INAUGURAL EXERCISES.

Symphony Hall, Boston, Mass.,

Monday, January 6, 1964.

The ceremonies attending the inauguration of Mayor-elect John Frederick Collins, the City Councillors-elect, and the School Committee members-elect of the City of Boston were held in Symphony Hall, at ten o'clock A.M., when the Mayor-elect, the members-elect of the Council, and the members-elect of the School Committee entered the hall in a procession headed by City Clerk Joseph M. Dunlea and the City Messenger William J. O'Donnell to the strains of an inaugural march, "Coronation March," by Meyerheer. They took seats on the platform, and the meeting was called to order by City Clerk Dunlea, who said:

Ladies and gentlemen, as City Clerk of the City of Boston, I now officially open these inaugural ceremonies. The principal purpose of these exercises is the taking of the oath of office by the Mayor-elect, the members-elect of the City Council, and the members-elect of the School Committee.

It is now my pleasure to introduce Mr. Luigi Vena who will sing "The Star-Spangled Banner."

"The Star-Spangled Banner" was then sung by Mr. Vena.

City Clerk DUNLEA—I now most respectfully present His Eminence, Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston, who will give the invocation.

Richard Cardinal CUSHING—God, our Father, who watches over the destinies of nations and peoples, look down with special favor on our city and its citizens as we mark the beginning of a new period of service for those holding public office. Guide, by the light of Thy grace, the actions of all those upon whom has been placed, in the traditions of our country, the responsibilities of civic leadership and public decision. Let them recall today how from its earliest hours the fortunes of the republic have been entrusted to Thy care and made glorious by Thy blessings.

This year, when we can speak with such special meaning of a New Boston, let us dedicate ourselves in this most resolute manner to put behind us whatever may divide us or bring discord among us; let us fly from every ignoble act or selfish interest which may make barren our efforts for continued progress and ever more effective renewal. Let us recognize together the shining history we share in this "city set upon a hill" and let these years that are ours continue all that was good in the past, and through the realization of our present hopes, leave a legacy of greatness for the citizens of the future.

For all those who take office today, and all those who assist them in whatever capacity, we pray for wisdom in judging the course of men and events, for stout hearts in days of difficult decision, for integrity of spirit against every force of evil, and for that community confidence that makes possible our united common endeavor in the pursuit of the welfare of all our citizens.

Let us not shrink from facing with courage and resolve the problems that must be a part of every great city—whether they are in the economy, in transportation, in housing, in education, in renewal, or wherever else. Let us think especially of the dispossessed and the afflicted, of the poor and the sick, and of all those upon whom the touch of misfortune has in some measure descended. Let no barriers of race or origin, of wealth or neighborhood, separate us from our clear duty in providing the good life for all our people.

May what is begun today go forward in honor and accomplishment so that all of us, and those who follow us, can carry in pride the name of this city and its leaders in public life. In the ancient motto of Boston—"as He was with our fathers, so may God be with us." Amen.

City Clerk DUNLEA—I now most respectfully present Rabbi Roland B. Gittelsohn, Temple Israel, who will offer prayer.

Rabbi GITTELSOHN—Lord of eternity, Thou who dwellest in the outermost reaches of the universe, yet at the same time within the hearts of men, humbly do we thank and praise Thee on this auspicious occasion with words that have been used in the tradition of the Jewish people for centuries:

Praise us, Thou eternal our God, ruling Spirit of the universe, who has granted us life, sustained us and ennobled us to greet this day and to participate in this momentous event.

We pray Thee at this moment, O Lord, for all the people of our city, more especially for him who once more assumes the pre-eminent position of leadership, and for those who have now been installed and inaugurated to uphold his hand. Teach them all and remind them except the Lord build the city they labor in vain that build it; that a community which permits itself to be placed on corruption is destined to destroy itself, and only a community or a city which lives its life in accordance with the highest ideals that come from Thee, O Lord, can possibly endure.

May these men and women elected and inaugurated this day seek not their own vain-glory and gain but the good of all the people. May they resist the temptation to all to hide behind technicalities or quibble over words, and not to have a moment of rest until justice, full and complete justice, has been done to all men of every color, every class, and every creed.

May they remember if those in low places are not secure, those in high places cannot be sure.

May all of us, eternal our God, understand that in a democracy, we must not pass our responsibilities to those men we have elected to leadership, that we must uphold and support them, criticize them when they need criticism, praise them when the merit praise, and each of us accept his own responsibilities as a citizen.

Thus do we pray, O God, Thou wilt establish the working of our hands; yea, the work of our hands establish Thou it. Amen.

City Clerk DUNLEA—It is my pleasure to present The Boston Teachers College Music Club who will sing two selections "Psalm 150" and "The Song of My Land."

City Clerk DUNLEA—I now most respectfully present Reverend Doctor George Tsoumas of the New England Greek Orthodox Diocese, who will give prayer.

Reverend Doctor TSOUMAS—Almighty Triune God, Who in Thy mercy and loving kindness regard the prayers of all who call upon Thee with an open heart, incline Thy ear and hear our prayer humbly offered unto Thee, on this ever-memorable occasion of the inauguration of our beloved Mayor, John Frederick Collins.

We entreat Thee, O Lord, to sanctify his soul; illumine his mind by Thy Holy Spirit; guard him from all dangers; grant him tranquility and steadfastness so that he may like Him build his administration on rock, not on sand. Give him courage to be honest, unafraid, straight-forward, truthful; courage in danger; serenity under strain; strength to do what he ought to do for the benefit of a city that has called him for the second time to its highest office.

Bless also his advisers and associates so that working together with one mind and heart, the John Frederick Collins Administration will be carried forward in the paths of excellence and prosperity until it shall become a model for other cities of our Commonwealth.

This is our prayer. Hear us, answer us, O Lord. For Thou are merciful and compassionate, and to Thee are due glory, honor, and worship, to the Father, and the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS OF HONORABLE JOHN F. COLLINS.

As we gather here this morning to consider what the future holds for our city, our hearts are inevitably and sorely afflicted with sadness—a poignant and sometimes unendurable sadness, engendered by the tragic martyrdom of one of Boston's greatest citizens—our late beloved President, John F. Kennedy.

And on this, the first official occasion of his own city since his departure, it is particularly appropriate that we record our respect, and our admiration for this brave and fallen hero.

John F. Kennedy had the qualities of heart and spirit which mark the anointed among us—calling to mind the noble and courageous knights of the Arthurian legend and the bold and venturesome Crusaders of the Middle Ages. He symbolized men's highest aspirations, and his most courageous response to challenge.

He widened the horizons of all of us, by sharing with us his own perception of man's yearning to fulfill his loftiest dreams.

He had confidence in, and affection for, all humankind. Throughout the world, he brought light, and laughter and happiness into the lives even of those who had good cause to despair. He instilled in all of us a new hope for man—a new belief in man's capacity to broaden his dimensions and to realize his greatest goals.

It was only natural that men and women everywhere responded to him with their love, and it was only natural that a universal cry of anguish went up in response to his death.

Faith in our democratic institutions was an indelible part of his life and of his convictions. He knew well the responsibilities of statecraft involved in the preservation of those institutions, and he personified the principles which must constantly guide the footsteps of those to whom leadership has been entrusted.

Just three years ago this week, in addressing a joint session of our Great and General Court, he devoted himself to an exposition of those responsibilities and principles.

"Of those to whom much is given," he said, "much is required," and for true and conscientious public service he listed these irreducible requirements:—Courage, Judgment, Integrity and Dedication.

My friends, the true memorial to this valiant son of Boston will ever be found in our hearts. But the monument we erect in his memory will consist of how we, too, serve—and what we achieve—in his honor—and true to his example—and in furtherance of his noble objectives.

Let us so dedicate and consecrate ourselves, and, thus inspired, build a truly great and imposing monument of unselfish service to our city, to our state, to our nation, and thereby to all mankind.

To that end, let us pledge to one another our trust, our understanding and our collaboration. Let us especially turn our political swords into plowshares so as well to till the rich soil with which we have been favored, lest through conflict and neglect our good earth turn to dust.

The last four years have been eventful and encouraging for the New Boston. Our accomplishments have been numerous and important, and require no detailed review. Especially noteworthy is our esprit de corps, which is at an all time high. Few cities have had the good fortune to benefit, as has Boston, from the great quality and quantity of the unselfish services rendered by her citizens. Indeed, it may truly be said of thousands of Bostonians, that they have asked, not what their city could do for them, but what they could do for their city.

However, as gratified as we are entitled to feel, we dare not become complacent. We cannot rest on our laurels, for we are on a treadmill, and if we so much as pause to stand still, we lose ground which we may never regain.

The fact is that Boston's problems remain numerous, difficult and urgent, and among the most serious and immediate of these problems are those of transportation, education and taxation.

The further fact is that Boston by herself can do little about these problems, for the key to their solution lies not in her hands, but in the hands of our elected state officials.

And the disheartening fact is that the state government, in recent years, has been grossly inadequate in carrying out its responsibilities, not only to Boston, but to all the cities and towns of our Commonwealth.

If Massachusetts municipalities are accurately described as creatures of the Commonwealth, then they are indeed offspring of an unfeeling parent. And if the cities and towns may be further described as arms of the Legislature, then they are appendages so far removed therefrom that the legislative body has become insensitive to their pain and distress.

For more than a decade Boston and her sister cities and towns have persistently and respectfully called the state's attention to the grave problems of local property tax relief, increased aid to education, and mass transportation.

But—except for a valiant and dedicated minority of senators and representatives, alas, too few in number—their pleas and warnings have been healthily ignored and disregarded—receiving, at best, a modicum of lip service, with the result that legislation of critical importance to Boston and other cities has too often been quietly and quickly buried.

Yet, while the state has been pleading poverty to the needs of local government, it has gone merrily along on the road to its own fiscal disaster, creating new and in many instances unnecessary jobs, handing out frequent or sometime disproportionate salary increases, and in the process drying up financial resources which long ago should have been made available to the cities and towns, which can no longer live on mere promises!

We in Boston have reduced our combined city and county budget 2.7 per cent in the last four years, while the state budget has increased 20.7 per cent!

In the last ten years, the state budget has increased more than 96 per cent, while the Boston budget has increased only 37 per cent—and Boston has achieved this record not only despite increased state assessments, increased MDC assessments and increased MTA assessments, but also despite a 72 per cent rise in school appropriations alone!

And so I say—with all conviction and with all the respect due the honorable members of our state government—the moment of truth is fast arriving—and it is incumbent upon all of us to face the fiscal facts of life, and to take now the steps that we may not have time to take, if we ever reach the moment of desperation.

What is needed is a massive citizens' assault on the minds of our elected state officials, so that they may be made to realize—once and for all—that our state administration and our local administrations are not two competitive systems of government, but integrated parts of a single body politic, elected by, and to serve the needs of, the same citizens of Massachusetts.

I have faith that once this fundamental concept is understood, accepted, and implemented at the state level, then most of our problems will find ready and successful solutions.

The problem of mass transportation is not confined to Boston, and Boston's concern with this subject is not confined to the MTA.

The problem affects each and every inhabitant of the 75 cities and towns making up metropolitan Boston, and the solution must be on a full metropolitan regional basis—not on a local basis, not on a sectionalized basis, and not on a piecemeal basis.

If the Boston & Maine and the New Haven Railroads discontinue commuter transportation to Boston, then 20,000 commuters from the north, northwest, and southwest will join the 10,000 from the South Shore on highways which are already overly congested. There will not be space, and there are no new roads designed for their convenience.

Even if new superhighways were planned for such an onslaught, the automobiles involved would require 10,000 more parking spaces within the City of Boston, in addition to those already needed and planned for. And I may note here that a bill to permit the City of Boston to borrow 20 million dollars for parking garage purposes recently passed the House, only to be unceremoniously interred in the Senate.

But more superhighways—more expressways to motorized traffic jungles—are not the answer in any event.

We have reached the stage where we must realize and accept certain transportation facts—and the time for daydreaming is past.

First, we must accept the fact that the railroads are going out of the commuting business, and nothing we do can keep them in it very long.

Second, we must accept the fact that local mass transportation has become a governmental responsibility, the resolution of which does not lie in higher fares and reduced service, but in a sensible balance of moderate fares and reasonable service, tailored to the travel requirements of all our citizens. We must face up to inevitable deficits, which must be assumed by—and equitably apportioned among—the state itself, and all—I repeat, all—of the municipalities involved.

Third, we must be mature and intelligent enough to understand that this problem must be solved on a metropolitan basis—and cannot be solved on a sectionalized, city by city, or town by town, basis. It requires a collective, collaborative effort for the benefit of, and in the enlightened self-interest of, the entire metropolitan population. Barriers between the states and regions of this nation have always been held unthinkable. Barriers between adjoining cities and towns of metropolitan Boston are sheer and mad self-destruction.

What is required, and required immediately, is a program of MTA rapid transit extensions along available railroad rights of way, so that the population of the entire metropolitan region may be adequately served.

Such a program must be accompanied by an administrative structure that gives effective representation and authority to those cities and towns that receive the transit services and help pay for their cost.

It must also be accompanied by a financial plan involving direct state participation, so as to untie the combined knots of sectionalism, confusion and inertia, and to replace chaos with order and progress.

The time for studies is past, the time for action is here. There is not "time-out" in this struggle against regional economic strangulation. The transportation clock cannot be adjusted to fit political calendars—this clock runs on, regardless. We cannot permit time to run out on us.

Another area in which the state has been notably deficient is in the field of aid to local education.

I am sure I do not need to explain or emphasize to any of you the necessity and importance of increased and improved educational facilities and professional services.

The decline in Boston's public school enrollment has been reversed. From 90,000 in 1960, the enrollment is now nearly 95,000, and will grow to 106,000 in 1970.

The problems of replacing superannuated buildings, and providing increased facilities, unfortunately face us at the very time when we must initiate hold new educational programs for the benefit not only of the culturally disadvantaged child and the unusually endowed child, but also to equip and enable all of our pupils to meet the increasingly complex challenges of the world in which we live.

Boston is meeting the need for new facilities in its recently launched multimillion dollar school construction program.

And Boston is facing the requirements for educational innovations through new reading, counseling, and work-study programs.

But imposing buildings will fail us—and experimental programs will founder—unless we have talented teachers.

The cost of attracting and paying for the best teachers is constantly rising, and will predictably rise each year. The amount of this essential and unavoidable expense is simply beyond the financial capacity of Boston's taxpayers alone, that is, unaided by more generous state allotments for educational purposes.

Traditionally the people of Massachusetts have stood for the highest and the best in education, as in all other cultural areas. But the state government of Massachusetts has been among the most laggard in furnishing aid for educational purposes. Massachusetts has the dubious distinction of being 46th among all the states of the nation in aid for local education. It has been estimated that the Commonwealth contributes only 8 percent of Boston's school operating costs, as com-

pared with the average contribution to all other Massachusetts municipalities of 20 percent, while the national average is 40 percent.

The time has arrived for the state to undertake its fair share of the cost of educating our young and also to correct the discrimination in this regard between Boston and the other cities and towns of the Commonwealth.

For four consecutive years we have succeeded in lowering Boston's tax rate, despite a reduced tax base, increased state assessments, and unavoidable increases in school appropriations. This we accomplished through numerous budgetary economies, accelerated collection procedures, and increased departmental efficiency.

At the same time, we reduced our public debt, got urban renewal off to a significant start, and helped stimulate a billion dollar building boom, which is improving the facade of Boston and creating more jobs for her citizens.

I had hoped to be able to assure you today that 1964 would see a fifth consecutive decrease in our tax rate—but I must in candor, and with great personal disappointment state that the prospects even of holding our rate are gloomy and unfavorable.

The answer is that holding our finger in the dike can be only partially successful, because the State, the MDC, and the MTA are always pouring more water into the dam. And we lack both the power to control the flow, and the resources within which to contain it.

Indeed it is fortunate that we converted cash deficit four years ago into a cash surplus of \$6,000,000 today—otherwise the situation would be even more discouraging.

We are faced immediately with increased State and MDC assessments of \$2,000,000 and an increased MTA assessment of one and one half million dollars. Welfare and veterans services costs beyond our control will increase two and one half million dollars. Not including proposed 1964 salary increases, school costs will rise some three million dollars.

In this situation, the Commonwealth's blithe indifference to our problems is, I assure you, neither comforting nor assuring.

The root of the problem is that the state has failed the cities and towns, by refusing to give them the wherewithal to meet their own costs, let alone the additional expenses imposed upon them by the state.

The principal source of local tax revenue is the property tax—and this is continually being eroded by new tax exemptions created by the Legislature.

The state income tax was established on the main premise that its proceeds would be distributed almost wholly to the cities and towns. Yet today, the state retains 60 percent, and only 40 percent goes to local government.

And the state even deducts its school contribution grant from this 40 percent distribution to the municipalities.

To add consternation to our disappointment, the local communities forced to finance the state's own share of costs of welfare, vocational education, and veterans' benefits are forced to wait anywhere from three to twenty-seven months for reimbursement by the state.

We in Boston shall nevertheless make every effort to hold the line—using our free cash, a moderate but significant increase in new valuations through new construction, and an increase in departmental receipts—but it presently seems impossible to avoid an increase in the 1964 Boston tax rate.

The callous indifference of the state government to the problems of Boston and other local taxpayers is only underlined—when we consider how beneficial to the Commonwealth, as well as to Boston, have been our decreased tax rates of the last four years—which have served to attract new investors, to stimulate a major building boom, and to create thousands of new jobs.

For at least a decade, the state leadership has acknowledged that a new source of income is required, for the relief of homeowners and other real estate taxpayers. But always

the matter is referred to "next year." Well, "next year" is never going to come, and the time to act is this year and here and now.

The combined talents of our state government must now be equal both to the recognition of the task and to the task itself. I firmly believe that our elected state officials have the capacity that is required. But they must also show the courage necessary to the task. The exercises of that courage will be warmly applauded, as well as appreciated—by every citizen of Massachusetts.

While Boston's problems are severe, our difficulties are outmatched by our prospects—and our discouragement is overcome by our determination.

We have come a long way, and we are determined to go all the way. The past four years have proved that there is nothing that the people of Boston cannot do, if they will to do it—and they have so willed.

Among other matters, the people of Boston are determined that the improvement and perfection of their community relations shall not be hindered or prevented by thoughtless attitudes on the part of any protagonist.

Boston has always been and will always be a bastion of democracy and a fortress protecting human rights everywhere. History proves that and will prove it again.

The people of Boston have a passion for social justice, but they have learned long ago that the use of reason and moderation is not inconsistent with, but indeed essential to, the attainment of our social objectives.

I say to all concerned that we must ever remember that intemperate and impulsive attitudes are no antidote for the poisons of bigotry, intolerance, and misunderstanding; and that problems of human relations are not best solved in the flaming cauldron of emotional stress.

This is a good city, made up of good people, who know that hatred and malice go with cowardice, while good will and understanding go with courage. We have mutual problems today—we will work them out together, as one mature and united community, striving and working together, with our minds as well as our hearts, to achieve welcome and successful solutions, in the context and atmosphere of our mutual trust, mutual understanding, and mutual affection.

However significant the inauguration of a Mayor of Boston may be as an official event, it is yet only an incident to be noted in the chronology of our city.

What is important is not the incident of our induction, but the enduring record of our performance.

And so I say to my colleagues the honorable members of our new City Council and of our new School Committee—let our record be one of honor and honorable achievement—let the judgment of history be less one of acclaim than of approval.

Let us join together and with the people of Boston in further strengthening the resources of our beloved city, both physical and spiritual, so that Boston may enduringly remain one of the greatest and proudest cities of our great nation.

And in carrying out our trust, let us ever be mindful of these words written by our late President in his last hours:

"The righteousness of our cause must always underlie our strength, for as was written long ago, 'except the Lord guard the city, the guard watches in vain.'"

(Prolonged applause.)

City Clerk DUNLEA—I now most respectfully present Reverend Frederick M. Meek, D.D., of the Old South Church, who will deliver benediction.

Reverend Frederick M. Meek—Almighty God, without whose sustaining strength no good cause and no high intent proposed by men can prosper or endure, in the closing moments of this occasion so meaningful in the life of Boston, we ask your blessing on this city where a noble past and a creative future are joined uniquely upon its leadership, especially upon this man, John Collins, who shall guide its destinies in the days ahead, and upon all its people as they share each common lot. To

this end may grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father, from Jesus Christ, the Son, and from God's Holy Spirit abide with you always. Amen.

City Clerk DUNLEA—These exercises will now close with the playing of the "Knights-bridge March."

The "Knightsbridge March" was played as the Mayor and his suite left the stage at 11.15 A.M.

Immediately following the inaugural ceremonies, Assistant City Clerk and Justice of the Peace Frederic J. O'Donnell, administered the oath of office to Councillor-elect John E. Kerrigan at the latter's home.

First meeting of the City Council of 1964 held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, at 11.30 A.M., Councillor Craven, senior member, presiding. Absent, Councillor Kerrigan.

The Right Reverend Christopher P. Griffin, chaplain of the City Council, was escorted to the rostrum.

INVOCATION BY THE RIGHT REVEREND CHRISTOPHER P. GRIFFIN.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Under the benign dispositions of Thy divine providence, O God, we gather in this venerable chamber in the high adventure of public service. We acknowledge openly and unafraid Thy majestic sovereignty, God of our fathers. Reverently we invoke Thy richest blessing upon the city and its Mayor and Councillors. This is the city of my birth, and the city of my love, may it be a blessed and happy place where democracy is achieved without hatred, where the majority is without tyranny, and the minority without fear, and we live together in peace and mutual understanding. May these Thy servants, councillors, by the grace of God and favor of a sovereign people meet Thy high demands of this office with wisdom, with zeal, prudence, honor, and courage. Resolved, That the members of the Boston City Council of the City of Boston, here assembled, go on record as endorsing the efforts and stand of the National Association of Government Employees who have formed Save the Boston Naval Shipyard Committee and that this City Council do all in its power to prevent the Department of Defense in Washington from closing, curtailing or negating the purpose and future of the Boston Naval Shipyard; and we further

Resolve, That this resolution be presented to the Massachusetts Congressional Delegation on January 6, 1964, in Boston, Mass., concerning the Boston Naval Shipyard.

AGREEMENT FOR ACQUISITION AND INSTALLATION OF PARKING METERS.

Gentlemen:

I am submitting herewith an amended order for authorization by the Traffic and Parking Department to purchase new parking meters.

In my opinion, the city should in purchasing and installing new meters take advantage of the provisions of section 22A, chapter 40 of the General Laws, whereby meters may be purchased and paid for out of current parking meter receipts for a period not exceeding five years without appropriation by the city.

I respectfully recommend the adoption of this amended order by your Honorable Body for a sum not to exceed \$650,000 as estimated in a letter from the Traffic and Parking Commissioner dated December 20, 1963, transmitted herewith for consideration by your Honorable Body.

Dear Sir:

In a letter to you dated April 13, 1963, it was requested that the permission of the City Council be obtained for the acquisition of 6,500 parking meters to replace the ten-cent meters that were being continuously vandalized. At that time it was felt that we should not replace the five-cent meters inasmuch as they

had not been vandalized sufficiently to request a replacement of them.

Since that time all of our meters have been vandalized to the point where it is imperative that all meters be replaced by vandal-proof meters. Experiences both by this department and by other cities have proven that this is the best solution available to control vandalism.

Our loss of revenue plus damages to the meters will amount to approximately \$500,000 for the year 1963. Although many arrests have been made by the Boston Police Department it is expected that this vandalism will continue. Only about half the meters are functioning properly and in the near future practically all of them will be out of order.

In view of the foregoing it is respectfully requested that the original request made to the City Council be withdrawn and that a new order be submitted to the Boston City Council for the acquisition of 10,000 parking meters to replace the present meters and also to add new installations where necessary and to pay for same from the item "Parking Meter Fees."

It is estimated that the cost will not exceed the sum of \$650,000. No cash outlay will be required inasmuch as it is possible to pay for the meters over a period of five years from the revenue received from the meters. This would mean a payment each year of approximately \$130,000 from the revenue received from the meters for this five-year period.

Dear Sir:

In order to provide for the financing of the operation of the municipal government during the fiscal year 1964, it is necessary to submit to the City Council at an early meeting an order authorizing the issuance as needed during the year of temporary loans in anticipation of revenue receipts. This method of financing is made necessary by the fact that under the Massachusetts municipal tax calendar, the major portion of the city's revenue receipts is received late in the year.

By authority of section 4 of chapter 44 of the General Laws, the city could issue in 1964 in anticipation of revenue receipts temporary loans which would not exceed, in the aggregate, the total tax levy of the fiscal year 1963 together with the corporation and income tax distributions received from the Common-

wealth in the same year. This would total \$156,671,883.59. In 1963, a total of \$35,000,000 was authorized by the City Council and approved by the Mayor. During the year it was necessary to issue \$30,000,000. At the present time it appears that the 1964 requirements for this type of financing will be \$40,000,000.

I respectfully recommend therefore that an order in the amount of \$40,000,000 be submitted to the City Council for consideration and adoption.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING FILING OF AN APPLICATION FOR STATE URBAN RENEWAL ASSISTANCE GRANT BY THE BOSTON REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY NEW YORK STREETS PROJECT, UR MASS. 2-1.

