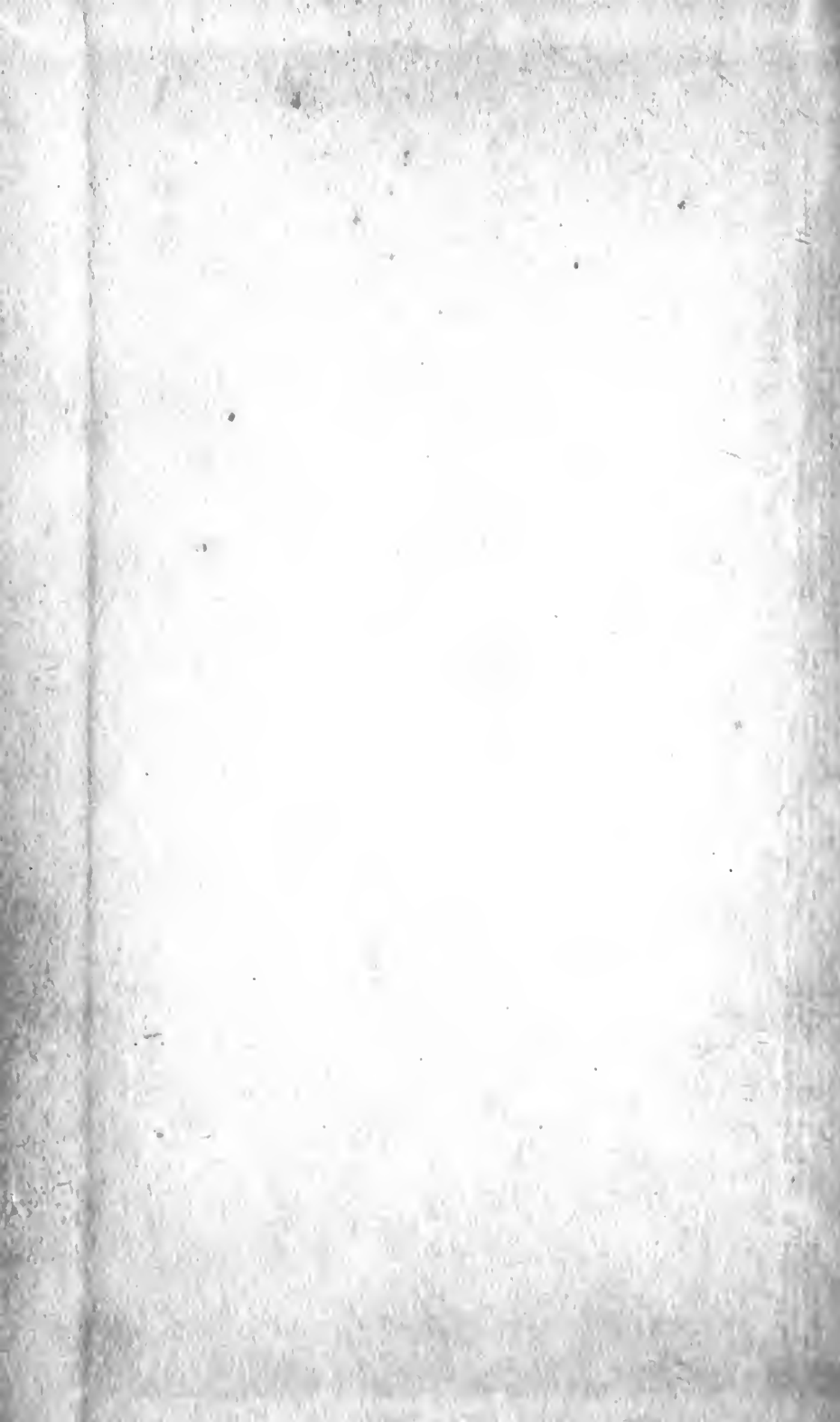

## DIRECTIONS

# FOR USING THIS CIPHER CODE.

---

In order to prevent mistakes by telegraph operators, it is best, in writing messages, to begin every cipher word with a capital letter, and to leave a little space between each cipher.

When it is necessary to telegraph in ordinary language, and there is fear of its being misunderstood, begin that part of the message which it is desired should be read literally, with the cipher word "Rigor," which will be found on page 170.

Words to fill blanks in sentences must be placed in the order in which they should be read, immediately *after* the ciphers for such sentences, except where the sentences begin with a blank. In that case, the word for the blank will immediately *precede* the cipher for the sentence.

All quotations for "Future Delivery Contracts" sold in New York, are for basis of "Middleing Uplands, American Standard classification, any grade from Strict Ordinary to Fair, inclusive."

Orders to buy or sell will be understood to be for account of the sender, unless otherwise stated.

