Your Honorable Body will notice a discrepancy in this amount from last year, which is owing to the small stock of goods carried at present by merchants and jobbers, and the general prostration of business throughout the State.

The Real Estate Roll has this day been completed and delivered to the Clerk of your Honorable Body; the valuation of Property contained therein will not vary much from \$75,000,000.

Enclosed herewith I also submit for your approval a copy of my Annual Report to the Surveyor General of the State, together with the Statistics of the Manufacturing and Mechanical Industries of this City and County, which is intended as an appendix to this Report.

During my term, 6,184 voters have been registered to date in this office.

REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE.

Police Office, San Francisco, August 1, 1871.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors

Of the City and County of San Francisco:

Gentlemen—In compliance with Resolution No. 2,207 of your Honorable Board, I submit this the Annual Report of the Police Department for the year ending June 30, 1871.

The usual schedules are appended, viz:

Schedule "A"—Showing the number and classification of arrests made by the Police during the year.

Schedule "B"—Exhibit of value of property reported as stolen or lost during the year, and amount recovered by the Police.

Schedule "C"—Exhibits the number of witnesses subpænaed for the Police Judge's Court; nuisances and street obstructions abated; and lost children restored to parents and guardians by the Police during the year.

Schedule "D"—Cash received during the year from Sheriffs of other counties, Masters of Vessels and others, for the keeping of prisoners in the City Prison.

Schedule "E"—Unclaimed property and money in possession of the Chief of Police to June 30, 1871.

The number of Police Officers employed and paid by the City is the same as at the date of my last annual report—namely, four Captains and one hundred Policemen.

This number is not sufficient for the wants of the city, and many applications from citizens or property owners for the extension of Police patrol protection to districts outside the present field of patrol duty, have necessarily remained unsatisfied, from the fact that the officers could not be taken off the beats already established in the more thickly settled portion of the city, without injury to the public service.

Upon comparison of the number of our police and population with the police and population of other large cities, I find that our police force is far below the strength found to be required in other places.

New York has three policemen to our one, and London has three and one half, and Dublin five times as many policemen as we have, proportionally to population.

I submit a table, which has been prepared with some care from police reports and other sources, showing the population and police force of many large cities; and it will be noticed that of all the places named San Francisco has the fewest policemen.

Besides the above, New York has a large number of Fire Policemen, and Chicago has a very efficient private Police force, under Allen Pinkerton, Esq.

All property in the City and County pays an equal rate, in proportion to its value, for police purposes, and all owners are equally entitled to the benefits of the police organization, and all persons, without regard to property, are entitled to the equal protection of the laws.

To fulfil this duty and afford this protection, the beats which are regularly patrolled have been extended as far as could be done, with the present number of Policemen; and the Police force is distributed so as to extend the greatest protection to life and property possible with the given number of men.

It is true, the detection and arrest of a thief in one part of the city may prevent the commission of a robbery by him in some other part, and the suppression of vice or violence in one part of the city tends to the improvement and safety of all the inhabitants; so that the more distant portions of the city do get some protection, but not as much as the people ask for, or as the more central portions of the city receive.

Perhaps the most equitable plan would be to increase the Police force to a proper strength, proportional to our population, and then the field of patrol duty could be so extended that there would be less cause of complaint and fewer complainants of taxation without protection.

As our city grows larger in extent, and population increases and wealth accumulates, the necessity becomes greater for a sufficient, reliable and well-organized Police force, and the increased protection to life and property will make ample compensation for its cost.

LODGERS.

The number of destitute persons who, having no place to sleep, applied for lodging in the City Prison during the past year, was 1,911; and their number in proportion to the persons arrested was one lodger to seven arrests; the previous year it was one to ten arrests.

I find in a recent Philadelphia report that the number of lodgers in that city was two to one arrest, and in Chicago four to one arrest.

The number of these unfortunates, although comparatively very small in our city, is still sufficiently large to claim some better provision for them than has yet been made. They, if not criminal, should not be compelled to sleep in close proximity to the drunken or criminal occupants of the prison.

When the new City Hall is built the prison accommodations will be better, and it may be possible to separate the criminal from the indigent.

THE POLICE TELEGRAPH

Has worked well during the year, the instruments most used being those at the following stations: Harbor Police, Fourth and Harrison streets, Hayes Valley and the Mission.

The instrument at the Industrial School is chiefly of use to that institution; the instrument at Pacific and Larkin streets, has not been much used, the surrounding neighborhood being very quiet and orderly.

These instruments are all connected with the office of the Fire Alarm and Police Telegraph; and your Honorable Board has recently ordered that an instrument be placed in the Police Office.

REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS.

Fire Commissioners' Office, San Francisco, June 30, 1871.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors

Of the City and County of San Francisco.

Gentlemen—The Board of Fire Commissioners submit their Annual Report, showing the condition of the Fire Department of the City and County of San Francisco, for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1871.

At an election held on the 5th day of September, 1870, John Rosenfeld, Esq., was elected Fire Commissioner, and at the Annual Meeting of the Board held on the 6th day of December, 1870, Mr. Rosenfeld took his seat as a member of this Board, vice Tyler Curtis, Esq., term expired.

At the same meeting of this Board (6th day of December, 1870) James H. Reynolds, Esq., was elected President of the Board in place of Charles E. McLane, Esq., who subsequently (at the same meeting) handed in his resignation as a member of the Board of Fire Commissioners.

At a meeting of the Board of Supervisors held on the evening of the 12th of December, 1870, Supervisor James J. Kenney was appointed Fire Commissioner, to fill the unexpired term of Mr. McLane; and at a special meeting of the Board, held on the 15th day of December, 1870, Mr. Kenney took his seat as a member of the Board.

At a regular monthly meeting of this Board, held on the 7th day of February, 1871, John Rosenfeld, Esq., was elected President of the Board.

The Board at present consists of John Rosenfeld, President, Benjamin H. Freeman, Samuel Rainey, James H. Reynolds, and James J. Kenney.

The Department at present consists of eight (8) Steam Fire Engines, twelve (12) Horse Hose Reels, two (2) Hook and Ladder Trucks, and thirty-two (32) Horses, with the necessary equipments.

The number of members to which the Department is now entitled is one hundred and sixty-three (163), exclusive of the Board of Engineers and Clerk of the Board of Fire Commissioners, and divided as follows: Eight (8) Enginemen, eight (8) Firemen, fourteen (14) Drivers, four (4) Stewards, two (2) Tillermen, and one (1) Corporation Yard-Keeper, who are permanently employed, and one hundred and twenty-six (126) members who do fire duty only when alarmed for that purpose.

These, together with five (5) men employed by your Honorable Body in the Corporation Yard, one (1) Superintendent of Steamers, one (1) Assistant Superintendent, two (2) Hydrant Men, and one (1) Drayman, constitute the entire force of the Fire Department.

We call the attention of your Honorable Body to the recommendations set forth in the Chief Engineer's Report, with regard to the purchase of machinery and apparatus for the use of the Department, and most respectfully recommend the purchase of the same.

Referring your Honorable Body to the Report of the Chief Engineer, herewith accompanying, for details of the transactions and workings of the Department for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1871,

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER

OF THE

SAN FRANCISCO FIRE DEPARTMENT.

To the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners:

Gentlemen—In accordance with the Resolutions of your Honorable Body, I have the honor to hereby transmit the following Report for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1871; and submit for your consideration a detailed statement of the Department under my charge—its workings and condition, with statistics—which I trust will be of interest to your Honorable Body, the members of the City Government and citizens of San Francisco.

The items of interest presented and forming part of this Report will be, the organization of the Department, a full and complete list of its members, their age, residence and occupation, with the number of their badges; also, a list and location of Hydrants and Cisterns where water may be obtained in case of fire, together with a list and location of Telegraph Fire Alarm Boxes, a record of all the fires and fire alarms which have occurred in this city during the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1871; the causes of all such fires, as far as the same has been ascertained; a statement of all the losses caused by such fires, and all insurance thereon and amounts paid; the amount of hose used, good and inferior; a complete inventory of all the property belonging to the Department, and where located; the number of alarms; number of times in service and number of hours in service of each Company; the number and style of buildings burned during the year; highest number of buildings burned at any one fire during the year; the largest loss at any one fire; the average loss to the number of buildings, and statement of losses; together with such other

information and recommendations as the experience of the past would seem to suggest.

Your Honorable Body elected me Chief Engineer of the San Francisco Paid Fire Department on the fifth day of April, 1871, and on the same date I entered upon the discharge of the duties of my office.

Upon assuming the duties and responsibilities of this office, I instituted a thorough and rigid investigation into all the working details of the Department, and issued such orders as, in my judgment, were demanded to place the same on a systematic basis and secure to the city prompt and vigilant service of its members; and I have the satisfaction of stating, that for good order, sobriety, discipline, efficiency and bravery, the Fire Department of the City of San Francisco, as now organized, can not be excelled by any similar organization in the world.

On application to the City and County Auditor's office, to ascertain the condition of the Running Expense Fund of the Department, I find that for the Fiscal Year 1871–72, the amount of \$12,578 22 has been overdrawn, which now leaves the amount of \$12,421 78 to meet the current expenses of the present year, which is entirely inadequate, on account of the growing condition of our Department.

The annual appropriation for the Fund is entirely too small to meet the demands of this Department, in consequence of the additions that have been, and are to be made; therefore, application should be made to the next Legislature to have the Running Expense Fund increased to an amount sufficient to meet the expenses of each year.

The apparatus of the Department is all in good working condition; but as, in my judgment, more is required, I now most respectfully recommend, for the promotion of the efficiency of our Department and the preservation of property, the purchase of the following most necessary Machinery and Apparatus:

STEAM ENGINES.

I recommend the purchase of two second-class Amoskeag Steam Engines, one of them to be used as a relief engine, and to be placed in the Corporation Yard, as the one now in use is about worn out; the other one to be placed in the house of Hose Company No. 2, on Main street; and the house of that Company to be used thereafter as an Engine House. A great deal of valuable property is located in that neighborhood, such as warehouses, gas house, foundries, lumber yards, hay barns, etc., and a Steam Engine is very much needed in that locality, as, in consequence of the smallness of the water-pipes in that vicinity, the supply of water is limited and quite insufficient when simply used direct from the hydrant by means of hose only.

FUEL CART.

I also recommend the purchase of a Fuel Cart, the same as used in New York and other Eastern cities. I find, at large fires, that the Steamers sometimes get short, or run out of fuel, as they can carry only sufficient for a short period of service; and it is very necessary that a Fuel Cart should be provided, in order that they may be constantly supplied with fuel of the proper kind, and that no delay or interruption shall occur in the working or efforts of the Department during the continuance of a conflagration.

EXTRA MACHINERY.

I also recommend the purchase of the following parts of Machinery, to be used as a reserve in case of breakage, and which will add greatly to the efficiency of the Department, and be the means of placing it in perfect working order at any time duty may be required, viz:

One set of Composition Tubes, for Boilers;
One duplicate Axle for each class Engine;
Three sets of half-Elliptic Springs, for Engines;
One set of Velute Springs for each class Engine;
One Truck Iron for each Boiler of Engine;
Two sets of Hind Wheels for second-class Engine;
One set of Front Wheels for third-class Engine;
Two sets of Axles for Tenders;
Two sets of Extra Wheels for Tenders;
Two sets of Extra Springs for Tenders;
and
One Extra Relief Tender;
One-half dozen small Suctions for Engines, five feet long.

WORK SHOP.

I trust your Honorable Body will urge the necessity of a repair or work shop to be established at the Corporation Yard, and that a practical machinist, blacksmith, and wheelwright be permanently employed, who, together with the enginemen (who are machinists) could repair their engines and apparatus, and do the work required in the Department. A horse-shoer and harness-maker should be also employed who would do all the work required in their different departments. By reference to the books of the Auditor as to the cost of the Department you will at once see the necessity of the establishment of such an institution. I am fully confident that such a work shop would in a very short time repay the city for the outlay.

HOUSES.

The house now occupied by Hook and Ladder Company No. 1, on O Farrell street, is in a very unsafe condition, and in case of a heavy gale of wind or severe storm, the upper story may at any time be seriously damaged, and perhaps lives may be lost.

I would therefore suggest that steps may be immediately taken to place it in good and strong condition, before any accidents occur.

With the above exception, I believe the other houses belonging to the Department to be in very good condition and repair.

HOSE.

I also recommend the purchase of 5,000 feet of hose. We should always and at all times have an abundant supply of good serviceable hose on hand; so that, in case of the destruction or injury of hose at fires, as sometimes is the case, we may have a reserve in store, from which the Department may be immediately supplied, thus ensuring its constant readiness and efficiency.

CISTERNS.