Resolved:

Section 1. The following-described area in the municipality of Boston was previously declared to be a substandard and decadent area and was a land assembly and redevelopment area within the land assembly and redevelopment laws of the Commonwealth.

The project boundary starts at the intersection of the center lines of Dover and Albany streets and runs in a westerly direction

along the center line of Dover street to the intersection of the center lines of Dover street and Harrison avenue; thence in a northerly direction along the center line of Harrison avenue to the center line of Dover street, between Harrison avenue and Washington street; thence along the center line of Dover street in a westerly direction to its intersection with the center line of Washington street; thence in a northerly direction along the center line of Washington street to the intersection of the center line of Washington street and the southerly side of the retaining wall on the south side of the South End Cut which is used by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company; thence along the southerly side of said retaining wall in an easterly direction to its intersection with the center line of Albany street; thence in a southerly direction along the center line of Albany street to the point of origin of the boundary line.

Section 2. The existence of said area was impairing and arresting the sound growth and development of the municipality and was inimical to the public health, safety, morals and welfare of the inhabitants thereof and of the Commonwealth.

Section 3. The municipality has undertaken a land assembly and redevelopment project in said area, hereinafter called Project West End, UR Mass. 2-3, under and pursuant to the federal housing act of 1949, as amended.

Section 4. The development of the project was essential to the sound growth and development of the municipality and to the welfare of the inhabitants thereof.

Section 5. It is necessary and in the public interest that the municipality avail itself of the Urban Renewal Assistance Grant provided by the land assembly and redevelopment or urban renewal laws of the Commonwealth for the purpose of carrying out and financing the project.

Section 6. The municipality hereby expresses its intent and recognizes its responsibility to do whatever is necessary or appropriate to carry out the project.

Section 7. The Boston Redevelopment Authority is hereby authorized and directed to file an application, in the form of application prescribed by the Division of Urban and Industrial Renewal of the State Housing Board, for a State Urban Renewal Assistance Grant for the project in a total amount not to exceed \$2,736,485 which sum represents the Commonwealth's responsibility for this project, namely one half of the municipality's contributions, said sum to be paid on an annual basis, each such annual payment not to exceed one twentieth of the total liability of the Commonwealth for its share of such project.

RULES OF CITY COUNCIL.

Coun. FOLEY, for the Committee to Prepare and Report Rules, for the City Council for the years 1964 and 1965, submitted the following:

The committee appointed to prepare and report rules to govern the proceedings of the City Council for the years 1964 and 1965 respectfully submits and recommends for adoption the accompanying draft of rules as governed by the City Council for the years 1962 and 1963, with the exception of the following changes:

Rule 25, Clause 12, to strike out the words "and Recreation" where they first appear.

Rule 25, Clause 14, to strike out the words "Redevelopment, Rehabilitation and" where they first appear.

The rules reported were as follows:

**RULES OF THE CITY COUNCIL.
1964-1965.**

RULE 1. Unless otherwise ordered from time to time, and except on holidays, the regular meeting of the city council shall be held on every Monday at two o'clock P.M. Special meetings may be called by the president at his discretion, and by the city clerk for the purpose only of drawing jurors. No special meeting of the city council, except to draw jurors, shall be called, except with the consent of all the members, upon less notice than twenty-four hours from the time the notices are mailed or dispatched by special messenger.

QUORUM.

RULE 2. A quorum of the city council shall consist of five members. If, at the time any meeting is called to order, or if, during a meeting, on a vote on the adoption of a motion or order, a roll call shows less than a quorum present, the president may declare a recess of not more than ten minutes, after which time, if a quorum is not present, the meeting shall be adjourned. If, on the question of lack of a quorum a roll call shows less than a quorum present, the president shall declare the meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT.

RULE 3. The president of the council shall take the chair at the hour to which the council shall have adjourned and shall call the members to order, and a quorum being present, shall proceed with the regular order of business. In the absence of the president the senior member by age present shall preside as temporary president, or until a presiding officer is chosen.

RULE 4. The president shall preserve decorum and order, may speak to points of order in preference to other members and shall decide all questions of order, subject to

an appeal. Any member may appeal from the decision of the chair, but no appeal shall be considered unless properly seconded. No other business, except a motion to adjourn or to lay on the table, shall be in order until the question on appeal has been decided.

The question shall be put as follows:

"Shall the decision of the chair stand as the judgment of the council?" The vote shall be by a roll call, and it shall be decided in the affirmative unless a majority of the votes are to the contrary.

The president may, at any time, during debate or otherwise, declare a recess for not more than ten minutes, and such action shall not be subject to appeal, nor shall any motions apply thereto.

RULE 5. The president shall propound all motions in the order in which they are moved, unless the subsequent motion shall be previous in its nature, except that, in naming sums and fixing times, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

RULE 6. The president shall, at the request of any member, make a division of a question when the sense will admit of it.

RULE 7. The president shall, without debate, decide all questions relating to priority of business to be acted upon.

RULE 8. The president shall declare all votes; but if any member doubts a vote, the president shall cause a rising vote to be taken, and, when two members so request, shall cause the vote to be taken or verified by yeas and nays.

RULE 9. The president shall appoint all committees, fill all vacancies therein, and designate the rank of the members thereof.

RULE 10. When the president of the council or the president pro tempore shall desire to vacate the chair he may call any member to it; but such substitution shall not continue beyond an adjournment.

MOTIONS.

RULE 11. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the president shall so direct.

RULE 12. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost shall not preclude amendment, or a motion to strike out and insert.

RULE 13. No motion or proposition of a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

Any motion, order or resolution which in the opinion of the presiding officer does not have a direct bearing on the business of the council shall be referred without debate to the committee on rules and shall not be further considered by the council except upon report by that committee. There shall be no appeal from the decision of the chair hereunder, and this rule shall not be subject to suspension. No motions shall apply, nor shall unanimous consent to speak on the matter so referred be in order.

The committee on rules may report that any motion, order or resolution so referred to it is out of order because not having a direct bearing on the business of the council, and its report shall be a final disposition of the matter, subject to an appeal which shall be governed by the same provisions as those governing appeals from rulings of the presiding officer.

RULE 14. When a petition, order or resolution relates to a subject which may properly be examined and reported upon by an existing committee of the city council, such order or resolution shall, upon presentation, be referred to such committee. When a motion is made to refer any subject, and different committees are proposed, the motions shall be put in the following order:

1. To a standing committee of the council.
2. To a special committee of the council.

Any member offering a motion, order or resolution, which is referred to a committee, shall be given a hearing on the same by the committee before a report is made thereon, provided he so requests at the time of offering the order or before final action by the committee.

If, after thirty days, a matter referred to a committee other than a committee of all the members is not reported upon, it may be recalled by a standing vote of three members of the city council.

If, within thirty days, a matter referred to a committee other than a committee of all the members is not reported upon, it may be recalled by a majority vote of all the members.

If, after sixty days, a matter referred to a committee is not reported upon, any member may recall such matter from the committee, and such matter shall not again be committed to any committee other than the executive committee.

The provisions of this rule shall not apply to matters referred to the rules committee under Rule 13, and such matters shall not be considered except upon report by that committee.

RULE 15. After a motion has been put by the president it shall not be withdrawn except by unanimous consent.

RULE 16. When a question is under debate the following motions only shall be entertained, and shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. The previous question.
4. To close debate at a specified time.
5. To postpone to a day certain.
6. To commit.
7. To amend.
8. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE 17. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, except on an immediate repetition or pending a verification of a vote; and that motion, the motion to lay on the table, the motion to take from the table, and the motion for the previous question, shall be decided without debate.

READINGS.

RULE 18. Every ordinance, order and resolution, unless reported upon by a committee or rejected, shall have two several readings, both of which may take place at the same session unless objection is made, provided, however, that all orders for the expenditure of moneys, unless reported upon by a committee of the council, shall lie over for one week before final action thereon. Whenever the second reading immediately follows the first reading, the document may be read by its title only. All orders releasing rights or easements in or restrictions on land, all orders for the sale of land other than school lands, all appropriations for the purchase of land other than for school purposes, and all loans voted by the city council shall require a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the city council, and shall be passed only after two separate readings and by two separate votes, the second of said readings and votes to be had not less than fourteen days after the first, except in cases in which a shorter period is authorized by law. Any order rescinding an order for any of the foregoing purposes shall require the same number of readings and of votes as was required for the passage of the original order.

RECONSIDERATION.

RULE 19. When a vote has been taken any member may move a reconsideration thereof at the same meeting. Debate on motions to reconsider shall be limited to twenty minutes, and no member shall occupy more than four minutes, but on a vote upon any subsidiary or incidental question, debate shall be limited to ten minutes, and no member shall occupy more than two minutes.

RULE 20. When a motion to reconsider has been decided, that decision shall not be reconsidered, and no question shall be twice reconsidered unless it has been amended after the reconsideration; nor shall any reconsideration be had upon the following motions:

- To adjourn.
- The previous question.
- To lay on the table.
- To take from the table.
- To close debate at a specified time.

A motion to reconsider may be laid on the table or postponed indefinitely, and the effect of such action in either case shall be to defeat the motion to reconsider.

CONDUCT OF MEMBERS.

RULE 21. Every member when about to speak shall rise, address the chair, and wait until he is recognized, and, in speaking, shall refrain from mentioning any other member by name, shall confine himself to the question, shall not use unbecoming, abusive or unparliamentary language, and shall avoid personalities. Any member who, in debate or otherwise, indulges in personalities or makes charges reflecting upon the character of another member, shall make an apology in open session at the meeting at which the offence is committed or at the next succeeding regular meeting, and, failing to do so, shall be named by the president or held in contempt and suspended from further participation in debate until said apology is made.

RULE 22. No member shall speak more than once on a question when another member who has not spoken claims the floor, and no member speaking shall, without his consent, be interrupted by another, except upon a point of order.

RULE 23. No member shall be permitted to vote on any question, or to serve on any committee, where his private right is immediately concerned, distinct from the public interest.

RULE 24. Every member who shall be present when a question is put, unless he is excluded by interest, shall give his vote in the affirmative or negative or shall respond "present," unless the council for special reason shall excuse him from voting.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

RULE 25. The following standing committees of the council, and all other committees, unless specially directed by the council, shall be appointed by the president:

1. A committee, to be known as the Executive Committee, to consist of all the members of the council.

2. A committee on Appropriations and Finance, to consist of all the members of the council, to whom shall be referred such appropriation orders as may be submitted to the council from time to time, and all applications for expenditure which involve a loan.

3. A committee on Claims, to consist of five members of the council, to whom shall be referred all claims against the city arising from the act or neglect of any of its departments. They shall report annually an account of the claims awarded or approved by them, and the amount of money awarded or paid in settlements thereof.

4. A committee on Confirmations, to consist of five members of the council, to whom shall be referred all appointments which are required to be confirmed by the council.

5. A committee on Hospitals, to consist of five members of the council, to whom shall be referred all matters concerning hospitals.

6. A committee on Inspection of Prisons, to consist of five members of the council.

7. A committee on Legislative Matters, to consist of five members of the council, who shall, unless otherwise ordered, appear before the committees of the General Court and represent the interest of the city; provided, said committee shall not appear unless authorized by vote of the city council and shall not, unless directed so to do by the city council, oppose any legislation petitioned for by the preceding city council.

8. A committee on Licenses, to consist of five members of the council, to whom shall be referred all petitions for licenses and permits.

9. A committee on Ordinances, to consist of five members of the council, to whom shall be referred all ordinances or orders concerning ordinances.

10. A committee on Public Housing, to consist of five members of the council, to whom shall be referred all matters concerning public housing.

11. A committee on Public Lands, to consist of five members of the council, to whom shall be referred all matters relating to public lands.

12. A committee on Public Services, to consist of five members of the council, to whom shall be referred all matters concerning public safety, public welfare, public works, parks, playgrounds and recreation.

13. A committee on Rules, to consist of five members of the council, to consider all matters concerning the rules, and to whom shall be referred all resolutions expressing opinions, principles, facts or purposes.

14. A committee on Urban Renewal, to consist of all the members of the council, to whom shall be referred all matters concerning urban redevelopment, rehabilitation and renewal.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

RULE 26. At every regular meeting of the council the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Communications from his honor the mayor.
2. Presentation of petitions, memorials and remonstrances.
3. Reports of city officers, etc.
4. Unfinished business of preceding meetings.
5. Reports of committees.
6. Motions, orders and resolutions.

SPECTATORS.

RULE 27. No person, except a member of the council, shall, at any time, be permitted to occupy the seat, in the council chamber, of any member of the council. The city messenger shall enforce this rule.

RULE 28. No person, excepting officials connected with the city council, and duly assigned reporters of the daily newspapers, shall be allowed in the anterooms or upon the floor of the council chamber while the council is in session. Spectators will be allowed in the gallery of the council chamber when the council is in session, and no one will be admitted to said gallery after the seats are occupied. No demonstrations of approval or disapproval from the spectators shall be permitted, and if such demonstrations are made the gallery will be cleared. The city messenger shall enforce this rule.

BURIAL GROUNDS.

RULE 29. No permission for the use of land for the purpose of burial shall be granted until a public hearing shall have been given by the executive committee of the city council on the application for such permission, after due notice has been given abutters.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

RULE 30. No meeting of any committee shall, without the consent of all the members thereof, be called upon less notice than twenty-four hours from the time the clerk shall have mailed the notices or dispatched them by special messenger, provided, however, that meetings of the executive committee may be held in the recess period of any meeting of the council without such consent or notice. No committee, unless authorized by an order of the city council, shall incur any expense. No committee meetings shall be called later than one hour immediately preceding the time set for any regular meeting of the city council, nor shall any committee remain in session later than the hour named for any such regular meeting.

The clerk of committees shall mail notices of all committee meetings to all the members of the council.

FORM OF VOTES.

RULE 31. In all votes the form of expression shall be "Ordered" for everything by way of command, and the form shall be "Resolved" for everything expressing opinions, principles, facts or purposes.

TRANSFERS.

RULE 32. Every application for an appropriation to be provided for by transfer shall be referred to the executive committee, unless

otherwise ordered, and no such appropriation shall be made until the said committee has reported thereon.

USE OF ROOMS ON COUNCIL FLOOR.

RULE 33. No person except members and officers of the city council and regularly assigned city hall reporters shall be admitted at any time to the president's room, the personal offices of the councillors, executive committee room or council chamber, except when invited on official business or accompanied by a member of the council.

CONFIRMATION OF APPOINTMENTS.

RULE 34. The question of confirming appointments by the mayor shall be decided by a yes and no ballot, if requested by one member or directed by the presiding officer.

AMENDMENT AND SUSPENSION.

RULE 35. The foregoing rules shall not be altered, amended, suspended or repealed at any time, except by the votes of two-thirds of all the members of the city council.

**ORDER FOR LOAN FOR REMODELING,
RECONSTRUCTING, ETC., HOSPITAL
DEPARTMENT BUILDINGS.**

To the City Council.
Gentlemen:

I am submitting herewith a request for authorization to borrow outside the debt limit, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 752 of the Acts of 1963, the sum of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) for remodeling, reconstructing, and making extraordinary improvements and repairs to buildings owned by said city and in the custody of the Board of Trustees in charge of its Hospital Department. A modernization of the physical facilities of the Boston City Hospital commenced with an expenditure of \$2,600,000 under chapter 364 of the Acts of 1955 as supplemented by a further \$3,000,000 under chapter 668 of the Acts of 1958. Much, however, remains to be done.

The Supervisor of Budgets, taking into account the city's current fiscal situation and the long-term value of the improvements involved, came to the conclusion that the City Hospital modernization program could best be continued under a new \$5,000,000 outside-the-debt-limit bond issue, and on December 5, 1962, petitioned the Legislature for the necessary enabling act; but under the rules of the General Court, before the petition could be considered, your Honorable Body had to adopt a resolution approving it, which action was consequently done on June 10, 1963. I agree with the Supervisor of Budgets that such a bond issue is the best method for financing continued improvement of the hospital's physical facilities, therefore, I urge the expeditious adoption of this order by your Honorable Body.

Ordered, That under the provisions of chapter 752 of the Acts of 1963 the City of Boston be, and hereby is, authorized to borrow the sum of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) for remodeling, reconstructing, or making extraordinary improvements or repairs to buildings owned by said city in the custody of the Board of Trustees in charge of its Hospital Department. Such bonds or notes shall bear on their face the words, City of Boston, Extraordinary Repairs Loan, Acts of 1963. LIFE INSURANCE POLICY FOR FIREMEN OR POLICE OFFICERS KILLED IN LINE OF DUTY.

City of Boston,
 Law Department, January 7, 1964.
 To the Honorable the City Council.
 Gentlemen:

This is in response to an order passed December 23, 1963, inquiring as to the steps necessary for the city to purchase a life insurance policy which would pay \$25,000 to the widows and children of Boston's fire fighters and police officers killed in line of duty.

In *Berube v. Selectmen of Edgartown*, 331 Mass. 72, the Supreme Judicial Court said (p. 74): "It is familiar law that municipalities can exercise only such powers as are expressly or impliedly conferred upon them by the Legislature. . . . In the expenditure of

funds raised by taxation this principle applies with special force. . . ." In view of the explicit limitations in G. L., c. 32B, ss. 5 and 11A, a \$25,000 policy is clearly not possible under chapter 32B of the General Laws; and life insurance is not mentioned in G. L., c. 40, s. 5, cl. (1), listing types of insurance for which municipalities may appropriate money. "It is a familiar principle of statutory interpretation that express mention of one matter excludes other similar matters not mentioned." *Spence, Bryson, Inc. v. China Products Co.*, 308 Mass. 81, 88. In my opinion, therefore, before the city may purchase insurance paying \$25,000 to the widows and children of Boston's fire fighters and police officers killed in line of duty, an enabling act must be passed by the Legislature.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMISSION RE PURCHASE OF VANDAL-RESISTANT PARKING METERS.

The following was received:

City of Boston,

 To The Honorable The City Council.

There is currently before you an order to purchase 6,500 vandal-resistant parking meters. The Commission, after making a study of the year-end figures on parking meter revenue loss and meter vandalism, views this as a matter of great urgency. Our study indicates that the mounting wave of vandalism has brought near paralysis to the City's effort to regulate curbside parking in the downtown area. Street after street of continuously vandalized meters attest to the grim fact that the parking meter has ceased to be an instrument of control or a source of revenue in the intown business district.

Parking meter revenue was \$357,000 less in 1963 than in 1962. When the cost of meter parts and repairs is added, the total loss figure approaches the \$500,000 mark.

However, if 1963 was a bad year for parking meter income, then 1964 will be even worse. The 1963 decline was, in the main, a progressive one, starting with a January revenue figure of \$61,700 and ending with a December income of only \$8,400.

The Police Department responded to this situation with a strict crackdown. The 650 arrests for parking meter vandalism made by the Boston police in 1963 were three times the number of such arrests made the previous year. Nevertheless, the vandalism goes on.

The Traffic and Parking Commission has now reached the conclusion that virtually the only meters worth the attention of collectors are the 252 vandal-resistant meters located around the Public Garden, Boston Public Library, and Gainsborough street, as well as those in the suburban areas of the City. The Commission has now stopped trying to either repair meters or, for the most part, to collect revenue from the downtown area.

A striking example of the futility of attempting to keep abreast of meter repairs is found in the case of the 295 meters in the North End parking lot under the Fitzgerald Expressway. In January, 1963, there were 141 repairs made on meters in this lot. In September, this number had grown to 307.

The figures for October, November, and December were 827, 834, and 725 respectively. The number of meter repairs made in January more than doubled in September and increased by about 500 percent in October and November. In other words, during the late months of 1963 each of the 295 meters was repaired, on the average, almost three times per month.

Vandalism has also hit the areas other than downtown, the so-called "suburban" areas. In January, 1963, there was a total of 2,047 meters in these areas; in December, 1963, there were 1,512. More than 25 per cent had to be removed, due to vandalism. The department was compelled to remove all meters in certain locations, due to vandalism: In July, 154 meters from the Dudley Station area; in September, 33 were taken out of the Grove Hall area; in November, 33 came out of the Uphams Corner area; in December, 89 were taken out of the Codman Square area, 61 out of Fields Corner, 76 out of Uphams Corner, and 32 out of Bowdoin area.

In conclusion, we should like to note that the parking meter is much more than a source of income. It performs its most significant role as an instrument of parking control. The fact that it has all but ceased to carry out this function in the downtown area and is in danger of doing so in other sections of the City as well, greatly impair the City's effort to deal with its severe traffic and parking problems.

In view of all these considerations, the Commission hopes you will be able to give the order for the purchase of the requested vandal-resistant meters your prompt and earnest consideration.

PROPOSED ESTABLISHMENT OF A HISTORIC DISTRICT IN THE BACK BAY.

Coun. W. FOLEY offered the following:

Section 1. Under the authority of chapter 40C, section 3, of the General Laws there is hereby established within the geographical confines of the City of Boston a historic district to be known as the Back Bay Historic District, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning in the middle of Beacon street at a point 150 feet west of a continuation of the westerly line of the sidewalk on the westerly side of Arlington street, and running southerly parallel to the westerly line of the sidewalk on the westerly side of Arlington street, and 150 feet therefrom, to a point in the middle of the alleyway between Commonwealth avenue and Newbury street, and 150 feet west of the continuation of the westerly line of the sidewalk on the westerly side of Arlington street; then turning and running westerly along the middle of the alleyway between Newbury street and Commonwealth avenue and crossing Massachusetts avenue to the property line on the westerly side of Massachusetts avenue; then turning and running southerly along the said property line, being the property line of the parcel on the southwest corner of Commonwealth avenue and Massachusetts avenue, now or formerly owned by Walter R. Moore and occupied by an apartment house known as the Eliot to the property line between said parcel and the parcel adjoining it on the south; then turning and running along the property line between said parcel now or formerly owned by Walter R. Moore and the parcel adjoining it on the south to the property line of the Harvard Club of Boston; then continuing across said property owned by the Harvard Club of Boston by a line parallel to the southerly line of Commonwealth avenue to the middle of Alley 917; then turning and running along the middle of Alley 917 to a point opposite the middle of Alley 918; then turning and running westerly along the middle of Alley 918 to a point 150 feet easterly of the easterly line of the sidewalk on the easterly side of Charlesgate East; then turning and running northerly parallel to the easterly line of the sidewalk on the easterly side of Charlesgate East and 150 feet therefrom to a point in the middle of Beacon street, 150 feet easterly from a continuation of the easterly line of the sidewalk on the easterly side of Charlesgate East; then turning and running easterly along the middle of Beacon street to the point of beginning.

Section 2. Pursuant to chapter 40, section 4, of the General Laws, there is hereby established a Back Bay Historic District Commission, consisting of 7 members appointed by the Mayor, subject to confirmation by the City Council.

Of the 7 members of the Back Bay Historic District Commission, one member shall be

selected from two nominees submitted by the Massachusetts Historical Society; one member shall be selected from two candidates, one of whom shall be nominated by the Massachusetts State Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, and one of whom shall be nominated by the Boston Society of Landscape Architects; and one member shall be selected from two nominees of the Greater Boston Real Estate Board. Four members shall be appointed by his Honor the Mayor, at least two of whom shall be residents of Back Bay Historic District.

Coun. W. FOLEY offered the following:

Ordered, That pursuant to chapter 40C, sections 3 and 4, of the General Laws, and in association with Ordinance concerning same, above, there is hereby established a Back Bay Historic District Study Committee consisting of 7 members appointed by the Mayor, subject to confirmation by the City Council.

Of the seven members of the Back Bay Historic District Study Committee, one member shall be selected from two nominees submitted by the Massachusetts Historical Society; one member shall be selected from two candidates, one of whom shall be nominated by the Massachusetts State Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, and one of whom shall be nominated by the Boston Society of Landscape Architects; and one member shall be selected from two nominees of the Greater Boston Real Estate Board.

One or more of the foregoing shall be where possible a resident of the proposed Back Bay Historic District in accordance with G. L., chapter 40, section 4.

Four members shall be appointed by his Honor the Mayor without other qualifications subject to confirmation by the City Council.

Severally referred to the Committee on Ordinances.

In connection with the foregoing order, Councillor W. FOLEY offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Committee on Ordinances be requested to hold a publicly advertised hearing on the question of the order establishing a Back Bay Historic District Study Committee.

Whereas, The City of Boston, Trustee, under the will of Lucy Bullman, is the owner of approximately nine hundred (900) square feet of land on Joy street, Boston Proper; and

Whereas, Civic Center, Inc., a corporation existing under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts has offered to purchase the same for the sum of thirty-eight hundred (3,800) dollars; now therefore it is hereby

Ordered, That the Mayor of the City of Boston be, and be hereby is authorized, subject to the approval of the Probate Court for the County of Suffolk to sell and convey to Civic Center, Inc., for not less than thirty-eight hundred (3,800) dollars a certain parcel

of land together with the building thereon situated on the westerly side of Joy street, Boston, bounded and described as follows:

Easterly by Joy street, twenty-one and 59-100 (21.59) feet; southerly by land of the City of Boston, forty-two and 21-100 (42.21) feet; westerly by land of the City of Boston, twenty-two and 68-100 (22.68) feet; northerly by land now or formerly of Daniel Thanas et al. forty-one and 58-100 (41.58) feet.

