Editor Democrat:

No one could have witnessed the exercises of Friday and Friday night with a more favorable opinion of the instruction in the very marked improvement made by this institution during the past year.

The young men and ladies deserve special mention, but we fear to make any discrimination—all did well. The speeches made by the representatives of the two societies on Friday night were very touching and equal to almost any college valedictorian.

And now for the Training School. I cannot see how Boone and Watauga county can afford to let the proposition of that noble, public-spirited man, Mr. Cone, go unchallenged. I do not believe that our people have ever realized what this institution would mean for any locality. In the first place it means four or five thousand dollars spent in the erection of a suitable building, then two thousand annually from the State for the support of the school, and this will, in all probability, be increased to five thousand in a few years. Besides, a liberal estimate of the number of students from the seven counties would not be less than three hundred dollars. This would mean at least fifteen hundred a year in the matter of board bills.

Then another great advantage would not only be in dollars and cents, but an institution of this kind will help to elevate the moral, social and intellectual stand-

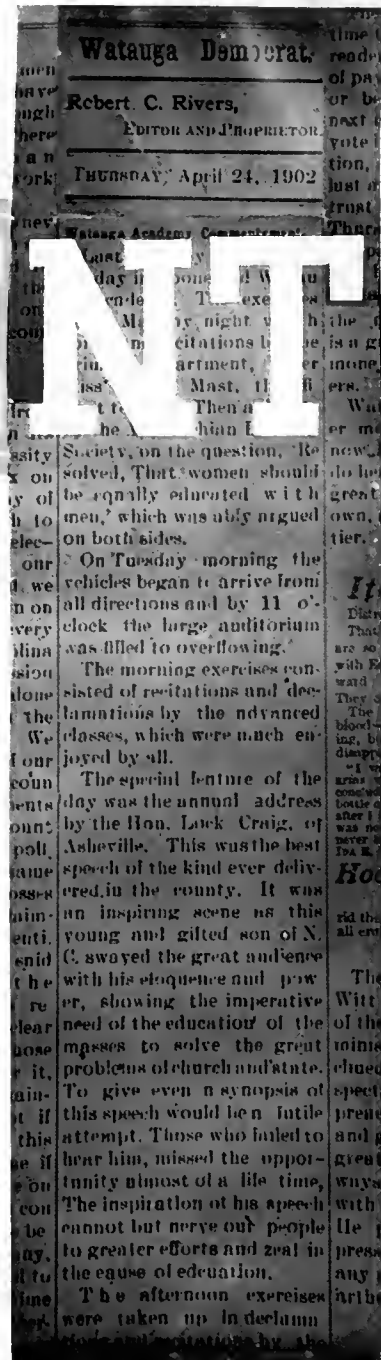

Administration Building

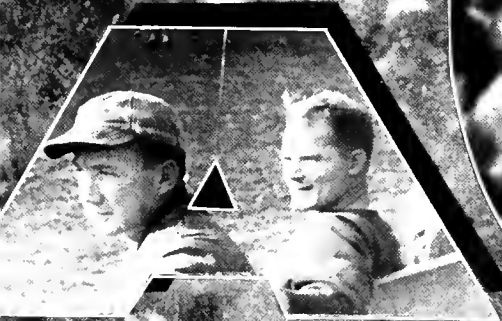
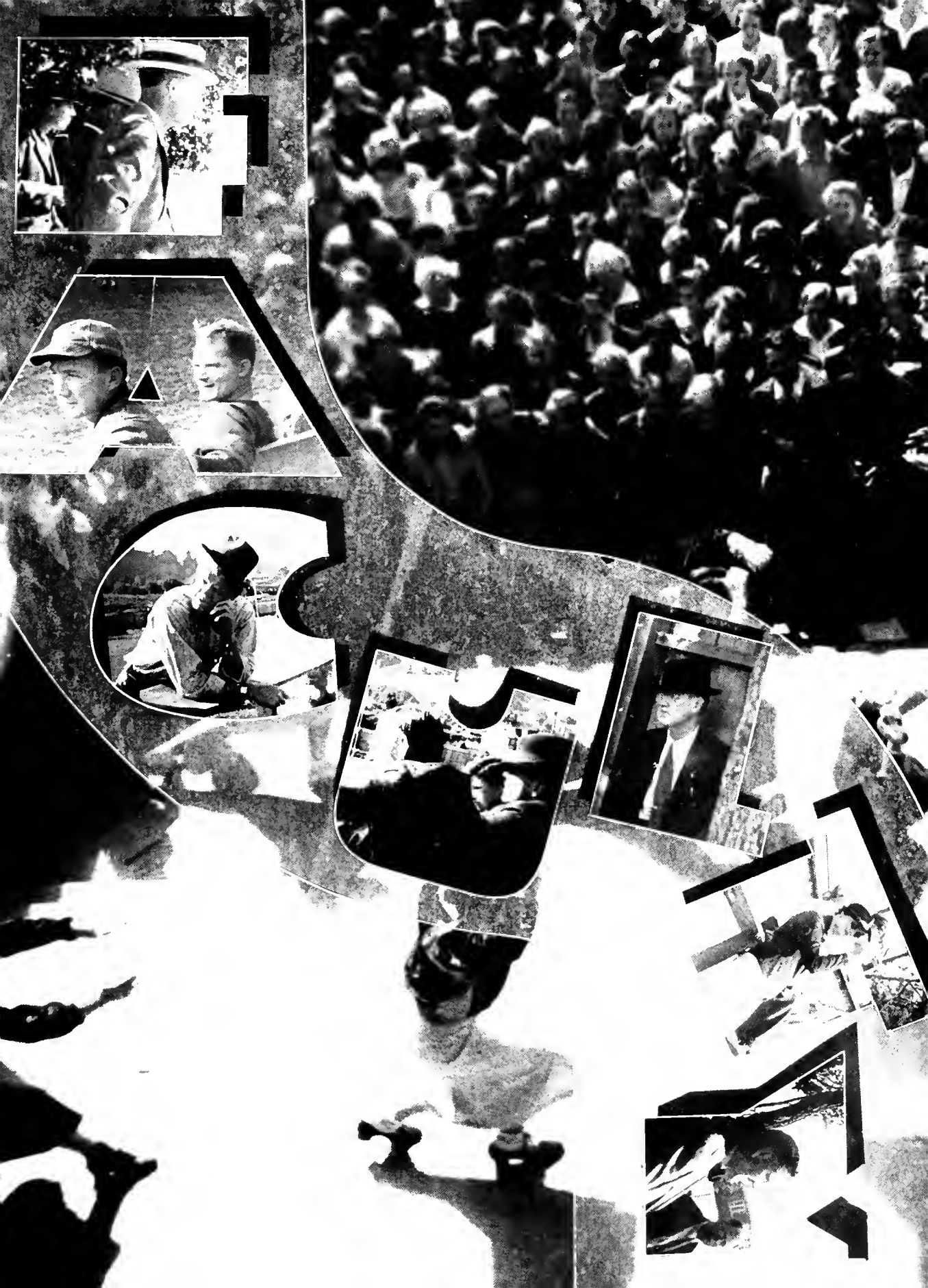
The administration building of Appalachian is truly the nucleus of the college. Like a mighty giant it towers above all the other structures of the campus.

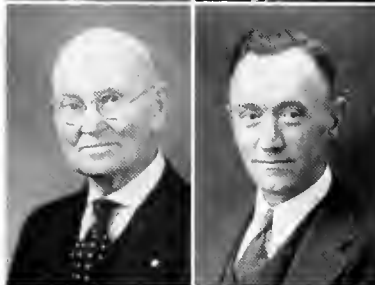

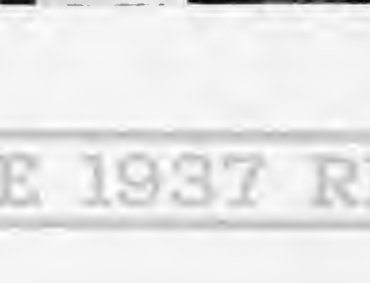

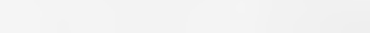

Prof. B. B. Dongherby in Raleigh News and Observer

Prof. B. B. Dongherby, county Superintendent of Watauga, spoke for Mr. Newland's bill to establish a Training School for teachers in the mountains of Watauga North Carolina before the House Committee on Education yesterday. He spoke of the popularity of the bill and declared that the public school teachers were carrying the lead in North Carolina today, that it meant something to be teacher, that the most efficient work could be brought about only by trained teachers, that it would be good economy for the State to spend a little more money and have a trained corps of teachers. He said that North Carolina was so large and so diversified in climate and soil, in products and population that it was not expedient to undertake to gather all her teachers into any one place, or into any two or three places. He suggested that his section could not be reached by institutions already established.