I would call the attention of your Honorable Body to the leaky condition of the Cisterns located in the following places, and recommend that they be repaired as soon as possible: The cistern on Stockton, corner of Pacific; the cistern on Dupont, corner of Jackson; the cistern on Dupont, corner of Washington; the cistern on Kearny, corner of Sacramento; the cistern on Kearny, corner of California; the cistern on Sansome, corner of Bush; the cistern on Second, corner of Folsom; the cistern on Broadway, corner of Ohio; the cistern on Columbia, corner of Guerrero; and the cistern on Fremont, corner of Mission.

I also recommend that two new cisterns of large size be built as follows: One at the crossing of Beale and Howard, and the other at the crossing of Beale and Mission streets. It is necessary to have cisterns in these localities as the water mains in that part of the city are too small to afford an abundant supply of water in case of a large fire.

DEPARTMENT RELIEF FUND.

I am sorry to state that this Fund, maintained by the monthly contributions of the members of the Department, is (owing to sickness and accidents happening to members) now entirely exhausted. I would therefore request your Honorable Body to take some immediate action, and call on the Insurance Companies of this city to subscribe donations to the Fund. It is just and proper that those members who, in time of conflagration, risk their lives by rushing into the most dangerous places in order to save life and property, and through their perseverance and bravery meet with most severe injuries, often of a very dangerous nature, should, during their suffering and sickness and when unable to perform duty, be taken care of.

I cannot conclude my report without expressing my thanks to the Exempt members of the old Volunteer Department, who were associated with me in that organization, and who on many occasions since my connection with the present Department have evinced their friendship for myself, and the success of the new organization, by lending us their voluntary aid and performing most efficient services.

I desire to return my thanks to the Fire and Water Committee of the Honorable Board of Supervisors, for the attention given to the requirements of the Department, for their cordial support and endorsement, and also for the able, prompt and cheerful manner in which they have given me their co-operation since my election as Chief Engineer of the Department.

I also take this occasion for myself and in behalf of the Department to tender our thanks to Chief Crowley and the Police Department, and to Fire Marshal Durkee and his deputies, for the valuable services rendered by them at fires, and for the cheerful and prompt manner in which they have always rendered assistance when called upon to do so.

I desire also to express my thanks to Mr. Greenwood, Superintendent of the Fire Alarm Telegraph, and to his assistants, for the promptness and correctness with which fire alarms have been sounded.

It is a source of very great gratification to me, as well as the other Officers and Members of the Department, to know that the citizens universally recognize its unequaled efficiency and feel a just pride in its success. They have watched its progress with the greatest care and have never been tardy in giving expressions of approval, which have served as powerful incentives to the prompt and faithful performance of the difficult and hazardous duties devolving upon the members.

To your Honorable Body, who placed me in the responsible position of Chief Engineer of the Fire Department of the City of San Francisco, I am under lasting obligations of gratitude, and now tender you my sincere thanks for the high honor conferred on me; and I do assure you, gentlemen, that it always shall be my aim to discharge the duties of Chief Engineer so as to retain the confidence and esteem of your Honorable Body and the respect of my fellow-citizens.

The Engineman, Fireman and Driver are permanently employed. These, together with the Foreman and eight Hosemen, who do duty only when alarmed, constitute the Company.

This Engine was built by the Amoskeag Manufacturing Company, at Manchester, New Hampshire, and is a first-class double Engine. It has vertical reciprocating steam cylinders, $7\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter and two double-acting vertical pumps, $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter and 12-inch stroke, and will discharge about 600 gallons per minute.

A Tender, to carry fuel, and a Water-tank for the supply of the Boiler, make a part of the machine. The Tender will carry fuel enough for two hours' consumption, and the Water-tank will contain 60 gallons.

This Company was organized December 3, 1866, from which time they have had charge of this Engine.

The weight of this Engine, with three men, is about 8,500 pounds.

The House of this Company is new and in good condition. This Company have in charge one thousand four hundred (1,400) feet of Hose. The Hose Reel is two-wheeled, of the Amoskeag build. The returns show that the Engine rolled to two hundred and forty (240) alarms, and worked at thirty-six (36) fires thirty-eight hours (38.30) and one-half during the year.

FIRE ALARM AND POLICE TELEGRAPH REPORT.

OFFICE OF FIRE ALARM AND POLICE TELEGRAPH, San Francisco, July 19, 1871.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors

Of the City and County of San Francisco.

Gentlemen—In accordance with Resolution No. 2,207 of your Honorable Body, the following report of the workings and condition of the Fire Alarm and Police Telegraph for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1871, is respectfully submitted.

CONDITION OF THE TELEGRAPH.

All the Lines, Machinery and Instruments are in perfect working order, and during the past year the Telegraph has given renewed evidence of its invaluable aid to the Fire Department.

NUMBER OF ALARMS FOR THE YEAR.

The total number of Alarms given during the year was two hundred and forty-five (245). The causes were as follows: Actual fires, 197; Chimneys, 23; Bonfires, 5; General Alarms, 4; False, 14; Falling Wall, 1; Exhibition, 1.

An accurate record is kept of the time of each alarm, as well as the station from which it originates.

MERIDIAN BELLS.

Three blows are struck on all the Bells and Gongs at 12 o'clock M., (Tennent's time.)

EXTENSIONS.

Twenty (20) new automatic Signal Boxes have been purchased and erected during the past year, making the total number now in use one hundred and twelve (112). The new style of Boxes have been found to work well, and a great improvement on the old ones. The new Boxes have been located in the lower part of the city, where fires are most frequent, and the old Boxes have been removed to the outskirts of the city.

ADDITIONAL BELL.

A new Bell made by W. T. Garratt, weighing two thousand (2,000) pounds, has been purchased and erected on a tower built for the purpose, at the house of Engine Company No. 7, at the Mission. All the necessary machinery for striking the same has been placed and is in good working order, and has been found to be a great convenience to the residents of the Mission and vicinity.

REMOVAL.

The small Bell formerly in service at the Mission has been removed to the house of Hose Company No. 5, on Market street.

POLICE TELEGRAPH.

The Police Telegraph is in daily use, and has been found to be of great service to the Police Department. During the year the line has been extended to the Industrial School and has been of great benefit to that Department. Ten (10) instruments in all are now in use.

KEYS TO THE SIGNAL BOXES.

Keys to the Signal Boxes are in the hands of the Police and are also left at places most convenient to the Boxes. The instructions to key-holders are that upon the discovery or positive information of a fire near your Signal-Box, turn

the crank slowly and steadily twenty-five or thirty times, then wait a few moments, and if you hear no alarm given on the bells or gongs, turn again: if you still hear no alarm go to the next nearest Box and give the alarm from that. If no light shows up wait at the Box and direct the firemen to the fire. Alarms from the Automatic Boxes are given by pulling down a hook once and letting go, unerring mechanism does the rest. Complaints concerning the working of the Fire Alarm Telegraph, irregular striking of the Bells or Gongs, broken wires, etc., should in all cases be reported at the Fire Alarm Telegraph Office, Brenham Place.

GENERAL ALARMS.

A second alarm from the same Box will be considered a General Alarm.

ROYALTY.

A settlement with Gamewell and Co., for the royalty on the manufacture of twenty-five (25) Signal Boxes, has been made by the payment of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five (\$1,875) dollars.

APPROPRIATION.

The sum of fifteen thousand (\$15,000) dollars was appropriated by the last Legislature for extensions and repairs of the Fire Alarm and Police Telegraph for the ensuing two years.

HORSE AND WAGON.

I would recommend the purchase of a horse, harness and light wagon for the use of the Fire Alarm Telegraph. The horse now in use is the property of the Repairer.

ADDITIONAL FORCE.

The constant extension of our lines with the additional machinery, boxes, etc., to keep in repair, makes it necessary to employ considerable extra help. I think the efficiency of the Department would be increased by the employment of an additional man.

Great credit is due my assistants for their fidelity and zeal in all matters appertaining to the successful working of this Department. The officers and members of the Fire Department have all interested themselves to make the Telegraph as efficient as possible.

The total amount necessary, as estimated by the Committee on Finance, to defray the expenses of the Public School Department for the past year, was \$522,500; the actual disbursements have therefore exceeded the estimated by \$7,641 55.

Owing to the insufficiency of funds towards the close of the year, teachers and janitors received only one-half of their usual pay for the month of June, 1871, and were informed that, for obtaining the remaining half they would have to trust to the justice and liberality of the Legislature. The balance due teachers and janitors amounts in the aggregate to about \$18,000.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE-JULY, 1871.

## To the Honorable Board of Education:

Gentlemen—Your Committee on Finance, in accordance with law, beg leave to submit the following report of the estimated revenue and expenditures of the Public School Department for the Fiscal Year 1871–72:

It will be seen by the foregoing statement that the estimated expenses of the Fiscal Year 1871-72 exceed the income by \$76,940. The estimates are based upon the disbursements of previous years, allowing a sufficient increase in the various items as the growth of the Department demands. The revenue is,

therefore, inadequate to meet the increasing wants of the Department, and it will be necessary to apply again for relief to the Legislature. Your Committee would take this opportunity to state that the large amount—namely, \$60,000—necessary annually to pay the Interest and Sinking Fund of School Bonds, seriously cripples the School Fund, and they would recommend that an effort be made to have this draft upon the School Fund paid from the General Fund.

Could this be accomplished, and in addition thereto, a small special tax levied each year for building purposes, your Committee think the necessity of applying constantly to the Legislature for relief, and the existence of deficits at the end of each school year, would cease.

#### FINANCES.

The School Year ending June 30, 1871, closed with a nominal balance on hand of \$3,829 93, as seen by the statistical tables; but as teachers and janitors were left unpaid for half of the month of June, these unpaid salaries constitute an equitable claim against the Department of \$18,000.

Should the payment of these claims be authorized by the Legislature, the actual deficit will amount to \$14,000.

This deficit was partly due to the cost of furniture for the new school houses, the heavy expenditure for repairs and planking yards and to the great increase of school attendance.

At the beginning of the School Year, a small reduction was made in the salaries of Primary Assistants; but, in compliance with a very general expression of public opinion, the Board of Education reconsidered its action and restored the salaries to the original rates.

From the estimates made by the Finance Committee it will be seen that the probable deficit at the end of the present School Year, June 30, 1872, will amount to \$77,000. Add to this the equitable claims of teachers and janitors for last year, the total deficit will be swelled to \$92,000. What is the cause of this probable deficiency, and how is it to be met? The school attendance is rapidly increasing, while the school revenue does not increase. The city assessment roll this year is a little less than that of last year, while the increase in school attendance over the average of last year for the first two months of the present School Year was 2,300 children, requiring 30 new classes and an increase of 38 teachers, making an increase of 10 per cent. in the item of salaries of teachers. Without any further increase in the number of teachers, the cost of salaries will amount to about \$395,000.

But according to the June School Census, there were over 2,200 children between the ages of 5 and 6 years, 2,000 of whom will enter school during the year, requiring at least 25 more classes and 25 more teachers, at a cost, say, of \$20,000, making the whole amount of teachers' salaries at least \$415,000.

The cost of supplying the new school-houses with furniture, including the Lincoln Building, since July, 1871, has been about \$10,000. Many of the school buildings need painting and repairing, and this item of expense will be a heavy one.

The estimate of the Finance Committee is evidently within bounds.

Now, a general reduction of salaries ought not to be made. Last year public opinion was against it, and that opinion probably remains unchanged. Our Grammar Principals and High School Principals are paid 25 per cent. less than teachers of the same grade in Boston; our 294 Primary Teachers are paid an average of \$100 a year more than teachers of the same grade in Boston; equal to 14 per cent. more.

The cost per pupil for tuition—that is, salaries of teachers exclusively—last year, in this city, was \$19 83; in Boston, \$20 60; Chicago, \$16 10.

The total cost per pupil in this city, last year, not including building fund, was \$30 43; in Boston, \$28 20.

The total cost per pupil, including expenses for building in this city, was \$40 47; in Boston, \$46 28.

The deficiency of the present year will have to be met, either by a direct appropriation from the city of \$90,000, or the amount must be made payable out of a new issue of bonds required for building purposes.

But it will be impossible to carry on the schools next year, with the revenue derived from a tax of 45 cents on a hundred dollars; the rate of tax must be increased to 55 cents on a hundred dollars. This will be barely sufficient to carry on the schools.

One tenth of our entire school revenue is required to pay the interest and sinking fund, on bonds already issued. In other words, one tenth of our school revenue is used indirectly in the payment of rent for school-houses.

Should an issue of bonds be made to the amount of \$375,000, a heavy additional burden will be laid upon the current school revenue.

#### BONDS FOR BUILDING PURPOSES.

Notwithstanding the recent erection of 6 large school buildings and several smaller ones, the School Department is now renting 43 rooms for the accommodation of 2,000 children, at a cost of \$10,000 a year. Last year the city, with a school attendance of 18,000, expended for school buildings \$175,000.

Boston with a school attendance of 35,000, expended \$612,000. Our demands for school buildings are not greater than in other cities.

A new building is needed in the Ninth Ward to accommodate the Rincon Grammar School, and to relieve the Department from the rent of the Silver Street Primary School building.