The above-described parcel of land is shown on a plan marked "City of Boston, Public Works Department, Engineering Division, Cambridge Street, Boston Proper, January 8, 1962, John J. McCall, Division Engineer"; and further that the proceeds of any sale be applied to the Lucy Bullman Fund.

Any instrument conveying the above-described premises shall contain a provision that the grantee shall within six months of the delivery of a deed rehabilitate the exterior of the building and that for breach of said provision the City of Boston shall have the right to enter and repossess the premises as of its former estate.

A certificate by the Commissioner of Real Property of the City of Boston that the conditions have been complied with shall be conclusive.

The question came on giving the order in the new draft its first reading and passage.

Your Committee on Public Lands held a hearing on this matter on Thursday, January 23, 1964. The hearing was attended by Police Commissioner McNamara and his subordinates in charge of training activities.

It appears that the training activities of the Boston Police Department both present and proposed consist mostly of classroom work requiring no more than two classrooms. The only outdoor facility needed is a modern shooting range requiring about $\frac{1}{2}$ of an acre and surely no more than $\frac{1}{2}$ an acre. The present facility on Moon Island can, according to Commissioner McNamara, be expanded to the size required.

The classrooms assigned to training needs of the department are now in process of being shifted from Division 2 to Division 4. A General Services building is scheduled in the Capital Improvement Program of the City of Boston for 1966. The building will probably be located near Fire Department Headquarters in the South End and will incorporate the needed classrooms.

Your committee therefore recommends that no further action upon this matter is necessary.

Reference is made to the following City Council order:

"Ordered, That his Honor the Mayor direct the Commissioner of Public Works to conduct a survey of the street lighting in the Jamaica Plain and Roxbury areas to determine the feasibility of replacing the old-fashioned lighting with a more adequate system of lighting due to the increased incidents of bodily crime in those areas."

The street lighting program of this department for 1964 proposes major improvements throughout the city, including Jamaica Plain and Roxbury, and we have submitted recommendations for a street lighting appropriation which will permit the relighting of an additional 75 to 100 miles of streets.

Based on modern street lighting standards, most of our street lighting is obsolete. In 1962 we planned the beginning of a modernization program but were handicapped to some extent by reductions in our requested appropriation. In 1963 we succeeded in getting an accelerated street lighting program under way, and during the period July 1, 1963, to December 31, 1963, relighted approximately 78 miles of highways. If our 1964 appropriation request is approved by the Mayor and City Council, we will be able to relight approximately 108 miles of streets.

City-wide modernization cannot be accomplished overnight. Our original plans for completing this

work over a ten (10) year period have been changed and our present schedules (assuming adequate appropriations are available) would provide for completing the entire city by the end of 1967.

We are well aware of the need and demand for improved lighting. Like all other requests for improvements in the services, the cost is an important factor and it is estimated that our street lighting bill would increase over one million dollars per year when modernization is completed.

In some areas of the city, where redevelopment projects are planned, we have proposed the installation of city-owned lighting systems paid for as part of redevelopment costs and carrying a considerably lower monthly charge than Edison-owned facilities. Of course, in such sections relighting must be scheduled with other project improvements. This applies particularly to Washington Park and other project areas which are referred to in the above-referenced Council order.

We have a dual problem at this location. Another group of citizens removed from the playground are just as insistent that the playground be flooded for skating.

We have now set aside a reduced area in the playground which we hope will satisfy those who desire the skating and at the same time satisfy the property owners who do not want the skating.

BUDGET FOR 1964.

The following was received:

To the City Council.
Gentlemen:

I submit herewith the budget allowances for City, County and Revenue Departments for the year 1964 which total, in the aggregate, \$142,168,861.00.

These allowances are \$7,432,492.87 higher than those for the previous year, but are more than \$10.7 million less than the amounts requested by the various departments involved.

Increases in compensation for police and firemen, for physicians and nurses at our hospitals, for librarians and assistant librarians, and for city and county workers covered by the Jacobs survey, plus legislatively-enacted salary increases for Judges, Court Clerks, and Assistant Clerks and Probation Officers, will require additional funds this year of more than \$4,000,000.00. Increased allowances for Welfare and Veterans' Aid account for another \$1,100,000.00.

The policy inaugurated in the 1962 budget of replacing equipment on an annual basis is continuing this year. In fact, over 1.5 million dollars is recommended in this year's budget for this purpose, reflecting an increase of nearly \$700,000.00 over 1963. Today one can observe our new equipment on our streets and be satisfied to know that the city is meeting its obligations for their purchases on a pay-as-you-go basis. It is my desire to see this policy continued.

A new system for better control of funds appropriated for equipment has been initiated this year. A single account for all department requirements has been established with a detailed allocation to each department. It is expected that by this method equipment needs can be determined more accurately and that a more efficient method of mass purchasing will effect an overall saving to the city.

In accordance with the provisions of section 3 of chapter 4 of the revised city ordinances, I have prepared, under your direction and in consultation with the Director of Administrative Services, in segregated form, the annual budget for the City, County and Income Departments, for submission, by you, to the City Council for the year 1964.

Departmental requests for 1964 amounted to \$152,942,696.00. After careful scrutiny of the individual accounts these recommendations have been reduced to \$142,168,861.00 or a decrease of \$10,773,835.00 under the original proposals of the Department Heads.

A summary of appropriations for City, County and Income Departments is indicated herewith:

Listed below are the reasons for these increases:

Personal Services. The increase of \$4,049,213.00 is the result of the salary increase granted to employees, by the Mayor and the City Council, with the acceptance of the new Compensation Plan. Furthermore, certain county employees' salaries were increased as the result of legislation passed in 1963.

Contractual Services. The increase in this group has been made necessary by the following:

a. Boston Redevelopment Authority: the city will be required to prepare photogrammetric maps for territories outside the areas of the Boston Neighborhood Redevelopment Program.

b. Public Works Department: for better illumination of city streets, and increased cost of collection of garbage and refuse.

c. The other increases are for repairs to city owned buildings.

Supplies and Materials. The cost of materials is constantly increasing and is reflected in this area.

Current Charges and Obligations. Additional Welfare and Veterans' Benefits costs have appreciably increased this item.

Equipment. As a result of the city's policy to replace equipment as needed for the continued efficient operation of the city departments, this appropriation has been increased.

Structures and Improvements. Necessary repairs to bridges, buildings, and the installation of a new heating plant in the Franklin Park Greenhouses are responsible for the substantial increase in this item.

Land and Improvements. Decrease of \$243,000.00.

Special Appropriations. Notwithstanding an increase of \$200,000.00 for the Group Insurance Plan, this appropriation has decreased.

Ordered, That the appropriation for the Cemetery Division, Parks and Recreation Department, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 13 of the Acts of 1961 be and hereby is appropriated from the General Cemetery Fund, to be expended under the direction of the Commissioner, Parks and Recreation Department for the Cemetery Division, the expense of maintenance, improvement and embellishing said cemeteries as is not met by the income of deposits for perpetual care on hand December 31, 1963.

Ordered, That all sums of money which form no part of the income of the city, but shall be paid for services rendered or work done by any department or division for any other department or division, or for any person or corporation other than the City of Boston, be paid into the general treasury, and that all contributions made to any appropriation be expended for the objects and purposes directed by the several contributors thereof including such sums as may be appropriated for the Sewer and Water Divisions of the Public Works Department and so designated in said appropriations as a proper allocation to the Public Works Department General or any subdivision thereof.

Ordered, That all taxes raised to meet the appropriations of the city, and all taxes assessed for meeting the city's proportion of the state tax for the year 1964, or for any other taxes or assessments payable to the Commonwealth, shall be due and payable on July 1, 1964. Interest shall be charged at the rate of 4 per cent per annum and computed from October 1, 1964, on all real estate and personal property taxes remaining unpaid after November 1, 1964, and assessed and payable in the year 1964, before said November 1, 1964, until such taxes are paid. All interest which shall have become due on taxes shall be added to and be part of such taxes.

Ordered, That except as the appropriation for any purpose or item shall be increased by additional appropriations or transfers lawfully made, no money shall be expended by any department for any of the purposes or items designated in the tables and schedules hereinafter set out in excess of the amount set down as appropriated for such specific purpose or item.

RESTRICTIONS ON PARK FRONTAGES ON COMMONWEALTH AVENUE.

The following was received:

City of Boston,

Office of the Mayor, February 7, 1964.

To the City Council.

Gentlemen:

Transmitted herewith for your consideration and adoption is an ordinance further amending section 10 of chapter 19 of the Revised Ordinances of 1961, by eliminating the 70-foot height restriction contained therein, as applied to buildings and structures hereafter erected on Commonwealth Avenue, from Arlington Street to a line parallel to and 130 feet west of Charlesgate West.

The purpose of this amendment is to permit the construction of new and urgently needed apartment buildings on Commonwealth Avenue to reasonable heights in excess of 70 feet, but subject to the height and use limitations imposed by the existing and proposed new Zoning Codes, which adequately regulate the subject matter and protect the public interest therein.

At the outset I wish to emphasize that the proposed amendment will in no way affect either (a) the requirement of the written permission of the Parks and Recreation Commission before any such building or structure is erected, as contained in section 11 of said chapter 19; or (b) the 20-foot set back from Commonwealth Avenue, as contained in section 12 of said chapter 19.

The existing 70-foot height restriction is unnecessary, is directly inconsistent with other provisions of law, and constitutes a serious impediment and danger to the proper aesthetic and economic redevelopment of this 240-foot wide Avenue. If not eliminated, it will inevitably result in the further physical deterioration of Commonwealth Avenue, and its

increased occupancy by tax-exempt institutions, lodging houses, fraternity houses, and for other uses contrary to the city's best interests.

1. The 70-foot height restriction is unnecessary because the matter of height (as well as use) of structures is adequately and, indeed, strictly controlled by the existing Zoning Code, and will continue to be so controlled by the new Zoning Code shortly to be effective.

2. The 70-foot height restriction is inconsistent with the action taken by the city (during the predecessor administration, and subsequently approved by the Supreme Judicial Court, in *Elmer v. Boston Board of Zoning Adjustment*, 343 Mass. 24) in establishing, after extensive public hearings, a 155-foot height restriction on Commonwealth Avenue, from Arlington Street to a distance 100 feet west of Dartmouth Street.

3. The 70-foot height restriction is inconsistent with the provisions of the new Boston Zoning Code, adopted after twelve years of study, which governs the height of buildings on Commonwealth Avenue according to the ratio of floor area to the size of the lot of the premises involved.

4. I am satisfied, on the basis of competent expert advice, that by reason of subsoil conditions it is economically impossible to erect any new apartment structures on Commonwealth Avenue within a height of 70 feet.

5. I am further satisfied, on the basis of the same expert advice, that it is economically infeasible to attempt to rehabilitate many of the existing structures on Commonwealth Avenue, except for tax-exempt or subsidized occupancy.

6. I have been officially advised that because of the obstacles to redevelopment caused by this 70-foot height restriction, a number of important parcels on Commonwealth Avenue are now under active negotiation for sale to tax-exempt institutions.

7. I am satisfied, from personal observation, that by reason of this 70-foot height restriction, Commonwealth Avenue is steadily deteriorating in appearance, in character of occupancy, and economic value to the citizens of Boston.

8. I am further satisfied that, by reason of this 70-foot height restriction, the City of Boston is receiving only a fraction of the tax revenues which a properly developed Commonwealth Avenue is capable of yielding for the benefit of all our inhabitants.

9. The proposed amendment would permit such redevelopment, through 100 percent private financing, and without governmental subsidy, assistance or expense of any kind.

10. The proposed amendment has the approval of the Parks and Recreation Commission, and the general proposal has had the active support of numerous public agencies and civic organizations for many years.

I urgently recommend the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

An Ordinance Concerning Restrictions on Park Frontages on Commonwealth Avenue.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as follows:

SECT. 1. Section 10 of Chapter 19 of the Revised Ordinances of 1961, as amended by Chapter 9 of the Ordinances of 1961, is hereby further amended by substituting a semicolon for the period after the word "street" in line 43 and inserting thereafter the words:—"and provided further, however, that the provisions of this section 10 shall not apply to buildings or structures or any part thereof hereafter erected or altered on land which abuts on and has an entrance into and is within 100 feet from Commonwealth Avenue, from Arlington Street to a line drawn parallel to and one hundred and thirty feet west of Charlesgate West."

SECT. 2. Anything in Section 3 of Chapter 1 of the Revised Ordinances of 1961 to the contrary notwithstanding, this ordinance shall be published by the action of the City Council in passing the same.

ORDER FOR LOAN FOR WASHINGTON PARK URBAN RENEWAL AREA.

On March 15, 1963, the City of Boston executed a cooperation agreement with the Boston Redevelopment Authority committing the City of Boston to share the cost of carrying out project execution activities in the Washington Park Urban Renewal Area. The city's share of the net project cost is currently estimated at \$11,367,370. This includes construction in whole or in part of project improvements and supporting public facilities.

In view of the considerable progress which has been made in the Washington Park Urban Renewal Area since the initiation of project execution activities, the Boston Redevelopment Authority, acting under the terms of the cooperation agreement, has respectfully requested that the city finance, as local non-cash grants-in-aid, the construction of certain eligible and agreed-upon project improvements, such as streets, parks and public utilities, in accordance with the approved Urban Renewal Plan for the Washington Park Area. The total cost of such local non-cash grants-in-aid is estimated at \$6,455,000. To finance these costs, the city may by the terms of section 26CC, chapter 121, of the Massachusetts General Laws, issue urban renewal bonds to meet its commitments under the terms of the approved plan.

I therefore respectfully request for your consideration and action, the attached loan order for the required amount of \$6,455,000.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC LANDS.

Coun. W. J. FOLEY, for the Committee on Public Lands, submitted the following:
REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC LANDS RE ACCEPTANCE OF CHAPTER 799 OF THE ACTS AND RESOLVES OF 1963.

I.

Chapter 771 of the Acts and Resolves of 1962 authorized and directed the Metropolitan District Commission to construct three ice skating rinks, one in Jamaica Plain, one in Roxbury, and one in Charlestown.

Chapter 799 of the Acts and Resolves of 1963, when accepted by the City Council, authorizes the City of Boston to convey sites to the Metropolitan District Commission pursuant to the purpose of chapter 771 of 1962 i. e. construction of ice skating rinks.

II.

Your Committee on Public Lands held a publicly advertised hearing on this matter Thursday, February 6, 1964. The hearing was well attended with the exception of the Eustis Street Playground part of the act. It seems that Eustis Street Playground was included in chapter 799 of 1963 by mistake. Your Committee therefore finds itself in the seemingly illogical position of recommending that among other things authority to convey Eustis Street Playground to the Metropolitan District Commission be accepted while at the same time recommending that it not be conveyed by his Honor the Mayor. This contradiction arises from the fact that the acceptance of the three sites does not appear to be severable.

Conveyance by the Mayor would result in the automatic construction by the Metropolitan District Commission of a skating rink at Eustis Street Playground which nobody appears to want.

Therefore, while we must accept the authority for the Mayor and Parks and Recreation Commission to convey the Eustis Street Playground to the Metropolitan District Commission we at the same time urge that the authority not be exercised.

III.

As to the wisdom of obtaining the Charlestown and Jamaica Plain rinks through Metropolitan District Commission action your committee will only observe that practically speaking this is the only way this generation of youngsters in these districts will enjoy an ice skating rink.

Furthermore, the question is primarily fiscal and acceptance by the Council does not force the Mayor to convey. As the one official most responsible for fiscal policy under our charter, your committee feels sure the Mayor and the Board of Parks and Recreation Department will review this question when the decision is made whether or not to exercise the authority contained in chapter 790 of 1963.

IV.

The authority contained in the act is permissive, not mandatory. Acceptance by the Council does not convey the properties, it simply permits the Mayor and Parks and Recreation Department to convey if they deem it wise. (Real Property Board as well in the case of the Charlestown site).

V.

The responsibility for site selection in the case of the Jamaica Plain site has been assumed by the legislators from that area. There is a division among them. The testimony at the hearing indicated that the difference of opinion will be settled this week by the action of the Committee on Metropolitan Affairs of the Great and General Court.

VI.

Your Committee on Public Lands therefore recommends acceptance of chapter 799 of the Acts and Resolves of 1963.

Your Committee on Public Lands recommends because of the situation indicated in section V supra that final action on this matter be postponed to a day certain, to wit, Monday, February 17, 1964.

TRANSFER OF TAX TITLE LAND FOR
REHABILITATION DEMONSTRATIONS.

Gentlemen:

This is in response to your request of February 10, 1964, for "a formal opinion as to the Council's association under the charter or the statutes of the Commonwealth with this transfer of property in Charlestown as indicated in the letter from the Real Property Board to the Boston Redevelopment Authority."

By the last sentence of G. L., c. 121, s. 26AAA, the Boston Redevelopment Authority is authorized to carry out demonstrations for the elimination of urban blight and by the last sentence of St. 1943, c. 434, s. 4 (as added by St. 1961, c. 314, s. 1) the Commissioner of Real Property, notwithstanding any provision of any special or general law to the contrary, may grant and convey in behalf of the city, without consideration, to the Boston Redevelopment Authority any property acquired by the city by tax title foreclosure.

Pursuant to these statutes the Boston Redevelopment Authority is proposing to carry out certain rehabilitation demonstrations in Charlestown, using tax title property con-

veyed by the city under the last cited statute and funds from a Federal Survey and Planning Advance already approved by the City Council. In the circumstances, the City Council, in my opinion, does not have at the present time any power or duty with respect to the matter.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF COMMITTEE
ON PUBLIC LANDS.

Coun. W. J. FOLEY, for the Committee on Public Lands, offered the following:

I would like to offer a supplementary committee report concerning the order for acceptance of chapter 799 of the Acts of 1964.

Your committee a week ago reported that with respect to the William Eustis Playground no one seemed interested in the construction thereupon of a skating rink by the Metropolitan District Commission. As a matter of fact, the one witness who appeared was actually opposed to such action by the Metropolitan District Commission.

In the intervening week, it has been brought to the attention of the committee that the witness who opposed the construction of the rink upon this playground, Representative Charles Iannello, is, indeed, the representative of the area wherein the playground lies, but the playground which is in Ward 8, Precinct 6, is very near Ward 11 and very near Ward 9.

Your committee would want now to leave open the possibility of the construction on the William Eustis Playground of the skating rink in question.

Your committee would invite to the attention of the Council the fact that the newspaper advertisement which resulted in the appearance before the committee of a large number of people from Charlestown and another large number from Jamaica Plain, resulted in the appearance of no one from Roxbury in favor of the skating rink in the William Eustis Playground. In the intervening week, however, it has been reported to us that there would be substantial support in Ward 11 and Ward 9 for such skating rink.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the Board of Parks and Recreation explore further the degree of interest in the Roxbury area in a skating rink. Unless there are other problems, it does seem strange that there would not be substantial interest in such an attractive facility.

The possibility should be considered that no one noticed the advertisement in the newspaper and that none of the leadership in the area other than Representative Iannello was aware of the hearing on this matter before the Committee on Public Lands.

ACCEPTANCE OF GIFT FROM BOSTON OPERA ASSOCIATION, INC.

The following was received:

City of Boston,

Office of the Mayor, March 9, 1964.

To the City Council.

Gentlemen:

In the late summer of 1960, representatives of the Boston Opera Association, Inc., suggested to the Auditorium Commission that provisions for operatic performances be included in the design of the municipal auditorium. After the architects for the auditorium indicated that the inclusion of such provisions would be feasible and the necessary plans and specifications for the operatic facilities had been prepared, the Auditorium Commission included the opera features as an alternate in inviting bids. The low bidder set a figure of \$277,000 against such alternate. Whereupon the Boston Opera Association, Inc., gave the city \$281,155 to defray this \$277,000 and \$4,155 in additional architectural fees upon the understanding that pending actual expenditure of the \$281,155, the city would invest the same.

The last paragraph of the Boston Opera Association, Inc.'s letter of March 5, 1962, accompanying the \$281,155 was as follows:

"If the construction of the said municipal auditorium proceeds as contemplated, under the aforesaid general bid without the acceptance of alternate number 6, the undersigned expects to make not later than March 1, 1964, an additional gift to the City of Boston, to be appropriated for expenditure by the Auditorium Commission for the purpose of providing the municipal auditorium with tiered seats and other equipment suitable for grand opera performances, such additional gift to be in the amount by which \$78,845 exceeds the net income through February 15, 1964, from the investment of the aforesaid \$281,155 in accordance with paragraph (2) above. Including the said net income

such additional gift will make a total contribution of the undersigned of three hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$360,000)."

In fulfillment of the pledge just quoted, on Monday, March 2, 1964, the Boston Opera Association, Inc., handed me a check for \$64,848.62, payable to the City of Boston, accompanied by the letter enclosed herewith. The \$64,848.62 sum is the amount by which \$78,845 exceeds the \$13,996.38 income on the investment.

In order that the Collector-Treasurer may accept this additional gift and apply it in accordance with its terms, I recommend early adoption of the order transmitted herewith.

1. Report on message of the Mayor and order (referred December 23, 1963) approving application for reservation of low-rent public housing and financial assistance—recommending that the order ought to pass, and submits the following report:

I.

Your Committee on Public Housing to whom was referred the above matter December 23, 1963, held hearings on this matter February 6, 1964, and February 27, 1964.

During the service of a majority of your committee in the Boston City Council, this is the third time the Boston Housing Authority has come before the Council seeking Council affirmation as required by federal law of the shortage of accommodations of low-income housing in the city and approval of the concept of attempting to meet some of the need by the construction of additional federally subsidized housing units. Each time the proposed increment has been on the order of about 1,000 units and of course the need for these units in this city can be established conclusively in about five minutes.

Your committee resolved this time to require and encourage a general discussion of the role of public housing in Boston as part of the processing of the matter.

Pursuant thereto your committee with the energetic aid of Mrs. Louis I. Kane of the Boston League of Women Voters sought out well-informed persons and obtained their testimony on the two dates above mentioned resulting therein two stenographic volumes of testimony which the committee feels make a valuable contribution toward the objective of achieving a broadly based fresh rethinking of the role of public housing in Boston.

It had been the intention of your committee in this report to extract from these stenographic volumes the various ideas therein contained so that they might be preserved in one place. An examination of the volumes will indicate that to fairly summarize them one would almost have to quote very lengthy sections to the point where the reader might just as well read the transcript anyway.

An attempt therefore will be made to itemize in a general way what is contained in the hope the interested reader might find time to explore the matter further.

II.

1. Chairman Edward D. Hassen's opening statement contains an excellent summary in one place of the present inventory of real estate of the Boston Housing Authority.

2. Volume I contains the beginning of an approach to the question of how planning-wise to measure the volume of public housing which the City of Boston can support. This is an oft-put question. There seems to be almost no planning thought being applied to it at the present time. Paradoxically enough there are indications in the testimony that this approach may not in fact be valid, anyway.

3. There is a discussion in Volume I of the possibility of using rehabilitated structures of public housing of 1,000 units your Body is now asked to vote about 250 units are rehabilitation units, the remainder new units for the elderly. The idea of rehabilitation is superficially and immediately attractive to many. Close scrutiny of the idea indicates that new superior units may actually cost us less than old rehabilitated inferior units.

4. The suggestion that substandard units in Boston vacated by people moving into public housing units in Boston may then be occupied by persons moving in from outside of Boston who then later on move into public housing was discussed. There seems to be the feeling that Boston is actually eliminating substandard units so fast that this is not really a problem today. Unfortunately we do not seem to have statistical information on this question. We clearly should. This is a planning responsibility.

5. Mr. Cornelius J. Connors, the statistician of the Boston Housing Authority, provided two sets of figures, one of which is appended. One purports to measure the size of the Boston Housing Authority's effort as compared to those Massachusetts communities who have public housing programs (31 in number). This is a genuine contribution and should provide fuel for a further public dialogue.

Much, of course, remains—what are we to think of those communities who feel no responsibility to house the poor—of this more later.

Mr. Connors also informed us that by special contract with the Federal Bureau of the Census, figures concerning the elderly in Boston derivative from the 1960 census were obtained. Specifically information was asked of the Federal Bureau as to the living conditions of the elderly in Boston. According to this figure, there are 8,600 elderly persons in Boston living in substandard accommodations. This is a very useful figure and of itself, of course, will support the proposed increment of 750 units for housing the elderly in Boston which is called for in this resolution.

It is, however, a starting figure for discussion and not the final one. The committee has asked, and the Housing Authority has agreed to permit these statistics to be made generally available to social agencies in Boston. This processing, and the previous one quite clearly showed a very, very definite lack of statistics, upon which social programs for the elderly may be rationally ordered in Boston. Let us hope that this statistical presentation will be useful and will be used. It is, certainly, a most impressive improvement compared to the statistical presentation made by the same Housing Authority in the year 1957.

6. In siting units for elderly there appears to be a real conflict between the "Garden Type Apartments" school and the "Building Block" school. Should the units be garden type, small, and be located in the outlying newer residential suburb or should they be used to bolster the older sections of the city in denser concentrations. A tremendously important and immediate problem about which much should be written. Much more should surely be said.

7. The very real problem which for want of a better word we identify as a "Slacker Community Problem." Are there communities in the metropolitan area willing to accept general public improvements beneficial to all the citizens of the community but which dislocate their poor without making any sincere effort to relocate the displaced poor? We must report there appears to be some. Probably a Metropolitan Planning Council problem but also one which would excite considerable passion.

