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# THE TENTH ANNUAL EISTEDDFOD



The SMU campus was "Eisteddofo-dized" once again, this year marking the tenth year of the folk festival. Some ninety singers, dancers, storytellers, and traditional folk musicians displayed their talents at SMU's exclusive folk festival. Music, color, and costumes turned the campanile into another world for the first weekend in October of 1981. Sunny skies enhanced the outdoor workshops which included harmonies, contra, country and square dance, along with a vivacious Portuguese dance troupe. Evening concerts attracted near capacity crowds from all over as renowned folk musicians performed traditional Irish, English and Scot-

tish tunes, ballads, blues and songs of the seas.

The Eisteddfod festival was created by Howard Glasser, a faculty member from the College of Visual and Performing Arts. A man of vast experience, he has acquired an international reputation as an outstanding calligrapher. His musical interests have had a major impact on the SMU community; especially as coordinator of the monthly Ceilidh folk music get togethers and the Eisteddfod. This Eisteddfod was not only Professor Glasser's tenth, it also marked his last as chairman and organizer of the folk festival.
























A cool autumn breeze carried the aroma of fall leaves and the sweet sound of banjos and fiddles throughout the SMU courtyard. People sat with their feet tapping mesmerized by the bright greens, reds, and blues, of the skirts on the lively Portuguese dancers. Men dressed in white kimono type suits with a red sash about their waists, lead the red-caped women in a graceful dance around the dancing pole. Their soft brown leather boots did a seemingly easy left, hop, hop right, hop, hop, drag back, dance steps.

Small bands of performers milled about, laughing and joking, tuning up their instruments. Many conjured up to play together and swap folk songs. Children careened in circles, bearded men danced, playing, swinging and dancing; this was the rustic cultural atmosphere Eisteddfod brings to SMU and the 1980's.






The SMU Cross Country Teams, coached by Bob Dowd, out did themselves again in the 81-82 season setting records in both mens and womens teams. On November 21st, over a frozen snow covered golf-course in Kenosha, Wisconsin they reached another pinnacle in a long history of Harrier success.

Led by Cathy Carnes, the womens team placed fourth in the nation in their first ever national competition; the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division III Championship. Carnes who placed fourth out of 116 runners became SMU's first All American in Womens Cross Country. Contributing to the womens effort were Terry Duhamel placed 37th, Julie Dube 45th, Senior Captain Nancy Lane 47th, Cheryl Mrozienshi 50th, Christy Baker 65, and Sharon Santamaria 70.

The men, who were led by co-captain Keith Coughlin *placed 18th* finished eighth in the country. Out of a field of 185 runners, senior co-captain Brian Lockard placed 39th, Bob Cosgrove 60th, Senior Jim Kent 73rd, Keith Paton 106th, Joe Cooney 127th, and senior Matt Sukeforth 136th.













On February 7th, Nikki Giovanni spoke to the SMU community in the campus center main auditorium. The combination lecture and poetry reading was sponsored by the Black Student Union, the Lecture Series, the Program Council and the Women's Center. ### **TRAVESTIES**

Travesties, written by Tom Stoppard, was a play of limericks, puns, word play, contradictions and paradoxes. The play was a commentary on how arts and politics since World War I broke the established order. This was done by altering the scenes back and forth from one time period to another. This juxtapositioning of the scenes was very effective and made the descrepancies between the two periods quite comic. Centered on the life experiences of Henry Carr, who was once a minor official in the consular corps in 1914. Carr remembers himself as an important influence in the lives of the local intellectuals. The structure of the play was based heavily on "The Importance of Being Earnest" by Oscar Wilde, using it continuously as a source for allusions, puns and dialogues. "Travesties" also relied on the historic coincidence that Lenin, James Joyce and Tristan Tzara, the founder of Dadiasm, were all living in Zurich during the War. The play illuminated the present with its Marx Brothers visions of the past.

# The Diary of Anne Frank





"The Diary of Anne Frank" written by Frances Goodrich and Albert Hackett, takes place in Amsterdam between the years 1942 and 1945. All the events of the play occur in the attic of an office building where Anne's father conducted his business before Nazi occupation.

# "FORGET NAM? . . . NEVER!"

That was the theme as the Viet Nam Veterans Peace Memorial Amphitheater was rededicated on May 6th of 1982. The event was the highlight of the Viet Nam Veterans Awareness Week which ran May 2nd to May 8th.

Paying hommage to Viet Nam Veterans were James Fitzpatrick; president of the Massachusetts Viet Nam Veterans Association, Mrs. Joseph Dunn; National Chairwoman of Families of M.I.A.'s, gubernatorial candidates; John Lakian, Andy Card, former Governor Michael Dukakis, U.S. Congressman Barney Frank and color guards representing the armed services. As the ceremony concluded, one message was clear; Viet Nam is a topic not to be pushed aside and forgotten.

Facing what he called "a problem far worse than anything in the history of the university", President Donald Walker called for an emergency meeting of faculty, staff, administration, and students on October 16th. Over 1,500 students and staff members attended the first of two rallies as President Walker explained the crisis SMU was facing.