A new Primary building is also needed in the same Ward, say, somewhere in the vicinity of the intersection of Fifth and Bryant streets, to accommodate the surplus pupils of the Rincon, Fourth Street, and Eighth Street Schools.

In the Eighth Ward, 19 rooms are rented, all basement rooms, filled by 900 children.

The old brick building at the corner of Bush and Stockton streets, is in a condition so dilapidated and unsafe, that it ought to be torn down and its place supplied by a new one.

The eight classes in the building, added to the 19 rooms, make 27 rooms required, to which may be added three classes more, occupying rooms and halls unfit for school purposes, making a total of 30 new rooms needed to accommodate the pupils of this District, now in attendance.

A building on the lot owned by the Department on Eddy street, near Larkin, would accommodate a considerable part of the Eighth District.

The Spring Valley School-house must either be enlarged, or a new building must be erected in the vicinity. The Fairmount house must be enlarged to a four class-room building.

A new house is needed on the Potrero, another at the Ocean House, and one at Laguna Honda.

It is cheaper for the city to build than to rent. The cost of the buildings, etc., may be estimated as follows:

To this may be added the estimated deficit for the present year, \$90,000, making a total of \$334,000. Should a building for the Boys' High School be erected, the amount would be increased to \$369,000.

The amount, then, required in the new issue of bonds is not less than \$375,000.

#### EDUCATIONAL CONDITION OF THE SCHOOLS.

A detailed report of the annual examinations and promotions will be found in the report of the Deputy Superintendent.

Supplementary statistics, showing the classification of the schools up to the time of publication of this report, will be found attached to the Deputy's report.

#### TEXT BOOKS.

The sweeping change of text books made compulsory on the city, by the law passed at the last session of the Legislature, which placed the city under the control of the State Board of Education, is much to be regretted. The expense was very heavy, amounting in some cases in single families to \$25.

The change is the more to be regretted, as generally the new books are inferior to the old ones. The amount already expended, in the first two months of the year, by the Board, in the purchase of books for indigent children, exceeds \$2,000. The State Uniformity Law is open to many grave objections. Books which are suitable for use in graded city schools are not adapted for use in ungraded country schools, and vice versa. Leading educators in other States are setting their faces against State uniformity. A question involving so many hundreds of thousands of dollars, is a dangerous power to be centralized in one Board, subjected to the pressure of influential publishing houses. As far as San Francisco is concerned, the law ought to be repealed.

Considering the large annual expenditure for books for indigent children, the New York and Philadelphia plan of furnishing all text books free, in the form of school libraries, is entitled to

a careful consideration. In the end it will cost the people less than half the present cost.

#### GOOD SCHOOLS.

Good schools cannot be maintained without good buildings and good teachers. Competent teachers cannot be had without a fair rate of wages. Good schools, therefore, are costly, but they must be maintained. A liberal expenditure in education is the truest economy in the end.

Let all citizens, all legislators, and all school officers unite in a spirit of enlightened liberality, to provide the means for supporting public schools, and then, if educated and professional teachers are placed in charge of the children, we may hope to attain in the future the highest results of modern civilization, a community of educated men and women.

# HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT.

HEALTH OFFICE, San Francisco, July, 1871.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors

Of the City and County of San Francisco:

Gentlemen—In compliance with a notification received from your Clerk, I have the honor to transmit to your Honorable Body this, my Second Annual Report, which is for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1871.

It affords me great satisfaction to be able to demonstrate, by unmistakable facts and figures, that the world-wide notoriety of our healthy and exhilarating climate is fully justified. Notwith-standing our population has steadily and very considerably increased, the aggregate number of deaths has materially decreased as compared with last year, and I am satisfied our returns are fuller and more correct than for any previous year.

I submit a tabular statement drawn from the mortality statistics of the principal cities of the United States:

In compiling this table I have omitted the Chinese population (11,817) and their deaths (295), because, to include them in making a comparison with other cities where there is none of that population, I would do injustice to the facts establishing the salubrity of our climate, for the obvious reason, well known to all who are familiar with their habits, that they pay no regard to hygiene and sanitary laws; and not only that, but from prejudice, and not speaking or understanding our language, they fail, when attacked with disease, to avail themselves of proper care and medical treatment. The mortality amongst them is proportionately greater than amongst our own race, as will be seen by the table herein submitted, and consequently the rate of aggregate mortality in the City is increased thereby. It is found that their rate amounts to 24.96 per thousand, whilst our own rate is but 20.91 per thousand.

A glance at the table exhibiting the percentage of deaths in each Ward will disclose the fact that the Ward giving the greatest percentage is the Fourth, which contains the largest number of Chinese—indeed, nearly one-half of the entire population of that class in our City.

Even if we include the Chinese, it would increase our mortality rate to only 21.5, which is about that of St. Louis, the next apparently healthiest city named in the foregoing table (No. 1.)

The percentage for the preceding year (including Chinese) was 22.3.

In the following table there will be found the number of deaths from all zymotic diseases during the last five years, which shows a less number occurring therefrom during the year just closed than during either of the two preceding years:

Yet, in the face of this decrease in the aggregate, there appears a fearful increase of deaths from fevers of the Typhoid, Remittent and Intermittent types, which by no means should be common to our climate. There has been also a slight increase in Puerperal Fever and Diarrhoa.

We find a diminution of Scarlatina, Diphtheria, Measles, Dysentery, Cholera Infantum, Croup, and all diseases incident to infancy, greater than the increase from the other causes mentioned. Believing, as all experience tends to prove, that these febrile diseases are dependant, to a great extent, if not wholly, upon local causes, I have taken great pains to trace them to their proper localities and to satisfy myself as to their increase here

where we certainly should have as little of their prevalence proportionately as anywhere in the world. The following table shows the population and percentage of mortality in each of the City Wards:

We find the lowest rate of mortality in the First and Ninth Wards, their percentage being 1.24; and the greatest in the Fourth Ward, 2.24. The Second and Tenth Wards are nearly equal to the Fourth. But if we take the single disease of Typhoid Fever (in Table No. 4) and trace it through the different Wards, we find that the First and Ninth, which seem in the aggregate mortality to be the healthiest, had more deaths from that disease than other Wards, and in this respect stands next the Second and Tenth Wards. The Fourth Ward, which exhibits the largest mortality in the aggregate, stands fifth in the number of deaths from Typhoid Fever. Let it be observed that these Wards which show this large mortality from Typhoid Fever constitute almost the entire City Front, bordering on the Bay, and include

the level and low land, extending as far as we have defective drainage. The First, Second, Ninth and Tenth Wards, it is well known, are miserably provided with sewerage.

The Second Ward has no sewerage, and is densely populated with a large proportion of the poorer classes, many of whom suffer for the ordinary comforts of life, and that is a fruitful source of Typhoid Fever. The First, Ninth and Tenth Wards are very poorly drained. Their territory is so level and the grade of the streets so slight as to make it impossible for the sewers to clear themselves, and they become mere reservoirs to receive and retain all the filth of the city. This filth is taken out, at various holes made for the purpose along the streets, by means of scoops and buckets, deposited on the ground in a pile in the open air, where it is suffered to remain until its effluvia has poisoned the air and effected all the injury to health of which it is capable, and then is carted off and dumped into the Bay.

Is it a matter of wonder, in view of these facts, that we have had an increase of Typhoid Fever? or would it be at all surprising if we should be visited with Typhus Fever—ay, even Cholera or Yellow Fever? Constant strong winds probably only save us from such a scourge!

We have a Municipal Ordinance which requires that "every privy vault, cess-pool, sink or drain, must be connected with the sewer in the street, (if there be a sewer with which the same can be connected,) in such a manner that it shall be effectually drained and purified."

Now, this is an Ordinance allowing persons who live in the more elevated portions of the city to get rid of all their filth; but what becomes of it? Why, it goes down into the First, Ninth or Tenth Ward, accumulating until the sewers are full; and then, to relieve the people on the higher grounds, this filth from privy vaults, sinks, etc., is taken out and placed on the ground in these lower Wards, there allowed to remain some time, and those who reside in the locality are subjected, without any fault of their own, to this generating cause of sickness.

As an evidence that defective sewerage is one of the causes of the increase of Typhoid Fever, I would call attention to the Seventh Ward, which is bounded by Market, Second and Harrison streets, and the Bay. Its population is 10,383, only 450 less than the Ninth Ward, though of an area less than one-half, but it is well sewered and sufficiently elevated, for the most part, to effectually drain itself. It shows a mortality from Typhoid Fever of only 3, whilst the Ninth Ward, with double the area and but 450 more population, suffered a mortality from that disease of 9, or three times the number.

There were 13 deaths from Intermittent Fever throughout the city, 6 of which (almost one-half) occurred in the Sixth Ward alone. A considerable amount of grading has been going on in that Ward, which has exposed more or less vegetable matter to the solar rays, the decomposition of which generates the malarial effluvia, supposed to be the cause of this and the Remittent form of fevers. Fifteen deaths occurred from the latter disease—3 in each the Tenth and Twelfth Wards, 2 in each the Fourth, Ninth and Eleventh, and 1 in each the First, Second and Seventh Wards.

#### SEWERS.

No sewerage would be infinitely better than the imperfect system existing in our city at the present time. Persons living in the First, Ninth and Tenth Wards have a just cause of action for damages against those living in the more elevated portions of the city for constructing sewers and sending through them their filth, which is thus carried to the doors of those in the Wards named, and there allowed to remain until the sewers become so full, that, to relieve the people in the upper Wards, they must be emptied. And thus one portion of our people is allowed to visit pestilence upon another portion. Nature has certainly made this one of the healthiest localities in the world, but man is its destroyer.

Sewers should have sufficient fall to allow the contents to pass off, so that it will be unnecessary to remove the filth from them through holes here and there in the streets, and deposit it for a time upon the ground, suffering the atmosphere around to become impregnated with the noxious gases emanating therefrom. This great evil can be remedied only by changing the grades of the streets where necessary to give greater fall to the sewers, or by the use of an extraordinary amount of water in perfectly flushing the sewers; else by abolishing all sewers, and require, in all cases, the construction of earth-closets or water-tight privy vaults

and cess-pools, and, when filled, allow them to be emptied only by means of air-tight box-carts, which should dump their contents into the Bay with the least possible delay. I most earnestly call attention to this very important subject, and I would urge upon the proper authorities the adoption of some remedial measures for this already great, and yet rapidly growing evil. I entertain the hope that the next Legislature will enact for this city a law creating a body to be composed of competent engineers that shall take control of the whole subject matter relating to sewers and street grades. The longer the delay, the greater and more difficult the task. By reference to the statement of nuisances, in another portion of this Report, it will be seen that of the number complained of 240 remain unabated, very nearly all of which are simply awaiting the construction of sewers, without which it is impossible to abate them.

#### PHTHISIS.

It will be observed that Pulmonary Tuberculosis (or Consumption) has increased from 444 during the previous year, to 518. On the bare face of it this appears alarming; but when we consider the fact that large numbers come here annually from distant places, seeking relief from this dread destroyer of human life, we find no difficulty in accounting for this great increase of mortality from this particular disease. It is a well-known fact, among old physicians here at least, that there are now a great many persons in our City and State who came to this country as a last resort to recover from pulmonary affections and are now enjoying perfect health. Such, through their correspondence with friends, have induced many others in a dying or hopeless condition to visit this Coast, and the most helpless ones repair to this city as almost the only point where they can obtain the comforts of life they require. In this way the number of Consumptive patients is much increased in this city.

It is admitted by all who are conversant with the facts that California affords a greater variety of climate than any other country in the world of an equal given area. In a few hours' journey from this city we may reach the locality of perpetually snowcapped mountains, and, in a contrary direction, in the same short space of time, may be set down in a climate of almost continual spring weather, soft and balmy as ambrosial breezes, amidst flowers and fruits of a tropical latitude. San Francisco seems midway between them, with her bracing and energizing winds, never hot, never freezing. Here, then, if the patient requires a temperature uniformly cold and dry he can soon reach it on the north, or, if a uniformly warm and dry temperature be better suited to him, a few miles to the south will furnish it; whilst a cool bracing saline atmosphere is always in this city. All constitutions may be suited, in climate, in different portions of our State, but the debilitated and those in the second stages of Phthisis should not stop in San Francisco, as our high and bracing winds are suited only to those of at least a moderately vigorous constitution.

The following table will exhibit the mortality from Phthisis for each of the last five years:

It will be seen that there has been a steady increase from Phthisis, and yet from all other Tubercular diseases we find a noticeable decrease. If our climate, or any local cause, were at fault, we would find an increase in about the same ratio in the other classes of Tubercular disease. I have prepared the following table to show the mortality from all diseases of the respiratory organs, for the past five years:

We find that there has been a regular diminution in all the diseases of this class, except in those produced by or resulting from Phthisis, viz., Haemoptysis and Pleurisy. Although Bronchitis and Pneumonia are the most common exciting causes of Consumption, yet it is shown above that they have diminished.

