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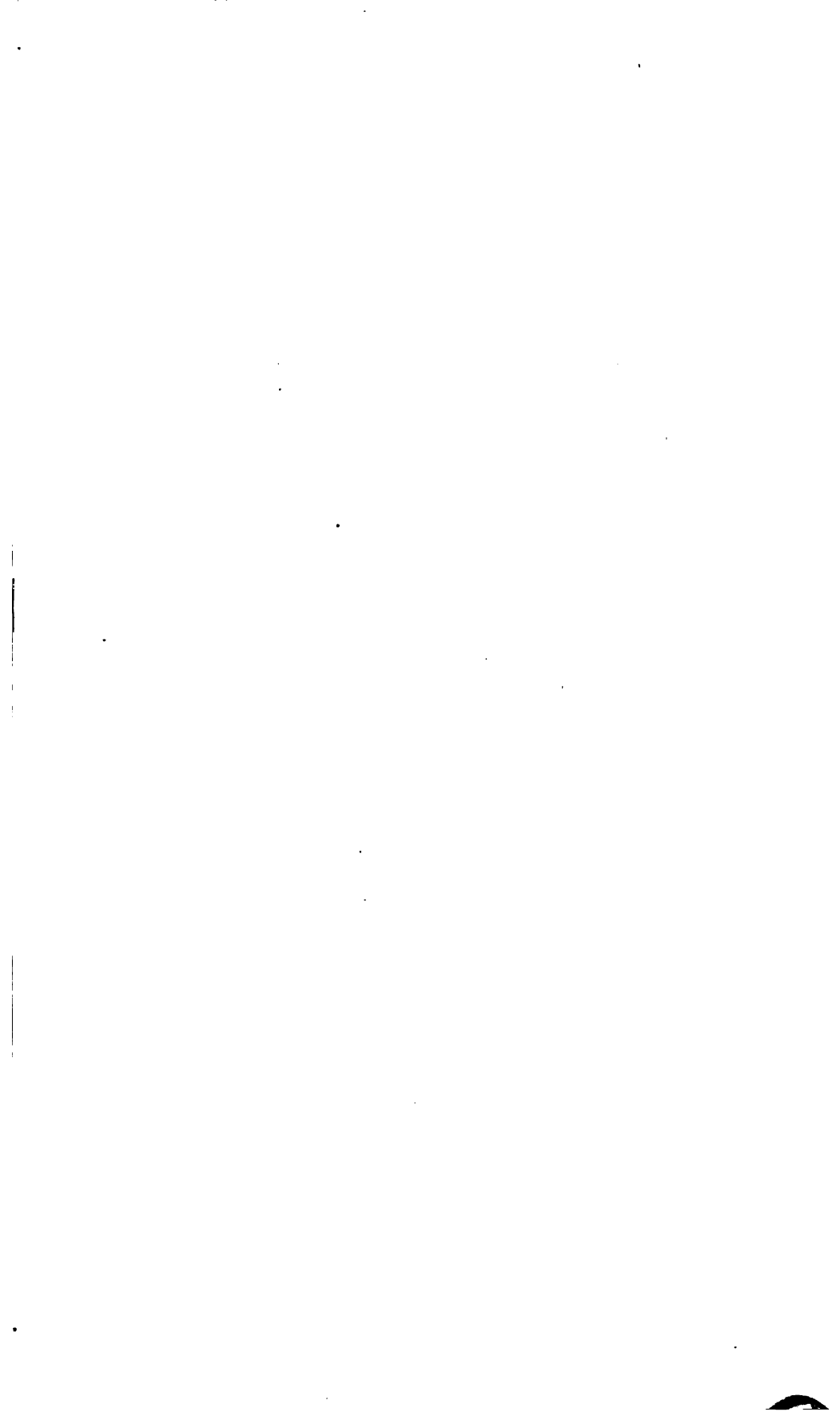

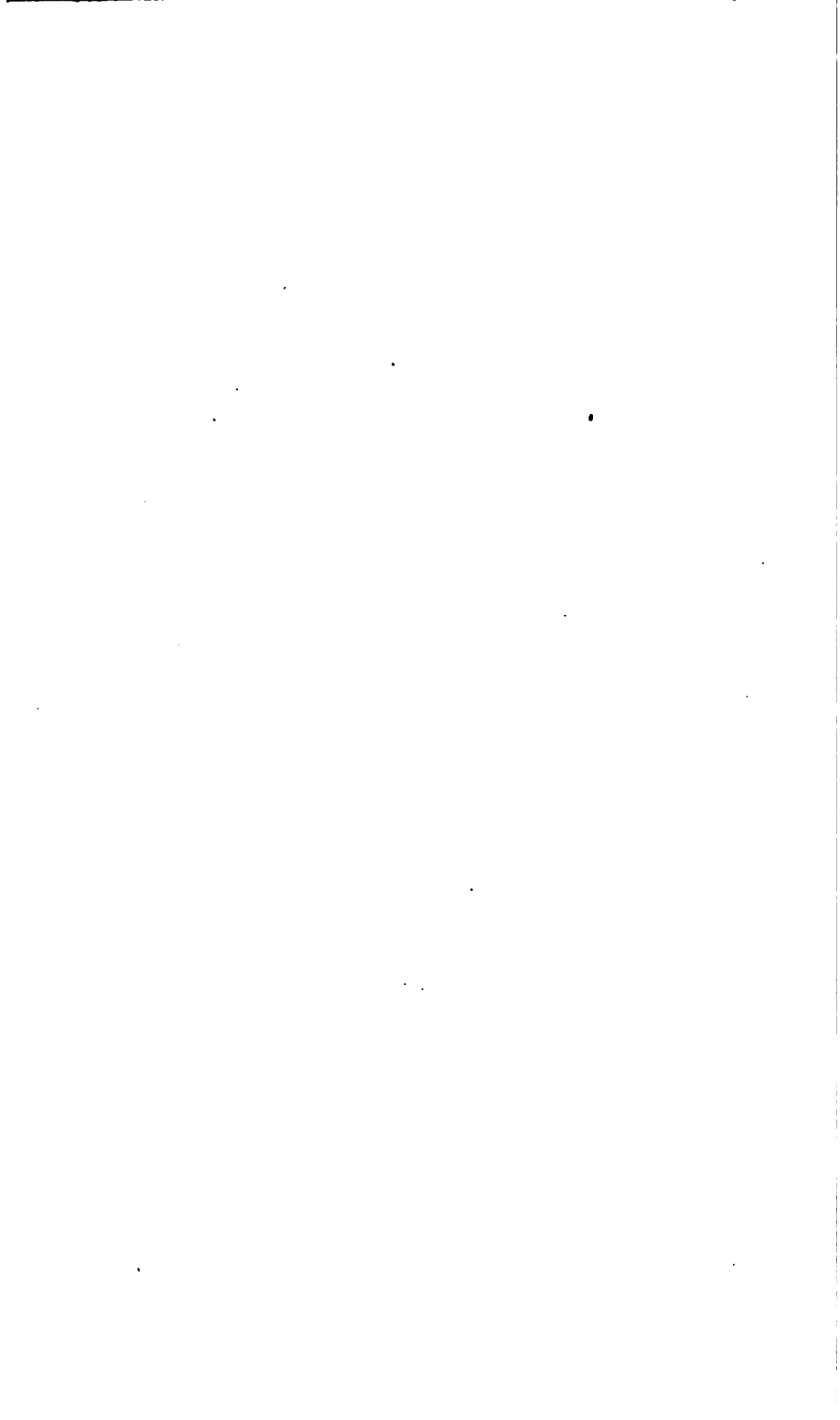

EDITOR'S PREFACE.

THE collecting of the materials of this volume began several years since, without a thought of publication, for the personal gratification of the compiler and with a purpose to preserve that which otherwise would have been, probably, irrecoverably lost. As the work progressed the interest increased. A wide correspondence was carried on for some five or six years, during which time the larger part of the genealogical matter of the work was gathered, and the results were put into the hands of the editor to arrange and print.

The thought of inserting biographical and personal notes was not entertained until it was found that much material for such sketches, too valuable to be thrown aside, was contained in the letters. This matter, fragmentary in its nature, supplemented by such information as could be procured from town histories, public records, local newspapers, and a limited correspondence during the time the work was preparing for the press, has been made use of, so far as possible, to give the chief points of interest in the personal history of members of the fra-

ternity. Many sketches are incomplete, and many omissions — specially to be regretted — will be noted. These imperfections are attributable to our inability to obtain the desired information.

Acknowledgments are due to Thompson's History of Montpelier, Miss Hemenway's Gazetteer of Vermont, Miss Larned's History of Windham County, Conn., Ammidown's Historical Collections, and Washburn's History of Leicester, from which, as well as from numerous local newspapers, free and often literal extracts have been made. Indebtedness is also acknowledged and thanks tendered to the following, who by their efforts have added much to the value of the work: Miss Ellen D. Larned, of Thompson, Conn., who furnished a large part of the sketches of the Connecticut branches of the family; Doct. Simon Davis, of College City, California; Hon. Ebenezer Davis, of Dudley, Mass.; Mr. George Davis, of Webster, Mass.; Miss M. E. Stone, of North Oxford, Mass.; Miss Ellen E. Willson, of Richville, Vermont; Mr. Nathaniel Davis, of North Montpelier, Vermont; Mr. Willard H. Davis, of Lowell, Ohio, with many others who cannot be named here. Particular mention should be made of the labors of Rev. Jesse P. Davis, late of Chillicothe, Illinois, who rendered very valuable service in gathering the statistics of families in Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois, but who was not permitted to live to see the completion of a work in which he took a lively interest.

Due care has been used to make the printed record conform to the written one as received from our correspondents, and yet, doubtless, errors will be found; they

always exist to a greater or less extent in the larger works of this kind because the sources of information are necessarily imperfect.

As to the plan, while it may be criticised as conflicting in a measure with the dictum of professional genealogists, it is believed to be the best to answer the design of the compiler, which was to give a record of the descendants of Samuel Davis and Joseph Davis, and of all who have intermarried with the families, down to every grandchild of a Davis, male or female.

The numbering of families in the Joseph Davis line was begun at 800, as a matter of convenience, and to avoid a confounding of the two branches.

The correctness and good taste of the typography of the work are due in a large degree to the interest and care of Mr. Benj. J. Dodge, under whose immediate supervision it has been printed.

DESCENDANTS.

OF THE

ANCESTRY OF SAMUEL DAVIS.

THE emigrant ancestor of Samuel Davis was **William Davis**, who was of Roxbury in 1642. No attempt has been made to trace his parentage. The fact that at this date numerous families of the name had settled up and down our coast from Maine far southward, would seem to render this a task difficult to accomplish. A tradition held extensively in the family is, that he came from Wales about 1635.

He was born in 1617 and married, first, Elizabeth ———. She was buried 4 May, 1658. He married, second, 21 Oct. 1658, Alice Thorpe. She was buried 24 Feb. 1667. He married, third, Jane ———. He was admitted to full communion 20 April, 1673. Elizabeth his wife was a member of the church 7 Oct. 1649, at which time their eldest three children were baptized. Alice was admitted to the church 4 June, 1663, and Jane 8 June, 1673.

He died 9 Dec. 1683. His widow Jane died 12 May, 1714, at Watertown, at the residence of Josiah Goddard who married her daughter Rachel.

THE WILL OF WILLIAM^r DAVIS.

“The last Will and Testament of William Daves of Roxbury in the County of Suffolk in New England the 6th of December in the year of Our Lord One thousand six hundred Eighty three, now having my per fect memory & understanding by the blessing of my mercifull Father, into whose hands I commit my Soule :

Unto my daughter Elizabeth I consigne over a bill of twelve pounds and a trunck that was her mothers together with all the things in it. And unto my son Mathew and Jonathan when they come to age they shall have the two Orchards lying near my son Joseph's, and if they are not worth Forty pounds then the Overseers of the Estate shall sell some Land for to make it up, their portion twenty pounds apiece.

And then for my belove d wife I do make her sole Executrix of all y^e rest of my Estate of Lands and movables and give her full power for to dispose of it for her wants as shee see cause, with that full power and Authority over it as I my selfe might have if I had continued For my three eldest son's John and Samuel and Joseph, they have received their portions already, notwithstanding I give unto my son John, the eldest of my Children five shilling, and to Samuel and Joseph five and sixpence to buy them some good bookes to remember me with : And Further my desire is that there should bee two Over Seers chose who my wife see good ;

This is my last will and Testament.

In Witness whereof I have set to my hand the day and yeare above written.

At an adjournment of y^e County Court in Boston 17th Decemb^r 1685 pursuant to y^e direction of y^e Will, Jane Davis Exec^{tr} made choice of Edward Morris and Jabez Tolman to be overseers for y^e end proposed in y^e will, wch. persons y^e Court approved of Attest Is^a Addington Cl^{ke}”

March, 1754, and the balance of the farm was given to the son in his will. This Benjamin was known as “retailer Ben,” from which it is inferred he was a trader. He had a son Benjamin, *b.* 1710, who in 1731 went to Oxford, and *m.* Sibyl dau. of Joseph Rocket—the first female *ch. b.* in Oxford—sett. in the easterly part of the town. He served in the French War and after his return sett. just outside the town limits on the south-east, near Nipmuck pond. He was the progenitor of the family of the name which lived in the southerly part of Oxford, known as the Benjamin Davis family.

THE WILL OF JOHN^s DAVIS.

The last Will and Testament of John Davis of Roxbury in the County of Suffolke in New England the three and twenty of february One thousand seven hundred & four or five, as followeth having my perfect understanding and memory by the blessing of my mercifull father into whose hands I commit my soull & dispose of mye worldly estate: in the First place my will is that all my just debts & funerall charges be paid and discharged by my Executors hereafter named with all Convenient speed after my Interment

Item. I will and constitute and appoint my 2 sons Wilame and Sammuell to be my Executors :

* CHARITY, his widow, was executrix of his will. Samuel Davis was the first name on her official bond. The following were the children of William^s and Charity Davis: i. John,⁴ *b.* 11 Sept. 1701; inherited the homestead of his grandfather; was deacon of Roxbury church. ii. William,⁴ *b.* 6 June, 1704; sett. at Oxford; *m.* 4 Feb. 1742, Elizabeth dau. of Isaac Learned of Oxford. He *d.* 14 Aug. 1775. She *d.* 1799; both at Oxford. He was her senior by sixteen years. He gave in his will nearly the whole of his estate to the four children of his brother John of Roxbury, namely, John, Nathaniel, Charity *w.* of Ephraim Murdock, and Abigail. He lived in Oxford about fifty years, and was owner of some of the most valuable real estate on the main street. iii. Nathaniel,⁴ *b.* 19 Jan. 1706.

Including in it that part of wood Land and pasture land adjoining upon Johne May and Josheway Seivers and alsoe I give my son wilam all my movebles without thought dors and withine excepting 2 guns one at the castell and mye hunting gune it is my will that my sone Willame shall pay to my 2 daughters marah Beaken and Elezebeth Mayo. twenty pound to marah Beaken and twenty pound to Elezebeth Mayo in curr^t mony of Newengland withen fouere yere. five pound to each a yere.

Item. I give to my Sone Sammuell all my land lying up at Jacob Chamberlins with all appurtenances belongenge theretoo with too small wood lots lyinge in the 2^a division nowe to Sammuell *Morelis* the one being for ten acres and the othere Seven Acres, likewise I give to my Son Samuel my hunting goune, & the other goune, mentioned.

Item. My will is that my son Samuill shall pay to my 2 Daughters Mary Baken & Eliz^a Mayo Ten pound in curr^t money of New England, in one years time, as their Legacies given to them by their Grandfather Edward Devotion, which is to each five pounds, it being forgot in the place of it by recollecting of my thoughts. I do will that mye Son wilame shall have mye 2 acres of Salt marsh lieng in Gravelye point.

Item. it is mye will that this mye Esteat of housene and lands given by me to my son Willame might not at his deces be anye ways alinated but that it might Socksesivlye falle to my grand child John Davis if he livse till he com of eage and if he dye that it shold fale to the next heire.

Of the earlier years of SAMUEL DAVIS little is known. In 1720, he in company with Thomas Mayo, his brother-in-law, and Joseph Weld, whose sister he afterward married, bought of Gabriel Bernon, then of Kingston, R. I., for the sum of twelve hundred pounds, twenty-five hundred acres of land in the eastern section of "Oxford Village," then in Suffolk County. This land had been granted by Joseph Dudley and his associates to Bernon as one of the conditions of a contract to bring over from England and settle upon the Oxford grant thirty French Protestant families. Mr. Davis did not remove to Oxford until eight or nine years after his purchase. He had then passed the prime of young manhood and was nearly fifty years of age. That he was a man of more than ordinary qualities, both intellectual and moral, is proved from the high position which was at once accorded him by his fellow-citizens. For twenty-five years after his coming, down to the time when he was unfitted by age for further action, he was almost constantly in the public service. In a great majority of the town meetings during that time he was the moderator; for about fifteen years he was on the board of selectmen, and for a number of years an assessor and town treasurer. In 1734 he was voted by the town, as a mark of honor, "the pew on the westerly side of the meeting-house adjoining the double doors." In 1735 he was chosen deacon of the church, which office he held until his death. In 1742 and 1747 he was elected representative to the legislature. In 1744 the town took action upon the most important undertaking of the first century of its history—the building of a large, and, for the times, expensive meeting-house. Of a committee to consider dimensions and cost, and to order materials and to fix the prices of all labor and materials, he was the chairman. In this house after its completion the pews were allotted to the proprietors in proportion to their estates. The first came to Col. Ebenezer Learned and the second to Samuel Davis. From 1750 to 1755 he held no town office excepting

that of moderator. After 1755 his name does not appear upon the town records. His extensive landed estate was disposed of during his life, he having given a large farm to each of his six sons. Living to his seventy-ninth year, he had adjusted his business affairs, and died intestate. His homestead has descended from father to child down to the present time, and is now owned and occupied by Lucy Davis [see 60, i.].

Capt. SAMUEL DAVIS came to Oxford with his father when eighteen years of age; was a farmer—lived in the easterly part of the town on a farm of one hundred and eighty-nine acres, given him by his father in 1738. This estate was after his death divided among his three sons. He was captain of militia, and at the time of the French and Indian War, marched with his brother, Capt. Edward, at the head of thirty-nine men of his company on his way to Fort William Henry, but returned after reaching Sheffield, Mass., one hundred and five miles out, having been in service sixteen days. From 1740 to 1760 he was considerably in town office, being constable, and later selectman for four years. In 1744 he was chosen by the town one of the committee, of which his father was the chairman, to oversee the building of the new meeting-house, and to appraise materials and labor.

He was a member of the committee to supply the pulpit, after the death of Rev. Mr. Campbell, the first settled English minister of the town.

EDWARD DAVIS, Esq., was for many years a very influential citizen of Oxford and much in public life; captain of militia in time of the French War, and marched with thirty-three men of his company, for the relief of Fort William Henry, as far as Sheffield, Mass., and returned, having been out sixteen days. He retained his connection with the militia and was from 1763 to 1771 major of the first Worcester County regiment, under Col. John Chandler, but was too far advanced in years to take an active part in the revolutionary contest. From 1740 to 1780 he was constantly in town office; fifteen years representative to the legislature, many years selectman, and moderator in town meetings. From 1760 onward, he was many years justice of the peace, doing much business, especially in performing the marriage ceremony; occupied positions of trust, and settled

many estates. In 1772 he was the chairman of the town's committee to oppose the setting off of the town of Ward; in 1775, member of the Provincial Congress at Watertown.

He settled in the easterly part of the town, on a farm given him by his father in 1740. Here he built a commodious and well finished house, which is still standing. Of the seven sons born and reared here, the youngest, Jonathan, only remained in town. He succeeded to the homestead and enlarged and much improved the house. The farm in 1872 passed out of the possession of the Davis family. Edward Davis, Esq., was an extensive land holder in Charlton and Dudley, as well as Oxford.

Dea. THOMAS DAVIS was a farmer and miller. Lived on the farm of one hundred and fifty-five acres, adjoining the homestead on the north, given him by his father in 1743. Dea. DANIEL DAVIS was a farmer, and occupied the forty-acre lot on Oxford plain given him by his father, his home having been on the Sutton road near the mill brook. In the spring of 1752 he removed to Killingly, Conn., where he purchased a valuable farm and mill privilege on Five Mile river. He was much esteemed in his new home, serving as selectman, and in other public capacities, and also as deacon and committee of the church at Breakneck hill. After the death of his wife and the removal of his sons, he followed them to Thompson parish—originally a part of Killingly—where he owned a farm. Here he was beloved and honored, and allowed the privilege of building in the meeting-house a special pew “on the right hand side of the broad alley.” He was considered a wise and prudent man, and his counsel was often sought in times of peril. A cause of great grief and sorrow in his old age was the fact of his kindred at Oxford having embraced the new doctrines of the Universalists. His family Bible and arm-chair are now in possession of Mrs. Harriet D. Palmer, a descendant, living at Great Barrington, Mass.

Capt. ELISHA DAVIS was a farmer, living on an estate of one hundred and fifty acres given him by his father, adjoining on the east that of his brother Thomas. On this place, upon the same stream which ran through his brother's premises, he built a saw-mill, and also a potash factory the product of which he marketed in Boston. He was a man of intelligence, and deservedly popular; captain of militia; in 1752, constable; in 1765, selectman; in 1778, assessor; in 1780, on a committee of three to supply the town's quota of beef for the revolutionary army; from 1787, for seven years chairman of selectmen; in 1791, chairman of a committee to provide for the ordination of Rev. Mr. Dudley. He was active, energetic and prosperous; worthy and exemplary, and occupied positions of trust and responsibility.

In his will, in giving directions as to the disposition of his property, he says "each son is to have as much as two daughters except the son that lives on my home farm [Nehemiah] and he must have one hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty seven cents more than either other-son, in order to support the dignity of my house in making my friends welcome."

SAMUEL DAVIS inherited one hundred and seventeen acres of the easterly part of his father's farm, now owned by Charles Lovett. He had good natural abilities, was a number of years selectman, and upon several important town committees where weighty financial questions were involved; was among the first of the Davis family to give his influence to the Universalist society and became a prominent supporter of it; was chairman of a committee who in 1785, at the organization of the body, issued certificates to members. The same year he, with Jonathan Davis, Jeremiah Davis, Abijah Davis, Elijah Davis and others, signed a protest against the supporting by the town of preaching in the "standing order."

Having upon his farm a water privilege, he, in company with Joshua Stockwell and Wright Stockwell, his brothers-in-law, built a dam and erected a shop, where he began the manufacture of shovels, hoes, nails, etc. This business was not a success. In 1800, being then fifty-four years of age, he removed to Eddington, Me., where he spent the remainder of his life. In person he was large, and when in his prime was noted for his great physical strength, and was known in all the region as a wrestler. It is related that upon a time a "professional" from

a distance, having heard of him, came to town to try a match with him. News of the affair quickly spread through the village, and a large company assembled at the old tavern on the plain to see the sport. Mr. Davis, who was not personally known to his opponent, kept a little in the background, and when the match was "called," his brother Elijah, who was a stalwart man, stepped forward, and, grappling with the champion, after a somewhat lengthened contest was thrown. Samuel, who had watched closely his antagonist for the purpose of learning his game, now walked into the ring, saying: "I am the man you came to Oxford to wrestle with," and very soon demonstrated his superiority.

ELIJAH DAVIS was a farmer; a strong man physically and intellectually; of sound sense and great firmness and decision, and much respected. He had a remarkable memory, was a lover of books, and was especially familiar with the Bible. In his younger years he was a hard worker, but having injured his constitution by labor, was in later life unable to do heavy work. He liked to enlarge his estate and employ help to cultivate it; was social, and enjoyed much having a company of people around him. His personal aspect was somewhat remarkable,

he being tall and large, and having a noble head, covered in his old age with long flowing white locks, which gave him a patriarchal appearance. On his death-bed at ninety-two, when words from the Bible were repeated to him, he often gave the chapter and verse from memory.

Mrs. Davis was a very worthy woman, large hearted, and accustomed to go much among the sick.