8. A welcome dash of cold water was supplied by Mrs. Joanne Ross of the Tenants Association Council concerning Columbia Point. She made the point that extremely large families with very limited income could not even find private accommodations comparable to Columbia Point. She indicated that there is a lot to be said for "clean, hot water, good floors and halls easy to maintain." Renewal could help Columbia Point as well.

9. The problem of whether to admit women with illegitimate children to projects was discussed. The good of the children who have done no wrong against the general moral tone of the project. Lacking the wisdom of Solomon we merely report the discussion.

10. The usual emphasis on real estate taxes was made by the private housing people. It seems plain that private real estate could not reach the truly low-income market were the city to charge no taxes at all.

Ordered, That the sum of two hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$225) be allowed and paid to Edward White in reimbursement for amount of execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Public Works Department, Highway Division, said sum to be charged to the appropriation for executions of Court, Damage Claims and Reimbursements.

The reports were accepted and the orders were severally passed.

Passed under suspension of the rules.

PROPOSED LOCATIONS FOR MASSACHUSETTS BAY COMMUNITY COLLEGE.

Coun. IANNELLA offered the following:

Ordered, That his Honor the Mayor, together with the Boston Redevelopment Authority, exert every effort to have the Massachusetts Bay Community College locate either in Charlestown, Castle Square, or Washington Park, or some other similar location.

Ordered, That the Boston Redevelopment Authority, as the planning agency of the City of Boston, advise the City Council, Mayor, and State Education Commission, as to whether or not there should be constructed an Air-Right Building in the Copley Square area to house Community Junior College facilities in addition to those facilities already proposed.

Coun. W. J. FOLEY offered the following: Resolved, That the Traffic Commissioner be, and hereby is, earnestly requested, through his Honor the Mayor, to remove from the streets of Boston as soon as possible every parking meter which is not functioning.

PREPARE AND PRESENT PARKING METER PROGRAM.

Coun. W. J. FOLEY offered the following: Resolved, That the City Council calls upon the Traffic Commissioner, through his Honor the Mayor, to prepare and present a balanced and complete program to the City Council including:

1. An adequate enforcement program by the terms of which responsibility for the observation of cars parked overtime and the recording of registration numbers thereof is taken from the Police Department, relieving highly skilled officers for more demanding work, and assigned to persons in a program scaled in such a way that the entire cost thereof may be taken from parking meter revenue.

2. Collection from the meters by the city at extremely frequent intervals by mechanized means again scaled so that the entire cost may again be taken from meter revenue.

3. A program originally planned in such a way that the authority of the meter may be re-established as an effective instrument of law enforcement in the mind of the public including for a sufficient time a policing of the meters by police officers in plain clothes.

Ordered, That the appropriation for Water Service, current expenses, and the payment to the Metropolitan Water District Commission, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and for the interest and debt requirements for water purposes be met by the income of said service, and any excess over income, from taxes, as provided for by Chapter 488 of the Acts of 1895; that the appropriation for Sewer Service current expenses, payment of maintenance assessments to the Metropolitan District Commission, Commonwealth of Massachusetts and for the interest and debt requirements for loans issued for sewer purposes be met by the income of said service, and any excess over income, from taxes, as provided for by Section 16 of Chapter 83 of the General Laws as amended by Chapter 311 of the Acts of 1961; that appropriations for the maintenance and operation of parking meters and the regulation of parking and other traffic activities incident thereto, be met by the income from parking meter fees; exclusive of the money raised by loan or needed to carry out the requirements of any statute, gift, trust or special appropriation; by the income of the financial year beginning January 1, 1964; by taxes on the estates in the City of Boston; and by the proceeds of any duly authorized loans.

Ordered, That the appropriation for the Cemetery Division, Parks and Recreation Department, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 13 of the Acts of 1961 be and hereby is appropriated from the General Cemetery Fund, to be expended under the direction of the Commissioner, Parks and Recreation Department for the Cemetery Division, the expense of maintenance, improvement and embellishing said cemeteries as is not met by the income of deposits for perpetual care on hand December 31, 1963.

Ordered, That all sums of money which form no part of the income of the city, but shall be paid for services rendered for work done by any department or division for any other department or division, or for any person or corporation other than the City of Boston, be paid into the general treasury, and that all contributions made to any appropriation be expended for the objects and purposes directed by the several contributors thereof including such sums as may be appropriated for the Sewer and Water Divisions of the Public Works Department and so designated in said appropriations as a proper allocation to the Public Works Department General or any subdivision thereof.

Ordered, That all taxes raised to meet the appropriations of the city, and all taxes assessed for meeting the city's proportion of the state tax for the year 1964, or for any other taxes or assessments payable to the Commonwealth, shall be due and payable on July 1, 1964. Interest shall be charged at the rate of 4 per cent per annum and computed from October 1, 1964, on all real estate and personal property taxes remaining unpaid after November 1, 1964, and assessed and payable in the year 1964, before said November 1, 1964, until such taxes are paid. All interest which shall have become due on taxes shall be added to and be part of such taxes.

Ordered, That except as the appropriation for any purpose or item shall be increased by additional appropriations or transfers lawfully made, no money shall be expended by any department for any of the purposes or items designated in the tables and schedules hereinafter set out in excess of the amount set down as appropriated for such specific purpose or item.

APPROPRIATION FOR INCREASE IN COMPENSATION TO MEMBERS OF POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Coun W. J. FOLEY offered the following:
 Whereas, The City Council has this day under suspension of rules passed an appropriation order sufficient to increase the compensation of members of the fire fighting forces \$400 annually;
 Whereas, His Honor the Mayor has failed to initiate an appropriation order to provide a similar increase for members of the Boston Police Department;

Whereas, Under the City Charter only the Mayor may initiate an appropriation order;
 Whereas, A policy of equal pay for the uniformed forces has been traditional in Boston for a very long period of time; be it therefore

Resolved, That the City Council urges his Honor the Mayor to immediately initiate for its consideration an appropriation order companion to the order forwarded to the Council today, sufficient to increase the compensation of Boston police officers by the same amount individually as Boston fire fighters.

The resolution was adopted under suspension of the rules.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CLAIMS.

Coun. G. F. FOLEY, for the Committee on Claims, submitted the following:

1. Report on order passed by the City Council on October 24, 1960, and approved by the Mayor on October 25, 1960, for payment of annuity of \$1,812 to Blanche G. Donnell, widow of Frederick J. Donnell, late member of the Police Department—recommending passage of the following amended order:

Whereas, Section 89A of chapter 32 of the General Laws provides for widows and children coming within its terms the following annuities: To the widow, so long as she remains unmarried, an annuity of fifteen hundred dollars a year, increased by not exceeding three hundred and twelve dollars for each child of such deceased person during such time as such child is under the age of eighteen or over said age and physically or mentally incapacitated from earning; and, if there is any such child and no widow or the widow later dies, such an annuity as would have been payable to the widow had there been one or had she lived, during the time aforesaid; and, if there is any such child and the widow remarries, in lieu of the aforesaid annuity to her, an annuity not exceeding five hundred and twenty dollars to or for the benefit of each such child during the time aforesaid; and

Whereas, The order passed by the City Council on October 24, 1960, and approved by the Mayor on October 25, 1960, granting to Blanche G. Donnell, widow of Frederick J. Donnell, under said section 89A an annuity of fifteen hundred dollars increased by three hundred and twelve dollars for a child physically or mentally incapacitated from earning failed to provide for the continuance of such annuity in the event of the death of Blanche G. Donnell; and

Whereas, Said Blanche G. Donnell died on February 23, 1964, and said child is still physically or mentally incapacitated from earning; now therefore it is hereby

Ordered, That the order passed by the City Council on October 24, 1960, and approved by the Mayor on October 25, 1960, granting under section 89A of chapter 32 of the General Laws to Blanche G. Donnell, widow of Frederick J. Donnell, an annuity on account of her husband's dying from injuries received in the performance of his duty as a member of the Police Department be, and the same hereby is, amended, effective as of February 23, 1964, by inserting after the words "provided, however, that if the widow remarries, the annuity for said child shall be \$520 during the remainder of the time aforesaid" the words"; and provided further that, if the widow dies, there shall be paid for the benefit of said child during the remainder of the time aforesaid such an annuity as would have been payable to the widow had she lived, namely, an annuity of eighteen hundred and twelve dollars."

2. Report on petition of James C. Harold (referred March 16) to be reimbursed as a result of an execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Fire Department, Headquarters Division—recommending passage of the accompanying order:

Ordered, That the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) be allowed and paid to James C. Harold in reimbursement for amount of execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Fire Department, Headquarters Division, said sum to be charged to the appropriation for executions of Court, Damage Claims and Reimbursements.

3. Report on petition of James C. Harold (referred March 16) to be reimbursed as a result of an execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Fire Department, Headquarters Division—recommending passage of the accompanying order:

Ordered, That the sum of two thousand six hundred dollars (\$2,600) be allowed and paid to James C. Harold in reimbursement for amount of execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Fire Department, Headquarters Division, said sum to be charged to the appropriation for executions of Court, Damage Claims and Reimbursements.

4. Report on petition of Arthur J. Murphy (referred March 16) to be reimbursed as a result of an execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Police Department, attached to Division 4—recommending passage of the accompanying order:

Ordered, That the sum of five hundred forty dollars (\$540) be allowed and paid to Arthur J. Murphy in reimbursement for amount of execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Police Department, attached to Division 4, said sum to be charged to the appropriation for executions of Court, Damage Claims and Reimbursements.

The memory of perhaps our nation's greatest soldier will fade away at the sunset of the world—when there have also faded away:

The thousands of American officers and men, still alive, who recall this day the gallant general of the Rainbow Division of World War I:

The hundreds of thousands of American officers and men who recall, on this day, the terrible and bloody path back from the South Pacific to Tokyo; the Occupations of Japan and Korea and the Korean Conflict;

The millions of our indomitable wartime ally, the Philippine nation, to whom he came as the marshal of their armed forces; to whom he did return from the darkness of defeat, as he promised, to rid them of a terrible invader;

The millions of the Japanese nation who found in him the proconsul of a foreign conqueror who brought hope where there was despair; kindness where vengeance had been expected; liberty and

freedom where dictatorial and militaristic domination had been anticipated as the food of defeated nations from the beginning of time.

In this last accomplishment—without parallel in the history of mankind—perhaps was a greater victory than the many victories he had won in battle.

Following so closely the death of President Kennedy, himself a naval officer once under the command of General MacArthur, we surely are reminded again—if remembrance there need be—that we are the beneficiaries of great captains who have made mighty efforts, fought terrible wars, to save our nation from defeat and conquest and bring to mankind everywhere the shade and the fruit of that tree of freedom which found its roots in the City of Boston.

I submit herewith a proposed form of ordinance concerning the installation and maintenance by the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company of telephone booths on public sidewalks in the city.

Chapter 88 of the Acts of 1960 permits the municipal board or officer having charge of the laying out of public ways to grant permits for the placing and maintaining of telephone booths and appurtenances thereon on public ways. Chapter 222 of the Acts of 1949 provides that "the City of Boston may from time to time by ordinance fix the fees for licenses and permits granted under the authority of statutes . . ."

The adoption of this ordinance would permit the Public Improvement Commission to designate locations and issue permits for the installation of telephone booths and to accept commissions based upon the income derived from the use of the telephone booths by the general public. In addition to providing a source of revenue to the city, this program will at the same time render a useful and convenient service to the public.

I am transmitting herewith the proposal from the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company entitled "A Proposal for Boston . . . Service to the Citizens, From the City to the Sidewalk Telephones."

At a meeting of the Public Improvement Commission held March 31, 1964, the commission recommended the adoption of this program for Boston.

I therefore recommend the adoption of this ordinance by your Honorable Body.

ORDINANCE TRANSFERRING POWERS AND DUTIES RE TREES, PLANTS AND SHRUBS TO COMMISSIONER OF PARKS AND RECREATION.

Section 7 of chapter 19 of the Revised Ordinances of 1961 provides that the Parks and Recreation Commission "shall have the care and superintendence of all trees, plants and shrubs belonging to the city; shall trim all shade trees standing in the street so that they shall not interfere with public travel; shall carry out all orders of the commissioner of public works made after public notice and hearing to remove trees standing in the street; shall, upon request of the officer having charge of the public lamps, trim in such manner as said officer may require any tree which interferes with the proper lighting of a street; shall cause all statutes and ordinances for the protection of trees, shrubs and flowers in the public grounds and streets to be strictly observed; and shall be deemed to be the officials having charge of shade trees within the meaning of chapter eighty-seven of the General Laws."

The Parks and Recreation Commission, which, as you know, is an unpaid board that meets periodically, is of the opinion that it would be more efficient and the public interest much better served if the powers and duties just quoted were vested in the Commissioner of Parks and Recreation, who devotes his whole time to the work of the Parks and Recreation Department. Since few, if any, of the powers and duties involved are deliberative, as distinguished from executive, in character, I concur in the commission's opinion and accordingly recommend adoption of the ordinance transmitted herewith.

ORDINANCE RE BOND REQUIRED FOR CERTAIN PERMITS TO OPEN, OCCUPY, OBSTRUCT, OR USE PORTIONS OF THE STREETS.

Rev. Ord. (1961), c. 21, s. 16, requires a surty bond as a condition precedent to the issuance of a permit to open, occupy, obstruct or use a portion of a street. Currently, said section 16 fixes the amount of the bond at \$20,000 in the case of a permit to lay, maintain and use wires, pipes or conduits under the surface of the streets, or wires, railway tracks or rails in the streets, or to place and maintain in the streets poles for the support of wires, at \$3,000 in the case of a permit to move a building through the streets, and at \$1,000 in the case of all other permits. This is not realistic when \$1,000 may be recovered for a street defect. Accordingly, I recommend adoption of the ordinance transmitted herewith to require \$5,000 bonds in those cases where only \$3,000 and \$1,000 bonds are now required.

It is my opinion, after study, that security and protection at the Charles Street Jail requires the implementation of the following recommendations to assure the public safety:

1. Modernization of thirty-four cells for maximum security on the trial side of the jail, replacement of bars on windows and doors by modern steel and automatic locks.

2. The front door entrance and lobby should be remodeled to provide for a walk-in metal detector and hulletproof protection for the duty guard.

3. Repairs to masonry surrounding the jail and house need immediate attention.

4. Doors in the chapel and hospital where there would be a concentration of inmates, should be replaced as soon as practicable for better security.

Engineering estimates place the cost of the suggested work at approximately, \$200,000. In view of this, I respectfully request your Honor to make the necessary funds available as soon as possible.

URBAN RENEWAL PLAN FOR GOVERNMENT CENTER PROJECT AREA.

The following was received:

City of Boston,

The Honorable City Council.
Gentlemen:

On June 5, 1963, the Boston Redevelopment Authority approved an urban renewal plan for the Government Center project. This approval, together with the findings and determinations required under chapter 121 of the General Laws, was made by the Authority after consideration of the statements, views, and opinions expressed at a public hearing held on April 17, 1963, by the Authority to consider the plan and the undertaking of an urban renewal project in accordance therewith. At the public hearing many persons and organizations interested in the development of Boston came forward to express their support and endorsement of the plan proposals.

Pursuant to the provisions of said chapter 121 and the provisions of Title I of the Federal Housing Act, the Authority must secure approval of the plan by the City Council after due notice and a public hearing, which approval must include the findings required by federal law. Under federal requirements such notice should be published at least once a week for two successive weeks, with the first notice published not less than ten days prior to the date of the hearing.

Accordingly, the following documents are transmitted herewith for your consideration and appropriate action:

1. Proposed resolution for adoption by the City Council after due notice and public hearing.
2. Form of notice of such public hearing.
3. Urban renewal plan as approved by the Boston Redevelopment Authority on June 5.
4. Relocation program of the Authority.
5. Copies of the following resolutions adopted by the Authority.

(a) Resolution Finding That the Government Center Project Area Is a Decadent Area;

(b) Resolution Approving the Urban Renewal Plan.

6. Proposed Cooperation, Agreement as approved by the Law Department and authorized for execution by the Authority.

7. Part I Application for Loan and Grant.

In addition, the Government Center model will be available for examination at the public hearing.

The plan presented to you was carefully prepared by highly qualified planners and architects whose basic purpose was to clear a highted and decadent area and propose a rational plan for its re-use. It provides a sound and workable traffic and circulation plan and proposed private building sites which will permit the project not only to prevent a further decline, but also to increase substantially the city's tax base. This has been a very difficult accomplishment in view of the fact that some 85 percent of the project is to be used for public building sites, public open spaces and public rights of way.

The plan has received widespread community endorsement and the approval of the Federal Urban Renewal Administration. It has satisfied

the requirements of eight different public agencies whose needs had to be accommodated within the project area. It achieves exceptionally high standards of civic design and assures our city of a new civic center which will be beautiful as well as functional.

The total cost of the project, including acquisition, administrative expenses, demolition, relocation, property management, site improvements, supporting facilities, and contingencies is estimated to be approximately \$48,000,000. Land proceeds are estimated at just under \$10,000,000. Thus the net cost of the project will be approximately \$38,000,000, of which two thirds will be paid by the federal government in the form of a capital grant, and one third locally in the form of so-called non-cash local grants-in-aid, consisting in this case of the proposed parking garage, MTA improvements, plaza, and street and highway adjustments. No direct cash expenditures by the city to the project are contemplated. Moreover, one half of the local expenditures are eligible for reimbursement by the Commonwealth. The Authority is requesting a temporary loan of \$37,447,000 from the federal government to defray project costs until the federal grant has been earned and all the land conveyed. This loan will, of course, pay off the early acquisition loan which is now outstanding for this project.

As you know, this plan was presented in identical form to the City Council in June and July, 1963. The City Council has approved elements of the plan as part of the early disposition of the Federal Office Building site (Parcel 5), the City Hall site (Parcel 6) and the private office building site between Pemberton and Scollay squares (Parcel 12). Approval of the over-all plan was withheld because and solely because of the controversy over the choice of a developer of Parcel 8.

In this connection, it should be pointed out that: 1. Neither the Boston Redevelopment Authority nor Administrator Logue nor any other public official has ever made a commitment or reached an understanding with any developer regarding the disposition of Parcel 8. I believe that the testimony at the hearings held last summer clearly supports this conclusion.

2. The Boston Redevelopment Authority has formally voted to hold an open competition on the disposition of Parcel 8.

3. Monsignor Lally, Chairman of the Boston Redevelopment Authority, directly assured each member of the previous Council that a fair and open competition would be held.

4. The Redevelopment Authority has accepted by suggestion that all development proposals for Parcel 8 be submitted to an impartial blue ribbon panel of seven distinguished citizens for study, evaluation and public recommendation.

5. The distinguished law firm of Foley, Hoag and Eliot has reviewed the entire matter and has found that there is no violation of the federal law relating to public disclosure.

6. The federal government, with full knowledge of the allegations made by the opponents of the plan, approved the plan. It is inconceivable that the federal government would have done this had it felt that there was a violation of federal law.

I believe it is evident that a fair and open competition will be held for the disposition of Parcel 8.

The federal government, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the City of Boston, and private developers have already committed over 50 million dollars in anticipation of plan approval. Without their faith, the Government Center, with its vast benefits to Boston, could not be realized. I believe that they and the citizens of Boston are entitled to timely action on the plan. I fully recommend the plan to you as one that is in the best interest of the City of Boston, and request your approval of it.

Pursuant to the provisions of said Chapter 121 and the provisions of Title I of the Federal Housing Act, the Authority must secure approval of the plan by the Mayor with the approval of the City Council after due notice and a public hearing, which approval must include the findings required by federal law. Under federal requirements such notice should be published at least once a week for two successive weeks, with the first notice published not less than ten days prior to the date of the hearing.

Accordingly, the following documents are transmitted herewith for your consideration and consideration by the City Council:

1. Proposed resolution for adoption by the City Council after due notice and public hearing.
2. Form of notice of such public hearing.
3. Urban renewal plan as approved by this Authority on June 5.
4. Relocation program of the Authority.
5. Copies of the following resolutions adopted by the Authority:

(a) Resolution Finding That the Govern-

ment Center Project Area Is a Decadent Area;

(b) Resolution Approving the Urban Renewal Plan.

6. Proposed Cooperation Agreement as approved by the Law Department and authorized for execution by the Authority.

7. Part I Application for Loan and Grant.

8. A suggested letter from you to the City Council transmitting the relevant documents.

In addition, the Government Center model will be available for examination at the public hearing.

The plan transmitted herewith was carefully prepared by highly qualified planners and architects whose basic purpose was to clear a blighted and decadent area and propose a rational plan for its re-use. It provides a sound and workable traffic and circulation plan and proposed private building sites which will permit the project not only to prevent a further decline, but also to increase substantially the city's tax base. This has been a very difficult accomplishment in view of the fact that some 85 percent of the project land is to be used for public building sites, public open spaces and public rights of way.

The plan has received widespread community endorsement and the approval of the Federal Urban Renewal Administration. It has satisfied the requirements of eight different public agencies whose needs had to be accommodated within the project area. It achieves exceptionally high standards of civic design and assures our city of a new civic center which will be beautiful as well as functional.

The total cost of the project including acquisition, administrative expenses, demolition, relocation, property management, site improvements, supporting facilities, and contingencies is estimated to be approximately \$48,000,000. Land proceeds are estimated at just under \$10,000,000. Thus, the net cost of the project will be approximately \$38,000,000, of which two thirds will be paid by the federal government in the form of a capital grant, and one third locally in the form of so-called non-cash local grants-in-aid, consisting in this case of the proposed parking garage, MTA improvements, plaza, and street and highway adjustments. No direct cash expenditures by the city to the project are contemplated. Moreover, one half of the local expenditures are eligible for reimbursement by the Commonwealth. The Authority is requesting a temporary loan of \$37,447,000 from the federal government to defray project costs until the federal grant has been earned and all the land conveyed. This loan will, of course, pay off the early acquisition loan which is now outstanding for this project.

As you know, this plan was presented in identical form to you and to the City Council in June and July, 1963. The City Council has approved elements of the plan as part of the early disposition of the Federal Office Building Site (Parcel 5), the City Hall Site (Parcel 6), and the private office building site between Pemberton and Scollay squares (Parcel 12). Approval of the over-all plan was withheld, I believe, because and solely because of the controversy over the choice of a developer of Parcel 8.

In this connection, it should be pointed out that:

1. Neither the Boston Redevelopment Authority nor Administrator Logue has ever made a commitment or reached an understanding with any developer regarding the disposition of Parcel 8. I believe that the testimony at the hearings held last summer clearly supports this conclusion.

2. The Boston Redevelopment Authority has formally voted to hold an open competition on the disposition of Parcel 8.

3. I personally assured each member of the previous Council that a fair and open competition would be held.

4. The Redevelopment Authority has accepted your suggestion that all development proposals for Parcel 8 be submitted to an impartial blue ribbon panel of seven distinguished citizens for study, evaluation and public recommendation.

5. The distinguished law firm of Foley, Hoag and Eliot has reviewed the entire matter and has found that there is no violation of the federal law relating to public disclosure.

6. The federal government, with full knowledge of the allegations made by the opponents of the Plan, has approved the Plan. It is inconceivable that the Federal Government would have done this had it felt that there was a violation of Federal Law.

I believe it is evident that a fair and open competition will be held for the disposition of Parcel 8.

The Federal Government, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the City of Boston, and private developers have already submitted over 50 million dollars in anticipation of plan approval. Without their faith, the Government Center, with its vast benefits to Boston, could not be realized. I therefore urge that you recommend favorable action from the City Council at the earliest opportunity.