The whole number of deaths of Chinese from all causes was 295, of which 89 were from Phthisis, or 30.17 per cent., whilst in a mortality of 2,919 of all other nationalities there were but 429 from the same cause, or only 14.69 per cent. This shows a mortality from this disease amongst the Chinese more than twice as great proportionately as amongst all other classes of our population; and here we find another source of our large percentage of the aggregate mortality.

#### SYPHILIS.

From this specific disease there were 38 deaths, of which 16 (nearly one half) were Chinese—1 in the Second Ward, 12 in the Fourth, 7 in the Sixth, 2 in the Eleventh and 16 in Public Institutions.

#### NUISANCES.

During the year there were 2,037 nuisances complained of, being an increase of 329 on the previous year. The number

abated is 1,709 against 1,120 the preceding year, showing an increase of 589. There yet remains unabated 240, being 303 less than we commenced the year with; and the reason these have not been abated I have given in a former portion of this Report. There were 88 complaints entered in this office wherein no good grounds existed and were dismissed. In the abatement of nuisances there was caused to be constructed (under the supervision of the Health Inspectors) 20,230 running feet of private sewers, which connected 5,823 privy vaults with the main street sewers. This has been an arduous work, far outstripping everything in this line accomplished heretofore; and I would do injustice to worth and merit if I failed to ascribe full credit to the great industry, energy and devotion of the two Health Inspectors, Messrs. D. C. Bryan and Thurston C. Owens.

The Market Inspector, Mr. S. J. Bookstaver, vigilant, indefatigable and efficient, has rendered valuable services and worked great reformation in a department where much fault existed in previous years. The following is a statement of his operations

during the year:

From them there was collected \$1,312 25, all of which was paid over to the City and County Treasurer, as per vouchers on file in this office.



# ALMSHOUSE REPORT.

CITY AND COUNTY ALMSHOUSE, San Francisco, July 1, 1871

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors

Of the City and County of San Francisco:

Gentlemen—In compliance with Resolution No. 2,207 of your Honorable Body, I respectfully submit the following Report of the condition of the City and County Almshouse for the Fiscal year ending June 30, 1871.

This Institution is about six miles from the City Hall and located on what is known as the San Miguel Ranch, in sight of Lake Honda. It was opened on the 12th day of September, A. D. 1867.

The entire front of the building is 187 feet; the main centre 40 by 46 feet; the wings, north and south, each 44 by 73½ feet; one rear wing 44 by 64 feet. The height of the building is 66 feet, divided into four stories, three of which were finished when the Institution was opened, with bath-rooms and water-closets on each floor. The fourth story has been finished the last year at a total cost, for lumber, plastering, plumbing, painting and hardware, of \$3,500—the carpenter work and lathing being done

by the inmates. This story (the fourth) will accommodate (in sleeping rooms) about one hundred and fifty inmates making the total accommodations of the Institution five Since the opening of the Almshouse up to the present date 1,228 persons have been admitted and found a comfortable home, through the charitable citizens of San Francisco. The last year there has been a new steam-pump for supplying water for the use of the inmates; from the pump one thousand feet of three-inch discharge pipe has been laid to the tanks, and, from the tanks to the main building, 500 feet of twoinch service-pipe, giving a supply of water to every floor, so that in case of fire the floors can be flooded. Steam can be got up in ten minutes, and, by attaching hose to the hydrant, water can be thrown over any part, and ten feet above the roof of the main building. The pump is equal to any steam fireengine in San Francisco.

The pipe laid, gates set, joints made, and all work connected with the above improvements was done by the inmates, the City only paying for the cost of pipe and materials. There has been established in the Institution during the last year a tailor-shop and a shoe-shop where clothing and boots are made by the inmates, of California materials, for the use of the Institution, instead of, as formerly, buying ready-made goods.

The grounds around the main building have been laid out with gravel walks, flower-beds and lawns, the work being done by the inmates—making the Institution equal, if not superior to any in the United States or Europe. Such is the opinion of visitors the last year from the above places.

The cost of food for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1870, was, for an average of 229 inmates per day, \$29,721.69; cost per diem for each person for food  $35\frac{1}{2}$  cents. The total cost for the same year for food, fuel, light and salaries was \$46,790.28; with the above average of inmates, the cost for each was  $55\frac{7}{6}$  cents. The cost of food for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1871, with an average of  $303\frac{3}{4}$  inmates per day, was \$27,546 58—the cost per diem for each inmate being  $24\frac{2}{3}$  cents. The total cost for the

said year, for food, fuel, light and salaries, was \$44,843.46. With the above average of inmates,  $(303\frac{3}{4})$ , the cost per diem for each was  $40\frac{1}{2}$  cents. Deducting \$1,371.73, the amount received for potatoes sold from the farm for the said Fiscal Year (which amount was paid into the City Treasury) from the amount before stated, would leave \$26,174.84, making a cost for each inmate per diem of  $23\frac{2}{3}$  cents, instead of  $24\frac{2}{3}$  cents.

The Old Small-Pox Hospital on the Almshouse grounds was closed for nearly two years, and going to ruin. This last year it has been thoroughly fumigated, cleaned and painted, and all clothes which accumulated during the epidemic, and beds used at that time, burned. The grounds have been laid out with gravel walks, grass-plots, trees planted, and enclosed with a six-foot picket fence—the work being done by the inmates. It is now used as a Hospital for Imbeciles, of which there are twenty-On the farm there has been fifteen acres of six at present. new ground cultivated, eleven acres of which was cleared of brush and thick undergrowth; the other four acres was swamp. It has been thoroughly drained by making ditches through the swamp and filling with stone, all of which is now covered in and cultivated over. This is the first time the farm has produced hay, potatoes and other vegetables to run the Institution the entire year, besides selling potatoes to the amount before mentioned.

All other years the above-mentioned produce was purchased for the Institution seven months out of the twelve. Besides the above improvements, four thousand feet of fencing has been done on the farm by the inmates.

In conclusion, I would ask your Honorable Body to recommend to the next Legislature that an appropriation be made for the purchase of five hundred acres of land, (more or less,) to be added to the farm, so that by the cultivation of said land the Institution could nearly maintain itself, thereby relieving the tax-payers of considerable outlay of money every year.

#### REMARKS.

The expenditures for this office during the past year, have been largely increased over former years by the creation of the Municipal Criminal Court, which is non-productive of fees; and the

office fees have been heavily diminished by the repeal of laws requiring copies of complaints to be certified by the Clerk, and prohibiting the collection of fees for Declarations of Intention, and Certificates of Citizenship. There has also been commenced in the name of the People, a large number of suits for the collection of street assessments, which the law authorizes the Clerk to file without the payment of the usual office fees.

There is a pressing necessity for additional room in this office. The cases for papers will be entirely filled in a few months and there is no space to place others; and if the present office is to be retained as such, I would respectfully recommend that some convenient room be selected, with cases prepared, to place a portion of the oldest causes belonging to each Court, and that some suitable person be employed to get them when demanded by Searchers of Records and parties interested in them.

There has been a greater number of actions commenced in the District Courts during the past year than in the preceding one,

and a larger number of judgments entered.

There has also been an increase of general business in other departments of this office.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT CHARLES D. CARTER, AT THE CELEBRATION OF THE TWELFTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, MAY 17, 1871.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN-In rising to address you on this the twelfth anniversary of the founding of the Industrial School, I am happy to say that never in the history of the School has its internal affairs been in a more satisfactory condition than at present. The boys are well fed, and are being educated in the leading rudiments of a good school education. They are all kept busy; when not at school they are kept at work, either on the farm attached to the School, in some of the various mechanical workshops where goods are made, or in the bakery. When they are neither at school nor at work they are allowed to go to the band-room, where they can learn to play on any one of the various musical instruments used in a full band. In this way, in this constant but varied round of education and industry, the time of the boys is pleasantly and profitably passed, and idleness, that handmaid of vice, is kept at arm's length. The great end and aim of the Institution is reformatory rather than penal. The boys are made to feel that they are not in charge of task-masters, but with those who take the best, because a disinterested, interest in their welfare. Of course, our rules compel us to maintain a rigid discipline in everything, and some of the boys-the younger ones, especially-cannot understand that even this, one of the harshest but most necessary features of the Institution, is intended to benefit them. But gradually we find that good but firm treatment begets confidence, if not love, and the boys generally soon learn to obey and respect the rules, and make strong efforts at educational and industrial advancement. These results arise from an awakened self-respect on the part of the boys themselves, and from gratitude to the Institution and its Managers.

No one can pay even a casual visit to the Industrial School without being impressed with its value. It is a bar of reform placed across the path of boys who are found on the high road to the State Prison. It is simply a question with the community whether it will maintain a well-conducted Industrial School or enlarge its State Prison, and make certain calculation on increased crime and violence. Outside these walls the boys placed here are too often incipient outlaws; but, recognizing the fact that the majority of them are not responsible for their law-defying practices—which must in all cases be laid at the door of parental viciousness or neglect—we take the boys in here and endeavor to enlighten their minds and make their hands useful.

We find music a most valuable aid in this direction. Viciousness and depraved habits find a strong enemy in music. The devil can be driven out of a boy much more readily with a musical instrument than by violence or confinement. This is a fact which some persons may doubt, but they are doubters only

because they have not had an opportunity for observation in the matter. About one-fifth of the total number of boys in the School have either become proficient or are making progress in the use of some musical instrument, while all its inmates daily partake of the pleasure of hearing the band play.

The workshops connected with the Industrial School are in a very flourishing condition, and a majority of the boys promise to be excellent mechanics and independent men. The workshops of the School would go a long way towards supporting it if requisite machinery were introduced, by means of which the boys might compete with outside establishments on an equal footing. As it is, the home-made work must compete with that which is largely made by machinery; and we all know that the latter is now everywhere distancing human fingers-not, it is true, in the matter of quality but in the matter of cost, and that is now the main point. If the Legislature would make an appropriation for the purpose of introducing machinery into a few departments of the workshops, there can be no doubt that the profits would be large and immediate, and the lightening of the tax on property-owners most desirable. Of course, the amount of goods of any, or, indeed, of all kinds, made at the School, would never be so large as to affect outside manufactories in any appreciable degree. The only object sought is to make the labor of the boys almost, if not quite, sustain the expenses of the Institution.

We are now, we think, turning them from a future life of crime into paths of honest industry; but the process is costly, and we wish, while maintaining all the good features of the Institution, to lift its pecuniary weight from off the shoulders of already overburdened taxpayers.

To do this the State Treasury must be called on—a call to which it should the more readily respond, because fully 40 per cent. of all the boys do not belong to the city, but to the State at large. It is true they were found within the county limits—lodging under sidewalks, in old boilers, empty houses, or some equally cheerful habitation—before they were placed in the School; but neither their parents nor homes were here. They came to the city because it afforded them a safe hiding-place, sympathizing companions, and a much more enlarged opportunity of stealing a livelihood.

Leaving myself, as I now distinctly do, out of the question, I think San Francisco and the State owe a heavy debt of gratitude to the gentlemen who, without hope of pecuniary reward of any kind, have given their time in faithfully managing the Industrial School. None of them came here to grind an axe for themselves or relations, to have a good time (as that phrase is generally understood), to make speeches or to air pet theories. They came here to work for the elevation of boys whose parents have been either criminal or careless in their training. If there is any doubt on the public mind as to the fact that many of the measures adopted in the past in conducting this School might have been improved upon, as those of the future may also be, there is no doubt, I think, in the minds of its Managers themselves. We do not claim either infallibility or perfection; all we claim is, that we are endeavoring to perform, without hope of pecuniary reward, a good service for society and the

inmates of the School, in the best manner possible, with the lights we have before us. No mistake was ever made intentionally, or persevered in a moment after it was perceived to be a mistake.

Gentlemen—The undersigned, "Park Commissioners," under and by virtue of the authority of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled "An Act to provide for the improvement of Public Parks in the City of San Francisco," approved April 4, 1870, have the honor to submit herewith a report of their proceedings and a statement of their receipts and expenditures, as required by Section 6 of said Act.

The Commissioners organized on the 3d of May, 1870, by the election of S. F. Butterworth as President, and Andrew J. Moulder as Secretary.

The salary of the Secretary was fixed at seventy-five dollars per month.

On the 6th of May, the Commissioners advertised, in accordance with law, for bids for Park Bonds, to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent. (6 per cent.) per annum, with a notification that no bid under par could be accepted.

Sixty days afterwards, to wit, on the 5th of July, 1870, bonds to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars were awarded to A. Seligman, at par, his

being the only bid received, and on the 1st of August, 1870, fifteen bonds of \$1,000 each, dated August 1, 1870, and bearing interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, the principal payable in fifty years from date, were issued to said A. Seligman, and in return therefor the sum of \$15,000 in gold coin was received by the Commissioners. Abraham Seligman was appointed Treasurer, and his offer of one per cent. per annum, on monthly balances in his hands, was accepted.