EBENEZER DAVIS was a man of very limited education, but had strong sense, good judgment, precise and methodical habits; was frugal, and had shrewd business tact, and therefore was a successful man financially. He lived his whole married life upon a large farm in the north-easterly part of Charlton, sixty acres of which he bought in 1763, and two hundred acres of

which were given him by his father in 1765. From this and the large estate he added to it, he gathered great profits. He traded largely in hay, cattle and dairy products, his broad acres yielding good crops and his three barns being well filled with farm stock. In his earlier years he was a hard laborer, but later was engaged largely in public matters, and in transacting business for his friends and townsmen, doing much service in settling estates, arranging money affairs, and writing wills, deeds, and other legal papers. His competency was attested by the lawyers of the vicinity, who had a saying that it was useless for them to try to pick to pieces an instrument of his drawing.

He filled for many years the leading town offices, and was considered authority in financial affairs. The Revolutionary War gave him his grand opportunity, and the contracts he made with the government for the supply of beef for the army yielded him a golden harvest. As his wealth increased he hoarded it by scattering it abroad. Instead of investing it in large amounts he loaned it in small sums to hundreds of individuals in Charlton and the adjacent places, and in those days before banking had become common he seems to have been the principal resource of the people of the region who had occasion to borrow money. With all his means he was not in the least ostentatious, but lived in a low, one-storied house, in plain farmer-like style.* He had a warm heart, often assisted the poor, and in his family was kind and genial, and was remarkably fond of children.

He with his wife joined the Baptist church in Charlton in 1767. In Oct. 1779 the church withdrew its fellowship because he held to the doctrine of universal salvation. He afterward became a zealous supporter of the Universalist society at Oxford.

His wife Deborah possessed extraordinary business capacity; was a good judge of the value of farm products, and often traded in them in his absence. It is related that on a certain day a cattle-dealer, preceding his drove, called at the house, wishing to buy. Mrs. Davis went out with him to look over

* His home was at the southerly side of a high hill known as Ponikin Hill. The house has been removed and a new one built, and is occupied as an almshouse by the town of Charlton.

the herd, and fixing upon a pair of heavy, fat oxen, he asked the price. She named a sum which he at once objected to as too high, saying he had a pair as good which he would sell for so much, naming a price considerably below hers. "Drive them along and let's see them," said she. He, having named his price for effect and little thinking she would venture on such a transaction, had the animals brought on for her inspection. After looking at them for a few moments, she said: "Turn them into the yard yonder, and come into the house and take your money." He hesitated, but seeing she was in earnest, complied, confessing that for once he had been out-generaled by a woman.

The inventory of the estate of Mr. Davis shows his property to have been held as follows: The home farm, \$11,400; personal property, \$2,294; notes of hand and individual accounts, \$83,396; a total of \$100,090. The main portion of this estate he gave in equal shares to his five daughters: Ruth Washburn, Deborah Ammidown, Lydia Wheelock, Pamela Kies, and Betsey Borden. A memorandum of his executors states that these each received \$20,000. His estate was settled by his sons-in-law, Calvin Ammidown and John Wheelock, and his brother Jonathan, of Oxford.

ASA (ii.) was somewhat excentric; in ill health; with his father's assistance began business as a merchant in Boston, but was not successful; returned to Charlton.

Dea. EDWARD DAVIS was a farmer; one of the best of men, in public and in private. A leading man of Dudley when in his prime. He had decided ability, and gave his influence to every good cause; was justice of the peace, town clerk eighteen years, representative to the legislature from 1777 to 1780, in 1775 was selectman, assessor, and town clerk; for many years deacon of the Congregational church.

Col. JACOB DAVIS had a limited common school education, and went in young manhood to Charlton, where his father owned a large tract of land, settling upon a farm of about two hundred and sixty-five acres, two hundred acres of which his father gave him as his portion, 2 Jan. 1768, and the balance of which he purchased of his father. He was energetic and public spirited, and honored by his townsmen, being placed in some of the highest offices in their gift; was representative, and selectman, and was in deeds styled "gentleman." During the Revolutionary War he was widely known as a patriot; was colonel of militia, and in actual service to some extent, and is said to have been under Washington at the crossing of the Delaware in Dec. 1776. After the war he held for several years a contract for carrying the mail on a Worcester County route. Among his last public acts in Charlton was the serving as chairman of a committee to draw up instructions to the town representative respecting temporary relief by the legislature to debtors under embarrassment on account of the depreciated currency, indicating that while he felt the pressing need of relief, he would appeal to the proper source for a remedy, rather than take up arms as so many did. He was a warm friend of education, and for the purpose of establishing a classical school in the vicinity, in company with two other gentlemen, in May, 1783, bought an estate in the centre of Leicester, at a cost of one thousand seven hundred dollars—his name appearing first in the deed of purchase—where in 1784 was established the well known Leicester Academy, and the said estate was deeded to the school as a gift. He was a trustee of the institution from its incorporation in March, 1784, to 1786, when he removed to Vermont. He had become an extensive land owner before leaving the State, having in his possession at least fifteen hundred and fifty acres in the north-easterly part of Charlton, upon which were farm buildings, a grist-mill and a saw-mill, and on different portions of which were small farms which he had sold to settlers. This property had been mortgaged for a portion of its value to his brother Ebenezer, to whom it was sold at the time Col. Davis left Charlton.*

*The Jacob Davis homestead was upon the northern slope of a hill, about one-fourth of a mile south-westerly from his mill and the house of

Early in 1780 he began his operations in wild lands in Vermont, being one of a company which obtained a grant for a township far north in the primitive forests of that State. This movement as appears was originated by Col. Timothy Bigelow, and resulted in the founding of the beautiful town of Montpelier. A claim has been made that the honor of chief founder of this place belongs to Col. Bigelow, but it is difficult to see a just basis for it. His name stands as the chief grantee, but so far as appears, he took no part either in immediate preliminaries or in actual possession of the place. Col. Davis had named the town at the time of the grant, in 1780; he was prominent in the proprietors' meetings, surveyed and laid out the lots, went earliest upon the ground and made the first opening in the forests at the centre, taking permanent possession as a settler; built the first house on the site of the village, had the oversight of the laying out and construction of the first highways, directed in the distribution of lots to the settlers, and acted as moderator of the first town meeting, which he was the prime mover in calling, and which was held in his own house. If these things entitle a man to be called the founder of a town, according to history, the honor of founding the present capital of the State of Vermont belongs to Jacob Davis. Hon. D. P. Thompson, in his able history of Montpelier, says in effect, he was emphatically the chief of its founders, and his history became the history of the town during the first two important years of its existence, and subsequently for ten or twelve years his career involved its annals in a remarkable degree.* The story of his experiences, as given by this writer, is of great interest. His first occupation of the soil of the village was in the summer of 1787, when he with his favorite nephew, Parley Davis, and a hired man began clearing away the forests and built a log house.

his brother Ebenezer, upon the old road from the centre of the town to Millward—a name by which this portion of the town has been known for many years. The house is now standing, but has been enlarged and materially changed since it was occupied by Col. Davis. Isaac Tower and his son Isaac owned and occupied it many years. It is now owned by H. K. Davidson.

* He was also one of the pioneers of Calais, and built the first grist-mill at that place.

Later in the season his two sons Jacob and Thomas joined the company. The log house being ready for occupation, when the snows of December came the two sons with two of the four daughters and a part of the household goods, left Brookfield, Vt. (to which place Col. Davis had previously removed, and which was then the nearest settlement southward from the grant), and made their way to the new home. Leaving Thomas and the sisters, Jacob returned at once to Brookfield for the rest of the family. Before they could be ready to go a series of heavy snow storms set in, which so blocked the roads that it was impossible to reach the snow-bound trio until the following March, when their lonely isolation ended, to their great joy.

The associates of Col. Davis, in making choice of their locations in the township, pitched mostly upon the hills and higher grounds. He, however, selected a spot on the lower level, which included meadows and a mill-site, saying, with characteristic sagacity and foresight, that the travel would eventually go through the valleys. Upon this mill-site he in 1788 built the first saw-mill in the town, and in 1789 the first grist-mill, which, considering the difficulties which attended such an undertaking, gave proof of his rare enterprise and capability.

In 1790, the log house having become too small for the increasing population, Col. Davis built a large frame house, the first finished in the town. The following winter Prince Edward of England, later Duke of Kent—father of Queen Victoria—made a journey through the country from Montreal to Boston, and stopped at this house for the night. To insure to himself safety among a barbarous people, he had a band of fifteen or twenty armed attendants who guarded his person and also tasted his food to prevent harm from poisoning. In the morning, as he was about to leave, Col. Davis in conversation took occasion to enlighten him a little as to the character of the people of Vermont, asserting that he was safer there than in the streets of London, and so reassured his honored guest that the greater part of his retinue was dismissed, and he went on his journey with entire confidence as to his safety.

Somewhere near the year 1800 Col. Davis became involved in several lawsuits concerning land titles. In one of these cases,

not being able to prove a payment he had made, judgment was given against him. Such clear injustice he determined to resist. He therefore conveyed to his friends his attachable property, removed to Burlington, which was within the jail limits, and lived there more than a dozen years, when a compromise amounting to almost a surrender of the claim was made, and the matter settled. He was preparing to return to his beloved Montpelier when he was taken ill with an acute disease and died.

Personally he was of large, tall and compact frame, handsome features, and a dignified and noble manner. His great physical strength was shown in the fact that he felled and cut into log lengths an acre a day of average forest growth while clearing his lands. Says Mr. Thompson, to whom we are largely indebted for the materials of this sketch: "But Col. Davis' physical powers were of small account in comparison with the other traits of the man, his enterprise, energy, judgment and far-reaching sagacity; but even these were not all the good qualities of his character; no needy man ever went empty-handed from his door; he ever gave employment of some kind to those who asked for it, and so well he rewarded all his employees that no reasonable man in the whole settlement was ever heard to complain of the amount of wages he paid, or any unfair conduct in his dealings." It is evident that his opinion and example continued long and largely to operate upon the people, imbuing them with his own qualities and imparting a healthy tone in regard to frugality, industry and the virtues which go to make up a happy and prosperous community.

Mrs. Davis was a fitting and competent helpmeet of her husband; a person of rare endowments, physical, mental and moral; with a charming address and a gentle and benevolent disposition. She was an active member of the Congregational church, and by her kind words and many beneficent acts greatly endeared herself to a large number of friends.

Col. TIMOTHY HUBBARD, the husband of Lucy (viii.), was bred on a farm near Hartford, Conn., and went to Montpelier about the year 1800. He is to be reckoned with those who, by business capacity and efficiency, contributed largely to the wealth and prosperity of that place. He was an enterprising, clear-headed and successful merchant, became wealthy, owned

a number of farms, and retired upon one of them on the borders of the village. He filled various town offices, and from 1801 to 1810 was postmaster, and for years president of the Bank of Montpelier, and was also much engaged in administering upon estates. In 1810 he was chosen captain of the favorite military company in the town, "The Governor's Guards." At the time of the invasion of Plattsburgh in 1814, he sallied, cane in hand, into the streets, and with fifer and drummer at his side marched the town through and through nearly all day, and before night had enlisted three-fourths of his fellow-citizens as volunteers, who made him captain by acclamation. This splendid company made all haste for Plattsburgh, but was too late to join the battle. He was a man of noble and generous impulses, upright and fearless, doing his duty, whatever might ensue. He gave freely to benevolent objects, and before his death had distributed one-third of his large estate among his needy relatives.

NATHANIEL DAVIS went about two years after marriage to Dudley, Mass., where he bought, March, 1767, a farm of two hundred and seventy-four acres, bounded easterly on the French river a half mile; he died in a little over six years afterward. Rev. EDEN BURROUGHS graduated in 1757 at Yale College; taught school for one year on Long Island, pursuing meantime the study of theology, which he completed under Rev. Ephraim Judson, of Taunton, Mass. On 13 Jan. 1760, he was ordained pastor of the South society in Killingly, Conn., taking up his residence on a farm near the meeting-house. The death and removal of prominent members so weakened the church that he was obliged to leave, and on 1 Sept. 1772, he was settled at Hanover, N. H., his letter of acceptance being dated at Oxford, Mass., 3 July, 1772. Here his labors were greatly blessed, through a long ministry. In 1810 he took charge of the college church. In November of the same year he removed to Hartford, Vt., which lies nearly opposite Hanover, where resided some of the members of the college church, and died there three years later. He received from Dartmouth College the degree of doctor of divinity, and was a trustee of that institution from 1773 until his death. He was a man of sterling worth, eminently pious and successful in his profession, and had the respect and esteem of all who knew him.

Mrs. Burroughs is spoken of as a very superior person, and greatly beloved. A member of the family wrote: "She was one who impressed me with the idea of greatness growing out of goodness." Another says: "Her name and memory are held in admiring reverence by all her descendants."

He was captain of militia, a millwright by trade, and left a considerable property at his death.

Capt. SAMUEL LAMB was a respectable citizen and a farmer; captain in the Revolutionary War.

Dr. EDWARD LAMB (iii.) began his education at Leicester Academy; studied medicine with Dr. Calvin P. Fiske, of Sturbridge, and attended lectures at Boston and Cambridge. When about twenty-four years of age he went to Montpelier, Vt., where his brother Learned had previously settled. He was there chosen constable and collector in 1799 and 1800; representative to the legislature in 1804, 1814, and 1815; and in 1836 was presidential elector.

He had strong sense, extensive practical information, and a very retentive memory. In personal appearance he was prepossessing; had a massive and noble head, and in manner was kindly and attractive. These pleasing qualities were much enhanced by a fund of instructive and amusing anecdote which he possessed, which made him very popular and companionable. He was extensively and favorably known in his profession, and his opinions in medical matters were highly valued. He was the leading physician of Montpelier for forty years. From the loose and careless manner of keeping his accounts it is believed he did not collect more than one-half his dues. Mr. Thompson, the historian of Montpelier, wrote: "If ever a people owed a

great and unequivocal debt to any one man, the people of Montpelier and vicinity rest under such obligations to Dr. Lamb. Let his descendants never utter his name without breathing a blessing on his memory."

Capt. REUBEN DAVIS settled on a farm in Charlton given him by his father; was an enterprising and thrifty man; a true patriot, and active in securing soldiers and furnishing them with supplies in the Revolutionary War; was one of a committee of the town to furnish clothing. In the summer of 1775 he was lieutenant in the Oxford company of eight months' men—William Campbell, captain—in Col. Learned's regiment, which was stationed at Roxbury during the siege of Boston, and later was promoted to be captain. Under a resolve of General Court, 30 June, 1781, he went with his command to West Point, where they arrived 1 August. There he was taken ill, and died the ninth day of October following. A grandson of his wrote many years ago, "I presume no man in Charlton had so many friends." Of his three children who survived him, Ezra was under the guardianship of his uncle Jacob, and Matilda and Sally that of their uncle Ebenezer.

Capt. LEVI DAVIS had but few advantages for education, but was a man of much force of character and shrewd business tact; was active and prosperous, and of high standing as a citizen. He was actively engaged in the revolutionary struggle; was a member of Capt. Craft's company of "Troop," in Col. Learned's regiment, which marched from Oxford at the "Lexington alarm," 19 Apr. 1775, and subsequently entered the transport service, where with the rank of captain he served during the war. At Oxford at twenty-seven he was constable, and member of a committee of the town to see that certain resolutions of the Concord and Worcester conventions were enforced; at twenty-eight, assessor and town treasurer; at twenty-nine, selectman and treasurer. About this time—1782—he removed to Charlton. There, as at Oxford, he took a leading part in public affairs, was many years selectman and treasurer, and on business where expenditure of money was in question was often on committees. He received from his father a large farm in the northerly part of the town, upon which he and his sons did many a hard day's work at cutting timber and hauling it to the mill, and in gathering the stones from the rough soil and building heavy walls, which are yet standing to witness to their

vigor and hard toil.* In 1792 he was contractor for the building of the Universalist meeting-house in Oxford. In his later years he occupied positions of trust, and had charge of numerous estates.

At his death he owned four large farms, one of which was a portion of the Indian reserve in the easterly part of Dudley, occupied after his death by his son Rufus. His estate as appraised and divided among his heirs amounted to sixteen thousand five hundred dollars.

HAYNES LEARNED was the son of Gen. Ebenezer Learned, of Oxford, and seems to have inherited a taste for military affairs. At eighteen years of age he enlisted as a private in Capt. John Town's company, in his father's regiment, which marched for Cambridge 19 Apr. 1775, at the "Lexington alarm." Later in the season he joined the regiment of eight months' men,

under his father's command at the siege of Boston, and was corporal in Capt. William Campbell's company, of Oxford, serving until 17 Sept. 1775, when he was discharged. Later he was sergeant in Capt. Jeremiah Kingsbury's company, Col. Jona. Holman's regiment, which marched by order of General Court to reinforce Gen. Gates. According to tradition he was at one time in command of a company of colored troops in the Revolutionary War. He settled in Ward, now Auburn, on a farm given him by his father, where his eldest five children were born. There he was respected, and chosen as town assessor. He removed in 1788 to Livermore, Me., in the settlement and development of which place his father was interested as a proprietor. There he stood well as a citizen, and was chosen one of the selectmen in 1797. He worked at the trade of a millwright at Livermore and also at Winslow, to which place he removed. "In 1807," says the Learned Genealogy, "he received an appointment from the United States government to superintend fortifications at St. Mary's, Georgia, where he died."

Col. SYLVANUS LEARNED was the son of Gen. Ebenezer Learned, and in 1776, at the age of sixteen, went as waiter to his father in the revolutionary army. He later enlisted as a soldier in Capt. Thomas Fish's company, and was transferred to that of Capt. Webb, in Col. Shepard's regiment, in the division under Lafayette—where he was sergeant 1 March, 1777—and served during the war. He lost largely by the depreciation of the paper currency; and it is said sold the last of his army pay—a roll of some hundreds of dollars—at the bar of the old hotel on the plain, in Oxford, for a mug of “flip.” He was colonel of militia after his return from the war. In the early part of his life was justice of the peace. He was a man of more than ordinary natural endowments, and in deportment exceedingly courteous and gentlemanly.

Gen. JONATHAN DAVIS was the youngest of seven brothers, all farmers and all of whom excepting himself removed from Oxford, he remaining upon the homestead. Like his father he was much in public business; justice of the peace, representative, selectman, and in other important offices; settled many estates and filled places of trust, having in charge large sums of

money; was a county commissioner; major-general of militia. He was popular and well known in towns adjacent to Oxford, and on public occasions was honored as a prominent man of the region. He was the leading man in procuring the organization of the Oxford Bank in 1823, and for the first ten years its president. In the early history of the Universalist society he was one of its supporters, but later in life was a leading man and an officer in the Congregational society. He was first in the list of trustees named in the act of incorporation of Nichols Academy, Dudley, 1819, and was authorized to call the first meeting of the corporation; was a liberal subscriber to its fund. In 1827 he removed from the homestead to a dwelling situated two miles nearer the centre of Oxford, where he resided until his death.

THOMAS RICH was one of six brothers who went in young manhood from Sutton to Warwick, Mass.; was first lieutenant in Capt. Wright's company, which marched from that town on the "Lexington alarm." He and his brother Nathaniel were among the pioneers at Shoreham, Vt., he having bought land at Richville, near the falls, in 1785, built a house and occupied it in 1786. The next year he built a saw-mill, and also worked upon a grist-mill, of which his brother Nathaniel was the owner, quarrying the stones at Pittsford and turning

them over without help, it is said. This mill was completed in 1787. In religion he was a Baptist until the formation of the Universalist society in Shoreham in 1806, when he became a supporter of that faith. These brothers were noted hunters, and in their excursions had marked the value of the water-power at Shoreham and decided upon it as a place of settlement while it was yet a wilderness.

HON. CHARLES RICH (i.) went with his father from Warwick, Mass., to Shoreham, Vt., at its first settlement in 1785, as cook and boy of all work. He grew up with the place and came to be one of its most noted citizens. He was some ten years a member of the State legislature, and in 1813 was chosen representative to congress from his district, as a democrat, serving two years. In 1817 he was re-elected, and held the office until his death in 1824. He was a strong Universalist, and was ready at all times to have discussions—some of them public—with his opponents, and drew to his side nearly half the town, which was remarkable at that early day. He brought into the town some of the earliest importations of Spanish Merino sheep, and was the only one in Vermont who, with his sons, kept the stock unmixed and pure, and in consequence enriched the region round about by the great value of the progeny, which are now sold at from fifty to a thousand dollars each, and are in demand from Maine to California. He was a trader and also kept a tavern at Richville, a part of Shoreham. He closed up his business affairs in 1811 upon entering public life.

In congress he acted the part of a wise and influential member. In 1818 he introduced a bill, which was adopted, to guard the rights of the colored people, to prevent their being transported through the country on a false claim of ownership. He was a prominent advocate of a protective policy for our infant manufactures, and in January, 1820, offered a resolution favoring the prohibition of the importation of a certain class of articles. On this he made a speech, of which Niles's Register said: "It was a statesman's. It is not very long, but it contains more sound sense than we are accustomed to find in the same space." He was a consistent man, and would never wear anything but American manufactures. After his death the paper referred to said: "A more upright and useful member

than he was does not remain in the House of Representatives."

His son, Davis, was a very noble man, of excellent judgment, large intelligence, and scrupulous honesty. He was a member of the Vermont legislature, and assistant judge of the county court.

Rev. ELISHA RICH was apprenticed at the age of fourteen years to learn the gunsmith's trade, which business he followed for many years. He went in early life to Warwick, Mass., with his brothers. A record in that town of the death of a son of Elisha and Mary Rich, 2 April, 1767, would indicate that he had

married and was then living there. Very soon after this date we find him among the early settlers of Royalston, Mass., a town adjoining Warwick, where at the head of about ten Baptist families he formed a church in 1768, and officiated as its teacher. In 1771 he was granted two settler's lots. Soon after he went to Framingham, where he preached for a time, and removed to Chelmsford, Mass., where he was ordained, Oct. 1774. About the year 1777 he went thence to Plymouth, Vt.; remained there one year, and next removed to Clarendon, where he preached five years. In the spring of 1783 he bought land at Pittsford, Vt., and settled on a farm on which was a water privilege, where he built a grist-mill, which he soon afterward sold. Through his efforts mainly a Baptist church was formed there in 1783, of which he was made the pastor in 1784. This office he filled about twenty years, and in 1803 he retired and emigrated to near Sugar Creek, a branch of the Susquehanna, Pennsylvania, where he and his wife soon after died. He was a faithful and successful pastor, nearly one hundred members having been added to the church during his ministry. He took great pleasure in raising and caring for bees, and usually kept thirty or forty hives. Gen. Hendee, of Pittsford, to whose manuscript we are largely indebted for the main facts of our sketch, says of his family: Phebe and Lydia were born in Royalston, Ruth and Mary in Framingham, and Olive and Elisha in Chelmsford. No public records of their births appear.

CALEB HENDEE, Jr., *m.* Lydia (ii.), was of Huguenot descent, the son of Caleb and Caroline (Ellsworth) Hendee, *b.* at Simsbury, Conn. His father removed in his childhood to East Windsor, Conn., and thence in 1773 to Pittsford, Vt. Caleb, Jr., had a common school education, developed remarkable talents for mathematics, and became a noted teacher. At nineteen he was a land surveyor, in 1798 county surveyor, and in 1817 surveyor-general of the State. He was lister of Pittsford thirty years; United States assessor; justice of the peace for twenty-nine years, and assistant judge of probate. He served twenty-five years as town clerk and treasurer; was representative ten years, and brigadier-general of militia from 1807 to 1810. He was one of the leading men of the town, and highly esteemed.

JACOB RICH went early with his brothers to Warwick, Mass., and settled upon the farm previously owned by his brother Charles—who was there killed by a falling tree—where he

spent his days. He kept a tavern, cultivated the farm, and operated a saw-mill and a grist-mill. A local paper said in 1876: "We have just rescued from the rubbish the old centennial sign of the old tavern on the brook towards Winchester, with its punch-bowl and junk bottle. That was the house where the teamsters and those pork-raisers from Vermont and New Hampshire, who went to Boston to exchange it for rum and molasses, took their flip in the brave days of old. 'JACOB RICH' was on that sign."

Rev. CALEB RICH had a limited common school education. His father being a Baptist and his mother an adherent of the

“standing order,” he probably became accustomed to hearing discussions on religious questions in his boyhood. He had a speculative and inquiring mind, and as appears very readily accepted the views of the opposers of orthodoxy of the day in general, although on special points of doctrine he held views peculiar to himself. He was nominally a Baptist, and retained his connection with that denomination until after his removal to Warwick, at about twenty-one years of age. There his peculiar notions became so offensive that he and also his brother Nathaniel were brought before the church “for errors in doctrine,” and on the charge, were set aside. Soon after, in 1773, these brothers with one or two associates formed a new society at Warwick, and Caleb became the minister.

