These policies and procedures are designed to ensure that community residents and local leaders can effectively participate in the decisions regarding the sale of real estate sold by the Department of Neighborhood Development. A formal policy was also created to establish a uniform and time-limited structure for this process so that developers and residents alike have a clear understanding of how the process works, enabling both to more effectively plan for, and participate in, the decision-making process.

Finally, the Department of Neighborhood Development already has the ultimate legal responsibility to ensure that all property disposition is done in conformance with all Federal, State and Local governing laws. It also has the responsibility of public trust, to ensure that all property disposition is conducted with the goal of providing the greatest public benefits to all of the City's residents. DND is therefore obligated to retain the final authority to make decisions about property dispo-

sition in order to faithfully execute these legal and public trust responsibilities.

I transmit herewith for your approval an order approving the acceptance of Section 51 of Chapter 127 of the Acts of 1999 which grants by local option a cost of living adjustment (COLA) in excess of the percentage increase allowed by G.L. c. 32 § 103(c), up to a maximum of 3% on the first \$12,000 of the retirement allowance.

In December 1997, this City accepted the provisions of Section 288 of Chapter 194 of the Acts of 1997, which authorized COLA payments payable by the Boston Retirement Board. However, Section 288 limited the COLA payments to less than 3% in those years

in which the percentage recommended by the report filed with the state legislature was less than 3%. Section 51 of Chapter 127 of the Acts of 1999 authorizes the Boston Retirement Board to pay a COLA in excess of that allowed by Section 288, up to the maximum of 3% on the first \$ 12,000 of the retirement allowance.

Prior to awarding an increased COLA, the Boston Retirement Board must provide the City Council with 30 days advance notice of the public meeting at which the Board will consider the increased COLA. Any increased COLA under Section 51 for Fiscal Year 2000 must be approved in Fiscal Year 2000 and will be

retroactive to July 1, 1999.

The provision of Section 51 takes effect upon acceptance by the Boston Retirement Board and upon acceptance of the City Council and the Mayor. The Boston Retirement Board accepted Section 51 on December 15, 1999. I urge your Honorable Body to approve the acceptance so that the amendment to the COLA provisions can take effect in the City without delay.

Notwithstanding the provisions of any law to the contrary, and in order to promote the public good, the State-Boston Retirement Board is hereby authorized and directed to retire ISRAEL AMOS, a firefighter of the City of Boston, who as the result of serious injuries sustained in the performance of his job, specifically a severely sprained left ankle, while fighting a fire at 271 Centre Street in Dorchester on July 12, 1989, is totally and permanently incapacitated for further service as a firefighter. The annual amount of pension payable to ISRAEL AMOS under this act shall be fixed in an amount equal to the regular rate of compensation which would have been paid had he continued in service as a firefighter in said city at the grade held by him at the time of his retirement.

Such retirement shall become effective as of the date following the last day on which he is entitled to receive

regular compensation.

Upon the retirement of ISRAEL AMOS, the retirement board of said city shall forthwith pay to him all amounts standing to his credit in the annuity savings

fund of the retirement system of said city.

Section 2. The provisions of section one hundred of chapter forty-one of the General Laws shall continue to apply to ISRAEL AMOS relative to his indemnification by the City of Boston for any hospital, medical and related expenses which may be incurred by him after the date of his retirement as a result of the aforementioned

incapacity.

Section 3. Upon the death of ISRAEL AMOS, if his wife at the time of the accident survives him, and as along as she remains unmarried, the City shall pay to his wife an annual annuity equal to the sum of three-fourths of the amount of the pension payable to him at the time of his death and three hundred and twelve dollars (\$312) for each child of ISRAEL AMOS for such time as such child is either under eighteen years of age or totally physically or mentally incapacitated from working. If the spouse of ISRAEL AMOS remarries, the city shall pay to his wife at the time of the accident, in lieu of the aforesaid annuity, an annual annuity of five-hundred and twenty dollars (\$520) for each child of ISRAEL AMOS for such time as such child is residing with her and is either under eighteen years of age on January first of the year in question or totally or mentally incapacitated from working

Whereas, The Boston City Council, based on the testimony of these parties will be in a position to address the challenges of today's housing market through enacting legislation that makes a difference to the residents of this city, therefore be it

We are writing to update you on our activities as members of the Audit Committee of the City of Boston for the year ended December 31, 1999. During this period. we had four meetings with the City's independent auditors, KPMG LLP ("KPMG"), and City Management to discuss various aspects of the City's audit as follows:

February 4, 1999

The meeting centered on a discussion of the management letters issued by KPMG for the City and the Public Health Commission ("PHC") as a result of their audits for the fiscal year 1998 financial statements.

KPMG's report on the City's internal controls contained no material weaknesses.

KPMG's report on the PHC's internal controls contained material weaknesses.

Ed Collins, CFO, updated the Board on the City's year 2000 readiness.

June 3, 1999

Representatives from the PHC, John Auerbach,

Executive Director and Walter Ramos, Director of Administration, provided a presentation of their responses to its material weakness management letter. We are pleased to report that the PHC is diligently working towards resolving the issues.

September 30, 1999

The meeting was devoted to a discussion of the status of the City, PHC and Single audits, any significant issues raised to date and the timetables for completion. No significant issues were presented to us at this time.

Sally Glora, City Auditor, provided an overview of the City's conversion to PeopleSoft. The conversion of the general ledger took place on July 1, 1999, as planned.

December 23, 1999

An overview of the City's financial condition and results of the audit of the City's fiscal 1999 financial statements was presented to the Committee.

KPMG informed us that there were no disagreements with City Management and all audit issues relating to the financial statements were resolved to their satisfaction. KPMG issued an unqualified opinion on the City's financial statements for the fiscal year 1999.

In 1996 we reported about the disturbing trend and deficit position of the City's Blue Cross/Blue Shield health claims fund. We are pleased to see that the deficit had been reduced from \$20 million in 1996 to \$5 million in 1999.

The results of the PHC audit for fiscal 1999 were discussed. We are pleased to report that KPMG and City representatives experienced great improvements with PHC and Boston Medical Center operations during the fiscal year. Accordingly, KPMG has issued a report on internal controls containing no material weaknesses.

The City's audit reports discussed above are on file in the City Clerk's office.

During the past year, the Committee members have received the full cooperation of the Chief Financial Officer and the City Auditor in dealing with the issues presented to us. If any member of the City Council has further questions about our activities, please contact me at 345-1210.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as follows:

Whereas, The City of Boston real estate market is cyclical in nature; and

Whereas, The City is currently in the midst of a "hot" real estate market in which average rents have escalated significantly since the mid-1990s; and

Whereas, The City's response to the need to create additional housing has not met the need for affordable housing; therefore be it ordained:

Section 1. The following terms all have the following

meanings:

"Aggregate installment payment", shall mean the sum of all property tax payments due for real property at

each installment payment period.

"Collector-Treasurer", shall mean the Collector-Treasurer of the City of Boston, who amongst other duties, is authorized to collect tax revenues on behalf of the City of Boston.

"Installment payment", shall have the same meaning as the term is used in Section 57C of Chapter 59 of the

Massachusetts General Laws.

"Neighborhood Housing Trust", shall have the same meaning as the trust created pursuant to City of Boston Ordinance 1986 c.7 Section 1.

"Property taxes", shall mean the sum of taxes on real property to be collected by the collector-treasurer pursuant to the provisions of Section 2 of Chapter 60 of the Massachusetts General Laws.

"Real property", shall have the same meaning as the term is used in Section 2A of Chapter 59 of the Massachusetts General Laws.

Section 2. Affordable Housing Funds:

For each taxable year, the collect-treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to deposit two and one-half percent of the aggregate installment payment due into the Neighborhood Housing Trust.

Section 3. Annual Report.

The Collector-Treasurer shall prepare and submit, annually, a report on the Neighborhood Housing Trust to the City Council. Said report shall include, but not be limited to the following, a financial statement, which provides a list of project support by funding, the amount

of funding each project received, and the neighborhood of each project. Said report shall be submitted to the Council on or before June 30 of each year.

Section 4. Effective Date.

This act shall take effect June 1, 2000. Referred to the Committee on Housing.

Councillors TURNER, ROSS, HENNIGAN, ROACHE, YANCEY, HONAN and SCAPICCHIO offered the following:

Ordered, That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under clause (1) of Section eight of Article two, as amended, of the Amendments to

the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

Whereas, The voters of the Commonwealth through the initiative process voted to eliminate rent control in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in the 1994

General Election; and

Whereas, The General Court subsequently codified the vote of the electorate in 1995; and

Whereas, A majority of voters of the City of Boston voted on the initiative to uphold the protections to vulnerable citizens via rent control; and

Whereas, Since the end of rent control in the City of Boston, the cost of rental housing has increased faster than the increase in inflation or the consumer price index; and

Whereas, There is a need on the part of City government to offer programs and/or solutions to the affordable rent problem in the City of Boston, therefore be it

Ordained, Section 1. Notwithstanding any general or special

laws to the contrary.

Section 2. The title of this act shall be the "Boston

Rent Stabilization Act".

Section 3. When used in this act, unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

"Base rent", shall mean the rent charged a tenant as of December 31, 2000.

"Collector-Treasurer", shall mean the collector-treasurer of the City of Boston.

"Department", shall mean the Treasury Department of the City of Boston.

"Dwelling unit", shall mean a residential unit of an eligible housing accommodation.

"Eligible housing accommodation", shall mean any building or structure containing six (6) or fewer residential units, except those units which are governmentally assisted.

"Governmentally assisted", shall mean any unit that is owned, operated, leased or otherwise assisted through a subsidy, under any federal, state or local program, whether the subsidy is attached to the unit or to the inhabitant of the unit.

"Landlord", shall mean the individual who holds title to any eligible housing accommodation in any manner, including without limitation, a partnership, corporation or trust.

"Rent", shall mean the consideration, including without limitation, all bonuses, gratuities, or charges contingent or otherwise demanded or received for, or in connection with, the use of occupancy of an eligible housing accommodation.

"Rent rate", shall mean the rent charged a tenant pursuant to the provisions of this act.

"Rental housing agreement", shall mean an agreement, oral, written or implied, between a landlord and a tenant for the use and occupancy of an eligible housing accommodation.

"Tenant", shall mean a tenant, subtenant, lessee, sublessee or other person entitled under the terms of a rental housing agreement to the use and occupancy of an eligible housing accommodation.

"Vacancy rate", shall mean the percentage of vacant residential dwelling units as determined by comparing the number of vacant residential units which shall be in the numerator, to the number of residential units, which shall be the denominator.

Section 4. Voluntary Rent Control.

There shall be a program to achieve voluntary rent control within eligible housing accommodations in the City of Boston. Said program shall remain in effect when the citywide vacancy rate for any calendar year is five percent or less.

When the citywide vacancy rate for any calendar year is five percent or less, a landlord of an eligible housing accommodation shall be entitled to claim an exemption equal to not more than twenty percent of the assessed value of said eligible housing accommodations, provided, that the change in the base rent or rent rate does not exceed the maximum allowable adjustment in rent pursuant to Section 7: provided further, that no such exemption shall be allowed for a landlord of a governmentally assisted unit.

Section 5. Collector-Treasurer.

The Collector-Treasurer shall be responsible for carrying out the provisions of this act. The Collector-Treasurer shall promulgate such policies, rules, rulings and regulations, and shall issue such orders that are necessary to carry out the provisions of this act. The Collector-Treasurer shall, as provided in Section 7, allow for an adjustment to the maximum rent for a dwelling unit in an eligible housing accommodation.

Section 6. Registration.

The Collector-Treasurer shall require that a landlord seeking to claim the exemption pursuant to Section 3 register the eligible housing accommodation on a form(s) approved by the Collector-Treasurer; provided, that said forms shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, the following information:

(a) the address of the eligible housing accommoda-

(b) the name of the tenants residing in dwelling units of the eligible housing accommodation;

(c) the rent charged each tenant as of December 31 of the year for which the exemption is being claimed;

(d) the number of rooms of each dwelling unit of the

eligible housing accommodation.

One copy of each Apartment Registration Form, which pertains to the tenant's dwelling unit of the eligible housing accommodation, shall be sent by the owner to the tenant by certified mail.

For each year that a landlord seeks to claim the exemption pursuant to Section 4 of this act, he shall file

an Apartment Registration Form.

A landlord shall not be entitled to claim the exemption pursuant to Section 4 of this act if he has failed to file the Apartment Registration Form in the manner prescribed by this act and/or by rules and regulations promulgated by the Collector-Treasurer.

Section 7. Maximum Allowable Adjustment in Rent.

The Collector-Treasurer, commencing January 1, 2001, shall allow for an annual adjustment in the base rent charged a tenant of a dwelling unit of an eligible housing accommodation, the resulting rent shall be known as the rent rate. Said allowance shall be equal to an amount equal to the percentage increase in the consumer price index during the prior calendar year added to the base rent or the rent rate, whichever is applicable.

Section 8. Vacancy Prior to the End of the Year.

Where a tenant vacates a dwelling unit prior to the end of a year in which the landlord has taken the exemption pursuant to Section 4, and the eligible housing accommodation is rented to a new tenant, the rent rate provided in the new lease shall be no greater than the rent rate charged the vacating tenant.

Section 9. Penalties

It shall be unlawful for a landlord to claim an exemption pursuant to Section 3 for which he is not entitled to take pursuant to the provisions of this act. Any landlord receiving the exemption pursuant to Section 4 who is otherwise not entitled to receive said exemption shall pay any monies subsequently owed and shall be subject to a fine of five thousand dollars.

Section 10. Effective Date

This act shall take effect October 1, 2000. Referred to the Committee on Housing.

Whereas, The Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) holds title to many vacant parcels in the City;

Whereas, The BRA has opportunity to dispose of these parcels in the course of any calendar year; and

Whereas, Boston is currently in the midst of a "hot" real estate market in which the cost of housing has increased faster than the rate of increase in inflation and the consumer price index; and

Whereas, In the past, the disposition of these parcels has occurred without there being a plan to increase the

number of affordable housing units; and

Whereas, The disposition of these parcels represents opportunities to create additional affordable housing units; therefore be it

Ordained.

Section 1. Not withstanding any general or special laws to the contrary.

Section 2. That the title of this act shall be the "Boston Affordable Housing Development Act"

Section 3. When used in this act, unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context, the following terms all have the following meanings:

"Authority", shall mean the Boston Redevelopment

"Authority-owned parcel", shall mean a parcel or parcels of land to which the Boston Redevelopment Authority has title to or otherwise owns.

"Board", shall mean the Board of Directors of the Boston Redevelopment Authority.

"City", shall mean the City of Boston.
"City Council", shall mean the Boston City Council. "Developer", shall mean a person who purchases, leases or otherwise obtains the right to develop an authority-owned parcel.

"Disposition", shall mean the conveyance of title to a

parcel of land.

'Low-income household", shall mean a household that has an annual median income that is less than or equal to sixty-one percent (61%) of the area median income.

"Moderate-income household", shall mean a household that has an annual median income that is equal to or greater than sixty-one percent (61%), but less than or equal to eighty percent (80%) of the area median

"High moderate-income household", shall mean a household that has an annual median income that is equal to or greater than eighty-one percent (81%) but less than or equal to one hundred and twenty percent (120%) of the area median income.

"Market rate household", shall mean a household that has an annual median income greater than one hundred and twenty percent (120%) of the area median income.

"Low-income-housing", shall mean housing units developed for the benefit of or to be inhabited by lowincome households.

"Moderate-income housing", shall mean housing unit developed for the benefit of or to be inhabited by moderate income households.

"High moderate-income housing", shall mean housing units developed for the benefit of or to be inhabited by high moderate-income households.

"Market rate housing", shall mean housing units developed for the benefit of market income households.

"Person", shall mean an individual, partnership, corporation, trust or other entity which acquires title to or the right to develop or an authority-owned parcel.

Section 4. Disposition of Authority-Owned Parcels.

Whenever the Board effects disposition of an authority-owned parcel to a developer who is developing housing units on said parcel, said disposition shall require the development of housing units according to the following formula:

a. one-third of the housing units shall be low-income housing units, provided that one-half shall be developed for the benefit of households whose annual income is between zero (0%) and thirty percent (30%) of the area median income and one half shall be developed for the benefit of households whose annual income is between thirty-one and sixty percent of the area median income;

b. one-third of the housing units shall be moderate-

income housing units; and

c. one-third of the housing units shall be high moderate-income and market rate housing units; provided that one half shall be developed for the benefit of households whose annual income is between eighty-one percent (81%) and one hundred and twenty percent (120%) of the area median income and one half for the benefit of households whose income is over one hundred and twenty percent (120%) of the area median income.

Section 5. Additional Low-Income Housing Units. Nothing herein shall prohibit the Board from approving of a disposition that will provide low-income hous-

ing units in an amount greater than the formula pursuant to Section 4.

Section 6. Waiver Requests.

If the Board determines that it is in the best interest of the public that a proposed disposition of an authorityowned parcel not require the use of the formula pursuant to Section 4, it shall petition the City Council for a waiver from said requirement; provided that, said waiver request shall state clearly the reason(s) that a waiver is needed.

Section 7. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment.

#### ORDINANCE RE: AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT ACT (DOCKET NO. 0276)

Councillors TURNER, ROSS, HENNIGAN, ROACHE, YANCEY, HONAN, DAVIS-MULLEN, CONLEY, SCAPICCHIO and MURPHY offered the following:

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as fol-

Whereas, The City of Boston holds title to many vacant parcels in the City; and

Whereas, The City has opportunity to dispose of these parcels in the course of any calendar year; and

Whereas, The City is currently in the midst of a "hot" real estate market in which the cost of housing has increased faster than the rate of increase in inflation and the consumer price index; and

Whereas, In the past, the disposition of these parcels has occurred without there being a plan to increase the

number of affordable housing units; and

Whereas, The disposition of these parcels represents opportunities to create additional affordable housing units, therefore be it

Ordained:

Section 1. The title of this ordinance shall be the "Affordable Housing Development Ordinance".

Section 2. When used in this ordinance, unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context, the following terms hall have the following meanings:

"City", shall mean the City of Boston.

"City Council", shall mean the Boston City Council.

"City-owned parcels" shall mean a parcels of land to which the City of Boston has title to or otherwise owns.

"Commission", shall mean the Public Facilities Commission of the City of Boston or its successor

"Department", shall mean the Department of

Neighborhood.

"Developer" shall mean a person who purchases, leases or otherwise obtains the right to develop a cityowned parcel.

"Disposition", shall mean the conveyance of title to a

parcel.

"Low-income household", shall mean a household that has an annual median income that is less than or equal to sixty percent (60%) of the area median income.

'Moderate-income household", shall mean a household that has an annual median income that is equal to or greater than sixty-one percent (61%), but less than or equal to eighty percent (80%) of the area median income.

"High moderate-income household", shall mean a household that has an annual median income that is equal to or greater than eighty-one percent (81%) but less than or equal to one hundred and twenty percent (120%) of the area median Income.

"Market rate household", shall mean a household that has an annual median income greater than one hundred and twenty percent (120%) of the area median income.

"Low income-housing", shall mean housing units developed for the benefit of or to be inhabited by lowincome households.

'Moderate-income housing", shall mean housing units developed for the benefit of or to be inhabited by moderate income households.

"High moderate-income housing", shall mean housing units developed for the benefit of or to be inhabited

by high moderate-income households.

"Market rate housing", shall mean housing units developed for the benefit of market income households.

'Person', shall mean an individual, partnership, corporation, trust or other entity which acquires title to or the right to develop or a city-owned parcel.

Section 3. Disposition of City-owned Parcels.

Whenever the Commission effects disposition of a city-owned parcel, to a developer who is developing housing units on said parcel, said disposition shall require that said developer develop such housing units according to the following formula:

a. one-third of the housing units shall be low-income housing units, that one-half shall be developed for the benefit of households whose annual income is between zero (0%) and thirty percent (30%) of the area median income and one half shall be developed for the benefit of households whose annual income is between thirty-one (31%) and sixty percent (60%) of the area median income.

b. one-third of the housing units shall be moderate-

income housing units, and

c. one-third of the housing units shall be high moderate-income and market rate housing units; provided that one half shall be developed for the benefit of households whose annual income is between eighty-one percent (81%) and one hundred and twenty percent (120%) of the area median income and one half for the benefit of households whose income is over one hundred and twenty percent (120%) of the area median income.

Section 4. Additional Low-income Housing Units.

Nothing herein shall prohibit the Commission from approving of a disposition that will provide low-income housing units in an amount greater than the formula pursuant to Section 3.

Scction 5. Waiver Requests.

If the Commission determines that it is in the best interest of the public that a proposed disposition of a city-owned parcel not require the use of the formula pursuant to Section 3, it shall petition the City Council for a waiver from said requirement; provided that, said

waiver request shall state clearly the reason(s) that a waiver is needed.

Section 6. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON ELDERLY HOLD HEARING TO DETERMINE STATUS OF DRAMATIC INCREASE IN NUMBER OF GRANDPARENTS RAISING THEIR GRAND-CHILDREN (DOCKET NO. 0277)

Whereas, Neighborhoods throughout the City of Boston have seen a dramatic increase in the number of grandparents raising their grandchildren; and

Whereas, This emerging category of grandfamilies often does not fall under the traditional definition of

family; and

Whereas, Many of these grandfamilies are in need of substantial financial and social support but find themselves ineligible to receive benefits, or are afraid to report their status for fear of losing their grandchildren; and

Whereas, Boston Aging Concerns-Young and Old United, an organization dedicated to the recognition and support of this emerging population, are in discussions with the City of Boston to obtain a number of City owned parcels for development as an intergenerational community; and

Whereas, The affordable housing piece is but one component of what is required to support the grand-parents of the City of Boston who are raising their

grandchildren; therefore be it

Ordered, The Boston City Council Committee on Elderly hold a hearing to determine the status of the grandfamilies situation in Boston, what is being done to provide services to this community, and where there is a need for more support from the City; be it further

Ordered, That the Commission on Affairs of the Elderly, and other departments relevant to the development of a City policy specific to Grandfamilies, be invited to testify.

Referred to the Committee on Elderly.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SAFETY HOLD HEARING TO ALLOW TESTIMONY REGARDING FEASIBILITY OF REESTABLISHING TRAFFIC DIVISION WITHIN POLICE DEPARTMENT UTILIZING UNIFORMED POLICE OFFICERS TO ASSUME RESPONSIBILITIES OF TRAFFIC CONTROL (DOCKET NO. 0278)

Councillors ROACHE, FLAHERTY, FEENEY, HENNIGAN, HONAN, TURNER, DAVIS-MULLEN, MURPHY and ROSS offered the following:

Whereas, The recent increase in economic development and expansion has had a noticeable impact on a historically tedious traffic situation in the City and its neighborhoods; and

Ordered, All appropriate officials from the Boston Police and the Boston Transportation Departments, as well as other relevant departments be invited to testify.

Rules of the City Council 2000

General Rules Meeting Time

Rule 1. Unless otherwise ordered from time to time, and except on holidays, the regular meeting of the city

council shall be on Wednesdays at twelve o'clock P.M. in the Christopher lannella Council Chamber, 1 City Hall Square, Boston, 5th floor. Special meetings may be called at the president's discretion, upon a forty-eight hour notice from the time the notices are mailed or dispatched by special messenger, or relayed to each councillor's office. Special meetings of the council may be called by the president upon less than forty-eight hours notice in the case of an emergency, and with the consent of two-thirds of all members.

Quorum

Rule 2. A quorum of the council shall consist of seven members and any member may call for a roll call on the question of the presence of a quorum. If at any time any meeting is called to order, or if during a meeting a roll calls shows less than a quorum, the presiding officer shall call a recess of not more than ten minutes, after which time, if a quorum is not present, the meeting may be adjourned by the presiding officer.

Presiding Officer

Rule 3. The president of the council shall assume the chair at the hour set by the previous adjournment; shall call the members to order and after a roll call showing a quorum present, shall proceed with the regular order of business. The president shall select a president pro tempore to act in his or her absence and serve as vice chair of the committee of the Whole. In the event of the absence of both the president and the president pro tempore, the senior member by age shall preside. Said president pro tempore, or otherwise the senior member by age, shall serve as president in accordance with Section 11B of the city charter if the mayor and council president are absent from the city.

Appealing a Decision of the Chair

Rule 4. The presiding officer may speak to points of order in preference to other members, and shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal from the decision of the chair, but no appeal shall be considered unless properly seconded. No other business except a motion to adjourn or to lay on the table shall be in order until the question on appeal has been decided. The question shall be put as follows:

"Shall the decision of the chair stand as the judgment

of the Council?'

The vote shall be by a roll call, and it shall be decided in the affirmative unless a majority of the votes are to the contrary.

Recess

Rule 5. The presiding officer may at any time, during debate or otherwise, declare a recess for not more than ten minutes, any such action shall not be subject to appeal, nor shall any motions apply thereto.

Propounding Motions

Rule 6. The presiding officer shall propound all motions in the order in which they are moved, unless the subsequent motion shall be previous in its nature, provided that in naming sums and fixing time the largest sum and longest term shall be put first.

Deciding Questions

Rule 7. Subject to the provisions of these rules, the presiding officer shall, without debate, decide all questions relating to priority of business to be acted upon.

Dividing a Question

Rule 8. The presiding officer shall, at the request of any member, make a division of a question when the sense will admit of it.

Doubting the Vote

Rule 9. The presiding officer shall declare all votes; but if any member doubts a vote the president shall cause a rising vote to be taken and, when two members so request, shall cause the vote to be taken by a roll call.

Vacating the Chair

Rule 10. When the presiding officer shall desire to vacate the chair he or she shall call the president protempore, or in the absence of the president pro-tempore, any member to it; but the president or the president protempore, as the case may be, may resume the chair at will.

Agenda

Rule 11. The original and twenty-one copies of any message, ordinance, resolution, vote or other measure submitted by the Mayor shall be delivered to the office of the City Clerk before one o'clock P.M. on the regular work day preceding any meeting of the council. Such submission is a prerequisite to any item's consideration at such meeting.

The original and two copies of any order, ordinance, resolution or committee report (including consent agenda items, but not reports of the committee of the whole voted during a recess of a council meeting), provided that Rule 34 has been complied with in the case of committee reports, submitted by a councillor shall also be delivered before such time and to such place. Such submission is a prerequisite to any item's consideration at such meeting. Twenty copies are to be delivered to the city messenger by each councillor's office submitting the same; but only one copy of each matter to be considered on the consent agenda is to be given to the city messenger.

Duties of the Clerk

Rule 12. It shall be the duty of the city clerk, acting as clerk and parliamentarian of the council, to prepare and cause to be printed for each meeting a listing of all matters submitted for consideration to the council in accordance with Rule 11; such listing shall be known as the agenda, and it shall be divided into two sections, the latter of which shall be known as the consent agenda.

Said agenda shall include unfinished business of the preceding meetings, matters on the table, assignment, and thirty and sixty-day orders not acted upon in previous meetings. Said matters shall be listed in accordance with the order of business as described in Rule 15.

Said agenda shall be delivered to the city messenger by 4:30 PM on the regular workday preceding the scheduled meeting. It shall be the duty of the city messenger to compile the agenda, all matters listed on said agenda, the legislative calendar and any other documents appropriate to the scheduled meeting. Such compilation shall be known as "the packet", and it shall be promptly delivered to each council member and the staff director.

Corrections as to Form

Rule 13. The city clerk, with the approval of the president, and with the assistance of the corporation counsel if necessary, may make changes to correct the form of an ordinance once passed, but prior to its presentation to the mayor, provided however that its substance is not thereby affected.

Items of the Same Matter

Rule 14. In the event that resolutions or orders concerning the same subject are filed with the city clerk for consideration by the council, the clerk shall cause to have entered on the agenda only that resolution or order which was first filed and the name of the sponsor(s) to the similar resolution or order shall be added as a sponsoring member to the resolution or order which is placed on the agenda. Such action, however, shall not preclude any member from offering an amendment to said resolution.

Removal from the Consent Agenda

Rule 14A. Resolutions of condolences and congratulations filed in accordance with Rule 36 shall be listed upon the consent agenda. Any member of the council may object to the clerk upon such a filing, whereas the matter being objected to shall be removed from the consent agenda and placed on the agenda of the regular council business. No such resolution shall bear the name of any councillor not indicating consent to sponsorship.

All matters contained on the consent agenda shall be read as one and the question of adoption and passage of all said matters shall be by a single motion. The question shall be put as follows:

"The question now comes on approval of the various matters contained within the consent agenda."

Order of Business and Debate

Rule 15. At every regular meeting of the council the

order of business shall be as follows:

1. Communications from the mayor.

- 2. Presentation of petition, memorials, and remonstrances.
- 3. Reports of city officers and other.
- 4. Unfinished business of preceding meetings.
- Reports of committees.
- Orders and resolutions.
- 7. Consent agenda.

Motions and Orders

Rule 16. When a question is under debate the following motions shall be entertained and shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged:

1. To adjourn.

2. To lay on the table.

3. The previous question.

4. To close debate at a specified time.

5. To postpone to a day certain.

6. To commit.

7. To amend.

8. To postpone indefinitely.

Strike and Insert

Rule 17. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost shall not preclude amendment, or a motion to strike out and insert.

At the call of the president, motion(s) to amend shall be reduced to writing and copies given to members. Three copies shall be given to the City Clerk.

Adjourn

Rule 18. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time except on an immediate repetition or pending a verification of a vote; and that motion, the motion to lay on the table, the motion to take from the table, and the motion for the previous question shall be decided without debate.

Direct Bearing and Previously Debated Matters

Rule 19. No motion or proposition of a subject different from than under consideration shall be admitted under the color of an amendment.

Any motion, order, or resolution which in the opinion of the presiding officer does not have a direct bearing on the business of the council, or which has been previously debated and acted upon in the current municipal year, shall be referred to the committee of the whole, and shall not be further considered by the council except upon report by that committee. There shall be no appeal from the decision of the chair hereunder, and this rule shall not be subject to suspension. No motion shall apply, nor shall unanimous consent to speak on the matter so referred be in order.

The committee of the whole may report that any motion, order, or resolution, so referred to it, is out of order for the reasons stated above; and its report shall be a final disposition of the matter, subject to an appeal. Such appeal shall be governed by the same provisions as those governing appeals from rulings of the presiding officer.