RESOLUTION OF BOSTON CITY COUNCIL
APPROVING URBAN RENEWAL PLAN
AND FEASIBILITY OF RELOCATION
FOR PROJECT NO. MASS. R-35

Whereas, Under the provisions of Title I of the Housing Act of 1949, as amended, the Housing and Home Finance Administrator is authorized to provide financial assistance to Local Public Agencies for undertaking and carrying out urban renewal projects; and

Whereas, It is provided in such act that contracts for financial aid thereunder shall require that the urban renewal plan for the respective project area be approved by the governing body of the locality in which the project is situated and that such approval include findings by the governing body that: (1) the financial aid to be provided in the contract is necessary to enable the project to be undertaken in accordance with the urban renewal plan; (2) the urban renewal plan will afford maximum opportunity, consistent with the sound needs of the locality as a whole, for the rehabilitation or redevelopment of the urban renewal area by private enterprise; (3) the urban renewal plan conforms to a general plan for the development of the locality as a whole; and (4) the urban renewal plan gives due consideration to the provision of adequate park and recreational areas and facilities, as may be desirable for neighborhood improvement, with special consideration for the health, safety, and welfare of children residing in the general vicinity of the site covered by the plan; and

Whereas, The Boston Redevelopment Authority (hereinafter called the "Authority") has entered into a planning contract and a temporary loan contract for financial assistance under such act with the United States of America, acting by and through the Housing and Home Finance Administrator, pursuant of which federal funds were provided for the urban renewal project (herein called the "Project") identified as "Government Center Project" and encompassing the area described in the attached Exhibit "A"; and

Whereas, The Authority has applied for additional financial assistance under such act and proposes to enter into an additional contract or contracts with the Housing and Home Finance Agency for the undertaking of, and for making available additional financial assistance for, the project; and

Whereas, The Authority on September 15, 1961, entered into a temporary loan contract with the United States of America for the purpose of financing early land acquisition and related activities in the Government Center Urban Renewal Area pursuant to Section 26P of Chapter 121 of the Massachusetts General Laws; and

Whereas, The City of Boston acting by and through its Mayor with the approval of the City Council thereafter executed a covenant with the Authority whereby the City of Boston in accordance with the applicable law shall bear any and all loss that arise as a result of such early land acquisition and related activities in the event that the land so acquired is not used for urban renewal purposes, because the urban renewal plan for the Government Center Urban Renewal Area is not approved or is amended to omit such land or is abandoned for any reason; and

Whereas, The Authority with the consent of the City of Boston acting by and through the Mayor with the approval of the City Council has assigned any and all of its rights under said covenant to the United States of America; and

Whereas, The Authority has made detailed studies of the location, physical condition of structures, land use, environmental influences, and social, cultural, and economic conditions of the project area and has determined that the area is a decadent area and that it is detrimental

and a menace to the safety, health, and welfare of the inhabitants and users thereof and of the locality at large, because of the existence of obsolete buildings which are ill adapted to contemporary use; conversions from residential to nonresidential uses; a high percentage of structures 100 or more years old; over 90 percent of the buildings in the area determined substandard on the basis of federal criteria; fire hazards caused by accumulation of combustible debris, unenclosed stairways and lack of fireproof construction as well as high building coverage, narrow streets and lack of off-street loading facilities which hamper effective fire fighting and make most of the area a congested value district as designated by the National Board of Fire Underwriters; vermin infestation in almost half of the structures in the area; exposed electrical wiring in about 62 percent of the structures; obsolete plumbing in at least 68 percent of the structures; improper toilet ventilation; and narrow and inadequate streets; and because buildings have been torn down and not replaced and which under existing conditions it is improbable it will be replaced by the ordinary operations of private enterprise; and because there have been substantial adverse charges in recent years in business and economic conditions in the area; and the members of this governing body have been fully apprised by the Authority and are aware of these facts and conditions; and

Whereas, There has been prepared and referred to the Boston City Council for review and approval an urban renewal plan for the project area, dated April 3, 1963 (as revised May 29, 1963), and consisting of a title page, a table of contents, 56 pages of text numbered 1 to 56, and 3 maps, adopted by the Authority on June 5, 1963, and submitted to the City Council by his Honor the Mayor; and

Whereas, The Mayor submitted to the City Council with the aforesaid urban renewal plan but not as a part thereof the following supporting documentation: (1) Application for Loan and Grant; (2) appropriate resolutions of the Authority; (3) finding of decadence by the Authority, including statistical data used for the determination of same; (4) relocation status report; and (5) proposed cooperation agreement authorized for execution by the Authority; and

Whereas, A general plan has been prepared and is recognized and used as a guide for the general development of the locality as a whole; and

Whereas, The Authority which is the duly designated and official planning body for the locality, has found that said urban renewal plan conforms to the said general plan for the locality as a whole, and the City Council has duly considered said finding; and

Whereas, Said urban renewal plan for the project area prescribes certain land uses for the project area and will require, among other things, changes in zoning, the vacating and removal of streets, alleys, and other public ways, the establishment of new street patterns, the location and relocation of sewer and water mains and other public facilities, and other public action; and

Whereas, The Authority has caused to be made a competent independent analysis of the local supply of hotel and other transient housing; and

Whereas, The Authority has prepared and submitted a program for the relocation of families displaced as a result of carrying out the project in accordance with said urban renewal plan; and

Whereas, There have also been presented to the governing body information and data respecting the relocation program which have been prepared by the Authority as a result of studies, surveys, and inspections in the project area, and the assembling and analysis of the data and information obtained from such studies, surveys, and inspections; and

Whereas, A public hearing on said urban renewal plan and project was, after due notice thereof, held on _____, and all persons desiring to be heard on said plan and project were so heard; and

Whereas, The members of the City Council have carefully considered and reviewed the aforesaid urban renewal plan and the aforesaid relocation program in the light of (1) the supporting documentation submitted therewith as aforesaid; (2) the proceedings at the aforesaid public hearing; and (3) the general knowledge of the City Coun-

Whereas, The members of the City Council are cognizant of the conditions that are imposed in the undertaking and carrying out of urban renewal projects with federal financial assistance under Title I, including those prohibiting discrimination because of race, color, creed, or national origin; now therefore it is hereby

Ordered:

1. That it is hereby found and determined that the project area is a decadent area and qualifies as an eligible project area under Chapter 121 of the General Laws.

2. That said urban renewal plan for the project aforementioned, having been duly reviewed and considered, is hereby approved and the Clerk is hereby directed to file said copy of said urban renewal plan with the minutes of this meeting.

3. That it is hereby found and determined that said urban renewal plan for the project area conforms to said general plan of the locality.

4. That it is hereby found and determined that the financial aid provided and to be provided pursuant to said contracts for federal financial assistance pertaining to the project is necessary to enable the project to be undertaken in accordance with the urban renewal plan for the project area.

5. That it is hereby found and determined that the above-mentioned urban renewal plan for the urban renewal area will afford maximum opportunity, consistent with the sound needs of the locality as a whole, for the urban renewal of such areas by private enterprise.

6. That it is hereby found and determined that the urban renewal plan for the urban renewal area gives due consideration to the provision of adequate park and recreational areas and facilities, as may be desirable for neighborhood improvement, with special consideration for the health, safety, and welfare of children residing in the general vicinity of the site covered by the plan.

7. That it is hereby found and determined, as a result of a competent independent analysis of the local supply of transient housing, that there exists in the area a need for additional units of such housing.

8. That it is hereby found and determined that the program for the proper relocation of the families displaced in carrying out the project in decent, safe, and sanitary dwellings in conformity with acceptable standards is feasible and has been reasonably and timely effected to permit the proper prosecution and completion of the project; and that such dwellings or dwelling units available to such displaced families are at least equal in number to the number of displaced families, are not generally less desirable in regard to public utilities and public and commercial facilities than the dwellings of the displaced families in the project area, are available at rents or prices within the financial means of the displaced families, and are reasonably accessible to their places of employment.

9. That in order to implement and facilitate the effectuation of the urban renewal plan hereby approved it is found and determined that certain official action must be taken by this Body with reference, among other things, to changes in zoning, the vacating and removal of streets, alleys, and other public ways, the establishment of new street patterns, the location and relocation of sewer and water mains and other public facilities, and other public action, and accordingly, this Body hereby: (a) pledges its cooperation in helping to carry out such urban renewal plan; (b) requests the various officials, departments, boards, and agencies of the locality having administrative responsibilities on the premises likewise to cooperate to such end and to exercise their respective functions and powers in a manner consistent with said urban renewal plan; (c) stands ready to consider and take appropriate action upon proposals and measures designed to effectuate said urban renewal plan; and (d) authorizes the Mayor of the City of Boston to execute and deliver in the name and behalf of the city the cooperation agreement as approved by the Authority and presented to this meeting.

10. That additional financial assistance under the provisions of Title I of the Housing Act of 1949, as amended, is necessary to enable the land in the project area to be renewed in accordance with the urban renewal plan for the project area and, accordingly, the filing by the Authority of an application or applications for such financial assistance under said Title I is hereby approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC LANDS.
Re Acceptance of Chapter 330 of the Acts of 1962.

I.

Your Committee on Public Lands held a hearing on this matter Thursday, April 9, 1964.

The hearing was widely advertised.

Monsignor Malouf and others associated with Our Lady of the Assumption Church appeared in favor of acceptance by the city of the legislation. No one opposed the acceptance.

II.

Park land cannot be alienated without specific legislative authorization.

Acceptance of chapter 330 of the Acts of 1962 would accept for the city the right to sell all or any part of a described 9.25 acres of park land to the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston.

The land is on the Veterans of Foreign Wars Parkway and lies just north of it at the intersection of Center Street.

Once the authority to sell the land is accepted by the City Council and Mayor, it (the authority to sell) is exercised under the statute in behalf of the city by the Board of Parks and Recreation and the Mayor without further reference to the City Council.

III.

Your committee recommends that the order accepting chapter 330 of the Acts of 1962 ought to pass.

APPROPRIATION FOR PURCHASE OF LAND ON LONG ISLAND BY HOSPITAL DEPARTMENT.

On June 11, 1962, you received from me a message respecting the two parcels of land on Long Island which by deed dated March 28, 1949, the City of Boston had acquired as a single tract from the United States of America upon certain conditions which the city had fulfilled as to one of the parcels but not as to the other thereby putting in jeopardy its title to both. Pursuant to the order accompanying that message, which was adopted by your Honorable Body in December, 1962, the parcel as to which the conditions had not been fulfilled was reconveyed to the United States, quieting the title to the other parcel. Because of the conditions, only nominal consideration had been paid for the 1949 deed.

Recently, the General Services Administration advised me that it would entertain an offer by the city to buy from the United States at a purchase price of \$23,500 the parcel so reconveyed, which, if taken to the low water limit, contains over forty-seven acres. As the parcel abuts the estate of the Long Island Hospital, precautions should be taken lest it become devoted to a use detrimental to the city's institution. This, it would seem, can best be done by purchasing the land at the government's price of \$23,500, which is a modest sum compared to the \$576,000 asked in 1949 for an unconditional title to the two parcels.

Accordingly, I recommend early adoption by your Honorable Body of the accompanying order appropriating from the Sale of City Lands Account sufficient funds to make it possible for the Hospital Department to effectuate this purchase.

APPROPRIATION FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES.

On February 3, 1964, the School Committee submitted its estimates of the proposed expenditures for all school purposes for 1964 totaling in the aggregate \$47,655,194 or \$6,855,194 more than appropriated in 1963.

After careful review of the proposed school budget the School Committee was notified on March 25, 1964, that the total school budget should not exceed \$44,434,977 which would be \$3,634,977 greater than the 1963 appropriation.

In that communication I noted that it was the School Committee's function to determine how the total amount allowed should be spent and that I had no desire to infringe upon that responsibility. I did, however, feel that suggested reductions, recommended by the Supervisor of Budgets, which guided me in my decision, be made available to the committee. This was done within the same communication.

I have taken into account that with a total appropriation in 1964 of \$44,434,977 this will reflect an increase since 1959 of \$10,812,815 or better than 32 percent in five years.

Under the appropriation limit provided by law, the School Committee on April 6, 1964, appropriated for General School Purposes, \$38,396,200, for Alterations and Repairs, \$1,800,000, and for Land and Buildings, \$118,700, for a total of \$40,314,900. I am therefore submitting herewith under the provisions of chapter 224 of the Acts of 1936 as amended by chapter 117, of the Acts of 1949 and as most recently amended by chapter 786 of the Acts of 1963 an order for General School Purposes of \$4,120,077.

This will permit the School Committee in 1964 to expend for General School Purposes \$42,516,277 which is \$156,526 less than was requested by the committee. It is my belief, however, that if prudent methods are employed in the expenditure of appropriated funds that sufficient moneys will be available to fulfill all of the programs contemplated for the fiscal year 1964.

I submit herewith an order providing for the additional appropriation and respectfully recommend its adoption by your Honorable Body.

The Boston Redevelopment Authority has requested me to seek the necessary approvals and consents to the "early land disposition" of the Castle Square site in the South End Urban Renewal Area, following the same procedures used in early land disposition in the Government Center Project. Castle square consists of six parcels as follows:

Parcel 1 contains approximately 400,700 square feet and will be used for the development of approximately 500 units of 221(d) (3) housing to be available to middle-income families, with priority given to families displaced by urban renewal or other governmental action. The Authority proposes that Parcel 1 be sold to a limited dividend subsidiary of the City Redevelopment Corporation.

Parcel 2 contains approximately 25,272 square feet and will consist of two tower units to be built by the Boston Housing Authority in conjunction with the 221(d) (3) units. The two proposed towers will provide approximately 100 units of Housing for the Elderly with priority given to persons displaced from urban renewal projects in the city.

Parcel 3, containing approximately 212,000 square feet, has been designated for commercial-industrial re-use. City Redevelopment Corporation is interested in developing this parcel also.

Parcels 4 and 5 are small parcels on either side of the Holy Trinity Church which have been designated for church expansion. It is expected that they will be used for construction of a parish house and a community center.

Parcel 6 is composed of areas to be devoted to pedestrian paths, parks, drives and parking areas for the use of occupants of the residential developments described above. These areas are expected to be developed by the appropriate city agencies.

Demolition in Castle square has proceeded to the point where construction in the near future is possible.

Early construction of the relocation housing units on Parcels 1 and 2 will meet the current strong demand for low- and middle-income housing for the relocation of families and elderly persons displaced from urban renewal projects throughout the city and will provide a much-needed relocation resource for these projects. Construction of the church

facilities and public park and parking areas will provide needed amenities and services for the occupants of the residential development.

Since the Urban Renewal Plan for the South End as a whole is not scheduled to be completed until late this year, I believe it would be in the public interest to dispose of this land following the so-called "early land disposition" procedure used in the Government Center. The Authority has approved the disposition of the above parcels for uses in accordance with the Land Use Provisions, Planning Objectives, and Other Requirements for the Development of Castle Square, attached herewith, which the Authority intends to include in the urban renewal plan to be adopted and approved for the South End area. Such disposition requires, however, appropriate consents by the City of Boston, the State Housing Board, the Division of Urban and Industrial Renewal, and the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

RESOLUTION APPROVING THE EARLY LAND DISPOSITION OF CASTLE SQUARE.

Whereas, The Castle Square Section of the South End Urban Renewal Area was acquired by eminent domain on December 19, 1962, pursuant to a Temporary Loan Contract (Early Land Acquisition) executed with the federal government and following the required consents to Early Land Acquisition granted by the Mayor, the City Council, and the State Housing Board; and

Whereas, Demolition in said area has proceeded to the point where construction can begin in the near future; and

Whereas, Parcel 1 in said Castle Square area is to be used for the construction of middle income relocation housing under Section 221(d) (3) of the National Housing Act as amended, with preference given to persons displaced from urban renewal projects; and

Whereas, Parcel 2 of said area is to be used for the construction of low rent public housing for the elderly pursuant to the provisions of the United States Housing Act of 1937 as amended; and

Whereas, Parcel 3 in said area is to be used for commercial and/or industrial development, with preference given to commercial occupants displaced from urban renewal projects; and

Whereas, Parcels 4 and 5 in said area are to be used for institutional or church uses ancillary to the Holy Trinity Church located in Castle square; and

Whereas, Parcel 6 in said area is composed of areas to be devoted to pedestrian walks, park areas, drives, and parking areas for the use of residents in the residential developments; and

Whereas, There has been presented to this meeting of the Authority a set of Land Use Provisions, Planning Objectives, and Other Requirements for the Development of Castle Square which provisions, objectives, and requirements are intended to be included in the urban renewal plan for the South End area upon its approval and adoption; and

Whereas, It is desirable and in the public interest that the Authority be able to dispose of said Parcels 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 prior to the approval and adoption of the urban renewal plan for the South End area as a whole, now therefore be it Resolved, by the Boston Redevelopment Authority:

1. That the disposition of Parcels 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 in the Castle Square area prior to the approval and adoption of the urban renewal plan for the South End area as a whole is hereby approved.

2. That the Land Use Provisions, Planning Objectives, and Other Requirements for the Development of Castle Square, which are intended to be included in the urban renewal plan for the South End area as a whole, are based on a local survey and conform to the general and comprehensive plan of the locality as a whole.

3. That the chairman is hereby authorized to request the approval and consent of the Mayor, the City Council, the State Housing Board, and the State Division of Urban and Industrial Renewal to such disposition.

RESOLUTION OF BOSTON CITY COUNCIL.

Whereas, The Boston Redevelopment Authority (hereinafter called the "Authority") has taken and acquired the Castle Square portion of the South End Urban Renewal Area (hereinafter called the "Renewal Area") in the City of Boston in connection with a proposed project; and

Whereas, The Authority is presently preparing an urban renewal plan for the renewal area; and

Whereas, The Authority desires to dispose of the Castle Square portion of the renewal area, shown on the map attached hereto as Exhibit A, for uses in accordance with the Land Use Provisions, Planning, Objectives, and Other Requirements for the Development of Castle square set forth in Exhibit D attached hereto, which provisions and requirements will be included in the urban renewal plan for the entire renewal area upon its approval and adoption; and

Whereas, Parcels 1, 2 and 3 in Castle square will be used for the construction of approximately 500 units of 221(d) (3) housing and approximately 100 units of public housing for the elderly, to be available on a priority basis to families and elderly persons displaced by urban renewal or as a result of other governmental action and for commercial and light industrial uses; and

Whereas, Parcels 4, 5, and 6 in Castle square will be used for the construction of church facilities and public parks and parking areas to provide needed amenities and services for the occupants of the residential development; and

RESOLUTION APPROVING URBAN RE-NEWAL PLAN FOR DOWNTOWN WATERFRONT-FANEUIL HALL PROJECT.

The following was received:
City of Boston,
Office of the Mayor, April 27, 1964.
The Honorable City Council.

Gentlemen:
On April 24, 1964, the Boston Redevelopment Authority approved an urban renewal plan for the Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall Project. This approval, together with the findings and determinations required under Chapter 121 of the General Laws, was made by the Authority after consideration of the statements, views, and opinions expressed at a public hearing held on April 15, 1964, by the Authority to consider the plan and the undertaking of an urban renewal project in accordance therewith. At the public hearing many persons and organizations interested in the development of Boston came forward to express their support and endorsement of the plan proposals.

Pursuant to the provisions of said Chapter 121 and the provisions of Title I of the Federal Housing Act, the Authority must secure approval of the plan by the City Council after due notice and a public hearing, which approval must include the findings required by federal law. Under federal requirements such notice should be published at least once a week for two successive weeks, with the first notice published not less than ten days prior to the date of the hearing.

Accordingly, the following documents are transmitted herewith for your consideration and appropriate action:

1. Proposed resolution for adoption by the City Council after due notice and public hearing.
2. Form of notice of such public hearing.
3. Urban renewal plan as approved by the Boston Redevelopment Authority on April 24.
4. Copies of the following resolutions adopted by the Authority:
 - (a) Resolution Finding That the Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall Project Area is a Decadent Area.
 - (b) Resolution Approving the Urban Renewal Plan.
5. Proposed Cooperation Agreement as approved by the Law Department and authorized for execution by the Authority.
6. Part I Application for Loan and Grant.

In addition, the Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall model will be available for examination at the public hearing.

The plan that has been approved by the Authority is the result of an outstanding example of the type of cooperation that can exist between government and private enterprise. As you well know, the Downtown Waterfront Corporation worked with the Redevelopment Authority in the preparation of the plan for the project area. The plan that has been developed exhibits a very strong balance of land uses. Opportunity is afforded in the area for the development of a balanced residential community, including high-rise, garden and town house apartments on the waterfront and moderate-income housing inland, adjacent to the North End community.

The plan provides for approximately 2,200 residential units to be developed in the area which today has no more than 100 units. The plan also provides opportunities for the development of a wide variety of commercial and business uses, ranging from a large-scale office building to smaller scale buildings which could be utilized for a mixture of office and other commercial type activities.

A very important part of this plan is that it affords the opportunity for widespread rehabilitation and conversion of existing structures, as opposed to widespread demolition. This is particularly so in the Faneuil Hall-Blackstone Block area. This area has been noted by many leading critics as one of the most outstanding urban areas in the country.

There are many historic and architecturally significant buildings in the project area and it is one of the primary concerns of the plan that these buildings be rehabilitated for uses which are appropriate to the area. The uses proposed in the plan include a wide range of activities, including office, general commercial, residential, and institutional uses. Public open spaces and public walkways which are intended to connect the waterfront to the other portions of the downtown peninsula are important elements of the plan.

One of the most important and complicated problems concerning this project deals with the relocation of the many wholesale food businesses. The Redevelopment Authority and the Downtown Waterfront Corporation, in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture, have made extensive studies of the feasibility of developing new food distribution facilities to replace those that exist in the project area. There is widespread support on the part of the wholesale food dealers in the area for the development of new facilities.

The conditions under which the many fruit and produce, meat, poultry, dairy, and dry grocery dealers operate are, to say the least, obsolete and inefficient. A recent report delivered by the United States Department of Agriculture to the wholesale food dealers in the project area indicated that the development of modern distribution facilities would result in a savings of many millions of dollars to the industry. Organizations representing the various commodity groups in the area have been working with the Redevelopment Authority and the Downtown Waterfront Corporation towards the goal of developing the new facilities.

The wholesale seafood dealers presently in the project area also require relocation. The Authority has been working with these dealers and has made proposals to them for their relocation.

At the April 15 hearing held by the Authority, the spokesman for the seafood industry indicated that the dealers were not wholly satisfied with the Authority's relocation proposals. However, the industry as well as the Authority indicated that they do expect that a reasonable solution to the seafood industry's relocation needs will be forthcoming.

The total cost of the project including land acquisition, demolition, relocation, property management, site improvements, supporting facilities, administrative expenses, and contingencies is estimated to be approximately \$28.4 million. The return from the sale of land is estimated to be approximately \$4.1 million. The net project cost, which will be shared 2/3 federally and 1/2 locally, will be approximately \$24.3 million. The local share will be entirely in the form of non-cash, local-grants-in-aid, i.e., the cash value of street improvements, water and sewerage facilities, street lighting, police, and fire signal systems, etc.

No direct cash expenditures by the city to the project are contemplated. In addition, the State Department of Public Works has indicated that they will undertake certain adjustments to the Central Artery which will involve an expenditure of approximately \$500,000 which should be creditable to the local 1/3 share of the project cost. Furthermore, 1/2 of the local expenditures will be eligible for reimbursement by the Commonwealth.

There is widespread public interest for redevelopment of the waterfront project area. It is very clear that the area needs redevelopment. The Authority has already received indications from private developers who would invest more than \$40 million in the project area. Additional development should result in a total of about \$90 million in private development. This development will return almost twice the amount of taxes that the area presently returns.

The opportunity that the Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall Urban Renewal Plan poses to the City of Boston to reopen "its window on the world" should not be missed.

I strongly recommend to the Council that it take the necessary action leading to its approval.

RESOLUTION OF BOSTON CITY COUNCIL
APPROVING URBAN RENEWAL PLAN
FOR PROJECT NO. MASS. R-77.

Whereas, under the provisions of Title I of the Housing Act of 1949, as amended, the Housing and Home Finance Administrator is authorized to provide financial assistance to local public agencies for undertaking and carrying out urban renewal projects; and

Whereas, It is provided in such act that contracts for financial aid thereunder shall require that the urban renewal plan for the respective project area be approved by the governing body of the locality in which the project is situated and that such approval include findings by the governing body that: (1) the financial aid to be provided in the contract is necessary to enable the project to be undertaken in accordance with the Urban Renewal Plan; (2) the urban renewal plan will afford maximum opportunity, consistent with the sound needs of the locality as a whole, for the rehabilitation or redevelopment of the urban renewal area by private enterprise; (3) the urban renewal plan conforms to a general plan for the development of the locality as a whole; and (4) the urban renewal plan gives due consideration to the provision of adequate park and recreational areas and facilities, as may be desirable for neighborhood improvements, with special consideration for the health, safety, and welfare of children residing in the general vicinity of the site covered by the plan; and

Whereas, The Boston Redevelopment Authority (hereinafter called the "Authority") has entered into a planning contract for financial assistance under such act with the United States of America, acting by and through the Housing and Home Finance Administrator, pursuant to which federal funds were approved for the urban renewal project (hereinafter called the "Project") identified as "Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall" and encompassing the area described in the attached Exhibit "A"; and

Whereas, The Authority has applied for additional financial assistance under such act and proposed to enter into an additional contract or contracts with the Housing and Home Finance Agency for the undertaking of, and for making available additional financial assistance for, the project; and

Whereas, The Authority has made detailed studies of the location, physical condition of the structures, land use, environmental influences, and social, cultural and economic conditions of the project area and has determined that the area is a decadent area and that it is detrimental and a menace to the safety, health, and welfare of the inhabitants and users thereof and of the locality at large, because of, among other things, the existence of obsolete buildings which are ill-adapted to contemporary use; a predominance of loft buildings built prior to 1900; approximately 69 percent of the buildings in the area determined substandard on the basis of federal criteria; fire hazards caused by accumulation of combustible debris, unenclosed stairways and lack of fireproof construction as well as high building coverage, narrow streets and lack of off-street loading facilities which hamper effective fire fighting and make most of the area a congested value district as designated by the National Board of Fire Underwriters; and narrow and inadequate streets; and because buildings have been torn down and not replaced and which under existing conditions it is improbable it will be replaced by the ordinary operations of private enterprise; and because there have been substantial adverse changes in recent years in business and economic conditions in the area; and the members of this Governing Body have been fully apprised by the Authority and are aware of these facts and conditions; and

Whereas, There has been prepared and referred to the Boston City Council for review and approval an urban renewal plan for the project area, dated April 15, 1964, and consisting of a title page, a table of contents, 36 pages of text numbered 1 to 36, and 3 maps, adopted by the Authority on April 24, 1964, and submitted to the City Council by his Honor the Mayor; and

Whereas, The Mayor submitted to the City Council with aforesaid urban renewal plan but not as a part thereof the following supporting documentation: (1) Application for loan and grant; (2) appropriate resolutions of the Authority; (3) finding of decadence by the Authority, including statistical data used for the determination of same; (4) proposed cooperation agreement authorized for execution by the Authority; and (5) transient housing study; and

Whereas, A general plan has been prepared and is recognized and used as a guide for the general development of the locality as a whole; and

Whereas, The Authority which is the duly designated and official planning body for the locality, has found that said urban renewal plan conforms to the said general plan for the locality as a whole, and the City Council has duly considered said findings; and

Whereas, Said urban renewal plan for the project area prescribes certain land uses for the project area and will require, among other things, changes in zoning, the vacating and removal of streets, alleys, and other public ways, the establishment of new street patterns, the location and relocation of sewer and water mains and other public facilities, and other public action; and

Whereas, The Authority has caused to be made a competent independent analysis of local supply of hotel and other transient housing; and

Whereas, A public hearing on said urban renewal plan and project was, after due notice thereof held on _____ and all persons desiring to be heard on said plan and project were so heard; and

Whereas, The members of the City Council have carefully considered and reviewed the aforesaid urban renewal plan in the light of (1) the supporting documentation submitted therewith as aforesaid; (2) the proceedings at the aforesaid public hearing; and (3) the general knowledge of the city councilors with respect to conditions prevailing in the project area and in the City of Boston as a whole; and

Whereas, The members of the City Council are cognizant of the conditions that are imposed in the undertaking and carrying out of urban renewal projects with federal financial assistance under Title I, including those prohibiting discrimination because of race, color, creed, or national origin; now, therefore, it is hereby

Ordered:

1. That it is hereby found and determined that the project area is a decadent area and qualifies as an eligible project area under Chapter 121 of the General Laws.