In 1775, at the “Lexington alarm,” he marched as a minute man, under Capt. Wright, for Cambridge, and after being there a few weeks obtained a furlough and went to visit among his relatives at Sutton and Oxford. His friends would hear him explain his new doctrine; and therefore from house to house in Sutton, Oxford, Charlton, Thompson and Douglas, he opened and expounded his theories, until on his return to the camp, he says, “the brethren numbered forty or fifty.” On his return to Warwick he renewed his labors with increased zeal. There his ordination as a minister occurred in 1781. After having remained in Warwick about thirty years, he removed to Shoreham, Vt., and later to New Haven, Vt., in which place and vicinity he continued to preach, as his health permitted. He was familiar with the scriptures, delighted in argument on doctrinal subjects, and was more than an ordinary man as a thinker, but as a preacher he did not excel. Rev. W. S. Balch, from whose sketch of him these notes are in part compiled, says: “He was the real founder of American Universalism.”

Capt. DANIEL DAVIS lived in his young manhood on his father's farm in the easterly part of Killingly, and removed soon after coming of age to Thompson Parish, bought land in various quarters, and engaged actively in society and public affairs. He was specially efficient during the revolutionary struggle, and was chosen at the very outset to collect subscriptions for the relief of the poor in Boston, and retained throughout in many responsible services, such as engaging men for the army and obtaining for them clothing and other necessaries as they were required; and also providing for the families of those who had entered the service. His patriotism induced him to sacrifice his own property for the public good, advancing money, which was repaid in depreciated currency, till his estate was seriously involved. He entered personally upon the

service and was promoted to the rank of a captain, and was often called to lead his company into close contact with the enemy.

After the return of peace his attention was turned to the subject of westward emigration, and he joined the honored "Company of Ohio Associates," which, under Gen. Rufus Putnam, traversed the wilderness in the spring of 1788, and began the settlement of Ohio. A tradition widely held among his descendants is that he was the second man ashore when the boat which took the company down the river struck upon Point Harmar, 7 April, 1788, and, as he afterward declared, wishing to do something of which his posterity would speak with pride, cut the first tree felled by a settler west of the Ohio River. This tree being a "buckeye," or horse-chestnut, the incident gave to the State the name which it still retains.

In 1789 he settled at Waterford, Ohio, where he passed the remainder of his life. There he with his eldest two sons participated in the perils of Indian warfare until Wayne's victory in 1794, when he settled down to the peaceful pursuits of life and aided very materially in forming the institutions of the new State. His strong mind and prudent forecast gave him great influence, and he became a power for good in the section with which he was identified, helping forward every work which would tend to its elevation and advancement.

Capt. PERLEY HOWE was the son of Rev. Perley Howe, of Killingly, and seems to have been a man of much more than ordinary ability. He was active and efficient in town affairs, filling the chief offices with credit, and in the time of the Revolution manifested his patriotism and public spirit, engaging personally in the service and was a captain. It is related on the authority of his daughter, that on a time he was a bearer of dispatches, and narrowly escaped with his life, having been fired on by the British while in the discharge of his duty. She also states that after Aaron Burr left the army his vacant position was offered to Capt. Howe, who declined it because he with other Connecticut soldiers were imbued even at that early day with some peculiar notions about state rights and state army organizations. He removed in 1795 to Ohio, where his wisdom and experience were much relied upon in building up the institutions of that young State.

SAMPSON HOWE, Esq., was the son of Rev. Perley Howe, of Killingly, settled on Killingly Hill, owning and cultivating, it is said, a mile square east of the Quinebaug. He was also a trader, and kept a public house for many years. During the Revolutionary War he was employed in various public services; was town clerk and treasurer in 1780, which office he held honorably for twenty-three years. He represented his town at the convention which adopted the federal constitution in 1788, and was more than thirty times elected to the general assembly; was many years justice of the peace, and much of his time occupied in public official duties, and contributed probably more than any other citizen of the town to both the making and administering the laws.

His judgment and candor were held in high esteem, and he was honored as a leading man of the town. With all his renown he did not consider it beneath his dignity to "ring the bell and sweep the meeting-house" for twenty dollars a year.

A large family of sons and daughters grew up in his pleasant home, which was widely noted for its social attractions, intelligence, and hospitality.

AUGUSTUS HOWE (viii.) was for a time a country trader; one of the original company formed in 1827, called the Mechanicsville Co., associated for manufacturing purposes in Thompson, Conn.; at the junction of the Quinebaug and French Rivers. The later part of his life he resided at Orange, New Jersey.

Dr. JOHN E. EATON was the son of Rev. Joshua Eaton, the first minister of Spencer, and descended in a direct line from John Eliot, of Roxbury. He graduated at Harvard College ; studied medicine, and was the second settled physician of Dudley, Mass., where he continued to practice about twenty-five years. He was very skillful, had a large practice, he and his "apprentices" being known and employed not only in Dudley but in all the towns adjacent. Being of a slender constitution, his pressing labors impaired his health and he sunk under them and died of consumption when but little past middle life. He had great energy and promptness—was very systematic and strict in all his affairs, and it is said could go in the dark to his medicine chest and take from it whatever he wished. He had numerous pupils, among whom was Dr. Samuel P. Knight, who married his daughter, and succeeded to his practice.

He was much respected as a citizen, and served one year as town clerk of Dudley. He was a supporter of the Congregational society, but was not a member of the church. The following is inscribed on his tombstone :

" Thousands of journeys night and day
I've rode weary on the way

A journey never to return."

ABIJAH DAVIS, Esq., was brought up on his father's farm in Oxford, and after his marriage lived for twelve years on the Rev. John Campbell place, which he owned. In 1795 he bought a farm on the west side of the main street and built the large house now standing, owned by George W. Holman, where he spent his subsequent life. He was economical, industrious, upright in all his transactions, a good financier, and became wealthy for the times; had good intellectual ability and a discerning mind; was genial and kindly disposed, and noted as a peace-maker; a most obliging neighbor; was a man of much decision of character, but of few words. He was very popular as a citizen and largely engaged in town and public affairs; representative for thirteen years, between 1807 and 1821, and many years chairman of selectmen; captain of militia; for a long time justice of the peace, doing a large share of the business of the town and vicinity in the trying of petty cases; settled numerous estates. His judgment and sound sense were fully confided in by the people, and his counsel and advice often sought.

He was a manufacturer; a leading citizen, major of militia, and justice of the peace.

PETER BUTLER *m.* Mehitable (ii.), was the son of James and Mary (Sigourney) Butler, his mother having been the granddaughter of Andrew Sigourney, the constable of the Huguenot Colony which settled at Oxford in 1686. His parents lived in Boston before the Revolutionary War, and when hostile movements were apprehended, removed to Maine, where he was born. Later they came to Oxford, he being then five years of age. He was brought up to the trade of his father, that of a hatter. This business they followed some years at Oxford at the old common, where they also kept a tavern and a store. Mr. Butler continued the mercantile business, and also cultivated a small farm, after his father's decease. He was a man of decided character and strict integrity; active in church affairs; had a retentive memory, well stored with the productions of the standard English writers, and also with the local traditions and facts of the town's history, and for general intelligence he exceeded the majority of his fellow-citizens. He was a social, kind-hearted, sympathetic man, unambitious, and indifferent to public preferment.

He was colonel of militia, farmer, an honorable and worthy man, and of the first standing in society.

Capt. ALLEN HANCOCK was among the best citizens of Dudley; a man of great worth, and influential among his fellow-citizens. Farmer; captain of militia.

Col. WILLIAM HANCOCK (ii.) was a merchant and farmer at Dudley; a man of strong mind and sound judgment, well read, of large general intelligence, and of high standing in the estimation of his townsmen. He was very much in public affairs; selectman twelve years, town clerk, State senator, and representative, and member of a committee in 1836 to revise the statutes of the commonwealth; colonel of militia. For many years he was foster-father of the Nichols Academy, having after the death of its founder taken it under his special care; was nineteen years a trustee, during which he devoted much time and labor to the school; had the charge of remodelling and finishing the incompleting building left by Mr. Nichols; was for thirteen years chairman of the committee for hiring teachers, and many years clerk of the corporation. In addition to various smaller contributions to its fund, he gave in 1865 two thousand dollars, the income of which was to be applied to the assistance of needy pupils, and at his death this fund was increased to six thousand dollars. He was gentlemanly in manner, and prepossessing in personal appearance.

THOMAS LEARNED was a man of note in the town of Dudley and vicinity; captain of militia; elected for many years to all the higher town offices; representative to the legislature, guardian under the State of the Nipmuck Indians; was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, enlisted 1779 in Capt. Thomas Fish's company, Oxford, and being of a stately form, was afterward one of a conspicuous company called the "Lafayette Guards." He was a successful farmer and acquired a good estate; was the owner of two farms.

JEDEDIAH MARCY, Esq., was a prominent and respected citizen of Dudley; a farmer, an able business man, and became wealthy; was justice of the peace, much in public affairs, eleven years chairman of selectmen. In 1801 gave to the Poll Parish, at what is now Southbridge, the lot on which the first church stands.

WILLIAM L. MARCY (iii.) studied at Leicester and Woodstock academies, and at Brown University, where he graduated with honors in 1808; studied law at Troy, N. Y., and began practice there; was chosen recorder of the city in 1816 and served two years, being removed on political grounds. He then took the editorship of the "Troy Budget," and brought it into prominence as a democratic paper. In 1821 he received the appointment of adjutant-general of the State militia, and in 1823 was elected by the legislature comptroller of the State, and removed to Albany. To this important office he was re-elected in 1826. He was a member of the "Albany Regency," which then controlled the politics of the State. In 1829 the democratic party, in recognition of his great ability and valuable services, gave him the office of associate justice of the supreme court of the State, which place he filled with much efficiency. In 1831 he was elected senator to congress from New York, and was appointed chairman of the judiciary committee. In 1832 he was elected governor of the State, and in 1834 and 1836 was re-elected, but in 1838 was defeated, William H. Seward being his competitor. President Polk on taking the presidential chair called him to the bureau of secretary of war in his cabinet, the affairs of which department he conducted with marked ability during the war with Mexico. He also proved his statesmanship in the adjustment with the British authorities of the boundary line of Oregon Territory. Upon the elevation of General Pierce to the presidency, Mr. Marcy accepted the position of secretary of state. The affairs of this office he administered with his usual capability and retired from this his last public position with honor.

As an orator he did not excel, but as a writer on public affairs few have surpassed him, his productions having been pointed, close and logical. In person he was above the average size, and had a noble and dignified bearing. Socially he was genial and attractive.

JEDEDIAH MARCY (vi.) was a thriving farmer; inherited a goodly estate which was much enhanced in value by the rapid growth of the town of Southbridge.

ELIJAH DAVIS was a superior mechanic; by occupation a millwright—the first to work at the business in Oxford. From him and his brother Ezra there sprang a school, as it were, of some ten or fifteen skillful artisans, whose services were in requisition in most of the New England States when the era of cotton and woolen manufactures was first opening. He learned the trade of Ebenezer Phelps, formerly of Sutton, then owner of a mill at New Boston, Conn.; worked at it a few years at Oxford, and in 1815 removed to Rutland, Mass., where he owned a saw-mill and grist-mill. There he was much respected and elected to important town offices. In 1832 he removed to Enfield, Mass., living upon a farm, and in 1856 to Warwick, Mass., where he died.

His native talent was good, but his education scanty; he was, nevertheless, an extensive reader, and was very familiar with the Bible.

EZRA DAVIS was a man of good intellectual qualities and strong will, with a decided taste for mechanics, which led him to choose the business of a millwright. He was in the main self-educated, but learned of his brother Elijah the rudiments of the trade, and was able by his own intuitions to advance from step to step in a vocation which required not only skill of hand but also accurate mathematical calculation, until he was called the leading man in his line in Worcester County. His services were in demand in many directions, far and near, in building mill-wheels, fulling-mills, and other similar works. In the fall of 1832, being at work at Clappville, now Rochdale, he was standing upon a water-wheel which was accidentally set in motion by which he was thrown violently down, crushing one hand and injuring him internally so that he died in consequence after a few weeks of painful illness. He was a remarkably industrious man, thrifty, and accumulated a handsome property.

JOSEPH WASHBURN had a limited opportunity for education, having been bound out at seventeen to learn the trade of a housewright. Capt. SAMUEL KIES was the son of John and Mary Kies, of Killingly, Conn.; studied law with his brother Daniel at Brooklyn, Conn., but never practiced. Dr. EBENEZER BORDEN was the son of Dr. Asa Borden, who lived at Scituate, R. I., and removed thence to Spencer, Mass., where he *m.* Deborah Howland in 1771. JACOB DAVIS was a man of more than average ability; studied at Leicester Academy, and in 1787 with his brother Thomas joined his father at Montpelier; taught the first school there, in a log house; was a farmer; had scholarly tastes and a special fondness for mathematics, and in his later years spent much time in solving intricate problems. He was a model gentleman of the old school, quiet and genial, and always dressed in low shoes and knee-breeches, and wore his hair in a cue.

He was noted for his liberality, and in the "year of the famine," so called, nearly seventy years ago, divided his store of corn and provisions with his less fortunate neighbors, until his own family were obliged to live on a limited diet for a considerable time before the next harvest. The latter part of his life he spent at Berlin with Isaac T., his son. He was held in the highest respect and esteem by all who knew him.

EZRA DAVIS (ii.) was a young man of great promise; a teacher. His death was deeply mourned by the circle in which he moved. The following lines are from a poem written upon his decease:

"May we presume to ask the reason why
 So excellent a youth so soon must die?
 One of the noble few that dared to rise
 Above the vulgar, and true wisdom prize—
 One that we fancied at some future day
 Would surely 'lure to heaven and point the way';
 Must it be so, tell us ye heavenly powers,
 Why must he die and such a loss be ours?"

Hon. CORNELIUS LYNDE was the son of John and Ruth Lynde, of Leicester, Mass., and was apprenticed in his youth to learn the clothier's trade, and served till twenty-one years of age; earned the means of getting an education and entered Harvard College. When the revolutionary struggle began he answered the call of his country; left his studies, entered the army and served through the war, attaining the rank of major. After the war he settled at Williamstown, Mass., and in 1786 removed to Williamstown, Vt.; was one of its original proprietors and settlers; laid out and allotted the land to his associates; was justice of the peace, and the first town clerk. In 1796 he built the first saw-mill in the town; was representative from 1791 to 1795; member of the State council 1794 to 1799; the first postmaster of the town; assistant justice of the county court 1797 and 1798. In 1800, at a meeting at his house, a Universalist society was formed, of which he was a prominent member. His wife was a woman of great worth and lovely character.

JAMES LYNDE (ii.) was unmarried; graduated in 1810 at Dartmouth College; studied law with Judge Prentiss, at Montpelier; settled in practice at Williamstown, where he continued till his death. He had remarkable mental powers, but was of a feeble constitution.

THOMAS DAVIS was educated in the common schools of Charlton and at Leicester Academy, closing his studies at the latter 10 July, 1787. He with his brother Jacob went soon after to Montpelier and began clearing the land for occupation. Like his father he was of stalwart constitution, and probably did more hard work in reclaiming the site of the village than any other man. He became the owner of the mills his father had built at the lower or Waterman's falls, and operated them many years. In 1807 he built the elegant and widely known Pavilion Hotel—the finest in the State—and was for some ten or twelve years its proprietor and popular landlord. Later he removed to his father's old residence, the jail house, where he was for a long time jailer. He afterward retired and lived with his son, at whose house he died, aged ninety-two years and eight months. He was among the most public spirited and noble hearted of Montpelier's citizens, and did very much to advance its interests. He presented the State with the ground on which the State house stands; he gave his

father's spacious dwelling, which had been occupied as a hotel, to the county for a jail and jailer's house; and he also gave the land on which the Brick church—now Bethany church—stands, and was a constituent member of the first Congregational society, formed in 1800. His means became considerably reduced in his old age through his liberality and an unfortunate investment in mill building.

He was a remarkably unobtrusive and exemplary man, avoiding giving offence, and practicing the virtues which make the worthy man and good citizen. Hon. E. P. Walton, who knew him well, said: "I do not remember ever to have heard from his lips a single idle word."

DAVID WING, JR., removed with his father's family from Rochester, Mass., to Montpelier in 1790, settling upon a farm in the easterly part of the town. He had received a very good common-school education, and taught the second school kept in the town in the house of Col. Jacob Davis, in 1791. Thompson, in his history of Montpelier, says: "He was a young man of unusual promise and capacity for public business." In 1793 he was chosen town clerk, which office he filled until his death in 1806. His rapid promotions in important public positions indicate his superior talents and moral worth. From the office

of town clerk he rose to be representative, judge of county court, and secretary of state, successively. But his career was short. At the age of forty years a malignant fever suddenly took him away. His death was greatly lamented as a loss not alone to the town but to the State.

Hon. Gen. PARLEY DAVIS was among the most eminent of the early members of the Samuel Davis family. When he was about a year old his father removed from Oxford to Dudley, and died there six years afterward, leaving three sons, who were placed under the guardianship of their uncle Ebenezer, at Charlton. Parley lived for a time with his uncle Haynes Learned, at Ward, Mass. — now Auburn — and later with his uncle Ebenezer. He acquired a good common-school education

and finished his studies at the then new Leicester Academy, where he had learned the art of surveying, and thus fitted himself for the career of usefulness before him. In 1785 his uncle Jacob Davis, of Charlton—who had become interested in the opening of a new settlement in the wilds of central Vermont—contracted with the company of which he was a member to survey and lay out the lots to settlers, a grant of land having been made at the site of Montpelier. The next year, 1786, the surveying party entered the tract and during the season completed the survey, Parley being twenty years of age, and acting as assistant. In May, 1787, he accompanied his uncle from Brookfield to the new town and aided in taking permanent possession. In June he selected and surveyed for himself a lot of about three hundred acres at the centre of the town, “which became his home for a long and honorable life.” About this time he and his uncle were appointed a committee to lay out and construct public roads. At the organization of the town in 1791 he was chosen constable and collector. He was the first justice of the peace in the village. In 1799 and 1802 he represented the town in the legislature. He was captain of the first military company, formed in 1794, and later was major and brigadier-general, and commanded the Plattsburg volunteers at Burlington, 10 Sept. 1814. In 1805 he was placed at the head of a commission to open a highway from Montpelier to Burlington. About twenty-five years afterward, when the subject of a railroad from Boston to Ogdensburgh was under consideration, he was appointed chairman of a committee of the town to consider the subject and report upon it. This report, of which he is understood to have been the author, was very able and gained the highest credit for the committee, and gave a great impulse to public opinion. He had not only large business capacity but possessed tact and energy to make his talents effective; consequently he was retained in the public service, and there is hardly a page of the records of the first fifty years of Montpelier’s history on which his name does not appear. Personally he was exceedingly social and attractive, “genial and full of pleasant stories.” He had a benevolent disposition and was peculiarly thoughtful for the young, being interested in the schools and active and liberal in the founding of a town library. His name stands

among the most honored of the public-spirited benefactors of the village of Montpelier. The witty Dr. Edward Lamb, in speaking of the three brothers, Hezekiah, Nathaniel, and Parley, all of whom he knew intimately, said: "Hezekiah is Magnus, Nathaniel, Major, and Parley, Maximus."

Mrs. Davis was a person of rare gifts and accomplishments; studied medicine and surgery; ably performed the duties of physician among the early settlers of Montpelier, and for skill in surgery especially had a wide reputation.

Maj. NATHANIEL DAVIS was conspicuous among the early business men of Montpelier. Little is known of his early history, except that he lived, after his father's death, at Charlton, under the guardianship of his uncle, Ebenezer Davis. He went to Montpelier in 1789, settling in the north-east part of the town, now set off as East Montpelier. In 1793 he built a saw-mill on his farm, cutting the timber and clearing his land rapidly. In 1795 he built a large two-story dwelling—now standing, and the oldest house in the town. Here his only son, Col. Nathaniel, died in 1879. Before 1800 he built potash works and a store, where for about twenty-five years he did a large and successful business, and his store and house, says Mr.

Thompson, were at one time a fashionable resort for trade and visiting for a large tract of the surrounding country, including even to a considerable extent the great village of Montpelier. Soon after 1810 he began building at what is now East Calais, erecting a saw-mill, grist-mill, nail factory, and scythe works, and also opened a store. This property subsequently came into the possession of his daughters, who married, one the Hon. Shubael Wheeler and another Samuel Rich, Jr. In 1825 Mr. Davis turned his attention more exclusively to agricultural pursuits, and in company with his son, Col. Nathaniel, added farm to farm, raising and fattening cattle until their production of marketable beeves was more than a hundred head per annum. About 1838 he with his son built a woolen mill at North Montpelier, three hundred feet long and three stories in height, at which for a time business flourished. A partner from a neighboring town was admitted, who, having more pretence than judgment and integrity, was the means of the speedy failure of the concern, and "the almost total ruin of the fine estate which Major Davis had been a lifetime in accumulating by his honest industry." The failure was a crushing blow to him, and in his advanced years he retired to the homestead and assisted in managing the affairs of the farm. His wife died soon after their retirement and he followed in a few years. He was a man of remarkable business capacity and energy, and aimed to lead the northern part of the town in business enterprise, and did so. He was greatly esteemed, and to this day is spoken of with high respect by those who knew him, and is remembered with pride by his descendants.

HEZEKIAH DAVIS was the youngest of the three sons of Nathaniel Davis, of Dudley, who went to Montpelier; settled on a farm on East Hill, at quite a distance from the village, and became one of the most independent farmers of the place. He was a man of character and intelligence, but was of a retiring disposition and not ambitious to mingle in public affairs.

Doubtless Dr. Lamb's appellation, "Magnus," was not an unmeaning compliment, but may be understood as indicating that he was a very worthy and honorable man.

RICHARD FOSTER, when he was about ten years of age, went with his father from Salisbury to Hanover, N. H. They settled on the farm which was granted to Rev. Eden Burroughs as the first minister of that town. Richard continued to live upon the farm and became a worthy man and a prominent and active member of the Congregational church. After the death of his wife he lived with his sons.

EDEN BURROUGHS FOSTER (i.) graduated at Dartmouth College, taking the degree of A. B., in 1837. Studied theology at Andover; settled first, 1841, at Henniker, N. H.; next, in 1848, at Pelham, N. H., and thence, in 1853, he removed to Lowell, Mass. In 1861 he went to West Springfield, Mass., and in 1866 returned to Lowell, where he continued his labors till his death, 11 April, 1882. His ministry here of twenty-one years was specially successful. "He was a man of clear, massive powers, a well-read scholar, a logical and forcible preacher, and a tender and faithful pastor."

WILLIAM COWPER FOSTER (iii.) graduated at Dartmouth College in 1841, studied theology at Union Seminary, New York city; ordained pastor at Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, 13 Oct. 1847; dismissed 27 May, 1849; settled over Shawmut Church, Boston, 25 Oct. 1849; dismissed 16 Jan. 1852; installed at Central Church, Lawrence, 16 Jan. 1852; dismissed 17 Feb. 1857; settled at North Becket, Mass., 1860; dismissed 15 Nov. 1863; labored as an evangelist a number of years; lost his eyesight, retired, and now lives at Middletown, Conn. He was a good preacher, and his labors as an evangelist were considered very successful.

DANIEL FOSTER (iv.) graduated at Dartmouth College, 1841; licensed as a Congregational minister; ordained 1849 as a Methodist, and later was a Unitarian missionary in Kansas;

was chaplain of the Massachusetts house of representatives in 1859. He went in 1862 as chaplain of the thirty-third regiment Massachusetts volunteers in the late war; was made captain of a company in the thirty-seventh regiment of colored troops, and in that rank lost his life at Chapin's Bluff, Va., 30 Sept. 1864. He was for many years before the war prominent as an anti-slavery man; preached at Huntington, Mass., and Concord, Mass.