In reports of purchases or sales, "for your account," will be understood, unless otherwise expressed.


Sterling Bills will always be understood to be drawn at 60 days' sight, and Domestic d. afts at sight, unless otherwise stated.

All orders sent by this Code to buy or sell for Future Delivery in New York, will be with the distinct understanding that the purchases or sales so ordered are to be, in every respect, subject to the By-Laws and Rules of the New York Cotton Exchange relating to contracts for the Future Delivery of Cotton, and their settlement.

To express a price or quantity for which there is no "cipher" in the Tables of Numerals, use two or more "ciphers," the sum of which will express the desired amount; for example—"Bombast, Blood" will be read "5771."

To qualify quotations or estimates, use the Table on Page 12, in connection with the Table of Numerals; example—"10 to 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ " will be expressed by the cipher words "Aloft, Bravery."

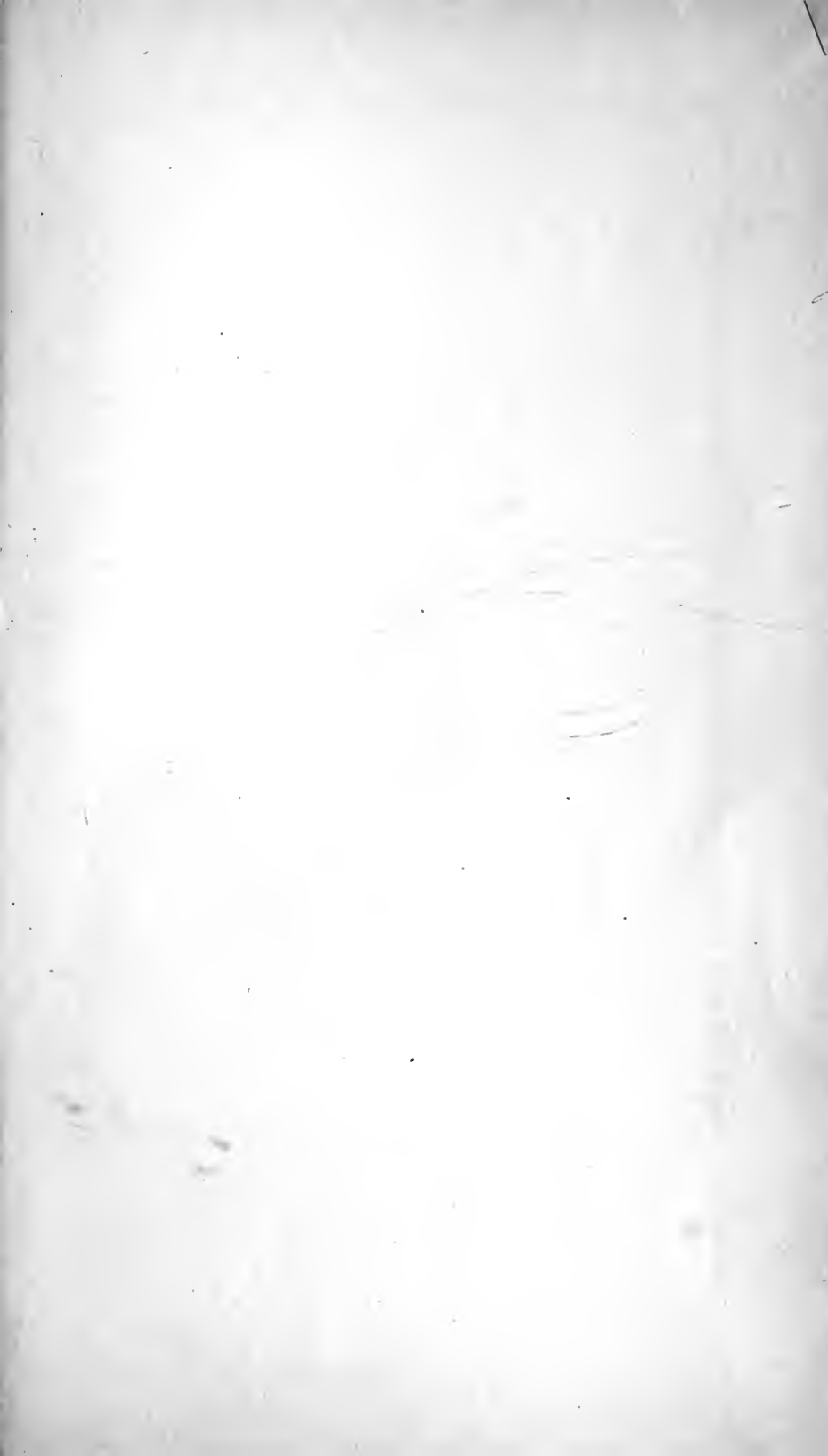