He supported his position with the following arguments:

1. The expenses of the other schools too great for rural teachers.

2. That the mountain people could not spend hot summer months in Greensboro, Chapel Hill, or Raleigh.

3. That the other schools were full and that the mountain teachers would prefer attending a school in their own climate, where living expenses could be reduced to a minimum.

He spoke of the Constitutional Amendment and made the following plea:

"The State has made greater demands upon us than ever before. We take it for granted that the State will allow us to make a little demands upon her. We don't ask help because we have merited it, but because we need it. We come in our weakness, we come as supplicants, but we come in the name of 600 white teachers and 40,000 white children, and ask the great State of North Carolina with her cotton mills, her tobacco factories, her railroads, tremendous wealth, and the prestige of the University for more than a century, to concede a small

A. T. S. Has Modern Water Supply System

50,000 Gallon Tank Takes Care of All Present Needs of the School Plant—Other Notes.

The Appalachian Training School has been entertained at chapel exercises recently by a talk from Prof. J. A. Williams on the great project at Stone Mountain in Georgia commemorating the heroes of the Southern confederacy. Prof. Logan has been reading Enoch Arden in sections for the entertainment of the student body. Also quite a number of basketball games have been engaged in for the past few days. Both the young ladies and the young men's teams went to Lenoir on Friday where the former played the team of Davenport College and the latter played the home town team. In both these games the Training School teams came out second best. In the school Gymnasium there have been several contests between the different classes and the results were various.

Some of the enterprises of the Training School begun several years ago have been greatly enlarged and improved, some made entirely new. This latter is especially true of the water system. Quite a number of years ago they inaugurated a small system by piping a few small springs from the side of Howard's Knob, which served the purpose of the school for several years. A few years ago the state appropriated funds for a new system. In constructing this system a number of springs were purchased on the side of Rich Mountain some three miles distant. These were cemented so that no surface water could get into them and all were piped to a tank on the side of the mountain and from there by a large flume the water was carried to a tank of 250,000 gallons capacity located on a high ridge far above the town and school. From this latter large pipe "runs" throughout the school grounds. This plant is for the school alone and will furnish an ample supply of pure mountain water for the use of the school in its fullest development for years to come.

This week at the college marks the busiest of the year. On Monday evening was a graduate piano recital by Miss Mary E. Davis, who was assisted by Prof. A. R. Smith in several vocal solos. Tuesday and Wednesday were taken up with reviews and examinations and this afternoon at 3:30 the senior class is to give its class day exercises. At 8 o'clock a comedy-drama in three acts will be staged by the members of the senior class. The title of the play is "At the End of the Rainbow," and it is pointed out that this is the only exercise of the year for which an admission fee is charged. The proceeds go to the student loan fund and is used to help secure an education for those who are unable to help themselves.

NEW TRAINING SCHOOL TRUSTEES MEET

The new board of trustees of the Appalachian Training School met at the Critcher Hotel Thursday night. Dr. Brooks, State Superintendent and Prof. A. T. Allen, director of teacher training in North Carolina, were also present. The board qualified before Clerk of Court Smith.

Capt. E. F. Lovill was elected chairman of the board, and M. B. Blackburn vice-chairman; E. F. Lovill, M. B. Blackburn, E. S. Coffey elected executive committee, and E. S. Coffey and M. B. Blackburn elected a building committee; B. B. Dougherty elected president of the school, and D. D. Dougherty treasurer and business manager.

For the most part the old members of the faculty will remain and a number of new teachers added. The school will have two years of normal work above the high school course. The entire program was carried out without any difference of opinion. Dr. Brooks expressed himself highly pleased with the outlook.

Training School Shows Marvelous Growth

A. T. S. Faculty Has Interesting Meeting \$425,000 has been Received for Building Purposes During Four Years.—President Gives Outline for Future of Institution.

A very interesting meeting of the faculty of the Appalachian Training School was held on Saturday afternoon the 17th. President Dougherty presided a blue print of the grounds of the school which was made by Dr. E. S. Draper of Charlotte. This map plans the campus for a million dollar plant. It shows all the present buildings and those that are to be built to meet the needs of the School and provides for walks, drives and ornamental trees and shrubbery for the campus.