CHARLES FOSTER (vi.) graduated at Dartmouth College, 1840; studied law and began practice in 1849 at Washington, Iowa; removed to Le Claire; was elected to the senate of Iowa, 1857; enlisted, 21 April, 1861, in the late war; promoted to the rank of captain in the eleventh regiment Iowa volunteers 1 Oct. 1861, and to that of major, 1 Sept. 1862; was wounded at Atlanta, Ga., 26 July, 1864, while on duty as adjutant, and died in consequence, at Cincinnati, while on his way home. Col. LEARNED LAMB went among the early settlers from Charlton to Montpelier, where he was well known and much respected. "He was noted for his towering form, military tastes, ready wit and lashing satire;" was many years colonel of militia, and in the war of 1812 was commissioned as captain. He was a carpenter, millwright, and bridge-builder, and for a number of years the leading man in this line of business in Montpelier; framed the first state-house and many other large structures in the town and vicinity; built the first bridges over most of the main streams in and about Montpelier; was a member of the Congregational society at its formation in 1800. He removed in 1817 to Louisville, Ky., where he died.

Lieut. EZRA DAVIS was left fatherless at seven years of age, was brought up under the guardianship of his uncle Jacob Davis, in Charlton, and at the age of fifteen or sixteen years went to Boston, entering as clerk the store of Capt. John Brazer, a well-known merchant on Dock square, then the heart of the city. By his industry and tact he arose rapidly, became a partner in the business, and married the daughter of Mr. Brazer. For a number of years the trade was carried on under the name of Brazer & Davis. Later Mr. Brazer retired and Mr. Davis conducted the business alone. The operations of the house were such as to require frequent visits to foreign countries. Mr. Davis learned the French language, conducted the correspondence and made many voyages to Europe and the West Indies. As operations increased he became interested in ship-

ping and was the owner of vessels. His estate has now claims before congress for damages for losses by the French privateers. On 8 Feb. 1813, he sailed from Boston on the schooner "Enterprise, Devereaux, master, bound for a port in France. On 10 March the schooner was taken by the sloop-of-war "Lyra," put in charge of a prize-master and ordered to Corunna, Spain. Mr. Davis, against his protest and declaration that if transferred he must be put in the "Lyra's" boat by force, was removed from the "Enterprise." On twenty-first of the month the "Lyra" captured the "Gold Coiner," of New York, put the prize in charge of her second lieutenant and ordered her to Plymouth, England. Mr. Davis having been assured by the "Lyra's" officers that he would not be held as a prisoner of war on reaching England, was at his own request placed on board the "Gold Coiner." On arriving at Plymouth he was directed to go to the admiral's office, and was at once committed to Mill Prison, and was afterward removed to the prison hulk "Hector." He was in Paris during the "Reign of Terror" and saw Robespierre guillotined.

In the later part of his life he held a position in the Boston custom house. In 1801 he became a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, of Boston. He was also an officer in the "Washington Light Infantry."

In person he was tall, erect, and prepossessing. His large-hearted generosity and his sociability made him a favorite in the large circle in which he moved.

JOHN BRAZER DAVIS (i.) fitted for college at Exeter Academy, graduated at Harvard, 1815, the second in his class, being seventeen years of age. This class included J. A. Lowell, J. G. Palfrey, Theophilus Parsons, and Jared Sparks, the latter being room-mate of Davis. He taught a select school on Chestnut street, Salem; was tutor in Harvard College, 1819 and 1820; studied law and was admitted attorney, at Boston, April, 1821; for five years was representative from Boston in the legislature; aid-de-camp to Governor Lincoln; for two years editor of the Boston "Patriot and Chronicle." In the history of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, we find the following: "Lieut.-Col. J. B. Davis, Boston, lawyer; grandson of Capt. Brazer, 1786, and son of Lieut. Davis, 1801, a gentleman of great promise in his profession, and has been much distinguished

in our public affairs for one of his years." In a notice of him at the time of his death, the Boston "Atlas" said: "Mr. Davis was in good health but a few days ago and addressed his fellow-citizens in Faneuil Hall on the evening preceding our annual State election. He was a young man of acknowledged talent and promise, and acted a conspicuous part in bringing about the union of parties upon which our State politics have for the last few years rested. Having lately relinquished his connection with politics, he had devoted his attention mainly to the legal profession, in which he bade fair to rise to distinction."

The late Hon. Josiah Quincy, in a recent letter, says: "In about 1827 I hired an office of him in what is now Brazer's building, which stands at the corner of State and Devonshire streets, on the site of the first church, contiguous to his own. He was the executor and sole trustee of the property of his grandfather, John Brazer, who left a large estate on Dock square, Exchange, State, Kilby and Franklin streets. Being almost the only wealthy member of the Jefferson party, he owned the greatest part if not the whole of the "Patriot," of which his grandson was editor, until he sold it to Nathan Hale and it was merged in the "Advertiser." In 1825 we became brother aids in the military family of Governor Lincoln, and as such attended Gen. Lafayette during his last visit to the State, beside frequent other meetings at various reviews, etc. On his death in 1832 I became his administrator and succeeded to all his trusts. He was a good man and a thorough gentleman. I am most happy to aid in keeping green the memory of such a man."

His wife was a very rare woman, and highly educated, under the care of Gen. Henry Dearborn.

EZRA DAVIS (vii.) was in early life in the East India trade, making many voyages to Calcutta, the islands of the Archipelago, and to China. Subsequently he was in mercantile business in New Orleans, and later a sugar planter in St. Charles Parish, La.

Gen. JOHN SPURR was a man of more than ordinary strength of character; a patriot in the Revolutionary War, and one of the party which threw overboard the British tea in Boston Harbor. He was an old school Jeffersonian, an active opposer of the federalists, and was leader of his party in Charlton; held the higher town offices, representative, etc.; an energetic and successful farmer; was interested in military affairs, and general of the militia. In person he was tall, erect, genteel, and of striking presence, and in bearing very courteous and gentlemanly.

His wife was a very worthy woman, highly respected, and remarkable for her personal beauty.

Col. CALEB CURTIS was the son of Rev. Caleb Curtis, the first minister of Charlton, Mass., and was among the first settlers of Calais, Vt., going there prior to 1795; a farmer, and a man of much strength of character and decided moral convictions, whose life was a standing rebuke to evil-doers; representative to the State legislature; an efficient promoter of education in his village, and was instrumental in building a church in a destitute part of the town. He was one of the best of the citizens of Calais, and highly esteemed. He was twice married after the death of Polly Davis, his first wife.

Capt. Rev. EDWARD TURNER was in scholarly and literary attainments one of the foremost of the supporters of Universalism in its earlier days; the associate and friend of Hosea Ballou; his equal in talent and his superior in culture. He was the son of Seth Turner, of Medfield, Mass., a farmer of literary tastes, who in 1786 removed from that place to Sturbridge, Mass. Of his early life little is known; but we find him at seventeen years of age a pupil at Leicester Academy. He was naturally inclined to study, was always a great reader, and seems to have been in the main self-educated. His first marriage occurred in 1794. He preached his first sermon at Bennington, Vt., in 1798; was licensed by the general convention in 1800, and subsequently, until about the time of his second marriage in 1808, itinerated, preaching at Southbridge, Brookfield, Oxford, Dudley, Milford, Boston and Gloucester, making his home

meantime with his father at Sturbridge. In 1809 he was settled as pastor at Salem; removed thence in 1814 to Charlestown, where he remained until 1823. In 1824 he went to Portsmouth, N. H., where he continued until 1828, when he returned to Charlton to take the charge of a new Unitarian church formed there, and severed his connection with the Universalist denomination. In 1832 he removed to Fishkill, N. Y., where he had the pastorate of a Unitarian church until 1840, when he returned to Charlestown, Mass., and after one year went to reside with his son-in-law, Mr. Charles Brewer, at Jamaica Plain, where he spent his remaining years, preaching as supply at various places.

In character he was gentle, unselfish and unambitious; had a sensitive and sympathetic nature, delicacy of feeling, purity of purpose and inexhaustible kindness of heart. As a preacher he was in his earlier ministry zealous and full of fervor, and at times eloquent, but in later years assumed a more quiet style.

Mrs. Turner was a wise counsellor, and a devoted and sympathetic helper in every good work — whose praises were in all the churches.

RUFUS DAVIS began life with good prospects; settled on a valuable farm of one hundred and sixty acres which he received from his father, and which was once a part of the Indian reserve in the easterly part of Dudley. He prospered for a time, was a very hard-working, honest man, and was appreciated by his townsmen, having been elected town clerk from 1809 to 1815. He, however, partially on account of over-doing, broke down

early, lost his vigor, his courage and his property, and died at the age of fifty-three. Hundreds of rods of substantial stone wall now standing on his old farm attest his energy and industry.

LEVI DAVIS in 1808 took possession of the homestead in Charlton, his father having died in 1807. He lived there until 1814, when he sold to Samuel Kies [85] and started on a tour of observation to the far west, namely: New York State. Not finding a satisfactory place to settle, he returned, and the next year went to Columbus, Chenango County, N. Y., whither his wife's father had removed from Canton, Mass., in 1795. He remained there till April, 1816, when he removed to Dryden, Tompkins County, where he lived about nine years, but suffered financially on account of an unfortunate co-partnership in which he was interested. In 1825 he purchased one hundred and forty-four acres of wild land (to which he added largely afterward) at Troupsburg, now Greenwood, Steuben County, and there made a permanent settlement. He took his family into a location in a wilderness where the nearest dwelling was four miles up the creek; built a substantial log house, and there struggled courageously with poverty and the privations of frontier life until he saw himself surrounded by a flourishing village, of which he might justly call himself the founder. He was public-spirited and interested in the growth and improve-

ment of the place; was the first to establish trade there, and from the first settlement to the present time this business has been continued by the family, and now prospers under the name of John Davis & Co. He was for thirty years in the lumber business. He also from the first, for many years, kept a tavern in the original log-house, and about 1840 built the "Ward House" as it now is, excepting that the third story has been added. He was the first supervisor of the town, and for twenty-five years its first postmaster. He was an industrious, thorough-going business man of strict integrity; had uncommon executive ability, and his high character and sound judgment secured to him the sincere respect and esteem of the community in which he lived.

His wife was a remarkably fine woman, of large-hearted benevolent disposition, and was possessed of the virtues which go to make up the highest type of true womanly character.

Capt. AARON DAVIS went, at the age of twenty-two, with his brother Levi from Charlton to New York State in search of a place in which to settle. They both resided for a time at Dryden, Tompkins County. About 1834 Aaron removed from Dryden to Portage, on the Genesee River, having been married, lost his wife and re-married, at Dryden. At Portage he bought the Fort Hill farm of four hundred acres. This farm is located

about three miles above the falls, near where the high bridge spans the river. Here he labored diligently, and gathering heavy crops from the rich intervals became wealthy. Later in life he was unfortunate and in 1842 saw the fruits of his toil swept away through his indiscretion in endorsing notes for his friends. In the summer of 1845, while hoeing corn in his field, he fell and died instantly.

EDWARD D. LEARNED was a man of superior talents; graduated at Bowdoin College, taught school, studying law meantime, at Augusta or Hallowell, Me.; went to Havana, where he remained a short time, and thence, about 1828, to Mississippi, practicing law at Pearlington, Monticello, Gallatin and Jackson, at which place he settled, built up a flourishing business, and owned a large landed estate. He died suddenly at the age of thirty-seven of an epidemic, greatly lamented, the community losing by his decease one of its most honored members.

Four of his sons lived to maturity and were all sailors. Three of them made one or more voyages round the world.

CHARLES E. LEARNED (i.) attended the common schools at Gardiner, Me., whither the eldest three sons were sent after their father's death to be educated. There he was thrown in contact with sea-faring men; shipped before the mast; was soon promoted to supercargo, trading with China and the East Indies until the discovery of gold in California, when he left the sea for mining speculation, which he followed with the usual miner's luck—large fortunes in prospective never realized; died there.

FRANCIS EUGENE LEARNED (ii.) was educated in the common schools of Gardiner, Me.; went to sea before he was of age and arose rapidly to command; was captain and part owner of the first steamer which ran between San Francisco and Sacramento. Dissatisfied with fresh water navigation he returned

to the sea, and as master and owner of ship and cargo, trading on his own account, in Jan. 1853, sailed from Cartagena, South America, for Baltimore, and died on the voyage.

HENRY AUGUSTUS LEARNED (iii.) attended the common schools with his brothers at Gardiner, Maine, and like them took to the salt water; was in California for a few months soon after the discovery of gold there, but continued to follow the sea, being promoted until he became first mate of the bark "M. de Embril," which sailed March, 1855, from New York for Santander, Spain, and was never heard from.

RUFUS F. LEARNED (vi.) was born in Mississippi; educated in the schools at Winslow, Maine; had the roving disposition of his brothers; went to California at sixteen years of age, thence to Australia at eighteen, where he was half owner of a ten-mile mining ditch, and when of age returned home to Mississippi on a visit and was induced to remain. He voted against secession, but the act having passed, joined the confederate army and at the close of the war found himself penniless. Accepting the new order of things he made the best of his talents and surroundings, and is now among the leading business men of Natchez, being a lumber dealer and manufacturer, and owner and operator of a steam saw-mill at that place and having a branch of the same business at New Orleans. He has also been part owner of a cotton manufactory at Natchez.

ABISHA LEARNED, Esq., was a man of strong mind and sound common sense ; was in his young manhood a successful teacher ; cultivated a farm and operated a saw-mill, doing a considerable business in the lumber trade. He was public-spirited and filled some of the highest town offices ; school committee, assessor, and was for many years a justice of the peace. In his bearing he was gentlemanly and cordial, had a pleasing address, and was possessed of more than ordinary general intelligence ; in temperament, deliberate, cool and self-possessed. He was among the highly esteemed citizens of Oxford ; active in church matters, and when the Episcopal church was established at South Leicester, now Rochdale, he left the church in Oxford to unite with it. He lived and died in the house at North

Oxford built by his grandfather, Gen. Ebenezer Learned, after his return from the Revolutionary War, he having received it through his father. This estate since the death of his widow has passed out of the possession of the Learned family.

In 1831 he built a large stone woolen-mill on his premises, which he rented to his son-in-law, Edward Denny. This mill was burned in 1833 and rebuilt the same year. The second mill was burned in 1850 and was not rebuilt.

EDWARD DENNY (i.) was the son of Nathaniel P. Denny, of Leicester, Mass.; educated at Leicester Academy; went to Boston, entering as clerk the store of Daniel Denny & Co., and while yet young was appointed by Mr. Joshua Clapp superintendent of his woolen mills at Clappville, now Rochdale, where he remained a number of years; began business for himself at North Oxford in 1831, having rented a mill of Abisha Learned; remained there until 1836, when he removed to Worcester, the mill having been burned and rebuilt in 1833. His next manufacturing operations were at Barre Plains, two or three years later, where he bought property and settled, doing a thriving business until his decease. After the death of his wife he married again, but lived only a short time after his second marriage. He had three children by his first marriage; two died young, and the surviving daughter married John C., son of Hon. Geo. Bancroft, the historian.

Mr. Denny was a man of good business talent, pleasing address, and was generally respected; was at one time a member of the governor's council. His business career was one of general prosperity, and he died possessed of a comfortable fortune.

ELIZABETH R. LEARNED (ii.) was a woman of superior mind, refined and cultivated tastes, brilliant wit, and engaging manners, with great buoyancy of spirits, which endowments drew to her a circle of admiring friends. She was, however, a confirmed invalid most of her life, and consequently her circle of influence was circumscribed. During her few later years she was a great sufferer, and was therefore almost entirely isolated. But her memory will not soon fade. She died possessed of an estate of over ten thousand dollars, the whole

of which she bequeathed in trust as a permanent fund, the income of which is to be given to aid the needy, worthy women and orphans of Oxford.

Hon. SYLVANUS LEARNED early developed uncommon natural talents, but had few educational advantages. He, however, made the best of his opportunities and fitted himself while young for a teacher and taught three years in the public schools of Oxford. Soon after his marriage he removed to the then far west, settling in 1820 at Peruville, Tompkins County, N. Y., where he lived greatly honored and respected. He was an efficient promoter of education, a champion of truth and justice, and a cordial sympathizer with the oppressed and down-trodden. He was active in political matters and was elected justice of the peace in 1827, and filled the office with much ability for more than twenty-five years. He was school commissioner for seven years; first president of Groton Academy eight years; loan

commissioner for the county four years; and in 1843 was member of the assembly.

On 17 May, 1870, he left home to visit his son William L. Learned, at Lansing, Mich., and began failing in strength immediately on his arrival. He continued to decline till the second day of June, when he died, at nearly 82 years of age.

WILLIAM L. LEARNED (i.) lived at Hudson, Mich., where he was in trade from 1841 to 1849. In 1850 he removed to St. Anthony, Minn., where he was elected to the territorial legislature. In 1854 he removed to Anoka, Minn., where he managed for a heavy firm the building of a costly dam and mills, and continued there in milling and real estate business till the breaking out of the late war. He enlisted as a soldier and was promoted to the rank of lieutenant in the signal corps, and was presented with a flag for marked services. On account of ill health he resigned in 1863. In 1864 he enlisted and served about a year in a company raised to fight the Indians in north-western Minnesota. Later, with his wife and son, he joined a company of emigrants for Idaho, which was driven back by the Indians to Fort Rice, where he remained four years. From thence he returned to Lansing, where he was actively identified with the business interests of the place till his death. He was a highly respected citizen, and had numerous friends from whom he had won esteem by his honor and probity.

EDWARD DAVIS (ii.) was a respected and influential citizen of Peruville; benevolent, upright, honorable, and beloved by all who knew him.

Col. STEPHEN DAVIS was a farmer; born and spent his whole life on the "Esquire Edward Davis" homestead; was highly respected and considerably in public life; county commissioner, and from 1821 to 1830 most of the time in town office; selectman, school committee, etc.; colonel of militia; officer in the Congregational society. He was a man of good judgment and sound sense—very social, courteous, and of pleasing address.

Gen. NELSON H. DAVIS (iii.) graduated in 1846 at West Point, and went the same year into the Mexican War, joining Gen. Taylor's command at Monterey; marched to Tampico, where he joined Gen. Scott's forces, and was in his army during the war, having been at the siege of Vera Cruz, the battle of Cerro Gordo, the storming of Contreras, the capture of Cherubusco, and subsequent engagements near the Mexican capital, including the capture of the city. He was brevetted for meritorious conduct at the battle of Contreras. He left Mexico in 1848 with the army, and in November of that year sailed from New York for California, arriving at Monterey, April, 1849; served in California until Dec. 1853, at remote stations, mainly in the Indian country, and engaged in two notable and successful fights with large bodies of natives at Clear Lake and on Russian River. In 1854 he returned to the east and was on recruiting duty at Boston until the summer of 1855. In the fall of that year he again went west and served on the frontier until the spring of 1861, when he and his company were ordered east and engaged in the late civil war. He was acting

major of the "regular" battalion at the first battle of Bull Run; commissioned colonel of the seventh Massachusetts volunteers 4 Sept. 1861; resigned 12 Nov. 1861, at which time he was appointed assistant inspector-general, United States army.

In the late war he served in the "Army of the Potomac," at headquarters under McClellan, Hooker and Meade, and was subsequently ordered to the department of New Mexico, which included also Arizona, as inspector-general of the department. Here he traveled much among hostile Indians, and with his command had a severe engagement with the Apaches, attacking them in their mountain retreats and giving them the first severe whipping they had received for many years, for which the legislature of Arizona gave him a vote of thanks. He was later removed to Missouri, where he was inspector of that department, and afterward for three years was inspector-general under direct orders from the War Department. He was next inspector-general of the division of the Atlantic, under Gen Hancock, and 1 July, 1881, was assigned to duty in the same capacity in the division of the Missouri, under Lieut.-Gen. Sheridan, in which position he is now, 1882, serving.

Gen. Davis has held every grade of rank from brevet second lieutenant to that of colonel in his corps inspector-general's department, and brevet brigadier-general in the army, and now holds the two latter grades; has been brevetted for services in the Mexican War, War of the Rebellion, and in Indian fights; has traveled and been on duty in every State and territory in the Union.

LUTHER WARREN, Esq., was a farmer and tavern-keeper on Killingly Hill, at the old Capt. John Felshaw stand; a model landlord, jovial and convivial; an ardent and influential democrat. Warren's Tavern was widely known and popular, much frequented by travelers and local politicians. Balls and courts were frequently held there, and training days were specially notable. Esquire Warren was a very able, active and public-spirited citizen, much interested in military and public affairs; a prominent Freemason; was wealthy for the times.

GEORGE WARREN (v.) was a farmer; had excellent natural endowments, and the attractive social qualities which made him popular; a man of sincerity and strict integrity. He was judge of probate for Killingly and sheriff of Windham County. Later, when the town of Putnam was organized he was active in the movement and was chairman of the first board of selectmen chosen 3 July, 1855, and on the following day, which was celebrated with great enthusiasm in honor of our national independence and of the organization of the new town also, he was the chief marshal.

FREDERICK TYLER was the son of Capt. Daniel and Sarah (Edwards) Tyler, prominent people of Brooklyn, Conn., and descended through his mother from Jonathan Edwards. After marriage he remained on a farm in Brooklyn a number of years, and thence removed to Hunter, N. Y., in the Mohawk Valley, where he owned and operated a large tannery. In 1838 he returned to Hartford, Conn., and engaged in the coal trade. He was a capable and successful business man. His wife was a constituent member of the Abington "Ladies' Library Association," founded in 1813, and which flourished over sixty years. The old spinning-wheel on which she spun flax the while she was reading Sir Charles Grandison and other similar books, is cherished as a sacred relic by her daughter, Mrs. Cowen, now of Hartford.

GEORGE F. TYLER (iii.) was a coal dealer in New York and later in Philadelphia; retired from active business in 1867; now resides in Philadelphia. Has with his family spent several years in Europe recently.

ROBERT O. TYLER (vi.) was a graduate of West Point; served with distinction in the late war; was lieutenant-colonel and brevet major-general United States army; received a wound at Cold Harbor from which he died.

EDWIN I. TYLER (vii.) went in boyhood to Hartford, and has since resided there; coal dealer.

Doct. ROBERT GROSVENOR was the son of Joshua, of Pomfret, Conn., a descendant of John and Esther, first settlers of that place. After studying his profession with Doct. Warner and Doct. Jonathan Hall, and being licensed to practice at the age of twenty, he settled on Killingly Hill and acquired an extensive business, continuing for fifty-five consecutive years. He was a man of strong and decided character, had a powerful hold upon his patients, and was received as an oracle in many households in a large section of the country. He was a staunch adherent to the old heroic medical practice, and few of his patients escaped blood-letting and a course of calomel. A shrewd and successful financier, he engaged somewhat in manufacturing enterprises, and was one of the proprietors of the Howe Factory. He was an active member of the church and ecclesiastical society, and served as committee in building the meeting-house at Killingly, and in other public affairs. He was of commanding presence, genial disposition, and was possessed of sterling qualities of head and heart.

HEZEKIAH HOWE studied with Rev. Elisha Atkins, of Killingly; taught school at sixteen years of age in a notoriously

insubordinate district, floored the rebels at the first onset and brought the school to order; assisted his father in business affairs till about 1807, when he removed to Pawtucket, engaging in trade and the manufacture of cotton goods and machinery in the firm of David Wilkinson & Co. He won the confidence of the community, was director in the Manufacturers' Bank, and in the war of 1812 was instrumental in raising a company of soldiers. He was active in the formation of an Episcopal society in the village, and aided in building St. Paul's church and served as junior warden and chorister. He built a fine residence, now standing, and known as the "Slater mansion." Having had from childhood a pulmonary trouble, he found it advisable to remove from Pawtucket, and in 1819 returned to Killingly and the old homestead. Here he passed a few years in quiet, maintaining the delightful hospitality for which the home had ever been famous. In 1827, with restored health, he removed to Wilkinsonville, Mass., went into partnership with David Wilkinson, and bought and operated a cotton mill at Saundersville, Grafton. Business flourished greatly for a time. A bank was instituted by the firm, and other promising plans projected, when a financial crisis swept every thing away and he was forced to begin the world anew. Cohoes Falls, New York — then a forlorn hamlet — was chosen as a place for new enterprises, which were begun 1 May, 1830.

The history of Cohoes says: "Mr. Howe had a most important part in shaping the fortunes of this place, and was prominent among those who laid here the foundations of a large and prosperous city. He had contracts for constructing the first canals of the Cohoes company; was engaged in general business here at different times, and was for over twenty years post-master." Here, as at Pawtucket, he was forward in procuring the establishment of Episcopal worship, and he saw St. John's church extend till from four communicants it embraced four hundred families.

Bereavements in the death of wife, sons, and his eldest daughter shadowed his life, and resigning his offices in city and church, he returned with his sole surviving child to Danielsonville, Conn., where he spent his remaining years at the Episcopal parsonage. Many attest his christian loveliness of character and private life, and his fortitude and submission

under trials. "His firm integrity and gentle kindness of manner endeared him to many friends, and his death was deeply lamented. His remains were borne back to St. John's church, Cohoes, where a large assembly of old friends and neighbors gathered to do him honor as he lay in state for hours before that altar where he so loved to worship."

DAVID W. LELAND *m.* Maria W. (i.), was a man of strong mind, sound principles, and great moral courage, and was influential in Charleston, where he resided. He was one of the few who dared to take a stand for the right and to defend Hon. Samuel Hoar when he was attacked by a mob in that city in 1840.

SMITH WILKINSON was the first successful cotton manufacturer in Connecticut. He was the youngest son in that remarkable Rhode Island family which was so prominent in establishing this manufacture in America, and was one of the "Pomfret Manufacturing Company," which bought one thousand acres around the falls at the present site of Putnam, where only a saw-mill, grist-mill, and clothier's works, with perhaps three or four houses, were then standing. Here he took the sole management of affairs, erected a mill and other necessary buildings, and remained as agent and proprietor for over forty years. With strong individuality, keen insight and large business capacity, his influence was deeply impressed on his generation. Under his autocratic rule "Pomfret Factory" was made a model village. Order and discipline were strictly maintained, idleness, drunkenness, profanity, Sabbath-breaking, and even ball-playing on Fast-day, were rigidly prohibited. This state of affairs was conducive to thrift, and during the war of 1812 the company flourished and skillfully tided over the succeeding depression which ruined so many other similar enterprises in the region. In 1826 Mr. Wilkinson became the chief proprietor of the village and materially enlarged its operations, building a large stone mill and otherwise improving the estate, adding to it judiciously as opportunity offered from time to time. He was much interested in all the vital questions of the day; an earnest advocate of temperance, a zealous anti-mason and anti-slavery man, and battled all forms of error, as he saw it, with strong will and vehement partisanship, his tenacious memory and unyielding combativeness making him a formidable opponent.

He was through life a lover of books and polite literature, and could repeat from memory the greater part of "Paradise Lost," "Pope's Essay on Man," "The Course of Time," and other popular favorites. His house was the centre of refined and graceful hospitality, entertaining an almost constant succession of visitors, Mrs. Wilkinson presiding with that gracious affability characteristic of her family.

He was interested in public improvements, and when the Norwich and Worcester railroad was projected gave it his hearty encouragement. This road was in a few years instrumental in revolutionizing affairs in the Quinebaug valley, and

“Pomfret Factory” was superseded by modern “Putnam.” In the development of the new town he took a lively concern, and assisted materially in procuring its legal organization. In 1848 he retired from active business and quietly passed his few remaining years. He was early connected with the Congregational church on Killingly Hill, and was a friend and supporter of christian and benevolent institutions.

REV. GEORGE J. TILLOTSON *m.* Rebecca (ii.), graduated at Yale College, 1825; ordained pastor of the Congregational church at Brooklyn, Conn., 25 May, 1831; dismissed 10 March, 1858. He helped to build up the Congregational church at Putnam; has been for many years a Fellow of Yale College; contributed largely toward founding the normal institute for colored people, at Austin, Texas, which bears his name. His residence is at Wethersfield, Conn.

EDMUND WILKINSON (iv.) early engaged with his father in manufacturing; was active in promoting the interests of the new town of Putnam, gave the land for both railroad tracks, and expended much labor and money in procuring the incorporation of the town. His present residence is Greenwich, Conn.

Rev. JOHN LAURIS BLAKE, D. D., was the son of Jonathan Blake, one of the first settlers of Northwood, N. H.; was apprenticed to learn a trade at thirteen years of age; by overwork purchased his indentures for the purpose of studying and entering the ministry; graduated at Brown University in 1812, having paid his expenses by teaching; was licensed to preach as a Congregationalist in 1813; changed to the Episcopal form and was admitted as deacon 1815, and organized the St. Paul's parish at North Providence, now Pawtucket, remaining in charge until 1820. He then opened a young ladies' school at Concord, N. H., taking also the rectorship of a mission church at Hopkinton. In 1822 he removed his school to Boston, and became pastor of St. Matthew's church at South Boston. His health failing, he removed in 1836 to New York, and thence in

1846 to Orange, N. J., where he died. He received the degree of D. D. from Augusta College, Ky., and was an active member of various literary societies. From 1811, when he began literary work, his pen was never idle, and the list of his published works numbers more than fifty. His principal production was his Biographical Dictionary, although his school-books were very popular, and of his Natural Philosophy one hundred and fifty thousand copies were sold.

Col. MORRIS LARNED was a leading citizen of Dudley. Being of a slender constitution he left his father's farm in young manhood and engaged in trade in partnership with Phineas Bemis, but later returned to farming, which he continued through life. He had good business talents, firm integrity, was popular, and filled for many years important offices; was town clerk seven years, chairman of selectmen five years, representative to general court three years; colonel of militia. His golden wedding was celebrated in 1860. His widow still survives at the homestead.

Dr. SAMUEL P. KNIGHT studied medicine with Dr. John E. Eaton, of Dudley, whose daughter he married and to whose business he succeeded; was a very amiable and exemplary man; in good standing as a citizen, and a successful practitioner; was the chief physician of Dudley for nearly fifty years.

CHARLES A. BABCOCK *m.* Emeline (iii.), was the son of Samuel H. Babcock, the principal owner in 1840 at the Merino factory, Dudley, and was the book-keeper of the establishment until it suspended business in 1842, when he went to Boston into a mercantile house. He was able and energetic, and by his merits took a high position among Boston business men; was a member of the firm of A. & A. Lawrence & Co., and later of Geo. C. Richardson & Co., wholesale dry goods dealers. He was a man of solid worth, and successful financially.

HEZEKIAH CONANT *m.* Mary Eaton (x.), was the son of Harvey and Dolly (Healy) Conant [see 64, iv.], of Dudley. He was born 28 July, 1827, at Dudley; an ingenious mechanic and inventor; patented machinery now in use by thread manufacturers, which has been a source of large income to him; is now a thread manufacturer at Pawtucket, R. I. He has from time to time made large donations to the Nichols Academy at Dudley, rebuilding in 1880 of brick in the most substantial manner the main edifice of the institution, and later adding a separate building, erected in a corresponding style, for a library and observatory, and fitted with expensive astronomical and philosophical apparatus.

GEORGE BOWEN was a descendant of Henry Bowen, a pioneer of Woodstock, 1686; merchant, inn-keeper and post-master at Woodstock Hill; justice of the peace; a man of means, and of good standing as a citizen.

HENRY C. BOWEN (i.) studied at Nichols Academy, Dudley; entered his father's store at fifteen, and in 1833 went to New York into the wholesale silk house of Arthur Tappan & Co., where he was very efficient and was promoted to the position of manager and chief purchaser in one of its leading departments. In 1838 he began the same business in a partnership under the name of Bowen & McNamee, which was continued successfully until 1857, when the firm became Bowen, Holmes & Co., and thus continued until the beginning of the late war, when Mr. Bowen relinquished trade. Having been one of the founders of "The Independent," and being at this time half-owner, he bought

out his partners and has since given his attention to its publication. In 1869 he bought the "Brooklyn Union," which he published successfully about three years. In March, 1863, he was appointed by President Lincoln collector of internal revenue for the city of Brooklyn, N. Y., which position he held until Andrew Johnson came to the presidential chair. He, not liking the tone of "The Independent," sent word to Mr. Bowen that unless that paper changed its sentiments and supported his administration he would be removed from office within thirty days. The reply was: "No emoluments within the gift of the government can buy 'The Independent'" — and the president made good his word.

Mr. Bowen is an enterprising, industrious, self-reliant man; has done much for religious and benevolent interests in the country; was the originator of the plan for aiding in church-building among the needy, and gave ten thousand dollars to initiate the project, to which sum he has since added liberally. Several banks and insurance companies in New York have been established through his influence. At Woodstock he has given nearly twenty thousand dollars for the benefit of an academy, and through his taste and generosity Roseland Park, of about seventy acres, was projected, laid out and ornamented, at an estimated cost of seventy-five thousand dollars. Although not yet complete, this is the finest pleasure ground in central New England, and is noted for its large assemblages on public occasions, especially on fourth of July celebrations, when some of the most distinguished orators of the country have been present. Mr. Bowen has a summer residence at Woodstock.

EDWARD E. BOWEN (ii.) was the successor of his father as merchant and postmaster at Woodstock Hill; removed to Brooklyn, N. Y., and was a merchant in New York city; later, deputy collector of the third district of New York; at present a banker.

THOMAS DAVIS was an energetic business man; went from Oxford to Ellisburgh, N. Y., about the time of his marriage, and in 1826 there built flouring-mills, which proved a losing investment. He afterward removed to Rochester, where he was in the collector's office for one or two years, and then removed to Lockport, where he took charge of the large mill and land business of E. Bissell for four years. He then removed to Carlton, and, with a partner, built another flouring-mill, a saw-mill, store, and other buildings. Here he had begun a good business, when the crash of 1837 occurred and so involved him that in 1839 he was obliged to give up the struggle. His health becoming impaired, he returned to Massachusetts, and in 1839 went into business, in company with a friend, at Millbury. In 1842 he died, and his family returned to Ellisburgh.

Amid all his misfortunes and reverses — which perhaps were in a measure due to his somewhat venturesome temperament —

he maintained his honor and integrity and the full confidence of his friends.

ELI H. DAVIS (iii.) went in 1854, after his father's death, with his mother and other members of the family, from Ellisburgh, N. Y., to Illinois, and thence the next year to Minnesota, where he was engaged in hardware trade ten years. HIRAM SIBLEY went at sixteen years of age from his native town to Lima, in western New York. From thence he removed to Mendon and established the manufacturing village now known as Sibleyville, where he managed successfully for ten years a foundry and machine shop. He then removed to Rochester and engaged in the real estate business. In 1843 he was elected sheriff. He became much interested in telegraph affairs and was the originator of the plan for a line from the east to the Pacific coast. A design having been formed to carry the wires across Behring's Straits and through Siberia and Russia to England, Mr. Sibley went to Russia, was magnificently entertained at the royal court, and succeeded in completing with the Czar the necessary negotiations for building the line through his territory. The successful laying of the Atlantic cable by Mr. Field, however, superseded this project and it was abandoned. He conceived the idea of the consolidation of various companies into the Western Union Company, and of this corporation was for sixteen years president, being succeeded by William Orton.

Mr. Sibley has been largely interested in building and managing railroads in the southern and western States. His farming interests are very extensive, and he is one of the largest owners of cultivated land in the country. He owns and cultivates fourteen farms, and is chief owner of the Sullivant farm of forty thousand acres, the largest in Illinois. He is the proprietor of large tracts of timber land in Michigan, and with co-partners does a lumber business of vast extent, and the amount of his operations in seeds at Rochester and Chicago is immense. At the latter city he is now (1882) about erecting the largest seed house in the world.

He was the founder of "Sibley College of Mechanic Arts" at Cornell University, at a cost of over a hundred thousand dollars, and he also presented to the University of Rochester "Sibley Hall"—one of the finest buildings in the city, costing one hundred and twenty thousand dollars—to be used for educational purposes.

The gifts of Mrs. Sibley to charitable purposes have been

large, and among her benefactions is the donation to the Protestant Episcopal church at North Adams of a beautiful house of worship, built at a cost of twenty-five thousand dollars, upon the spot where both Mr. Sibley and Mrs. Sibley were born.

Davis on the premises, enlarged it and added a grist-mill, and has since cultivated the farm and done a prosperous milling busi-

ness. He is an ingenious mechanic ; a good citizen ; has been several years selectman.

EBENEZER D. WASHBURN was an earnest student and intended to enter Harvard College; began preparatory study at Leicester Academy, where his ambition led him to such severe and protracted application that his health gave way and he was obliged to forego his anticipated college course. His ill health continuing, he decided to try a change of climate, and went first to Cincinnati, Ohio, where he lived a while, and removed to Mobile, Ala., where he began the publication of the first daily newspaper in that city. He later settled at Montgomery, Ala., where he spent his remaining days. He studied law and practiced there successfully many years, and was judge of the county court; stood high in the estimation of the people; was active in the church. Being debilitated in the summer of 1838 he went for relief to "Talladago" [Tallahatta?] Springs; declined and died there.

Doct. SETH WASHBURN was in his boyhood apprenticed, with "honest John Davis," to a Worcester County tanner. They worked for a while at the trade and came to the conclusion they could do better. John, therefore, went to the study of the law, and Seth to that of medicine with Dr. Flint, of Northampton. He later attended lectures at Harvard Medical College, where he graduated about 1817, and at once settled in business at Greenfield, Mass. There he acquired a large practice, and at the age of thirty-five years died of consumption, brought on by exposure and devotion to his profession. During his last illness he embraced the religion of his precious mother, and died trusting in the merits of Jesus. His gravestone bears the inscription :

"An honest man 's the noblest work of God."

He was eminently successful as a physician and won a host of friends by his kind and faithful ministrations and his integrity and purity of character.

Doct. THOMAS D. WASHBURN. (i.) was a surgeon in the United States army through the late war; is an enthusiast in his profession; keeps abreast of the times, and is a skillful and successful practitioner at Hillsboro, Illinois.

JOSEPH WASHBURN had a common school education; went in 1820 to Savannah, Ga., into mercantile business; afterward lived at Milledgeville and Macon, but returned to Savannah at least twenty years before his death. After his return he was in commission business in the firm of Washburn & Wilder for a number of years; retired and was president of the Bank of Savannah. In the latter part of his life he devoted himself almost entirely to horticulture, cultivating with his own hands his garden, in which he took special delight.

He was a member of the independent Presbyterian church at Savannah; possessed decided firmness of character and sincere piety, and was much esteemed.

HENRY K. WASHBURN (ii.) was for many years a commission merchant at Savannah; captain in confederate quartermaster department; now living on his farm in Whitefield County, Georgia.

JOSEPH WASHBURN (iii.) was educated at Williams College, and was for several years a clerk at Savannah; served through the war in the confederate cavalry and artillery. Became a Presbyterian minister; settled at Charlotte Court House, Va., and St. Mary's, Ga.; now lives at Savannah.

INGERSOLL WASHBURN (iv.) was educated at Princeton College; served in the confederate army during the late war; was

EMORY WASHBURN studied at Leicester Academy and Dartmouth College, completing his course at Williams where he graduated in 1817, the youngest in his class. He studied law at Harvard, and was admitted to the bar in 1821; practiced law at Leicester a few years, and was town clerk and representative to the legislature in 1826 and 1827; was member of a committee which made the first railroad report ever made to that body, the question being upon a railroad from Boston to Albany. In 1828 he removed to Worcester and practiced his profession with assiduity and success. His labors became enormous. He

trusted nothing to inspiration, but guided by a strong common sense and full legal knowledge he made his client's cause his own, and maintained it with a confidence and tenacity that often gave him the advantage over practitioners of more brilliant talents. He was partner with John Davis, later governor and senator. In 1841 he was chosen State senator and made the chairman of the judiciary committee. In 1844 he was appointed by Governor Briggs judge of the court of common pleas and served nearly four years, when he resigned and returned to the practice of law. In 1853 he was nominated and chosen governor of Massachusetts as a whig—the last elected by the party under that name. In 1856 he accepted the Bussey professorship of law in Harvard College, and held the chair for twenty years. In this capacity he was extremely useful, diligent, as he always was, inspiring respect by his character and attainments, and affection by his amiable personal qualities. On resigning his professorship he opened a law office at Cambridge, but was not allowed to remain in private life. He was elected with enthusiasm representative to the legislature from Cambridge in the session of 1877, where he was chairman of the judiciary committee and in the performance of his duties when taken with his last illness. He had received the degree of LL. D. in 1854 from Harvard and Williams colleges. He was the author of a history of Leicester and also of several law books highly valued by the profession.

His distinguishing characteristics in public and private life were industry and faithfulness. He had the respect and confidence of the public to a very unusual degree.

Speaking of the Davis family, one says: "There are side branches like the life and character of Emory Washburn whose blossoms and whose fruits will never decay."

A sister presents this tribute: "Never sister loved brother as I did him; companions and playmates from babyhood, I never heard him utter an unkind expression, but he possessed the same gentle sweet temper in childhood that characterized his mature years."

EMORY WASHBURN (iii.) graduated at Harvard College and the Cambridge Law School, and is in practice of his profession at Chicago, Illinois.

ALFRED F. WASHBURN (iv.) was educated at Harvard College and the University of Leipzig, preparing himself for the ministry, and is rector of a Protestant Episcopal church in Boston.

Rev. JOSEPH MUENSCHER, D. D., was the son of John Muenschler, who was born about 1748, in the Landgravate of Hesse, Germany, came to America during the Revolutionary War, and at its close settled at Newport, R. I., from whence he removed to Providence. Joseph fitted for college at Phillips Academy, Andover; graduated at Brown University in 1821; studied theology at Andover, Mass.; was ordained deacon in the Protestant Episcopal church 7 March, 1824; admitted as priest 13 March, 1825; rector of the church at South Leicester, now Rochdale, Mass., from 1824 to 1827; removed to Northampton, Mass., where he was rector till 1831, and was the

main instrument in the erection of the church edifice there. He was next settled at Saco, Maine; resigned his rectorship in 1833 to accept the office of professor of sacred literature in the theological seminary at Gambier, Ohio, to which place he removed, and for two years was professor of Latin in Kenyon College, at that place, in addition to the duties of his other professorship. In 1841 he accepted a call to a rectorship at Mount Vernon, Ohio, which position he occupied till 1855, when he resigned and relinquished his public labors.

A number of valuable text books and educational works on biblical subjects, and a treatise on the orthography and pronunciation of the English language—all of his production—have been published. A collection of sacred music—"The Church Choir," published in 1839—which has had a wide circulation, was of his compiling. He was the founder of the society for the relief of widows and children of deceased clergymen of the Episcopal church in Ohio in 1845, and has since for most of the time been its chief manager and secretary. He received in 1849 the degree of D. D. from Kenyon College, and in 1852 the same honor from Brown University.

JOSEPH W. MUENSCHER (i.) graduated at Kenyon College in 1844; studied law with Hon. C. Delano, of Mount Vernon, Ohio, and at Cambridge Law School; sett. in practice at Sandusky, Ohio, where he died of cholera when under twenty-three years of age.

EMORY W. MUENSCHER (iii.) graduated at Kenyon College in 1850, studied civil engineering at Union College, Schenectady, and law at Worcester in the office of his uncle, Emory Washburn, and was admitted to the bar; settled at Grand Rapids, Mich.; enlisted at the opening of the late war in the fourth regiment Ohio volunteers; was promoted to the rank of adjutant of the thirtieth regiment, which position he resigned and was chosen captain of company I; served in the Army of the Tennessee, was in numerous battles, and marched under Sherman through Georgia to the sea; received a commission as lieutenant-colonel, and resigned, leaving the service. CHESTER A. DRESSER (ii.) is a leading cotton manufacturer of Southbridge; began the business in boyhood, went through its various stages, and is a thoroughly practical man. He went in young manhood to Virginia as manager of the

Mechanics' Mill, near Petersburg; returned to the north and began business with a partner at Westville, where he continued three years. In 1845, at the organization of the Central Mills, at Southbridge, under Hon. E. D. Ammidown and others, he was made superintendent. Later, having an invitation to enter the employment of the Amoskeag Company, at Manchester, N. H., he went there into a responsible position, which he filled for two years. He then returned to Southbridge and assumed the charge as agent of the Central Mills, which position he has occupied to the present time. In 1871 he built the large hotel at Southbridge which bears his name. He is one of the wealthiest men of the town.

Hon. EBENEZER D. AMMIDOWN was born and brought up on a farm, but being of a slender constitution was not able to do hard work, and following his inclinations employed himself in lighter mechanical matters of various kinds. He was ingenious and able from his native capacity to readily understand the intricacies of machinery. His father was a pioneer in the cotton manufacture in Southbridge, and at the time of his death had begun the business on a small scale. At his decease the prosecution of this new enterprise devolved upon the son, then a comparatively young man, in connection with the late Doct. Samuel Hartwell and Moses Plimpton, Esq. To this responsibility Mr. Ammidown applied himself with the energy and good judgment which always characterized his later efforts, and the result was the permanent establishment of the leading manufacture of the town. Mr. Holmes Ammidown in his history of Southbridge says that to him more than to any other person the place is indebted for the development of this industry. But the natural scope and bent of Mr. Ammidown's mind were by no means satisfied with a success in this direction. When railroading became established in this region he discerned at once in it an instrumentality which could be successfully used not only to increase general prosperity, but to benefit and build up his native town, in whose welfare he ever felt a special interest. He therefore entered heartily into that subject; acted as one of a board of commissioners about 1838 to locate and settle land claims on the Norwich and Worcester road; was foremost in projecting the Norfolk County (now New York and New England) road, and for a time its president, and was the main instrument in obtaining a charter for the Southbridge and Blackstone road. The new entrance into the city of Boston at Summer street over the South Boston flats was a scheme of his devising, and was carried out mainly through his persistent efforts. In both houses of the State legislature, to which he was repeatedly elected, he labored resolutely and perseveringly to effect his purpose. Nearly thirty years of his later life were chiefly devoted to this work, and the end was gained at last. He had reason to hope that he should see the fruit of his labor, but was not permitted this happiness. He died 23 Nov. 1865, and on 9 Nov. 1866, communication by rail between Southbridge and Boston was opened.

He was a man of broad views and much public spirit—"pre-eminently the man of public improvements in Southbridge," giving his influence to every project calculated to benefit town, county, or State. He had a mind far-seeing in its range and which arrived quickly and with certainty at its conclusions, and was therefore specially competent in the management of public affairs. As a county commissioner—which office he held for many years—he was remarkably efficient, and as a magistrate, in which capacity he acted for a long time, doing much business, he was eminently successful, and his decisions were rarely reversed by the higher courts.

Hon. Linus Child, who knew him intimately, wrote: "He was a man of great natural talents and energy, and to whatever business or employment he applied himself he always exhibited great clearness of perception, comprehensiveness of views and a capacity to appreciate at a glance the true bearings of any subject to which he gave his attention."

In private life he was most estimable, a true and wise friend and adviser, and possessed of a warm heart. Socially he was quiet and unobtrusive, and like the rest of that branch of the Davis family ever too full of real work for much that was light and trifling, and though he had a keen sense of the ludicrous and a fund of dry wit, he was considered a sedate man. Says Mr. Child: "He was always calm and collected, even in the most trying circumstances; was seldom off his guard, and never manifested undue excitement. The undisturbed calmness with which he met the last hours of his life, when in the perfect possession of all his faculties he held his last interview with his family and gave his last counsels and directions, only indicated the same quiet and well-balanced mind which he had so constantly displayed throughout all the varying scenes of a long and useful life."

MANNING LEONARD *m.* Mary F. (i.), was the son of Rev. Z. L. Leonard, Baptist minister of Sturbridge, Mass.; lived on his father's farm till 1832, when he went to New York city as clerk in the dry goods house of Tiffany, Anderson & Co. In 1835 he removed to Madison, Indiana, and founded the wholesale dry goods house of Leonard & Phelps; remained there until 1844, when he returned to Southbridge and engaged with

his father-in-law, Hon. E. D. Ammidown, in the cotton manufacture. He at first was superintendent, and later clerk and treasurer. Mr. Ammidown soon left the business on account of other engagements, Mr. Leonard continuing it—a short time alone but for the most of the time in partnership with Chester A. Dresser—until 1863. He then sold his interest to Mr. Dresser, and on account of ill health retired from active business.

He has filled the most important town offices; was representative in 1869; has been on the Free Public Library committee since its formation in 1870; thirty-four years clerk of the Savings Bank; thirty-three years a director in State and National Bank; twenty-eight years justice of the peace; fourteen years notary public; early a life member of the New England Historic, Genealogical Society, Boston; life member of the Society of Antiquity, Worcester.

He is among the most estimable citizens of Southbridge, a liberal supporter of religious and charitable institutions, and an active member of the Congregational church.

JONATHAN H. BARKER *m.* Antoinette (iv.), was from Littleton, Mass.; went west, and from clerk on a steamboat he arose to be captain, and large proprietor in the United States mail line between Cincinnati, Ohio, and Louisville, Kentucky; was a dealer at Cincinnati in steamboat supplies; became wealthy, retired from business, and now lives at South Acton, Mass.

MALCOLM AMMIDOWN (v.) was lieutenant in the thirty-fourth regiment of Massachusetts volunteers in the late war; taken prisoner at Newcastle, West Virginia, carried to Charleston, S. C., where he died in prison, of yellow fever.

JOSEPH KINSEY *m.* Ann Frances (vi.), was of Quaker parentage, born at Baltimore, Maryland; a prominent business man of Cincinnati, Ohio; an extensive manufacturer of railroad supplies; president of the Globe Rolling Mills Corporation; is wealthy.

Doct. SAMUEL HARTWELL was the son of Samuel and Susanna (Burr) Hartwell, of Oxford (North Gore); worked when a boy at the carpenter's trade, but gave up the business and went to New Jersey, where his brother Cyrus was a practicing physician, and studied medicine with him for a time; went to New York city, where he completed his education at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, graduating in 1816. The next year he settled in practice at Southbridge, where he attained a high reputation in his profession and became known throughout the region around as a skillful practitioner. He was an enterprising and public-spirited man, and to some extent pecuniarily interested in the leading manufacture of the town for many years.

Doct. SAMUEL C. HARTWELL (i.) studied medicine with his father and at the Philadelphia Medical School, from which he graduated; began practice early and has an extensive business in Southbridge. Has been representative to the State legislature; is often moderator in town meetings.

Maj. JOHN SPURR was a man of good abilities, and for many years the chief trader at Charlton Centre; built the brick store now standing, also the large hotel near it, which he managed for a number of years. Later in life he owned and cultivated a farm in the village. Like his father he was a man of very positive opinions, a zealous politician and leader for many years of the democratic party in the town. He was a good financier and accumulated a handsome property; was major of militia; justice of the peace; representative and State senator.

DWIGHT WOODBURY *m.* Sally* (iv.), in early manhood began dry goods trade at Macon, Georgia, and prospered; returned to New York city, where he continued the business and became wealthy. He invested his means largely in western lands, and on retiring from business, about the time of the opening of the late war, he removed to Anoka, Minnesota, where he had real estate, and has since resided there.

JAMES M. EDMUND G. HOWE was the son of Edmund and Eunice (Grant) Howe, of Mansfield, Conn. He was fitted for college at fourteen years of age and expected to enter at Yale, but on account of his father's ill health, being an only son, he was obliged to remain at home, and much of the responsibility of his father's business, that of a merchant, was early placed upon him. He soon proved his efficiency, and rapidly developed the capacity which marked his subsequent business career. After the death of his father he went to Hartford in 1829 as a clerk, and continued thus for two years. In 1831 he formed a partnership under the name of Pratt, Howe & Co.—dry goods jobbers—which continued five years. In 1836 the firm was changed to Howe, Mather & Co., J. S. Morgan, the London banker, being junior partner. Mr. Morgan retiring in 1851, the firm relinquished the dry goods trade and established a private banking-house. In 1857 the firm dissolved. Mr. Howe removed his business interests to New York city, and entered the banking firm of Ketchum, Howe & Co., where he remained three years. In 1860 he returned to Hartford and the old firm of Howe, Mather & Co. was renewed, which partnership continued until his death in 1872.

Mr. Howe was one of the founders of the Greenwoods Company, at New Hartford, and was the master mind in the organization and management of the Hartford Carpet Company, and both concerns owe much of their success to his wisdom and enterprise. He was from 1851 to 1857 president of the City Bank, and from 1866 to his death president of the National Exchange Bank; the first president of the Hartford and Wethersfield Horse R. R. Company; vice-president of the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company; a director in the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company; director in the Hartford Carpet Company; trustee of the Society for Savings, and also of various benevolent institutions, whose interests he guarded with jealous care.

He was a man of uncommon force and enterprise, and wherever he had charge his energy was felt. He had great business sagacity, and his judgment of men and credits was remarkable. His knowledge and discrimination were such that his advice was much sought, and he was specially efficient as a trustee and director. His integrity was unquestioned, his word as good as his bond.

He was a liberal and indulgent father and husband; loyal to his friends — “true as steel.” No just claim of the deserving poor failed of his consideration. He was benevolent, judicious, just, and a broad, conservative and educated gentleman of the old school, whose associations were with the best men of his time. In politics he was a Henry Clay whig and later a moderate republican, and once reluctantly accepted the position of representative to the legislature from Hartford.

Maj. WILLIAM J. WOOD *m.* Frances P. (iii.), was the son of Freeman and Mary B. (Jackson) Wood, of Morris County, New Jersey, and a descendant of Robert Jackson, who settled under the Dutch at Hempstead, Long Island, in 1644; graduated in 1856 at Princeton, New Jersey; in 1859, admitted to law practice, which he followed in New Jersey three years; in 1862, member of the legislature of New Jersey; in 1863 commissioned major in United States army and served as disbursing officer until 1865, when he resigned and went to Troy, New York, into the manufacture of iron and steel, remaining two years; in 1867 became vice-president and manager of the Collins Edge Tool Company, at Collinsville, Conn., where he, in 1883, continues. Residence at Hartford.

Rev. HEZEKIAH H. DAVIS was a true, sound and estimable man; owned and cultivated a farm; an enthusiastic member of the Methodist church, and a local preacher; the first to introduce the preaching of his faith in Southbridge, Charlton, Woodstock, and East Thompson; began preaching about 1830 and continued until his death. He was highly respected in the town, and was selectman and assessor a number of years; also representative and school-committee. GEORGE DAVIS (i.), a worthy citizen of Dudley, and an active and exemplary member of the Methodist church. MARCUS T. C. Doct. ISAIAH BUCKMAN studied medicine with Doct. Hewett, of Boston, and at the Woodstock (Vt.) Medical School, and settled in practice at South Woodstock, where he arose by his intrinsic merits to prominence as a physician and surgeon. He was the inventor of an invalid bedstead, which was patented, and which received high commendation from leading Boston physicians. In 1848, through his efforts chiefly, an academy was established at South Woodstock of which he was long the chief supervisor, and to the pupils of which he gave lectures. He was a chief supporter of the Universalist society, an active anti-slavery and temperance man, and awake to every good cause. A local paper soon after his death said: "No movement for the public good has been initiated in this community for the last quarter of a century in which he was not one of the prime movers. He will be greatly missed not only as a kind, sympathetic physician, but as a citizen and a practical christian." He used his pen very effectively, and wrote for the press a series of articles on the subject of nursing which attracted attention and was reprinted abroad. He had great kindness of heart and was much beloved for his self-sacrificing devotion to his profession.

Mrs. Buckman was a person of remarkably fine qualities; untiring in her works of beneficence, a strict economist and a

sympathizer with her husband in his labors among the needy and suffering.

Col. NATHANIEL DAVIS in early life was identified with a large mercantile, manufacturing and farming business at North Montpelier and East Calais, Vt., established by his father. In 1829 he was made major of the fifth regiment Vermont militia, and soon after colonel, in which office he served several years with distinction. Not far from the year 1837, aided by his father, he built at North Montpelier a large woolen-mill and began its operation with a partner, who proved unworthy and was the means of the failure of the enterprise. EDWARD BURROUGHS went at the age of eleven years to Stanstead, Canada, as clerk in a store. Being ambitious, he soon sought a higher sphere and removed to Quebec and began the study of law. In 1816 he entered the office of Perrault & Ross, prothonotaries to the court of common pleas. Here he displayed so much tact and aptitude for his duties that he was soon placed at the head of the department, managing the affairs of the superior court, where he introduced many valuable reforms in the mode of transacting business. On the death of Mr. Ross he was appointed to the vacant place, and for many years acted conjointly with Mr. Perrault. For forty-five years he held a position in the registry office and in 1861 was succeeded by his son, Henry Ross Burroughs. ASA D. BURROUGHS was a dry goods merchant, wholesale and retail, at Montreal, Canada. He suffered heavy loss from fire, but recovered his good standing; was an able business man; retiring and went very little in society. An active member and free supporter of the Unitarian church.

CHARLES S. BURROUGHS (i.) was educated at the college of St. Hyacinth, Canada; studied law at Quebec and Montreal; began business at the latter place, continued ten years, and had an extensive practice. On the projection of a railroad from Montreal to Ottawa, he, being a stockholder and the attorney for the contractors, removed to St. Andrews, P. Q., where he remained twelve years. He then removed to La Chute, where he bought land and continued his professional business. A plan was devised for a new line from Montreal to Ottawa, which should pass through La Chute. In this he became much interested, and by great effort, the establishment of a newspaper and other expenditures succeeded in procuring the passage of the road through his estate, which was thus largely increased in value. Col. SAMUEL D. SPURR was in his youth under the guardianship of Dr. Dan Lamb, of Charlton, his father having died when he was twelve years of age. He fitted for college at Leicester Academy and hoped to complete a classical course, but was persuaded to take up business. He therefore entered the store of his brother John, at Charlton Centre, and after a few years became the proprietor, continuing the trade successfully for about ten years, during which time he gained in an unusual degree the confidence and respect of his fellow-citizens. He was two years representative to the legislature and filled the higher town offices, and was also colonel of the militia ; was often employed in drawing legal papers and transacting business usually done by professional men ; was an active member of the Unitarian society. Soon after his marriage to Miss Lamb, the daughter of his former guardian, he removed to Worcester, bought a house and lot at the corner of Main and Central streets, removed the house and in copartnership with Isaac Davis, Esq., built the block now standing known as Granite Block. Here he resumed the dry goods trade, which he continued till his death.

He had more than ordinary talents, sterling worth, and was a judicious and true man whose counsels were valued and often sought.

Hon. GEORGE F. HOAR *m.* Mary L. (i.), graduated at Harvard College in 1846 ; studied law and settled in practice at Worcester, where he became prominent in his profession ; was representative and senator in the State legislature ; representative in congress of the Worcester district for eight years ; a member of the board of overseers of Harvard College from 1874 to 1880 ; chairman of the State republican convention in 1871 and 1877 ; member of the congressional electoral commission in 1876 ; president of the national republican convention at Chicago in 1880 ; United States senator from Massachusetts from 1877 to

1883, which position he has filled with high honor and to which he was re-elected in January, 1883. His son, Rockwood Hoar, is a promising young lawyer at Worcester.

THOMAS J. SPURR (ii.) was a young man of rare promise, and an excellent scholar; studied at Harvard College, where he took his degree in 1858; entered the law school at Cambridge, and later studied with Hon. George F. Hoar at Worcester; in the spring of 1862 he received a commission as first lieutenant in the fifteenth regiment Massachusetts volunteers and went immediately into the service, where he won the affection and confidence of his men in a remarkable degree. On the morning of the seventeenth of September, 1862, at Antietam, as he was forming the broken front of his company, he received a wound from which he died at Hagerstown on the twenty-seventh. "We loved him as a brother," was the testimony of his comrades. "He was loving and tender, and brave and heroic," were the words of Dr. Alonzo Hill in his eulogy delivered before a crowded assemblage which had met at Worcester to do honor to his memory.

Doct. **JOHN T. GILMAN** studied medicine at Dartmouth Medical School; began practice in 1816 at East Calais, Vermont, and was the first physician settled there. He had a large practice and died wealthy for the times. His early death resulted from over-work, after a severe attack of pneumonia from which he had not fully recovered.

MARCUS D. GILMAN (i.) went from Calais to Montpelier in 1835, and for ten years was there and at Northfield engaged in trade. In June, 1845, he with a partner began a general mercantile business, wholesale and retail, at Chicago, Illinois. At the end of the first year he bought out his partner and from that time, either alone or with different associates, he prosecuted an increasing trade in two wholesale establishments—dry goods and groceries—so successfully that in 1868 he retired with a competency and returned to the east, taking up his residence at Newton, Mass., where he lived two years and then returned to Montpelier. While in Chicago he was candidate for mayor and also for city treasurer, and was offered the candidacy of the Illinois State treasurer. At Montpelier he was elected representative to the legislature in 1874 and 1875, being the only democrat chosen to the office since the division of the town. From 1874 to 1881 he was the efficient librarian of the Vermont Historical Society. In antiquarian, historical and biographical research he stands among the first men of the State, and has a private library amply furnished on these subjects. He is president of the State Numismatical Society, and author of a work of importance entitled "The Bibliography of Vermont."

JOHN M. GILMAN (ii.) was educated at the Washington County Grammar School, at Montpelier; studied law with Heaton & Reed, at Montpelier, and began practice at New

Lisbon, Ohio. In 1857 he removed to St. Paul, Minn., where he is in practice, a prominent member of his profession. In Ohio he was State senator in 1849 and 1850, and at St. Paul was elected four times to the legislature. BENJAMIN BROWN was in early life a clerk in a broker's office and later in the office of a foreign merchant, in Boston, where he remained a few years. At the age of sixteen, having a desire for a sea life and to visit distant countries, he shipped as a green hand on board the bark Palmer, and in 1831, eleven years later, he became master in the trade of the Pacific Ocean, and continued voyages to the East Indies, China, Kamtschatka, Siberia, Alaska, the Sandwich Islands, California, Mexico and the South American ports. In 1836 he became a member of the firm of Pierce & Brewer, at Honolulu, where he remained until 1846, when he returned to Massachusetts and resided at Jamaica Plain, continuing the trade from Boston. Here he founded the old and well-known shipping house of Charles Brewer & Co., which has continued to the present time, being now managed by his two sons, Edward M. and Joseph, and his nephew, Charles H. Hon. GEORGE L. DAVIS was educated in the common schools and a select school at Oxford; taught at Sutton in the winter of 1834-5; went in the spring of 1835 to Andover, Mass., to learn the trade of a machinist with Messrs. Barnes, Gilbert & Richardson, Mr. Gilbert being his uncle. In 1836 the business was removed from Andover to North Andover, and in 1841 a new partnership formed, under the name of Gilbert, Gleason & Davis, of which he was the junior member. In 1851 Mr. Davis and Mr. Charles Furber became sole owners, and continued until the death of the latter in 1857. Subsequently other partners were admitted and down to 1882 the business was transacted under the firm name of Davis & Furber, Mr. Davis having been active in the management of its growing interests. This establishment has a reputation throughout a large portion of the country for its first-class machinery.

Mr. Davis was four years in the Massachusetts senate; has been for sixteen years president of the Bay State Bank, at Law-

rence; prominent in town affairs; deacon of the Congregational church since 1857, and a liberal supporter of religious and charitable institutions.

JAMES H. DAVIS (iii.) was at Phillips Academy, Andover, from 1859 for two years or more, and later in the Military School at Worcester, and Williston Seminary at Easthampton. In the summer of 1862 he entered the office of Davis & Furber, at North Andover, where he has since continued, and is now a partner in the business. He owns and occupies a farm at North Andover.

HARRIET E. Dea. HENRY G. DAVIS went in his youth as a clerk into the store at Oxford of Samuel Dowse, whose daughter he afterward married. Later for a number of years he was salesman in a leading dry goods house in Springfield, Mass., from whence he went to Worcester into a similar position. From Worcester he removed to Pittsfield, Mass., and with a partner early in 1844 began the dry goods and crockery trade, which he continued until his death. He grew rapidly in the esteem of his fellow-townsmen as a business man, a citizen and a christian. His business prospered, he received the appointment of postmaster, and in the church was promoted to the office of Sabbath-school superintendent, and in January, 1851, was chosen deacon under Rev. Dr. John Todd, with whom he was a favorite. The increasing responsibilities of business, in addition to the calls of a more public nature made upon him, impaired his health — a constitution not naturally hardy yielded to the strain, and in the flower of his manhood and usefulness he went to his reward.

After his decease Dr. Todd wrote a sketch of him, which was published under the title, "The Model Deacon." He says: "And when I speak of his amiable life I do not mean simply that he had a countenance so mild and lovely that all loved to look at it, speech so sweet that all loved to hear him speak to them, a smile so winning that all loved to meet it, and a disposition so gentle that none could receive offence; but I mean that the natural traits of character were so permeated by the spirit of Christ that the whole man was made uncommon." He had an even and quiet temperament, was calm and self-reliant, well balanced, decided, unobtrusive, and said little unless asked about his opinions or principles. He had a clear mind; was a great reader, intelligent, generous and self-sacrificing; energetic and persevering in whatever he undertook.

“The savor of his influence was widely felt, and seldom do we find a character with so little we would like to hide.”

Rev. **WILLIAM T. BRIGGS** graduated at Oneida Institute, New York, in 1844; studied theology at Oneida and Andover, Mass. His first settlement was at North Andover, Mass., 4 Nov. 1846. ASA CUTLER was a blacksmith at Killingly; later a successful cotton manufacturer. He began business running a mill on a contract in the south part of Killingly. In 1825 he with three partners—one of whom was Calvin Leffingwell, of Killingly, who had learned cotton manufacturing with Mr. Smith Wilkinson—bought mill property at North Oxford, Mass., where he continued nearly four years, and returned to Killingly. In 1839 he again went to Oxford, enlarged his operations, and prosecuted the business with success until 1847, when he sold a share of his interest there and settled permanently at Pomfret Factories, now Putnam. There he interested himself much in public affairs and was very active in procuring the act of incorporation for the new town, spending much time and money in the cause. He was early identified with its business interests; built a large brick block of stores and many dwellings, which

he rented. He was a man of good executive ability, strong common sense, was very positive in his convictions, and on all great moral questions of his day took advanced ground.

HOBART C. CUTLER (ii.) began business as a merchant at Killingly, Conn.; removed to North Oxford and with his brother Edward operated for a year or two his father's factory; in 1852 went to Pomfret Depot, now Putnam, where he did a prosperous business in flour, grain and hardware, and continued until his death. He was a very worthy man, of amiable disposition; deacon of the Congregational church.

DOCT. DANIEL B. PLIMPTON *m.* Tamar D. (iii.), was a native of Southbridge, Mass.; studied medicine at the Woodstock (Vt.) Medical School; was three years with Dr. Samuel Hartwell, of Southbridge; began practice at Oxford and removed to Putnam, Conn., where he followed his profession twenty-eight years. He was highly esteemed as a citizen and physician; was active in church affairs, and gave his influence to every good work; was one of the founders of the Congregational church at Putnam, and for many years superintendent of the Sunday-school. THOMAS DEVIN was of Huguenot descent, the original name having been DeVinne. He was the son of Michael, who was a refugee in the north of Ireland and emigrated to Maryland. While Thomas was yet a lad his parents removed to the vicinity of Marietta, Ohio, where they had a farm of four hundred acres. Here he began to exhibit some of the tact for business affairs which characterized his later life. At twenty years of age he made a trip with a flat-boat laden with farm produce down the Ohio and Mississippi rivers to New Orleans, which was then their best market, and continued for several years these annual excursions. He married and removed to Morgan County, settling upon a tract of eight hundred acres of land,

and opened up a farm. But his inclination for mercantile pursuits led him to give up farming and he removed to McConnellsville, arranged for a store and began merchandising, which thereafter was the chief business of his life. From McConnellsville he went in 1835 to Oxford, Ohio, and thence two years subsequently to Decatur, Illinois. In 1839 with wife and seven children he removed to Iowa, settling at Pittsburg, in the Des Moines valley, where he continued in trade until 1855, when he settled permanently at Ottumwa. Here entering upon a business which he had established while residing at Pittsburg, he prospered and became one of the wealthiest men in that section of the State.

The Ottumwa "Courier," in a notice of him, says: "Mr. Devin has been identified with the interests of Ottumwa since 1844, but did not move his family here until 1855. He has thus been a part of the history of this place for nearly thirty years. For this time he has been a leading man among the moneyed and commercial men of the Des Moines valley until the infirmities of age obliged him to narrow down his business operations. He was a man of singular purity of life as well as inflexibility of purpose. His name is widely and firmly engraved upon the commercial history of all this part of Iowa as an always reliable, active, energetic business man; in the social circle as a congenial, kind neighbor and friend, and in his domestic relations as the best of husbands and kindest of fathers."

WILLARD DAVIS was an intelligent, active, robust young man, brought up on his father's farm at Adams, Ohio; fond of sport, and with his rifle brought down many a deer in the neighboring forests. In 1830 he bought one hundred acres of land near the homestead and became a thriving and independent farmer. After his father's death in 1843 he purchased the old farm, occupied it and there spent his remaining days.

He was social, genial, and hospitable, and enjoyed highly the companionship of friends and especially of the young. He was public-spirited, yet unambitious of preferment, and was universally respected as a true, honorable and worthy man.

JESSE W. DAVIS, youngest son of Capt. William, was the only son remaining at home at the death of his father in 1843, and much of the care of the farm devolved upon him. In October of that year he met with a serious accident in a grist-mill, having been caught by his clothing on a revolving shaft which carried him rapidly around, breaking and crushing his lower limbs and feet in a shocking manner. His physicians on consultation thought best to remove his right leg, but he with characteristic decision said to them as he drew his finger across his throat, "If it must come off, take it off here," and seeing him fixed in his opposition they yielded. In six months he was able to walk with the help of crutches, and a few weeks later resumed his accustomed labors.

In 1851 he built a trading-boat and went into mercantile business. Later he bought a farm in Mason County, West Virginia, not far from the Ohio River, which he cultivated until 1861, when he sold out and returned to Lowell, Ohio, and in partnership with his nephew, Walter Davis, opened a general store, which they continued successfully two years. In 1863 he bought a farm in Edgar County, Illinois, and there began farming and stock-raising, in which he has been very prosperous, and now owns three hundred and fifty acres of land, besides a handsome estate at Paris, where he resides.

Rev. JESSE P. DAVIS was early left an orphan and went to live with an elder sister. For want of means his education was limited, but being ambitious, by hard study he made up in a measure the lack of his earlier years. After his majority he went to Missouri, and in Washington and the adjoining counties was a teacher for over twenty years. During this time by marriage he became the owner of slaves and soon began to plan for their emancipation. He freely relinquished his own right in them and by his counsel aided them in purchasing their freedom from other interested parties and emigrating to Liberia. His decided opposition to the prevailing sentiment in the State on this subject caused his removal in 1856 to Illinois, where he engaged in teaching at Chester. Having in early life united with the Methodist Episcopal church, he was licensed to preach in 1843. Soon after his settlement at Chester he received an appointment as pastor at that place, and until 1874, a period of eighteen years, he was a member of the Southern Illinois Conference ; was appointed to some of the most important stations

in its limits, and was for a number of years a presiding elder. In 1874 he united with the Reformed Episcopal church and became rector of St. John's church at Chillicothe, Illinois, where he officiated about six years, when on account of ill health he retired from stated public labors, but continued to reside there. In the late war he was chaplain in the seventh regiment Illinois volunteers.

"He was a faithful minister, a good preacher, and an earnest worker in the Master's cause." One who knew him well writes: "He stood head and shoulders above the masses in his far-reaching and deeper thought and intuitions of truth. Yet his kind and benevolent nature and unselfish interest that made another's feeling of pain and pleasure his own made him ever the friend of the friendless."

Mr. Davis was interested for a number of years before his death in the progress of this work, and rendered very valuable assistance in procuring for it the records of families in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

WILLIAM D. MANN learned the carpenter's trade, and at twenty-five years of age went to the west; lived at West Liberty and Dubuque, Iowa; became interested in the shipping of ice to the lower Mississippi; removed to Baton Rouge soon after the death of his first wife and there, in wholesale trade, became wealthy, but lost heavily during the war. He was a staunch unionist and while the federal troops occupied the place his house was the officers' headquarters. At the close of the war he was chosen delegate to the reconstruction convention at New Orleans, and also representative to congress, but was refused a seat at the capitol by the then sitting congress.

He had good business talent, was a thorough gentleman, generous, warm-hearted, and highly esteemed in business circles and among his numerous friends.

