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

# P R E F A C E .

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THIS ABRIDGMENT OF WORSHIP IN THE SCHOOL-ROOM, has been prepared at the request of a number of Teachers, who have expressed an earnest desire that the book might be thus brought within the reach of pupils generally. It is in this form furnished at a cost which places it within the reach of all.

The arrangement of the pages is such that no embarrassment can be caused, in case some pupils have the complete work, and others the abridged. The paging in the Abridgment at the bottom of the page, corresponds with the entire work, and shows what pages have been selected from that, while the notation at the head of the page shows the number of each page in the book consecutively.

A number of Tunes and Hymns, which are general favorites with our young people, are given at the close of the book ; thus furnishing variety, when Teachers may wish to use these Hymns and Tunes.

It is suggested that Teachers may often prefer to divide the lesson, and make two of it instead of one. In such case only one column, or one-half of the Scripture selections would be used ; and the remainder, with the second Hymn, would form the lesson for the second day. By pursuing this method the lessons would be sufficient for any ordinary school year.

I would observe here that, for the sake of the unity of the service, the Teacher should ALWAYS ANNOUNCE THE SUBJECT, PRINTED IN ITALICS, AT THE HEAD OF THE PAGE, before commencing the lesson. Let the Teacher always read the first verse—one-half of the school read the second in concert—the other half read the third—Teacher the fourth, and so on around.

This Abridgment of Worship in the School Room consists of two parts :—

I. PART FIRST contains 90 pages, taken from the complete work. These embrace such Lessons as are of special importance to the young, and contain the principal portion of the standard Church tunes, which are found in the complete work. The Tunes were adapted to the Hymns of each page in this portion of the work by T. J. Cook. See his "*Musical Preface*," on the next page.

II. THE SECOND PART is composed of new matter.

In the selections of Hymns and Tunes for this part of the work, valuable suggestions were made by some of the most successful and experienced Sabbath School Teachers and Superintendents, as well as by Pastors.

The revision and final arrangement of the material thus collected, were made by T. E. PERKINS, of New York City. See Mr. Perkins' Preface to Part II.

This part contains a choice list of Tunes and Hymns, which will not only be learned with interest in the Singing Class, but will be cherished and sung by the fireside and in the Sabbath School. Teachers of the Day School may also often select an appropriate piece from this part in connection with the regular Lesson of the day, in Part I.

10 Wherefore the children of Israel shall keep the sabbath, to observe the sabbath, throughout their generations, for a perpetual covenant.




15 Let us, therefore, come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need.—*Heb.* 4-16.