2. That said urban renewal plan for the project aforementioned, having been duly reviewed and considered, is hereby approved and the Clerk is hereby directed to file said copy of said urban renewal plan with the minutes of this meeting.

3. That it is hereby found and determined that said urban renewal plan for the project area conforms to said general plan of the locality.

4. That it is hereby found and determined that the financial aid provided and to be provided pursuant to said contracts for federal financial assistance pertaining to the project is necessary to enable the project to be undertaken in accordance with urban renewal plan for the project area.

5. That it is hereby found and determined that the above-mentioned urban renewal plan for the urban renewal area will afford maximum opportunity, consistent with the sound needs of the locality as a whole, for the urban renewal of such areas by private enterprise.

6. That it is hereby found and determined that the urban renewal plan for the urban renewal area gives due consideration to the provision of adequate park and recreational areas and facilities, as may be desirable for neighborhood improvement, with special consideration for the health, safety, and welfare of children residing in the general vicinity of the site covered by the plan.

7. That it is hereby found and determined, as a result of a competent independent analysis of the local supply of transient housing, that there exists in the area a need for additional units of such housing.

8. That in order to implement and facilitate the effectuation of the urban renewal plan hereby approved it is found and determined that certain official action must be taken by this Body with reference, among other things, to changing in zoning, the vacating and removal of streets, alleys, and other public ways, the establishment of new street patterns, the location and relocation of sewer and water mains and other public facilities,

and other public action, and accordingly, this body hereby: (a) Pledges its cooperation in helping to carry out such urban renewal plan; (b) requests the various officials, departments, boards, and agencies of the locality having administrative responsibilities in the premises likewise to cooperate to such end and to exercise their respective functions and powers in a manner consistent with said urban renewal plan; (c) stands ready to consider and take appropriate action upon proposals and measures designed to effectuate said urban renewal plan; and (d) authorizes the Mayor of the City of Boston to execute and deliver in the name of and on behalf of the city the cooperation agreement as approved by the Authority and presented to this meeting.

ORDINANCE FORBIDDING THE DRINKING OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR IN THE STREETS.

An Ordinance Forbidding the Drinking of Intoxicating Liquor in the Streets.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 29 of the Revised Ordinance of 1961 is hereby amended by inserting after section 57 the following section:—

Section 57A. No person shall in any public way or public alley, whether in or upon a vehicle or on foot, drink any alcoholic beverage as defined in section 1 of chapter 138 of the General Laws.

SECTION 2. Section 110 of said chapter 29, as amended by section 2 of chapter 1 of the Ordinances of 1962, is hereby further amended by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place thereof the following sentence:—Any person violating any provision of sections 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 49A, 49B, 49C or 57A shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars for each offense.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be published once a week for three successive weeks in two daily newspapers published in this city, and shall take effect upon the day following the last of said publications.

Gentlemen:

On February 19, 1963, the Public Improvement Commission held a public hearing on a petition of William J. Fitzgerald and Ann P. B. Fitzgerald, Trustees of Fitzgerald Investment Trust, for the discontinuance of a portion of Truro street, Boston Proper, and subsequently voted to take no action. At the public hearing Mr. Fitzgerald stated that he desired to consolidate two parking areas which he owned, abutting both sides of Truro street, into a larger single area with better controlled access and egress. Several occupants or owners of property abutting Alley No. 504 objected to the discontinuance on the grounds that Truro street provided better access to their property than adjacent Harwich street.

On December 3, 1963, Fitzgerald Investment Trust repeticioned, and our department engineers were instructed to review the matter.

They advised that with some minor widenings on Harwich street, on land owned by Fitzgerald Investment Trust, the street could be improved to provide an adequate approach to Alley No. 504.

This commission, therefore, on December 19, 1963, held a second hearing for the street discontinuance and a new hearing for the widening and relocation of Harwich street. The abutters on Alley No. 504 repeated their earlier objection. After careful deliberation, this commission voted on February 4, 1964, to favor the discontinuance and, concurrently, to order the widening of Harwich street.

It is the determination of this commission that the land of the City of Boston lying within the discontinued area of Truro street is no longer required for public purposes, and it is the recommendation of the commission that the land be sold, subject to the City of Boston's easements for existing sewer facilities, to the Fitzgerald Investment Trust for the sum of \$5,000.

Dear Mr. Mayor:

The charges prescribed by Rev. Ord. (1961), c. 30, s. 1, cl. (158), for the use of halls in municipally owned buildings are wholly unrealistic so far as the halls in Boston's new municipal auditorium are concerned; and this is as might be expected because the auditorium was not even in the design stage when those charges were fixed by Rev. Ord. (1947), c. 40A, s. 1, cl. (134) as inserted by Ord. 1956, c. 7, s. 2. The Auditorium Commission has accordingly reviewed the subject with its consultant on management matters as well as with an attorney from the Corporation Counsel's office, and recommends that your Honor submit to the City Council the ordinance enclosed herewith relative to the fees to be paid for the use of the municipal auditorium and the halls therein.

The enclosed ordinance is founded on the last sentence of St. 1949, c. 222, s. 1, which says that "Any such ordinance may set a maximum fee or charge, or a minimum fee or charge, or both, and may empower an administrative board or officer to fix the fee or charge conformably with the limit or limits set." Criteria for fixing the charge within the specified limits are stated. Provision is also made for the charge to consist of a basic fee and an additional fee approximating the city's out-of-pocket expense. This breakdown endeavors to ensure that, so far as out-of-pocket expenses are concerned, the auditorium will not operate at a deficit. The basic fee should meet the cost of general light, heat and air conditioning, and general overhead, and defray, in part at least, bond interest and amortization.

We believe the ordinance to be self-explanatory; but if you have any question, please do not hesitate to call upon us.

An Ordinance Relative to the Fees to be Paid for the Use of the Municipal Auditorium and the Halls Therein.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of chapter 30 of the Revised Ordinances of 1961 is hereby amended by inserting after clause (21) the following clause:—

(21A) Auditorium, Use of. The charge to be paid for a license from the auditorium commission to use the municipal auditorium or the assembly hall, first floor exhibition hall, or second floor exhibition hall therein for a day or part of a day shall be the basic fee and the additional fee prescribed by this clause. The basic fee shall be such amount as the auditorium commission shall deem reasonable in the circumstances after taking into account the season of the year, the particular day or days involved, the type and extent of the use involved, the prices of others for competing facilities, and all other relevant factors; provided, however, that in the case of a license covering all halls in the auditorium, the basic fee shall be not less than \$2,500 nor more than \$4,500, except that the basic fee for such a license shall be, in the case of a use ceasing before 1 P.M., not less than \$1,200, nor more than \$1,800, and in the case of a use commencing after 1 P.M., not less than \$1,800 nor more than \$3,000; and provided further, that in the case of a license for the assembly hall the basic fee shall be not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$2,500, except in the case of a use ceasing before 1 P.M., in which case the basic fee shall be not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,200; and provided also that in the case of a license for the first floor exhibition hall, the basic fee shall be not less than \$1,200 nor more than \$2,000, except that the basic fee for such a license shall be, in the case of a use ceasing before 1 P.M., not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000, and in the case of a use commencing after 1 P.M., not less than \$800 nor more than \$1,500; and provided in addition, that in the case of a license for the second floor exhibition hall, the basic fee shall be not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,200, except that the basic fee for such a license shall be, in the case of a use ceasing before 1 P.M., not less than \$300, nor more than \$600, and in the case of a use commencing after 1 P.M., not less than \$450 nor more than \$900. When, incident to a license for which a basic fee is paid, a further license is granted to use the hall or halls covered by the principal license solely for setting up, rehearsing or dismantling the exhibition, convention or other show or gathering to be held under the principal license, no basic fee need be imposed for such further license unless the days covered thereby exceed in number the days covered by the principal license. The minimum and maximum basic fees set by this clause shall be construed to include general light, heat and air conditioning and, in the case of the assembly hall, the use of such city owned seats and of such city owned risers therefor as the auditorium commission from time to time may control. The additional fee shall be such amount as the auditorium commission shall determine approximates the cost to the city of furnishing communication services and compressed air, water, steam, gas and electricity for specific uses, of providing janitorial and cleanup services, of providing, setting up and removing booths, counters, signs, tables, chairs or other furnishings in any hall or meeting room, of receiving, setting up and dismantling exhibits, of handling and storing crates, of opening and closing the orchestra pit, of dismantling and resetting city owned seats and risers in the assembly hall, and of supplying carpenters, electricians, gas-fitters, plumbers and other tradesmen, door-keepers, guards, watchmen, ticket sellers, ticket takers, ushers, porters, technicians and operators for public address system, motion pic-

ture equipment, stage lighting and equipment, and other special lighting or equipment, and other such personnel.

SECTION 2. Clause (158) of said section 1 of said chapter 30 is hereby amended by striking out the last sentence and inserting in place thereof the following sentence:—The word "hall", as used in this clause, shall not be construed to include the municipal auditorium or any part thereof, but shall be construed to include a gymnasium with seating accommodations.

SECTION 3. Anything in section 3 of chapter 1 of the Revised Ordinances of 1961 to the contrary notwithstanding, this ordinance shall be published by the action of the city council in passing the same.

At your meeting on August 13, 1962, you received from me a message recommending adoption of an accompanying order accepting the provisions of G. L., c. 90, s. 18A, relative to ways within the control of the City of Boston. Such acceptance is a necessary antecedent to the adoption by the Traffic and Parking Commission of rules regulating the use, by pedestrians, of ways within the city's control.

The grim fact that nearly sixteen hundred pedestrians were injured and forty-four killed by motor vehicles on Boston's streets in 1963 demonstrates an urgent need to regulate foot traffic in a concerted endeavor to cut this

high pedestrian toll. Consequently, I renew the recommendation I made twenty months ago and exhort you to adopt at an early date an order accepting the aforesaid provisions and thereby enable Boston to lead an all-out campaign against jaywalking in Massachusetts.

Dear Mr. Mayor:

On October 28, 1959, the City of Boston entered into a contract with Metcalf & Eddy, Inc., engineers, to prepare plans and specifications for the construction of a new Dalton Street Bridge over the rights-of-way of the Boston & Albany Railroad and the Massachusetts Turnpike Extension, the final plans for which bridge have now been completed and are included herewith.

The purpose to be accomplished in extending Dalton street, through the construction of the proposed bridge, is to connect Dalton street with Boylston street, so as to complete the periphery of streets bordering upon the new Civic Auditorium and the Prudential developments.

I contemplate that actual construction work will commence at the earliest possible date. Accordingly, and since under G. L., c. 160, s. 134A, and G. L., c. 159, s. 59, favorable action thereon by both the Boston City Council and thereafter by the Department of Public Utilities of the Commonwealth, is mandatory.

I therefore submit for the consideration of your Honor and presentation thereof to the City Council an order for adoption by that Honorable Body relating to this new Dalton Street Bridge construction undertaking.

economical, and absolutely vandalproof, I am sure you will want to seriously consider similar discs for Boston.

NOTES ON CARDBOARD PARKING DISCS USED IN PARIS AND ROME.

The attached paper parking disc has been successfully used in Paris, in lieu of meters, for the past six or seven years. These discs are simple, sensible and economical. They don't cost anything and they don't require the deposit of any nickels or dimes, yet are just as effective as costly meters in controlling overtime parking.

Each motorist carries a disc with him in the glove compartment of his car. In Paris and Rome the discs are supplied by the city and the oil companies. When the motorist arrives at the place where he wants to park he turns the disc so it shows the arrival time (within one half hour) and the time he is required to leave automatically shows in the right-hand slot or opening. He then stands the disc inside the windshield of his car where it can be seen.

If he tries to gyp by showing a false arrival time it is a violation and he is fined. If he overstays the departure time shown, it is also a violation and he is fined.

The essential point is that the disc system works if it is coupled with regular police checking of the cars. This is exactly like the mechanical meters—they work only if there is regular checking by the police.

In Paris, Rome, and London, the enforcement of parking regulations is not usually handled by the regular police officers. This function is handled by special parking supervisors or "traffic wardens" recruited from retired officers and others. These men are not full-fledged policemen. Their sole function is to prevent overtime and illegal parking. Each traffic warden is assigned a few streets or an area which he patrols constantly. Only a consistent, regular patrol of an area can enforce parking regulations; whether meters or discs are used for auxiliary information.

Meters can be fed and parking discs can be changed, and neither one can tell an officer if a car has been standing more than two hours. The only way an officer can obtain this information is by noting the number or marking the car and then returning to check it again.

Voted, Pursuant to the fifth paragraph of Section 20C of Chapter 90 of the General Laws, as appearing in Section 6 of Chapter 786 of the Acts of 1962:

That Section 1A of Article X of the Traffic Rules and Regulations of the city of Boston, as appearing in vote passed by the Traffic and Parking Commission on October 4, 1962 (which vote was approved by an order adopted by the City Council on October 22, 1962, and approved by the Mayor on October 23, 1962) be, and the same hereby is, amended, effective October 1, 1964, by striking out paragraph (2) and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph:

(2) The fine the payment of which shall operate under Section 20C of Chapter 90 of the General Laws as a final disposition of an offense subject to said section committed in the city of Boston shall be as follows:

A. IN DOWNTOWN BOSTON.

(a) For every offense subject to said section committed by the offender within the jurisdiction of the court and in the aforesaid downtown area of the city of Boston—

(i) If such offense is a violation either of clause (1) or clause (5) or clause (6) or clause (10) or clause (11) or clause (12) or clause (16) or clause (17) of section 1 of Article IV of these rules and regulations, or of clause (1) or clause (5) or clause (6) or clause (10) or clause (11) or clause (12) or clause (16) or clause (17) of section 2 of Article IV A of these rules and regulations, which clauses respectively prohibit in the parts of said downtown area respectively covered by said Articles parking within an intersection, parking near a fire station, parking near a hydrant, parking so as not to leave a clear and unobstructed lane at least ten feet wide, parking on the roadway side of a vehicle stopped or parked at the curb or edge of a roadway, parking in such a manner as to obstruct the movement of a streetcar, trackless trolley, bus or railroad train, parking upon the roadway of any street during any period declared an emergency period for such street, and parking in any street or part thereof where signs prohibit parking for the purpose of facilitating snow removal—Fifteen Dollars

(ii) If such offense is a violation either of clause (2) or clause (3) or clause (4) or clause (7) or clause (8) or clause (14) or clause (15) or clause (18) of section 1 of Article IV of these rules and regulations or of clause (2) or clause (3) or clause (4) or clause (7) or clause (8) or clause (14) or clause (15) or clause (18) of section 2 of Article IV A of these rules and regulations, which clauses respectively prohibit in the parts of said downtown area respectively covered by said Articles parking upon a sidewalk, parking upon a crosswalk, parking within twenty feet of an intersection, parking in front of a public or private driveway, parking upon a bridge or viaduct or within a highway tunnel or underpass, parking in a public hackney stand, parking adjacent to or upon a center division strip, streetcar reservation or island placed on or being part of a public way, and parking in any street or part thereof where signs prohibit parking for the purpose of facilitating the cleaning or maintaining of the street; or if such offense is a violation of either section 2 or section 3 of Article IV of these rules and regulations, or of section 3 or section 4 of Article IV A of these rules and regulations, which sections prohibit parking in certain places if official signs are installed and maintained in each block; or if such offense is a violation of section 12 or section 14 of Article

This is in further reference to my letter of March 26, 1964, relative to request for \$250,000 to be allocated to this department for traffic signals under the terms of Chapter 822 of the Acts of 1963. This allocation is urgently needed for the projects listed below:

1. New control equipment Unit 1 Downtown System (\$120,000).

This would involve the replacement of controllers at approximately fifty-five intersections in the downtown area and the installation of a new central control panel in the new City Hall. The existing controllers and control panel are obsolete. This system is approximately thirty-five years old.

2. Recabling of Unit 1 Downtown System (\$44,000).

This would involve the removal of existing obsolete thirty-five-year-old cable and installing new cable. In addition the new signal equipment to be installed would require increasing the number of conductors in the interconnecting cable.

3. New type pedestrian signals (\$86,000).

The National Traffic Manual now requires the installation of "Walk"—"Don't Walk" signals for pedestrian indications.

This amount will enable us to make the necessary changes to conform to the new manual at approximately 20 percent of our total signalized intersections.

This department has prepared a general program for highway construction and repairs in the coming year totaling \$6,560,000 as follows:

(a) Major Streets (Chapter 90) \$2,000,000.

(c) Local Streets (Chapter 822) \$1,100,000.

(d) Local Streets \$2,080,000.

Dear Mr. Mayor:

During the years 1950 to 1960, our programs for the reconstruction and repairs of major streets throughout the city omitted much necessary sidewalk reconstruction work. This work was carried on under Chapter 90 State Aid and the work laid out by state engineers for the most part limited sidewalk reconstruction to locations where edgestone had to be relocated or reset as a consequence of the roadway work.

Today, the roadways of many of these Chapter 90 highways are in fair to good condition but the sidewalks are extremely poor. It is estimated that a program for reconstructing sidewalks in these Chapter 90 streets will cost approximately \$250,000.

To a lesser hut, nevertheless, serious degree, we have developed similar situations in sidewalks of streets reconstructed in recent years under City of Boston contracts and I find that repairs under our maintenance program would fall far short of the extensive restoration work required. A preliminary survey indicates that at least \$750,000 should be expended in 1964 for sidewalk reconstruction on these particular streets.

Accordingly, I respectfully request that the City Council authorize a loan in the amount of \$1,000,000 under authority of Chapter 44, Section 7, paragraph 6, to perform this necessary work on public ways at various locations throughout the city.

Dear Sir:

This department is continuously confronted with the necessity of installing additional traffic signal posts in connection with the reconstruction of streets and the redesign of intersections. Most of these latter installations are made by our own forces working weekends which involves the payment of overtime. Payments to the Boston Edison Company for necessary service connections and other related work are also required.

All of the above has been paid from the appropriation "Automatic Traffic Control Signals in Various Sections of the City." The most recent allocation of funds from this appropriation was on May 24, 1963, in the amount of \$25,000.

These funds have been replenished from time to time with the consent of the Mayor and the City Council by transfers from available sources. In recent years these transfers have been accomplished from moneys obtained from "Sales of City Property."

In order to provide sufficient funds for the necessary changes in our traffic signals as described above, in addition to making provisions for the installation of some completely new signals, I respectfully request that at least the sum of \$25,000 be provided in the appropriation "Automatic Traffic Control Signals in Various Sections of the City."

Dear Mr. Mayor:

Conferences were held on May 5, 1964, and again on May 27, 1964, with the State Tax Commission on matters relating to the finances of the City of Boston. The city was represented by Mr. Kerr of the Law Department, Mr. Leonard, the City Auditor, and myself as Budget Director.

In addition to other business it was stated by the Director of Accounts that, in his opinion, the T. B. Sanatorium should be, for

accounting purposes, treated as a Municipal Department of the city rather than an Income Department.

To comply with this revision in our tax structure will require the following action:

1. To rescind the original appropriation to the Sanatorium voted on March 23, 1964, by the City Council.
2. To appropriate \$2,519,615 for the full cost of operating the Sanatorium in 1964 from taxes or other available sources of revenue funds.

It will be possible to use in the Estimated Receipts Section of the tax rate computation the net revenue received from sources other than city funds in 1963 by the Sanatorium amounting to \$1,172,348.37, and also, to transfer the city's appropriation for T. B. Patient Care to this appropriation amounting to \$900,000. It will be necessary, however, to appropriate from available funds the sum of \$1,619,615 to meet the total appropriation.

It is therefore requested that an appropriation order be submitted to the City Council as early as possible to avoid unnecessary delay in determining a tax rate for the year 1964.

In accordance with the terms of the cooperation agreements between the City and the Boston Redevelopment Authority covering the Government Center and the Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall Renewal Projects, the city is obligated to share the cost of carrying out project execution activities in these two areas. The local share of the net cost for each project is currently estimated at \$13,277,845 for Government Center and \$8,422,051 for Waterfront. This includes construction in whole or in part of project improvements and supporting public facilities.

In view of the considerable progress which has been made in the Government Center Urban Renewal Area since the initiation of project execution activities and to enable engineering and project improvement work in the Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall to proceed in an orderly fashion, the Boston Redevelopment Authority, acting under the terms of the executed cooperation agreements, has respectfully requested that the city arrange for the financing, as non-cash local grants-in-aid, of certain eligible and agreed-upon project improvements, such as streets, parks, and public utilities, in accordance with the approved Urban Renewal Plans for both projects. The total cost of such local non-cash grants-in-aid is estimated at \$6,000,000 and \$8,000,000 for the Government Center and Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall, respectively. To finance these costs, the city may by the terms of Section 26CC, Chapter 121, of the Massachusetts General Laws, issue Urban Renewal Bonds to meet its commitments under the terms of the approved plans.

I therefore respectfully request for your consideration and action, the attached loan orders for the required amounts.

On May 26, 1964, your Honor approved the Urban Renewal Plan for the Government Center Urban Renewal Area which had been approved by the Boston City Council on May 25, 1964. We are hopeful that both your Honor and the Council will soon approve the Waterfront Urban Renewal Plan.

Within the next few weeks it is hoped that two separate cooperation agreements will be executed between the City of Boston and the Boston Redevelopment Authority covering the above-mentioned Urban Renewal Plans. These cooperation agreements will obligate the city to assume at least one third of the net project cost required to finance project execution activities in the two areas. The local share of the net project cost is currently estimated at \$13,277,845 for Government Center and \$8,422,051 for the Waterfront. This includes construction in whole or in part of project improvements and supporting facilities.

In order to help us maintain our development schedules, and in accordance with these cooperation agreements, we are respectfully asking the city to honor its obligation to finance, as non-cash local grants-in-aid, the construction of the following eligible and agreed-upon project improvements in accordance with the approved Urban Renewal Plans for the Government Center and Waterfront areas:

Streets.
Parks and Plazas.
Streets, Parks, Plaza and Wharf Lighting.
High Service Water Systems.
Low Service Water Systems.
High Pressure Fire Systems.
Sewers and Drains.
Police Signal Systems.
Fire Signal Systems.
Traffic Controls.
Street, Traffic and Directional Signs.

The total cost of such project improvements is estimated at \$6,000,000 for Government Center and \$8,000,000 for the Waterfront. ORDINANCE MAKING CORRECTIVE

In administering chapter 8 of the Ordinances of 1963 further regulating the steel and iron provisions of the Boston Building Code, it has come to attention that there is no Table C.1.6.1.2. notwithstanding the mention of such a table at the end of Section 28-1.6.1.A., and further that in Section 1.29.2.2. formula (27) is incorrectly stated. To remedy these imperfections I recommend adoption of the ordinance transmitted herewith making corrective changes in the steel and iron provisions of the Boston Building Code.

1.5.3.2. Groove Welds.

The full stresses allowed by Sect. 1.5A for the connected material shall apply to complete penetration groove welds stressed in tension, compression, bending, shear and bearing and to partial penetration groove welds stressed in compression, in bearing or in tension parallel to the axis of the weld. (See Sect. 1.17.2 for electrodes and submerged arc welding process to be employed on various grades of steel.)

1.5.4. Cast Steel and Steel Forgings. — Allowable stresses same as those provided in Sect. 1.5.1, where applicable.

1.5.5A. Masonry Bearing. — Refer to Parts 24 and 26 of this Code.