Remanding Matters to the Mayor

Rule 20. Any order, ordinance, resolution, vote, or other measure submitted by the mayor shall be rejected without prejudice, unless when it is filed with the city clerk, it bears the certificate of the corporation counsel that, if adopted or passed in the form submitted by the mayor, it will be in accordance with the law.

Withdrawal of Motions

Rule 21. After a motion has been put by the presiding officer, it may be withdrawn by the presiding officer on the request of the sponsor, providing no objection.

Committee Assignment and Action

Rule 22. When a petition, order, or resolution relates to a subject that may properly be examined and reported upon by an existing committee of the council, such order or resolution shall, upon presentation, be referred to such committee. When a motion is made to refer any subject, and different committees are proposed, the motions shall be put in the following order:

1. To a standing committee of the council.

2. To a special committee of the council.

Any member offering a motion, order, or resolution which is referred to a committee may request that the chair of the committee set, within 30 days, a mutually agreeable date for a hearing.

Calling of Matters in Committee

Rule 23. If within twenty-one days, after a matter is referred to a committee, other than a matter referred to the Committee of the Whole under Rule 19, and the matter is not voted upon, it may be called by nine members of the Council.

If after twenty-one days, after a matter is referred to a committee, other than a matter referred to the Committee of the Whole under Rule 19, and the matter is not voted upon, it may be called by seven members of the Council.

If after sixty days, after a matter is referred to a committee, other than a matter referred to the Committee of the Whole under Rule 19, and the matter is not voted upon, it may be called by five members of the Council.

The chair of a committee may call a docket out of his/her committee at any time and ask that a vote be taken on the matter, provided that when such a call is made, the clerk will take a roll-call vote of the committee members to ascertain that a majority of the committee members support the call of the chair.

Matters Placed on File at Year End

Rule 24. The City Clerk shall place on file.any matter that has been in committee for more than sixty days prior to the last day of the calendar year. The City Clerk shall carry over and assign a new docket number to any matter that has been in committee for less than sixty days prior to the last day of the calendar year. Sixty-day orders shall be exempt from this rule.

Voting

Rule 25. In all votes the form of expression shall be "Ordered" for everything by way of command, and the form shall be "Resolved" for everything expressing opinions, principles, facts, or purposes.

Summons of Members

Rule 26. Upon request for a call of the yeas and nays, the president shall hold open the calling for a period of no longer than five minutes during which time the city messenger shall summons all members who are absent from the Iannella Council Chamber. The clerk shall call the names of the members in alphabetical order without interruption. Each member shall respond to his or her name when called by the clerk. No member shall be recorded after the name of the next member has been called in the prescribed manner, except by unanimous consent of all members present.

A majority present and voting

Rule 27. Every member who shall be present when a question is put, unless he or she is excluded by interest, shall vote in the affirmative or negative or shall respond "present", unless the council has for special reason excused that member from voting. Unless otherwise provided, a majority of those councillors present and voting at a meeting of the council, or a council committee, shall constitute a majority.

Absence of Sponsoring Member

Rule 28. In the event that the sponsoring member of any order, resolution, or other matter, excepting those contained on the consent agenda, is not present when the clerk reads said matter, the presiding officer shall instruct the clerk to withdraw said matter from consideration at that meeting.

Reconsideration

Rule 29. Once a vote has been taken, any member may move consideration thereof, but only at the same meeting. Debate on motions to reconsider shall be limited to thirty minutes, and no member shall occupy more than five minutes; but on a vote upon any subsidiary or incidental question, debate shall be limited to ten minutes, and no member shall occupy more than two minutes.

Rule 30. When a motion to reconsider has been decided that decision shall not be reconsidered, and no

question shall be twice reconsidered unless it has been amended after the reconsideration; nor shall any reconsideration be had upon the following motions:

1. To adjourn.

2. The previous question.

3. To lay on the table.4. To take from the table.

5. To close debate at a specified time.

A motion to reconsider may be laid on the table or postponed indefinitely, and the effect of such action in either case shall be to defeat the motion to reconsider.

Second Readings and Two-Thirds Majority Required Rule 31. All orders releasing rights, easements, or restrictions on land, all orders for the sale of land, all appropriations for the purchase of land, and all loans voted by the council shall require a vote of two-thirds of all members of the council, and shall be passed only after two separate readings and by two separate votes, the second of said readings and votes to be had not less than fourteen days after the first, except in cases in which a shorter period is authorized by law. Any order rescinding an order for any of the foregoing purposes shall require the same number of readings and votes as was required for the passage of the original order.

Adoption of Matters on Day Introduced

Rule 32. No ordinance or substitution of an ordinance may be adopted at the meeting at which it is submitted. This rule may not be suspended, except with unanimous consent.

Committees

Forty-eight hour Notice Required

Rule 33. No meeting of any committee shall be called upon less than forty-eight hours (exclusive of holidays and weekends) from the time the council staff shall have mailed the notices or dispatched them by special messenger; provided that meetings of the committee of the whole may be held for a specific purpose(s) at the call of the president, at the completion of council business and prior to final adjournment of any meeting of the council without such notice. Only that specific item(s) for which a committee of the whole hearing has been called shall be in order at such hearing.

The staff director, upon the scheduling of a committee hearing, shall promptly post a record of time, place, and subject matter of such hearing and shall cause a written notice thereof to be delivered to all councillors.

At the start of any committee hearing the committee chair shall state the procedure by which the hearing shall be governed. Unless changed by a majority of the committee members, the chair's procedure shall govern. The chair and members of any committee shall speak and question witnesses for not more than ten minutes at a time, provided that the sponsor(s) of the various committee proposals shall be given an opportunity to make the initial presentation.

No committee unless authorized by an order of the council shall incur any expense, including, but not limited to advertising and stenographic costs. No committee meeting, except the committee of the whole, shall be conducted on the day of any regular meeting of the council. No committee meeting shill be conducted on the same day and time as another committee meeting.

Committee Action

Rule 34. All items listed on the weekly agenda that are to be reported out of committee must be accompanied by a committee report. The committee chair shall draft the report. The chair must distribute the committee report to all members of the committee no less than 24 hours before the report is submitted to the clerk; but in any case no later than noon on the Monday before the council meeting at which the report is to be introduced.

It shall be the duty of the committee members to communicate their agreement, disagreement, abstention or amendment to the chair prior to the report's submission to the clerk. Any committee member who does not respond prior to the report being submitted to the clerk shall be deemed to be in favor of the report. However, no committee member's name shall be listed as in favor of

any report, unless the member has affirmatively communicated as such to the chair.

No committee member may sign on to any committee report after the report is filed with the clerk.

Committee Appointment, Structure and Role

Rule 35. The president of the City Council shall appoint all standing committees, all special committees, shall fill any vacancy and designate the rank of the members of each committee unless specifically directed otherwise by two-thirds of the council. All standing committees shall consist of between three and nine members.

The role of each committee shall be to provide a forum for in-depth review and analysis of all city departments, boards, and agencies, and to provide a means for residents of Boston to address their concerns with regard to services provided by the city.

Committees shall focus upon: (1) public policy, (2) efficiency of service delivery, and (3) cost containment, it being the goal of our city government to provide appropriate services while ensuring that public moneys, which derive from our citizenry, are spent wisely and cautiously.

Each committee shall recommend such changes in the ordinances or statutes as will provide the greatest necessary services for the tax moneys expended.

Committees of the Council

There shall be the following standing committees:

A) Committee of the Whole, which shall concern itself with any litigation involving the city council and

all other matters referred to it.

B) Committee on Arts and Humanities, which shall concern itself with the encouragement of the arts and humanities within out city, including cultural development, museums, performing arts, public art, art education, the support and funding of private art and cultural amenities within Boston, and locations and opportunities to display and/or present art works The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Art Commission, Mid-Town Cultural District, the Boston Arts Lottery Council and the Office of Cultural Affairs.

C) Committee on Banking and Community Investment, which shall concern itself with the delivery of banking services in the neighborhoods of Boston, including the availability of construction and mortgage loans for affordable housing in every neighborhood, the promotion of public policy goals such as community reinvestment, affirmative marketing and non-discriminatory lending policies, and the provision of banking services to smaller, neighborhood-based businesses. The committee shall also concern itself with the linking and leveraging of these objectives by use of city actions involving the purchase of banking services, deposits, borrowing and investment.

D) Committee on City and Neighborhood Services, which shall concern itself with the delivery of municipal services to the residents and neighborhoods of Boston, especially as they impact on youth, the disabled and infirm. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Boston Employment Commission, the Health and Hospitals, Parks and Recreation, and Library Departments, the Office of Neighborhood Services, the Office of Cable Communications, and the White and

Browne Funds.

E) Committee on Economic Development and Transportation, which shall concern itself with the physical and economic preservation and development of the city; transportation policies for the city, including issues related to mass transit, Logan' International Airport, the imposition of tolls, effects of the depression of the Central Artery, construction of the Third Harbor Tunnel, and construction of the 1-93 connector; the relationship of the city to the Metropolitan Arca Planning Council; planning of public buildings, including jail construction, the effect of large-scale development on neighborhoods and people of Boston, including avoidance of noise pollution, damage to the water table. protecting aecess to homes and businesses, and trucking

and safe disposal of construction material and debris. The Committee shall also concern itself with the various inspectional, regulatory and licensing activities, commerce, trade, and transportation policy of the city, including the promotion of fair trade, equal access, consumer education and protection, including councilissued licenses and permits. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Boston Industrial Development Finance and Boston Redevelopment Authorities, the Public Improvement, Public Facilities, and Economic Development and Industrial Commissions, the Inspectional Services and Transportation Departments and the Licensing Board, Zoning Commission, Mayor's Office of Consumer Affairs and Licensing and the Office of the Parking

F) Committee on Education and School Matters, which shall concern itself with the quality of education provided by the Boston Public Schools, including the Boston School Department budget, and structure of the School Department. The committee shall work to strengthen cooperation among city and state government, private enterprise, and institutions of higher learning. The committee shall exercise complete budget authority with respect to the School Department. The Committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Community Centers Commission.

G) Committee on the Elderly, which shall concern itself with the provision of services to elderly persons and the special problems of aging, including personal safety, access to health care, the promotion of independent living, home health services, nutrition, and transportation. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Commission on the Affairs of the

Elderly.

H) Committee on Environment and Historic Preservation, which shall concern itself with the natural and historic resources and landmarks of the city, including wetlands, the harbor, and the harbor islands. The committee shall have oversight with respect to the care, management, custody and use of public lands and buildings, except park land. The committee shall involve itself in the relationship between the city and Metropolitan District Commission, the Mass. Water Resources Authority, the Boston Water and Sewer Commission; the problems of pollution, conservation, preservation and energy. The committee shall also concern itself with the implementation of voluntary recycling and other resource recovery efforts, public and private; protection from improper storage, transportation, and disposal of wastes, especially hazardous and infectious wastes, reclamation of dump lands and polluted lands; and, the means and costs of disposal of waste products by the city and from businesses within the city. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Property Management, Public Works and Environment Departments.

I) Committee on Equity, which shall concern itself with promoting equal and fair access to public and private services and facilities for all Bostonians, including males, females, minorities, veterans, the disabled, and those of any religious persuasion' race or ethnicity, to the end that within our city, the rights and privileges espoused as the American ideal are not denied. The Committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Women's, Comparable Worth, Human Rights and Fair Housing Commissions, and the office of Minority and Women Business Enterprise and the Commission for Persons with Disabilities and the Affirmative Action

Office.

J) Committee on Government Operations, which shall concern itself with the organization and structure of city government, including departmental fees and charges. The committee shall have referred to it all proposed ordinances and special laws affecting the structure, duties, and responsibilities of city departments, agencies and commissions. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Administrative

Services, Election, and Law Departments; the Office of the Mayor except those components assigned to other committees; City Clerk, Registrar, Group Insurance, Execution of Courts, Workers' Compensation Service, Retirement Board and pension liabilities.

K) Committee on Housing, which shall concern itself with public policy involving the preservation, creation, and rehabilitation of housing in the city, including public housing programs. The committee is charged with evaluation of policies and programs of the city to insure an adequate supply of affordable housing; to advocate toward the goal of safe, decent, and affordable housing for all Bostonians; and to deal with the problem of homelessness in our city. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Emergency Shelter Commission, the Fair Housing Commission, the Boston Housing Authority and the Institutional Expansion Board.

L) Committee on Labor, ,r which shall concern itself with public policy issues affecting labor unions and members of collective bargaining units, both public and private, as they relate to the city. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Office of Labor

M) Committee on Post Audit and Oversight, which shall concern itself with evaluating the efficiency and effectiveness of city operations and program, and administrative compliance with the intent of legislation, including administrative regulations of departments, agencies and programs. The committee shall select areas for review, establish goals and objectives, collect and analyze data, and report to the council with recommendations, including possible legislative and programmatic changes based on its review and analysis. The Committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Auditing Department and the Boston Finance Commission.

N) Committee on Public Health, which shall concern itself with public health issues of Boston residents, including the impact of industry on the public health. The committee shall provide a forum for residents seeking a voice to express their concerns about cancer rates and heart disease, as these diseases may be exacerbated by pollution and environmental factors associated with urban living. The committee shall concern itself with efforts to prevent the onset of HIV and Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome and to offer progressive and efficacious treatment to those persons with AIDS and AIDS related complex. The committee shall also concern itself with programs aimed at reducing infant mortality in Boston.

O) Committee on Public Safety which shall concern itself with all efforts to protect citizens of Boston from crime and fire. It shall insure the delivery of fire and police protection to all neighborhoods of Boston. The committee shall also concern itself with evaluating, encouraging, and facilitating existing citizen-driven efforts to prevent crime, including arson, vandalism, gang and youth crime, assault, housebreak, and crime committed as a vehicle of prejudice. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to Fire and Police Departments, the Suffolk County Jail, Safe Neighborhoods, anti-crime efforts financed by state and

federal governments, and county matters.

P) Committee on Rules and Administration, which shall concern itself with the rules and administrative functions of the city council. The committee shall meet in confidence to discuss matters in accordance with M.G.L. c.39, s.23B (the state's Open Meeting Law). Adoption of the Rules of the City Council shall serve as an affirmative vote of the city council members to convene the committee, when the chair sees fit. The purpose of the committee's meetings shall be to address such issues as are outlined in the open meeting law. Adoption of said rules shall also serve as notice of the several meetings of the committee. The reconvening of the city council shall be governed by Rule 1 of these rules. The city clerk shall reproduce this section and post such

notice at the appropriate place(s) in city hall.

Q) Special Committee on State and Federal Relations, which shall concern itself with encouraging cooperation between the city and other levels of government to discourage duplicative programs, coordinate efforts. to provide services, present the Council's views to state and federal authorities, and maximize revenues available to the city from state and federal sources. The Committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Office of Intergovernmental Relations.

R) Committee on Tourism, which shall concern itself with the promotion of visits to our city by individuals and convention groups, develop programs whereby city agencies encourage tourism and best display the assets of our city to those who visit us, and, recommend legislation and/or other actions to make Boston a welcome place for visitors. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Office of Special Events and

S) Committee on University-Community Relations, which shall concern itself with developing an improved relationship between our neighborhoods and academic institutions impacting them, including the encouragement of undergraduate student housing, university master plans which respect neighborhood concerns, equitable agreements for services and payments in lieu of taxes, effective programs to curtail students misbehavior, and, mutually beneficial programs allowing university students to gain practical experience while assisting Boston school children, residents arid neighborhoods.

T) Committee on Veterans, which shall concern itself with facilities available for organized veterans and for delivery of services to veterans, with particular regard to the interface of public agencies, veterans and their organizations, including the dedication of surplus or underutilized properties and building for such purposes. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Veterans' Services Department and the Veterans' Graves Division of the Parks and Recreation Department.

U) Committee or Ways and Means, which shall exercise general oversight with respect to revenues and expenditures of the City of Boston and all other component units that comprise the "governmental entity" as defined by the National Council of Governmental Accounting Statement Three with the exception of the budget for the Boston School Department. The committee, which shall consist of nine members, may report to the council the cost of implementation of any order, ordinance, program or other initiative pending before the body, and shall make such report whenever requested by another committee or directed to do so by the council; shall be referred to it a!l matters concerning appropriations, the city budget, expenditures and loans; and, further, no appropriation, budget expenditure or loan shall be voted out of committee except upon a majority vote of its members. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Assessing, Auditing and Treasury Departments, and the Office of Budget Management.

There shall be the following special committees:

A) Special Committee on Accreditation, which shall concern itself with efforts to ensure accreditation of all Boston Public Schools. The Committee shall work to ensure that coordination between city agencies and the School Department is maximized in order to provide those services necessary to maintain accreditation of all Boston Public Schools.

B) Special Committee on Library Services, which shall concern itself with the siting of library facilities and studies undertaken to determine the need and feasibility of additional library services or facilities

C) Special Committee on Residency, which shall concern itself with the review of the city's policy regarding residency for city employees. The committee shall study existing state and local legislation, collective bargaining provisions and enforcement procedures affecting the city's residency policy. The committee shall exercise oversight with respect to the Residency Compliance

D) Special Committee on Youth Services, which shall concern itself with the provision of services to children and adolescents in Boston. The committee shall work to strengthen cooperation among city, state, and private agencies engaged in providing youth services and to expand support for public and private youth activities

E) Special Committee on Informational Technology, which shall concern itself with telecommunications, new technologies, information technology, computer technology and the Internet. This committee shall exercise oversight of the Management Information Systems Department (MIS), and the Office of Cable Communications. This committee shall explore ways for all city departments to become more effective and efficient in the use of computer technology for the benefit of residents of the city.

F) Special Committee on Flooding and Storm Damage, which shall concern itself with issues relevant to flooding in the City of Boston, including relief, prevention and the improvement of services. The committee shall retain oversight over the Boston Water and Sewer Commission, the Department of Public Works, and other appropriate commissions and departments when the above commissions and departments are

responding to flood issues.

G) Special Committee on the Census, which shall concern itself with issues relevant to census preparation and completion with the City of Boston. This committee shall not act upon issues relevant to redistricting of the council districts.

H) Special Committee on New School Sites, which shall concern itself with the necessity and acceptability of new school sites. The committee shall work with the school department and the Mayor's office in making its

determinations.

1) Special Committee on Job Training & Career Opportunities, which shall concern itself with job training and opportunities stemming from new and planned development, (such as the two Millennium projects, the South Boston Waterfront, etc.). The committee shall investigate ways in which the city can prepare its citizenry, young and old, for the various job opportunities that will be created due to the city's economic growth. Use of public school space for night classes shall be entertained by the committee. The committee shall work to develop ideas to help solve the problem of an undereducated work force.

J) Special Committee on Youth & Domestic Violence, which shall concern itself with the particular issues involved with violence towards children and amongst families. The committee shall examine existing city programs designed to deal with such issues and review suggestions for future policy and programs. Special attention may be paid to violence within the schools and programs to combat such violence. The committee will work to maintain the public's awareness and response to

these issues.

Council Accolades

Rule 36. The council, or any committee thereof, shall have the honor of recognizing persons, groups, and events of significant importance to the City of Boston.

Conduct in City Council

Contempt Citation

Rule 37. Every member about to speak shall rise, address the chair, and wait until recognized. No member shall be recognized when seated or away from his or her desk. In speaking, members shall refrain from mentioning other members by name, shall confine themselves to the question, shall not use unbecoming, abusive, or nonparliamentary language and shall avoid personalities. Any member who, in debate or otherwise, indulges in personalities or makes charges reflecting upon the character of another member, shall make an apology in open session at the meeting at which the offense was committed or at the next succeeding regular meeting and, failing to do so, shall be named by the president to be held in contempt and suspended from further participation in debate and statement until said apology is made.

Order of and Time Limit on Speaking

Rule 38. No member shall speak more than once on a question when another member who has not spoken claims the floor, and no member speaking shall, without consenting, be interrupted by another, except on a point of order.

A member may speak upon a matter for no more than ten minutes at a time. A member who has not spoken on a matter shall have priority and recognition by the chair whenever said member shall rise. The assistant city clerk, acting as assistant clerk of the council, shall inform the president whenever a member has spoken longer than ten minutes.

Conflict of Interest

Rule 39. No member shall engage in any business or transaction or shall have a financial or other private interest, direct or indirect, which is in conflict with the proper discharge of his or her official duties. A member who has a direct or indirect financial or other private interest, distinct from the public interest, in any proposed legislation shall publicly disclose, on the official record of the council, the nature and extent of such interest, and upon doing so shall be excused from voting on said question.

Guests

Rule 40. No person except a member of the council shall at any time be permitted to occupy a seat in the lannella Council Chamber of any member of the council. The city messenger shall enforce this rule.

Rule 41. Use of cell phones and pagers is strictly prohibited within the lannella Council Chamber. Such items must be turned off upon entering the Iannella Chamber, and any person violating this rule shall be asked to leave the chamber by the City Messenger.

Rule 42. No person, excepting council staff or a councillor's staff, shall be allowed in the anterooms or upon the council floor of the lannella Council Chamber, except upon invitation of the presiding officer. Seats reserved for the press, both electronic and print media, shall be reserved solely for accredited members of the press. Guests will be allowed in the gallery of the lannella Council Chamber when the council is in session, but no one will be admitted to said gallery after all seats are occupied. No demonstration of approval or disapproval from guests will be permitted, and if such demonstrations are made the gallery will be cleared. The city messenger shall enforce this rule.

Members of the Press on Council Floor

Rule 43. Members of the press in attendance shall refrain from discussion within the lannella Council Chamber with council members during a council meeting. No member of the press shall be allowed on the council floor, except with the permission of the president.

Rule 44. No person, who for compensation or reward acts to promote, oppose, or influence a matter pending before the council shall be admitted at any time to the lannella Council Chamber or anterooms thereof unless said person has registered with the city clerk; stating; the mature of his or her business.

Further Rules, Amendment and Suspension

Rule 45. Unless inconsistent with any provision of these rules, the proceedings of the council shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order, current edition.

Suspension of Rules

Rule 46. With the exception of Rule 19 which may not be suspended and Rules 11 and 32 which may be suspended only by a unanimous roll call of those present, the foregoing rules shall not be altered, amended, superseded or repealed at any time, except by a vote of two-thirds of all members of the council Provided, however, that Rule 11 may be suspended only in the case of an order, ordinance, vote, committee report or other measure submitted by the mayor or by a councillor calling for action by the council that is of any emergency

nature, namely that which imposes an imminent threat to the peace, health, or safety of the people or their property.

Adoption of Rules

Rule 47. The Rules of the City Council shall be adopted by a majority roll call vote at the first regular meeting of February of each year.

The Chair moved that the Rules be amended by

deleting the last sentence of Rule 3.

The motion was carried.

On motion of the Chair, the rules, as amended, were adopted, the order was passed, yeas 13.

ORDER FOR HEARING RE: JANUARY 27, 2000 MBTA INCIDENT WHEN FEMALE TEENAGE STUDENT WAS ASSAULTED ON ORANGE LINE BY GROUP OF FELLOW HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS (DOCKET NO. 0281)

Councillors DAVIS-MULLEN, HENNIGAN, ROSS, YANCEY and FEENEY offered the following:

Whereas, On Thursday, January 27, a female teenage Boston Public School student was assaulted on an Orange Line MBTA train by a group of fellow high school students because she was holding hands with another female; and

Whereas, The MBTA Police arrested four teenage Boston Public School students in connection with this incident for allegedly attacking and violating the civil

rights of the victim; and

Whereas, The suspects arrested in this incident allegedly taunted and attacked the victim calling her a "lesbian" because she was holding hands with another female: and

Whereas, On January 24, 2000, the Department of Education awarded the Boston Public Schools a \$40,000 "Safe Schools Initiative" grant that is to be used for promoting and educating "gay and straight" alliances among students; and

Whereas, Any incident of violence, hatred or ill behavior directed towards another individual because of any differences in sexual preference, race, gender or nationality must not be tolerated in our schools and our

society, therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council conduct a full public hearing regarding the January 27, 2000 MBTA incident, as well as to discuss what policies the school department has in place to educate students against this type of behavior, and be it further

Ordered, That the school department also discuss how and where the "Safe Schools Initiative" grant will be

spent, implemented and enforced.

MBTA TO ASSESS EMERGENCY SYSTEMS IN PLACE OR SYSTEMS THAT CAN BE PUT IN PLACE TO ASSIST VICTIMS IN TIMES OF TROUBLE AND FURTHER INVITING SCHOOL DEPARTMENT TO OUTLINE SENSITIVITY TRAINING PROGRAMS IN PLACE IN SCHOOL SYSTEM (DOCKET NO. 0283)

Councillor HENNIGAN asked that Docket No. 0283 be taken out of order. Hearing no objection the matter was before the body.

Councillors HENNIGAN, MURPHY, FLAHERTY, TURNER, ROSS, YANCEY and FEENEY offered the following:

Whereas, Last week, it was reported that a female student in the Boston Public School system was viciously attacked to a state of unconsciousness on an MBTA Orange Line train by other students, allegedly based upon stereotypical perceptions and gay bashing;

Whereas, The unimaginable fear and horror experienced by this young victim at this cruel and inhuman action has evoked shock and outrage from the public; and

Whereas, This is the second incident reported by the media in the last two weeks where personal injury

occurred on public transportation; and

Whereas, It is mandatory for taxi cabs in the City of Boston to be equipped with a switch to activate emergency amber flashing lights, affixed to the roof of the cab, in order to alert the public and police that a dangerous situation exists inside the vehicle that may be out of the control of the driver; and

Whereas, Procedures need to be in place for bystanders on public transportation to immediately contact the operator and/or authorities when crimes occur as most people want to aid a victim but may be unsure of how to do this on public transportation; now, therefore he if

Ordered, That the Boston City Council Committees on Public Safety and Education hold a hearing, inviting the MBTA to attend, to assess emergency systems in place or systems that can be put in place, to assist the victim(s) in times of trouble; and be it further

Ordered, That representatives of the Boston Public School attend the hearing to outline sensitivity training programs in place in the school system that address the variety of cultures and lifestyles represented in the school population in the City of Boston.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON HOUSING HOLD HEARING RE: 34 EAST SPRINGFIELD STREET AS WELL AS RESPONSIVENESS OF BHA MANAGEMENT TO COMPLAINTS FROM ABUTTERS (DOCKET NO. 0314)

Councillor KELLY offered the following:

Whereas, The BHA owned property at 34 East Springfield Street has been the subject of complaints to the Boston Police Department; and

Whereas, Similar complaints to the BHA regarding loud music, people shouting outside the building, and traffic approaching the building at odd hours have been ignored by the BHA after repeated attempts by residents that these problems be addressed; and

Whereas, Concerned neighbors have also complained about the deteriorating condition of the property and the BHA management has been unresponsive to these com-

plaints; be it therefore

Ordered, That the city council's Committee on Housing conduct a public hearing into the matter of the condition of the property at 34 East Springfield Street, Boston, as well as the responsiveness of the BHA management to complaints from abutters, and that representatives of the mayor's office, the BHA and the East Springfield Street Betterment Committee, be invited to attend;

Referred to the Committee on Housing.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON HOUSING HOLD HEARING RE: OVERSIGHT PRACTICES OF MONITORING COMMITTEE OF BOSTON HOUSING AUTHORITY (DOCKET NO. 0315)

Councillor KELLY offered the following:

Whereas, Recent reports in the Boston Herald have brought into question the management practices and financial accountability of the Boston Housing Authority; and

Whereas, It was reported on February 8, 2000, that the BHA had contracted for legal services with the law

firm of Gadsby & Hannah LLP for the amount of \$85,000, but when the bill was submitted, the bill was \$667,202, and this brings into question how Gadsby & Hannah could have so unexplainably underbid on this contract; and

Whereas, The BHA has come under criticism recently for its handling of evictions, discrimination complaints, housing assignment policies, vacant units in empty buildings, pay raises, and exorbitant legal fees; therefore be it

Ordered, That the city council's Committee on Housing conduct a public hearing into the management practices of the Boston Housing Authority, and that members of the BHA Monitoring Committee, or its Chair, as established by the mayor and city council by c.88, §2 of the Acts of 1989, be invited to attend to address the above issues.

Referred to the Committee on Housing.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS HOLD HEARING TO DETER-MINE WHETHER CITY SHOULD SUBMIT TO COMMONWEALTH AS PART OF ITS LEGISLATIVE AGENDA A PROPOSAL TO AMEND VOTER REGISTRATION POLICY, (DOCKET NO. 0316)

Councillors ROSS, SCAPICCHIO, TURNER, YANCEY and FEENEY offered the following:

Whereas, Voter participation in Boston and throughout the Commonwealth has steadily declined, particularly in municipal elections; and

Whereas, Requiring citizens to register twenty-one days in advance has provided a significant impediment to allowing new voters to become involved in the political process; and

Whereas, Most recently in the New Hampshire primaries, where same day voter registration is allowed, voters went to the polls to exercise in their constitutional right to vote in record numbers; and

Whereas, Removing impediments to the voting process can only strengthen the number of voters who turnout and participate in the election process; therefore be it

Ordered, That the Committee on Government Operations of the City Council convene a public hearing to determine whether Boston should submit to the Commonwealth, as part of its legislative agenda, a proposal to amend voter registration policy; and be it further

Ordered, That certain officials and others be invited to attend, including representatives from the Secretary of State's Office, the Election Department and various community-based organizations, residents and entities that have voiced their opinions on this issue.

Referred to the Committee of the Whole.

# RESOLUTION REGARDING INCLUSIONARY ZONING (DOCKET NO. 0317)

Councillors HONAN, HENNIGAN, ROSS, FLA-HERTY, MURPHY, ROACHE, TURNER and FEENEY offered the following:

Whereas, The vacancy rate in the City of Boston is less than 2 percent, and 50 percent of the City of Boston's households earn less than the median income; and

Whereas, Funding for housing through Federal and State budgets has continued to decline over the past several years, with the State housing budget dropping from \$220 million in 1990 to \$137.5 million by 1999; and

Whereas, The hot real estate market in the city has resulted in a growth in the development of luxury apartments and condominiums, with little development in the

affordable housing arena; and

Whereas, Low income and moderate income individuals and families are being forced to move outside the City of Boston due to the lack of affordable housing;

and

Whereas, The communities of Cambridge and Brookline have successfully adopted zoning by-laws calling for a 15% inclusionary zoning policy for the purpose of encouraging housing opportunities for people of all income levels and especially for increasing the supply of housing available to low and moderate income people; and

Whereas, These communities have continued to experience a growth in housing development with no adverse effect related to inclusionary zoning policies; therefore

be it

Resolved, That the Boston City Council in meeting assembled support the amendment of Article 80 of the City of Boston Zoning Code to provide mandatory, citywide, 15% on-site inclusionary zoning for all residential developments of 10 or more units, either new construction or adaptive reuse, with an option for off-site units or cash payment to the Neighborhood Housing Trust. Such payment shall be of comparable value to the affordable unit(s) that would have otherwise been provided in a comparable Inclusionary Project. The resulting affordable units shall be targeted to low and moderate income residents of the City of Boston, with the average unit being affordable to a household with an income equal to 65% of the area median and be subject to certain deed restrictions. This ordinance shall not alter the existing provisions linking new commercial and retail developments to affordable housing contributions.