Mr. Dougherty put on the blackboard \$425,000, stating that the school had received this amount for building purposes during the past four years. This amount has been spent as follows: Water system, \$29,000; Power plant \$45,000; central dining room \$50,000; Dormitory \$46,000; Demonstration school \$65,000; Administration Building \$115,000. Of these the first three and the last are now being used, though some little work is still to be done on them.

Mr. Dougherty said that the campus would likely receive attention as the next thing. Then in a most foreseeing and impressive talk gave his ideal for the future of the school. He would have a grammar school of seven grades, the equal of any in the country; the teachers to be the best to be found; a four year high school that meets all standards, a two year Normal College, with faculty, buildings and equipment as good as can be found in this country. (Prof. Dougherty did say, smiling, that we must work out a two year college before we could think much about a four year college.) One thing, he impressed the fact that there should be an endowment fund of \$100,000 to loan to poor but deserving students. Prof. Dougherty expressed his high ideals for the institution and the faculty behind him in the furtherance of his plans. If these ideals are reached in the development of the school it will be indeed a fine thing for the training of the young people of our beloved state.

\$65,000 Invested in A. T. S. Power Plant

Modern Hydro-Electric Plant. Six plants. One installed in 1914.—24 Hour Service—Rate Lower Than at Other Places in State.

About 1914 the Appalachian Training School installed its first power plant giving the school and the town electric lights and power. That one, although rather small, was one of the very best plants anywhere for its size being so adjusted as to stop automatically at any time the keeper might desire. About two years ago this plant was burned, but was soon rebuilt and continued to be used until the fall of the past year, when the new plant, situated between Boone and Blowing Rock three miles from Boone, was ready to start. This latter plant, situated on New River has been giving excellent results since the power was turned on, running day and night, except during the Sabbath. This latter plant has a dam 24 feet in height and from the dam a metal flume runs 1850 feet down the river giving the water a fall of 113 feet to the power plant which gives power apparently amply sufficient for much more distribution in the town and school. In fact it is estimated that the ordinary flow of the river, unless it would be an extraordinary dry season, would be amply sufficient to run the plant with-