Specifications for a minute topographical survey of the "Avenue," and "Golden Gate Park," and their connections with the adjacent city surveys were prepared, and a number of competent engineers and surveyors were invited to put in sealed bids, stating for what sum in gross they would execute the work in accordance with said specifications.

On the 8th of August, 1870, the bids were opened, and the contract was awarded to Mr. Wm. Hammond Hall for the sum of four thousand eight hundred and sixty dollars, his being the lowest bid.

Mr. Hall entered the field shortly afterwards with a corps of assistants, and completed a very careful and accurate survey, early in December.

He is now engaged in the preparation of detailed maps on a large scale, embracing all desirable information as a basis for the laying out and improvement of the Park and Avenue. It is expected these maps will be completed by the middle of January, 1871.

On the 17th November, 1870, the Commissioners appointed P. Owens "Keeper of the Grounds of the Avenue and Parks," at a salary of \$75 per month.

* This appointment was necessary to protect the trees and shrubbery from waste by trespassers, and to prevent unauthorized parties from intruding upon the premises. The Commissioners have taken steps towards the establishment of a green-house, on an economical scale, for the rearing of suitable evergreen and other trees and shrubs, to be set out on the Park Grounds. By this means many thousand valuable trees will be obtained from the seeds, at a comparatively small cost.

As soon as the maps of the surveys made are completed, the Commissioners propose to adopt the best plan attainable by competition for the laying out and improvement of the Avenue and Parks, and to proceed, as rapidly as the means placed at their disposal will permit, to carry the same into execution.

Appended hereto please find a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Commissioners from the date of their organization up to the present time.

# REPORT OF THE PARK COMMISSIONERS FOR THE SIX MONTHS ENDING JUNE 30, 1871.

Office of the Park Commissioners, San Francisco, July 1, 1871.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors

Of the City and County of San Francisco:

Gentlemen—We, the undersigned, Park Commissioners, have the honor to submit, in compliance with law, the following report of operations during the six (6) months ending this day.

On the 15th of February, Mr. Wm. H. Hall, the engineer employed, presented his final report of the topographical survey of "the Avenue" and "Golden Gate Park," with accompanying maps on a large scale and in minute detail.

The report was accepted and the maps were officially adopted by the Board. On the 10th of April, Mr. Abraham Seligman resigned his position as Treasurer of the Board, and on same day Messrs. J. Seligman & Co. were elected to fill the vacancy.

On the 2d of May, the Commissioners advertised for bids for grading "the Avenue," extending from Baker to Stanyan streets, in accordance with carefully prepared specifications.

In response, twenty-three (23) bids were received, and were opened at 3 o'clock P. M. on Friday the 12th of May.

The contract was awarded to B. Kenny, the lowest bidder, at the rate of four and one-half cents (4½c.) per cubic yard for cutting, and 6 cents per cubic yard for filling, or embankment.

A bond in the penal sum of \$10,000, with satisfactory sureties, was taken for the faithful performance of the contract. In addition, it was stipulated in the contract that the Commissioners should retain, as additional security, until the completion of the contract, twenty-five per cent. of the amount reported by the Engineer due to the Contractor for the work done up to the 1st of each month.

Immediately after the award, the Contractor commenced the work of grading the Avenue and has prosecuted it diligently since.

The amount of work done to date, under this contract, has been 38,300 cubic yards of cutting, and 38,300 cubic yards of filling. The total work to be done is estimated by the Engineer at 96,261 cubic yards of cutting, and 179,370 cubic yards of filling, the cost of which at the contract prices, will be \$15,093 94.

It is expected that the entire grading will be completed before the 15th of November next.

Since the last report, the Commissioners have greatly enlarged the Greenhouse and Nursery, at a small expense, and have now many thousand young trees of suitable varieties, raised from the seed, growing finely. In this way they expect to raise all the ornamental and shade trees necessary to stock the Park, at a trifling cost.

The Commissioners would further report that they have negotiated the sale at par to Messrs. J. Seligman & Co. of Park Improvement Bonds to the amount of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000).

These bonds bear interest at the rate of six per cent (6 per cent.) per annum, and are payable in fifty years from their date—August 1, 1870.

The bonds of this issue of \$60,000, dated as above, were delivered this day, ex-coupon No. 1, which was payable January 1, 1871, and ex-coupon No. 2, payable July 1, 1871. The cancelled coupons were this day surrendered to the City and County Treasurer.

Herewith, please find a copy of the specifications, in compliance with which the contract has been made for the grading of "the Avenue," and also a statement showing the receipts and expenditures by the Commissioners since the date of their last report, January 9, 1871.

# SPECIFICATIONS FOR CONTRACT TO GRADE THE AVENUE LEADING TO GOLDEN GATE PARK.

First—It is required that the herein described earthwork be executed subject to the estimates, and in accordance with the directions of the Engineer appointed by the Park Commissioners.

Second—The figures here given represent very near approximations (calculated from actual survey) to the various amounts of cutting and filling required to be done in the several sections described, to reduce or elevate the surface of said avenue to the planes of the official grades of the adjoining streets (allowing proper amounts for shrinkage); but the Commissioners reserve the right to retain any portion of the cutting or add to any portion of the filling they may see proper, in order to make the surface of the ground conform to their plan for improvement, without being liable for additional compensation to the Contractor, unless said Contractor may have to bring the extra material required by such modifications from a greater distance without the avenue boundaries than it could have been procured within them. And said extra compensation shall be the subject of another agreement before the additional work shall have been performed.

Third—The annexed estimate of amount has been made to the vertical planes bounding the avenue, notwithstanding that in heavy cuts and on the fills the slip will be great.

Fourth—The measurement of each parcel of work will be made by the Engineer in charge, from survey, and on these estimates payment will be based.

Fifth—Bids must be made for the entire work at a specific price per cubic yard, each, for cutting and filling.



## OUTSIDE LANDS.

For the purpose of ending the litigation in reference to Pueblo Lands, pending in the Courts of the United States, Congress passed an Act which was approved on the 8th of March, 1866, relinquishing to this City all the right of the United States in the land described in the decision of Judge Field, in trust, to be conveyed to the parties in the bona fide actual possession by themselves or tenants on the passage of the Act, subject to such terms and conditions as the Legislature of the State might prescribe. The Board of Supervisors, in order to settle the question of title to these lands, commenced proceedings after the passage of said Act by Congress, which have finally resulted in the passage of Acts by the Legislature of this State, determining the whole matter so far as legislation could effect, and providing under what conditions and to whom grants of land should be made. A detailed statement of the proceedings had by the Board appears in Appendix to Municipal Reports of Fiscal Years, 1867-68 and 1868-69.

The following tabular statement of the proceedings had, with the final decree of Judge Field, the grant by Congress and the various Acts passed by the Legislature, are herewith presented for reference:

FINAL DECREE CONFIRMING THE CLAIM OF THE CITY OF SAN FRANCISCO TO ITS PUEBLO LANDS, ENTERED MAY 18, 1865.

THE CITY OF SAN FRANCISCO VS.
THE UNITED STATES.

The appeal in this case taken by the petitioner, the City of San Francisco, from the decree of the Board of Land Commissioners to ascertain and settle private land claims in the State of California, entered on the twenty-first day of December, 1854, by which the claim of the petitioner was adjudged to be valid, and confirmed to lands within certain described limits, coming on to be heard upon the transcript of proceedings and decision of said Board, and the papers and evidence upon which said decision was founded, and further evidence taken in the District Court of the United States for the Northern District of California pending said appeal—the said case having been transferred to this Court by order of the said District Court, under the provisions of section four of the act entitled "An Act to expedite the Settlement of Titles to Lands in the State of California," approved July 1st, 1864—and counsel of the United States and for the petitioner having been heard, and due deliberation had, it is ordered, adjudged, and decreed, that the claim of the petitioner, the

City of San Francisco, to the land hereinafter described, is valid, and that the same be confirmed.

The land of which confirmation is made is a tract situated in the County of San Francisco, and embracing so much of the extreme upper portion of the peninsula above ordinary high-water mark (as the same existed at the date of the conquest of the country, namely, the seventh of July, A.D. 1846) on which the City of San Francisco is situated, as will contain an area of four square leagues-said tract being bounded on the north and east by the Bay of San Francisco; on the west by the Pacific Ocean; and on the south by a due east and west line drawn so as to include the area aforesaid, subject to the following deductions, namely: Such parcels of land as have been heretofore reserved or dedicated to public uses by the United States; and also such parcels of land as have been by grants from lawful authority vested in private proprietorship, and have been finally confirmed to parties claiming under said grants by the tribunals of the United States, or shall hereafter be finally confirmed to parties claiming thereunder by said tribunals, in proceedings now pending therein for that purpose; all of which said excepted parcels of land are included within the area of four square leagues above mentioned, but are excluded from the confirmation to the city. This confirmation is in trust, for the benefit of the lot-holders, under grants from the Pueblo, Town, or City of San Francisco, or other competent authority, and as to any residue, in trust for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the City.

#### GRANT BY CONGRESS.

Chap. XIII.—An Act to Quiet the Title to Certain Lands within the Corporate Limits of the City of San Francisco.

#### [Approved March 8, 1866.]

Be it enacted, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States, in Congress assembled. That all the right and title of the United States to the land situated within the corporate limits of the City of San Francisco, in the State of California, confirmed to the City of San Francisco by the decree of the Circuit Court of the United States for the Northern District of California, entered on the eighteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, be, and the same are hereby relinquished and granted to the said City of San Francisco, and its successors, and the claim of the said city to the said land is here. by confirmed, subject, however, to the reservations and exceptions designated in said decree, and upon the following trusts, namely: that all the said land, not heretofore granted to said City, shall be disposed of and conveyed by said City to parties in the bona fide actual possession thereof, by themselves or tenants, on the passage of this Act, in such quantities and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature of the State of California may prescribe, except such parcels thereof as may be reserved and set apart by ordinance of said City for public uses; provided, however, that the relinquishment and grant by this Act shall not interfere with, or prejudice any valid adverse right or claim, if such exist, to said land or any part thereof, whether derived from Spain, Mexico, or the United States, or pre clude a judicial examination and adjustment thereof.

#### ANACT

TO CONFIRM A CERTAIN ORDER PASSED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO.

#### [Approved March 27, 1868.]

The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Whereas, the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco passed an order, numbered eight hundred, which said order was approved by the Mayor and President of the Board of Supervisors on January fourteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, and which is as follows:

"Order No. 800.—An order for the settlement and quieting titles to land in the City and County of San Francisco, situate above high water mark of the Bay of San Francisco and the Pacific Ocean, and without the corporate limits of the City of San Francisco.

" The People of the City and County of San Francisco do ordain as follows:

"Section 1. Immediately after the passage of this order, the Board of Supervisors shall proceed to devise and adopt a plan for the subdivision into blocks and lots of all the lands not reserved to the United States, situated on the Peninsula of San Francisco, and within the present corporate limits of said city and county, and above the natural ordinary high water mark of the Bay of San Francisco and the Pacific Ocean, as the same existed on the seventh day of July, eighteen hundred and forty-six, and without the corporate limits of the City of San Francisco, as defined in the Act to re-incorporate the said city, passed by the Legislature of California on the fifteenth day of April, eighteen hundred and fifty-one, so far as said Board may deem such subdivision necessary; and to select and set apart for public uses such lots and portions of said land as said Board may deem necessary. subject to the limitations and provisions hereinafter in this order contained.

"SEC. 2. After the adoption of the plan provided for in section one of this order, the Board of Supervisors shall cause to be made a map of said lands, according to said plan. Such map shall show the streets and public highways, the blocks formed by the intersection of the streets and public highways, and the lots into which said blocks shall be subdivided, and upon such map shall be designated the lots and portions of land set apart for public uses, and the particular use for which each lot or portion of land shall have been set apart.

"Sec. 3. Upon the completion of the map provided for by section two of this order, it shall be deposited for public inspection in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, and there remain for a period of thirty days; and notice shall be published in three of the daily papers during the whole time that said map shall so remain in said office.

"Sec. 4. Any person having or claiming any interest in any portion of said lands, under and by virtue of any of the provisions of this order, may, at any time before the completion of said map, or while the same shall remain in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors for public inspection, present to the Committee on Outside Lands, hereinafter in this order provided for, a description and diagram of the lands in which he shall so claim an interest, and have the same delineated on said map; but no claim shall be delineated upon said map by said committee, unless all taxes shall have been paid thereon for five fiscal years preceding the year beginning July first, eighteen hundred and sixty-six.

"Sec. 5. After the said map shall have remained in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors for the said period of thirty days, as provided in section three of this order, the Board of Supervisors may examine the objections, if any, made thereto, and may make such alterations in the location or designation of any lots or portions of land set apart for

public uses as may be necessary to obviate any objection which the said Board shall deem just and proper.