Referred to the Committee on Housing.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SAFETY HOLD HEARING TO INVESTIGATE STATUS OF PENSION BENEFITS FOR FAMILY OF THOMAS CARNEY (DOCKET NO. 0318)

Ordered, That the Committee on Public Safety hold a hearing to investigate the status of pension benefits for the family of Thomas Carney; and be it further

Ordered, That officials from the Treasurer's office, the Boston Retirement Board, The Boston Police Patrolman's Association and appropriate medical personnel be invited to attend.

RESOLUTION THAT CITY COUNCIL PETITION MASSACHUSETTS SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES TO RESTORE \$15,000,000 IN AID TO CITY IN STATE BUDGET (DOCKET NO. 0319)

Councillors MURPHY, FLAHERTY, TURNER, SCAPICCHIO, HONAN, HENNIGAN, FEENEY, CONLEY and YANCEY offered the following:

Whereas, It has been reported that State aid to the City of Boston may be cut by more than \$15 million; and

Whereas, A large percentage of our City services including youth summer jobs programs are funded through this local aid; and

Whereas, The summer jobs programs have been successful in keeping the neighborhoods clean while instilling in our youth valuable job skills, strong work ethics, knowledge of the neighborhoods and pride in their City; and

Whereas, The loss of the summer jobs program will adversely affect our kids, our neighborhoods, our crimc rate and the aesthetics of our neighborhoods, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Boston City Council hereby pcti-

tions the State Senate and House of Representatives to restore the \$15 million in aid to the City of Boston in their budget; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this Resolution be transmitted by the Clerk of the City of Boston to House Speaker Thomas Finneran and Senate President Thomas Birmingham.

ORDER APPROVING PETITION FOR SPECIAL LAW RE: LICENSING OF TAXIS AND SIGHTSEEING AUTOS (DOCKET NO. 0320)

Ordered, That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause (1) of Section eight of Article two, as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

Petition for a Special Law re:
Licensing of Taxis and Sightseeing Autos

Section 1. The purpose of this act is to rest final approval authority of taxi medallions and sightseeing auto permits with the Boston City Council.

Section 2. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, a majority vote of the Boston City Council shall be required before any taxi medallion, or permit for a sightseeing auto is awarded to a petitioner.

Section 3. The Boston Police Department shall continue to process said medallions and permits as its police commissioner sees fit. Once the police department's process is complete with regard to a medallion or permit application, the police commissioner or his designee shall issue a report containing the petitioner's application and a recommendation as to whether the medallion or permit should be issued.

Section 4. Said reports shall be studied in committee at the city council, and a committee report shall be issued either supporting or not supporting the police commissioner or his/her designee's recommendation.

Section 5. This act shall take effect upon passage.

ON-CAMPUS HOUSING FOR ALL REGIS-TERED STUDENTS (DOCKET NO. 0322)

Councillors DAVIS-MULLEN, ROACHE, HONAN, MURPHY, ROSS, CONLEY, FEENEY and TURNER offered the following:

Whereas, The City of Boston is home to numerous colleges, universities and other institutions of higher learning that enroll thousands of students each year, from across the Commonwealth and across the nation;

Whereas, These colleges do not provide on-campus housing for every student. forcing students to seek offcampus apartments in close proximity to the college;

Whereas, The influx and impact of college students seeking housing in the community, particularly in the Allston/Brighton, Back Bay and Fenway areas, has resulted in a shortage of housing, thus creating a competitive environment and ultimate rise in market rents; and

Whereas, The residents of these impacted areas are forced to compete with students, and contend with landlords who know that students are willing to pay much higher than what the market would ordinarily dictate;

Whereas, The law of supply and demand, the competition between student and resident and the knowledge of colleges and universities that throwing students into the rental housing market has driven up the cost of living and housing for everyone in these impacted areas;

Whereas, Colleges and universities often expand their campuses for classroom size, institutional and educational purposes, but do not always provide a proposal on how they plan on housing and dealing with the increased enrollment of students that these additions will also bring; and

Whereas, These colleges and universities could ease the rental and housing crunch for all involved if they were required to provide a plan to house all of their students on-campus; and

Whereas, Most colleges and universities must file plans and apply to the Boston Redevelopment Authority for permits to build more classroom, research and extracurricular space, therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council conduct a public hearing to discuss and contemplate requiring colleges and universities to provide a long term proposal on providing on-campus housing all registered students; and be it further

Ordered, That the Boston City Council, in conjunction with the Mayor's Office and the Boston Redevelopment Authority, discuss creating and enforcing legislation that requires all educational institutions to tie in a plan for housing the expected increase of students that a proposal might bring before any permit or official sign-off is granted for construction

Referred to the Committee on University and Community Relations and the Committee on Housing.

Whereas, The process for deciding how to implement the cuts should not be an arbitrary one; therefore be it

Ordered, That the Committee on Education & School Matters hold a prompt hearing to discuss the matter; and be it further

Ordered, That the committee review the process for determining which students should be classified as in need of special education; and be it further

Ordered, That appropriate officials from the Boston School Department, including Superintendent Payzant, Michael Contompasis and Pia Durkin, and members of

the Special Needs Parents Advisory Council be invited to attend.

Referred to the Committee on Education and School Matters.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND TRANSPORTATION HOLD HEARING FOR PURPOSE OF ASCERTAINING BOSTON REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY'S POSITION ON MAKING AMENDMENTS TO ZONING CODE AND DETERMINE WHY SUCH AMENDMENTS HAVE NOT BEEN MADE IN DUE COURSE AS ALLOWED BY TERM OF SAID CODE (DOCKET NO. 0327)

Councillors FLAHERTY, ROSS, HONAN, MUR-PHY, TURNER, ROACHE, HENNIGAN, SCAPIC-CHIO, CONLEY, YANCEY, KELLY, FEENEY and DAVIS-MULLEN offered the following:

Whereas, Among the declared purposes of the Boston Zoning Code is the promotion of the health, safety, convenience, morals and welfare of the inhabitants of

the City of Boston; and

Whereas, Among the declared purposes of Article 26 and of Article 80 of the Code are the facilitation of an adequate provision of low- and moderate-income housing; the establishment of a balance between new, large-scale real estate development and the low- and moderate-income housing needs of the City of Boston; and the provision of job training to low- and moderate-income people; and

Whereas, In order to increase the availability of lowand moderate-income housing, the Code requires certain developers, as a condition of a grant of Zoning Relief, as that term is defined in Article 2A of the Code, to make a Housing Contribution Grant to the Neighborhood Housing Trust, or to contribute to the direct creation of low- and moderate-income housing; and

Whereas, In order to increase the opportunities for job training for low- and moderate-income people, the Code requires certain developers, as a condition of a grant of Zoning Relief, to make a Jobs Contribution Grant payment to the Neighborhood Housing Trust, or to create a job training program in compliance with the requirements set forth in the Code; and

Whereas, The Development Impact Use payment sums were originally set in 1983 at a rate of one dollar (\$1.00) for each square foot of gross floor area in excess of one-hundred thousand (100,000) square feet, in the case of a Jobs Contribution Grant; and five dollars (\$5.00) for each square foot of gross floor area in excess of one hundred thousand (100,000) square feet, in the case of a Housing Contribution Grant; and;

Whereas, The Code allows the Boston Redevelopment Authority to periodically recalculate the formulas comprising the amounts and rates of payment for the Housing Contribution Grant and the Jobs Contribution Grant, taking into account certain economic, housing and employment trends; and

Whereas, Those formulas have not in fact been recalculated, resulting in Development Impact Project Exactions which have been eroded by inflation and rendered inadequate to meet the goals and purposes of the Code; therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council Committee on Economic Development and Transportation conduct a hearing, inviting representatives of the Boston Redevelopment Authority, for the purposes of ascertaining the Authority's position on making such amendments to the Code, and determining why such amendments have not been made in due course as allowed by the terms of the Code.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION HOLD HEARING TO EXPLORE FEASIBILITY AND DESIRABILITY OF ESTABLISHING TEACHER EMERITUS PROGRAM IN CITY (DOCKET NO. 0328)

Councillors FLAHERTY and ROACHE offered the following:

Whereas, The quality of teaching depends upon effective initial preparation, supportive induction, and continuous access to appropriate learning opportunities throughout a teacher's career; and

Whereas, Teachers with access to new knowledge, enriched professional roles, and ongoing collegial work feel more efficacious in developing the capacity needed to teach their students well, and more positive about staying in the profession: and

staying in the profession; and
Whereas, There is an obvious need to prepare
teachers well initially and to create stable, high quality

sources of professional development; and

Whereas: Numerous teachers retired from the Boston Public Schools possess substantial content knowledge, pedagogical knowledge, pedagogical skills, sociocultural knowledge and skills, and personal and professional development experience; and

Whereas, Many of these retired teachers are eager to continue imparting their accumulated knowledge, skills, talent and experience to their peers active in the

teaching profession; and

Whereas, The Boston City Council acknowledges the ongoing development and potential contribution of educators beyond full-time service, and particularly recognizes the rich pool of experience which can facilitate the development of beginning and advanced teachers, therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council Committee on Education conduct a hearing, inviting representatives from the Boston Public Schools, the Boston School Committee, the Boston Teachers Union, and other interested and appropriate parties, to explore the feasibility and desirability of establishing a Teacher Emeritus program in the City of Boston.

Referred to the Committee on Education and School Matters.

ORDER THAT COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SAFETY HOLD HEARING TO ASSESS POTENTIAL DANGERS CAUSED BY CHANGE IN PRE-SCRIPTION DRUG COVERAGE RECENTLY ANNOUNCED BY TUFTS HEALTH PLAN (DOCKET NO. 0329)

Councillors FLAHERTY, ROACHE, HONAN, FEENEY, TURNER and HENNIGAN offered the following:

Whereas, It is estimated that there are as many as 40 to 50 million allergy sufferers in the United States, and as many as 100,000 in the City of Boston; and

Whereas, Allergy sufferers rely on antihistamines to relieve or prevent the symptoms of allergic rhinitis (hay fever) and other allergies, thereby enabling them to comfortably perform routine daily activities, including those associated with their employment; and

Whereas, Many antihistamines cause drowsiness, but newer ones, such as Zyrtec, Claritin and Allegra, rarely

cause this side effect; and

Whereas, Tufts Health Plan recently announced that it will no longer pay for the newer, non-sedating antihistamines preferred by many of its subscribers who are allergy sufferers; and

Whereas, This decision has been roundly criticized by the Massachusetts Allergy Society, physicians and

the public; and

Whereas, Two thousand three hundred thirteen City of Boston employees are enrolled in the Tufts individual health plan, 2,997 are enrolled in the Tufts family health plan, and 350 are enrolled in the Tufts senior plan; and

Whereas, Many of these subscribers are being forced, because of financial constraints and Tufts' new policy, to treat their allergies with antihistamines that are included in their Tufts health plan coverage but which are sedating; and

Whereas, Driver fatigue is blamed for as many as 240,000 motor vehicle accidents and 1,500 deaths each year in the United States, and more than thirty-one percent of fatal-to-the-driver commercial truck crashes are caused by drowsiness, and drivers taking sedating medications are at a six times greater risk of involvement in a sleep-related crash, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the National Transportation Safety Board, the American Medical Association, and the American Automobile Association;

Whereas, Many City of Boston employees who are Tufts subscribers and allergy sufferers are public safety personnel or else perform job duties which require the operation of motor vehicles or heavy equipment and which therefore implicate public safety issues; and

Whereas, It is in the public safety interest of the residents of Boston to assess the potential dangers caused by the change in prescription drug coverage recently announced by Tufts Health Plan, as well as the desirability of continuing to include Tufts among the health insurance options offered City of Boston employees; therefore be it

Whereas, City Code Inspectors, despite their efforts and increased numbers, will continue to face the challenge of eliminating the trash and rodent problems in our neighborhoods if the behavior of certain businesses and some residents does not change; and

Whereas, On February 14, 2000, the City of Boston's Inspectional Services Department mailed letters to the residents of East Boston, Charlestown and the North End requesting these residents to file an affidavit with the City of Boston that requires that a certified examiner test the safety of any exterior steel or wooden stairways, fire escapes and egresses on their property; and

Whereas, The Inspectional Services Department will be notifying and intends on requiring every eligible property owner in the city of Boston to comply with this

request every five years; and

Whereas, Property owners who the City of Boston determines are required to comply with this request must pay \$50 per application fee, must hire a certified or registered Massachusetts Professional Registered Engineer to inspect the property; and

Whereas, The intent of this regulation is to ensure that these structures are safe for use but there is concern

among residents regarding

A. The validity and enforceability of this regula-

B. The excessive cost of complying with the regulation, particularly for those residents on fixed incomes, and

C. If some property owners were mistakenly or unfairly required to comply with this regulation,

therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council conduct a full public hearing regarding this regulation for the purpose

of allowing the Inspectional Services Department to explain who is required to comply, how the regulation will be enforced and what structures would fall under the regulation, and be it further

Whereas, According to officials of the City of Boston Transportation Department, between 2,000 and 3,000, or 40 to 45 percent of the city's approximately 7,200 digital parking meters are routinely out of order; and

Whereas, It is estimated that vandalism accounts for

98 percent of all broken meters; and

Whereas, City ordinance prohibits parking at broken meters, thus reducing available metered parking spaces within city boundaries; and

Whereas, The problem of vandalism is so acute that the Transportation Department has created a new strike force team to monitor meters and scofflaw activity and has instituted new measures to prosecute meter vandals; and

Whereas, The City of Boston undertook a Pilot Program from October 5, 1998 to June 30, 1999 using

eoin/"Smart Card" operated meters; and

Whereas, The Pilot Program demonstrated an increase of seventy-eight percent in revenues in the first month alone as compared to the prior year, as well as increased consumer convenience, reduced "downtime" and maintenance of meters, and reduced fee collection costs; therefore be it

Ordered, That the City Council's Committee on Post Audit and Oversight eonduct a hearing to examine the cost, in dollars and manpower, of maintaining the current meters and to explore the feasibility of replacing the existing meters with the type used in the Pilot Program; and be it further

ORDINANCE REGARDING IMPROPER PREPARATION OF FOOD (DOCKET NO. 0366)

Councillor DAVIS-MULLEN offered the following: City of Boston In the year two thousand

AN ORDINANCE REGARDING IMPROPER PREPARATION OF FOOD

Whereas, In the City of Boston, numerous vendors distribute food items via pushearts and other mobile facilities; and

Whereas, The number of such vendors is expected to rise with the growth of Boston's population and tourism industry; and

Whereas, Those who live, work and visit the city frequent such vendors daily; and

Whereas, Tourism is a vital industry to the City of Boston; and

Whereas, It is a legitimate concern of the city to protect the health of its citizens and those working and visiting Boston; therefore

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as

follows:

Section 1. In the City of Boston, manufacturing, preparing, handling, serving and/or distributing food from any vehicle and/or pusheart and/or by any hawker, peddler or like transient vendor, as defined in Chapter 101 of the General Laws, without the use of sanitary gloves, shall be considered unsanitary or unhealthful conditions in accordance with Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 94, Section 305A.

Section 2. This ordinance shall apply only to "Ready to Eat Food" as defined in the State Sanitary Code - 105 CMR 590.00

Section 3. Sanitary Gloves shall be used in the following manner. A new pair shall be worn for each transaction.

On motion of Councilor DAVIS-MULLEN, the rules were suspended; the ordinance was passed.

Whereas, In its ability to recruit new professionals, the City of Boston cannot compete with high salaries, stock options, or bonuses that today's high tech companies offer; therefore be it

Ordered, That the Special Committee on Technology of the City Council convene a public hearing to determine how the City of Boston can improve its ability to recruit and retain technology professionals; and be it further

Ordered, That certain officials and others be invited to attend including the Director and appropriate representatives of the office of Management and Information Services, as well as appropriate representatives and the Director of Human Resources.

Whereas, The residents of the City of Boston have worked hard over the past twenty-five years to put attitudes of racial intolerance behind them and to dispel the image of Boston as a hotbed of bigotry; and

Whereas, People of all races throughout the City have come together to work in harmony on critical issues such as housing and education in order to make the City a better place for all its residents; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Boston City Council in meeting assembled go on record, as a united body, as publicly renouncing attitudes of racial intolerance and divisiveness.

President KELLY in the Chair.

The resolution was adopted under suspension of the rules.

RESOLUTION RE: ZERO-TOLERANCE POLICY FOR BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS (DOCKET NO. 0381)

Councillors DAVIS-MULLEN, FEENEY, HONAN and ROACHE offered the following:

Whereas, The Boston Public Schools have been plagued with violence in recent months; and

Whereas, Violence in the schools has been, and continues to be a problem without resolution; and

Whereas, School violence not only affects a victim's physical and mental well being, but also has ripple effects across the entire student body and is an impediment to learning; and

Whereas, There are students within the system who are repeatedly suspended, or expelled from one school but then assigned to another; and

Whereas, School violence and the transferring of those suspected of it from one school to another is simply unacceptable;

Whereas, Students that commit acts of violence need to be expelled from the system, or sent to alternative schools on a permanent basis; and

Whereas, The current discipline policy of the Boston Public Schools is failing our children; and

Whereas, The school committee is charged by state law to maintain and implement policy for the school system; and

Whereas, Maintaining a safe learning environment is the responsibility of the Boston School Committee; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Boston City Council, herein assembled, urges the Boston School Committee to courageously adopt a zero-tolerance policy for violence involving students of the Boston Public Schools; and be it further.

Resolved, That the Boston City Council recognizes the constitutional constraints involved with drafting such a policy, but is of the opinion that the safety of our students is a compelling governmental interest, and that such constraints should not stand in the way of a fair, but effective policy.

Councillor CONLEY moved that the resolution be amended in the first Resolved paragraph, Paragraph No. 10, by striking out the words "courageously adopt" and substitute the words "consider adopting."

The motion was carried.

The resolution, as amended, was referred to the Committee on Education and School Matters.

RESOLUTION THAT BOSTON CITY COUNCIL URGES FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO REQUIRE LABELING OF GENETICALLY MANIPULATED FOOD AND FURTHER URGES MORATORIUM ON PRODUCTION OF ANY MORE OF THESE FOODS UNTIL ACCEPTABLE TESTING SYSTEMS ARE IN PLACE (DOCKET NO. 0382)

Councillors HENNIGAN and SCAPICCHIO offered the following:

Whereas, Genetically engineered foods have never been proven safe, nor are genetically engineered foods tested by any federal agency as the Food and Drug Administration requires only that the companies engineering these foods state, on the "honor system" that the foods are safe with no further testing required; and

Whereas, Cornell University researcher, John Losey, and other researches indicated in repeated tests that the larvae from Monarch Butterflics were dying at an alarming rate from toxic pollen generated from the genetically engineered corn near their feeding sites; and

Whereas, A class action lawsuit has been brought against the Food and Drug Administration by some of the nation's most prominent anti-trust lawyers for rushing these novel, unpredictable and untested food technology products to the market; and

Whereas, Numerous bioengineers and related distinguished scientists have gone on record stating this technology clearly is different from traditional breeding methods and is highly probable to exhibit a host of undesirable health and environmental risk factors as well as great potential for negative cascade effects in the genetic cross pollination of beneficial plants, insects and other fragile ecosystems directly linked to the breeding of this novel experimental food production technology; now, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Boston City Council, in meeting assembled, urges the Federal Government to require labeling of genetically manipulated foods and further urges a moratorium on the production of any more of these foods until acceptable testing systems are in place; and be it further

Resolved, That March 26, 2000 be declared YOU ARE WHAT YOU EAT DAY in the City of Boston.

The resolution was adopted under suspension of the rules.

## STATEMENT OF COUNCILLOR DAVIS-MULLEN

Whereas, The open space enhancement portions of the project have yet to be contracted out, and

Whereas, Project and state officials have yet to determine which government agency will control and maintain the central corridor property in the future; and

Whereas, The City of Boston has a historic opportunity to create an active green space area in the heart of its downtown that will be the city's project legacy for generations to come; and

Whereas, It is incumbent upon the Boston City Council to present the Council's views on this very important component of the project to state officials responsible for planning the project's air and land rights; therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council's Committee on State and Federal Relations convene a hearing to solicit public testimony from federal and state officials, and to present the Council's views to said officials, in order to ensure future sensitive open space planning above the depressed central artery.

I transmit herewith for your approval an act relating to certain amendments to the housing and job exaction requirements (linkage) with respect to large-scale

commercial real estate development.

The attached act would amend Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 to allow the zoning commission to retroactively increase the measured value of the affordable housing exaction and the employment exaction imposed on large-scale commercial real estate development by the per cent increase in the combined index for the period since the enactment of Chapter 371; provided however, that the measured value of the affordable housing exaction shall be set at no more than seven dollars and eighteen cents, and the employment exaction

shall be set at no more than one dollar and forty-four

Since the measured value of the affordable housing exaction and the employment exaction has not been increased since the effective date of Chapter 371 (which occurred on October 5, 1987), the measured value of the exactions have lagged behind the general economic welfare of the commonwealth, and the cost of housing and job training has increased faster than the rate of increase in inflation and the consumer price index. This amendment would put the measured value of the exactions on a par with current market values.

I urge the City Council to pass this act as expeditiously as possible so that the City can increase the amounts being contributed towards the creation of affordable housing in the city and job training to low and moderate income residents in the city through exactions on large-scale real estate development.

Whereas, The General Court finds and declares that a serious public emergency exists in the City of Boston with respect to the housing and also the employment of a substantial number of the citizens of said city, as

further described below; and

Whereas, There is not an adequate supply of affordable housing for low and moderate income residents of the city; and

Whereas, The construction of new large-scale commercial real estate developments in the city tends to reduce the supply of affordable housing available to low

and moderate income residents; and

Whereas, In order to supply affordable housing for low and moderate income residents in the city in conjunction with the construction of new large-scale commercial real estate developments, an act was adopted by the General Court as Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987, which imposed an obligation on large-scale commercial real estate developments to mitigate their adverse impacts on the availability of such affordable housing by making development impact project exactions to provide revenue to meet the public exigency of the provision of affordable housing in the city; and

Whereas, Section 16 of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 provides that the measured value of the affordable housing exaction to be imposed is to be determined on the basis of a fixed dollar amount per square foot of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses in excess of one hundred thousand square feet of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses, exclusive in both cases of all accessory parking garage space, as determined by the zoning commission of the city upon recommendation by the Boston Redevelopment Authority, and further provides that the zoning commission of the city is authorized to increase said measured value three years after the effective date of Chapter 371 and no more frequently than at three year intervals thereafter, but any such increase shall not exceed the per cent of the increase in the combined index for the prior thirty-six month period; and

Whereas, The measured value of the affordable housing exaction was set at five dollars per square foot upon the effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and has not been increased since then; and

Whereas, There is a not an adequate supply of employment opportunities for low and moderate income residents of the city; and

Whereas, The construction of new large-scale commercial real estate developments in the city tends to reduce the number of jobs for which low and moderate income residents of the city are qualified; and

Whereas, In order to supply job opportunities to low and moderate income residents in the city in conjunction with the construction of new large-scale commercial real estate developments. Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 also imposed an obligation on large-scale commercial real estate developments to mitigate their adverse impacts on the availability of such employment opportunities by making an employment exaction to provide revenue to meet the public exigency of the provision of job training for low and moderate income res-

idents of the city; and

Whereas, Section 17 of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 provides that the measured value of the employment exaction to be imposed is to be determined on the basis of a fixed dollar amount per square foot of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses in excess of one hundred thousand square feet of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses, exclusive in both cases of all accessory parking garage space, as determined by the zoning commission of the city upon recommendation by the Boston Redevelopment Authority, and further provides that the zoning commission of the city is authorized to increase said measured value three years after the effective date of Chapter 371 and no more frequently than at three year intervals thereafter, but any such increase shall not exceed the per cent of the increase in the combined index for the prior thirty-six month period; and

index for the prior thirty-six month period; and
Whereas, The measured value of the employment
exaction was set at one dollar per square foot upon the
effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and has

not been increased since then; and

Whereas. The City of Boston is currently in the midst of a "hot" real estate and economic market in which the cost of housing and job training has increased faster than the rate of increase in inflation and the consumer price index.

Now, therefore, be it enacted as follows:

Section 1: Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 is hereby amended by inserting after Section 16 thereof the

following new Section 16A:

"Section 16A. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the zoning commission shall be authorized to increase the measured value of the affordable housing exaction by the per cent of the increase in the combined index for the period commencing as of the effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and ending as of the most recent anniversary date of such effective date occurring prior to the enactment of this act, notwithstanding that such period is in excess of the thirty-six month period described in Section 16; provided, however, that the zoning commission shall not be authorized to set the measured value of the affordable housing exaction at more than seven dollars and eighteen cents per square foot of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses in excess of one hundred thousand square feet devoted to exaction uses, exclusive in both cases of all accessory parking garage space.

Section 2: Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 is hereby amended by inserting after Section 17 thereof the

following new Section 17A:

"Section 17A. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the zoning commission shall be authorized to increase the measured value of the employment exaction by the per cent of the increase in the combined index for the period commencing as of the effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and ending as of the most recent anniversary date of such effective date occurring prior to the enactment of this act notwithstanding that such period is in excess of the thirty-six month period described in Section 17; provided, however, that the zoning commission shall not be authorized to set the measured value of the employment exaction at more than

one dollar and forty-four cents per square foot of gross floor are,a devoted to exaction uses in excess of one hundred thousand square feet devoted to exaction uses, exclusive in both cases of all accessory parking garage space.

Section 3: The zoning commission is hereby authorized to adopt such regulations or rules as will effectuate the provisions of the amendment described in Sections 1 and 2 above, including without limitation, such regulations and rules as may be required to amend Section 80B-7 of the Boston Zoning Code to reflect such provisions.

Section 4: This act shall take effect immediately upon its enactment.

ORDER APPROVING PETITION FOR SPECIAL LAW TO PROVIDE MINIMUM RETIREMENT ALLOWANCE OF \$12,000 TO RETIREES OF THE STATE-BOSTON RETIREMENT SYSTEM WHO RETIRED WITH AT LEAST TWENTY-FIVE YEARS OF CREDITABLE SERVICE WITH AN EMPLOYER MEMBER OF STATE-BOSTON RETIREMENT SYSTEM (DOCKET NO. 0484)

I transmit herewith for your approval a Petition to the

General Court to provide a minimum retirement allowance of \$12,000 to retirees of the State-Boston Retirement System who retired with at least twenty-five years of creditable service with an employer member of

the State-Boston Retirement System.

This Body recently adopted legislation authorizing the awards of Cost of Living Adjustments to our retirees. However, COLAs are computed on a base pension of \$12,000. For those retirees whose pensions fall below this base amount, their COLAs are computed on the lower base amount. The proposed minimum base pension of \$12,000 would bring everyone up to the base upon which COLAs would be computed.

In the 1998 legislative session, retirees of the State Retirement System and the State Teachers' Retirement System were afforded a minimum pension of \$10,000. However, no legislative provision was included to provide a mechanism for local governments to provide a similar minimum pension to local retirees. Therefore, 1 offer this Home Rule Petition to provide a \$12,000 minimum pension, which is relative to the poverty guidelines for the Federal Food Stamp program and

other public assistance programs.

It is estimated that there are approximately 700 to 800 retirees who currently receive a pension below \$12,000, who would benefit from this proposal. I strongly urge the City Council to act on this legislation which would provide a pension upgrade to those individuals who rely on their Boston pension as their primary support, while that support is currently well below the Federal Poverty Guidelines. With this legislation, we can begin to assist these retirees.

(a) such member retired on superannuation with at least twenty-five years of creditable service performed as an employee of a public agency served by the State-Boston Retirement System, or

(b) such member retired on ordinary disability under section six with at least twenty-five years of creditable service performed as an employee of a public agency served by the State-Boston Retirement System, or

(c) such member retired for accidental disability under section seven, and

the gross annual income of such member and spouse, if any, as shown by a notarized federal income tax return is less than or equal to one hundred and fifty percent of the non-farm Federal Poverty guidelines issued by the United States Department of Health and Human Services in effect at the time of the member's application.

The Boston Retirement Board shall adopt such rules and regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate to implement this provision.

Section 2:

This act shall be effective upon its passage.

### ORDER THAT CITY COUNCIL HOLD HEARING RE: 43 MELROSE STREET (DOCKET NO. 0492)

Councillor KELLY offered the following: Whereas, On or about August 10, 1909, the City of Boston took by eminent domain for school purposes, part of a parcel of land measuring approximately ten feet wide (10.0 feet) and forty-eight feet long beside 43 Melrose Street, Boston; and

Whereas, Since purchasing the property at 43 Melrose Street in 1984, the current owner, Christine Colley, has maintained the passageway as a driveway to alleviate the burden of limited parking in the neighborhood; and

Whereas, The rights, title, or interest in this particular driveway appear to have been clouded in ambiguity since the taking of certain parcels of land by eminent domain in 1909, and the bounds of the driveway have been set off by a fence for almost forty years; and

Whereas, The Land Court in 1999, in dismissing Ms Colley's adverse possession claim for the land, did acknowledge in its Decision granting the city's motion for summary judgment, that the property was under the care, custody and control of the City, noting: "[t]he City is the record owner of the adjacent Boston High site, which includes a strip of land Ms. Colley refers to as a 'driveway' and the City refers to as a 'passageway.'

Whereas, The Boston City Council, after having thoroughly researched the issue in 1989, concluded that the driveway served no school or public purpose, was not traversable as a fire lane, and was, in fact, used almost exclusively as a private driveway, and supported Ms. Colley's request to have the property conveyed to the owner of 43 Melrose Street; and

Whereas, G.L. c. 40 §15 states that upon notification to the City Council that a parcel "is no longer required for public purposes" the City Council may, with the approval of the Mayor, by a two-thirds vote, authorize the conveyance of such land; and

Whereas, G.L. c. 40 §15A states that land held by one agency or department may be transferred back to another for disposition consistent with the provisions of G.L. c. 40 §15, therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council conduct a public hearing into the further use of said land, and that the owner of 43 Melrose Street, Christine Colley, a representative of the Mayor's Office, a member of the School Department, the City's Law Department, and a representative of the Public Improvement Commission be invited to attend.