1.5.6. Wind and Seismic Stresses. — Allowable stresses may be increased one-third above the values provided in Sect. 28-1.5.1, 28-1.5.2A, 28-1.5.3, 28-1.5.4 and 28-1.5.5A when produced by wind or seismic loading, acting alone or in combination with the design dead and live loads, provided the required section computed on this basis is not less than that required for the design dead and live load and impact (if any), computed without the one-third stress increase, nor less than that required by Sect. 28-1.7, if it is applicable.

Sect. 28-1.6A. Combined Stresses.

1.6.1A. Axial Compression and Bending. — Members subject to both axial compression and bending stresses shall be proportioned to meet the following requirements:

If $f_a/F_a \leq 0.15$,

$$\text{it is required: } \frac{f_a}{F_a} + \frac{f_b}{F_b} \leq 1.0 \quad \text{Formula (6)}$$

If $f_a/F_a > 0.15$,

C_m = a coefficient whose value shall be as follows:

A. For compression members in frames subject to joint translation (side-sway), $C_m = 0.85$.

For restrained compression members in frames braced against joint translation and not subject to transverse loading between their supports in the plane of bending, $C_m = 0.6 + 0.4 \frac{M_1}{M_2}$, but not less than 0.4, where M_1/M_2 is the ratio of the smaller to the larger moments at the ends of that portion of the member, unbraced in the plane of bending, under consideration. M_1/M_2 is positive when the member is bent in single curvature and negative when it is bent in reverse curvature.




C. For compression members in frames braced against joint translation in the plane of loading and subjected to transverse loading between their supports, the value of C_m may be determined by rational analysis. However, in lieu of such analysis, the following values may be used: (a) for members whose ends are restrained, $C_m = 0.85$, (b) for members whose ends are unrestrained, $C_m = 1$.







Up to 10,000 Complete Stress Reversals. — The stress-carrying area of members, connection material and fasteners* need not be increased because of repeated variation or reversal of stress unless the maximum stress allowed by Sect. 28-1.5 and 28-1.6 is expected to occur over 10,000† times in the life of the structure.

SECTION 2. Subsection 1.29.2.2 of Section 28-1.29 of said part 28, as so appearing, is hereby amended by striking out:

ACCEPTANCE OF CHAPTER 516 OF THE ACTS OF 1964 RE ADDITIONAL BORROWING FOR NEW CITY HALL AND MUNICIPAL AUDITORIUM.

The following was received:

Gentlemen:

By St. 1958, c. 624, provision was made for the construction by the City of Boston of a new City Hall, to be financed by a \$20,000,000 thirty-year bond issue outside the debt limit. By St. 1959, c. 403, the 1958 act was amended to provide for the equipping and furnishing of the new City Hall without additional funds being made available therefor. To assure a structure of distinction, a nationwide architectural competition was conducted; and the winner awarded the architectural contract. A site was acquired from the Boston Redevelopment Authority and a contract for foundation work let. On May 14, 1964, bids from general contractors under G. L., c. 149, ss. 1A-44L, inclusive, were opened. The lowest bid was \$19,925,000. The \$20,000,000 authorization had already been reduced by an expenditure of \$900,000 for the site and by encumbrances approximating \$1,170,000 for the architect and other specialists, and \$1,360,000 for the foundation, against which a \$400,000 credit for demolition is expected. It is estimated that furniture and equipment will cost a further \$1,645,000 over and above the \$400,000 demolition credit. Section 1 of chapter 516 of the Acts of 1964 provides for the additional \$5,000,000 bond issue needed.

By St. 1957, c. 718, Boston was authorized to issue \$12,000,000 forty (40) year bonds outside its debt limit to construct a municipal auditorium; but no provision was made for furniture or equipment. The \$12,000,000 is also not adequate to provide modest landscaping and certain other work necessary to finish the structure before it is opened. If the auditorium is to open on schedule in November, 1964, an additional \$900,000 must be made available at once so that contracts may be awarded immediately for these finishing touches. Section 2 of chapter 516 of the Acts of 1964 authorizes Boston to borrow this additional \$900,000.

By the express terms of section 3, chapter 516 of the Acts of 1964 does not take effect until it is accepted. G. L., c. 149, s. 44A, requires that the low City Hall bid be accepted or rejected within 30 days, Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays excluded, after its opening; which means that action must be taken by June 25, 1964. It is hoped, therefore, that your Honorable Body will act forthwith upon the accompanying order for the acceptance of said chapter of the Acts of 1964.

PROPOSED SALE OF DISCONTINUED PORTION OF GRANITE STREET AND BALDWIN STREET, SOUTH BOSTON, TO GILLETTE COMPANY.

Gentlemen:

I transmit herewith communication received from James W. Haley, Chairman, Public Improvement Commission, recommending the sale to the Gillette Company of certain lands abutting the premises of the company at Granite street and Baldwin street, South Boston district.

On April 28, 1964, the Public Improvement Commission voted to discontinue a portion of Granite street, between Richards street and Baldwin street, and a portion of Baldwin street, between Granite street and A street. The Gillette Company owns the land on either side of the discontinued streets and by acquiring the fee in these streets will be better able to develop its properties. The company has offered to pay to the City of Boston the sum of \$19,275 and will also convey to the City of Boston for highway purposes approximately 2,401 square feet of land on the southwesterly side of Richards street.

I am submitting a form of order which will permit the City of Boston to convey these lands to the Gillette Company and recommend adoption of the order by your Honorable Body.

By letter dated February 3, 1964, the Gillette Company petitioned for the discontinuance of a portion of Granite street, South Boston, between Richards street and Baldwin street, and a portion of Baldwin street, South Boston, between Granite street and A street.

A duly advertised public hearing was held on February 18, 1964, with all abutters invited. At this hearing one abutter brought to the attention of the commission that the discontinuance of Baldwin street would limit access to Granite street to a single entrance; namely, Richards street, pointing out that the third connection from Granite street to A street, Mt. Washington avenue, although open to public travel for many years, was in fact privately owned by the Boston Wharf Company.

Subsequently, a complete engineering study of the areas was completed and, on recommendation of our engineers, we have approved the proposed discontinuances as petitioned for by the Gillette Company, but at the same time approved the acceptance of Mt. Washington avenue as a public way and the widening of Richards street from 40 feet to 50 feet so as to provide one continuous lay out of Mt. Washington avenue, Granite street, and Richards street back to A street. All abutters concurred with this plan.

The Gillette Company has offered to purchase the abandoned streets at the price of \$1.25 per square foot—the same as recently accepted by the city for other similar streets in the area. They own all land adjacent to the portions of both streets which they propose be abandoned. Acquisition will enable them to consolidate their holdings and expand their plant area for future growth.

It is the determination of this commission that lands of the City of Boston lying within the proposed discontinued portions of Granite street and Baldwin street are no longer required for highway purposes and, accordingly, the commission recommends that said discontinued areas be sold to the Gillette Company for the sum of \$19,275, reserving to the City of Boston, however, easements for existing sewer and water facilities in Granite street together with a conveyance by the Gillette Company to the City of Boston of approximately 2,401 square feet of land on the southwesterly side of Richards street.

ELIMINATE HAZARDS TO HEALTH OF RESIDENTS OF LODGEHILL ROAD AREA, HYDE PARK.

I transmit herewith communication from the Commissioner of Public Works with reference to your order of May 4, 1964, concerning the elimination of the hazards to the health of the inhabitants of the Lodgehill Road area of Hyde Park.

Dear Sir:

"Ordered, That the Public Works Commissioner be requested, through his Honor the Mayor, to take immediate steps to eliminate the hazards to the health of the inhabitants of the Lodgehill Road area of Hyde Park. Said hazards consisting of sewerage from old drainage pipes with concurring presence of rats; this together with the crowding of new streets from said drainage; also the presence of nauseating and offensive odors and the continuous and continuing complaints of the lack of street cleaning in this particular area."

Dwellings on Lodgehill road are at the foot of an embankment at the top of which are located the rear yards of dwellings on Asheville road, which latter highway consists of a paved roadway without edgestones. There are many gullies on the embankment caused by rainfall and channels and pipes have been laid to conduct the waters from these gullies to Lodgehill road. The City of Boston neither built, maintains, nor operates any of these gullies or pipes. Sample of this water has been tested and found to be ground water, uncontaminated by sewage.

Investigation of the rodent situation by the Sewer Division revealed that one of the residents stated that she had heard that a neighbor had seen a rat in her uncovered garbage pail.

Street sweeping operations have been carried on in Lodgehill road on a weekly basis since early spring.

The subject matters of this order have been independently investigated by the City of Boston Health Department who found that the source of the trouble is from ground and surface waters, flowing from the uplands onto the lower properties.

This condition exists on all hills and has been the subject of litigation for over 100 years, so that the rights and obligations of the parties are clearly defined.

To Summarize:

1. Public streets in this area are cleaned regularly and are usually found with only insignificant amounts of litter or rubbish spillage.

2. Public streets drain well and are not eroding. Asheville road, private way, should be paved and the Public Improvement Commission would undoubtedly act favorably on a petition from the local residents.

3. Neither the Sewer Division nor the Health Department finds any evidence of "nauseating or offensive odors" in the vicinity.

PROVISION FOR LEGAL HOLIDAY WHICH FALLS ON SATURDAY.

Gentlemen:

With reference to the accompanying order passed by your Honorable Body on May 25, 1964, I am advised by the Corporation Counsel as follows:

"When a holiday falls on a Sunday, provision already exists for the following Monday to be a legal holiday. G. L., c. 4, s. 7, cl. 18. Accordingly insofar as the Council order relates to holidays falling on Sunday, no action is necessary.

"I am of the opinion, however, that public offices of the city or county cannot be closed on a Friday preceding a Saturday holiday by either ordinance or executive order until there is enabling legislation comparable to G. L., c. 34, s. 16, and G. L., c. 41, s. 110a, the latter of which states 'Any public office in any city or town may remain closed on any or all Saturdays as may be determined from time to time, in a city by the city council, subject to the provisions of the city charter, or, in a town, by vote of the town at a special or regular town meeting, and the provisions of section nine of chapter four shall apply in the case of such closing of any such office on any Saturday to the same extent as if such Saturday were a legal holiday.' It is the latter clause of this provision which is especially required to assure the legal postponement of acts required to be done on such Fridays."

In view of the foregoing, while it is not possible to grant all city employees a day off without loss of pay, nevertheless, I am authorizing city and county department heads, within their discretion, to operate on a skeleton force on Friday, July 3, 1964, provided that departmental operation will not be impaired to such an extent that it will be necessary to incur overtime expense.

AMENDMENT TO SCHEDULE OF FINES FOR PARKING VIOLATIONS.

The following was received:

To the Honorable the City Council of the City of Boston.

Gentlemen:

In meeting on May 18, 1964, you received from the Traffic and Parking Commission for approval an amendment of the schedule of fines for the noncriminal disposition of parking violations which was adopted by the commission on April 30, 1964, to become effective on October 1, 1964.

At that time the commission concluded that experience under the present schedule of fines clearly demonstrated that these fines are not sufficiently high to be a deterrent to the parking violator and so are not coping effectively with the traffic congestion resulting from this illegal parking. At today's meeting of the commission, attention was called to the fact that sections of the Boston extension of the Massachusetts Turnpike are expected to be opened to traffic about October 1, 1964, at about which time the Prudential Center is also going to become occupied. It was the very definite sense of the commission that the fine schedule adopted on April 30, 1964, should receive the approval of your Honorable Body and be put into effect at the earliest possible moment.

Since this commission is mindful that the clerks of court require four months between your approval of the schedule and its effective date for the necessary administrative work incident to a change in fines, the commission reluctantly adopted at its meeting today a vote changing the effective date of the higher fine schedule to December 1, 1964, instead of October 1, 1964. It is earnestly urged that your Honorable Body act before August 1, 1964, to avoid further extensions of the effective date with the ensuing continuance of traffic congestion in the meantime.

The vote adopted this day is submitted herewith for your approval.

STIPULATIONS OF HILL-BURTON ACT.

To the Honorable City Council.

Gentlemen:

A motion adopted by your Honorable Body on July 20, 1964, requests that I advise you "as to what are the stipulations of the Hill-Burton Act relative to obtaining reimbursement to the Boston City Hospital."

The Hill-Burton Act, technically the Hospital Survey and Construction Act, as originally approved on August 13, 1946, covered the federal fiscal year ending June 30, 1947, and the four succeeding fiscal years. By subsequent amendments it was extended through the fiscal year ending June 30, 1964, U.S.C.A. Title 42, s. 291d. A further five-year extension of the act is currently pending before the Congress. H.R. 10041. Until such legislation is enacted, there are no funds available for the Boston City Hospital.

One of the criticisms of the act which expired June 30, 1964, was that it stressed

new construction in places where hospitals and medical facilities were lacking, so that it favored suburban and rural areas while urban hospitals grew obsolete. The pending H.R. 10041 would authorize grants for the modernization of existing hospitals. As no new building has been built at the City Hospital since 1946, it has not been possible for the Hospital's Trustees to take advantage of the act, under which not more than \$400,000 has been available for any one building.

ESTABLISHING A PERMANENT STENOGRAPHER IN THE PROBATE COURT OF SUFFOLK COUNTY.

To the City Council.

Gentlemen:

Judges of probate were authorized by St. 1923, c. 392, to appoint permanent court stenographers. The following year, St. 1924, c. 194, dispensed with the permanent stenographer for the Probate Court in Suffolk County and authorized the appointment of a permanent officer for said county. Hence, under existing law, the judges of probate in every county, except Suffolk, may,

subject to the approval of the County Commissioners of their respective counties, appoint a permanent stenographer for the Probate Court of such county. G.L., c. 215, s. 18, as amended.

In the current year, the General Court passed further legislation on this subject, but, by its express terms, it is only to take effect upon its acceptance by the City of Boston. It is chapter 631 of the Acts of 1964 entitled "An Act To Establish an Official Stenographer in the Probate Court for Suffolk County." Its basic provisions are: "The judges of probate of Suffolk County shall appoint an official stenographer. Said official stenographer shall receive from said county such salary as shall be established from time to time by the judges of the probate court for Suffolk County, with the approval of the justices of the Supreme Judicial Court."

The Judges of Probate in Suffolk County have written* me urging the acceptance of this act. Accordingly, I submit herewith for your consideration an order for the acceptance of chapter 631 of the Acts of 1964.

Dear Mayor Collins:

You may know that heretofore the Judges of Probate in Suffolk County have under the provisions of General Laws, chapter 215, section 18, been empowered to appoint court stenographers on a per diem basis compensated at the same rate as stenographers appointed on the same basis in the Superior Court, Suffolk County.

The Superior Court, as you may also know, has many permanent stenographers who are classified as permanent and receive an annual salary of \$9,000 a year.

For many years, the Probate Court has employed a stenographer who has been a permanent stenographer in fact, but paid only on a per diem basis because of the limitations of the statute. The work load of this court has long since warranted the employment of a full-time permanent stenographer.

To that end, the Legislature has just enacted chapter 631 of the Acts of 1964, amending section 18 of chapter 215 of the General Laws. The amendment provides for the appointment of a permanent stenographer by the judges of this court, whose salary shall be fixed by them with the approval of the justices of the Supreme Judicial Court.

We propose that this individual receive a somewhat comparable salary to that received by the stenographers performing similar services in the Superior Court. We feel that this proposal is warranted both by the nature of the business of this court and the competency of our present stenographer.

Inasmuch as section 2 of the amendment provides that the act shall take effect upon its acceptance by the City of Boston, we respectfully submit this letter to you with the hope that you may see fit to expedite its acceptance by the city.

Dear Sir:

This is in reply to Council order dated August 31, 1964, requesting that this department again study the feasibility of employment of the variable traffic pattern on one or more major streets in the City of Boston; that is, the usage of Commonwealth, Huntington, or Columbus avenues for all inbound traffic in morning rush hours and reversal to all outbound traffic in the evening and that an experiment be made on at least one of the aforementioned streets.

Our engineers have resurveyed these streets and they report that the surveys indicate that this system would not be feasible for the same reason given in reply to a previous Council order dated January 19, 1959. These reasons are as follows:

1. Any delays occurring on these arteries are at major intersections and are caused by heavy cross movements of traffic. These delays would still occur with reversible lanes and the intersectional conflicts could only be resolved by separation of roadways.

2. Even if the above-mentioned intersectional conflicts could be eliminated, it is very doubtful whether any advantage would be gained because of the serious congestion which would occur at each terminus where the transition from reversible lanes to normal lanes would occur. For example, Arlington street at Boylston street which is now congested in the morning and Kenmore square which is running to capacity in the evening, would not be able to carry any additional traffic imposed by such a system.

3. On each of these arteries the traffic flow in the direction opposite to the peak morning and evening flows is considerably heavy and cannot be adequately accommodated on other streets.

4. None of these streets is adaptable to such a system because of the existence of permanent center divisional islands. In instances where such systems have been installed in other cities, there is no division in the highway or there are movable barriers between lanes which may be either manually or automatically operated such as on the Outer Drive of Chicago.

5. Such a system, if adopted, would require the installation of so-called lane signals above the roadways at frequent intervals and alterations to existing signals along each entire route requiring the expenditure of many thousands of dollars.

6. The hiring of many additional police officers and other personnel would be required in order to properly supervise the operation of such a system.

Your Honor is aware of the fact that we are now constructing a new modern play area facility at Centre and Mozart streets, Roxbury, on the site of the old Lowell School. This is a project in which you have expressed particular interest.

Under chapter 536 of the Acts of 1959 in the appropriation made for the construction of a new schoolhouse on the old playground site, provision was made under section 2 of this act for sufficient money to construct on the site of the old school a new play facility. The act provided for the sum of \$66,000 to be expended for the development of a play facility on this site. The cost of the demolition of the school building and the advertised contract for the establishment of the play area now in operation have earmarked for expenditure approximately the entire amount allowed.

It is our desire to construct on this play area a building which would contain sanitary facilities for boys and girls, a small room for a headquarters for the leaders on the playground, and a small area for the storage of equipment and other materials required by the custodian. This building would be of a construction as inexpensive as possible. The estimate submitted by the engineers indicates that the building will cost approximately \$15,000 to \$18,000.

I have talked with the City Auditor and the money is available in the account, "Sales of City Lands." The Parks and Recreation Department has contributed substantially to this appropriation through the sale of park lands.

I understand from the City Auditor that your Honor will be required to draw an order on the City Council for the approval of the transfer of an appropriation to construct this building.

This new play area will be one of the finest in the city, and in order to have it properly maintained, we should have constructed thereon a field house at a limited cost, as already explained herein.

Accordingly, I respectfully request that arrangements be made through City Council order to transfer the sum of \$18,000 from the appropriation, "Sales of City Lands" to "Construction of School Buildings, Acquisition of Land, etc.," 669-71-727, for the construction of a field house at Centre and Mozart streets, Roxbury.

Between 1952 and 1957, the Boston City Council made a series of appropriations for acquiring off-street parking areas and facilities and for the constructing or reconstructing and resurfacing such areas and facilities. This series of appropriations was to enable a program of off-street parking facilities in local business areas. There is only five hun-

dred and six dollars and forty-five cents (\$506.45) left from these appropriations.

Certain court proceedings for assessment of damages for the land takings incident to the program are still pending. Currently there is outstanding an interlocutory order for a pro tanto settlement in the amount of twenty-two thousand eighty-six dollars and twelve cents (\$22,086.12) in connection with one parcel for which there are no funds available.

Accordingly, I recommend to your Honor that you submit to the City Council an order for the appropriation of an additional twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the purposes aforesaid which will approximate the estimate of that order with associated court costs.

Dear Mr. Mayor:

In reply to your communication of September 3 enclosing Resolution of the City Council dated August 31, 1964, I am pleased to submit the following information which indicates that several formal and informal study groups have already been established among the permanent civil servants within the City Government.

An In-Service Training Division has been established in the Administrative Services Department where all levels of personnel in all occupational areas are given opportunities to improve and develop their present talents through the utilization, in some cases, of subsidies afforded by the state and federal governments. Active in-service training programs are presently conducted in the following departments: Police, Fire, Public Works, Health, Hospital, Traffic, Library, Welfare, and Park and many more will be initiated before the end of the year in other departments.

The most current example of opportunities for senior and key personnel for further study in their fields is the enrollment of some thirty (30) employees in the "Municipal Administration and Finance Courses" being conducted at the present time by the Bureau of Public Affairs, Boston College.

A "Conferama" is held annually by the key employees of the City Government concerning current problems and matters pertaining not only to Municipal Government but problems and matters which concern the general public. Prominent speakers from the fields of government, education, industry, etc., are featured and employees are given an opportunity to exchange ideas and discuss problems of mutual interest. Incidentally, all City Councilors are extended a cordial invitation each year to attend these meetings.

The policy of transferring senior personnel has been in effect for many years. Basically, this procedure involves nothing more than a mutual agreement between two department heads and the individual or individuals involved. The greater part of the Administrative Services Department was originally structured through the policy of transfer of senior personnel from other departments.

On April 9, 1964, a group of forty (40) key employees, including department heads, was organized and received its charter to conduct business under the rules and regulations of the Toastmasters International 3763-31, known as "Spokes-men of the Hub." Two-hour meetings are held regularly on the second and fourth Thursday of each month and the agenda of each meeting is committed "to examine problems . . . to the City of Boston . . ." Eleven meetings have been held to date.

It would appear from the above information and plans now being considered that the intent of the Council Resolution is presently being carried out on a major scale, thereby obviating the necessity of examining the advisability of establishing another study group at this time.

SUMMARY

The proposed measure provides that henceforth appointments in the executive branch of the government shall not require the advice and consent of the Governor's Council. Exceptions to this provision include appointments to the Youth Service Board, Industrial Accident Board, Commission of the Department of Public Utilities, Parole Board and Appellate Tax Board, which appointments shall continue to require Council action. However, should the Council fail to act upon such appointments within thirty calendar days, then the person involved shall be deemed to have been lawfully appointed. Any appointment in the executive branch by an officer other than the Governor which heretofore required Council approval shall henceforth require approval by the Governor.

Removals from office shall no longer require the advice and consent of the Council, except in the case of the Youth Service Board, which removals must still receive Council approval. As in the case of appointments still requiring Council approval, such recommended removal from the Youth Service Board must be acted upon by the Council within thirty calendar days; otherwise the proposed removal shall become effective as if approval had been given. In the case of any appointment which heretofore required Council approval the Governor may, within fifteen days of the making of the appoint-

ment, remove the person appointed without cause.

The Council shall no longer be required to approve the fixing of any compensation for services rendered in the executive department. And henceforth there need be no approval by the Council of actions or agreements by executive officers, including but not limited to borrowings and loans, investments, leases, licenses, purchases and conveyances, and contracts, and also including the promulgation of rules and regulations.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Governor shall at all times remain free to seek the advice and consent of the Council upon any matter.

Under the Act, effective as of January 1, 1964, each member of the General Court shall receive seventy-eight hundred dollars for each regular annual session, the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive the same amount as additional compensation, and the floor leaders of each of the major political parties in the Senate and House, the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of that committee of the House, shall each receive thirty-nine hundred dollars as additional compensation, to be paid as provided in the Act. After the same date the annual expense allowance is to be six hundred dollars for each member and the travel allowance is to be eight cents per mile with a stated minimum and an alternative, and a member chosen to fill a vacancy or who resigns during a session is to be entitled to per diem compensation at the rate for each regular annual session and to the allowances for travel and other expenses for the time of his membership.

It is also provided that in addition to the compensation for the 1963 annual session the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House shall be paid thirty-nine hundred dollars, the floor leaders of each major political party in the Senate and House, the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means and Chairman and Vice-Chairman of that committee of the House, shall be paid twenty-nine hundred and twenty-five dollars, and each other member shall be paid nineteen hundred and fifty dollars. Each member shall also be entitled to an additional expense allowance of two hundred dollars for the calendar year 1963 and the travel allowance shall be at the rate of eight cents per mile with a stated minimum and an alternative for the balance of the calendar year 1963.

That this task force be given a training period for orientation and familiarization with the various codes involved. That a single headquarters be set up with whatever administrative assistance necessary. Further that the coordinating committee meet regularly to determine the progress of this task force and to take whatever steps are necessary to remedy the situation;

Finally, That a report by the coordinating committee be made to the Mayor and City Council within one year.

PURCHASE OF SUPER PUMPER AND TENDER FIREFIGHTING UNIT.

EXPANSION OF COMMERCIAL AREA IN CASTLE SQUARE PROJECT.

Coun. W. J. FOLEY offered the following:

Whereas, The private developer for the Castle Square project has indicated full and immediate development of the small portion of the Castle Square area (5 acres) allotted to commercial use;

Whereas, There are fifteen acres in the Castle Square project assigned to residential development of units renting at about \$100 or more per month;

Whereas, Because of present and impending commercial dislocations in the Greater Boston area, it is probable that additional commercial users in the Castle Square area may be available beyond the originally assigned 5 acres;

Whereas, Boston has a desperate need for immediate and substantial increase in tax revenues; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Board of the BRA be respectfully requested to immediately review the re-use plan for the Castle Square project to determine whether it would now be feasible to increase the area of the project assigned to commercial re-use by reducing the area assigned to private FHA financed rental housing.

POLICE VEHICLES TO BE EQUIPPED WITH PROTECTIVE CLOTHING FOR USE IN EMERGENCIES.

Coun. W. J. FOLEY offered the following:

Whereas, At both the Bellflower Street fire in South Boston and the tragic Trumbull Street fire in the South End members of the Boston Police Department acting with great courage in an emergency, exposed themselves to injury in an attempt to aid their brother department, the Boston Fire Department, to save lives; and

Whereas, The Police Department is required to assist the Fire Department at all major fires; be it

Resolved, That the Police Commissioner, be requested, through his Honor the Mayor, to furnish and equip each police vehicle with protective clothing, including helmets and such other portion of the complete protective clothing issued firefighters as might be useful in an emergency situation.

The resolution was adopted under suspension of the rules.

CONTINUOUS PARK STRIP ON SOUTH SIDE OF BOSTON.

Coun. FOLEY offered the following:

Whereas, There is presently on display at the Boston Museum of Fine Arts a presentation of the works of landscape architect Frederick Low Olmstead who, among other works, designed for Boston in the latter half of the nineteenth century a continuous park strip from the Public Garden up Commonwealth Avenue to the Fens, from thence to Jamaica Pond, the Jamaicaaway, and to Franklin Park;

Whereas, This approach generally speaking has been most successful and has preserved and favorably influenced areas on the north side of the city;

Whereas, Olmstead's concept leaned heavily on planning attractive vistas;

Whereas, Since this Olmstead park system was built, the population of the city has increased and the southernmost areas have been heavily built up;

Whereas, It is still possible but will not long be possible to construct a continuous strip park system from Castle Island to Neponset and up the Neponset River Valley to the Lower Mills section of Dorchester and perhaps further;

Whereas, Such a park system would without effort open a series of vistas generally unavailable elsewhere;

Whereas, The Board of the BRA is the Planning Board for the City of Boston under the so-called "Prudential" omnibus legislation; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Board of the BRA ought now to consider before it is too late the possibility of installing on the south side of the City of Boston a continuous strip park system from Castle Island to the mouth of the Neponset River and thence in cooperation with the City of Quincy and the Town of Milton to Dorchester Lower Mills and perhaps to Mattapan; be it further

Resolved, That the Board of the BRA be respectfully requested to interest itself in devising ways of constructing the inner belt roadbed without the destruction of the Olmstead concept of a continuous park strip.

I am forwarding herewith a communication from the Director of Public Welfare, Mr. William F. Lally, in which he has requested additional funds for relief during the year 1964 of four million five hundred thousand (4,500,000) dollars.

In 1964 the State Legislature, cognizant of the problems confronting cities and towns due to rising costs of welfare and veterans' benefits, enacted into law chapter 264 of the Acts of 1964.

This act permits a municipality to issue a loan, payable over five years, to meet such a contingency. A further provision of this act allows the mandatory second reading of such an order after a period of twenty-four hours of the first reading by the City Council.

In order not to delay relief payments to needy persons it is requested that your Honorable Body consider holding a special meeting, at the earliest possible moment, to expedite this loan authorization.

Dear Mayor Collins:

On August 18, 1964, on behalf of the Board of Overseers of the Public Welfare, I directed a communication to you informing you that available figures at that time showed that the Welfare Department would be short in its appropriated funds to provide required services for the remainder of the year 1964. The financial reports then indicated that the department would be short in its appropriation 4.5 million dollars. It was the sincere hope of the department that this amount might be lessened; however, continued experience shows that this amount will be required. Additional appropriations in the fol-

lowing amounts for the specific programs are respectfully requested:

Old Age Assistance.....	\$400,000
Medical Assistance for the Aged.....	1,100,000
Aid to Families with Dependent Children.....	2,100,000
Disability Assistance.....	525,000
General Relief.....	375,000

OLD AGE ASSISTANCE

Appropriation	\$5,600,000
Anticipated expenditure.....	6,000,000
Estimated deficit.....	400,000

When the budget was prepared it was estimated that the department would assist 11,800 cases but it now appears that there is a decrease in cases and that a more correct figure at this point would be 11,400 cases.

MEDICAL ASSISTANCE FOR THE AGED

Appropriation	\$5,500,000
Anticipated expenditure.....	6,600,000
Estimated deficit.....	1,100,000

Although the deficit is stated as \$1,100,000, actually \$500,000 of the original appropriation for this category was transferred to the Disability Assistance and General Relief programs in September of this year in order to carry through these programs until additional appropriations could be made. The caseload in the Medical Assistance for the Aged program has remained pretty much in line with the department's original estimate but hospital costs and nursing home costs are continually rising in this area and consequently this will be a very expensive program. Recently the medical associations have given wide publicity to this program and already this department is feeling the impact of the publicity programs. The department currently has certified as eligible for MAA approximately 6,700 cases although it should be mentioned that not all cases will need assistance.

AID TO FAMILIES WITH DEPENDENT CHILDREN

Appropriation	\$8,910,000
Anticipated expenditure.....	11,010,000
Estimated deficit.....	2,100,000

When the budget for 1964 was prepared the department estimated that approximately 7,620 cases would be granted assistance. Presently there are 8,238 cases which, of course, is an increase of approximately 600 cases over the original estimate and accounts for the request for additional funds.

DISABILITY ASSISTANCE

Appropriation	\$3,600,000
Anticipated expenditure.....	4,125,000
Estimated deficit.....	525,000

In the original budget preparation the department estimated approximately 3,250 cases. The caseload is now 3,600 cases and although the deficit might appear to be only \$525,000, actually, through an intramural transfer of \$375,000 in September this tended to make our request at this point less.

GENERAL RELIEF

Anticipated expenditure.....	2,275,000
Estimated deficit.....	375,000

Although the department is running approximately 100 cases less than originally estimated, expenses have been higher. This is because the department has been meeting some additional needs of these fringe area people who are not eligible for assistance under any one of the federally assisted programs. Boston is not recognized as a major unemployment area, but it is extremely difficult for people in the middle years to obtain employment and while they are waiting to be eligible for Old Age Assistance must receive General Relief.

During the year 1964, legislative changes not contemplated at the time of budget preparation were enacted which, of course, affected the financial picture. Recently the nursing home rates for approved homes were increased 31 cents a day and it has affected approximately 950 welfare cases at \$120 or \$111,000 per annum. In September of this year, the Legislature increased the Leisure

Time Activities grant by \$1 a month necessitating an additional cost of \$138,000. Also in September of this year the Legislature relieved many married children of financial responsibility for their parents and it is contemplated that this will affect approximately 700 cases at \$15 a month which will add a gross cost of \$126,000. The public housing authorities have increased rents for public assistance recipients at an average of \$5 a month and at this point we have 3,600 persons living in public housing projects and an increased rental of \$60 a year will amount to \$216,000. Other small provisions having slight effect are increases in the burial allowance and a change in the income for potential recipients of Medical Assistance for the Aged.

It is respectfully requested that the funds requested by the department be appropriated as expeditiously as possible.

Dear Mr. Scagnoli:

This will acknowledge receipt of your recent correspondence as it relates to the resolution of Councillor W. J. Foley that all police vehicles be equipped with protective gear to be used in assisting Fire Department members during emergencies such as the recent Bellflower and Trumbull Streets fires.

It is my opinion that such a resolution is not consistent with the Rules and Regulations of the Boston Police Department. I specifically refer to Rule 47, Section 5 of the Boston Police Department Rules and Regulations which clearly outlines police duties and obligations at the scene of a fire.

Section 5 reads: "The Police at fires shall assist in all practical ways in the preservation of life, the protection of property and the prevention of crime; but after the arrival of the first piece of apparatus they shall not enter a burning building except for the purpose of saving life, or at the request of a superior officer of the Fire Department for the purpose of performing a proper police service. They shall maintain at all times cordial and helpful relations with the fire department and its individual members." Other sections of this rule outline various duties of the police as they relate to fires. This should indicate a line of demarcation as exists between a police and fire department.

All cruising cars of the Boston Police Department have regulation helmets, a department issue, and this together with standard equipment issued by the Boston Police Department are deemed adequate for the police in the performance of their duties at the scene of a fire.

Because of the foregoing and since additional expenditure by this department are not deemed advisable at this time, I can only recommend that matters be allowed to continue as they are.

Whereas, There are many persons in the city who are interested in the problem of ward boundaries; be it therefore

Resolved, That an appropriate committee of the City Council be assigned the task of holding a meeting which is widely and publicly advertised in the first week of December, 1964, for the purpose of affording those interested parties in the city an opportunity to be heard upon this subject; be it further

Resolved, That there be specifically extended invitations to this meeting to all senators of the Great and General Court representing any portion of the City of Boston, all representatives in the Great and General Court representing districts any part of which may be in the City of Boston, to the Democratic City Committee, the Republican City Committee, the League of Women Voters, the Board of Election Commissioners, and such other persons and agencies as the Chairman of the committee assigned this task shall determine would be useful.

Councillor LANGONE in the chair.

Coun. CRAVEN moved to amend the foregoing resolution by adding at the end thereof the following words:

"and that such other organizations as Democratic Women on Wheels, Democratic State Committee, Republican State Committee, and any other organizations which are concerned with the political subdivisions of the City of Boston be invited."

DEVELOPING AIR RIGHTS OVER SOUTH STATION.

Whereas, There has recently been proposed a garage structure for the South Station area to contain in excess of 5,000 parking spaces costing about \$10,000,000, at or near the junction of the Toll Road and the Central Artery;

Whereas, A recent statute permits the city to sell the air rights over any municipal parking facility;

Whereas, A structure of sufficient strength to contain the movement of 5,000 automobiles would quite readily sustain an additional light structure upon the roof of the building;

Whereas, The roof of this proposed garage would be approximately 14.5 acres in extent;

Whereas, It would be architecturally desirable to incorporate modifications to sustain air rights usage from the beginning of the design of the building;

Whereas, It is obviously necessary as a matter of fiscal necessity to adopt a policy vis-a-vis the expenditure of public funds so as to require a direct and substantial increase in the tax base from an investment of this magnitude; be it therefore

Resolved, That the City Council invites the attention of all concerned; that is, the Board of the Boston Redevelopment Authority, his Honor the Mayor, the Boston Real Estate Board, the Citizens Advisory Council, the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce, the Boston Retail Trade Board, and all concerned with the economic growth of this community to the urgent necessity of immediately developing concepts for the full and complete exploitation of the economic opportunity afforded by the possibility of developing the air rights on the enormous expanse of this proposed garage.

The resolution was adopted under the suspension of the rules.

STATEMENT BY COUNCILLOR G. F. FOLEY.

Upon receiving unanimous consent to make a statement, Councillor G. F. Foley stated that he had not received an answer from the Traffic Commissioner to an order filed at the last meeting requesting certain information concerning parking meters and he expected an answer at the next meeting.

AGREEMENT FOR ACQUISITION AND INSTALLATION OF PARKING METERS.

Gentlemen:

Enclosed is a communication I have received from the Commissioner of Traffic and Parking stressing the urgent need for eight thousand manually operated vandal resistant parking meters in addition to the thousand authorized by the order passed by your Honorable Body on May 11, 1964, so that once again parking may be adequately controlled in this city.

The current situation is well known to your Honorable Body. Suffice it to say, therefore, that I wholeheartedly approve the Traffic and Parking Commissioner's request.

Accordingly, I recommend that your Honorable Body adopt the accompanying order authorizing the purchase by the Traffic and Parking Commission of eight thousand parking meters under an agreement providing that payment of the purchase price is to be made over a period of five years out of receipts from the meters without appropriation by the city. You will note that the authorization is subject to G.L., c. 30, s. 39M, requiring the contract to be awarded to the lowest responsible and eligible bidder on the basis of competitive bids.

Dear Sir:

It is respectfully requested that the permission of the City Council be obtained for the acquisition of 8,000 parking meters and that the moneys to be used for payment shall be charged against the item "Parking Meter Fees."

It is estimated that the cost will not exceed the sum of \$520,000. No cash outlay will be required inasmuch as it is possible to acquire the meters without cost and to pay for them over a period of five years from the revenue received when the meters are installed. This would mean a payment each year of approximately \$104,000 from revenue received from the meters for this five-year period.

It is our intention that these meters be purchased subject to General Laws, c. 30, s. 39M, requiring that the contract be awarded to the lowest responsible and eligible bidder on the basis of competitive bid.

Our intention is to purchase vandal-resistant meters. Our experience with this type of meter for the past two years has been satisfactory and to date no case of forcible entry has occurred.

Since the adjustments involved are long overdue, I recommend early adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

An Ordinance Concerning the Salaries of Officers in Charge of Certain Departments of the City.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

SECTION 1. The first paragraph of section 5 of chapter 3 of the Revised Ordinances of 1961, as amended, is hereby further amended by striking out clauses (1), (2), (3), (4), and (5), and inserting in place thereof the following clauses:—

(1) The director of administrative services, seventeen thousand five hundred dollars; the supervisor of budgets, twelve thousand dollars; the supervisor of personnel, twelve thousand dollars; and the purchasing agent, twelve thousand dollars.

(2) The commissioner of assessing, fifteen thousand dollars; the two associate commissioners of assessing, thirteen thousand dollars each; and the member of the board of review in the assessing department appointed from the public at large, ninety-seven hundred and fifty dollars.

(3) The city auditor, thirteen thousand five hundred dollars.

(4) The building commissioner, thirteen thousand five hundred dollars.

(5) The city clerk, eleven thousand dollars in addition to any compensation to which he may be entitled under section 19F of chapter 41 of the General Laws.

SECTION 2. Said first paragraph of said section 5 of said chapter 3, as amended, is hereby further amended by striking out clauses (7), (8), (9), (10) and (11), and inserting in place thereof the following clauses:—

(7) The collector-treasurer, thirteen thousand five hundred dollars.

(8) The corporation counsel, sixteen thousand dollars.

(9) The chairman of the board of election commissioners, eleven thousand dollars; and the other three members of said board, nine thousand dollars each.

(10) The fire commissioner, sixteen thousand dollars.

(11) The health commissioner, sixteen thousand dollars.

SECTION 3. Said first paragraph of said section 5 of said chapter 3, as amended, is hereby further amended by striking out clauses (13), (14), (15), (16), (17) and (18), and inserting in place thereof the following clauses:—

(13) The commissioner of parks and recreation, thirteen thousand five hundred dollars.

(14) The penal institutions commissioner, ten thousand dollars.

(14A) The police commissioner, sixteen thousand dollars.

(15) The commissioner of public works, sixteen thousand dollars.

(16) The commissioner of real property, twelve thousand dollars; and the assistant commissioner of real property, ten thousand five hundred dollars.

(17) The commissioner of traffic and parking, twelve thousand dollars.

(18) The veterans benefits and services commissioner, eleven thousand dollars.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect as of July first, nineteen hundred and sixty-four.

The current \$5,000 annual salary which, since January 7, 1952, has been paid City Councillors under the Plan A Charter cannot today be said to be commensurate with either the dignity or the duties of the office of City Councillor elected at large under the Plan A Charter. Consequently, I am recommending adoption of the ordinance transmitted herewith, which, effective January 4, 1965, would make the annual salary of the President of the City Council \$8,000, and of the other City Councillors \$7,500.

Gentlemen:

You call to attention that G. L., c. 54, s. 1, empowers you during the current month of December to make a new division of Boston's territory "into such number of wards as may be fixed by law." You inquire, as I understand it, what number of wards are fixed by law.

At the outset, I must emphasize that the answer to this question is not free from doubt. However, reading St. 1875, c. 243, s. 1, with St. 1876, c. 242, s. 1, and St. 1911, c. 469, s. 6, I am of the opinion that the number of wards fixed by law is twenty-six, no more no less. Both St. 1914, c. 630, which fixed the number of wards as not less than twenty-four nor more than thirty-six and St. 1924, c. 410, s. 2, which fixed the number of wards as not more than thirty-six, were specifically limited by their terms to their respective years 1914 and 1924.

My dear Councillor:

As President of Local 419, AFL-CIO, Penal Department, Deer Island, I wish to present to the Council Body several discriminatory factors that the one hundred and five officers at Deer Island are, and have been subjected to for some years. We certainly comprehend the present plight of the city financially speaking but in justice to the employees here, we wish to bring to your attention the many discrepancies that now exist. Traditionally we have been paid comparably with the Boston Police and Fire Departments but far below the standard set up by the State Correctional system. There were some changes made by the recent Jacobs Survey, but we feel that a further study should be inaugurated to rectify their errors.

At the present time we have 605 inmates, which is average as against the population of Walpole 534, Concord 449, Bridgewater 833, Deer Island is not considered maximum security legally, yet our population consists of 25 percent recidivist who have been in maximum security institutions, and 20 percent here at the present time are under twenty-one years of age. This of course disproves the popular theory that we only have the mild type inmates serving time at this Island institution. Assuredly they are only committed on misdemeanors but the pure fact remains that 25 percent have at one time or another done maximum security time elsewhere. We take the same Civil Service examination as the State Correction Officers, assume the same type hazards, but do not receive the same monetary or fringe benefits.

The "longevity law" as it applies to us is another factor that should be studied and rectified. At the present time any officer hired from the Civil Service list must wait sixteen years before reaching maximum salary as against the State system which is seven years and the Boston Police and Fire Departments which is three years.

Recently in an examination for Correction Officer for Deer Island approximately 27 were examined and 4 passed, thus bringing forcibly to the Council that this job no longer appeals to the career-minded man. This can be traced directly to the many inequities that exist in this department. Under normal conditions several hundred would have applied and there would have been an established list to call from in the event that any would have been needed. As it is now we must call civilians without any previous experience to fill the gap that apathy and discrimination have enveloped us in.

Sirs, we wish to place a request before the County Commissioners for a more comprehensive study and revision of the present situation as it now exists at Deer Island and that necessary adjustments commensurate with the work and hazards involved be thoroughly studied. We sincerely hope this will be one of your first tasks and your Honorable Body will and can be assured all the coopera-

tion necessary in this long ignored matter. We most earnestly desire your help and ask your indulgence to this end. With kind personal regards I am,

1. Report on petition of John J. Daley (referred December 7) to be reimbursed as the result of an execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Public Works Department—recommending passage of the accompanying order:

Ordered, That the sum of two hundred forty-seven dollars and twenty cents (\$247.20) be allowed and paid to John J. Daley in reimbursement for amount of execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Public Works Department, Highway Division, said sum to be charged to the appropriation for executions of Court, Damage Claims and Reimbursements.

2. Report on petition of Stephen J. McDonough (referred November 30) to be reimbursed as the result of an execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Fire Department—recommending passage of the accompanying order:

Ordered, That the sum of three hundred seven dollars and seventy-three cents (\$307.73) be allowed and paid to Stephen J. McDonough in reimbursement for amount of execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Fire Department, assigned to Engine 26, said sum to be charged to the appropriation for executions of Court, Damage Claims and Reimbursements.

3. Report on petition of George V. Richardson (referred December 7) to be reimbursed as the result of two executions, issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Public Works Department—recommending passage of the accompanying order:

Ordered, That the sum of nine hundred fifty-nine dollars and fifty-five cents (\$959.55) be allowed and paid to George V. Richardson in reimbursement for amount of two executions issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Public Works Department, Highway Division, said sum to be charged to the appropriation for executions of Court, Damage Claims and Reimbursements.

4. Report on petition of George V. Richardson (referred December 7) to be reimbursed as the result of an execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Public Works Department—recommending passage of the accompanying order.

Ordered, That the sum of five hundred and fifty dollars (\$550) be allowed and paid to George V. Richardson in reimbursement for amount of execution issued against him on account of his acts as an employee of the Public Works Department, Highway Division, said sum to be charged to the appropriation for executions of Court, Damage Claims and Reimbursements.

The reports were accepted, and the orders were severally passed.

LEGAL OPINION ON REDRAWING WARD
LINES.

The following was received:

City of Boston,

Law Department, December 21, 1964.

To the Honorable the City Council.

Gentlemen:

At your meeting on December 7, you passed several orders respecting a new division of the city into wards, to one of which I replied that day.

The current statute on the subject is G. L., c. 54, s. 1, which, as far as relevant, provides:

"In nineteen hundred and twenty-four, and every tenth year thereafter, in December, a city, by vote of its city council, may make a new division of its territory into such number of wards as may be fixed by law. The boundaries of such wards shall be so arranged that the wards shall contain, as nearly as can be ascertained and as may be consistent with well defined limits to each ward, an equal number of voters . . ."

You ask that I draft legislation which would extend to December 31, 1965, your power to make such redivision of the wards of the city.

The Constitution of Massachusetts prescribes that "In the year nineteen hundred and thirty-five and every tenth year thereafter a census of the inhabitants of each city and town shall be taken and a special enumeration shall be made of the legal voters therein. Said special enumeration shall also specify the number of legal voters residing in each precinct of each town containing twelve thousand or more inhabitants according to said census and in each ward of each city. Each special enumeration shall be the basis for determining the representative districts . . ." (Const. Amdt. Art. XXI, as amended by Art. LXXI), and further that "Each special enumeration of legal voters required in the preceding article of amendment shall likewise be the basis for determining the senatorial districts . . ." (Const. Amdt. Art. XXII, as amended by Art. LXXI).

In 1965, the date of the census is to be January first. G. L., c. 9, s. 6. Compare *Opinion of the Justices*, 220 Mass. 609. Under the above-quoted constitutional provisions, the special enumeration of legal voters made in the course of that census "shall be the basis" for determining the representative and senatorial districts. If the wards are changed after January first, the Constitution does not furnish the General Court with the means of ascertaining the number of voters who resided in the ward on January first. The Constitution does not intend that the number of voters be ascertained in any other manner than by the official enumeration, taken and returned to the Secretary of the Commonwealth incident to the census. It is this official enumeration which is to be the sole guide of the General Court in making the apportionment. Any redivision of wards made after December in the current year cannot under the Constitution of Massachusetts be the basis for the next apportionment of representative and senatorial districts. *Opinion of the Justices*, 142 Mass. 601. *Opinion of the Justices*, 157 Mass. 595, esp. 597. Consequently, it is not possible under the Constitution of Massachusetts for me to draft legislation which would extend to December 31, 1965, your power to redivide the city into wards; and I am unable to comply with your request.

In accordance with another of the above-mentioned orders passed by your Honorable Body on December 7, I enclose summaries of the decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States in *Baker v. Carr*, 369 U. S. 186, *Gray v. Sanders*, 372 U. S. 368, *Westberry v. Sanders*, 376 U. S. 1, *WMCA, Inc. v. Lomenzo*,—U. S.—(decided June 15, 1964), and the case most nearly in point, *Reynolds v. Sims*—U. S. (also decided June 15, 1964).

Appended to these summaries is a supplemental memorandum dealing with the United States Supreme Court's use of the word "population."

You will note that in the provisions quoted above from the Constitution of Massachusetts, the corresponding term is "legal voters", which *Opinion of the Justices*, 247 Mass. 583, 588, states to mean "those persons, who, possessing the constitutional qualifications to become voters, have proved them by taking the necessary steps to become duly recorded on lists of registered voters of the several cities and towns." Thus, if you do redivide the city into wards during the remaining days of this month, the boundaries of such wards must be so arranged that the wards shall contain, as nearly as can be ascertained and as may be consistent with well defined limits to each ward, an equal number of registered voters. This is a mandate of the statute which you may not disregard.

Pursuant to the other of your orders, I have caused to be prepared and transmit herewith a memorandum concerning your power to make a new division of the city into wards.

Resolved, That the City Council of the City of Boston extends to our former member, James S. Coffey and his family, the sincere condolences of the members and express the wish that Almighty God will give them the strength to sustain them in their bereavement.

The resolution was adopted by a unanimous rising vote.

POLICY PROGRAM TO REDUCE IRRITA-
TIONS BETWEEN POLICE DEPART-
MENT AND CITIZENRY.

Coun. W. J. FOLEY offered the following:

Resolved, That the Police Commissioner be requested through his Honor the Mayor, to adopt as an immediate and primary policy of the department a multifaceted program to reduce the many irritations which may exist between the Police Department and the bulk of the law-abiding citizenry; be it further

Resolved, That specifically attention should be given to

1. Studying the successful method of cooperation between citizens and police developed in the Beacon Hill area by the commanding officer of Division 2.

2. Paying close attention to the handling of emergency telephone calls by the officers assigned to turret duty stressing courtesy and protection of a reassuring, capable, and positive image.

3. Devising methods whereby owners of stolen automobiles may be spared the cost of towing and storage.

4. A crash program involving the assignment of additional men to solve and end car thievery in Boston based on (a) the presumption that most such miscreants are multiple offenders; (b) a massive program at the time of motor vehicle inspection to provide car owners of the make of automobiles most affected by thievery, devices which prevent or inhibit theft.

5. Shifting as soon as possible the bulk of tagging duties to officers of limited authority from the Boston Traffic Commission.

6. The keeping of victims of crimes continuously informed insofar as it is possible of the progress of investigations even though such investigations in a given case might be unsuccessful.

The resolution was adopted under suspension of the rules.

MINIMUM COMPENSATION FOR POLICE.

Coun. G. F. FOLEY called up, under assignment, No. 1 on the Calendar, viz.:

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested in the year 1964 to study and prepare special legislation for presentation to the Great and General Court either during the legislative year 1965 or 1966 which will clarify the authority of the Boston City Council in redrawing ward lines in the City of Boston.
