FRIDAY THROUGH SUNDAY, MAY 16-18

All are invited, but graduates of all Class years ending in 5 and 0 are especially encouraged to return to campus for Senior/Alumni Weekend. Highlighting the program will be the **Alumni Luncheon** Saturday at noon, at which President William W. Hassler will accept the annual Citation.

At Indiana's Centennial **Commencement** Sunday afternoon at 1:30 Colonel Samuel Loboda '36, commanding officer of the U. S. Army Band, will be granted an honorary doctorate.

Saturday evening at 7:30 the highly regarded Pittsburgh Savoyards will perform the Gilbert and Sullivan operetta "The Pirates of Penzance." This event is sponsored by Indiana's Monday Music Club, with proceeds to benefit scholarships for University music students.

Following the performance, all returning alumni and friends are invited to a **Graduation Ball** at the Blue Room of John Sutton Hall, where The Mellowmen campus dance band will play. Classes of '25 and '29 are planning special dinners earlier in the evening.

Alumni Day will begin Saturday morning with **registration** at Sprowls Hall at 9 and with the **annual meeting of the Alumni Association** at McVitty Auditorium at 9:30, at which newly elected officers will lead a panel discussion concerning projected plans for the role of graduates in Indiana's second century.

Some special ways of marking this Centennial Alumni Weekend are planned for Saturday afternoon. At the Luncheon, both a **birthday cake and time capsule** will be unveiled, and the **planting of a Centennial oak** in the Grove will precede respective Reunion class meetings across the campus.

KEY POINTS SPOTLIGHTED CONCERNING BUDGET PICTURE

Through the winter and spring months a great deal of attention has been devoted to the financial standing of Indiana and the 13 state colleges not only on the respective campuses but in Harrisburg and through the media as well. Certain key points regarding this should be spotlighted —

— As of press date for this *Report*, many academic departments and administrative offices at Indiana were facing the very real situation of having exhausted all funds within their operating budgets. This came not through mismanagement but simply because funds allocated were not at all adequate.

— The underfunding of the respective state campuses by the Governor and legislature is not myth but fact. Inflation, soaring personnel costs and other factors cause college administrations to have fewer than half the dollars for program management at their discretion than three years ago.

— State government has mandated a commitment to offering career preparation to qualified students through the state colleges and Indiana. Because of the effects that underfunding is now having on academic programs, many are skeptical that this commitment may be described as one to quality preparation.

Graduates and friends of Indiana, who have in the past gained the benefits of better times than now prevail, are asked to write or call the Governor, their legislators and other appropriate officials in Harrisburg to advocate their support of proper priority and funding for public higher education.

PRESIDENT HASSLER CONVEYS MESSAGE TO ALUMNI CONCERNING RECENT DECISION TO RESIGN

It was with considerable regret that I recently submitted to the Board of Trustees my resignation as President of Indiana University of Pennsylvania, effective this summer. This major decision was made only after carefully weighing a number of factors, including the extreme difficulty of fulfilling my Presidential obligation to maintain and enhance the excellent academic program we have always desired for our students. This problem has been aggravated by the lowered priority of higher public education in the allocation of state funds, coupled with the increasing contractual obligations of collective bargaining. In addition, collective bargaining has drastically changed the campus climate in such a way that the warm collegial atmosphere has declined significantly.



I was initially attracted into education because of a sense of mission to promote the welfare and future of our students, but unfortunately I find this increasingly difficult to do. Consequently, after considering a number of attractive opportunities, I have accepted the appointment as President of Wesley College, a small church-related institution in Dover, Delaware, which has an excellent academic reputation. In this setting I hope to be able to better achieve my professional goals of service.

I have very mixed feelings about this change, as my roots in Indiana are deep indeed. I certainly shall miss my pleasant and stimulating contacts with the alumni, as one of the most rewarding aspects of my more than six years in the Presidency has been the cordial relationship with you. I trust that we shall be able to maintain this as much as possible, as I shall continue to be interested in your activities and progress. Mrs. Hassler joins me in extending our warmest wishes to you for the future, and meantime we look forward to seeing you on Alumni Weekend.