This budget, which is \$17.6 million larger than FY00, continues my commitment to improving education. The FY01 operating budget continues funding for the City's five year plan of reform, "Focus on Children" aimed at improving school performance. Among the programs and initiatives this budget funds are new resources for literacy and math programs; new instructional materials; on-going support for high-schools to meet accreditation standards; and continued investment in technology in the schools.

My commitment to schools is also illustrated through the City's Five Year Capital Plan. The City of Boston FY0l-FY05 Capital Plan includes authorization of the construction of three new schools: Orchard Gardens (grades K-8), Brunswick Gardens (grades 6-8), and

This budget provides our students with the tools necessary to meet the standards that have been established by the Boston School Committee. The school building program of the city of Boston shall not be subject to the provisions of section 44F of chapter 149 of the General Laws. I transmit herewith my Recommended Budget for Fiscal Year 2001 for the City of Boston and County of Suffolk. The Recommended Operating Budget totaling \$1.7 billion is 5.3 percent greater than the Fiscal Year 2000 Adopted Budget and would represent the City's 16th balanced budget in a row.

This budget reaffirms my commitment to the basic needs and services that make city living worthwhile. Notable however, is the City's growing responsibility for funding essential services that were traditionally shared at all levels of government. With the end of the state's seven year commitment to education reform, there are real questions about the future of the state-local relationship. Further, the traditional federal commitment to provide "safe, decent and affordable housing

for all Americans" is a distant memory. These issues, as well as rising fixed costs (including health insurance), are offset mainly by Boston's strong economy and my administration's ongoing efforts to maximize costefficiency and service delivery through sound fiscal management and reinvention of government services.

The Fiscal Year 2001 Operating Budget emphasizes the following priorities: improving the quality of residential life in the neighborhoods; accelerating the production of affordable housing; continuing the city's multi-year reform efforts in the Boston Public Schools; assisting in the healthy development of our City's youth at home, at school and in the community; and improving the public health through a variety of essential programs and services. I continue to direct resources towards improvement and maintenance of parks, libraries, schools, community centers, police and fire stations, and neighborhood business districts.

This budget is the result of a review of existing expenditures and new program needs and provides the best allocation of the City's available resources. I look forward to working with you during this process, and 1 respectfully request your favorable action on the Fiscal Year 2001 Operating Budget and the Five Year Capital

Plan for FY01 to FY05.

Petition for a Special Law re: The Destruction of

Whereas, Firearms and other similar weapons, when used for illegal or other inappropriate purposes, pose a

significant danger to the public good; and

Whereas, The marketplace is flooded by such weapons because of illegal sales or sales through unregulated markets; therefore the purpose of the following bill is to decrease the number of weapons entering the illegal and/or unregulated marketplace.

Section 1. The terms "Firearm", "Rifle", "Shotgun", "Sawed-off shotgun", "Machine gun", "Assault weapon", and "Weapon" shall have the same meaning

as is applied in M.G.L. c.140, s.121.

The term "Destroyed" shall mean to render the weapon useless or ineffective for its intended purpose.

Section 2. The police commissioner of the City of Boston shall cause all firearms, rifles, shotguns, sawedoff shotguns, machine guns, assault weapons and weapons, as defined above and brought into his/her custody through confiscation, gun buy-back programs or otherwise turned into the police department, to be destroyed.

Section 3. Such weapons that were purchased for use by the police department, but are no longer in use, shall

also be destroyed.

Section 4. The police commissioner shall administer this ordinance, provided that a weapon(s) is destroyed within a reasonable time period after any evidentiary or investigatory need for the weapon has ceased.

Whereas, Transportation consistently shows up as one of the most frequently identified unmet needs among elders in southwest Boston and transportation to medical appointments and grocery shopping are the

most pressing needs; and

Whereas, Ethos, a community-based, non-profit organizing serving the elderly and disabled, provided low-cost handicapped accessible, door-to-door transportation services for frail, homebound elders in southwest Boston for twenty-five years when in 1999 the city terminated its Meals on Wheels contract, which provided base funding for program operations; and

Whereas, Ethos' fleet of four wheelchair vans and one station wagon is a resource to meet the transportation needs of the elderly in southwest Boston for medical appointments, day care programs, grocery shopping and social and community events; and

Whereas, The City of Boston's Senior Shuttle does not have sufficient funds to expand its southwest Boston capacity and has expressed strong interest in expanding the capacity of its Senior Shuttle program through a sub-

contract arrangement; and

Whereas, Regular public transportation service is not readily accessible to elders in southwest Boston and the MBTA's Ride Program is perceived as difficult to access; now, therefore be it

Ordered, That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy, of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause (1) of Section eight of Article two, as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

Petition for a Special Law re:

The Destruction of Firearms in the City of Boston Whereas, Firearms and other similar weapons, when used for illegal or other inappropriate purposes, pose a

significant danger to the public good; and

Whereas, The marketplace is flooded by such weapons because of illegal sales or sales through unregulated markets; therefore the purpose of the following bill is to decrease the number of weapons entering the illegal and/or unregulated marketplace.

Section 1. (a) The terms "Firearm", "Rifle", "Shotgun", "Sawed-off shotgun", "Machine gun", "Assault weapon" and "Weapon" shall have the same meaning as is applied in M.G.L. c.140. s.121.

meaning as is applied in M.G.L. c. 140, s.121.
(b) The term "Destroyed" shall mean to render the weapon useless or ineffective for its intended purpose.

Section 2. The police commissioner of the City of Boston shall cause all firearms, rifles, shotguns, sawed-off shotguns, machine guns, assault weapons and weapons, as defined above, brought into his/her custody through confiscation, gun buy-back programs or otherwise turned into the police department, to be destroyed.

Section 3. Such weapons that were purchased for use by the police department, but are no longer in use, shall

be destroyed.

Section 4. The police commissioner shall administer this special law, provided that a weapon(s) is destroyed

within a reasonable time period after any evidentiary or investigatory need for the weapon has ceased.

The report was accepted; the order in the new draft was passed.

Docket Nos. 0275, 0276 and 0317 were withdrawn and referred back to the Committee on Housing.

Whereas, The Massachusetts Municipal Association is expecting local officials to comment on the proposed legislation before it is submitted to the state legislature; therefore be it

Whereas, This country is blessed to have as its First Amendment to the Constitution the Freedom of Speech; and

Whereas, Cities throughout the world have adopted means of celebrating their freedom of speech; and

Whereas, In Hyde Park, England, there exists within a village plaza a place known as "Speakers Corner" where people come to debate and speak about any and all issues; and

Whereas, The City of Boston is in a unique opportunity to redesign City Hall Plaza to include a variety of civic uses; therefore be it

Resolved, The Trust for City Hall Plaza pursue the establishment of a Speakers Corner where residents and visitors can assemble to exercise their First Amendment rights to free speech.

Whereas, The Community Reinvestment Act (the "CRA") was passed by Congress in 1977 to encourage financial institutions to help meet the credit needs of the communities they serve, to promote safe and sound lending practices, and to provide responsible retail banking and community development services; and

Whereas, Federal and state regulators — through the Federal Reserve, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, the Office of Thrift Supervision, and the Massachusetts Commissioner of Banks — monitor the performance of banks and thrifts in fulfilling their CRA

obligations; and

Whereas, A 1990 amendment to the CRA requires that CRA ratings be made public, and that each bank or thrift must maintain a public file that contains the public section of its most recent CRA performance review, a list of its services and branches, written comments from the public, and certain other information; and

(a) Abatement agreements negotiated under this ordinance shall apply to sites zoned for commercial or industrial use where there has been a release of oil or hazardous material, and shall be negotiated between the city and an eligible person as defined in section 2 of chapter 21 E.

(b) The abatement of outstanding interest, penalties, and payment of real estate tax obligations on such sites or portions of sites may be negotiated.

(c) The terms of such abatement agreements shall include, but shall not be limited to, the amount outstanding, the per cent of interest to accrue if determined applicable by the parties, the description of quantifiable monthly payments, the inception date of such payments, the date of final payment, late penalties, and any other contractual obligations arranged between the parties. The terms of repayment shall be set at the discretion of the Mayor or his/her designee and shall be included in the agreement between the parties.

Section 2. Persons authorized to negotiate agreements:

(a) The Mayor or his/her designee shall negotiate agreements as authorized under this ordinance.

(b) Before an agreement is negotiated, notice of the pending negotiation shall be sent to the district city councilor who represents the district where the site is located. Said notice shall include a description of the proposed development project and an invitation to attend said negotiations. A city councilor who is invited to attend may make written recommendations to the city's negotiator regarding contractual obligations to be contained in the final agreement between

the parties.

Section 3. Approval of abatement agreements:

(a) Approval of all abatement agreements shall require a majority vote of the City Council and approval by the Mayor.

Whereas, There are located within the City of Boston sites that are zoned for commercial or industrial use where there has been a release of oil or hazardous material; and

Whereas, The cleanup and development of such sites will benefit the environment and economic development

of the City of Boston; and

Whereas, The City Council urges the acceptance of section 59A of chapter 59 of the General Laws; therefore

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as follows:

Section 1. Scope:

(a) Abatement agreements negotiated under this ordinance shall apply to sites zoned for commercial or industrial use where there has been a release of oil or hazardous material, and shall be negotiated between the city and an eligible person as defined in section 2 of chapter 21E.

(b) The abatement of outstanding interest, penalties, and payment of real estate tax obligations on such sites or portions of sites may be negotiated.

- (c) The terms of such abatement agreements shall include, but shall not be limited to, the amount outstanding, the per cent of interest to accrue if determined applicable by the parties, the description of quantifiable monthly payments, the inception date of such payments, the date of final payment, late penalties, and any other contractual obligations arranged between the parties. The terms of repayment shall be set at the discretion of the Mayor or his/her designee and shall be included in the agreement between the parties.
- Section 2. Persons authored to negotiate agreements:
  (a) The Mayor or his/her designee shall negotiate agreements as authorized under this ordinance.
- (b) Before an agreement is negotiated, notice of the pending negotiation shall be sent to the district city councillor who represents the district where the site is located. Said notice shall include a description of the proposed development project and an invitation to attend said negotiations. A city councillor who is invited to attend may make written recommendations to the city's negotiator regarding contractual obligations to be contained in the final agreement between the parties.

Section 3. Approval of abatement agreements:

(a) Approval of all abatement agreements shall require a majority vote of the City Council and approval by the Mayor.

### AN ORDINANCE REGARDING RECYCLING MECHANISMS

Whereas, The City of Boston's Public Works Department makes available free recycling services to those who choose to participate; and

Whereas, Despite free recycling services, the City of Boston's targeted goals for recycling have not been realized; and

Whereas, Collection of recyclable materials from multi unit residential premises has lagged behind collections of such materials from premises of several units or less; and

Whereas, Instituting a recycling mechanism for multi unit residential premises will increase the amount of recyclable materials collected by the city; therefore Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as follows

Section 1. City of Boston Code, Ordinances, Chapter 7-13.4 is hereby amended by adding the following after

paragraph (g).

(h.) The owners of residential premises with ten (10) units or more shall submit to the Commissioner a recycling plan for their properties. The plan shall identify the respective property, and include the number of units, details for a holding facility for recyclable materials, and shall describe any structural changes that may be necessary for implementation of the holding facility. Said plans shall also include a statement by the owner that he/she will post notice, in a common area, notifying all residents of the need to place recyclable materials in the holding facility. Said notice shall include the dates and times of collections by the city.

Property owners shall cause the recyclable materials contained in holding facilities to be placed at the appropriate place of collection at the appropriate times as specified by the Commissioner. The means by which said materials will be placed for collection shall be

specified in the property's recycling plan.

The Commissioner, through authority granted in this ordinance, shall approve, reject or amend said plans. Once a plan is approved and the holding facility is operational, the Commissioner shall schedule collection of materials from said holding facilities.

All recycling plans shall be delivered to the Commissioner no later than six (6) months from the date

this ordinance takes effect.

# ORDINANCE RE: TRESPASSING ON PRIVATE PROPERTY (DOCKET NO. 0755)

Whereas, The United States Postal Service recently adopted a regulation that letter carriers must cut across lawns of private property owners rather than use established sidewalks, walkways or pathways; and

cut down on the time of delivery of mail; and

Whereas, A memorandum from the United States Postal Service deputy counsel states that the U.S. Postal Service may adopt broad regulations of a general character to accomplish its purpose in the most efficient manner possible; and

Whereas, The adoption of a local ordinance respecting private property interests, in no way infringes on the exercise of any duty to deliver mail; therefore be it

ordained as follows:

Section 1. In the city of Boston, all delivery personnel, including letter carriers, whether employed by a private firm, a government agency, or government-supported corporation, shall use sidewalks and accepted and approved walkways when accessing private property, and, excepting for necessity or emergency, shall refrain from traversing lawns or other private property not normally used as a walkway by the general public in order to effect delivery.

ORDER APPROVING PETITION FOR SPECIAL LAW DIRECTING STATE-BOSTON RETIRE-MENT BOARD TO RETIRE DETECTIVE ROBERT ROGERS (DOCKET NO. 0824)

Ordered, That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause (1) of Section Eight of Article Two, as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted providing precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

Whereas, Robert Rogers sustained serious injuries while in the performance of his duties, and as a result is totally and permanently incapacitated from further service as a Boston Police Detective; the Boston City

Council hereby

Petitions, that the following bill for a special law be enacted.

Section 1: Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special law to the contrary and in order to promote the public good, the State-Boston Retirement Board is hereby authorized and directed to retire Robert Rogers, a Detective of the City of Boston who, as a result of injuries sustained while in the performance of his duties on December Twenty-Sixth, Nineteen Hundred Ninety-Eight (12/26/98), is totally and permanently incapacitated from further service as a Detective.

Robert Rogers was seriously injured on December 26, 1998, when he was en route home from work and observed a gray Infiniti sedan bearing Massachusetts Plate No. 1168 JF traveling at a high rate of speed in the vicinity of East Milton on Route 93 Southbound. The vehicle suddenly lost control and traveled from the left lane across the highway to the right lane, striking a guard rail underneath the Bates Avenue Overpass, then traveling back across the highway to the left lane, striking the jersey barriers at the HOV lane before coming to rest. Detective Rogers then pulled off the roadway to the right side of the road just before Exit 8, Furnace Brook Parkway. He exited his vehicle, called for help on his police hand-held radio, and then approached the Infiniti sedan in order to render aid. At this time, two males who had occupied the front of the vehicle were getting out via the right front door. Detective Rogers identified himself to the individuals as a Boston Police Officer and began assisting a third party who was in the back seat area of the Infiniti and appeared to be having trouble getting out of the vehicle. It is at this time, while Detective Rogers was assisting the rear seat passenger out of the vehicle, that a white 1988 Mazda 626 bearing Massachusetts Plate No. 172-FVH, operated by Mr. Craig W. Gillespie, came upon the accident scene. Gillespic stated he was traveling in the left lane at 70 mph when he came around the slight curve and observed the gray Infiniti sedan disabled in the left lane against the jersey barriers and two or three people standing in the roadway in the left lane at the right side of the disabled vehicle. Mr. Gillespie stated he attempted to slow down and change from the left lane to the third travel lane in order to avoid hitting the vehicle or the pedestrians, however his vehicle struck the right rear quarter panel and right side and doors of the disabled vehicle, and also struck two or three pedestrians. A third vehicle, a 1993 white Volkswagen Cabriolet, bearing Massachusetts Plate No. RW 67 WB, being driven by Mrs. Renee A. Burns, was traveling behind Mr. Gillespie in the left hand lane at approximately 60 mph. She observed Mr. Gillespie run over some debris from the Infiniti and attempt to change lanes. Ms. Burns also braked and attempted to change lanes to avoid contacting the disabled vehicle, however, she was unable to avoid striking the disabled Infiniti, although not as severely as had Mr. Gillespie's vehicle.

Detective Rogers was severely and permanently injured, in the performance of his duty, while attempting to aid the victims of a traffic accident. Detective Rogers sustained compound fractures of both his lower left leg and lower right leg and multiple contusions to his head and body as a result of being struck by the vehicles as he attempted to render aid to the injured passengers of the car. The other individual who had been helping Detective Rogers was killed as a result of being struck

by the car.

The annual amount of pension payable to Robert Rogers shall be in an amount equal to the regular rate of compensation which would have been paid had he continued in service as a Detective of said City at the grade held by him at the time of his retirement. Such retirement shall become effective as of the date following the last day on which he received regular compensation. Upon such retirement, the State-Boston Retirement Board shall forthwith pay to him the amount credited to him as accumulated total deductions in the annuity savings of the State-Boston Retirement System

Section 2: Said Robert Rogers shall be entitled to receive such indemnification for all hospital, medical and related expenses that have been or may be incurred after the date of his retirement as a result of the injuries sustained by him while in the performance of his duties, according to the provisions of Chapter 41 of the General

Laws.

Section 3: This act shall take effect upon its passage. Referred to the Committee on Public Safety.

1 transmit herewith an appropriation order for the Boston Public Schools for FY01 in the amount of \$591,998,242 submitted pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 224 of the Acts of 1936, as amended by Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982, as further amended by Chapter 701 of the Acts of 1986, Chapter 613 of the Acts of 1987, and Chapter 108 of the Acts of 1991.

This budget, which is \$16.7 million larger than the

This budget, which is \$16.7 million larger than the FY00 budget, continues my commitment to improving education. The FY01 operating budget continues funding for the City's five year plan of reform, "Focus on Children" aimed at improving school performance. Among the programs and initiatives this budget funds are new resources for literacy and math programs; new instructional materials; on-going support for high schools to meet accreditation standards; and continued investment in technology in the schools.

The resubmission transfers \$955,570 from the School Budget to the City's Operating Budget in order to fund the consolidation of the School Department's legal services within the Law Department. This transfer is part of an effort to look at all city functions to improve efficiency.

My commitment to schools is also illustrated through the City's Five Year Capital Plan. The City of Boston FY01–FY05 Capital Plan includes authorization of the construction of three new schools: Orchard Gardens (grades K-8), Brunswick Gardens (grades 6-8), and Mildred Avenue (grades 6-8).

The Boston School Committee and the Superintendent have submitted a budget that balances competing priorities within available resources. This budget provides our students with the tools necessary to meet the standards that have been established by the Boston School Committee. I respectfully request your support of the FY01 appropriation for the Boston Public Schools.

Dear Councillors:

1 retransmit herewith my Recommended Budget for Fiscal Year 2001 for the City of Boston and County of Suffolk. The Recommended Operating Budget totaling \$1.7 billion is 5.4 percent greater than the Fiscal Year 2000 Adopted Budget and would represent the City's 16th consecutive balanced budget.

As you are aware, the City is still awaiting final action on the State's Fiscal Year 2001 Budget — Conference Committee deliberations are underway. The Fiscal Year

2001 Budget is based on the House version of the state budget; the Senate version appropriates \$1.6 million less to the City's General Fund. We continue to work with the members of the Conference Committee to ensure

that the City's needs are recognized.

Consistent with my original budget transmission submitted to you in April, this budget emphasizes the following priorities which have been deliberated and supported in the City Council over the last two months: improving the quality of residential life in the neighborhoods; accelerating the production of affordable housing; continuing the City's multi-year reform efforts in the Boston Public Schools; assisting in the healthy development of our City's youth at home, at school and in the community; and improving the public health through a variety of essential programs and services.

To finalize the issues requiring your consideration before the fiscal year begins on July 1, 1 am proposing an increase of \$1,290,570 to the original operating budget submission, as well as a \$955,570 reduction to the Boston Public Schools appropriation to be submitted separately today. This adjustment includes a transfer of responsibility from the School Department to the Law Department to consolidate the legal services portion of the School Department within the Law Department. This change, like others made in the original budget submission, reflects my commitment to improve city services by creating an organization that will function more effectively. To effect this transfer, \$955,570 has been taken from the School appropriation and \$955,570 is being added to the Law Department appropriation. In addition, the review of departments' budget has highlighted the need for adjustments of \$160,000 in the Emergency Shelter Commission, \$130,000 for the City Council and \$45,000 in the Licensing Board.

This budget balances competing priorities within the City's available resources. I respectfully request your favorable action on the Fiscal Year 2001 Operating Budget and the Five Year Capital Plan for FY01 to

FY05.

Whereas, The Municipal Harbor Plan Advisory Committee has been meeting since last summer and have spent countless hours crafting a Municipal Harbor Plan which will set the standard for the city's implementation of Chapter 91; and

Whereas, The BRA is preparing for submission to the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs this Municipal Harbor Plan, which, if approved and adopted, will alter the effect of the present Chapter 91 regulations b allowing substitutions and offsets for present limits on height, setbacks, shadow and open space; and

Whereas, It is appropriate for the City Council to examine the effect of the proposed Municipal Harbor Plan on the citizens of Boston; therefore be it

Ordered, That the City Council hold a public hearing on the proposed Municipal Harbor Plan; and be it further.

Ordered, That the BRA be requested not to finalize and submit the Municipal Harbor Plan to the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs until the City Council has had an opportunity to review the City's proposal.

Whereas, Many financial institutions offer opportunities for consumers to apply for and receive a line of credit in the form of a credit card to be used for the electronic purchase of consumer goods and services, and

Whereas, While there are policies in place to protect the consumer against credit card theft and fraud, there are no guarantees that a consumer will receive I00% protection against unauthorized charges made to his/her credit card, and

Whereas, Most credit card companies offer optional insurance coverage, for a fee, to the consumer to protect against any unauthorized charges made to their account through theft or fraud, and

Whereas, Credit card insurance coverage is basically a contract between the consumer and the financial institution and should comply with the fair and legal principles afforded to the public under the Uniform Commercial Code, the Constitution and various state laws concerning discrimination, and

Whereas, Once a contract has been established, or once coverage has been extended from the insurance carrier to the consumer, the carrier should only be able to terminate or deny coverage where just cause exists, and

Whereas, Although it should not be allowed, some credit card insurance carriers have been known to deny or terminate coverage to some consumers based on the consumer's age, and

Whereas, Any insurance carrier who denies credit

card insurance coverage to any consumer based on age, sex or race should not be allowed to sell insurance in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts because of these discriminatory practices, therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council conduct a public hearing to determine if the State Division of Insurance has a policy in place that forbids insurance carriers from denying or terminating credit card insurance to consumers based on age, sex or race and that the Commissioner of the Insurance Division be invited to

No one was ever charged with or convicted of Mary Sullivan's murder and now her family is launching their own investigation into this heinous crime. The family has asked for your cooperation but has been denied at every turn. The Sullivan family is only seeking closure to a thirty-sixyear-old wound. Mary Sullivan was only nineteen years old when she was brutally raped and strangled in her Charles Street apartment in January of 1964. Her family believes the real killer escaped justice.

We urge you to re-investigate the murder of Mary Sullivan. If your department does not deem Mary Sullivan's murder to be a priority at this time, we urge you to give her family access to all documentary and physical evidence in the case so they can proceed with their own investigation. There is no statute of limitation on murder and there are too many questions left unanswered in this horrible crime. The Boston City Council would like to see justice prevail for the Sullivan family, who has lived with a great pain for far too long.

I hereby transmit for your approval a City Council Order approving the modification to the Park Plaza Urban Renewal Plan (the "Plan") adopted by the Boston Redevelopment Authority by a resolution dated March 30, 2000. A copy of the resolution is attached. Section M.1 of the Plan entitled "Plan Modification or Amendment" states that "any change which increases any . . . height limit . . . or which alters the uses . . . shall be deemed to be substantial."

The resolution adopted by the Boston Redevelopment Authority modifies Section F.4 of the Plan entitled "Land Use and Building Requirements for Disposition Parcels" with respect to the Charles/Tremont Subparcel of Parcel 3 and Parcel B of the Park Plaza Urban Renewal Area to increase the height limitation to 155' if permitted under Section 38-7 of the Boston Zoning Code, and to add institutional use by a college or university to the Permitted Uses if permitted as of right or as a conditional use under the Boston Zoning Code. The modifications to the Plan require City Council approval.

The Emerson College Performance and Production Center, which will be constructed adjacent to Allen's Alley and will include College theaters, television studios, and rehearsal space and support facilities for the Emerson Majestic Theatre, will increase the College's presence in the Midtown Cultural District and will support the City's plans for the revitalization of the area as a center for the visual and performing arts.

I therefore urge the approval of the attached Council Order that will approve the modification to the Park Plaza Urban Renewal Plan thereby allowing the Emerson College Performance and Production Center project to proceed.

Whereas, The Urban Renewal Plan for the Park Plaza Urban Renewal Area (the "Urban Renewal Area") was adopted by the Boston Redevelopment Authority (the "Authority") on July 15, 1971; approved by the City Council of the City of Boston, with certain modifications, on December 6, 1971; and confirmed and accepted by vote of the Authority on December 6, 1971 (said plan, as heretofore amended, being herein referred to as the "Plan");

Whereas, Section M.1 of the Plan, entitled "Modification and Termination," provides that the Plan may be modified or amended from time by the Authority, and that certain amendments, including increases in permitted height for any parcel and changes in use, require approvals as for a new urban renewal

Whereas, The Massachusetts legislature has authorized the Commissioner of the Division of Capital Asset Management to grant Emerson College (the "College") a right to construct a building, which the College intends to use as a Performance and Production Center (the "Center"), on land (the "Easement") currently used as the loading area for the State Transportation Building, which land lies adjacent to Allen's Alley and partially within the Charles/Tremont Subparcel of Parcel 3 of the Urban Renewal Area and partially within Parcel "B" of the Urban Renewal Area;

Whereas, The proposed amendments to the Plan are necessary to effectuate the redevelopment of the Easement Parcel and the Allen's Alley area and the use thereof for educational purposes by the College;

Whereas, It is the opinion of the Authority that the modifications hereinafter provided with respect to the Charles/Tremont Subparcel of Parcel 3 and Parcel "B" are consistent with the objectives of the Plan;

Whereas, The Authority is cognizant of the requirements of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 30, Sections 61 through 62H, as amended and its implementing regulations (collectively, "MEPA") with respect to minimizing and preventing damage to the environment.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Authority as follows:

 Pursuant to Section M.1 thereof, that the Plan be and hereby is amended as follows:

 a. Section F.4, PARCEL3 — Charles/Tremont Subparcel of Parcel 3, Height is hereby amended by inserting the following at the end thereof:

"— that a height of 155' shall be allowed if permitted under Section 38-7 of the Boston

Zoning Code."

b. Section F.4, PARCEL'B", Height is hereby amended by inserting the following at the end thereof:

"except that a height of 155' shall be allowed if permitted under Section 38-7 of the Boston Zoning Code."

c. Section F.4, PARCEL3 — Charles/Tremont Subparcel of Parcel 3, Permitted Uses is hereby amended by inserting the following at the end of the second line thereof:

", institutional use by college or university permitted as of right or as a conditional use under Article 6 and Section 38-18.6(k) of the Boston Zoning Code."

d. Section F.4, PARCEL"B", Permitted Uses is hereby amended by inserting the following at the end of the first line thereof:

", institutional use by college or university permitted as of right or as a conditional use under Article 6 and Section 38-1 8.6(k) of the Boston Zoning Code,"

That all other provisions of the Plan not inconsistent herewith be and hereby are continued in full force and effect.

3. That it is hereby found and determined pursuant to MEPA that the foregoing modification of the Plan, and any proposed development undertaken pursuant thereto, will not result in significant damage to or impairment of the environment, and further that all practicable and feasible means and measures have been taken and are being utilized to avoid or minimize damage to the environment.

4. That the Secretary be and hereby is authorized to file the aforesaid amendments to the Plan with the minutes of this meeting and that said amendments shall be conclusively deemed to be the official amendments to the Plan;

5. That the Director be and hereby is authorized to submit to the Mayor for his approval and submission to the City Council and the Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development for their respective approvals the

foregoing amendments to the Plan approved by the Authority on this date.

#### City of Boston In City Council

AN ACT AUTHORIZING CERTAIN AMENDMENTS TO THE HOUSING AND EMPLOYMENT EXACTION REQUIREMENTS (LINKAGE) WITH RESPECT TO LARGE-SCALE COMMERCIAL REAL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT

Ordered, That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under clause (I) of Section eight of Article two, as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

Whereas, The General Court finds and declares that a serious public emergency exists in the City of Boston with respect to the housing and also the employment of a substantial number of the citizens of said city, as

further described below; and

Whereas, There is not an adequate supply of affordable housing for low- and moderate-income residents of the city; and

Whereas, The construction of new large-scale commercial real estate developments in the city tends to reduce the supply of affordable housing available to

low- and moderate-income residents; and

Whereas, In order to supply affordable housing for low- and moderate-income residents in the city in conjunction with the construction of new large-scale commercial real estate developments, an act was adopted by the General Court as Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987, which imposed an obligation on large-scale commercial real estate developments to mitigate their adverse impacts on the availability of such affordable housing by making development impact project exactions to provide revenue to meet the public exigency of the provision of affordable housing in the city; and

Whereas, Section 16 of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 provides that the measured value of the affordable housing exaction to be imposed is to be determined on the basis of a fixed dollar amount per square foot of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses in excess of one hundred thousand square feet of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses, exclusive in both cases of all accessory parking garage space, as determined by the zoning commission of the city upon recommendation by the Boston Redevelopment Authority, and further provides that the zoning commission of the city is authorized to increase said measured value three years after the effective date of Chapter 371 and no more frequently than at three year intervals thereafter, but any such increase shall not exceed the per cent of the increase in the combined index for the prior thirty-six month period; and

Whereas, The measured value of the affordable housing exaction was set at five dollars per square foot upon the effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and has not been increased since then; and

Whereas, There is a not an adequate supply of employment opportunities for low- and moderate-

income residents of the city; and

Whereas, The construction of new large-scale commercial real estate developments in the city tends to reduce the number of jobs for which low- and moderate-income residents of the city are qualified; and

Whereas, In order to supply job opportunities to lowand moderate-income residents in the city in conjunction with the construction of new large-scale commercial real estate developments, Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 also imposed an obligation on large-scale commercial real estate developments to mitigate their adverse impacts on the availability of such employment opportunities by making an employment exaction to provide revenue to meet the public exigency of the provision of job training for low and moderate income

residents of the city; and

Whereas, Section 17 of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 provides that the measured value of the employment exaction to be imposed is to be determined on the basis of a fixed dollar amount per square foot of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses in excess of one hundred thousand square feet of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses, exclusive in both cases of all accessory parking garage space, as determined by the zoning commission of the city upon recommendation by the Boston Redevelopment Authority, and further provides that the zoning commission of the city is authorized to increase said measured value three years after the effective date of Chapter 371 and no more frequently than at three year intervals thereafter, but any such increase shall not exceed the per cent of the increase in the combined index for the prior thirty-six month period; and

Whereas, The measured value of the employment exaction was set at one dollar per square foot upon the effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and has

not been increased since then; and

Whereas, The City of Boston is currently in the midst of a "hot" real estate and economic market in which the cost of housing and job training has increased faster than the rate of increase in inflation and the consumer price index.