- "Sec. 6. As soon as the alterations provided for in section five of this order shall have been made and delineated on said map, the said map shall become and be the official map of said lands; and the portions of land thereon designated as public streets and highways, and the tract or portion of land set apart and designated on said map as a public park, and the tract or portion of land set apart and designated thereon as a cemetery, and lots for a Hospital, City Hall, County Jail, Public Schools, Fire Department, City Library, or other public purposes, shall be deemed absolutely dedicated as such.
- "Sec. 7. No lot set apart for public use, other than for a park, plaza, cemetery or public square, or for the erection thereon of a City Hall or buildings for a City Library, Hospital, County Jail or an Asylum, shall exceed in extent two fifty-vara lots; and no tract or portion of land set apart for a plaza or public square shall exceed in extent four whole blocks, formed by the intersection of the main streets of the plan; and the tract or portion of land set apart for a cemetery shall not be less in extent than two hundred acres; and the tract or portion of land set apart for a public park shall not be less than one thousand acres.
- "Sec. 8. No person shall be entitled to receive compensation for any lot or portion of land set apart for public use, unless his claim shall have been delineated on the map hereinbefore in this order provided for, nor until all conflicting claims to such lot or portion of land shall have been flually determined; and no person shall be entitled to receive compensation for any portion of land included in any street or highway.
- "Sec. 9. All that portion of the land described in section one of this order which lies south of a line drawn due south, eighty-one degrees and thirty-five minutes east, magnetic, through Seal Rock, and west of a line easterly not less than two hundred feet from ordinary high water mark, is hereby reserved and set apart for public use as a public highway.
- "SEC. 10. After the committee hereinafter provided for in section thirteen shall have made their final report upon the said map and reservations, and the report shall be ratified by the Board of Supervisors, it shall be the further duty of the said committee to make a just appraisement of the lands reserved for public uses other than for streets and highways. and to make a just and equitable assessment of the value of the lands so reserved, ratably and equitably upon and to each piece and parcel of land delineated on said map, according to the appraised value of said lands (exclusive of the lands reserved for public streets and highways). They shall make their report in duplicate, under their hands or the hands of a majority of them; one copy of which said report shall be filed in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and the other copy of said report shall be filed in the office of the City and County Recorder; provided, that no member of such committee shall act in making such appraisements or assessments who shall be interested in any of the lands to be affected; and in case any member of said committee shall be so interested, the Board of Supervisors shall appoint some other member to act in his place in making said appraisements and assessments. The said committee shall be sworn to faithfully discharge their duties.
- "Sec. 11. Upon the payment to the County Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco of the amount assessed by the committee provided for in section thirteen of this order, upon the lands as provided for in section ten of this order, the City and County of San Francisco hereby relinquishes and grants all the right, title and claim which the said city and county now has or may hereafter acquire as the successor of the Pueblo of San Francisco, or as the grantee or the patentee of the United States, in and to the lands hereinbefore in this order described, and not excepted or reserved, or intended to be excepted or reserved, by any of the preceding sections or provisions of this order, and which may not be set apart for public use under any of the preceding sections and provisions, and upon which shall be paid, previous to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and

sixty-eight, all taxes which have been assessed thereon during the five fiscal years preceding the year beginning July first, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, unto the person, or to the heirs and assigns of persons, who were, on the eighth day of March, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, in the actual bona fide possession thereof, by themselves or their tenants, or, having been ousted from such possession before or since said day, have recovered or may recover the same by legal process. And it is hereby declared to be the intent and object of this section to pass the right, title and claim of the said city and county in and to every tract or portion of said land delineated on said map, except the portions that are or may be reserved as aforesaid, possessed by one person, unto the possessor thereof in severalty; and every separate tract or portion thereof, except the portions that are or may be reserved as aforesaid, possessed by more than one person, jointly or in common, unto the possessors thereof, jointly or in common.

"Sec. 12. The grants and relinquishments by this order made shall be subject to the selections, reservations and conditions hereinbefore in this order made and provided for.

"SEC. 13. A committee of five members of the Board of Supervisors shall be chosen by said Board, whose duty it shall be to prepare and report to the Board the plan provided for in section two of this order, to supervise the making of the map provided for in section three, to select, set apart and designate the lots and portions of land hereinbefore provided to be set apart for public use, and generally to superintend the carrying out of the provisions of this order; all the acts of said committee to be subject to the approval of the Board of Supervisors.

"Sec. 14. The committee aforesaid shall receive a reasonable compensation for their services, to be determined by the County Judge.

"Sec. 15. Whenever a survey shall be required to determine the boundaries of any claim or portion of any claim, whether ordered by the committee or requested by the claimants, the expenses of such survey shall be borne by such claimants; and no survey shall be received by the committee except it shall have been made by the City and Connty Surveyor, or a surveyor designated by the committee; and the amount of compensation for such survey shall be fixed by the committee at a reasonable rate, not to exceed the ordinary charges for such services.

"Sec. 16. The Board of Supervisors shall provide by order for the distribution and payment to those entitled thereto of the moneys assessed for the cost of reservations, and which shall have been paid to the City and County Treasurer, under the provisions of section eleven of this order.

"Sec. 17. Nothing in this order contained shall have the effect to annul or invalidate any action or proceeding heretofore had or commenced under the orders which are by this order repealed; and it shall not be necessary to do anew, under this order, anything therein provided for which is also provided for in the orders aforesaid, and which has been done under and in pursuance of the provisions of said orders, and have been ratified by the Board of Supervisors, and all proceedings commenced under said orders, relating to maps and surveys and not yet completed, shall be continued and completed under this order.

"SEC. 18. Order seven hundred and thirty-three, and all orders and parts of orders and resolutions, so far as they conflict with the provisions of this order, are hereby repealed.

"Sec. 19. This order is subject in all its parts to ratification by the Legislature, for which application shall be made by the Board of Supervisors."

Be it therefore enacted, that the within and before recited order be and the same is hereby ratified and confirmed; and all proceedings heretofore had, and which have taken place, or shall hereafter take place under its provisions, are ratified and confirmed in all respects; provided, that after the Board of Supervisors shall have set apart a tract of land for a cemetery, as provided in said order, and shall have set apart a tract of land for a public park, as therein provided, the said Board may, if in their judgment the same would be better for the public health or convenience, by a vote of at least ten members, and with the approval

of the Mayor, exchange such lands so set apart for cemetery purposes for other lands, not less than two hundred acres in extent, to be used as a cemetery; and they may also exchange said lands so set apart for a public park for other lands for the purposes of a public park, and not of less extent than one thousand acres; but no person in actual possession of any of the lands mentioned in the first section of said order on the said eighth day of March, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, and on which five years' taxes shall have been paid, as provided in such order, shall be dispossessed of any of said lands under any order heretofore or hereafter made by said Board of Supervisors for the reservation of any of said lands for public uses, except for streets, until compensation shall have been actually made to such person, as provided in said Order Number Eight Hundred; and until such compensation shall have been made, such person shall be allowed to continue in possession of such lands so possessed by them.

SEC. 2. This Act shall take effect from and after its passage.

#### AN ACT

FURTHER TO PROVIDE FOR THE RATIFICATION AND CONFIRMATION OF A CERTAIN ORDER PASSED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO, AND TO MODIFY CERTAIN PRGVISIONS OF THE SAME.

#### [Approved March 27, 1868.]

The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Nothing in the provisions of a certain order passed by the Board of Super visors of the City and County of San Francisco, numbered eight hundred, and entitled "An Order for the settlement and quieting titles to land in the City and County of San Francisco, situate above high water mark of the Bay of San Francisco and the Pacific Ocean, and without the corporate limits of the City of San Francisco," nor in the provisions of any Act confirming or purporting to confirm the same, shall authorize the said Board to exchange any lands set apart and reserved, or to be set apart and reserved, for a cemetery or a park, nor to deprive the said Board of the power of taking immediate possession of any lands hereafter reserved for public use under the provisions of said Order Number Eight Hundred, or by virtue of the terms of an Act of Congress approved March eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, entitled an Act to quiet the title to certain lands within the corporate limits of the City of San Francisco.

SEC. 2. Whenever the report of appraisement mentioned in section ten of said Order Number Eight Hundred shall have been made and filed, as therein provided, it shall be the duty of the City and County Recorder to make out, certify and deliver to the Tax Collector of said city and county a copy of the same, which copy shall be deemed and held to have the same force, effect and validity, in regard to the sums therein assessed, as an assessment roll-duly approved by the Board of Equalization in regard to State and County taxes. The said Tax Collector shall proceed to collect the said several sums of money assessed in said report in the same manner as State and county taxes are collected by him in said city and county; and all the provisions of the various Acts relating to the collection of the public revenue in said city and county, not inconsistent with the provisions of said Order Number Eight Hundred, nor the provisions of this Act, shall apply to the collection of the sums of money so assessed as aforesaid.

SEC. 3. This Act shall take effect from and after its passage.

### AN ACT

TO EXPEDITE THE SETTLEMENT OF LAND TITLES IN THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO, AND TO RATIFY AND CONFIRM THE ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS OF CERTAIN OF THE AUTHORITIES THEREOF.

[Approved March 14, 1870.]

The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Upon receiving a petition from any person or persons, claiming that they by themselves, their tenants or the persons through whom they claim or derive possession have been, from and including the eighth day of March, Anno Domini eighteen hundred and sixty-six (1866), and still are, in the possession of any of the lands without the corporate limits of the City of San Francisso, as defined in an Act to re-incorporate said city, passed by the Legislature of the State of California on the fifteenth day of April, Anno Domini eighteen hundred and fifty-one (1851), and described in the decree of Justice Field, of the United States Circuit Court, confirming the claim of the City and County of San Francisco, entered November second, Anno Domini eighteen hundred and sixty-four (1864), in the Circuit Court of the United States for the Northern District of the State of California, and that they, or the persons through whom they claim or derive possession, have paid to the Tax Collector of the City and County of San Francisco the amount assessed by the Outside Land Committee upon the land described in said petition, to pay for land reserved for public use, provided for in section ten (10) of Order Eight Hundred (800), and also paid the taxes mentioned in section four (4) of said order, and all the taxes levied on said lands for State and municipal purposes now due and remaining unpaid; or, upon receiving a petition from any person or persons, setting forth that said petitioners, by themselves, their tenants, or the persons through whom they claim or derive possession, were, on or before the first (1st) day of January, Anno Domini eighteen hundred and fifty-five (1855), to and including the twentieth (20th) day of June, Anno Domini eighteen hundred and fifty-five (1855), and still are, in possession of the land described in said petition, embraced within the corporate limits of the City of San Francisco, and above high water mark, as defined in the Act to incorporate said city, passed by the Legislature of the State of California, on the fifteenth (15th) day of April, Anno Domini eighteen hundred and fifty-one (1851); and such petition in either case setting forth that such lands have not been sold, leased, dedicated, reserved or conveyed by authority of the said City and County of San Francisco, or the United States, to any one, or for any purpose, and asking for a grant from said city and county, the Board of Supervisors shall proceed to act thereon as hereinafter provided. This petition shall be verified by the oath or affirmation of the party in whose behalf the petition is presented, or by some one acting as his agent, and conversant with the facts detailed in the petition.

Sec. 2. All petitions mentioned in the first section of this Act shall be referred to the Committee on Outside Lands. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall be the Clerk of the Outside Land Committee. The party presenting the said petition may appear before said Clerk and make proof, verbal and documentary, of the truth of the matters alleged in his petition. Copies of the documentary evidence shall be filed with said Clerk, and the oral testimony shall be reduced to writing by said Clerk and subscribed by the witness The proofs of the petitioner being closed, the said committee shall proceed to consider the same, and shall make such report and recommendation thereon as to them shall seem just and proper in the premises. The said committee shall file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors the testimony taken as aforesaid, together with the report of the said committee, and said report shall be submitted to the Board of Supervisors for their approval;

and if, in their judgment, the claim of the petitioner is well founded, they shall, by an order entered in their minutes, adjudge and award a grant of such lands to the petitioner or petitioners therefor, less the amount reserved for public use. The said Board shall thereupon give public notice of their award by notice, published at least once a week for three suc cessive weeks, in some daily newspaper published in the City and County of San Francisco, which notice shall specify the name of the applicant, the date and filing of his petition, and the tract of land awarded, by a good and sufficient description thereof; proof of publication of such notice shall be made in the manner now or hereafter required by law for the proof of publication in civil process. The Clerk of the said committee shall be allowed compensation, for taking the oath or affirmation of witnesses, twenty-five cents, and for reducing the testimony to writing, twenty cents a folio, which shall be in full for all services rendered by him as Clerk of said committee. The compensation herein allowed to the Clerk of said committee shall be paid to said Clerk by the party presenting the petition.