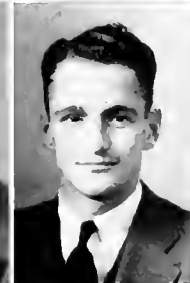

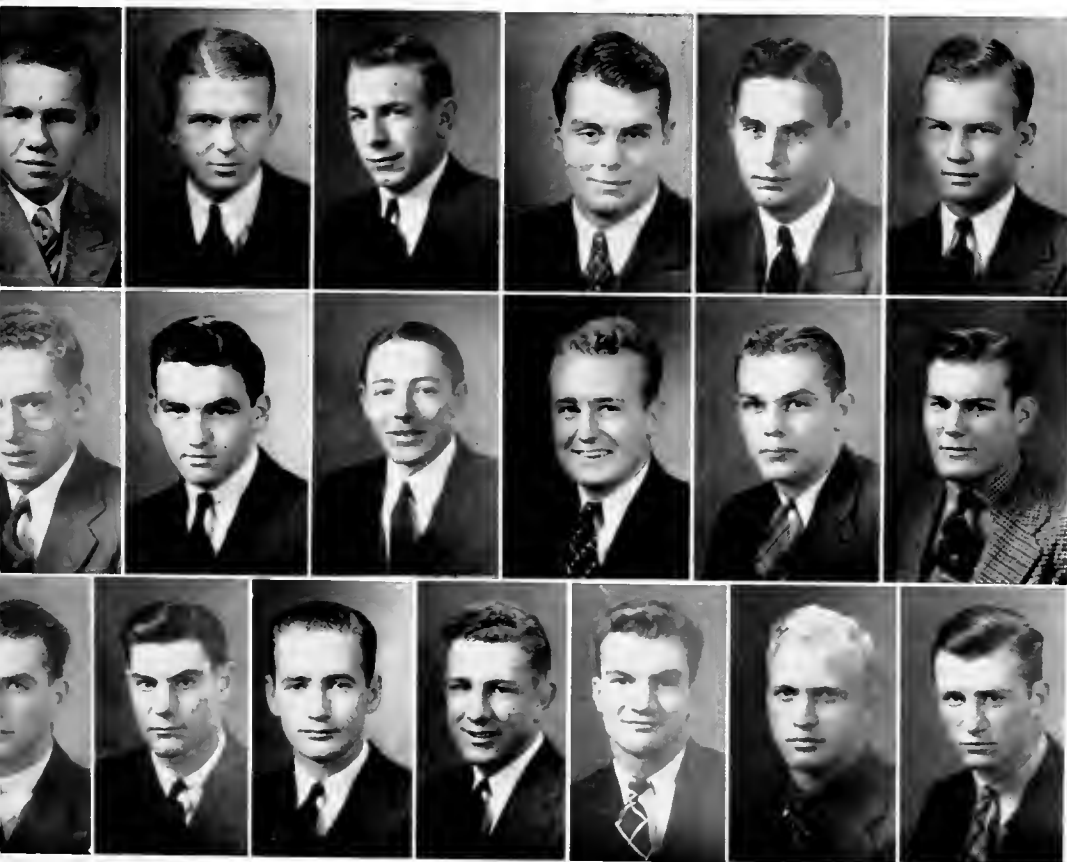

VARSITY FOOTBALL

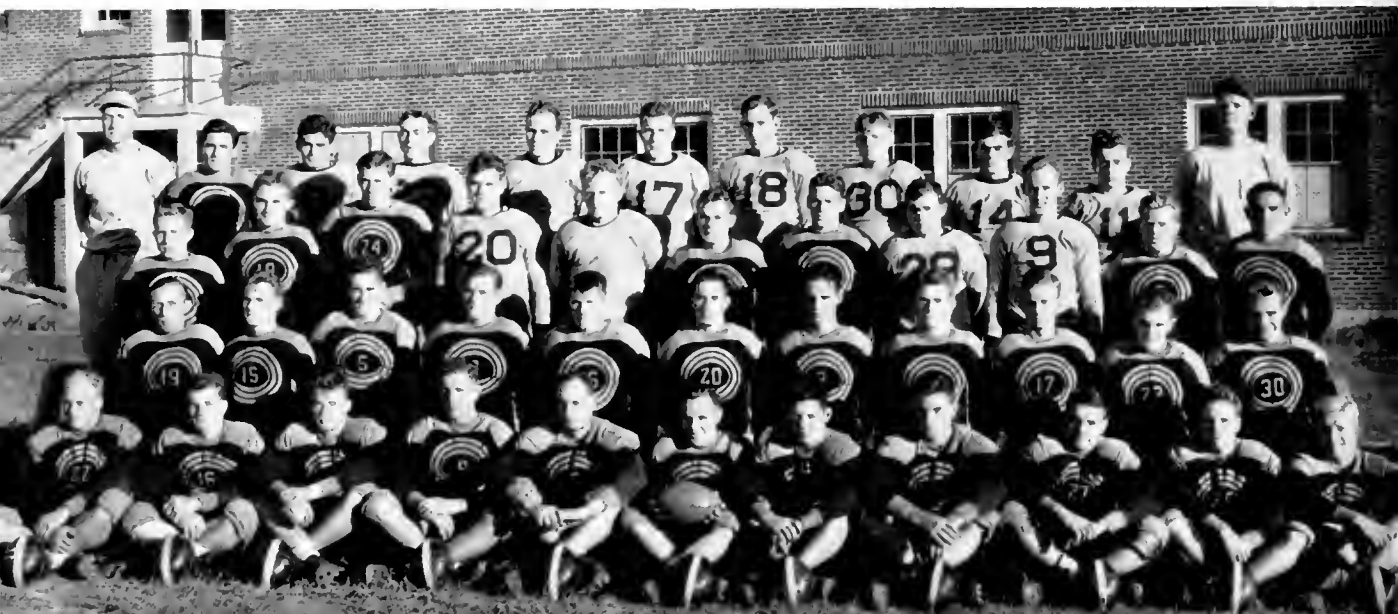

Led by Coach Kidd Brewer and his able aides, Flucie Stewart, line coach, and Robert Watkins, freshmen mentor, the mountaineers took second place in the Smoky Mountain Conference, third in the North State, and finished with a total score of 296 points to the opponents 29.