Now, therefore, be it enacted as follows:

Section 1: Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 is hereby amended by inserting after Section 16 thereof the

following new Section 16A:

Section 16A. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the zoning commission shall be authorized to increase the measured value of the affordable housing exaction by the per cent of the increase in the combined index for the period commencing as of the effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and ending as of the most recent anniversary date of such effective date occurring prior to the enactment of this act, notwithstanding that such period is in excess of the thirty-six month period described in Section 16; provided, however, that the zoning commission shall not be authorized to set the measured value of the affordable housing exaction for the period described above at more than seven dollars and eighteen cents per square foot of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses in excess of one hundred thousand square feet devoted to exaction uses, exclusive in both cases of all accessory parking garage space, and thereafter increases shall be in accordance with Section 16 above.

Section 2: Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 is hereby amended by inserting after Section 17 thereof the

following new Section 17A:

Section 17A. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the zoning commission shall be authorized to increase the measured value of the

employment exaction by the per cent of the increase in the combined index for the period commencing as of the effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and ending as of the most recent anniversary date of such effective date occurring prior to the enactment of this act notwithstanding that such period is in excess of the thirty-six month period described in Section 17; provided, however, that the zoning commission shall not be authorized to set the measured value of the employment exaction for the period described above at more than one dollar and fortyfour cents per square foot of gross floor area devoted to exaction uses in excess of one hundred thousand square feet devoted to exaction uses, exclusive in both cases of all accessory parking garage space, and thereafter increases shall be in accordance with Section 17 above.

Section 3: Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 is hereby amended by inserting after Section 17 thereof the

following new Section 18A:

Section 18A. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, including the provisions of Section 18(b) above, for the period commencing as of the effective date of Chapter 371 of the acts of 1987 and ending as of the most recent anniversary date of such effective date occurring prior to the enactment of this act notwithstanding that such period is in excess of the thirty-six month period described in Section 18(b), the zoning commission shall be authorized to increase the present and future economic burden of any such improvements or amenities to the present value of seven dollars and eighteen cents per square foot paid in equal and annual installments over a seven year period plus the present value of one dollar and forty-four cents per square foot paid in equal and annual installments over a two year period, each commencing on the date of the issuance of the building permit. and after the period described above increases to the present and future economic burden of any such improvements or amenities shall be in accordance with Section 18(b) above.

Section 4: The zoning commission is hereby authorized to adopt such regulations or rules as will effectuate the provisions of the amendment described in Sections 1 and 2 above, including without limitation, such regulations and rules as may be required to amend Section 80B-7 of the Boston Zoning Code to reflect

such provisions.

Section 5: This act shall take effect immediately upon its enactment.

Whereas, More than I,350 units of affordable, government-subsidized or insured apartments have already been lost in Boston due to owner decisions to opt out of federal subsidy programs; and

# ORDER RE: DEATH BENEFITS OF LIEUTENANT MINGOLELL1 (DOCKET NO. 0934)

Councillors HONAN and MURPHY offered the following:

Ordered, That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for special law relating to the City of Boston, be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause (1) of Section

Eight of Article Two, as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted providing precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

Whereas, Richard D. Mingolelli sustained injury while in the performance of his duties and such injuries resulted in his death, the Boston City Council hereby

Petitions, that the following bill for a special law be enacted.

Section 1: Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special law to the contrary and in order to promote the public good, the Boston Retirement Board is hereby authorized and directed to provide "Line of Duty" death benefits to Mrs. Anne Mingolelli, the surviving spouse of Richard D. Mingolelli, a Lieutenant in the Boston Fire Department who, on March 28, 1999, sustained injury while in the performance of his duties, and such injury resulted in his death on August 6, 1999.

On March 28, 1999, Richard D. Mingolelli suffered chest pains and neck pains while responding to an alarm at the Italian Home for Children, 1125 Centre Street, Jamaica Plain. Upon arrival at the location, an employee of the Italian Home for Children was pointing up to the front stairs of the building where the fire alarm was going off. Firefighter Magrath, who accompanied Lieutenant Mingolelli to the Italian Home for Children, and Lieutenant Mingolelli did a floor by floor search of the premises to investigate for a possible source of the fire alarm. Lieutenant Mingolelli, dressed in full gear (a total weight in excess of 55 pounds), ran to the top floor of the three story building to start his portion of the search. Firefighter Magrath began his search on the first floor and worked his way up the building. After completing his portion of the search, Firefighter Magrath met up with Lieutenant Mingolelli on the second floor of the building. According to Firefighter Magrath, Lieutenant Mingolelli did not look well, he was very pale and was short of breath. Lieutenant Mingolelli told Firefighter Magrath that he felt a burning sensation in his throat and that his chest felt tight. As a result, Licutenant Mingolelli was taken to Milton Hospital where he was seen by Dr. John Cronin. Dr. Cronin told Lieutenant Mingolelli that he could not return to work for the Boston Fire Department until further tests were done.

As a result of the incidents which transpired on March 23, 1999, Lieutenant Mingolelli was placed on leave for a heart injury. Lieutenant Mingolelli remained on injured leave until he suffered a fatal heart attack on August 6, 1999. The fatal heart attack sustained by Lieutenant Mingolelli on August 6, 1999 was a natural and proximate cause of the heart injury sustained by Lieutenant Mingolelli on March 28, 1999.

Lieutenant Mingolelli was injured in the line of duty of March 28, 1999. As a result, Lieutenant Mingolelli was placed on injured leave. On August 6, 1999, Lieutenant Mingolelli subsequently died of the injury

when he suffered a fatal heart attack.

The annual I amount of pension payable to Mrs. Anne Mingolelli, as the surviving spouse of Lieutenant Mingolelli, shall be equal to the amount of salary which would have been paid to Lieutenant Mingolelli had he continued in service as a Lieutenant of the Boston Fire Department.

Section 2: This act shall take effect upon its passage. Referred to the Committee on Public Safety.

Whereas: The Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) was established by the Boston City Council in

1957, "for the purpose of engaging in urban renewal and land assembly and redevelopment projects" (August 15, 1957 Order by Boston City Council, voted August 19, 1957), under State enabling legislation Chapter 150 of the Acts of 1957 at a time when development in Boston was purported to be in decline, and

Whereas, The purpose of this Federally subsidized Urban Renewal program was to eliminate "slums" and "blighted, decadent and substandard areas" using public resources and public police powers, including eminent domain, zoning exception, and tax concessions to stimulate replacement with economic development, and

Whereas, The BRA absorbed the Boston Planning Board in 1960, by Chapter 652 of the Acts of 1965 as amended, and has retained all planning responsibilities for the City, with the resulting conflict of interest between the Authority's development and the planning mandates, and

Whereas, Changed economic conditions have eliminated "blighted, decadent and substandard" areas, yet sections of the city are still designated urban renewal areas, and properties within them could be subject to BRA action on a BRA finding that they are "blighted, decadent or substandard", and

Whereas, The BRA is empowered to delegate Urban Redevelopment powers of zoning exception, tax concessions, and eminent domain to private development corporations to implement projects outside of the urban renewal areas, and

Whereas, Urban renewal/development by use of public resources and police powers is no longer justifiable, and continued use of such measures may constitute an abuse of authority and a violation of constitutional protections against seizure of private property without public purpose, and

Whereas, The City of Boston may be losing tax revenues due to concessions to developers under Chapter 121 A agreements, the documentation of which is needed from the Tax Assessment Department (and any other department containing such relative agreements;

Whereas, Federal financial subsidy to Urban Renewal ended in 1974, and the Urban Renewal plans, of 40 year terms, are beginning to expire, therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council conduct a public hearing to discuss and gather testimony from the BRA, the City, the business community, the Tax Assessment Department, Citizens of Boston, and others

the merits and means of reorganizing the BRA,
repealing the Urban Renewal and Urban

Redevelopment legislation,

alternatives for restructuring Boston's city planning and public property management functions into

agencies more appropriate for future city growth.

Whereas, The Commission has developed a reuse plan for the Foley building and the E Building located at the former Boston Specialty and Rehabilitation Hospital in Mattapan, based upon the report of the Mattapan Community Advisory Board to Mayor Thomas M. Menino and the Commission dated November 1999; and

Whereas, The Commission has determined that the highest and best use for the Foley building is its rehabilitation into a facility for affordable elder assisted and independent living, with financing which will include the low income housing tax credit program, and, with the approval of the Boston Redevelopment Authority, redevelopment under the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter I2IA: and

Whereas, The Commission has determined that the highest and best use for the E Building is to rehabilitate the E Building for use by the Entre Familia Program, with financing which will include the low income housing tax credits program, and, with the approval of the Boston Redevelopment Authority, redevelopment under the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 121A; and

Whereas, A development team led by Trinity Financial, Inc. was selected by the Commission pursuant to a request for proposals issued by the Commission and the Boston Redevelopment Authority;

Whereas, Ownership of the buildings and a long term lease of the surrounding land is required in order to secure affordable housing funds, including the low income housing tax credit program; and

Whereas, Any lease or conveyance of real property by the Commission, other than in the ordinary course of business, requires approval of the City Council and the Mayor under the provisions of Chapter 147 of the Acts of 1995 and Chapter 486 of the Acts of 1909.

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special law to the contrary, the conveyance by the Boston Housing Authority of the federally funded Maverick public housing project or the state funded West Broadway public housing project, or any part thereof, whether by leasehold or fee estate, to an urban revitalization corporation organized pursuant to Chapter 121A of the General Laws or to a non-profit state and federally tax-exempt corporation organized for the purpose of revitalizing such project; provided such conveyance shall be subject to chapter 30B of the General Laws to the extent such project is conveyed to an entity which is not owned, controlled or managed by the Boston Housing Authority on the date of said conveyance; and provided such conveyance has been funded in part by a federal government Hope VI grant, or pursuant to issuance of tax-exempt bonds authorized under the General Laws, shall not be subject to the requirements of any general or special law related to the procurement and award of contracts for the construction, reconstruction, installation, demolition, maintenance or repair of any building by a public agency, but shall remain subject to the requirements of sections 26 to 27H, inclusive of chapter 149 of the General Laws; provided, however, that contracts for the construction reconstruction, alteration, remodeling or repair of any publicly owned public works which service such projects and would otherwise be subject to the requirements of section 39M of chapter 30 of the General Laws shall not be exempted by the provisions of this act from the requirements of said statute.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Whereas, Last year seven residents of New York died after being infected by West Nile Virus; and

Whereas, Under the supervision of Mayor Thomas M. Menino and the Public Health Commission, Willow Pond and land in a 3 mile radius of Willow Pond was sprayed with insecticide in order to protect the health of residents from the threat of being bitten by a mosquito carrying the West Nile Virus; and

Whereas, Since the discovery of the crow, no human cases of West Nile Virus have been found in Massachusetts; and

Whereas, Many residents of the Boston area are very concerned about the possibility of contracting West Nile Virus from an infected mosquito; and

Whereas, Many residents are also concerned about the impact of spraying insecticide on the environment and wildlife such as the Three Spined Stickleback fish that is easily affected by such insecticides; therefore be it

Ordered, The appropriate City Council committee will hold a hearing for an update from the Public Health Commission and the Administration about the steps already taken and also future steps that will be taken to protect the residents of Boston from this disease, and that this will be an opportunity for concerned residents to be invited to the hearing and voice their concerns about West Nile Virus and the effects of the insecticides on the environment and wildlife.

Whereas, According to Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 161A, the Massachusetts Bay Transit Authority (MBTA) must meet certain procedural requirements before it can implement a fare increase, including demonstrating that they have made efforts to increase ridership and improve fare collection practices prior to the increase; and

Whereas, The MBTA must demonstrate that they have maximized all other sources of non-transportation revenue and will implement a free or reduced transfer policy; and

Whereas, The MBTA has made no attempt to meet these requirements before proposing a fare increase; and

Whereas, A fare increase would further burden residents in lower income neighborhoods of which a large portion of the residents in those neighborhoods of Boston are people of color; and

Whereas, Low income residents, in particular, who do not have alternative modes of transportation will be forced to use income needed for other expenses to meet the MBTA's 25% increase in fares; and

Whereas, The current level of service being provided by the MBTA does not and has not met the needs of riders, particularly on overly-crowded, late and dysfunctional MBTA buses; and

Whereas, The MBTA has a history of dis-investment in the inner city neighborhoods of Boston where people are most dependent upon MBTA service. We, the Boston City Council, find that the increase of fares system-wide without any improvements to MBTA service unjust; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Boston City Council requests that the Mayor direct the Boston Representative on the MBTA Board of Directors to vote against the MBTA's proposed fare increase.

On motion of Councilor TURNER, the rules were suspended; the resolution was adopted.

RESOLUTION CALLING UPON LEGISLATURE TO ACT IMMEDIATELY TO REVERSE DECI-SION TO VETO SUMMER JOB FUNDING (DOCKET NO. 0996)

Councilors ROSS, FEENEY, KELLY, SCAPIC-CHIO, TURNER, ROACHE, MURPHY, HONAN, HENNIGAN, FLAHERTY, DAVIS-MULLEN and YANCEY offered the following:

Whereas, The Summer Job program in Boston results in numerous benefits to our communities including a low crime rate and invaluable work experience; and

Whereas, The State has been an important partner with the City and the private sector in funding the cost of the Summer Job program; and

Whereas, The overwhelming majority of the Boston Legislative Delegation has supported legislation that would continue to finance this essential program; and

Whereas, The governor vetoed over 2 million dollars in Summer Job funding for Boston, effectively jeopardizing this vital service; and a veto override vote was not taken by the House of Representatives, now there-

fore be it

Resolved, That the Boston City Council calls upon the legislature and the governor to act immediately to reverse this unexpected decision.

Whereas, The taking of private land by eminent domain is a serious undertaking that, because it implicates important constitutional rights, should be reserved to accomplish a genuine and legitimate public purpose; and

Whereas, The courts have long recognized it is a fundamental principle of law that government should only exercise eminent domain for a public purpose because the use of eminent domain is one of the highest powers of government in that it affords the general public use of private property against an owner's will; and

Whereas, Because there are a number of concerns regarding the legitimacy of public purpose in taking private land from one person or entity, and turning it over to another person or entity for their private use, and whether the acquisition and financing arrangements envisioned by the state legislature are reinforced by adequate statutory safeguards that have been mandated by the Supreme Judicial Court in Opinion of the Justices, 356 Mass. 775 (1969), and whether the residents of Boston support a public financed ballpark at the proposed site; and

Whereas, A delay in voting on council acceptance of the necessary land taking and bonding issues, as well as the confusion that will arise should the council delay in signaling its interest on behalf of the residents of the City of Boston, is not in the best interest of any party and will only confuse investors who may be asked to financially support a plan under the assumption that council approval of the necessary measures is a given; be it therefore

Ordered, That the Boston City Council shall conduct a public hearing, or series of public hearings, into the above matter, and that representatives of the mayor's office, the Boston Red Sox, and the general public be invited to attend; and be it further

Ordered, That the appropriate committee shall conduct expedited public hearings and at the conclusion of this public process, shall recommend to the full council

the following order:

Ordered, Consistent with the land taking provisions of the City of Boston charter, as amended, the Boston City Council, by a required two-thirds vote, hereby authorizes, after full public hearings, the city to begin appropriate land takings, inasmuch as the public interest in a land taking for the purposes outlined in "An act relative to the construction and financing of infrastructure and other improvements in the City of Boston and around Fenway Park" is found to be a legitimate public purpose.

On motion of the Chair, the following language was substituted:

Mass. 775 (1969), and whether the residents of Boston support a public financed ballpark at the proposed site; and

Whereas, A delay in voting on council acceptance of the necessary land taking and bonding issues, as well as the confusion that will arise should the council delay in signaling its interest on behalf of the residents of the City of Boston, is not in the best interest of any party and will only confuse investors who may be asked to financially support a plan under the assumption that council approval of the necessary measures is a given; be it therefore

Ordered, That the Boston City Council shall conduct a public hearing, or series of public hearings, into the above matter, and that representatives of the mayor's office, the Boston Red Sox, and the general public be invited to attend; and be it further

The plan shall identify the respective property, and include the number of units, details for a holding facility for recyclable materials, and shall describe any structural changes that may be necessary for implementation of the holding facility. Said plans shall also include a statement by the owner that he/she will post notice, in common area, notifying all residents of the need to place recyclable materials in the holding facility. Said notice shall include the dates and times of collections by the city.

Property owners shall cause the recyclable materials contained in holding facilities to be placed at the appropriate place of collection at the appropriate times as specified by the Commissioner. The means by which said materials will be placed for collection shall be specified in the property's recycling plan.

The Commissioner, through authority granted in this ordinance, shall approve, reject or amend said plans. Once a plan is approved and the holding facility is operational, the Commissioner shall schedule collection of materials from said holding facilities.

Whereas, Much of the credit for this reduction in reported crime owes to the efforts of the Boston Police Department and its heightened focus on crime prevention, enforcement, community policing, education and early intervention; the prosecutorial efforts of the Suffolk County District Attorney's office; and the incarceration and rehabilitation services of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department; and

Whereas, Despite this decade-long trend of reduced criminal activity in the City of Boston, there exist several areas or "clusters" of unacceptably high rates of

crime, particularly violent crime; and

Whereas, Boston Police have identified eight clusters where residents are under siege by rising rates of crime in the six categories of homicide, robbery, aggravated assault, firearms arrests, recovered firearms and other general crime, of which there were 306 total incidents between February and May of this year; and

Whereas, It is in the interests of the city and its residents to examine the issues and circumstances causing or contributing to the existence of high-crime clusters in Boston, as part of an effort to provide appropriate and effective ameliorative resources; therefore be it hereby

Ordered, That the Boston City Council conduct a series of evening public hearings in areas encompassing the eight high-crime clusters, to hear from representatives of the Boston Police, the Suffolk County District Attorney's office, other law enforcement agencies, human service organizations, neighborhood residents, and any other interested parties, and to thereby gain a better understanding of the phenomenon of crime

Councillors HONAN, MURPHY and FEENEY offered the following:

Whereas, Chapter 636 was established by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to ensure education enrichment monies for the support of such activities as the establishment of parent information centers and

various cultural initiatives for youth; and

Whereas, While Boston's students are laboring to meet the higher academic standards imposed by the State Board of Education through improved performance on MCAS tests, this loss of funding would cut programs that are vital to our students' educational experience; and Whereas, Cultural enrichment is a significant factor

in student growth and personal development; and

Whereas, The City of Boston has received annual state funding for more than two decades including approximately \$5.4 million last year; and

Whereas, Governor Celluci vetoed this important line item and the Massachusetts Legislature did not consider the veto before its adjournment on July 31; therefore be

Resolved, That the Boston City Council in meeting assembled urge the Governor and Legislature to take appropriate measures to restore this funding through consideration of a supplemental budget legislation.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING ADDITION OF TWO NEW STOPS TO FAIRMOUNT COMMUTER RAIL (DOCKET NO. 1054)

Whereas, Members of the Greater Four Corners Action Coalition (GFCAC) are requesting that the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA)

reopen two rail stations in Dorchester; and

Whereas, These two stations, that would be on the existing Fairmount Commuter Rail Line, could be the first step toward later implementation of the "Indigo Line," a plan to make better use of this rail route which is being advocated by a diverse coalition of neighborhood and environmental groups, local City Councillors, State Senators, and Representatives, Congressman Capuano, members of the business community, and the MBTA Advisory Board; and

Whereas, Nearly 1,500 residents of Dorchester, Roxbury and Mattapan have signed a petition in support

of reopening the rail stations; and

Whereas, One station will be near Park Street and Norwell Street (allowing people from Codman Square and the southern part of Four Corners access), and the other will be at Washington Street and Erie Street with an additional entrance at Norwell Street and Carmen Street (allowing access to people from Grove Hall and the northern part of Four Corners); and

Whereas, The new stations along with increased frequency will create a sufficient rapid transit system for Dorchester, Roxbury and Mattapan residents traveling

to and from downtown Boston; and

Whereas, Boston Transportation Department Commissioner, Andrea d'Amato (following examples of other urban transportation agencies, such as those in San Francisco, Denver and Salt Lake City) is stressing rail as an effective option for public transit; and

Whereas, The new stations would help alleviate the growing problem of vehicular traffic congestion in Grove Hall, Codman Square and Four Corners; and

Whereas, Opening the new rail would add to the quality of life in a neighborhood that has struggled to survive through white flight, crime, and disinvestment;

Whereas, The capital cost for adding stations to an existing, fully functional rail line in regular operation will be minimal particularly in comparison to the \$56.5 million spent to add two stations and extend service 9.6 miles from Ipswich to Newburyport or the \$400+ million proposed to complete the Greenbush extension; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Boston City Council, in meeting assembled, support adding the two new stops to the Fairmount Commuter Rail.

ORDINANCE RELATING TO REGISTRATION OF DOGS AND FURTHER REGULATING DAN-GEROUS OR VICIOUS DOGS (DOCKET NO. 1105)

City of Boston

### In The Year Two Thousand

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 43B, Section 13, and any other applicable law, as follows:

Whereas, Vicious dogs are so dangerous that they constitute a threat to children and others in the city; and

Whereas, Vicious dogs occasionally escape from the yard or building in which they are kept, by slipping under a fence, jumping over a fence, slipping out through a door or gate temporarily opened or unlatched, breaking the leash or chain, or pulling up the anchor for the chain or leash; and

Whereas, Children too young to read may wander too close to a dog, even in the presence of "beware of dog"

signs; and

Whereas, It is the policy of the City that children and others should not have to assume the risk of a vicious dog having an opportunity to attack or to kill, and

Whereas, The benefits to a dog owner in owning a dangerous dog are outweighed by dangers to children and to the general public.

Now therefore be it ordained:

Section 1: Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting the following new section, after Section 1.9A:

16-1.9B Dangerous or Vicious Dogs

a) A "dangerous or vicious" dog as the term is used in this section shall mean any dog that has bitten or attacked any person or animal, and any dog that has attempted to bite or attack any person or animal. A dog shall be deemed to be attempting to attack if it is restrained by a leash, fence or other means, and it is clear from the dog's excited actions that only the presence of the leash, fence or other means of restraint is

preventing the dog from making an immediate attack. Such incidents shall be evidenced by verified reports of the Dog Officer and shall be governed by the procedures delineated in G.L. c. 140, § 157.

When a dog is deemed to be vicious, the Office of Animal Control may order any or all of the following:

1) Spay or neutering

2) Microchip Identification 3) Behavior Training

b) An "owner or keeper" of a vicious dog shall mean an individual who is the registered owner as well as an individual who keeps, harbors, or possesses a vicious

c) While on the owner's or keeper's property, a dangerous or vicious dog must be securely confined indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked pen or structure of a type meeting standards established by the Dog Officer, suitable to prevent the entry of young children, and designed to prevent the animal from escaping. Such pen or structure must have a minimum dimension of five feet by ten feet and must be securely enclosed. If it has no bottom secured to the sides, the sides must be imbedded into the ground no less than two feet. The enclosurE must also provide protection from the elements for the

The owner or keeper shall display a sign or signs on his or her premises facing out from all sides of the premises warning that there is a dangerous or vicious dog on the property the location and design of which shall be determined by the Dog Officer. This sign should be visible and capable of being read from a public way or within 20 feet of its placement. In addition, the owner shall conspicuously display a sign with a symbol warning children who cannot read of the presence of a dan-

gerous or vicious dog.

The Dog Officer may permit a dangerous or vicious dog to be off the owner's or keeper's premises if it is muzzled and restrained by a lead or chain approved by the Dog Officer not exceeding three feet in length and is under the control of an adult, able-bodied person. The muzzle must be made in a manner that will not cause injury to the dog or interfere with its vision or respiration, but must prevent it from biting any person or ani-

The provisions of this Ordinance regarding dangerous or vicious dogs shall not apply to animals owned by law enforcement agencies and used for law enforcement

(d) The owner or keeper of any dangerous or vicious dog who fails to comply with the requirements as set forth in paragraph (c) shall be subject to a fine of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for a first offense and five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for any subsequent offense. If said animal is found on property not owned or controlled by its owner or keeper, or not restrained in a secure area per paragraph (c) of this section on two separate occasions within a twelve-month period as documented by the Dog Officer, said animal shall be forever banned from within the limits of the City of Boston.

(e) Each day there exists a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute and be punishable as a separate offense.

(f) A dog shall not be considered legally licensed, pursuant to G.L. c. 140 §§ 137, 147, unless the owner is in full compliance with this ordinance.

(g) Compliance with the requirements of this section shall not be a defense to an order of disposal of a vicious

dog pursuant to GL. c. 140, § 157.

Section 2: To the extent permitted by G.L. c. 140 §172, fines collected pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance and Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinance, Section 1.9A and all dog registration and licensing fees collected pursuant to Chapter 18 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Section 1.4 (6-10) shall be deposited into a revolving fund within the Animal

Control Unit of the Property Management Department with disbursement at the direction of the Commissioner of Property Management, pursuant to the provisions of G.L. c. 44, §53E1/2, and shall be subject to annual authorization by the City Council with the approval of the Mayor. Said fund shall be utilized as follows: to reimburse for administrative costs to those City agencies which enforce this ordinance and Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Section 1.9 and for costs associated with licensing and registration. The total amount which may be expended from such fund in fiscal year 1997 shall not exceed amounts authorized under the aforesaid Section 53E1/2.

Section 3: The title of Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances, section 32.3 is hereby amended to

read as follows:

16-32.3 Alternative Noncriminal Disposition of Violations of Subsections 16-19, 16-32.4 16- 1.9B and 16-12.7.

Section 4: The first sentence of Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinance, Section 32.3 is hereby amended by inserting after 16-1.9 the following: ,16-1.9B

Section 5: The first sentence of Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Section 32.3 is hereby further amended by inserting the following after the last word of the sentence: and the Animal Control Unit of the Property Management Department.

Section 6: pursuant to the provision of St. 1909, c. 486, §5, as amended by St. 1953, c. 473, chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting the following new section, after Section 1.9B:

16-1.9C Dog Registration & Licensing.

The following positions in the Property Management Department and the Inspectional Services Department shall be reclassified or transferred to and within the Property Management Department: the incumbent Executive Assistant responsible for Animal Control in the Property Management Department shall be reclassified to the position of Executive Assistant (Director of Animal Control); the incumbent Dog Officers in the Inspectional Services Department shall each be transferred to the position of Animal Control Officer to the Property Management Department; the incumbent Administrative Assistant in the Animal Control Unit of the Inspectional Services Department shall be transferred to the Property Management Department to the position of Administrative Assistant (Animal Control). Each of the aforementioned positions and each subject employee who immediately prior to such transfer or reclassification held and office or position subject to Civil Service Laws and Rules shall be appointed without examination or registration and shall upon such appointment retain all rights to retirement with pension that shall or would have accrued, and each such employee's service shall be deemed to be continuous to the same extent as if this transfer or reclassification had not taken place.

Section 7: Chapter 18 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Sections 1.4 (6-10) are hereby amended by deleting the several references to "the Police Commissioner" and inserting in place thereof: the Animal Control Unit of the Property Management Department.

Section 8: All of the fees appearing in Chapter 18 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Sections 1.4(6)-(10) are hereby increased by the amount of two dollars (\$2.00).

Whereas, Massachusetts automobile insurance rates

are among the highest in the nation; and

Whereas, Rates for inner-city residents of Boston and other urban areas are two and three times higher than the state average rates; and

Whereas, Costs of automobile insurance in Boston are so high that as many as one-third of Boston Motorists drive illegally uninsured; and

Whereas, The rigidity and severity of the state's "Safe Driver Incentive Plan" engender considerable hostility

on the part of Massachusetts motorists; and

Whereas, Since the use of an automobile is vital to many of our citizens, and since the Commonwealth of Massachusetts requires that automobile insurance coverage be compulsory, it is only fitting that the state seek to provide the means whereby its citizens can meet that requirement; and

Whereas, Affordable automobile transportation can help to solve the welfare-to-work transportation problem of access to entry-level jobs in suburban retail

establishments; and

Whereas, A change to a so-called "choice/no-fault" system could produce annual savings for Massachusetts motorist on an average of \$285 a year, and for the motorists of Boston, as much as \$700 a year, based on a 1998 report of the Joint Economic Committee of the United States Congress; and

Whereas, Total annual savings for Massachusetts motorist could be as much as \$800 million, an annual amount greater than the projected current one-time cost of the recently-proposed new Red Sox stadium; and

Whereas, Total annual savings for the 180,000 Boston area motorists could approach \$70 million, an annual amount over six times the annual debt repayment schedule for the proposed Red Sox stadium;

Whereas, Other benefits of a choice/no-fault system, would include not only broader coverage of single-car accidents but also far quicker compensation for personal injuries, especially beneficial for those victims who cannot afford delays as long as two, three or four years before financial restitution is made available; and

Whereas, In addition to the savings a choice/no-fault system, a more competitive insurance market could provide more flexible incentives for safe driving than available under the Commonwealth's current "Safe Driver Incentive Program"; and

Whereas, Any move toward a more competitive system would need to include provisions to avoid the problems that characterized the prior 1977 attempt at competition; and

Whereas, Any proposed major change to our automobile insurance system should be subjected to as much study and analysis as possible; and

Whereas, The extent of the potential benefits for citizens of Boston warrants a full consideration of these

approaches by the Boston City Council; and

Whercas, A study of major changes to our automobile insurance system, including the concepts of choice/no-fault and of competition, was included as a budget item in the recent legislative budget presented to the Governor, an item which the Governor saw fit to veto;

Whereas, The John F. Kennedy School of Government of Harvard University, through its Policy Analysis Exercise program, makes available the services of graduate students, under the guidance of faculty advisors, to analyze public policy issues at nominal costs, and said program commences in October of each year and concludes with a a written report the following April; and

Whereas, A private citizen has offered to provide the funds to cover the costs of such a Policy Analysis

Exercise study; and

Whereas, Such a program could provide the Boston City Council with considerable relevant information with which to evaluate the benefits to the citizens of Boston and of the entire state, of the incorporation of choice/no-fault and competition into the Massachusetts automobile insurance system; therefore be it

Ordered, That the Boston City Council submit a proposal to the John F. ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO BANNING SALE OF MERCURY THERMOMETERS (DOCKET NO. 1116)

Councillors ROACHE, KELLY, FLAHERTY, DAVIS-MULLEN, FEENEY and MURPHY offered the following:

City of Boston In the Year Two Thousand

## AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO BANNING THE SALE OF MECURY THERMOMETERS IN THE CITY OF BOSTON

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 43B, Section 13, and any other applicable law, as follows:

(a) Mercury is a persistent and toxic pollutant that bioaccumulates in the environment and the food chain

(b) Incineration of medical and municipal waste, which contains whole or broken thermometers, is a major source of atmospheric deposition of mercury in the Northeast resulting in mercury contamination of air and water.