Sec. 3. Upon receiving proof of the publication of the notice provided for in the second section hereof, and the payment of all necessary expenses for deeds, the Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco is hereby authorized and empowered to execute, acknowledge and deliver to the party or parties presenting the aforesaid petition, a deed of conveyance of the tract or lot of land as aforesaid, adjudged and awarded to the petitioner, and attach thereto the corporate seal of the City and County of San Francisco; provided, the petitioner or petitioners shall, before receiving a deed as aforesaid, be required to quitclaim and peaceably deliver the possession of all land claimed by said petitioner or petitioners, reserved by the Commissioners acting under Ordinance Eight-Hundred and Twenty-two (822), and all those lands reserved by the Committee of the Board on Outside Lands for the use and benefit of the City and County of San Francisco; provided, however, that in case a suit shall be pending between the petitioner and some third person, involving the right of possession of the tract, or some portion thereof, petitioned for, and such third person shall file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors a copy of the complaint filed in such action, before the deed shall have been executed and delivered to the petitioner, and also competent proof that such third persons, or the persons through whom they claim or derive possession, have paid the taxes and assessments mentioned in the first section of this Act, then and in that case the deed shall be withheld until such suit shall be finally determined; and there shall thereafter be executed a deed of conveyance of so much of the tract of land as shall be involved in the said suit, to the party in whose favor the said suit shall be finally determined as aforesaid; provided, further, that the expenses hereinafter provided for shall be paid before such conveyance shall be delivered.

- SEC. 4. Upon the filing of a petition, as hereinbefore provided, the petitioner shall deposit with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors a sum of money sufficient to pay for the publication of the notice hereinbefore provided, and other expenses incident to the granting of the prayer of the petitioner. But the Clerk shall not receive on file any petition that shall not be in conformity with the provisions of this Act.
- SEC. 5. A conveyance executed and delivered in pursuance of the provisions of this Act shall operate as an acknowledgment on the part of the said city and county, that the title to the land therein described has passed under and by virtue of said Order Number Eight Hundred (890), or of said Ordinance Number Eight Hundred and Twenty-two (822), as the case may be, and also under and by virtue of the several Acts of Congress and the Legislature ratifying said order and ordinance, or under the authority of which the same have been passed; and such conveyance shall likewise operate to grant, convey, remise and release to the party, his heirs and assigns, named therein, the lands in such conveyance described, and all the estate and interest, present and future, of the said City and County of San Francisco, in and to such lands. But no such conveyance shall in any event be held to import a warranty or covenant of title on the part of, or to bind said city and county, or any officer thereof.
- Sec. 6. All orders and parts of orders of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, conflicting with Order Eight Hundred and Sixty-six (866), are hereby

repealed; but such repeal shall not invalidate any of the proceedings instituted under the order of which Eight Hundred and Sixty-six (866) is amendatory, and such proceedings may be continued under the provisions of said Order Eight Hundred and Sixty-six (866). Whenever such proceedings have been completed, and the Committee on Outside Lands of said Board of Supervisors, or a majority of them, have executed and delivered a deed or deeds, the person or persons to whom such deed or deeds were executed may obtain from the Mayor, at his or their own expense, a deed of the same land, executed by him and sealed with the corporate seal of the City and County of San Francisco, without further petition, proof, award or notice; and the Mayor is hereby authorized and empowered to execute such deeds. Any and all such deeds shall have the like force and effect as the conveyances mentioned in section five of this Act; provided, that if any grantee in any deed executed by such committee has heretofore sold or conveyed any land included in such deed, or his, her or their interest in such land, by writing recorded in the office of the City and County Recorder of the City and County of San Francisco, the deed executed by the Mayor, and sealed with the aforesaid corporate seal, shall be, as to the lands so sold or conveyed, for, and inure to the benefit of such purchaser or purchasers, grantee or grantees, and their heirs, and the deed executed by the Mayor shall expressly so state.

SEC. 7. Whereas, divers co-owners and tenants in common of certain tracts of land situate in the City and County of San Francisco, and within the limits described in Order Number Eight Hundred (800) of said Board of Supervisors, who are or claim to be in possession thereof as such owners and tenants in common, under and in accordance with the terms and provisions of said Order Number Eight Hundred (800), and as such alleged co-owners and tenants in common, have had said tracts of land delineated by metes and bounds, and as entireties, upon the map mentioned and provided for in said Order Number Eight Hundred (800), and have also severally paid their proportionate share of the taxes upon said tracts of lands for the five fiscal years preceding the year beginning July first (1st), eighteen hundred and sixty-six (1866), and all subsequent taxes due thereon, and have filed with said Board their petition, claiming said land under and in accordance with the terms and provisions of said order, and Order Number Seven Hundred and Forty-eight (748) of said Board; now, therefore, it shall be lawful for any such alleged co-owners or tenants in common of lands situate within the limits described by said Order Number Eight Hundred (800), or one or more thereof, or his or their successor or successors in interest, who shall have performed the acts and conditions aforesaid, to pay, as such co-owners or tenants in common, his or their proportionate share of the amount of any and all taxes or assessments now levied and due, or which may hereafter (at any time prior to the delivery of a deed from the City and County of San Francisco, for his or their undivided interest in said land.) be levied and become due upon the tract or tracts of land, wherein he or they hold as such co-owners or tenants in common; and to facilitate the payment of such proportionate shares, the Tax Collector is hereby authorized to divide into smaller parcels any tract of land claimed by coowners, owners in severalty or tenants in common, and to apportion to eacle subdivision the ratable proportion, value considered, of the assessment made to the whole tract so divided, and after the payment of the apportioned assessment upon any one of such subdivisions, no valid objection shall be made by any party to the acts of the Tax Collector in respect to such division, and the apportioned assessment shall become as valid and binding upon the respective subdivisions to which they have been so apportioned as if no division had been made by said Tax Collector.

SEC. 8. All of the acts and proceedings of the Tax Collector of the City and County of San Francisco, taken or done by him in pursuance of or under the authority of any order or resolution of the Board of Supervisors of said city and county, or in pursuance of or under the authority of any Act of the Legislature of the State of California, in reference to the collection of the taxes or assessments upon what are commonly designated as the outside lands of the said city and county, are hereby ratified and confirmed, and declared to be legal, valid and binding, both upon the lands embraced within the purview of any such Act of the Legisature of this State, or order or resolution of said Board of Supervisors of said city and county.

- SEC. 9. And whereas, certain lands, known as outside lands of the City and County of San Francisco, have been advertised for sale by the Tax Collector of said city and county, for the non-payment of taxes or assessments levied thereon, known as the outside land tax, which sale has been postponed from time to time by said Tax Collector; and whereas, some of the parties claiming to be the owners of portions of said lands refuse or neglect to pay the taxes so levied as aforesaid, and have enjoined the said Tax Collector from proceeding with said sale; now, therefore, be it enacted, that all the pieces or parcels of land so advertised by the said Tax Collector as aforesaid, on which assessments heretofore levied have not been already paid, or shall not be paid to said Tax Collector within thirty days from and after the passage of this Act, shall be sold by said Tax Collector for gold coin of the United States, as hereinafter provided. Said sales may be adjourned from time to time by said Tax Collector, not exceeding in all sixty days, and may take place at such place in said city and county as the said Tax Collector may designate. The time during which any injunction may be in force restraining said Tax Collector or other officer of said city and county from proceeding with said sale shall not be computed as any part of the periods limited and fixed within which he may perform the acts and duties herein defined, but shall be excluded therefrom. The said Tax Collector may retain in his custody so much of the proceeds arising from said sale as shall be necessary to liquidate and pay off the appraisements for reserved lands as heretofore made, pursuant to Order Number Eight Hundred, and all such proper and necessary costs as he may be at in conducting said sale and the collection of such assessments, and the overplus thereof he shall pay over to the Treasurer of the said city and county; and said Treasurer shall carry the amount so paid to him to the credit of the General Fund of said city and county. The amount so retained by the said Tax Collector shall be paid over by him to the parties entitled thereto under section eleven of Order Number Eight Hundred, in discharge of the appraisements for reserved lands; and within thirty days from and after he shall have received a sum from assessments equal to the total amount of appraisements for reserved lands, over and above the expenses and costs of making collections, he shall settle and pay off in full the appraisements made as aforesaid; provided, however, when there are conflicting claimants for particular appraisements, said Tax Collector shall not be obliged to make payment in such cases until such conflicting claims shall be determined, amicably or otherwise; and the said Tax Collector is hereby authorized, from time to time, to make distribution on account of said appraisements for reserved lands, pro rata, as often as he shall have on hand fifty per cent. or less thereof.
- SEC. 10. Said Tax Collector shall issue to each successful purchaser a receipt, in duplicate, for the amount bid and paid by him, which receipt shall also contain a brief description of the premises sold, and upon its face entitle the bidder, or his assigns, to a deed of conveyance of the premises therein described, at the expiration of twelve months from the date of the sale, unless there shall be a redemption of the premises as hereinafter provided.
- SEC. 11. Said lands shall be sold subject to redemption, and such redemption may be made at any time within twelve months from the date of sale, upon paying to the said Tax Collector the amount bid therefor, together with twenty-five per cent, thereon and in addition thereto; and the party redeming shall also pay such expenses of advertising and other expenses as the said Tax Collector may have incurred in and about the particular tract from the sale of which redemption is sought to be effected; provided, that all-lands sold for assessment prior to the passage of this Act shall have the same right of redemption as provided for in section eleven of this Act.
- SEC. 12. The Tax Collector, after the expiration of twelve months from the date of sale, in which there has been no redemption, shall make a conveyance of the premises sold to the purchaser thereof, or his assigns; and where there has been a redemption, he may make conveyance thereof to the redemptioner. In cases of redemption, the Tax Collector shall pay over to the holders of receipts the amount bid, together with the sum paid by the redemptioner, in addition to the bid.
  - SEC. 13. This Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

### GRANTS BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

Grants of Outside Lands have been made by the Board in pursuance of Order No. 866 and the foregoing Act of the Legislature, the first Order adjudging and awarding grants of said lands being adopted on the 21st day of June, 1869. Prior to that time, the Board made grants and passed the title to portions of the lands embraced within the Van Ness Ordinance under the provisions of Order No. 748, the first grant of these lands being made on the 11th day of March, 1867, and from that date the Committee on Outside Lands have examined and reported upon twelve hundred applications for lands: lying west of Larkin and southwest of Johnston (or Ninth street), embracing what is known as Van Ness and Outside Lands; and although it was considered that the want of a record title was even more necessary to the holders of property under the Van Ness Ordinance, it being more difficult with each succeeding year to prove up and furnish such proofs of possession as the Ordinance contemplates and the Courts require, yet the necessity, if it exists, is not apparent from the applications made, the greater portion of the applications and grants since June, 1869, being for Outside Lands.

The following tables have been carefully compiled from the Records of the Board and show the grants, date and description of Outside Lands made in blocks and portions of blocks, in what is known as the Mission and Potrero; also, that portion west of the charter line of 1851 and east of First avenue, with the land in acres, lying north and south of the Park Reservation and east of the Spring Valley Water Works Waste pond, where certificates have been issued which entitle the grantees named to receive a deed from the Mayor, executed by him and scaled with the corporate seal of the City and County of San Francisco; also, the grants made where protests against the delivery of a conveyance have been subsequently filed by reason of which the certificates for deeds are withheld, awaiting the determination of pending suits:

### LAND RELINQUISHED BY THE UNITED STATES.

GRANTS THAT HAVE BEEN MADE OF THE LAND EMBRACED WITHIN THE FORMER LINES OF THE MILITARY RESERVATION AT OLD POINT SAN JOSE, SINCE THE PASSAGE OF THE FOLLOWING ACT BY CONGRESS, ARE HEREWITH PRESENTED.

### AN ACT

TO RELINQUISH THE INTEREST OF THE UNITED STATES IN CERTAIN LANDS TO THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled:

That all the right and title of the United States to the Military Reservation in the City and County of San Francisco, in the State of California, known as the Point San Jose Military Reservation, be, and the same are hereby relinquished and granted to the said City and County, and its successors, for the uses and purposes, as follows:

 $\it First.$  To maintain all streets and alleys as now laid out upon the Official Map of the City of San Francisco.

Second. And then in trust to grant and convey the remainder of said lands to the parties severally who are at the date of the passage of this Act in the actual bona fide possession thereof, by themselves or their tenants, and in such parcels as the same are so held and possessed by them, or who, if they have not such possession, were deprived thereof by the United States military authorities when they went into the occupancy of said Military Reservation, or were deprived thereof by intruders or trespassers, against whom possession may be recovered by legal process.

Third. To have and to hold all the residue, if any, of said lands, for the use and benefit of said City, there being excepted from this relinquishment and grant all that certain piece or parcel of land, portion of said Reservation, and which is bounded and described as follows, viz: Commencing at a point in the mean low water shore line of the Bay, or entrance to the Bay, of San Francisco, east of the promontory of Point San Jose, where the same is intersected by the westerly line of Van Ness avenue, running thence southerly along the said westerly line of Van Ness avenue to its intersection with the northern line of Eay street, thence westerly along the north side of Bay street to its intersection with the eastern line of Laguna street, thence northerly along the said-eastern line of Laguna street to the westerly shore, thence in a northeasterly, easterly, southeasterly and southerly direction, following the said shore line, and including the entire water front between Laguna street and Van Ness avenue, to the point or place of beginning.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That nothing in this Act contained shall interfere with or prejudice any valid adverse right or claim, if such exist, to said land or any part thereof, whether derived from Spain, Mexico, or the United States, or preclude an examination and adjustment thereof by the Courts.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with the provisions of this Act be, and the same are hereby declared inapplicable to the lands hereinabove relinquished and granted.

