Dear Dr Brown:

1 I am in receipt of your favor of the 30th ult. I arrived here two or three weeks ago and put my self under the treatment of Dr Goldman.

I went to pieces again this last winter and the doctors urged me to get out of the strain. They said for me to cut entirely loose from the work here, come to America and settle down, with no thought of returning, unless I got entirely on my feet again. I should then go systematically into treatment, and if when I recovered I might then consider going back again, but not until then. As yet it is not at all clear as to whether or when I can return. My trouble is almost wholly a brain fog. Physically I am alright.

2 There are some matters which come up in connection with the evangelistic campaign which I was managing this last year, which I had thought might be of benefit all around to talk over with the Board. As you probably know, we had re-established some churches out in ~~our~~ evangelized districts with about 1400 enrolled out of nearly 2300 professing faith, and when I left it was going on at nine churches a month. However I do not know just when I can go up to N.Y.

My dear James:-

A letter from your cousin Clinton reached me in this morning's mail, indicating that he may come over to New York any day on a business errand in connection with an offer that has come to him from a college where he is desired ~~by~~ ~~a military academy~~ for a faculty position. I write at once to let you know, in case your father has determined his dates for being in the East. If he is at Mt. Hermon I would be glad if he would wire and let me know whether he will come by way of New York. The latch string is out for you and for him at #54 Grammercy Park and at the National Arts Club. A hearty welcome and "The Keys of the City" await you. I may have to go over to Washington, D/ C. for a day before the Commissioner of Indian affairs starts the first of next week for the Far West, so I am desirous to know as far as possible in advance of your father's movements. I do not know now whether I can go to Indiana to be with him two or three days at Madison before the end of this month.

I hope things are going nicely in your studios and that you are contented and happy in your Connecticut Valley surroundings and your Mt. Hermon work. The enclosed report of my task for the past year may be of interest to you and your father.

BETWEEN: Rhoda G. Fish, widow of Thomas F. Fish, deceased, of the City of Oakland, County of Alameda, State of California, the party of the first part, and

Lucia F. Moffett, married, (maiden name Lucia Hester Fish) of the City of Oakland, County of Alameda, State of California, the party of the second part.

WITNESSETH: That the said party of the first part, for and in consideration of the sum of Three Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty (\$3750.) Dollars, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, does by these presents grant, bargain, sell, convey and confirm unto the said party of the second part, and to her heirs and assigns forever, an undivided one-half part and interest in all that real property, situate in the City of Oakland, County of Alameda, State of California, and described as follows, to-wit:

Parcel 1: Beginning at a point on the Eastern line of Grove Street, distant thereon three hundred forty-five (345) feet Southerly from the Southerly line of 28th Street; running thence Southerly along said line of Grove Street, twenty-two (22) feet, six (6) inches; thence at right angles Easterly, eighty-four (84) feet; thence at right angles Northerly, twenty-two (22) feet, six (6) inches; thence at right angles Westerly, eighty-four (84) feet to the point of beginning.