(c) Mercury from mercury thermometers can also directly enter the environment through vaporization and/or spillage when a thermometer breaks during use, transportation or disposal. The United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) estimated that for the year 2000, 17 tons of elemental mercury from thermometers will be disposed of as municipal solid waste - this does not include additional mercury that finds its way into the medical waste stream.

(d) Accidental mercury spills, breakages, and releases have occurred at schools throughout the Northeast. In addition to the threat of health risks to students and staff and potential for adverse environment impact, these discharges are costly, Harvard University has sited that it costs \$110 to properly clean up a single thermometer breakage in a laboratory. If the mercury is accidentally spread through tracking, HVAC or cleaning, costs rapidly escalate. This does not reflect the cost to replace contaminated items and in some cases it can reach into multiple thousands of dollars. These incidences have proven costly to clean up and have exposed students, teachers and/or administrators to mercury emissions.

(e) Due to the bioaccumulation of mercury in fish, the Massachusetts Department of Public Health has issued a statewide native fresh waster fish advisory, warning pregnant women, women of childbearing age and chil-

dren not to consume any fish.

(f) Pharmacy chains of Rite-Aid, K-Mart, Brooks, Target, Wal-Mart, Albertson, Kinney, Toys 'R' Us, Safety First, The First Years and Meijers amongst others have joined a Mercury Free Thermometer campaign, pledging to discontinue the sale of mercury basal and fever thermometers.

(g) There are accurate and safe alternatives to mercury thermometers that are readily available and compa-

rable in cost.

- (h) Local take back programs have already demonstrated the ease and effectiveness of removing mercury products. The Town of Burlington, MA successfully collected more than 1425 mercury thermometers. Unexpectedly, Burlington's program also received over 60 pounds of raw elemental mercury. Oakland County in Michigan is also rounding up mercury thermometers to get the toxic metal out of medicine cabinets. Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, New England Medical Center, and Dana Farber Cancer Institute and Newton-Wellesley Medical Center are among many hospitals and clinics that have participated in mercury thermometers 'round-ups' and have taken a pledge to virtually climinate mercury waste from the health care waste stream by 2003.
- (i) The Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) has strictly limited the amount of mercury in effluent water to 1 part per billion. For every one-gram of mercury from a single mercury thermometer that goes down the drain, 5 million gallons of Boston Harbor seawater is contaminated.
- (j) Mereury discharged into the sewers ultimately is released into the ocean with the treated effluent at the MWRA's Deer Island Treatment Plant. Or it can become

part of the sewage sludge that the MWRA turns into fertilizer that is then spread onto agricultural fields.

(k) In 1998 the American Poison Control Center received 18,000 phone calls regarding broken mercury thermometers. The average cost of handling each call was \$30, plus the added cost to the caller of cleaning up

the mercury spill.

(1) In the state of New Hampshire, a person shall not sell or supply mercury fever thermometers to consumers and patients, except by prescription. The County of San Francisco; the City of Duluth, Minnesota; the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan and Dane County Wisconsin are among many government bodies that have already passed legislation to ban the sale of mercury thermometers.

(m) The New England States and Eastern Canadian Provinces are implementing a bi-national mercury plan, which was unanimously adopted in June of 1998 by the Conference of New England Governors and Eastern Canadian Premiers (and signed by Governor Cellucci in June 1998). The mercury action plan is an ambitious program to virtually eliminate the emissions of mercury in the region. The regional goal of this action plan supports the virtual elimination of anthropogenic mercury. The plan consistent with the prohibition of mercury thermometers sales.

(n) The "Massachusetts Zero Mercury Strategy", formed by Environmental Affairs Secretary, Robert Durand, adopted in the summer of 2000 an ambitious strategy that calls for virtual elimination of the use and discharge of mercury including mercury thermometers.

- (o) The American Hospital Association (AHA) US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) memorandum of Understanding calls for "virtual elimination" of mercury from healthcare facilities. Over 500 hospitals and clinics across the country have already taken a pledge to remove mercury thermometers and replace them with safe alternatives.
- (p) The New England states are in the process of individually introducing model mercury legislation that would severely restrict the sale of mercury fever thermometers.

Section 2 The Municipal Code of the City of Boston is amended as follows:

Section 2.1. Definitions.

A. City means the City of Boston.

B. Mercury thermometer means a mercury-containing product that is used to measure body temperature. A mercury-containing product is a product, device, instrument or equipment into which elemental mercury or mercury compounds are intentionally added during its formulation or manufacture and in which the continued presence of mercury is desired to provide a specific characteristic or to permit a specific function.

C. Health care facility means any hospital, nursing home, extended care facility, long-term facility, clinic or medical laboratory, state or private health or mental institution, clinic, physician's office or health mainte-

nance organization.

D. Manufacturer means any person, firm, association, partnership, corporation, governmental entity, organization, combination, or joint venture that produces a mercury fever thermometer. If the mercury thermometer is produced in a foreign county, the manufacturer is the

importer or domestic distributor.

Section 2.2. Retail Sale Prohibited. A person shall not sell or supply (including online retail) mercury fever thermometers to consumers and patients, except by prescription. The manufacturers of mercury fever thermometers shall supply clear instructions on the careful handling of the thermometer to avoid breakage and proper cleanup should a breakage occur with all mercury fever thermometers sold through prescriptions

Section 2.3. Manufacturing Prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any person to manufacture a mercury ther-

mometer in the City.

Section 2.4. Importation Prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any facility to import, purchase, or distribute a

mercury thermometer in the City.

Section 2.5. Restriction on the Sale of Mercury Thermometers. Six months after the adoption of this ordinance, a person may not sell or supply mercury fever thermometers to consumers and patients.

Section 2.6. Penalty. Any person who violates this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$700, or by imprisonment for not more than 6 months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

ORDINANCE RELATING TO REGISTRATION OF DOGS AND FURTHER REGULATING DAN-GEROUS OR VICIOUS DOGS (DOCKET NO. 1117)

Councillor MURPHY offered the following:

City of Boston In the Year Two Thousand

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE REGISTRATION OF DOGS AND FURTHER REGULATING DANGEROUS OR VICIOUS DOGS

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 43B, Section 13, and any other applicable law, as follows:

Whereas, Vicious dogs are so dangerous that they constitute a threat to children and others in the city; and

Whereas, Vicious dogs occasionally escape from the yard or building in which they are kept, by slipping under a fence, jumping over a fence, slipping out through a door or gate temporarily opened or unlatched, breaking the leash or chain, or pulling up the anchor for the chain or leash; and

Whereas, Children too young to read may wander too close to a dog, even in the presence of "beware of dog"

signs; and

Whereas, It is the policy of the City that children and others should not have to assume the risk of a vicious dog having an opportunity to attack or to kill, and

Whereas, The benefits to a dog owner in owning a dangerous dog are(outweighed by dangers to children and to the general public; now therefore be it ordained:

Section 1: Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting the following new section, after Section 1.9A:.

16-1.9B Dangerous or Vicious Dogs

a) A "dangerous or vicious" dog as the term is used in this section shall mean

1) Any dog that has bitten or attacked any person and any dog that has attempted to bite or attack any person. A dog shall be deemed to be attempting to attack if it is restrained by a leash, fence or other means, and it is clear from the dog's excited actions that only the presence of the leash, fence or other means of restraint is preventing the dog from making an immediate attack.

Any dog with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack, to cause injury to, or to otherwise

threaten the safety of domestic animals.

Such incidents shall be evidenced by verified reports of the Dog Officer and shall be governed by the proce-

dures delineated in G.L. c. 140, § 157.

When a dog is deemed to be vicious, the Office of Animal Control may order any or all of the following: 1) Spay or neutering 2) Microchip Identification 3) Behavior Training

b) An "owner or keeper" of a vicious dog shall mean an individual who is the registered owner as well as an individual who keeps, harbors, or possesses a vicious

dog.

c) While on the owner's or keeper's property, a dangerous or vicious dog must be securely confined indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked pen or structure of a type meeting standards established by the Dog Officer,

suitable to prevent the entry of young children, and designed to prevent the animal from escaping. Such pen or structure must have a minimum dimension of five feet by ten feet and must be securely enclosed. If it has no bottom secured to the sides, the sides must be imbedded into the ground no less than two feet. The enclosure must also provide protection from the elements for the

dog.

The owner or keeper shall display a sign or signs on the country from all sides of the his or her premises facing out from all sides of the premises warning that there is a dangerous or vicious dog on the property the location and design of which shall be determined by the Dog Officer. This sign should be visible and capable of being read from a public way or within 20 feet of its placement. In addition, the owner shall conspicuously display a sign with a symbol warning children who cannot read of the presence of a dangerous or vicious dog.

The Dog Officer may permit a dangerous or vicious dog to be off the owner's or keeper's premises if it is muzzled and restrained by a lead or chain approved by the Dog Officer not exceeding three feet in length and is under the control of an adult, able-bodied person. The muzzle must be made in a manner that will not cause injury to the dog or interfere with its vision or respiration, but must prevent it from biting any person or ani-

The provisions of this Ordinance regarding dangerous or vicious dogs shall not apply to animals owned by law enforcement agencies and used for law enforcement

(d) The owner or keeper of any dangerous or vicious dog who fails to comply with the requirements as set forth in paragraph (c) shall be subject to a fine of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for a first offense and five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for any subsequent offense. If said animal is found on property not owned or controlled by its owner or keeper, or not restrained in a secure area per paragraph (c) of this section on two separate occasions within a twelve-month period as documented by the Dog Officer, said animal shall be forever banned from within the limits of the City of Boston.

(e) Each day there exists a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute and be punish-

able as a separate offense.

(f) A dog shall not be considered legally licensed, pursuant to G.L. c. 140 §§ 137, 147, unless the owner is in full compliance with this ordinance.

(g) Compliance with the requirements of this section shall not be a defense to an order of disposal of a vicious

dog pursuant to G.L. c. 140, § 157.

Section 2: To the extent permitted by G.L. c. 140 § 172, fines collected pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance and Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinance, Section 1.9A and all dog registration and licensing fees collected pursuant to Chapter 18 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Section 1.4 (6-10) shall be deposited into a revolving fund within the Animal Control Unit of the Property Management Department with disbursement at the direction of the Commissioner of Property Management, pursuant to the provisions of G.L. c. 44, §53E1/2, and shall be subject to annual authorization by the City Council with the approval of the Mayor. Said fund shall be utilized as follows: to reimburse for administrative costs to those City agencies which enforce this ordinance and Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Section 1.9 and for costs associated with licensing and registration. The total amount which may be expended from such fund in fiscal year 1997 shall not exceed amounts authorized under the aforesaid Section 53E1/2.

Section 3: The title of Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances, section 32.3 is hereby amended to read as follows: 16-32.3 Alternative Noncriminal Disposition of Violations of Subsections 16- 19, 16-32.4

16-1.9B and 16-12.7.

Section 4: The first sentence of Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinance, Section 32.3 is hereby amended by inserting after 16-1.9 the following: ,16-1.9B

Section 5: The first sentence of Chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Section 32.3 is hereby further amended by inserting the following after the last word of the sentence: and the Animal Control Unit of the

Property Management Department.

Section 6: pursuant to the provision of St. 1909, c. 486, §5, as amended by St. 1953, c. 473, chapter 16 of the City of Boston Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting the following new section, after Section 1.9B: 16-1.9C Dog Registration & Licensing. All the powers and duties associated with dog registration and licensing in the City of Boston, heretofore exercised by the Police Commissioner of the City of Boston and the Inspectional Services Department pursuant to G.L. c. 140 are hereby transferred to the Animal Control Unit of the Property Management Department. The following positions in the Property Management Department and the Inspectional Services Department shall be reclassified or transferred to and within the Property Management Department: the incumbent Executive Assistant responsible for Animal Control in the Property Management Department shall be reclassified to the position of Executive Assistant (Director of Animal Control); the incumbent Dog Officers in the Inspectional Services Department shall each be transferred to the position of Animal Control Officer to the Property Management Department; the incumbent Administrative Assistant in the Animal Control Unit of the Inspectional Services Department shall be transferred to the Property Management Department to the position of Administrative Assistant (Animal Control). Each of the aforementioned positions and each subject employee who immediately prior to such transfer or reclassification held an office or position subject to Civil Service Laws and Rules shall be appointed without examination or registration and shall upon such appointment retain all rights to retirement with pension that shall or would have accrued, and each such employee's service shall be deemed to be continuous to the same extent as if this transfer or reclassification had not taken place.

Section 7: Chapter 18 of the City of Boston Ordinances, Sections 1.4 (6-10) are hereby amended by deleting the several references to "the Police deleting the several references to "the Police Commissioner" and inserting in place thereof: the Animal Control Unit of the Property Management

Department.

Section 8: All of the fees appearing in Chapter 18 of the city of Boston Ordinances, Sections 1.4(6)-(10) are hereby increased by the amount of two dollars (\$2.00).

liquor or beer and wine application;

Ordered, That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing, in cooperation with the Boston Licensing Board, to investigate this matter and to develop an improved notification system; and that Daniel Pokaski, Chairman of the Boston Licensing Board and other interested parties be invited to attend.

Whereas, With strong supporters on each side of this issue, there is a possibility that confusion may cloud the merits and consequences of Question 8; therefore be it

I herewith transmit an Act Relative to An Increase in the Exemption for Residential Real Property in the City of Boston from 20 Per Cent to 30 Per Cent for passage

by your Honorable Body.

Rising housing costs in the City of Boston is an issue of great importance. The substantial run-up in real estate prices will require the City to increase assessments. Since Proposition 2 1/2 limits the City's tax levy, the increase in assessments will be partially offset by reductions in the tax rate. However, as the appreciation in values is not uniform across the city, shifts in the tax burden - across neighborhoods and property types - can result in large increases for some taxpayers. I am committed to taking steps necessary to litigate all rising housing costs, including property taxes.

Consequently, I am proposing that the City of Boston offer an increased residential exemption. The residential exemption provides needed property tax relief to thousands of owner-occupiers of residential property in Boston. Increasing the amount of the exemption, from 20% of the average home value to 30%, will go a long way to helping Boston's residents keep their housing

costs down.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO AN INCREASE IN THE EXEMPTION FOR RESIDENTIAL REAL PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF BOSTON FROM 20 PER CENT TO 30 PER CENT

Ordered, That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause (1) of Section eight of Article two, as amended, of the Amendments to Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted providing precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

Whereas, Housing costs are rising rapidly in the City of Boston;

Whereas, The residential exemption provides relief from said housing costs for thousands of owner-occu-

piers of residential property in Boston;

Whereas, In the interest of helping Boston's residents afford the rising housing costs the City of Boston is committed to mitigating rising property taxes; now therefore, be it ordained by the City Council to be accompanied by a petition to the State Legislature:

SECTION ONE: Notwithstanding the provisions of section 5C of chapter 59 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, with respect to each parcel of real property classified as Class One, residential, in the city of Boston as certified by the commissioner of revenue to be assessing all local property at its full and fair cash valuation, and at the option of the mayor, with the approval of the city council, there shall be an exemption equal to not more than thirty per cent (30%) of the average assessed value of all Class One, residential, parcels within the City of Boston; provided however, that such an exemption shall be applied only to

the principal residence of the taxpayer as used by the taxpayer for income tax purposes. This exemption shall be in addition to any exemptions allowable under section 5 of chapter 59 of the General Laws; provided, however that in no instance shall the taxable valuation of such property, after all applicable exemptions, be reduced to below ten per cent (10%) of its full fair cash valuation, except through the applicability of section 8A of chapter 58 and clause Eighteenth of said section 5 of chapter 59. Where, under the provisions of said section 5, the exemption is based upon an amount of tax rather than on valuation, the reduction of taxable valuation for the purposes of the preceding sentence shall be computed by dividing the said amount of the tax by the residential tax rate of the city of Boston and multiplying the result by one-thousand dollars (\$1,000.00). For purposes of this paragraph, "parcel" shall mean a unit of real property as defined by the assessors in accordance with the deed for such property and shall include a condominium unit:

SECTION TWO: A taxpayer aggrieved by the failure to receive such residential exemption may apply for such residential exemption to the assessors in writing on a form approved by the board of assessors within three months after the date on which the bill or notice of assessment was sent. An application timely filed hereunder shall, for the purposes of this chapter, be treated as a timely filed application pursuant to section 59 of

chapter 59 of the General Laws.

Whereas, The City of Boston has submitted the Municipal Harbor Plan for approval to the Massachusetts Executive Office of Environmental Affairs; and

Whereas, Secretary Robert Durand has set the deadline for written public comment regarding the Municipal Harbor Plan for Wednesday, October 18,

Whereas, The Committee on Transportation and Economic Development has conducted two Hearings on the South Boston Waterfront District, the most recent on Monday, October 16, 2000; and

Whereas, The impact the present Boston Municipal Harbor Plan will have on the City of Boston and all of Boston's residents will span generations to come; and

Whereas, All of Boston's neighborhoods and persons regardless of their race or economic status should be provided a destination or venue where they can actively recreate and experience the benefits and excitement of a true public waterfront; and

Whereas, Under Chapter 91 of the Massachusetts

General Laws (the "Public Trust Doctrine") the waterfront belongs to the public and must be developed for a "proper public purpose" any development on the Waterfront must first and foremost serve "a proper public purpose" and second. the "private advantages" on developing the property "are not primary but merely incidental to the achievement of public purposes"; and therefore be it

Resolved, The Boston City Council in meeting assembled recommend to the Secretary of the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts that he approve the Municipal Harbor Plan while taking into consideration the comments. correspondence and testimony of the residents of the City of Boston through an inclusive consultation process;

Resolved, That the Boston City Council also recommend that conditions be imposed on building heights designed to ensure that no building in the district impair the operations of Logan Airport or cause the redistribution of flights using Runway #27 in a manner that would alter noise mitigation effort, and be it further

RESOLUTION ON EMERGENCY GOVERNMEN-TAL ACTION TO REDUCE OIL AND NAT-URAL GAS PRICES (DOCKET NO. 1261)

Councilor TURNER offered the following:

Whereas, The price of oil has more than tripled since January of 1999, to over \$35 per barrel, and threatens to go even higher over the coming weeks and months; and Whereas, Worldwide oil prices continue to rise despite increased production by OPEC nations, and release of the U. S. Strategic Petroleum Reserve; and

Whereas, The citizens of Boston, Massachusetts, and the New England states in particular, will face danger from increased fire hazards, as well as severe and potentially deadly economic hardship this winter, due to increases in prices for home heating fuels; and .

Whereas, The petroleum price crisis is presently but

Whereas, The petroleum price crisis is presently but one leading economic consequence of a general hyperinflation in financial asset-prices, now being expressed at increasing rates as a hyperinflation in coinmodity prices, following a trend similar to that suffered by Weimar, Germany during 1923; and

Whereas, The increasingly desperate effort to secure inflows of financial assets into the U.S. dollar sector, by means of various forms of speculative activity, seizes upon several combined factors, to increase asset-price accumulations from hyperinflationary trends in the

delivery prices of petroleum products; and

Whereas, These factors include recent increased concentration of ownership of major oil companies through mergers and acquisitions, the increased role of the spot market in petroleum deliveries, the significance of denomination of deliveries in U S dollars, most especially the intensity of speculative dealings in the form of financial derivatives in this area, which threaten to bring the per-barrel price of petroleum to between \$40 and \$50 per barrel soon, and not much later, much higher; and

Whereas, Only drastic measures taken in concert between sovereign national governments can bring the petroleum-price crisis under control; and

Whereas, Appropriate action led by the U.S. government must aim at immediate emergency cooperation among the governments of principal petroleum-exporting and principal petroleum-consuming nations; and

Whereas, The actions of legislative groupings i.e., town and city councils, state legislatures and federal elected representatives must uphold the oath of office to defend and secure the General Welfare of all citizens; and

Whereas, The following actions proposed by economist Lyndon LaRouche to deal with that emergency situation contribute an important, and decisive step in the direction of moving the government of these United States to act in concert with other nations to solve the more general problem of the world's financial and monctary systems, therefore be it

ORDINANCE CONCERNING INSTALLATION OF

Resolved, That the Boston City Council of Boston urges the President of the United States, the U. S. Senate and the House of Representatives to take emergency action to reduce oil and natural gas prices; including the following measures:

A) Declare a general strategic emergency in the matter of stability of flows and prices of essential energy-

B) Establish contracts, directly between the U. S government and the governments of petroleum exporting nations, of not less than twelve months governmentscheduled deliveries of petroleum;

C) Define reasonable prices for these contracts;

D) On the grounds of a global emergency in petroleum prices and supplies, set priorities on processing of such contracted petroleum flows through relevant refiners to priority categories of consumers in the United States, causing other stocks to be shunted to one side to the degree that these priority deliveries must be processed first;

E) Urge governments of other oil-consuming nations to take these same actions, in the context of this global

F) Investigate petroleum market manipulation, through financial derivatives speculation of other unfair speculative practices, and probe allegations that some portion of the U. S Strategic Petroleum Reserve recently released for the benefit of citizens of the Northeastern United States, are in fact being exported overseas for profit by the U S refineries; be it further

Resolved, That the City Council of Boston urges the Government of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the Massachusetts General Court, and other state and local governments of the United States to support these emergency actions in the vital interest of the General

Welfare of its citizens.

RESOLUTION ENCOURAGING RESIDENTS TO VOTE NO ON BALLOT QUESTION #8 (DOCKET NO. 1262)

Whereas, All eleven Massachusetts District Attorneys along with the Massachusetts Chiefs of Police Association oppose question #8 because it would allow persons charged with a drug crime to request a court finding that he or she is drug dependent or may be at risk of becoming drug dependent, and would benefit from court-monitored treatment instead of a period of probation or incarceration. Once treatment is successfully completed, the criminal charges would be dismissed, causing concern that this broad definition may allow repeat offenders and drug dealers to manipulate the system and side step prosecution; and

Whereas, It is understood that treatment is vital to the rehabilitation of persons fighting drug addictions, passage of question #8 however would open up vast legal loopholes in the effort to prosecute drug crimes throughout the entire Commonwealth; therefore be it

Given, however, that data from the 2000 census is not yet available, I am asking the City Council to approve a one-year extension of the MWBE ordinance to allow for the disparity study to be fully updated with the most recent and best available data. Once that information is available, I will ask my administration and the City Council to evaluate the data so that the City will have the strongest possible MWBE program from both programmatic and legal perspectives

In light of the fact that the findings of the 1994 disparity study remain valid until 2004 and the results of the 2000 Federal Census are not yet available, I urge your Honorable Body to pass this amendment without delay.

REPORT ON ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO BANNING SALE OF MERCURY THERMOMETERS (DOCKET NO. 1116)

City of Boston

In the Year Two Thousand

AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO BANNING THE SALE OF MERCURY THERMOMETERS IN THE CITY OF BOSTON

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 43B, Section 13, and any other applicable law, as follows:

Section 1

(a) Mercury is a persistent and toxic pollutant that bioaccumulates in the environment and the food chain

(b) Incineration of medical and municipal waste, which contains whole or broken thermometers, is a major source of atmospheric deposition of mercury in the Northeast resulting in mercury contamination of air and water.

(c) Mercury from mercury thermometers can also directly enter the environment through vaporization and/or spillage when a thermometer breaks during use, transportation or disposal. The United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) estimated that for the year 2000, 17 tons of elemental mercury from thermometers will be disposed of as municipal solid wastethis does not include additional mercury that finds its

way into the medical waste stream.

(d) Accidental mercury spills, breakages, and releases have occurred at schools throughout the Northeast. In addition to the threat of health risks to students and staff and potential for adverse environment impact, these discharges are costly, Harvard University has sited that it costs \$110 to properly clean up a single thermometer breakage in a laboratory. If the mercury is accidentally spread through tracking, HVAC or cleaning, costs rapidly escalate. This does not reflect the cost to replace contaminated items and in some cases it can reach into multiple thousands of dollars. These incidences have proven costly to clean up and have exposed students, teachers and/or administrators to mercury emissions.

(e) Due to the bioaccumulation of mercury in fish, the Massachusetts Department of Public Health has issued a statewide native fresh waster fish advisory, warning pregnant women, women of childbearing age and children not to consume any fish.

(f) Pharmacy chains of Rite-Aid, K-Mart, Brooks, Target, Wal-Mart, Albertson, Kinney, Toys 'R' Us, Safety First, The First Years and Meijers amongst others have joined a Mercury Free Thermometer campaign, pledging to discontinue the sale of mercury basal and

fever thermometers.

(g) There are accurate and safe alternatives to mercury thermometers that are readily available and com-

parable in cost.

(h) Local take back programs have already demonstrated the ease and effectiveness of removing mercury products. The town of Burlington, MA successfully collected more than 1425 mercury thermometers. Unexpectedly, Burlington's program also received over 60 pounds of raw elemental mercury. Oakland County in Michigan is also rounding up mercury thermometers to get the toxic metal out of medicine cabinets. Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, New England Medical Center, and Dana Farber Cancer Institute and Newton-Wellesley Medical Center are among many hospitals and clinics that have participated in mercury thermometers 'round-ups' and have taken a pledge to virtually eliminate mercury waste from the health care waste stream by 2003.

(i) In 1998 the American Poison Control Center received 18,000 phone calls regarding broken mercury thermometers. The average cost of handling each call was \$30, plus the added cost to the caller of cleaning up

the mercury spill.

(j) In the state of New Hampshire, a person shall not sell or supply mercury fever thermometers to consumers and patients, except by prescription. The county of San Francisco; the city of Duluth, Minnesota; the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan and Dane County Wisconsin are among many government bodies that have already passed legislation to ban the sale of mercury thermometers.

(k) The New England States and Eastern Canadian Provinces are implementing a bi-national mercury plan, which was unanimously adopted in June of 1998 by the Conference of New England Governors and Eastern Canadian Premiers (and signed by Governor Cellucci in June 1998). The mercury action plan is an ambitious program to virtually eliminate the emissions of mercury in the region. The regional goal of this action plan supports the virtual elimination of anthropogenic mercury. The plan consistent with the prohibition of mercury thermometers sales.

(1) The "Massachusetts Zero Mercury Strategy", formed by Environmental Affairs Secretary, Robert Durand, adopted in the summer of 2000 an ambitious strategy that calls for virtual elimination of the use and discharge of mercury including mercury thermometers.

(m) The American Hospital Association (AMA) - US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) memorandum of Understanding calls for "virtual elimination" of mercury from healthcare facilities. Over 500 hospitals and clinics across the country have already taken a pledge to remove mercury thermometers and replace them with safe alternatives.

(n) The New England states are in the process of individually introducing model mercury legislation that would severely restrict the sale of mercury fever therefore the sale of mercury fever therefore the sale of mercury fever therefore the sale of the sale

Section 2 The Municipal Code of the City of Boston is amended as follows:

Section 2.1. Definitions.

A. City means the City of Boston.

B. Mercury thermometer means a mercury-containing product that is used to measure body temperature. A mercury-containing product is a product, device, instrument or equipment into which elemental mercury or mercury compounds are intentionally added during its

formulation or manufacture and in which the continued presence of mercury is desired to provide a specific characteristic or to permit a specific function.

C. Health care facility means any hospital, nursing home, extended care facility, long term facility, clinic or medical laboratory, state or private health or mental institution, clinic, physician's office or health maintenance organization.

D. Manufacturer means any person, firm, association, partnership, corporation, governmental entity, organization, combination, or joint venture that produces a mercury fever thermometer. If the mercury thermometer is produced in a foreign county, the manufacturer is the

importer or domestic distributor.

Section 2.2. Retail Sale Prohibited. A person shall not sell or supply (including online retail) mercury fever thermometers to consumers and patients, except by prescription. The manufacturers of mercury fever thermometers shall supply clear instructions on the careful handling of the thermometer to avoid breakage and proper cleanup should a breakage occur with all mercury fever thermometers sold through prescriptions

<u>Section 2.3</u>. Manufacturing Prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any person to manufacture a mercury ther-

mometer in the City.

<u>Section 2.4.</u> Importation Prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any facility to import, purchase, or distribute a mercury thermometer in the City, except in the case of medical necessity as determined by a licensed physician.

<u>Section 2.5.</u> Restriction on the Sale of Mercury Thermometers. Six months after the adoption of this ordinance, a person may not sell or supply mercury fever thermometers to consumers and patients.

<u>Section 2.6</u>. Penalty. Any person who violates this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$700.00 per unit sold.

Councilor ROACHE moved that the ordinance be amended by striking the words "guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$700.00 per unit sold" and substituting the words "subject to a fine of not more than \$700.00 per unit sold. The Public Health Commission shall have jurisdiction over outreach and the enforcement of this ordinance."