Approved, July 1st, 1870.

### STREET WORK.

The Street Law prior to the session of the last Legislature allowed the contractor personally to demand and collect an assessment for the performance of street work, or the payment of the same to the Superintendent of Public Streets by the property owner, the collection of said assessments being at the risk of the contractor. By the Act passed in 1869-70, which proposed to do away with objectionable features in the then existing law, the Act was so amended as to provide for the delivery of street assessments by the Superintendent of Public Streets to the Tax Collector, to be by him collected, and the amounts received on each separate assessment paid over to the City and County Treasurer on the last day of each month to the credit of the respective fund, the contractor obtaining, on the recording of the assessment from the Superintendent of Streets, an order upon the Treasurer for the amount of the same, and receiving the sums so collected and paid into the fund by the Tax Collector, on presentation of said order. It further requires the Superintendent of Public Streets to publish a notice of each assessment, describing the general nature of the work done, the names of the persons and the amount assessed to them respectively, and the Tax Collector, on the receipt of the assessment, to publish a notice for a period of thirty days that the same is in his hands for collection, and if not paid within that time, will be delivered to the City and County Attorney for collection. The Act as amended also provided for an Assistant City and County Attorney, whose duty is to sue for and collect said delinquent assessments, his compensation being a fee and percentage in each action, as follows:

"After suit brought, and before judgment or decree, said Attorney shall be entitled to charge and collect, in addition to the said principal sum or sums for which suit is brought, interest, costs of suit and disbursements, fifteen dollars in each case where suit is commenced, which he shall have for his own use; but if a judgment or decree is rendered, fifteen per cent. shall be added and collected as his fee for collection; provided, that said percentage fee of fifteen dollars shall not be allowed to exceed the sum of one hundred dollars in any one judgment; and provided further, that if any suit is carried on appeal to the Supreme Court, he shall be entitled to receive an additional sum of one hundred dollars; and it is further provided, that said assessment or assessments shall draw interest at the rate of ten per cent. per annum, from the date of the recording of said assessment down to and after judgment or decree, any law to the contrary notwithstanding. It shall be the duty of said Assistant City and County Attorney to commence suit to recover said assessments within ten days after the same is delivered to him; and said action shall be brought in the name of the People of the City and County of San Francisco."

In October, 1870, Mayor Selby called the attention of the Board to the provisions of the Act, and, in accordance with his suggestions, the Board authorized the Tax Collector to employ messengers to serve notice upon property owners of work proposed to be done, also when assessments were due, so as to prevent them, through a want of knowledge of the operations of the Act, from paying, in addition to their assessments, the costs and expenses contemplated by the law.

The amendments so made to the Street Law, of which brief mention has been made, it is claimed, do not either benefit the property owner, the contractor or the city; for, while in cases where the amount of the assessment has been small and became delinquent by neglect or otherwise, the property owner has had to pay, besides interest, etc., the sum of fifteen dollars, where suit has been commenced, that amount alone sometimes exceeds the original amount of the assessment; and there is no doubt many suits instituted would not have been commenced

if the contractor was not practically prevented from settling his own accounts, while the contractor, not having power to arrange with the property owner for payment, is required to wait too long a time for the amounts to be collected by the Tax Collector and the Assistant City and County Attorney. And although the interest allowed is ten per cent., yet that does not relieve the contractor, who requires to use his money in the prosecution of his business. In addition, the City is put to an expense in the collection of those assessments, which, in the operation of the law, is not considered equitable to the property owner or the contractor, and subserves no public interest, the expense to the City in the Tax Collector's office amounting to five thousand dollars per annum, (see Tax Collector's Report, page 63), while, in the Treasurer's office, the expense cannot be less than two thousand dollars per annum. Another amendment, which meets with more favor, is that which requires the owners of a majority of the property affected to petition for a street, or portion of a street, to be graded before the Board can assume jurisdiction, except in cases as provided for in said Act. This provision, with the evident disposition on the part of the Board to order only such work performed as petitioned for or imperatively required, has reduced the amount of street work performed during the last year very materially from that of former years.

The Report of the Superintendent of Public Streets shows the street work performed and the amount of assessments, with the total cost from contracts awarded in prior years, and not completed till some time in the fiscal year 1870-71, as well as embracing such contracts as were awarded and completed in that year, while the following tables show only the contracts for street work awarded during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1871, the character of the work, price, and the total cost of such contracts as have been completed. The amount of Street Work awarded and completed during the Fiscal Year is as follows:





### CITY HALL.

THE Act providing for the erection of a City Hall in the City and County of San Francisco was approved April 4, 1870, and on the 27th, the Governor appointed Messrs. P. H. Canavan, Joseph G. Eastland and Chas. E. McLane as the three Commissioners to carry out its provisions. They met and organized on the 11th day of May, electing P. H. Canavan, Esq., as Chairman, and appointing Robert George, Esq., Secretary of the Commission, receiving on application at that date from His Honor, Mayor Selby, a formal transfer of Yerba Buena Park, as contemplated in the Law. After duly advertised notices, calling for proposals from June 1st, to grade Yerba Buena Park, as designated in the specifications, the same were received, and on July 7th were opened publicly, and ranged from 19% cents to 32% cents per cubic yard. The lowest bidder forfeited his deposit of \$1,000, and the contract was awarded to D. Hewes, the next lowest bidder, at the rate of 23 1/2 cents per cubic yard. Mr. Hewes entered into contract and commenced the work on July 26th, continuing and completing what was deemed necessary up to February, 1871. The work done levelled the whole of that portion of the Park provided to be laid out in lots and sold-a strip 200 feet wide of the Market street front, the space 200 feet wide designated as City Hall Avenue; Park Avenue, from Larkin to McAllister streets, parallel with and 200 feet distant from Market street, and a space some fifteen feet inside, including the angle of the eastern extremity of the City Hall Reservation. The total amount of cubic yards of sand-excavation and embankment, as per survey and estimate of the City and County Surveyor, was 141,042 55-100.

After consultation with the various City and County officers, a pamphlet of instructions and suggestions to architects was compiled, giving in detail the size of the various principal rooms, the accessory offices, their general location, with suggestions as to light and ventilation, accompanied by a map of the site, giving frontage, distances, streets and grades. Advertisements calling for plans and designs for the proposed building were inserted in the California and Eastern papers offering premiums for the five best plans, ranging from \$500 to \$2,500; the advertisements were inserted June 23d, the time for receiving plans being fixed for November 1st, which time was extended to the 15th of the same mouth. At that time sixteen sets of plans were received and subsequently removed to the Art Gallery of the Mechanics' Institute, in their Pavillon on Union Square, where they were opened and examined on the 17th in-t., by the Commissioners, and subsequently exhibited for public inspection. The plan bearing the motto "No Vile Fann" was selected, after nearly three months' time was taken by the Commissioners in canvassing the merits of the different plans presented. The architects of the plans selected were Messrs. Fuller & Laver of Albany, N. Y. The other premiums were awarded as follows:

Second Premium	Butler and Hochkoffe
Third Premium	S. H. Williams & Sor
Fourth Premium	Wright & Saunders.
Fifth Premium	P. J. O'Connor.

In addition, the Commissioners decided that three other sets of designs and plans were of such merit that the sum of \$500 was awarded to the author of each—viz., to Messrs. Langerfeldt & Attwood of Boston, Messrs. Patton & Jordan of San Francisco, and Mr. Samuel Sloan of Philadelphia.

Mr. Augustus Laver, of the firm of Messrs. Fuller and Laver, the authors of the adopted plans, was appointed Architect to the Board, and instructed to make such modifications in the designs as would bring the cost of the building within the limit allowed by law. On the 31st of January, 1871, Mr. Julius C. McCeney was elected Attorney to the Board.

In February, proposals were advertised for, to excavate for the foundation, including the levelling of that portion of the lot to be covered by the building. Permission having been

obtained from the City to use temporarily for the storage of the sand (which would be required as the building progressed) one-half of McAllister street, and that portion of Larkin street inside the railroad track, adjoining the City Hall Lot, a bulkhead and fence were erected enclosing those portions of the streets, to secure the sand from drifting. On the 27th of March the bids received (12) were opened, the prices ranging from 17½ to 22½ cents per cubic yard, and on the next day the contract was awarded to J. R. Meyers, who commenced and continued the necessary work until about May 10th. The quantity of sand excavated under the contract was 62.505 cubic yards. On the completion of this contract proposals were called for to furnish brick, cement, clean hard stone suitable for concrete, and undressed stone suitable for foundations, in order that the material should be of good quality and approved before being furnished to the contractor, to whom might be awarded the contract for laying and setting up the concrete bed. The privilege was granted by the U. S. Government to quarry and take stone from the Quarry at Angel Island, of which bidders were notified.

The advertisement called for receiving bids on May 20th, 1871, which time was extended to June 8th. Twenty-five bids were received and opened publicly, the prices ranging as follows:

The stone decided upon to use for concrete was the rough sandstone of Telegraph Hill, and the contract was awarded to M. Miles, at the rate of \$3.15 per cubic yard. The contract for cement was awarded to P. Caduc of the Benicia Cement Company, at the rate of \$3.24 per barrel. The stone selected for the foundation was that to be obtained from Augel Island, and the contract was awarded to Henry W. Seale, at the rate of \$6.65 per cubic yard. The lowest bid to furnish brick was considered too high; and as there was no immediate requirement for the same, no award was made. Proposals for putting in the concrete bed, with the accessory work, were then invited by advertisement from July 15th, the time for receiving them being on the 19th of August. Seven bids were received and opened at that date; the prices varied from \$1.90 to \$4.50 per cubic yard of concrete laid, including excavation for the same work, and from \$500 to \$2,700 for the fence. The two lowest bidders did not produce satisfactory testimonials of skill, as required, and the contract was awarded to D. Jordan, the next lowest bidder, at the rate of \$2.97 per cubic yard, and at \$1,200 for fencing in the site. The work of laying the concrete bed was commenced on September 18th, and is being steadily prosecuted. At this date, (Nov. 16th), upwards of three-fourths of the entire work is completed.

The work is steadily progressing; and proposals for doing the mason work of the foundation walls, also for furnishing cement and brick to be used in the same, were invited by advertisement October 13th, to be received November 30th, ensuing.

A map of the Park was prepared by the City and County Surveyor, and, as altered by the Commissioners, was approved; duplicates of the same were deposited in the office of the City and County Surveyor and in the Recorder's office.

As determined, the whole number of lots to be sold was 99, located as follows:

The details of the sale were finally arranged in the latter part of March, 1871. Messrs. John Middleton & Son were appointed the Auctioneers, and the sale advertised on and from April 7th, to take place on the 15th of May following. Prior to the time so fixed, suit was commenced in the Fourth District Court by the City and County of San Francisco and A. P. Hotaling et al. against the Commissioners, setting forth causes of complaint and praying for an injunction to restrain the sale of the lots. In consequence of a temporary injunction being granted, the sale was postponed to June 14th. The case was heard, and the decision (that the restraining order be set aside, and denying the motion for an injunction,) not being rendered until the 14th, (the day set for the sale), the Commissioners postponed the time to August 14th, which was further postponed to the 28th instant, on an Order of the Supreme Court, until the determination of the appeal, which Court afterwards confirmed the decision previously rend red by Judge Morrison.

The sale took place, as announced, at Platt's Hall, on August 23, 1871, the total amount realized being \$953,900. The following table shows the number and description of the lots, with the name of purchaser and the price of each lot, for which, and for the facts hereinbefore recited, the compiler is indebted to Robert George, Esq., Secretary of the Commission:

By the terms of the Act, the Board of Commissioners was authorized to draw orders or warrants on the Treasurer of the City and County, for services performed and labor done, etc., the Treasurer to pay the same in the order of their presentation; and, in case of no money being in Said fund from said date of presentation, the orders or warrants to bear interest at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum, until paid.

From June 17, 1870, to November 16, 1871, the total amount of demands registered and paid is \$215,360 38, of which the sum of \$5,561 08 was paid as interest on demands registered. The amount of receipts from the Board of City Hall Commissioners to November 16, 1871, is \$232,200.

#### REGISTRY LAW.

The Registry Law, inasmuch as it tends to prevent illegal voting, is conceded to have been necessary legislation; and, while none of the safeguards ought to be disturbed, yet it is claimed that it can be so amended as to reduce the expense in this City and County to a moderate figure, and not interfere with any essential feature of the Act, but, on the contrary, facilitate and accommodate our citizens in getting registered, enrolled, or transferred from one District to another, while lessening the expense. The expenditures by the City incidental to holding Elections since, with the expenses for the same number of years prior to the passage of the Law, are herewith presented:
