monica's Home, gratitude should be expressed to the many friends who have by their generosity enabled certain necessary alterations and additions to be made in the house, greatly facilitating the work and adding materially to the comfort and well being of the patients, this being especially true of the Tuberculosis Ward with its new bathroom, added beds and fitted up piazza, making it possible for the patients to sleep out of doors nearly the whole season. As a result of this, two patients, after remaining six months, have been sent out practically well and able again to go to work. The Boston Consumptive Hospital has been glad to send its colored women patients to the Home, and its physicians have expressed themselves as well pleased with the accomodations which, though only on a small scale, are homelike and effective. The grant which is given by them in board money is a real help in meeting the monthly bills, which these cases make necessarily heavy.

Hearty thanks should be expressed to the two colored societies, St. Monica's Relief Association, for the establishment of the "Leonard H. Grimes Fund" which provides annually for "A Day's Support", and to St. Monica's Sewing Circle for valuable assistance at the Fair ; also to the Needlework Guilds of Boston and Jamaica Plain, the Boston Sewing Circle, the Ladies' Aid of All Souls' Unitarian Church, Roxbury, St. Agnes' Guild of the Church of the Advent, and St. Barnabas Bees, to Dr. Dixwell and his Hospital Concert Band, the Boston Elevated Road, and Young Men's Christian Union, all of whom have assisted the Home in various ways. Through the Rev. Dr. Mann's kindly interest the children of Trinity Church gave a liberal donation for renovating the Children's Ward, and a beautiful picture for the room.

As will be noticed by a glance at the financial statement, the expenses have increased by \$1,802.84, and this is due, first, to the necessity for the extensive repairs and alterations, and second, to the fact that for the first time since the work began, the summer household was as large as during the winter months, and consequently the bills were correspond-

ingly heavy. A very successful "Musicale" under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Association was given in the spring, the proceeds of which paid the repair bills, and the annual sale in November, at which were realized about \$900.00, enabled all debts to be paid, and the year's account to be closed with a small balance, but the mortgage of \$5,750.00, with something less than \$200.00 in the treasury for that object, is quite a burden. If an assured income of \$6,000.00 could be secured by annual subscriptions or donations, then all proceeds from fairs, entertainments or bequests could be used for the mortgage fund.

About fifty subscribers to "A Day's Support Fund ", at \$10.00 each, have been obtained, but there are still many days unappropriated, and it is hoped that others may select a vacant day and make it theirs as a Memorial or a Thanksgiving. The financial stringency has lost us several annual subscribers (we hope only temporarily), but has been sufficient to make us feel a certain anxiety for the future. The great need for the coming year is that the annual subscription list should increase, and that those interested in our work should be willing to help us by gifts, either for the endowment or mortgage funds.

When it is considered that St. Monica's Home is the only hospital which accepts the cases of the Negro race exclusively, and that a large part of the work is done by the Sisters of St. Margaret absolutely without compensaion, will not the generous public of Boston contribute a sufficient sum to give the Home an assured income, and relieve the Managers and the Sisters of the anxiety and uncertainty as to the means of support from year to year.

We extend our grateful thanks to Dr. Kidner and his assistants who have been unfailing in their care and attention to the patients at all times.

A year ago, we, the undersigned, undertook the medical charge of St. Monica's Home, vice Drs. Mosher, Young, and Butler, resigned. Under ordinary conditions, we have made two regular weekly visits at the Home. In case of severe or acute illness more frequent visits have been made.

In the last few years the character of the cases treated has markedly changed. Formerly a large majority of the patients were feeble old women who needed comparatively little medical supervision. Of late, however, there have been steadily increasing numbers of patients suffering from tuberculosis in its various forms and stages. There have been also a number of heart, kidney, and rheumatic cases, which have required much attention. The development of the Home's activities along these lines has immensely enhanced the value of its work; for the reason that there are almost no other places where poor colored women, suffering from such severe but chronic illnesses, can be taken in and treated.

The large ward, which can be opened wide to the fresh air on three sides, is an ideal place for the treatment of consumptives. It, with the large covered deck, allowing patients actually to sleep out of doors, has been constantly used to its fullest capacity. The results obtained, considering the advanced stages of the disease in which many patients were received, have been most satisfactory.

Our thanks are due to Dr. M. H. Rogers, who has seen and pre-

scribed for several orthopedic cases, to Dr. George Waterman, who has given his advice on a baffling nerve case, and to Dr. Wohlbach, who undertook the pathological research involved in this case. We also wish to thank the staff of the Home for their kindly and efficient co-operation with us.

Old Colony Trust Company, of Boston, Massachusetts, hereby agrees to receive payment of subscriptions, donations, bequests and devises of money, securities or land for the benefit of St. Monica's Home for Sick Colored Women and Children, a charitable association conducted under the auspices of St. Margaret's Sisters of the Protestant Episcopal Church. All such payments, donations, bequests and devises received are to be held by it as a fund to be known as the St. Monica's Home Fund, and upon the following trusts, subject to such modifications satisfactory to it as may be rendered necessary by the stipulations of individual subscriptions, donations, bequests and devises:

I. To hold and manage the principal of said fund perpetually, and to invest and reinvest the same with full power to sell the same or any part thereof, or to alter or change investments at any time and from time to time.

2. To pay the net income of said fund as constituted from time to time by quarterly payments to the Treasurer of said Home. In determining who is at any time Treasurer of said Home said Trust Company may rely upon the statement of any officer of said St. Margaret's Sisters.

3. In case at any time said Home is discontinued, or in case for any reason the trusts above defined cannot be carried into effect, the income of said fund is to be thereafter applied or paid by said Trust Company to some similar charity carried on within the Diocese of Massachusetts of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and chosen by the Society of St. Margaret, a corporation organized under the laws of Massachusetts, and approved in writing by the officers of the St. Monica's Ladies' Aid Committee, as now constituted, or its successor, if any.