F. Dea. RUFUS P. MANN was one of the "excellent of the earth;" high-minded, conscientious and sincere; a man whose mature life was as it were one continuous act of devotion to principle and the cause he loved. He was a pillar in the Baptist church at Windsor, deacon from 1847 until his removal to McConnellsville in 1863, and for many years Sabbath-school superintendent. WILSON M. BULGER removed with his wife and oldest child from Taylorsville, Muskingum County, Ohio, in the fall of 1840 to Wells County, Ind., while it was yet a wilderness; built a log cabin and killed deer and coon for a living. With the help of his wife he dried the venison from sixty-four deer which he killed in one season, carrying it on horseback twenty miles through the forests to Fort Wayne, his only market. When the county was organized and Bluffton made the county seat he moved into town. His well known cognomen there has been for many years "Killbuck of the wilderness." At Bluffton he was clerk in a dry goods store for three years, and was then chosen county recorder, which position he filled for eighteen years. Since retiring from that office he has acted as notary public, conveyancer, etc. He is a prominent Universalist, and a short time since carried on a prolonged controversy on the subject in the local paper, his opponent being the Methodist preacher of Bluffton.

Mrs. Bulger was a very estimable person, and with her husband endured heroically all the hardships incident to their pioneer life.

SAMUEL L. HOWE was the son of Curtis Howe, of St. Albans, Vermont, and went with his parents in 1818 to Granville, Ohio, where he lived until 1832, when he removed to Lancaster, Ohio. From that place he went in 1841 to Mount Pleasant, Iowa, where he spent his remaining years. He studied at Athens College, Ohio, paying his expenses mainly by manual labor. At Lancaster he taught, and had as pupils the brothers John and William T. Sherman. During his early years he went through a course of reading law, but never practiced. In 1845 he established the "High School and Female Seminary" at Mount Pleasant, erecting a brick building for the purpose, which was later enlarged, and there continued to teach

with eminent success until near his death, a period of over thirty years. Such was the popularity of the institution that the average attendance in the later years was two hundred pupils. He was the author of an English grammar, which has been through several editions and is widely in use in the western schools; was county superintendent of schools for Henry County several terms and resigned only on account of ill health.

In 1849 he became interested in the "Iowa Freeman," a newspaper published at Mount Pleasant, brought it under his own control, changed its name to "The True Democrat," and for several years edited and published it as an ultra anti-slavery paper — the students in his school doing nearly all the work of the printing. He was a leader in the free-soil party, and probably did as much as any other man toward making Iowa what she is to-day politically. His influence in the State was great, not on account of his position, for he did not seek political preferment, but because of his strong character, which impressed all with whom he came in contact with his own enthusiasm. Pre-eminently was this true with his pupils; he inspired them with confidence and created in them a self-reliance which amounted almost to egotism. In his methods he was original. "Thoroughness" was his motto. His only rule in school was "Attend to your own business and let others alone." His own rule of life was "Do what is right." He therefore hated shams, compromises and wrongs, and having a positive nature, whenever he met them there was a contest. He was remarkable for his industry, led an active and fruitful life, and his moral and educational influence in Iowa and the surrounding region will be permanent and imperishable.

An obituary notice of him in a local paper closes thus: "He was a teacher, a reformer, a Christian, a hero; his genius was patience and indomitable perseverance; inflexible in purpose, puritanic in thought and feeling, incorruptible in honesty, faithful to his trust, he had but few peers while living, and dead, he placed mankind under obligations that may be discharged only by posterity."

OSCAR P. HOWE (i.) has been twenty-five years a teacher in New York city; vice-principal of a grammar school; principal of an evening school.

Doct. JOHN S. PANABAKER *m.* Elizabeth W. (ii.), was born in Ohio; educated as a physician and was successful in his practice; lived for a time at Dayton, Ohio, and removed to Mount Pleasant, Iowa, where he died, very highly esteemed. Gen. PERLEY P. PITKIN went in his eleventh year with his father from Marshfield to East Montpelier, where his education was completed under the eye of his grandfather, Gen. HON. REDMAN D. STEPHENS was educated at Alfred Seminary, now Alfred University, New York, graduating in 1851 ; taught one year at Cuba, New York, and began the study of law with R. L. Brundage, of Hornellsville, N. Y. ; admitted to

practice Sept. 1853; attended lectures 1853-4 and 1854-5 at Albany Law School. He then went west, and in March, 1855, settled at Marion, Iowa, where he became a partner in the law firm of Isbell, Hubbard & Stephens, and continued in practice until 1863, meantime being interested in the banking firm of Winslow, Hubbard & Stephens. In 1863 the First National Bank of Marion was organized, of which he was made cashier, and in Sept. 1864, president. In May, 1882, at the solicitation of leading business men at Cedar Rapids, he organized the Merchants National Bank there, of which he was the president. In Oct. 1882, he removed from Marion to Cedar Rapids and was closely identified with the business interests of the place.

He was supervisor at Marion, and representative from Linn County in the State legislature, where he took a high rank, being a worker as well as a good debater and having a good knowledge of public affairs and parliamentary law. He was largely interested in railroads, and efficient in procuring the location and building of several lines in the vicinity of Cedar Rapids, and for ten years was an officer in one corporation.

His business enterprises were numerous. He was president of the Linseed Oil Paint Company, director in the Board of Trade, also in the Eagle Woolen Mill Company, trustee of Iowa College, at Grinnell, treasurer of the Dairy Board of Trade, trustee of Coe College, Cedar Rapids, local treasurer of the Union Mutual Aid Insurance Company, of Waterloo; deacon of the Congregational church at Marion, of which he was a generous supporter, and where he paid freely toward the building of a large and handsome house of worship.

Amid all the complications of his busy life he found time to aid and encourage the young people in their local literary circle, and for several weeks before his death had led them in the study of astronomy.

A local paper says: "Intellectually he was a remarkable man. His fund of knowledge apparently embraced all departments of learning, and rare were the men whom he could not meet in conversation on their own ground. For general ability, integrity of character, business enterprise and public worth there remain few, if any, superiors. Cut down in the prime of life, he leaves an ample fortune, an honored name, and a revered memory."

Hon. J. B. Grinnell wrote thus of him: "The death of Mr. Stephens is a great loss to the friends of Iowa College, of which he was a warm-hearted and able trustee. His visits afforded great pleasure for the cheer he brought and fine business plans relating to the finances, where he was at home. Our national banking system he explained and defended with great skill. And in both Marion and Cedar Rapids there are evidences of an honorable and successful career worthy of imitation. He was active in the church and one of the founders of the new Congregational society in Cedar Rapids."

It is not surprising that we have to add the probable cause of his death was his over-exertion. His widow is his successor as president of the Merchants Bank at Cedar Rapids.

AUGUSTUS S. MERMOD was born of Christian parents; left motherless at five years of age; reared under the watch and

care of the National Church of Switzerland; had little opportunity for education, his services in his boyhood being required to aid in the maintenance of the family. In 1845 he landed at New York and went thence directly to St. Louis. Having learned watch-making at home, he entered at once the service of Eugene Jaccard, who had been for several years established there in the watch and jewelry trade, and was employed at the bench until 1849. In 1850 he became a partner in the business, which flourished so that in a few years it stood at the head of the trade in the city. In 1864 Mr. Mermod sold out to Mr. Jaccard, and in copartnership with D. C. Jaccard, who had been a partner in the old firm, and C. F. Mathey, who had been a clerk, initiated a new enterprise in the same line, under the style of D. C. Jaccard & Co., which after a few years of close competition gained a standing and steadily increased its operations until in 1872, when its firm name was changed to Mermod, Jaccard & Co. Since that time the business has largely increased, until their sales, including watches, jewelry, silver-ware, fancy goods, etc., now exceed those of any other retail establishment in the line in the country, with the single exception of Tiffany & Co., of New York.

Mr. Mermod united with the Presbyterian church in 1847 and has since been a liberal supporter of religious and charitable institutions; a constant and earnest Sabbath-school worker, and for many years elder of the church at Kirkwood (about thirteen miles from St. Louis), where he has resided for twenty-five years.

Mrs. Mermod was a woman of superior worth. The circumstances of her death were peculiar and impressive. We copy in part an account written for the press at the time by Rev. R. Irwin, of St. Louis. "Hers was a Christian heroism worthy the martyr's age. More than nine years she had walked under the shadow of a strange malady that baffled the skill of physicians of this and other countries, . . . and at last, without hesitation, consented to submit to the only alternative, the skill of surgery. The day and the hour were fixed. . . . On that morning she moved through the beautiful grounds that surrounded the house with as much cheerfulness as the birds that on that spring day sang in the trees above her. . . . When the surgeon came she received him and other members

of the profession with queenly grace, as though welcoming them to a banquet. She bade her family adieu, and without quivering lip or faltering nerve placed her hand on the surgeon and said: 'Now, doctor, help me up.' That hour of awful suspense! Hushed in prayer were the inmates of that house, and of many others, in which she was held dear. When it was announced that the operation could not be continued without immediate death ensuing, the bitter disappointment of friends was inexpressible. When her pastor broke the news to her she said: 'I lay down on this table with my head pillowed on my Father's promise: I will not fail thee nor forsake thee. He has not failed me nor forsaken me; now He will take me to himself.' . . . This was faith's victory. On Friday morning, the second day afterward, she passed to glory to receive the crown.

"Such lives are rare. The church at Kirkwood has suffered a severe loss; the pastor mourns the death of a valued friend and co-worker; the rich and poor alike realize that they have lost an exemplar and a friend."

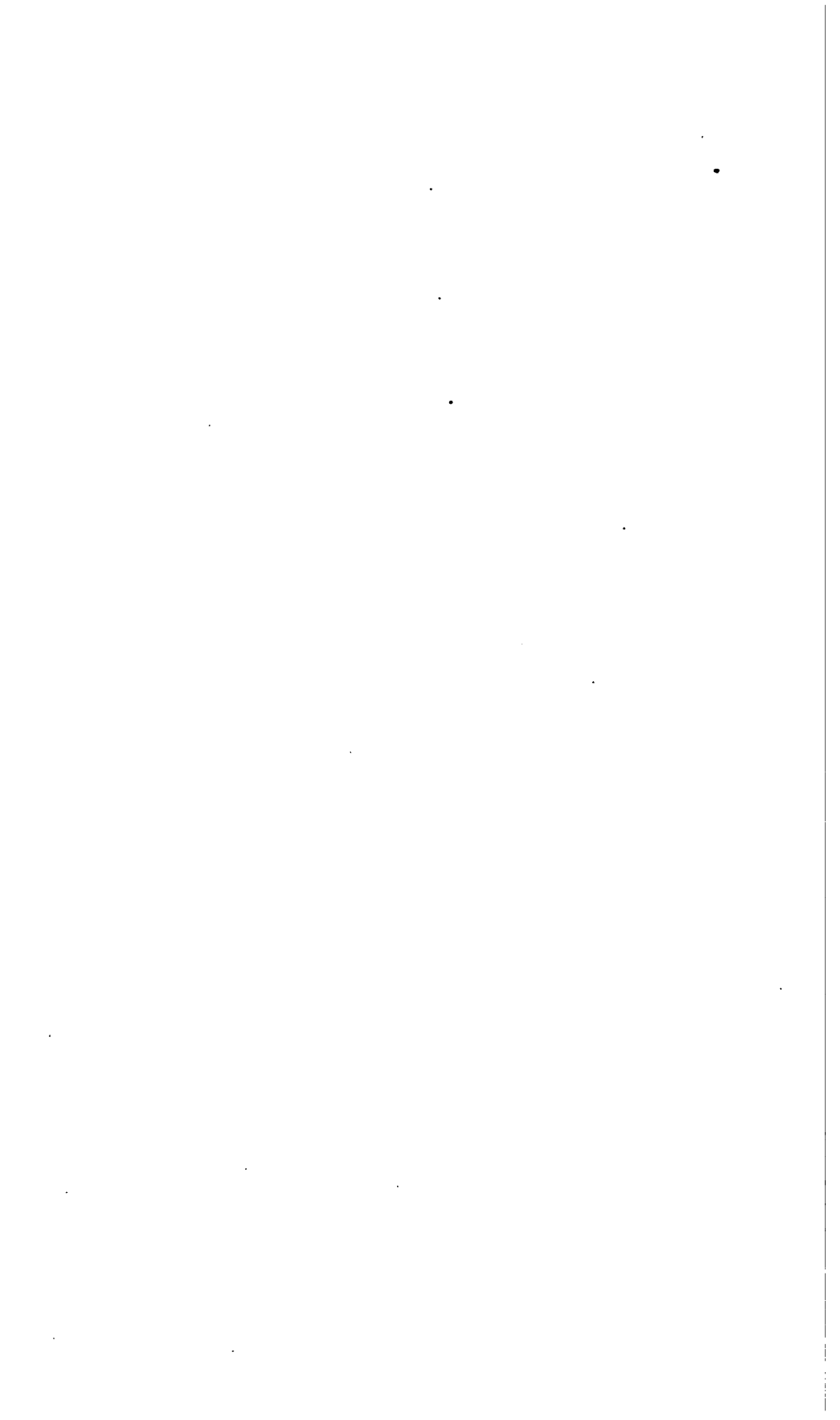

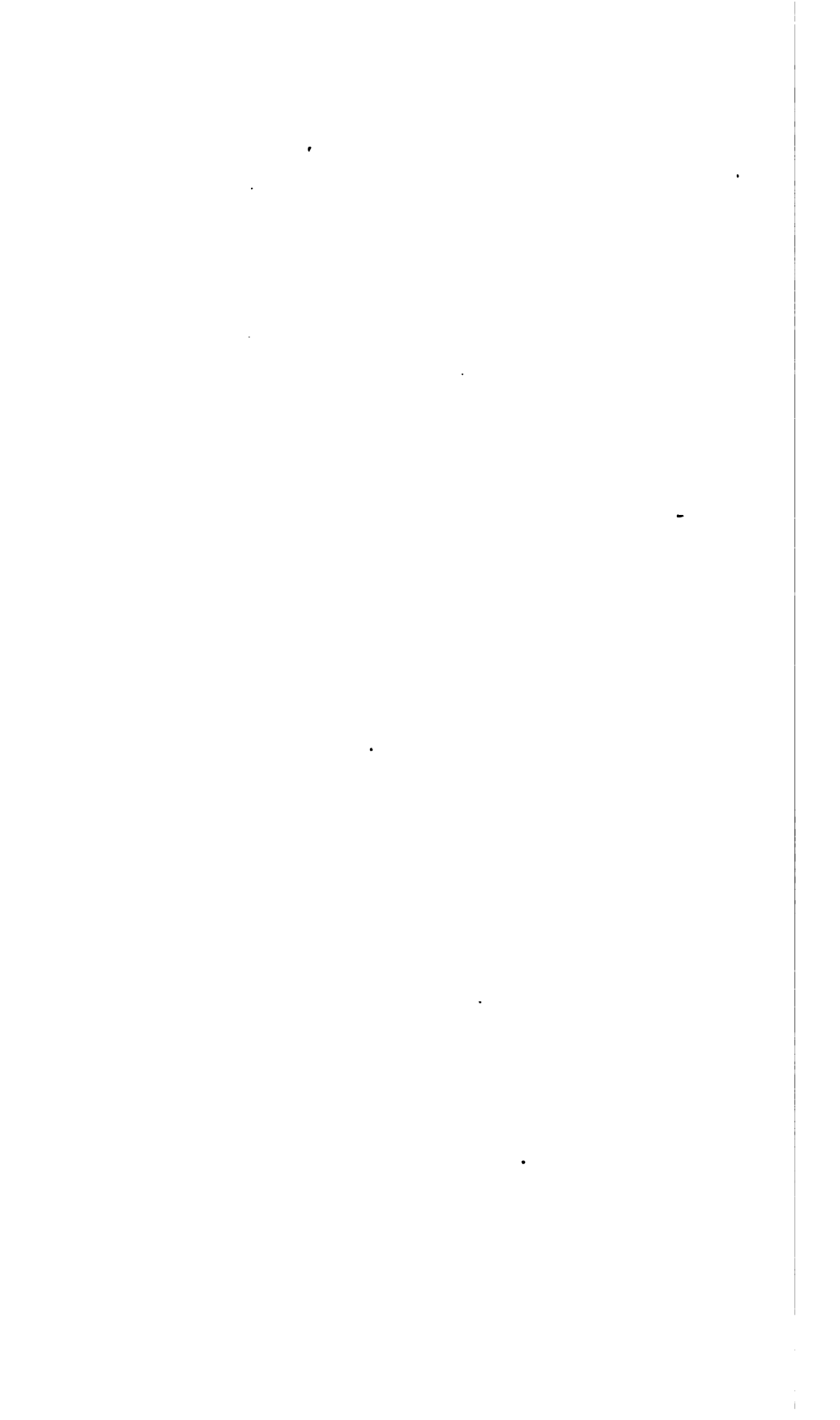

JOSEPH³ DAVIS was a cordwainer at Roxbury; in 1710 bought of his father a house and fifteen acres of land, partly in Roxbury and partly in Brookline, the house being in Brookline. This estate he and his wife Elizabeth sold, in 1717, to Joseph Scott. He died soon after. Jacob Chamberlain was administrator of his estate, on whose bond appears the name of Ichabod Davis. James Griggs was one of his appraisers; total of inventory, £415. His sons, Joseph and John, received his whole estate, excepting the widow's thirds, and gave a bond to distribute it equally among the heirs. It seems that most or all of these children settled at Woodstock, Conn., as we find their names, with the exception of Ebenezer, on the church records there.

*This may have been the Ebenezer Davis who came to Oxford and bought a farm on the hill north-east of the centre of the town — being the place now owned by Dea. Shepardson — married Lydia Dana, and had eleven children. He died in 1792. Elizabeth, his oldest child, married Dea. Edward Davis, of Dudley [see 16].

ROGER JEWETT was the son of Stephen Jewett, of Oxford, Mass., who removed to Lanesboro, Mass. SOLOMON SHAW learned the blacksmith's trade; during the war of 1812 was employed at Waters' Armory, Millbury, Mass. In 1814 and 1815 he built a house and water-power shop at Shawville, Wales, and began the making of hoes, scythes, axes, etc.; spent his later years upon a farm. JOHN JEWETT learned woolen manufacturing, and soon after his majority began, with two or three partners, making broad-cloths at "Merino Factory," in Dudley. About 1824 he engaged in company with Hon. Aaron Tufts and others in running two mills, the one in the valley west of Dudley Centre, the other at Shepherd's Mills — afterward called "Ramshorn Factory" — in the north part of the town. Soon after they were incorporated as the "Tufts Manufacturing Company," built a new mill, and removed all their interests to the northern location. Later, changes were made in proprietorship and Tufts and Jewett became sole owners, continuing the business successfully until 1843, when Tufts died. Jewett bought out Tufts' heirs and carried on the manufacturing alone until 1864, when he sold out, having been in the business for forty years. He later bought the original Edward Davis [16] farm at Dudley Centre, which was his home until his decease. He was an able business man, honorable in his transactions, and was president of the Oxford Bank from 1849 to 1857.

ELIJAH SHAW in his youth learned the trade of a boot and shoe bottomer, which he followed until twenty years of age, a part of the time employing several hands and selling goods in Hartford. In 1839, in partnership with his brother Warren, he began the manufacture of edge tools and carriages, which was continued until 1848. The building of the second woolen mill in Wales was begun in 1847, and in February, 1848, its proprietors, the three brothers, Warren, Elijah, and Eden D. Shaw, were incorporated under the name of "The Shaw Manufacturing Company." In 1850 Elijah was made agent of the company, under whose management the business increased and flourished, and new buildings were erected as occasion required until they had built five mills, of which he had the supervision. Later, Warren and Eden D. retired, and Elijah has since been sole owner and manager. Elijah Shaw has been

prominent in the management of the public affairs of the place, having filled the principal town offices, and in 1854, 1864 and 1865 was representative to the legislature. He has also been a leading man in the Baptist church, and a few years since built their present house of worship, at a cost of about twenty thousand dollars, and presented it to the society.

At the close of the late war he became interested in the cause of the freedmen at the south and aided materially in establishing a school for colored people at Raleigh, North Carolina. This institution prospered under the supervision of the Baptist denomination, and in 1870, by means of a donation of eight thousand dollars from Mr. Shaw, was enabled considerably to enlarge its operations, and he being the largest contributor to its funds his name was given to the school, it being known as the "Shaw Institute" until 1875, when it was incorporated under the name of the "Shaw University." It has normal, college, theological and medical departments, and holds property valued at one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars. Rev. BIOGRAPHICAL AND PERSONAL NOTES.

PAGE 126 [135]. Capt. WILLIAM DAVIS.—The sons of Capt. Daniel Davis were all born in Connecticut, and, excepting Willard, the eldest, who remained in his native State, went with their father to Ohio, where they matured amid the unfavorable circumstances of a frontier life. Opportunities for education and advancement were few, and they were early familiarized with the perils of Indian warfare and the hardships of garrison and campaign life, and spent many months of their early manhood in the old fort which stood on the banks of the Muskingum River, near Waterford, the place of their father's residence. Notwithstanding these adverse conditions, most or all of them arose to fill the positions of honorable and useful citizens, whose influence for good was marked and widely and permanently felt.

William was seventeen years of age at the time of the emigration, his birthday occurring while on the journey, and for five years subsequently his chief employment was aiding his father in defending the new settlement from the hostile Miamis and subduing and bringing under cultivation the soil from which their subsistence was to come. Wayne's victory occurring in August, 1794, in November of the same year he was married, and about the same time drew a hundred-acre lot in the Bear Creek allotment, Adams township, about twelve miles above Marietta, on the banks of the Muskingum. On this tract he and his brother Daniel—who was with him for a time—soon after built a cabin and began clearing the land, chopping down

the trees with the loaded rifle leaning against them that they might be prepared for an attack from the enemy. Here he and his little family struggled heroically with want and privation for the first few months, but gradually surrounded themselves with the comforts and appliances of civilized life. On a bluff near the river he built a house, a horse-power grist-mill with a wool-carding machine attached, a rope-walk, a blacksmith-shop and a cooper-shop, and being a natural mechanic operated either of them as occasion required. Here he continued to live and prosper, raised a numerous family and died at a ripe age.

He was of a social and hospitable disposition, and, although not much accustomed to making visits, gave a warm welcome to his friends. He was in manner gentlemanly and courteous; unambitious of office but served as township trustee, treasurer, and school director; was many years deacon of the Christian church and was strict in religious matters; captain of the militia. While the Muskingum River improvements by the State were in progress he opened his house to public entertainment and continued thus for several years.

He was among the prominent and influential men of the place, and his death was greatly mourned by a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

His second wife, Sarah, came to America with her parents at about five years of age. Her first husband was Jacob Shepard. She next married Theophilus Ransom, and lastly Capt. Davis. She was a very estimable person, possessing great kindness of heart, and was specially efficient in times of sickness and trial.

PAGE 127 [136]. DANIEL DAVIS lived at Marietta until the death of his wife Sally, and two or three years later removed to Barnard, Vt., having married for a second wife a native of that town. He remained there until 1818, when he went to Stockholm, St. Lawrence County, New York. He there took up a tract of one hundred acres of wild land, which he subdued and on which he built a house, which was his home during his subsequent life. The town was then in its infancy and he took a leading part in the management of its affairs, filling for many years important offices, being twenty years town clerk and justice of the peace. His house was for several years the place of holding town meetings.

He was a man of good character and excellent mind ; held in esteem by his townsmen and confided in as a person of candor and sound judgment, and often consulted in matters of law and equity.

PAGE 127 [137]. Capt. HEZEKIAH DAVIS was a farmer, residing on the Olive Green River—a tributary of the Muskingum—in a comparatively isolated township eight or ten miles from the residence of his brother, Col. Jesse. Like his brothers he was remarkable for his physical strength and agility, and in the games of ball-playing, wrestling and foot-racing at the old fort was among the most accomplished. William excelled in ball-playing and Hezekiah was the champion wrestler. During the war of 1812 he was a teamster in the command which marched from Washington County to Sandusky. He was captain of militia, and a man of much influence in his town ; respected, being a man of substantial worth, sober and earnest, and yet of an amiable and kindly disposition, which made him a general favorite. The Indians were specially attached to him and often showed their friendship by furnishing his table with their choicest pieces of venison when no other white man could get it from them.

When taken ill he was removed to the house of his brother, Col. Jesse, for care and medical treatment, and died there after a short sickness. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity and his funeral was conducted under the direction of the Order.

His sons came up to be worthy and honorable men, notwithstanding their early orphanage and the disadvantages of frontier life. [See Page 512 : 368, 369, 370].