AUDITORIUM IN COGSWELL HALL DEDICATED TO ORENDORFF

The auditorium situated in Cogswell Hall, the campus music building, was this past winter named for the late Dr. Harold S. Orendorff, chairman of the music department and Dean of the School of Fine Arts at IUP since 1958. Dr. Orendorff had passed away last spring.

Through his leadership, a liberal arts program in music was first offered and a graduate program developed. He became the first Dean of Fine Arts in 1966, serving until 1972, when he returned to fulltime teaching.

The total building in its name continues to honor the late Dr. and Mrs. Hamlin E. Cogswell. Dr. Cogswell was Indiana's first music chairman (1906-16).

GRADUATES ENCOURAGED TO NOMINATE FOR CITATIONS

As determined by the University Alumni Council last fall, future, significant awards recognition granted individuals in behalf of the Alumni Association will center on two parallel Citations, one for Achievement and another for Service.

The two Citations will be awarded annually, beginning in 1976, at the traditional Alumni Luncheon in May, as has the single Citation of the past more than 20 years. Decisions concerning individuals to be granted the awards will be made by the Alumni Council at its Homecoming meetings.

Alumni and friends of Indiana are encouraged to nominate individuals worthy of such recognition to the Association Awards Committee, who will in turn recommend to the Council. Appropriate nomination forms may be requested through the survey to the right.

The Citation for Achievement is to be granted to an alumnus(a) in recognition of sustained achievement in his or her selected profession. This Citation may also be broadly defined to include outstanding voluntary service to community, state, nation or society that is of significance.

That for Service is to be granted in recognition of outstanding contributions directly to the life of the University and/or its program of alumni affairs. Such individual need not be an alumnus.

In framing guidelines for the two new awards, the Alumni Council emphasized that the intent is to reaffirm and expand on the foundation and tradition of decisions attending the present, single Citation for Distinguished Service granted since 1954.

BOARD, COUNCIL TO MEET

Association leadership organizations, the Executive Board and Alumni Council, will meet for Friday evening dinner at 6 and dessert at 9 respectively Senior/Alumni Weekend. Delegates of all alumni chapters and graduating classes are encouraged to become active with the latter.

Graduates requesting transcript services of the University are reminded that such requests must be written and accompanied by \$1 per transcript. They should also anticipate a time of three to four weeks from date of mailing request to receipt of transcript. Such time factor is inevitable.

ALUMNI-VARSITY FOOTBALL GAME SET, WINTER SPORTS PACE BANNER YEAR

Next fall's varsity will host returning alumni football stars in their annual spring contest Saturday, May 3. In September, the varsity will open at home against Northwood of Michigan September 13, with dates to follow at Cortland of New York and at Shippensburg.

This past winter, the Big Indians reached NAIA District 18 *basketball* playoffs for seventh time in eight years. After a first round win over Point Park, the charges of coach Carl Davis dropped a closely contested final at Edinboro while relying to great extent on budding freshmen and sophomores.

Pacing Indiana to a total 17-6 mark, sophomore Rich Lynch really came into his own in both scoring and rebounding, his best performances coming in key games. Only two senior starters will graduate - Marty Mattocks of Mercer and Jeff Lawrence of Pittsburgh.

Coach Bill Blacksmith and his charges in *wrestling* posted a highly respectable 11-5-1 mark. Junior Larry McCoy, an Indiana hometown boy, became IUP's first NAIA national champion, competing in the 167 pound class. His tournament performance, a surprise to many, was truly outstanding.

And coach Ralph Johnson led his *swimming* team to that sport's best card over the past several years, finishing at 8-3 and winning the highly regarded Penn-Ohio meet. A welcome addition to the squad this year was Emilio Abreu, who comes to Indiana all the way from Paraguay, South America.

Tom Campisano '67 coached IUP's *rifle* team to a divisional championship, losing only to West Virginia U. in 15-1 meet competition. And, the University sponsored an *indoor soccer* tournament billed as the largest in the East.