Whereas, The artists, themselves being small industries, have always existed in harmony with the larger industrial entities, such as Gillette, coexisting without the contention often found in other mixed use neighborhoods; and

Whereas, The Fort Point neighborhood has become a prime location for development being bound by the Convention Center, the new waterfront development parcels, the completion of the local phase of the Big Dig and having easy access to the airport via the Ted Williams Tunnel; and

ORDINANCE AMENDING BOSTON FIRE PRE-VENTION CODE CONCERNING BLASTING **REGULATIONS (DOCKET NO. 1363)**

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE
BOSTON FIRE PREVENTION CODE
CONCERNING BLASTING REGULATIONS
Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as

That the City of Boston Code, Ordinances, Chapter 11, Section 5, Boston Fire Prevention Code (as adopted by Chapter 28 of the Ordinances of 1979), be amended by adding the following new article:

#### ARTICLE XXXII: BLASTING

#### Section 32.01 PURPOSE

All blasting within the Corporate Limits of the City of Boston shall comply with the requirements of 527 CMR, Board of Fire Prevention, Chapter 13.00, Explosives and Application Sections of the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 148. In addition, blasting shall comply with the following general and specific requirements and standards for the protection of people and property, land, and other natural resources. Unless otherwise provided for in this regulation, the provisions of 527CMR 13.00 are applicable and must be complied with at all times.

# Section 32.02 DEFINITIONS

If any of the following definitions are inconsistent with definitions that appear in 527CMR 13.00, the definition in 527CMR 13.00 is the definition that governs.

AIRBLAST The airborne shock wave or acoustic transient generated by an explosion.

"ALWAYS AND NEVER" List of precautions (IME Safety library Publication No. 4) printed by the Institute of Makers of Explosives pertaining to the transportation, storage, handling and use of explosive materials. Formerly titled 'DOS AND DON'TS'.

AMERICAN NATIONAL STANDARDS INSTI-TUTE (ANSI) A non-governmental organization concerned with developing safety and health standards for industry.

AMERICAN TABLE OF DISTANCES A quantitydistance table, prepared and approved by IME, for storage of explosive materials to determine safe distances from inhabited buildings, public highways, passenger railways, and other stored explosive materials.

AMMONIUM NITRATE The ammonium salt of nitric acid represented by the formula NH4NO3.

AMPERE A unit of electrical current produced by 1 volt acting through a resistance of 1 ohm.

ANFO A blasting agent (1.5D) containing no essential ingredients other than prilled ammonium nitrate and fuel oil.

ANSI See AMERICAN NATIONAL STANDARDS INSTITUTE.

APPROPRIATE AUTHORITY See COMPETENT AUTHORITY

APPROVED, APPROVAL, OR AUTHORIZED Terms which means APPROVED, APPROVAL, or by the authority having jurisdiction.

ARTIFICIAL BARRICADE An artificial mound or

revested wall of earth of a minimum thickness of three feet

ATF See BUREAU OF ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, AND FIREARMS.

AUTHORIZED PERSON An individual approved or assigned by management to perform a specific duty or duties or to be at a specific location or locations.

AUTHORITY HAVING JURISDICTION The governmental agency, office, or individual responsible for approving equipment, an installation, or a procedure.

AVAILABLE ENERGY The energy from an explosive material that is capable of performing useful work.

BACKBREAK Rock broken beyond the limits of the last row of holes in a blast, synonymous with OVER-BREAK.

BARRICADED The effective screening of a building containing explosive materials from a magazine or other building, railway, or highway by a natural or an artificial barrier. A straight line from the top of any sidewall of the building containing explosive materials to the eave line of any magazine or other building or to a point twelve feet above the center of a railway or highway shall pass through such barrier.

BARRIER A material object or objects that separates, keeps apart, or demarcates in a conspicuous manner such as cones, a warning sign, or tape.

BASE CHARGE The main explosive charge in the base of a detonator.

BINARY EXPLOSIVE (see Plosophoric Materials BATF See BUREAU OF ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, AND FIREARMS.

BENCH A horizontal ledge from which holes are drilled vertically down into the material to be blasted; benching is a process of excavating where a highwall is worked in steps or lifts.

BENCH HEIGHT The vertical distance from the top of a bench to the floor or to the top of the next lower bench.

BLACK POWDER A deflagrating or low explosive compound of an intimate mixture of sulfur, charcoal, and an alkalis nitrate, usually potassium or sodium nitrate.

BLAST, (BLASTING) The firing of explosive materials for such purposes as breaking rock or other material, moving material, or generating seismic waves.

BLAST AREA The area including the blast site and the immediate adjacent area within the influence of flying rock missiles, gases, and concussion. (\*\*)

#### BLASTHOLE See DRILL HOLE and BOREHOLE.

BLAST PATTERN The plan of the drill holes as laid out for blasting; an expression of the burden distance and the spacing distance and their relationship to each other. Synonymous with DRILL PATTERN.

BLAST SITE The area in which explosive materials are being or have been loaded and which includes all holes loaded or to be loaded for the same blast and for a distance of 50 feet in all directions. (\*\*)

BLASTER A person who holds a valid Certificate of Competency issued by the State Fire Marshal and qualified to be in charge of and responsible for the design, loading, and firing of a blast. A blaster is recognized in his field as an explosives craftsman. (\*\*)

BLASTING ACCESSORIES Non-explosive devices and materials used in blasting, such as, but not limited to, cap crimpers, tamping bags, blasting machines, blasting galvanometers, and cartridge punches.

BLASTING AGENT An explosive material which meets prescribed criteria for insensitivity to initiation.

For storage, Title 27, Code of Federal Regulations, Section 5511 defines a blasting agent as any material or mixture, consisting of fuel and oxidizer intended for blasting, not otherwise defined as an explosive: provided, that the finished product, as mixed for use or shipment, cannot be detonated by means of a No. 8 test blasting cap (detonator) when unconfined (Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Regulation).

For transportation, Title 49 CFR, Section 11 73.50, defines Class 1, Division 1. 5 (blasting agent) as a substance which has mass explosion hazard but is so insensitive that there is very little probability of initiation or of transition from burning to detonation under normal

conditions in transport.

# BLASTING CAP See DETONATOR.

BLASTING CREW A group of persons who assist the blaster in loading, tying in, and firing a blast.

BLASTING GALVANOMETER An electrical resistance instrument designed specifically for testing electric detonators and circuits containing them. It is used to check electrical continuity. Other acceptable instruments for this purpose are Blasting Ohmmeters and Blasters' Multi-meters.

BLASTING LOG A written record of information about a specific blast as may be required by law or regulation.

BLASTING MACHINE An electrical or electromechanical device which provides electrical energy for the purpose of energizing detonators in an electric blasting circuit. Also used in reference to certain non-electric systems (Sometimes called exploder or battery).

BLASTING MAT A mat of woven steel wire, rope, scrap tires, or other suitable material or construction to cover blastholes for the purpose of preventing flying rock missiles.

BLASTING VIBRATIONS The energy from a blast that manifests itself in vibrations which are transmitted through the earth away from the immediate blast area.

BOOSTER An explosive charge, usually of high detonation velocity and detonation pressure, designed to be used in the explosive initiation sequence between an initiator or primer and the main charge.

BOREHOLE A hole drilled in the material to be blasted, for the purpose of containing an explosive charge, also called BLASTHOLE or DRILL HOLE.

BREAKAGE A term used to describe the site distribution of the rock fragments created by a blast.

BRIDGEWIRE A resistance wire connecting the ends of the leg wires inside an electric detonator and which is embedded in the ignition charge of the detonator

BULK STRENGTH The strength per unit volume of an explosive calculated from its weight strength and density.

BURDEN The distance from the borehole and the

nearest free face or the distance between boreholes measured perpendicular to the spacing. Also the total amount of material to be blasted by a given hole, usually measured in cubic yards or tons.

BUREAU OF ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, AND FIREARMS A bureau of the Department of Treasury having responsibility for the promulgation and enforcement of regulations related to the unlawful use of explosive materials under 18 U.S.C. Chapter 40, (BATF) Section 847.

BUREAU OF MINES See U.S. BUREAU OF MINES.

CAP-SENSITIVE EXPLOSIVE MATERIAL An explosive material which will detonate with an IME No. 8 TEST DETONATOR when the material is unconfined.

CAPACITOR DISCHARGE BLASTING MACHINE A blasting machine in which electrical energy, stored on a capacitor, is discharged into a blasting circuit containing electric detonators

CARTRIDGE An individual closed shell, bag, or tube of circular cross section containing explosive material.

CARTRIDGE COUNT (STICK COUNT) The number of cartridges in a case. A standard case typically contains about 50 pounds of explosive material. Unless otherwise specified it refers to the number of 1/4 x 8 inch cartridges in a 50 lb. case.

CARTRIDGE STRENGTH Synonymous with BULK STRENGTH.

CFR See CODE OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS.

CIRCUIT A completed path for conveying electrical current. See SERIES BLASTING

CIRCUIT, PARALLEL BLASTING CIRCUIT, and SERIES-IN-PARALLEL BLASTING CIRCUIT (Some non-electric systems also use the word circuit.)

CLASS A EXPLOSIVES A term formerly used by the U.S. Department of Transportation to describe explosives which possess detonating or otherwise maximum hazard (Currently classified as Division 1.1 or 1.2 materials).

CLASS B EXPLOSIVES A term formerly used by the U.S. Department of Transportation to describe explosives which possess flammable hazard. (Currently classified as Division 3 materials.)

CLASS C EXPLOSIVES A term formerly used by the U.S. Department of Transportation to describe explosives which contain Class A or Class B explosives, or both as components but in restricted quantities. (Currently classified Division 1.4 materials.)

CODE OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS A codification of the general and permanent rules published in the Federal Register by the Executive departments and agencies of the Federal Government. The Code is divided into 50 titles which represent broad areas subject to Federal regulation.

COLLAR The mouth or opening of a borehole or shaft

COLUMN CHARGE A charge of explosives in a blasthole in the form of a long continuous unbroken column.

COLUMN DEPTH/COLUMN HEIGHT The length of each portion of a blasthole filled with explosive

materials.

COMPETENT AUTHORITY A national agency responsible under its national law for the control or regulation of a particular aspect of the transportation of hazardous materials. Also referred to as APPROPRIATE AUTHORITY (Ref. 49 CFR).

CONFINED DETONATION VELOCITY The detonation velocity of an explosive material in a substantial container or a borehole.

CONNECTING WIRE Wire used to extend the firing line or leg wires in an electric blasting circuit.

CONTINUITY CHECK (CIRCUIT CONTINUITY CHECK) A determination made by instrumentation where possible, and visually in all cases, to show that an initiation system is continuous and contains no breaks or improper connections that could cause stoppage or failure of the initiation process.

COUPLING The degree to which an explosive fills the cross-section of a borehole: bulk loaded explosives are completely coupled: untamped cartridges are decoupled.

CRITICAL DIAMETER The minimum diameter for propagation of a detonation wave at a stable velocity. Critical diameter is affected by conditions of confinement, temperature and pressure on the explosive.

CURRENT LEAKAGE Portion of the firing current bypassing part of the blasting circuit through unintended paths.

CURRENT LIMITING DEVICE An electric or electromechanical device that limits (I)current amplitude; (2) duration of current flow; or (3) total energy of the current delivered to an electric blasting circuit.

CUSHION BLASTING A blasting technique used to produce competent slopes or smooth walls. The cushion holes, fired after the main charge, have a reduced spacing and employ decoupled charges.

CUTOFF A break in a path of detonation or initiation caused by extraneous interference, such as flyrock or shifting ground.

DATE-SHOT CODE A code, required by Federal regulation (BATF), applied by manufacturers to the outside shipping containers, and, in many instances, to the immediate containers of explosive materials to aid in their identification and tracing.

DAUTRICHE METHOD-DETONATION VELOC-ITY A method of determining the detonation velocity of an explosive material by employing detonating cord and a witness plate.

DC Direct current.

DECIBEL A unit of air overpressure commonly used to measure airblast.

DECK LOADING (DECKING) A method of loading blastholes in which the explosive charges called decks or deck charges, in the same hole are separated by stemming or an air cushion.

DECK An explosive charge that is separated from other charges in the blasthole by stemming or an air cushion.

DECOUPLING The use of cartridged explosive products significantly smaller in diameter than the diameter of the blasthole. Decoupling or the use of decoupling

charges is designed to reduce the charge concentration in the blasthole and minimize stresses exerted on the walls of the blasthole.

DEFLAGRATION An explosive reaction such as a rapid combustion that moves through an explosive material at a velocity less than the speed of sound in the material.

DELAY A distinct pause of predetermined time between detonation or initiation impulses, to permit the firing of explosive charges separately.

DELAY BLASTING The practice of initiating individual explosive decks, boreholes or rows of boreholes at predetermined time intervals using delay detonators, or other delaying means, as compared to instantaneous blasting where all holes are fired essentially at the same time.

DELAY DETONATOR An electric or non-electric detonator used to introduce a predetermined lapse of time between the application of a firing signal and the detonation of the base charge.

DELAY ELEMENT The device in a delay detonator that produces the predetermined time lapse between the application of a firing signal and detonation.

DELAY INTERVAL The nominal time between the detonation of delay detonators of adjacent periods in a delay series; the nominal time between successive detonations in a blast.

DELAY PERIOD A designation given to a delay detonator to show its relative or absolute delay time in a given series.

DELAY SERIES A series of delay detonators designed to satisfy specific blasting requirements. There are basically two types of delay series: millisecond (MS) or short period (SP) with delay intervals on the order of milliseconds and long period (LP) with delay time on the order of seconds.

DELAY TAG A tag, band, or marker on a delay detonator that denotes the delay series, delay period and/or delay time of the detonator.

DELAY TIME The lapse of time between the application of a firing signal and the detonation of the base charge of a delay detonator.

DENSITY The mass of an explosive per unit of volume, usually expressed in grams per cubic centimeter or pounds per cubic foot (also see SPECIFIC GRAVITY).

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (DOT) A cabinet level agency of the Federal Government. It has the responsibility for the comprehensive regulation of transportation safety and issues regulations governing interstate shipments of explosives and other hazardous materials.

DETONATING CORD A flexible cord containing a center core of high explosive which may be used to initiate other high explosives.

DETONATING CORD DOWNLINE The section of detonating cord that extends within the blast hole from the ground surface down to the explosive charge.

DETONATING CORD MS CONNECTORS Nonclectric short-interval (millisecond) delay devices for use in delaying blasts which are initiated by detonating cord.

DETONATING CORD TRUNKLINE The line of

detonating cord that is used to connect and initiate other lines of detonating cord.

DETONATION An explosive reaction that moves through an explosive material at a velocity greater than the speed of sound in the material.

DETONATION PRESSURE The pressure produced in the reaction zone of a detonating explosive.

DETONATION VELOCITY The velocity at which a detonation progresses through an explosive.

DETONATOR Any device containing an initiating or primary explosive that is used for initiating detonation in another explosive material. A detonator may not contain more than 10 grams of total explosives by weight, excluding ignition or delay charges. The term includes, but is not limited to, electric blasting caps of instantaneous and delay types, blasting caps for use with safety fuse, detonating cord delay connectors, and nonelectric instantaneous and delay blasting caps which use detonating cord, shock tube, or any other replacement for electric leg wires. Unless specifically classified otherwise, detonators are classified 1.1 (Class A explosives). Also see DETONATORS I.4 (CLASS C EXPLOSIVES).

DETONATORS I.4 (CLASS C EXPLOSIVES) Initiating devices which will not mass explode when packaged for shipment (See MASS EXPLODE).

DIAMETER The cross-sectional width of a borehole or an explosive cartridge.

DITCH BLASTING The formation of a ditch by the detonation of a series of explosive charges.

DITCHING DYNAMITE A nitroglycerin type explosive especially designed to propagate sympathetically from hole to hole in ditch blasting.

DOS AND DON'TS Former name of a list of precautions (IME Safety Library Publication No. 4) printed by the Institute of Makers of Explosives pertaining to the transportation, storage, handling, and use of explosive materials and included in cases of explosive materials. Recently renamed, "ALWAYS AND NEVER".

# DOT See DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION.

DOWNLINE A line of detonating cord or plastic tubing in a blasthole which transmits the detonation from the trunkline or surface delay system down the hole to the primer.

DRILL HOLE A hole drilled in the material to be blasted for the purpose of containing an explosive charge, also called BLASTHOLE or BOREHOLE.

DRILLING PATTERN The location of blastholes in relationship to each other and the free face.

DYNAMITE A high explosive used for blasting, consisting essentially of a mixture of, but not limited to nitroglycerin, nitrocellulose, ammonium nitrate, sodium nitrate, and carbonaceous materials.

ELECTRIC BLASTING CIRCUIT An electric circuit containing electric detonators and associated wiring. Also see PARALLEL, SERIES, AND SERIES IN PARALLEL BLASTING CIRCUITS.

ELECTRIC DETONATOR A detonator designed for, and capable of, initiation by means of an electric current.

ELECTRICAL STORM An atmospheric disturbance

characterized by intense electrical activity producing lightning strokes and strong electric and magnetic fields. Synonymous with THUNDERSTORM and LIGHTNING STORM.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURE CARD Instructions carried on a vehicle transporting explosive materials and giving specific procedures in case of emergency.

EMULSION An explosive material containing substantial amounts of oxidizer dissolved in water droplets, surrounded by an immiscible fuel, or droplets of an immiscible fuel surrounded by water containing substantial amounts of oxidizer.

ENERGY A measure of the potential for an explosive to do work.

EXPLODE To react chemically in a rapid manner to produce heat and pressure. The term encompasses both deflagration and detonation.

EXPLOSION A chemical reaction involving an extremely rapid expansion of gases usually associated with the liberation of heat.

EXPLOSIVE Any chemical compound, mixture or device, the primary or common purpose of which is to function by explosion, i.e., with substantially instantaneous release of gas and heat. In 527 CMR I 3.00, explosives shall be a Class I Explosives Materials. Class I Explosives Materials class I Explosives Materials of the properties and hazards of the particular explosives materials. The Divisions of Class I Explosives Materials shall be:

Division 1.1: Explosives that have a mass explosion hazard. (formerly Class A explosives).

Division I.2: Explosives that have a projection hazard but not a mass explosion hazard. A high explosive. (formerly class A or class B explosives).

Division 1.3: Explosives that have a fire hazard and either a minor blast hazard or a minor projection hazard, or both, but not a mass explosion hazard. A low explosive. (formerly class B explosives).

Division I.4: Explosives that present a minor explosion hazard. An external fire must not cause virtual instantaneous explosion of almost the entire contents of the package. No device may contain more than 25g (0.9 oz) of a detonating material. A low explosive. (formerly a class C explosive).

Division 1.5: Very insensitive explosive materials that have a mass explosion hazard but are so insensitive that there is little or no probability of initiation or of transition from burning to detonation under normal conditions of transport. (formerly a blasting agent).

Division 1.6: Extremely insensitive articles that do not have a mass explosion hazard, and articles that demonstrate a negligible probability of accidental initiation or propagation. (no applicable hazard class. (\*\*)

EXPLOSIVE-ACTUATED DEVICE Any tool or special mechanized device which is actuated by explosives. The term does not include propellant-actuated devices. (Also see PROPELLANT-ACTUATED POWER DEVICE.) Examples of explosive-actuated devices are jet tappers and jet perforators.

EXPLOSIVE CHARGE The quantity of explosive material used in a blasthole, coyote tunnel, or explosive device.

EXPLOSIVE LOADING FACTOR The amount of explosive used per unit of rock. Also called POWDER FACTOR.

EXPLOSIVE MATERIALS Any explosive, blasting agent or detonator. The term includes, but is not limited

to, dynamite, and other explosives, slurries, emulsions, and water gels, black powder, pellet powder, initiating explosives, detonators (blasting caps), safety fuse, squibs, detonating cord, smokeless propellants, small arms ammunition, small arms percussion caps, smokeless primers, igniter cord and igniters. (\*\*)

A list of explosive materials determined to be within the coverage of 18 U.S.C. Chapter 40,1importation, Manufacture, Distribution and Storage of Explosive Materials, is issued at least annually by the Director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms of the

Department of the Treasury

The U.S. Department of Transportation classification of explosive materials used in commercial blasting operations are not identical with the statutory definitions of the Organized Crime Control Act of 1970, Title 128 U.S.C. Section 841.To achieve uniformity in transportation the definitions of the U.S. Department of Transportation in Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations parts 1999 subdivides these materials into:

Division I.1 Mass exploding (Class A explosives) Division 1.2 Projection hazard (Class A or Class

B explosives)

Division 1.3 Fire hazard, minor blast (Class B explosives) or projection hazard

Division 1.4 Minor explosion (Class C explo-

sives) hazard not mass exploding

Division 1.5 Insensitive explosives, (Blasting Agents) Very little probability of initiation or transition from burning to detonation during transport.

EXPLOSIVE STRENGTH The amount of energy released by an explosive upon detonation which is an indication of the capacity of the explosive to do work. (see also ENERGY)

EXTRA (AMMONIA) DYNAMITE A dynamite in which part of the nitroglycerin is replaced by ammonium nitrate in sufficient quantity to result in the same weight strength.

EXTRANEOUS ELECTRICITY Electrical energy, other than actual firing current or the test current from a blasting galvanometer, that is present at a blast site and that could enter an electric blasting circuit. It includes stray current, static electricity, RF (electromagnetic) waves, and time varying electric and magnetic fields.

FERTILIZER GRADE AMMONIUM NITRATE A grade of ammonium nitrate as defined by The Fertilizer Institute

FIRE EXTINGUISHER RATING A rating set forth in the National Fire Code which may be identified on an extinguisher by a number (5,20,70, etc.) indicating the extinguisher's relative effectiveness followed by a 1eKer (A,B, C, etc.) indicating the class or classes of fires for which the extinguisher has been found to be effective.

FIRE-RESISTANT Construction designed to provide reasonable protection against fire. (For exterior walls or magazines constructed of wood, this shall mean fire resistance equivalency provided by shect metal of not less than 26 gauge.)

FIRING CURRENT An electric current of recommended magnitude and duration to sufficiently energize an electric detonator or a circuit of electric detonators.

FIRING LINE The wire(s) connecting the electrical power source with the electric blasting circuit.

FLAGS-DANGER Flags, usually red, which may or may not be imprinted with a warning and used to caution personnel around explosives operations, or displayed on trucks transporting explosives. FLAMMABILITY The ease with which an explosive material may be ignited by flame and heat.

FLASHOVER The sympathetic detonation between explosive charges or between charged blastholes.

FLASH POINT The lowest temperature at which vapors from a volatile combustible substance ignite in air when exposed to flame, as determined in an apparatus specifically designed for such testing.

FLYROCK Rocks propelled from the blast area by the force of an explosion.

FRAGMENTATION The breaking of a solid mass into pieces by blasting.

FREE FACE A rock surface exposed to air or water which provides room for expansion upon fragmentation; sometimes called open face.

FUMES The gaseous products of an explosion. For the purpose of determining the fume classification of explosive materials, only poisonous or toxic gases are considered.

FUSE See SAFETY FUSE.

FUSE CAP A detonator which is initiated by a safety fuse; also referred to as an ordinary blasting cap. Synonymous with BLASTING CAP, also see DETONATOR.

FUSE CUTTER A mechanical device for cutting safety fuse clean and at right angles to its long axis.

GAP SENSITIVITY The maximum length of gap across which a detonation weave will travel and initiate a second or receptor cartridge. Both primer and receptor cartridge should be of the same composition, diameter, and weight. Usually refers to gap in air but other media may be used.

GELATIN DYNAMITE A type of highly water resistant dynamite characterized by its gelatinous or plastic consistency.

GEOLOGY A description of the types and arrangement of rock in an area; the description usually includes the dip and strike, the type and extent of preexisting breaks in the rock, and the hardness and massiveness of the rock, as these affect blast design.

GRAINS In the avoirdupois system of weight measurement 7000 grains are equivalent to one standard 16 ounce pound (0.45 kg.). A grain is 0.0648 grams in both the avoirdupois and the troy system.

GROUND FAULT An electrical path between parts of the blasting circuit and earth.

GROUND VIBRATION Shaking the ground by elastic waves emanating from a blast; usually measured in inches per second of particle velocity.

HANGFIRE The detonation of an explosive charge at some non-predictable time after its normally designed firing time.

HARDWOOD Red oak, white oak, hard maple, ash or hickory, free from loose knots, wind shakes, or similar defects.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS ADVISORY COUN-CIL (HMAC) An international organization representing shippers and carriers, container manufacturers and reconditioners, and emergency response companies for hazardous materials. HERTZ (Hz) Synonymous with "cycles per second."

HIGH EXPLOSIVES Explosives which are characterized by a very high rate of reaction, high pressure development, and the presence of a detonation wave in the explosive.

HIGHWALL A nearly vertical face at the edge of a bench, bluff, or ledge on a surface excavation.

HOLE DIAMETER The cross-sectional width of the borehole.

IGNITER CORD A small diameter pyrotechnic cord that bums at a uniform rate with an external flame and used to ignite a series of safety fuses.

IME See INSTITUTE OF MAKERS OF EXPLOSIVES.

IME-22 CONTAINER (COMPARTMENT) A container (portable), or a compartment (permanently affixed to a vehicle), which is constructed in accordance with IME SLP-22 specifications and is authorized by the Department of Transportation for the transport of certain types of detonators on the same vehicle with other explosives

IME FUME CLASSIFICATION A classification indicating the amount of carbon monoxide and hydrogen sulfide produced by an explosive or blasting agent. Explosives with positive oxygen balances are not considered as being acceptable in these classifications. See Appendix F

INCENDIVITY The property of an igniting agent (e.g. spark, flame or hot solid) which indicates it is of sufficient intensity to ignite flammable material or explosive gases.

INHABITED BUILDING A building regularly occupied in whole or part as a habitation for human beings, or any church, schoolhouse, railroad station, store, or other structure where people are accustomed to assemble, excerpt any building or structure occupied in connection with the manufacture, transportation, storage or use of explosive materials.

INITIATION The start of deflagration or detonation in an explosive material.

INITIATOR A detonator, detonating cord or similar device used to start detonation or deflagration in an explosive material.

INSTANTANEOUS DETONATOR A detonator that has a firing time of essentially zero seconds as compared to delay detonators with firing times of from several milliseconds to several seconds.

INSTITUTE OF MAKERS OF EXPLOSIVES A nonprofit, safety oriented trade association representing producers of commercial explosive materials in the U.S. and Canada and dedicated to satiety in the manufacture, transportation, (IME) storage, handling and use of explosive materials.

INSTITUTE OF MAKERS OF EXPLOSIVES NO.8 TEST DETONATOR IME No. ~ test detonator has 0.40 to 0.45 grams PETN base charge pressed to a specific gravity of 1.4g/cc and primcd with standard weights of primer, depending on manufacturer.

INVENTORY A listing of all explosive materials stored in a magazine.

ISSUING AUTHORITY The governmental agency,

office, or official vested with the authority to issue permits or licenses.

LEADING (LEAD) LINES OR WIRES The wires connecting the electrical power source with the circuit containing electric detonators. See FIRING LINE.

LEAKAGE RESISTANCE The resistance between the blasting circuit (including lead wires) and the ground.

LEG WIRES The two single wires or one duplex wire extending out from an electric detonator.

LOADING Placing explosive material in a blasthole or against the material to be blasted.

LOADING DENSITY The weight of explosive loaded per unit length of borehole occupied by the explosive, expressed as pounds/foot or kilograms/meter of borehole.

LOADING POLE A nonmetallic pole used to assist in the placing and compacting explosive charges in boreholes.

LOW EXPLOSIVES Explosive which are characterized by deflagration or low rate of reaction and the development of low pressure. See DEFLAGRATION.

MAGAZINE Any building, structure, or container, other than an explosives manufacturing building, approved for the storage of explosive materials.

MAGAZINE KEEPER A person responsible for the inventory and safe storage of explosive materials, including the proper maintenance of explosive materials, storage magazines and areas.

MAGAZINE, SURFACE A specially designed and constructed structure for the storage of explosive materials on the surface of the ground.

MAGAZINE UNDERGROUND A specially designed and constructed structure for the storage of explosive materials underground.

MAIN EXPLOSIVE CHARGE The explosive material that performs the major work of blasting.

MANUFACTURING CODES Code markings stamped on explosives materials packages, indicating among other information, the date of manufacture.

MASS EXPLODE (MASS EXPLOSION) An explosion which affects almost the entire load or quantity of explosives virtually instantaneously.

MAXIMUM RECOMMENDED FIRING CUR-RENT The highest electric current which will result in the safe and effective performance of an electric detonator.

MILLISECOND One thousandth part of a second (.001 or 1/1000 sec.)

MINE SAFETY AND HEALTH ADMINISTRA-TION (MSHA) An agency of the Department of Labor concerned with promulgation and enforcement of health and safety regulations in the mining field.

MISFIRE A blast or specific borehole that failed to detonate as planned. Also, the explosive materials that failed to detonate as planned.

MS CONNECTORS Nonelectric, short interval (millisecond) delay devices for use in delaying blasts which are initiated by detonating cord. Same as DETONAT-

#### ING CORD MS CONNECTORS.

MSHA APPROVAL A document issued by MSHA which states that an explosive or explosive unit has met MSHA requirements and which authorizes an approval marking identifying the explosive or explosive unit as approved as permissible.

MUCKPILE The pile of broken material resulting from a blast.

NATIONAL FIRE PROTECTION ASSOCIATION (NFPA) An independent, non-profit association organized to promote the science and improve the methods of fire protection and prevention, electrical safety and other related safety goals.

NATIONAL FIRE PROTECTION ASSOCIATION (NFPA) STANDARDS Standards for explosive materials and ammonium nitrate issued by the National Fire Protection Association.

NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL (NSC) A non-profit organization charged by Congress to provide a regular information service on the causes of accidents and ways to prevent them.

NATURAL BARRICADE Natural features of the ground such as hills, or timber of sufficient density that the surrounding exposures which require protection cannot be seen from the magazine when the trees are bare.

NITROGLYCERIN An explosive chemical compound used as a sensitizer in dynamite and represented by the formula(C3H5(0N02)3

NONELECTRIC DETONATOR A detonator that does not require the use of electric energy to function.

OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH ADMINISTRATION (OSHA) An agency of the Department of labor active in eliminating occupational hazards and promoting employee health and safety.

OFFICE OF SURFACE MINING (OSM) An agency of the Department of the Interior regulating surface coal mining and the surface effects of underground coal mining.

OVERBURDEN Material of any nature laying on top of a deposit of material which is to be mined.

PARALLEL BLASTING CIRCUIT An electric blasting circuit in which one leg wire of each detonator is connected to one of the wires from the source of firing current and the other wire from the firing current source. (Can also be used to refer to certain nonelectric systems.)

#### PARTICLE VELOCITY See Velocity

PARTING A rock mass located between two seams of coal; a joint or crack in rock.

PERMISSIBLE DIAMETER The smallest allowable diameter of particular permissible explosive, as approved by the Mine Safety and Health (SMALLEST) Administration (MSHA).