PAGE 128 [138]. Col. JESSE DAVIS was in many respects a remarkable man. He had not only a stalwart frame and a noble and commanding presence, but strong intellectual endowments joined with a decision of character and a moral courage and persistence in maintaining the right which made his influence for good great in the community in which he lived. He was a farmer, energetic and thrifty, and possessing good business talent and executive abilities above mediocrity. Opportunities for mercantile enterprises in the region in which he lived were limited, and the chief marketing of farm produce was done by

means of flat-boats on the rivers. An incident in the history of Col. Davis illustrates his tact, self-reliance and perseverance. At a certain time he devised a plan of taking a load of produce up the Kanawha River to the salt-works in Virginia and there exchanging it for salt, and marketing it in the towns below on the large rivers. He prospered in his design until he attempted to dispose of his cargo, when he found that the markets were overstocked and there was no sale at a remunerative price. Casting about him in his dilemma he conjectured that in the rich grazing country on the upper White River—a stream of somewhat difficult ascent on account of its swift current—there would probably be a demand for salt. He therefore turned his craft thitherward and after several weeks of severe labor in pushing his heavy freight against the stream reached his destination and found he had not misjudged in the matter. Soon an advantageous exchange was made, and with his boat loaded with fat cattle he made directly for New Orleans where he immediately realized a good return in money for his venture. Starting homeward on the first steamboat which ascended the Mississippi and Ohio rivers, he arrived safely after having been gone a year and a half, his family not having heard from him during the last seven months of his absence.

His residence was in Waterford township, on the Olive Green River, until 1821, when he removed to Champaign County, engaged in farming and stock-raising, and in two or three years after his removal died in the fullness of a ripe and vigorous manhood.

He was active in public affairs; for many years town clerk; justice of the peace; colonel of militia—a very efficient officer, and when mounted on his horse in military dress presented a noble appearance.

A relative writes: "Abounding in the amenities of life, eminently placable and of a genial, kindly disposition, he yet possessed the lion's boldness in defence of the right and the protection of the weak and needy. He was a Christian gentleman, conscientious and true, and seldom is there found a man who occupies the high public positions which he filled who enjoys more entirely the genuine respect and esteem of the people."

PAGE 164 [184]. FRANKLIN ADAMS was a manufacturer of and dealer in lumber at Bangor, Maine.

PAGE 165 [184, v.]. DAVIS F. ADAMS is a coal dealer at Lynn, Mass.

PAGE 165 [184, vi.]. ESTES F. ADAMS is in the lumber business at Bangor, of the firm of Stockwell, Adams & Co.

PAGE 283 [354]. WALTER DAVIS lived during his minority with his father at Adams, and was employed in the grist-mill and wool-carding room. Soon after coming of age in 1829 he married and settled upon a farm near the homestead, where he lived until 1834. He then removed to Marion County, Ohio, having bought a farm of one hundred and sixty acres on which was a water-privilege. Here he built a saw-mill, which he operated and also cultivated his farm.

He was an estimable man, of a gentle and cheerful disposition, a kind husband and father, and was generally respected; an exemplary member of the Christian church. His wife—a good and highly esteemed Christian woman—died in Kenton, Ohio, 1 March, 1883.

PAGE 289 [361]. Capt. EDWIN O. DAVIS went at six years of age with his father's family from Marietta to Barnard, Vt., where he lived until he was sixteen years old. He then removed to Stockholm, St. Lawrence County, N. Y., where (with the exception of one year spent in Vermont) he remained until 1825, living with his father who had removed thither. He then went to Fowler, N. Y., where he married. He was there part owner of a distillery in which he was employed at the time. Having bought a large tract of land at Fowler, he later engaged in farming and dairying. His estate bordered on the wilderness of northern New York and he was somewhat noted as a hunter. Running through his farm was a mill-stream on which he had a saw-mill and shingle-mill, which he operated, at the same time cultivating his farm. His severe labors brought on a rheumatic affection which several years since obliged him to give up his active life, and from which he has been a great sufferer in his old age. His land he has distributed to his children. Edwin,

the eldest, is living at the homestead, and Amasa S., Almira J., Asa and Daniel have each a portion of the old farm on which they have their homes.

Mr. Davis has been an active man in public affairs at Fowler, having been school commissioner, road commissioner, and assessor for a number of years; and is known in the region as "Capt. Davis," having been captain of the militia. He is in good standing as a citizen and respected as a moral and upright man.

PAGE 289 [362]. SAMUEL W. DAVIS removed to Dakota and is now (1883) living with his children, a number of whom have homesteads there.

PAGE 289 [362, iii.]. JULIUS A. DAVIS is a carpenter at San Francisco.

PAGE 291 [365]. ASA F. DAVIS is a merchant, keeping a general store, in partnership with his son Washington, at Keosauqua, Iowa.

PAGE 292 [367, iv.]. JULIUS BEACH lives at Guthrie, Iowa. Shoemaker.

PAGE 292 [368]. DANIEL DAVIS left the Muskingum valley in young manhood and was a farmer at New Haven, Ohio.

PAGE 293 [369]. EPHRAIM DAVIS was a farmer in Fulton County, Illinois, whither he had removed from Ohio but a few years before his decease. Ann, his widow, died 12 April, 1883, at Lewistown, Illinois.

PAGE 293 [370]. CHARLES DAVIS is (1883) a prosperous farmer in Washington County, Ohio. Post-office address, Luke Chute.

PAGE 294 [371]. NANCY C., wife of William M. Davis, died 17 July, 1882.

PAGE 294 [371, viii.]. ROLLA H. DAVIS married Annie Jones; settled in Washington Territory, where he is engaged in lumber business.

PAGE 292 [367]. Mrs. CHARLOTTE, widow of Albert Beach, is now (1883) living in Ohio, in her eighty-second year. One who knew her well in her younger days writes: "She was a noble specimen of the true woman—lovely in character as in person." A daughter now living in Illinois says: "She has been a sincere and humble Christian since her early youth; and the most constant reader of the Bible I ever knew. She possessed a rare and beautiful courage and an unquenchable hopefulness that I never met with in any other person; for, although her life has been full of toil and hard and bitter experiences, I never saw her despondent, even for a moment—her courage seemed always to rise above the difficulty, however great it might be.

PAGE 294 [372]. JESSE DAVIS was left fatherless at four years of age, and was in his boyhood under the care and direction of his uncle, Col. Jesse Davis. His genial, confiding and unselfish disposition greatly endeared him to his relatives. At twelve years of age, by the death of his uncle, he was thrown upon his own resources and "worked out" among friends at a small compensation. By his manliness and sterling character he made his way and was prospered, and about the time of his marriage settled upon a farm in north-western Ohio, where he succeeded financially and was in high standing as a citizen. He died at the age of thirty-seven years, much beloved.

A relative writes: "There will be few referred to in your record more worthy of respectful remembrance than he."

PAGE 295 [373]. STEPHEN DAVIS was, before his marriage, captain of a canal-boat on the Muskingum River. In 1842, after the improvements in the river navigation by building dams and locks, he settled near Windsor and was employed as lock-tender until near his death. He was a good citizen, intelligent and respected by all who knew him.

PAGE 296 [375]. Doct. SIMON DAVIS had a good common school education in Ohio, and at seventeen years of age received a certificate of qualification to teach; studied medicine at the medical school in Missouri which has since been merged in the State University, graduating in 1844, and practiced his profession for twenty years in Buchanan County, Mo.; on account

of climate removed to California and settled in 1871 at College City, where he now (1883), at the age of seventy-five years, continues in practice with all the enthusiasm of his younger days.

PAGE 296 [375, v.]. Doct. ALVA C. DAVIS studied medicine with his father and his brother, George W.; attended lectures at San Francisco; completed his educational course at Nashville, Tennessee, where he graduated in 1881, the valedictorian in a class of over four hundred. He is (1883) in successful practice at Chico, Cal.

PAGE 405 [587]. FRANK GODDARD died Oct. 1882.

PAGE 405 [588]. JOHN B. THOMPSON was born in 1834 at Gouverneur, N. Y.; married in 1873 at West Point, Nebraska, whither his wife had previously removed and had established a millinery store; settled soon after at Neligh, Neb., where he built a flouring-mill, then the best in the State. There he was post-master, justice of the peace, and school director. He sold his mill-property in the spring of 1874 and about a year later removed to Petaluma, California, and thence in 1880 to Grant County, Dakota, where he engaged in farming on an estate of three hundred and twenty acres, and also followed his trade, which was that of a carpenter; now (1883) continues there.

Their third child, Viola E., died 23 Sept. 1877; Josie E. was born 27 July, 1878, at Petaluma; Mabel, born 8 May, 1883, at Sherman, Dakota.

PAGE 416 [616]. CHARLES DAVIS is a farmer at Havana, Ohio.

PAGE 420 [627]. HENRY M. DAVIS resides (1883) at Ontario, Wisconsin.

PAGE 496 [856]. DR. CALVIN H. WARD went in 1843, when less than three years of age, from Monson, Mass., to Bristol, Wis., near Kenosha, and has since resided there; is a homœopathic physician. His wife, Mary A. Gillam, was born 12 Aug. 1843, at Rushford, New York.

PAGE 496 [857]. GEORGE D. DAVIS is a mechanic and farmer at Bristol, Wis. His wife, Julia Stanton, was born in 1830, at Nelson, Oneida County, New York.

EXTRACTS FROM AN ACCOUNT-BOOK OF EBENEZER DAVIS.

EBENEZER DAVIS [15] and his brother, Col. JACOB [17], lived as neighbors at Charlton, and their business relations as well as social were of an intimate nature. An account-book of the former is in the possession of his descendants, from which we gather some interesting facts concerning their pecuniary transactions. It cannot be doubted that while Ebenezer was growing rich from his government contracts during the Revolutionary War, the means of Col. Jacob were being reduced in his years of devotion to his country's interests. On his removal to Vermont, his home farm, mill and some other property were left in the management of Ebenezer, the rents and proceeds of which were duly credited to Jacob.

The following memoranda indicate the disposition finally made of this property :

A large running account with Jacob Davis appears, beginning April, 1782, and going on to Sept. 1790, when a settlement was made. After that date there are a few scattering entries down to 1800, when they cease.

The following quotations from this account show the movements of "the boys."

"1785	Oct 15	To two dollars in cash to equip the boys for school [probably Jacob, Jr., then 17, and his brother Thomas, then 13, at Leicester Academy].
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- 1786 Nov. 18. To half a day at the Academy to settle with Trask for y^e boy's board and to see about future board
 29. Paid Dr. Flint [Leicester] for doctoring Ezra (Ezra [106] then aged 12, son of Capt. Reuben [21] who was under the guardianship of his uncle Jacob).
- 1787 Jan 25. Paid for tuition over and above the order on the treasurer, for the 3 boys up to April next.
 Feb. 19. To 24 shillings for Ezra's books and 6 shillings for Thomas' wood.
 Paid Jos. Scott for Jacob, Thomas, and Ezra board from Jan 1, 1787 to 10 of July y^e same year at y^e Academy [Jacob and Thomas went soon after 10 July, to Montpelier, and Ezra into the employ of his uncle Ebenezer].

The following extracts are of interest as throwing light upon the removal of Col. Jacob, his sons and his nephews to Montpelier.

In March, 1787, "goods" were sent to Royalton, which lies about twenty-five miles south of Montpelier. These "goods" were probably in part Col. Davis' household furniture :

The June following another load "went up."

In Jan. 1788, three loads were sent up.

1788. March 1, there is a charge for carrying a sleigh load to Montpelier, £6. 4. 0

- "May 23. To 2 days self to procure cattle and cash to go to Bennington.
 To 4 oxen, 2 steers, 1 cow
 To 11 days self and horse to Bennington to drive cattle, and other matters, paid for expenses on the journey for myself and Capt. Lamb (brother-in-law [20]) and the drove
 "June 25 To 4 days self and horse to Worcester, Sutton, and Oxford to procure articles for the team, and expense money and to see Phelps [Ebenezer, of Sutton, the mill-wright].
 "July 23 For a journey of David Lamb with 3 horses and a wagen to Sutton, and to Montpelier with a load."

This "load" was probably the more intricate parts of the saw-mill built by Mr. Phelps at his shop at Sutton.

Charged at this time and probably a part of the load, were sickles, files, steel, sledge-hammer, pick-axe, new rum, butter, cheese, etc.

"1789 Jan 6 To 2 days self and horse to get team and expense to carry up loading."

Charged at this date—new rum, butter, cheese, axes, gudgeons to swing mill-stones, sole leather, upper leather, and leather aprons.

"Jan. 30. Paid Ebenezer Phelps for his work at Montpelier [building a saw-mill]	£42. 15. 6
Paid Jonathan Sibley [Phelps' assistant]	22. 9. 9."

The names of both are appended to the declaration of settlement, Sept. 18; 1790, as follows :

Jacob Davis

Ebenezer Davis being guardian of his nephews, Parley [97], Nathaniel [98], and Hezekiah [99], the details of his money transactions with them are in this book.

We learn that Parley was living in 1780 and 1781 at Ward, now Auburn, with Haynes Learned, who married his aunt Mary [23]. He was placed under the guardianship of his uncle Ebenezer 20 March, 1782. On the 16 April he left Ward, having received for his labor, "over and above what we had of said Learned," £8, and began work for his guardian at Charlton, where he continued till 29 Jan. 1783. He then "began to go to school and Mar. 25 left off." He then began work for Mr. David Rich, and continued during the year 1783.

A running account, chiefly for clothing and personal furnishings, goes on to 1792, falling off very much in amount in the later years. We find charged in this account "tow cloth for shirts and trousers—shoe buckles—axes—new rum—deer-skin breeches—use of a bed at the academy—turning a coat and

thread for the same — a snap-sack,” and at two different dates “one dollar, cash, for thanksgiving.” 1787, Nov. 5, is charged

“Paid brother Jonathan for Parley’s surveying instruments £6. 12.”

Mr. Davis became guardian of Nathaniel 11 Feb. 1784. On April 17, 1788, is charged “cash for expenses to Montpelier \$1.00.” Same date is credit “received of Jonathan Davis [Oxford, 25] for the work that Nathaniel has done for him over and above paying for his clothes and learning £6. 10.” 1790, Feb. 26, were charged “timber to make a sled — a pair of oxen — tow-cloth — four axes — six handles — 48 shillings in cash,” and a few minor articles, indicating that Nathaniel went with his oxen and sled and a load to Montpelier. No further entry occurs until Oct. 22 of the same year, when we have the concise statement, “Nath^l came down.”

Following this there is a small account, mostly for clothing, running to 4 March, 1791, when he is charged, among other things, with various kinds of grass seed — “200 nails” — “provisions for his journey,” and he probably left again for Vermont.

Of Hezekiah, Capt. Jesse Stone was the first guardian. On June 2, 1790, he transferred his trust to Ebenezer Davis, and the latter part of this year Hezekiah lived with his uncle Levi, at Charlton. In 1791, from “the fore part of January” he boarded with his guardian and went to school until near March. On the 4th and 5th of this month he is charged with various articles of clothing, “boiled meat, bread and nuts for his journey” — cheese — pork — “84 foot of boards to fix his sled — one bushel of ears of corn for his journey” — and Hezekiah left with his ox team for Montpelier.

In the next October entries begin again and continue through the winter, indicating that he spent the early winter at Charlton. 1792, Jan. 26, is a charge

“For cash to pay for land and expense — £37. 10^s. Feb. 2, paid for tools £23. 15. 9. — a pair of oxen — 22 dollars to buy things at Boston — cash for his journey 20. dollars” — butter, a kettle — “timber for a sled.”

Here the account with Hezekiah closes. He being now nearly twenty years of age, left his native State to make a permanent home in Vermont.

After the death of Capt. Reuben Davis [21] his widow was appointed administratrix of his estate, and her brother-in-law, Ebenezer, was her adviser and assistant in the management of its affairs until her marriage with Doct. Waters, 15 Jan. 1783. He was also the guardian of the daughters, Matilda and Sally, and the youngest son, Reuben.

The following memoranda show the resources of the children :

- " 1783, Apr. 9, received into my hands from Doctor Waters five hundred and ten pounds, twelve shillings, y^r same being three fifth parts of y^r net proceeds of y^r real estate of Reuben Davis, late of Charlton, deceased, one third part of which sum being y^r dower, y^r interest of which I am to pay to said Waters' wife annually so long as y^r principal remains in my hands."
- " 1784, May 20 Rec'd of Doct. Waters out of the personal estate of Reuben Davis aforesaid seventy seven pounds one shilling and one penny."
- " 1785 Dec 31 Rec'd of Doct. Waters out of the personal estate of Reuben Davis, twenty five pounds, six shillings and five pence in full for Matilda, Sally & Reuben's part of the personal estate."

We have seen from the account with Jacob Davis that Ezra, the eldest son, was for a time at Leicester Academy, and left there in July, 1787. In August following he began work for his uncle Ebenezer, which he continued until April, 1789, a period of about twenty months. The last entry on his account is for a coat, 18 April, 1789. He was then nearly sixteen years of age, and must soon thereafter have begun his business life at Boston.

We find an account with Matilda running from 20 May, 1784, to 1796, when a settlement was made with her husband, Samuel Jones. This account is chiefly for money, clothing, schooling (a short time at Leicester Academy), and personal furnishings. The girls, as appears, lived with their step-father, Doct. Waters.

There is a smaller account with Sally, running from 20 May, 1784, to 1797, which was settled with her husband, Col. Spurr, 10 April, 1798. This shows payments for board, clothing, doctor's bills, etc.

- " 1794 Sept 22 cash to buy wine brandy and medicines for sally £1. 0. 1
— 1795 Jan. 19. cash to buy clothing and for her expenses to Boston for the recovery of her health £9. 0. 0.— 1797 June 16, to 5 dollars to bear expense to Boston— July 8 to 40 dollars that Asa sent you to Boston.— July 14 to 50 dollars delivered to your mother to send to you at Boston"—

perhaps in anticipation of her marriage, which occurred a few months afterward.

A small account with the child, Reuben, appears, of which the following is the last entry :

“For cash paid Dr. Waters for board, clothing, doctoring, nursing, and funeral expenses from Apr. 9, 1783 to Jan. 8, 1785,”

at which date he died.

From this book we learn that on the fourth of November, 1783, Mr. Davis became the guardian of Esther and Sarah Hammond, of Charlton. The latter became the wife of Jonathan Davis [25] 12 Sept. 1787, and on 5 Nov. 1787, the affairs of her estate were settled with her husband.

An account with Samuel Kies [85] begins May, 1814, indicating that his removal from Brooklyn, Conn., to Charlton occurred about this time. This was the year in which Levi Davis sold his father's homestead to Mr. Kies, see Note, 113.

EDWARD DAVIS, JR., A SOLDIER.

Edward Davis [16] was a soldier in the French and Indian War. A petition by his father to the authorities at Boston sets forth that he was in Capt. John Larned's company [Oxford];

was sick with fever at Ticonderoga; was carried on board a vessel on Lake George; arrived where Fort William Henry stood; hiring help, went by water carriage to Albany, and with difficulty got to Sheffield, Mass., remaining there some time under Dr. Breck's care. The father went for him with a man and a horse and wagon. He was sick and under the doctor's care several weeks after getting home. Remuneration was asked. Granted, £1. 19^s. 4^d.

"Oxford June 8th, 1762 then Rec'd of Edward Davis Esqr twenty four Shillings Lawfull Money In full for what said Davis Rec'd of the Province Treasurer on account of a Petition that I had Granted by the General Court for my Sickness while I was in his Majesties Service In 1759 I say Rec'd by me

EXTRACTS FROM OLD TAX LISTS.

In Sept. 1770, a Province tax was assessed on estates in Oxford. On this list are as follows:

Edward, Jr., and Elisha are the largest two amounts on the list, and one other only is taxed more than Dea. Thomas.—[*Mass. Archives* 131, 264.

On a town list for 1771, Dea. Thomas Davis [4] is taxed for a "servant for life," one of the four negro slaves then owned in Oxford.

On the same list the tax of Edward Davis, Esq. [3], is larger than that of any other individual—fifteen persons are taxed for money at interest; of these are Edward Davis, Esq., £200, and Capt. Elisha Davis, £50.—[*Oxford Records*.]

PETITION FOR A "SCHOOL SQUADRON."

In February, 1782, a movement was made by the people of the easterly part of Oxford to be set off as a "School Squadron," a petition written and headed by Edward Davis, Esq., having been presented to the selectmen, in which the petitioners state that they "are very desirous to build a school-house in order to have [their] children have the benefit of schooling as well as other parts of the town." This request was signed by thirteen citizens, of whom seven were Davis by name, as follows:

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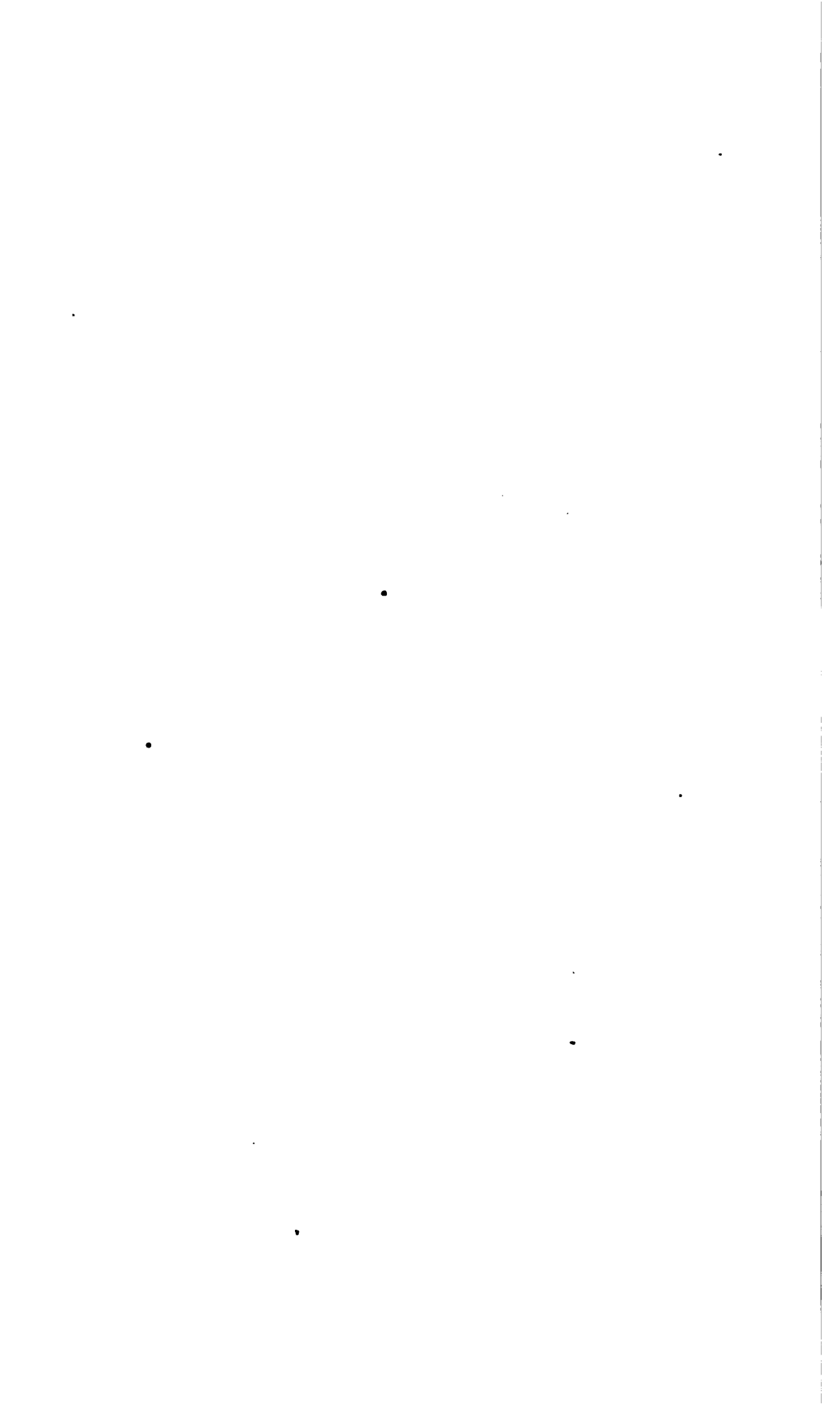
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