Three senior athletes wore Appalachian's uniforms for the last time this year. 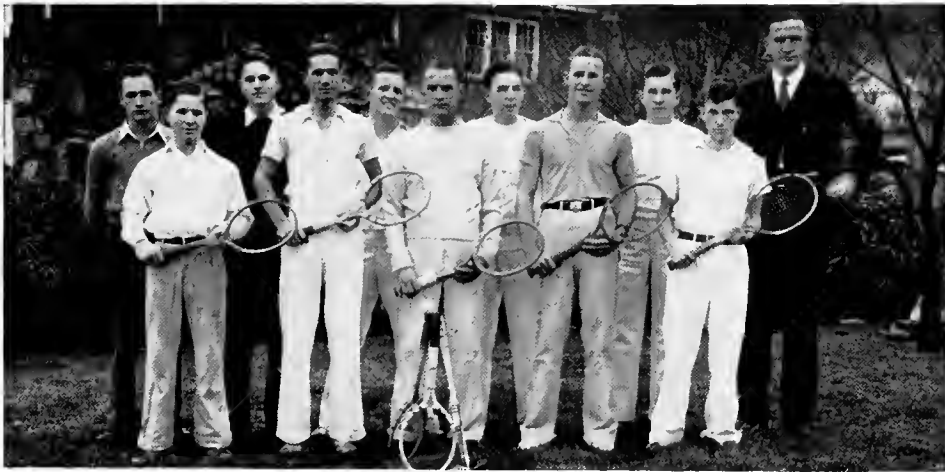

ASSEMBLY ALTERS NAME OF A. T. S.

First Six Weeks of the Spring Term Ends Saturday—Other School news As Reported by Our Regular Correspondent.

The recent legislature adopted a new charter for the school here changing the name from the Appalachian Training School to the Appalachian State Normal School. This name of course, includes the Normal Department and the High School Department. It provides that the board of Trustees shall consist of nine members appointed by the governor of the state. They are required to meet once each year. The act empowers the trustees to secure an endowment fund for the school to lend to worthy needy students, and that proceeds from the electric power plant shall be applied to this fund. It also incorporates all the property belonging to the school, making it unlawful to fish or hunt or exercise any special privileges without written permission.

Normal Heating Plant Is Valuable Asset

Perhaps the most valuable as well as the most modern addition to the campus of the Appalachian State Normal is the central heating plant which has recently been completed by R. F. Coffey, building engineer, and which was erected at a cost of more than \$50,000. The building is of brick construction and located just east of the site of the old Dougherty mill. It is designed for the accommodation of three 200-horsepower boilers, one of which is now in place and is satisfactorily heating five of the main buildings on the campus, warming the water in the swimming pools and supplying hot water to all the buildings. Besides the greater part of the cooking in the central dining hall is done with steam from this plant.

As this is accomplished, explains Mr. Coffey, through a system of steam mains that are carried to a central point of the campus in a large concrete tunnel, from which point the radiation is distributed to the individual buildings. The system is different from those heretofore used in that the steam as it condenses is piped back to the boiler, thus saving the greater part of the water.

In this same building is housed a new electric unit developing the same amount of electrical energy as is produced at the hydro plant in use on New River. A switchboard at the auxiliary plant allows the engineer to have complete control of the system. Both plants may be operated simultaneously or separately as occasion demands. Thus there can be no danger of a shortage of current until the amount used by the town and school is considerably more than doubled. When there is steam on the boiler and there is a shutdown at the New River plant, the change may be made instantly to the auxiliary, and under any condition, it is pointed out, the town could not be out of power for more than one hour.

Another 200-horsepower boiler will be installed this year, doubling the heating capacity of the plant, which now compares favorably with any in the state.

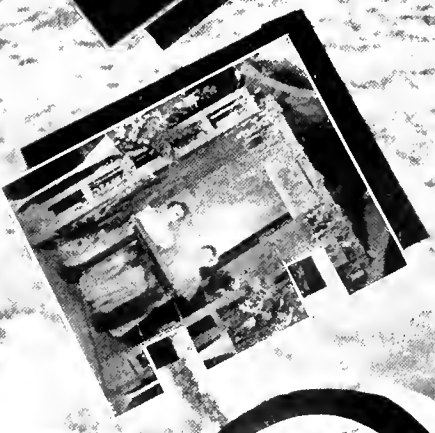