PERMISSIBLE (MSHA) APPROVED EXPLO-SIVES Explosives that are approved by the Mine Safety and Health Explosives Administration for use in gassy and dusty atmospheres. Permissible explosives must be used and stored in accordance with certain conditions specified by the Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA).

PLACARDS Signs placed on vehicles transporting

hazardous materials (including explosive materials) indicating the nature of the cargo.

PLOSOPHORIC MATERIALS [Binary Explosives], two or more unmixed, commercial manufactured, prepackaged chemical ingredients including oxidizers, flammable liquids or solids, or similar substances that are not independently classified as explosives but which when mixed or combined form a mixture that is classified as an explosive and that is intended for blasting. It may be classified by the Hazardous Materials Regulations of the U.S. Department of Transportation as an explosive depending on its susceptibility to detonation. (\*\*)

POWDER A common synonym for explosive materials.

POWDER FACTOR The amount of explosive used per unit of rock. Also called EXPLOSIVE LOADING FACTOR.

POWER SOURCE The source of power for energizing electric blasting circuits, e.g., a blasting machine or power line.

PREBLAST SURVEY A documentation of the existing condition of structures near an area where blasting is to be conducted.

PREMATURE FIRING The detonation of an explosive charge before the intended time.

PRESPLIMING (PRESHEARING) A smooth blasting method in which cracks for the final contour are created by firing a single row of holes prior to the initiation of the rest of the holes in the blast pattern.

PRILLED AMMONIUM NITRATE Ammonium nitrate in a pelleted or prilled form.

PRIMARY BLAST A blast used to fragment and displace material from its original position to facilitate subsequent handling and crushing.

PRIMARY EXPLOSIVE A sensitive explosive which nearly always detonates by simple ignition from such means as spark, flame, impact, friction, or other primary heat sources of appropriate magnitude.

PRIMER A unit, package or cartridge or explosives used to initiate other explosives or blasting agents, and which contains: (I) a detonator: or (2) detonating cord to which is attached a detonator designed to initiate the detonating cord.

PROPAGATION The detonation of an explosive charge by an impulse received from an adjacent or nearby explosive charge.

QUANTITY-DISTANCE TABLE A table listing minimum recommended distance from explosives materials stores of various weights to a specific location.

RADIO FREQUENCY ENERGY (RF) The energy radiated as electromagnetic waves in the radio frequency spectrum.

RADIO FREQUENCY TRANSMITTER An electronic transmitting device which radiates radio frequency waves. The transmitting device may be fixed (stationary) or mobile, and includes car telephones, citizens band radios, AM and FM radio transmitters, television transmitters and radar transmitters.

REGULATIONS FEDERAL, STATE, LOCAL Regulations promulgated by Federal, State or local regulatory agencies governing the manufacturer, trans-

portation, storage, sale, possession, handling and use of explosive materials.

RELIEF The effective distance from a blasthole to the nearest free face (synonymous with burden.)

RESISTANCE The measure of opposition to the flow of electrical current, expressed in ohms.

ROTATIONAL FIRING Delay blasting system used so that the detonating explosives will successively displace the burden into the void created by previously detonated explosives in holes which fired at an earlier delay period.

ROUND A group of boreholes fired or intended to be fired in a continuous sequence with the application of initiating energy.

SAFETY FUSE A flexible cord containing solid flammable materials by which fire or flame is conveyed at a continuous and uniform rate from the point of ignition to a cut end. A fuse detonator is usually attached to that end, although safety fuse may be used without a detonator to ignite material such as deflagrating explosives.

SAFETY STANDARD Suggested precautions relative to the safety practices to be employed in the manufacture, transportation, storage, handling and use of explosive materials.

SCALED DISTANCE A factor relating similar blast effects from various weight charges of explosive material at various distances. Scaled distances referring to blasting effects is obtained by dividing the distance of concern by a fractional power of the weight of the explosive materials.

SEAM A stratum or bed of coal or other material. May also refer to a crack or joint in a blast area which may be filled with mud or other material. A seam may be in any orientation.

SECONDARY BLASTING Blasting to reduce the size of boulders resulting from a primary blast.

SEISMOGRAPH An instrument, useful in monitoring blasting operations, which records ground vibration. Particle velocity, displacement, or acceleration is generally measured and recorded in three mutually perpendicular directions.

SENSITIVENESS A measure of an explosive's cartridge-to-cartridge propagating ability under certain test conditions. It is expressed as the distance through air at which a primed half cartridge (donor) will detonate an unprimed half cartridge (receptor). Also see GAP SENSITIVITY.

SENSITIVITY A physical characteristic of an explosive material classifying its ability to be initiated upon receiving an external impulse such as impact, shock, flame, friction or other influence which can cause explosive decomposition.

Can-Sensitive Explosive Material. Any explosive material that can be detonated by means of a No. 8 blasting cap or its equivalent. Cao-sensitive material SHALL be classified as an explosive.

Non Cap-Sensitive Explosive Material. Any explosive material that can NOT be detonated by means of a No. 8 blasting cap or its equivalent. Non cap-sensitive material SHALL NOT be classified as an explosive. (\*\*)

SEPARATION DISTANCES Minimum recommended distances from explosive materials accumulations to other specified locations.

SEQUENTIAL BLASTING MACHINE A blasting machine designed to actuate separate series of detonators at accurately timed intervals. Also called SEQUENTIAL TIMER

SEQUENTIAL TIMER See SEQUENTIAL BLASTING MACHINE

SERIES BLASTING CIRCUIT An electric blasting circuit that provides one continuous path for the current through all caps in the circuit.

SERIES-IN-PARALLEL BLASTING CIRCUIT A circuit in which electric detonators are divided into two or more balanced groups being connected together in series and the groups being connected together in parallel.

SHOCK TUBE A small diameter plastic tube used for initiating detonators. It contains only a limited amount of reactive material so that the energy that is transmitted through the tube by means of a detonation wave is guided through and confined within the walls of the tube.

SHOCK WAVE A transient pressure pulse that propagates at supersonic velocity.

SHORT DELAY BLASTING The practice of detonating blastholes in successive intervals where the time difference between any two successive detonations is measured in milliseconds.

SHOT ANCHOR A device that anchors explosive material charges in the borehole so that the charges will not be blown out by the detonation of other charges or, in seismic work, cannot be pulled out of the borehole by the leg wires.

SHOT BREAK A space consisting of an undrilled or drilled area which may include loaded or unloaded blast holes to separate two individual blasts located on the same bench.

SHOT FIRER See BLASTER. (shot firer usually refers to an underground coal mine blaster).

SHUNT (SHUNTING) The shorting together of the free ends of (I) electric detonator leg wires, or (2) the wire ends of an electric blasting circuit or part thereof The term also applies to an electrical shorting device applied to the free ends of electric detonators by the manufacturer.

SIGNS — EXPLOSIVE (PLACARDS) Signs, called placards, placed on vehicles transporting explosives denoting the character of the cargo, or signs placed near storage areas as a warning to unauthorized personnel.

SLURRY see Water Gel or Slurry

SPACING The distance between boreholes. In bench blasting, the distance is measured parallel to the free face and perpendicular to the burden.

SPECIFIC GRAVITY The ratio of the weight of any volume of substance to the weight of an equal volume of pure water.

STABILITY The ability of an explosive material to retain chemical and physical properties specified by the manufacturer when exposed to specific environmental conditions over a particular period of time.

STATIC ELECTRICITY Electric charge at rest on a person or object. It is most often produced by the contact and separation of dissimilar insulating materials.

STEMMING Inert material placed in a borehole on top of or between separate charges of explosive material. Used for the purpose of confining explosive materials or to separate charges of explosive material in the same borehole.

STORAGE The safekeeping of explosive materials usually in specially designed structures called magazines.

STRAY CURRENT A flow of electricity outside an insulated conductor system.

SUBDRILLING The practice of drilling boreholes below floor level or working elevation to insure breakage of rock to working elevation.

SYMPATHETIC DETONATION The detonation of an explosive material as the result of receiving an impulse from another detonation through air, earth or water. Synonymous with SYMPATHETIC PROPAGA-TION. (See also FLASHOVER.)

TABLE OF RECOMMENDED SEPARATION DISTANCES OF AMMONIUM NITRATE AND BLASTING AGENTS FROM EXPLOSIVES OR BLASTING AGENTS A quantity distance table designed to prevent explosion of ammonium nitrate and ammonium nitrate-based blasting agents by propagation from nearby stores of high explosives or blasting agents. It is based on a "donor-receptor" relationship developed by the U.S. Bureau of Mines.

TAMPING The action of compacting the explosive charge or the stemming in a blasthole. Sometimes refers to the stemming material itself.

TAMPING POLE A wooden or plastic pole used to compact explosive charges or stemming. (See also LOADING POLE.)

TEMPORARY STORAGE Storage of explosives for less than 24 hours.

TEST BLASTING CAP NO. 8 See INSTITUTE OF MAKERS OF EXPLOSIVES NO. 8 TEST DETONATOR

TOE In bench blasting, excessive burden measured at the floor level of the bench.

UNBARRICADED The absence of a natural or artificial barricade around explosive storage areas of facilities.

UNCONFINED DETONATION VELOCITY The detonation velocity of an explosive material fired without confinement; for example, a charge fired in the open. (Paper tubes are generally not considered as confinement.)

UNDERWRITERS LABORATORY INC. (UL) A nationally recognized incorporated testing laboratory qualified and equipped to conduct the necessary tests to determine compliance with appropriate standards and the satisfactory performance of materials or equipment in actual usage.

U.S. BUREAU OF MINES (USBM) A former bureau of the Department of Interior active in promoting safety in coal mines and in carrying out board programs in mining and related fields.

VOLT The unit of electromotive force. It is the difference in potential required to make a current of one ampere flow through a resistance of one ohm. VELOCITY The measurement of speed. (\*\*)

VELOCITY, PARTICLE The velocity at which the earth vibrates, measured in inches/sec, or cm/sec. (\*\*)

VELOCITY, PEAK PARTICLE The highest recorded particle velocity. (\*\*)

VELOCITY, SEISMIC The velocity at which a vibration or seismic wave travels in the earth outward from the source. It is measured in thousands of feet per second. (\*\*)

VOLUME STRENGTH Synonymous with CARTRIDGE STRENGTH. See BULK STRENGTH.

WARNING SIGNAL A visual or audible signal which is used for warning personnel in the vicinity of the blast area of the impending explosion.

WATER GEL or SLURRY A wide variety of materials used for blasting manufactured with varying degrees of sensitivity to initiation and may be classified as explosives or non explosive blasting agents. Water gels may be premixed at an explosive manufacturing building or mixed at the site immediately before delivery into the borehole. (\*\*)

WATER RESISTANCE The ability of an explosive to withstand the desensitizing effect of water penetration.

WATT A unit of electrical power equal to one joule per second.

WEIGHT STRENGTH The energy of an explosive material per unit of weight. Often expressed as a percentage of the energy per unit of weight of a specified explosive standard.

(\*\*) Commonwealth of MA Board of Fire Prevention Regulations, 527 CMR 13.03

### Section 32.03 GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These requirements apply equally to Section 32A Construction Blasting and Section 32B Quarry Blasting.

(A) Use And Handling Permit (Permit To Blast) Provisions

- (1) Use and Handling Permit shall be issued by the Head of the Boston Fire Department for all blasting conducted within Boston City limits
- (2) Prior to a Use and Handling Permit being issued, the Blaster shall provide the following:
- (3) A Valid Explosive Users Certificate (Own and Possess Certificate) issued by the State Fire Marshal.
- (4) A certificate of insurance providing General Liability insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000/\$1,000,000. (Note: A Use and Handling Permit shall be issued only for the explicit time period covered by the effective dates of the GL policy.)

(5) A Blasting Bond with the City of Boston or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts named as the certificate holder. (Note: A Use and Handling Permit shall be issued only for the period of time covered by the effective dates of the Bond.)

(6) A Certificate of Competency (Blaster's License) for each person(s) who could be responsible for blasting operations including shot design, charge loading, wiring, and detonation.

(7) Written proof, in a form approved by the Head of the Fire Department that Dig Safe has been notified of the proposed blasting operations and a dig safe number was issued in accordance with M.G.L. c. 82 §40.

(8) Proof that the required Preblast Inspection Surveys have been completed.

(9) The route that the explosives are going to be transported to the site must be pre-approved by the Special Hazards Section of the Fire Prevention Division. The time of arrival at the site and the time leaving the site should be included.

## 32.04 PREBLAST INFORMATION REQUIRE-**MENTS**

- (A) A blast analysis and a blast design plan as specified in 527 CMR 13.09 (1), (k) & (1), shall be provided and explained to the Head of the Fire Department.
- (B) The blast analysis shall consider adjacent area structure(s), building(s), building foundations, utilities, including gas and water supply lines, septic systems and swimming pools, and area geology within the distances defined in Table 1 in 32.08. The blast analysis shall identify commercial equipment such as computers, electron microscopes, laser equipment, relays etc., which are sensitive to vibrations, and other underground objects that might be damaged by the effects of a blast.
- (C) In preparing the blast design plan and blast analysis, the following shot variables, as a minimum, shall be considered to minimize the adverse effects of ground vibrations and flyrock:
  - Maximum charge weight detonating at one time (i.e. within 8 milliseconds).
  - True Distance (distance the waves must travel).
  - Geological conditions.
  - Degree of confinement.
  - · Physical properties of the rock.
  - Coupling.
  - Spatial distribution.
  - Detonator timing scatter.
  - Time duration of energy release. Type of explosive or blasting agent.
- (D) The following shot variables, as a minimum, shall be considered to minimize the adverse effects of air blast:
  - · Maximum charge weight detonating at one time (i.e. within 8 milliseconds).

  - · Exposed detonating material on the ground surface.
  - · Atmospheric conditions.
  - Temperature and temperature gradients.
  - Wind velocity, direction, and gradients.
  - Atmosphere and time of day.

Depth of burial of the charges

- Topography.
- Volume of displaced rock.
- Delay interval and orientation.
- Type of explosive.
- (E) The Blaster shall familiarize the Fire Department with the site and proposed Blasting Operations. The blaster shall provide a vicinity map drawn to scale to illustrate the blasting zone(s) and all structures and other infrastructure The vicinity map should include all structures to a radial distance determined from Table 1 in 32.08. A visit to the site to familiarize the Fire Department's designated personnel with conditions may be required per order of the Head of the Fire Department.
  - Exception: For quarries complying with all of the requirements of 32B of this ordinance, the radial distance of the vicinity map shall be the distance of the Blast Analysis as determined in 32B.03.
- (F) A preblast conference may required by the Head of the Fire Department, at which the Head of the Fire Department shall review its concerns and

comments with the blaster. Any conditions resulting from this conference shall be made in writing and shall become part of the Permit by reference.

(G) The Head of the Fire Department, in a written statement, shall, if it deems it necessary and in the public interest, require an independent blasting consultant, specialist, engineer or geologist, at the cost of the applicant, acceptable to the Head of the Fire Department be retained as a consultant. Said consultant, specialist, engineer or geologist shall produce a preblast analysis and assist the blaster in the preparation of a blast design plan as defined in 527 CMR 13.09 (1), (k) & (1), and by this ordinance. The analysis will include an assessment of the impacts of blasting on the stability of existing steep soil or rock slopes in the vicinity, sufficient to meet approval of the Head of the Fire Department.

#### 32.05 STORAGE OF EXPLOSIVE MATERIALS

- (A) On site storage of explosive materials shall be in approved day boxes or in DOT approved truck mounted magazines as detailed in 527 CMR 13.05 Storage.
- (B) Adequate security must be provided to prevent unauthorized access to the explosive material while it is onsite.
- (C) A system must be in place to warn responding emergency personnel about location of explosives. The system utilized should be documented and submitted at time of permit application.
- (D) An effort shall be made to locate the day box, or truck mounted magazine, at safe distances from homes and roads.
- (E) Overnight storage of explosives on site shall not be allowed unless written permit is obtained from the Fire Chief or his designee. If a storage permit is granted then location of the magazine shall comply with Table 1 of 527 CMR 13.05. In addition, a fire watch as determined by the Head of the Fire Department of not more than two (2) uniformed firefighters shall be posted on site, at the blaster's expense with sufficient fire fighting equipment to extinguish or control any fire exposure to the stored explosives.

### 32.06 TRANSPORTATION OF EXPLOSIVES

- (A) All vehicles transporting Explosives in or through the City of Boston shall be under the jurisdiction of the Fire Department. All vehicles transporting Explosives in or through the City of Boston shall also be under the jurisdiction of any other authority given legal jurisdiction by applicable state or federal regulation or law.
- (B) The route that the explosives are going to be transported to the site must be pre-approved by the Special Hazards Section of the Fire Prevention Division. The time of arrival at the site and the time leaving the site should be included.
- (C) All traffic violations involving vehicles transporting explosives shall be reported to the Head of the Fire Department for investigation.
- (D) The Fire Chief, or his designee, or the State Fire Marshal, or his designee, shall investigate all traffic accidents involving vehicles that are transporting explosives.
- (E) None of the vehicles involved in the accident, or the explosives, shall be moved without the approval of the Fire Chief, or his designee, or the State Fire Marshal, or his designee.

#### 32.07 RECORD KEEPING

(A) All blasting operations must be fully documented, as required in 527 CMR 13.09 (8) Blasting Log and herein. The following are minimum standards for what are regarded as the essentials of adequate blasting logs and vibration records. These logs and vibration records must be provided to the Head of the Fire Department the same day as the blast. Records of each event must be kept, by the licensed blaster, for a minimum of three years. Quarries, and other locations where long-term blasting occurs, should also keep records on-site. Records of each event shall:

• Include the name and blaster's license, of the

operator conducting the blast.

 Include the location, date and time of the blast and reference to the blasting permit granted for the blast.

 Identify the nearest dwelling, public building, school, church, institutional building or underground structure outside the permit area and establish the direction and distance from the nearest blasthole to the nearest structure. All distances shall be made accurately by direct measurement in the field or by measurement from a scale drawing of the blast vicinity.

 Include weather conditions, including those which may cause possible adverse blasting

effects.

· Record the type of material blasted.

Incorporate sketches of the blast pattern, including number of holes, burden, spacing, decks, and

delay pattern.

- Specify the diameter and depth of the holes, and type and length of stemming at the top of borehole and between explosive decks in multi-deck shots.
- Record the type of explosive used, the total weight of explosive used, the weight per hole and the maximum weight of explosives detonated in any one-delay period.

Specify the initiation system and the nominal fir-

ing time of each distinct detonation.

 Provide detailed descriptions of mats or other protection used.

- Document the type of seismographic instruments, their sensitivity (or range setting) and their calibration signals and certificates of annual calibration.
- Document the exact location of seismographic instrument, date, time and accurate distance from the blast.

• Show that name and firm (can be the operator)

analyzing the seismographic record.

(B) Vibration levels and airblast recorded. The levels that were actually recorded should be compared to the predicted levels in the blast plan and blast analysis. If the actual observations are consistently higher than those predicted, then modifications should be made to the scaled distance relationship being used and the new scaled distance predictive relationship, including all data and statistical analyses, should be forwarded to the Head of the Fire Department.

# 32.08 PREBLAST INSPECTION SURVEYS

(A) Preblast inspection surveys shall be conducted as outlined in 527 CMR 13.09 (10) Preblast Inspection Surveys, and by this ordinance.

(B) For blasting operation for which no historical data exists to assist in predicting probable vibration levels, the Head of the Fire Department may, order preblast inspection surveys to be conducted to distances that differ from the 250 feet distance required by 527 CMR 13.09. The required distance for preblast inspection surveys is dependent on the size of the blast, as measured in terms of the maximum pounds of explosives detonated per delay. Table 1 provides distances to which preblast inspection surveys shall be required. Exception: Quarries complying with all of the requirements of 32B of this ordinance shall not be required to conduct preblast surveys unless required by 527CMR.

(C) A map drawn to scale shall be submitted to identify all structures for which preblast surveys were made. This site map shall include all structures located at distances determined from Table 1.

Note: The distances in Table 1 are derived from 527 CMR Section 13.09 Table 2. The distances in Table 1, The Preblast Survey Table, are increased by approximately 50% over the distances in 527 CMR Section 13.09 Table 2. This increase is needed to take into account that particle velocities may be much higher than anticipated using the scaled distances assumed in 527 CMR Section 13.09 Table 2. Under some geological conditions particle velocities may be higher by a factor of two or more. Under conditions of high confinement, such as the opening holes in a heading or pre-splitting they may be higher by a factor of five or more. These numbers can also be derived approximately by utilizing the statistics published in RI-8507 and developing a model for the 95th percentile.

#### 32.09 BLASTING OPERATIONS

(A) No loaded drillholes shall be left unattended. Loaded drillholes that are present after normal working hours shall not be detonated unless and until approval is received from the Head of the Fire Department or his designee, or the Fire Marshal or his designee.

(B) The Fire Department shall be notified by the blaster in charge each day that blasting is done at least two hours before any blasting on site. It is required that the blaster shall also call the Fire Alarm Office immediately before each blast.

(C) Blasting mats shall be used for all blasts except were the Head of the Fire Department deems it

impractical

Exception: Quarries complying with all of the requirements of 32B of this ordinance shall not be required to use blasting mats unless required

by 527CMR.

(D) The blast site shall be tested for extrancous, static and electromagnetic currents, especially when electric blasting caps are used near overhead power transmission lines, and within the recommended Tables of Distance from radio transmitters as listed and graphed in Institute of Makers of Explosives, Safety Library Publication No. 20, Safety Guide for the Prevention of Radio Frequency Radiation

Hazards in the use of Commercial Electric Blasting Detonators (Blasting Caps)", December 1988.

#### 32.10 SEISMOGRAPH MONITORING OF BLASTS

- (A) All seismographs shall be placed and utilized in accordance with 527 CMR Section 13 and the Seismograph Field Practice Guidelines as listed in Appendix K of ISEE Blasters Handbook 17th Edition.
- (B) In all cases, the operator should describe the field conditions and set-up procedures in the permanent record of each blast.
- (C) One seismograph shall be placed at the location of the closest residence or above ground structure, not controlled by the project, to the blast. A second seismograph shall be placed at the location that is at the closest house or structure, not controlled by the project, approximately 180° away from the first seismograph, or at another location mutually agreed upon by the Blaster and the Head of the Fire Department. Where it is deemed necessary by the Head of the Fire Department, a third seismograph shall be located at a residence or other structure mutually agreed upon by the Blaster and the Head of the Fire Department.

#### 32.11 VIBRATION AND AIRBLAST

Blasts that exceed the maximum allowable limit for peak particle velocity vs. frequency, or decibel levels as established by this ordinance or are known to the blaster to have produced flyrock shall immediately be reported to the Head of the Fire Department. In case of exceedance of vibration or airblast limits, the blaster shall, prior to the next blast, forward to the Head of the Fire Department a written statement, signed by the responsible Blaster, as to why the exceedance occurred and what steps will be taken to prevent further exceedance. In the case of flyrock, the Blasting Permit must be re-applied for and will not be issued without an independent analysis of the blast, which shall include an explanation of the reasons why the flyrock occurred and recommended steps to be taken to prevent further flyrock incidents.

# 32A CONSTRUCTION BLASTING

# 32A.01 VIBRATION AND AIRBLAST

- (A) The blaster shall be required to record the effects of all blasts on a seismograph of the type specified in 527 CMR 13.09 (9) (C) 1 and 2.
- (B) Blasting logs containing the information listed in 527 CMR 13.09 (8) Blasting Log shall be kept for each blast.
- (C) The ground vibration limits shall be the limits shown in 527 CMR 13.09 (9) Allowable Limits of Effects of Blasting Option 2, Figure (b), Particle Velocity v. Frequency, USBM Recommendation (R18507, 1980).
- (D) The air blast limit shall be 133 dB peak.

# 32B QUARRY BLASTING

# 32B.01 SIGNAGE, NOTIFICATION, AND ACCESS

- (A) Blasting Signs, Warnings and Access Control. The operator shall:
  - (1) Conspicuously place a series of durable signs reading "WARNING! BLASTING AREA-DANGER" along the edge of any blasting area that comes within 100 feet of any public right of way and at the point where any other road provides access to the blasting area.
  - (2) At all entrances to the permit area from pub-

lic roads or highways, place conspicuous signs that state "WARNING! EXPLOSIVES IN USE" which clearly list and describe the meaning of the audible blast warning and the all-clear signals that are in place, and which the marking of blasting areas and charge holes waiting for firing within the permit area.


- (3) Warning and all clear signals of different character or pattern shall be sounded prior to and following each blast. Warning sirens or horns shall be deployed at the perimeter of the quarry and directed toward abutting inhabited structures. These devices shall produce a sound level in the range of 115 to 125 dB at the source. Prior to the start of each blasting season, all residences and businesses, identified in the blast analysis, shall be notified by means of legal notice in local newspapers or other equivalent means of public notice. Notification shall report the approximate date that blasting will commence for the upcoming season, the expected number of blasts per day and per week during the season, and clear explanations of the meaning of all warning and all clear signals.
- (4) Access within the blasting area shall be controlled to prevent the presence of unauthorized persons during blasting. No person shall enter the blasting area until an authorized representative has reasonably determined that no unusual hazards, such as imminent slides or undetonated charges exist, and access to and travel within the blasting area can be safely resumed.

# 32B.02 SAFE VIBRATION LIMITS

(A) The ground vibration limits shall be the limits shown in 527 CMR 13.09 (9) Allowable Limits of Effects of Blasting Option 2, Figure (b), Particle Velocity v. Frequency, USBM Recommendation (R18507, 1980), except that the maximum peak particle velocity for all frequencies greater than 20 Hz shall be 1.0 in./sec.

Allowable vibration limits for quarry blasting are shown on FIGURE 1 and are listed in TABLE 2.

- (B) Where sufficient blast data is available to prepare square root scaled distance plots, compliance with vibration limits shall be achieved by submittal of blast designs that predict 90% of the permitted vibration level with a 95% degree of confidence. For the case that 95% of the vibrations have frequencies greater than or equal to 20 Hz, the target vibration for blast design shall be 0.90 x 1.0 in see, or 0.90 inisec. For the case that 95% of the vibrations are greater than or equal to 10 Hz, the target vibration with a 95% degree of confidence shall be 0.90 x 0.75 in see, or approximately 0.70 in sec. For the case that 5% or more of the vibrations are less than 10 Hz, the target vibration for blast design shall be 0.90 x 0.5 in/sec, or 0.45 in/sec.
- (C) Existing quarries shall analyze vibration data acquired during the previous blasting year for the purpose of designing blasts to comply with these vibration limits.
- (D) New quarries, or quarries for which historical data is lacking, shall conduct a series of test blasts to establish vibration and noise propagation trends sufficient to predict vibrations at the 95% confidence level for proposed production blasts. Details of the test blasting procedures shall be submitted to the Head of the Fire Department for review and approval.

#### 32B.03 BLAST ANALYSIS

The area for the blast analysis for quarries will include the area completely included within the line at which peak particle velocity exceeded 0.25 ips, during the previous 3 years. These distances shall be determined in the blast analysis using published or site-specific predictive equations. For the case that peak vibration and airblast observations significantly differ from predictions of published models, the blast analysis shall be performed using site-specific data and predictive models. Development and planned usage of site-specific predictive models for ground vibration and airblast propagation shall be documented in reports submitted to the Head of the Fire Department.

#### 32B.04 SEISMOGRAPH MONITORING

One seismograph shall be placed at the location of the closest inhabited building or structure, not controlled by the quarry, to the blast. A second seismograph shall be placed at the closest residence behind the open face of the blast. The third seismograph shall be placed at a location mutually agreed upon by the quarry and the Head of the Fire Department.

#### 32B.05 INDEPENDENT CONSULTATION

Quarries shall retain the scrvices of a consultant who shall, on an annual basis, review the seismographic reports from the proceeding year and make recommendations designed to minimize the impact from vibrations on the surrounding neighborhood, for the upcoming

year based on the location in which the quarry intends to blast. Prior to each blasting season, representatives from the quarry together with representatives from the licensed blaster hired by the quarry and the consultant shall meet with the Head of the Fire Department or his designee to review the quarry's plans for blasting for the upcoming season.

The consultant's annual reports should include analyses of all items that mitigate the effects of noise and vibration (N/V) transmitted into the neighborhoods surrounding the quarry. These reports need to be comprehensive and cumulative so that any new blasting contractor will have readily accessible the entire year-by-year history (i.e. past 5 years) of implementations of blast designs and the success or failure of such designs to maintain N/V amplitudes at levels acceptable to the Head of the Fire Department.

At a minimum the shot variables to be considered are:

- Maximum charge weight detonating at one time.
  True distance (distance the waves must travel).
- Geological conditions.
- · Confinement.
- Physical properties of the rock.
- Coupling.
- Spacial distribution.
- Detonator timing scatter.
- Time of energy release.
- Type of explosive.

# 32C SEVERABILITY

#### 32C.01 Partial Validity

In the event any part or provision of this article is held to be illegal or void, this shall not have the effect of making void or illegal any of the other parts or provisions thereof, which are determined to be legal; and it shall be presumed that this article would have been passed without such illegal or invalid parts or provisions.

# 32C.02 Segregation of Invalid Provisions

Any invalid part of this article shall be segregated from the remainder of this article by the court holding such part invalid, and the remainder shall remain in effect.

Whereas, The tenth graders last year failed the math MCAS portion by 59% and the English MCAS portion

by 49%; and

Whereas, There is concern that the dropout rate has increased by 34% since 1996, partially as a response to the 2003 requirement; and

Whereas, Superintendent Payzant acknowledges that 10% - 15% of the teachers in the system are not certified and that 50% of the teachers of math in high schools have math as a secondary certification; and

Whereas, Superintendent Payzant in a November 1, 2000 letter on Standards-Based Instruction and Assessment to all administrative and academic personnel acknowledged that the BPS has not fully implemented the standards when he said "I recognize that we are only beginning to implement the standards in some subjects and grades (e.g. elementary social studies); and

Whereas, Superintendent Payzant has said at various discussions of MCAS that the Boston Public School system is still in the process of aligning the state standards with BPS curriculum; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Boston City Council ask the State Board of Education to postpone the use of the MCAS test as a criterion for graduation until school systems throughout the state:

1) Demonstrate that their curriculum standards are aligned with the state standards;

2) Demonstrate that they have a sufficient number of certified teachers to teach the courses; and

3) Demonstrate that at least 95% of their students have passed each subject area.