Governor Edward King had proposed level funding budgets of higher education for the fiscal year 1982. Had it passed, SMU would have had to operate on the same budget in 1983 that it had in 1982. Eight hundred fewer students would have been admitted to SMU in 1983 and over 100 staff members would have been fired. The proposed cut of 800 students would have come from the freshman class and transfer students. This would have cut the freshman class in half. The 100 employees fired would have come from all areas

including administrators, faculty and staff.

At the time, Massachusetts was ranked 50th in the nation in its support of higher education. In a state that ranked 50th nationwide, SMU was second from the bottom in the state. A university usually spends about 70% of its budget on salaries, SMU was spending 81% on salaries. Adding the cost of heat to this figure and it totaled up to 95% of SMU's budget.

At the first rally, President Walker cited two target areas to strive for to save SMU. One tactic was to eliminate Governor King's plan for level funding; the second was to build support for SMU among the constituent community.

Students were asked to participate by doing the following: attend SMU's open house on November 1; join the dollar club (the money collected was used to pay for offset printing costs for pamphlets);



pass out bumper stickers and information pamphlets; volunteer for the university crisis team (established to coordinate efforts, helping to prevent people from going off in their own directions lobbying without correct information) participate in lobbying and other political activities.

President Walker's message was summed up in the following comment at the rally:


"I don't think we ought to look upon the political game as a game of cops and robbers. We're not dealing with scoundrels at all. We're dealing with people who want the best for this commonwealth, and what they're saying is they will be tutored in what is best by your desires from the people who select them.

"Let's use that process. You don't scare legislators or governors into giving you your budget. You persudade them by convincing

them that that's what the people who elected them want. And we want it."

"People of this area would by no means sacrifice this university if they are convinced that it is a jeopardy. They've demonstrated their concern for this place time and agin, including with its inception, including with the issue of its independence. But we have to get the attention of our constituent groups.

"The problem is this — if the campaign poops out, if we get tired, it we give up, then we're bagged. We tried to turn out the troops and did do it. There's a political message there that's very clear. It can happen."



As of January 27, 1983 Governor King recommended to the legislature that SMU be allocated \$18 million for fiscal year 1983 as oppossed to his earlier proposal of only \$16 million. Although \$18 million was an improvement, it was not considered to be enough to maintain the level of education SMU previosuly offered. The sum of \$19 million was needed to provide the adequate base budget to continue quality education at SMU. Effective lobbying on the office of the Governor brought the recommendation up \$2 million, the next step was to lobby the legislators who would be making the final decision on the allocation of the budget.

Amidst the ongoing battle to SAVE SMU, President Walker called a second rally meeting in the auditorium on February 26th. The emphasis of the meeting centered on a push for a massive letter writing campaign targeted at the leaders of the state legislature. In the letter campaign to Governor King over 5,000 letters were received. President Walker asked the students, faculty and employees to write to the four prominent menbers of two legislative ways and means committees: in the Senate; President William Bulger, and Ways and Means Committee Chairperson Chester Aktins, in the House; Speaker of the House Thomas McGee, and Ways and Means Chairperson Michael Creedon.

The final step in insuring a \$19 million budget for SMU, was a torch run and rally at the State House in Boston. Approximately 3,500 turned out to support the efforts. Twenty-five busses transport-



# THE FIRST RUN OF THE SMU TORCH TO BOSTON

In December of 1964, a report was released known as the Willis-Harrington Report. It recommended that Southeastern Massachusetts Technical Institute be relegated to being a technical institute rather than offering majors in such subjects as the Humanities and Social Sciences. SMTI students and faculty along with area residents organized a rally for February 17, 1965 to protest the proposed limitations.

The demonstration consisted of a rally and bonfire at the future SMU campus in North Dartmouth. (The only completed building in North Dartmouth was the power plant, Group I was being constructed and wouldn't be completed until 1967). Classes at the time were held in school branches throughout New Bedford and Fall River.

The original "Torch of Learning" was lit from the bonfire at the rally and carried by runners who ran one mile at a time until they reached Boston. The torch symbolized student protests to the cutting out of the liberal arts curriculum. Once in Boston, SMTI supporters jammed the committee room where the school hearings were being held, as well as setting up picket lines outside the State House.

Although Southeastern Massachu-





ed the supporters from SMU to Boston along with hundreds of students making the drive in their own cars. Once in Boston the students impressed legislators, senators, representatives and presspeople with their orderliness and good behavior. Hundreds of posters, picket signs, flags and banners displayed SAVE SMU sentiments and covered the grounds of the Boston Common.

The fact that SMU would indeed receive the \$19 m. was positively announced by David Bartley in the primary speech at the rally. David Nelson, also a member of the House Ways and Means Committee said the mass effort was a "Victory Celebration". "It couldn't have been done without your voicing your opinions. You've had to fight for everything you've gotten", said New Bedford representative Dennis Lawrence.

Cathy Carnes presented House member Ms. Goyette the ceremonial torch at the steps of the State House. To acknowledge acceptance of the torch, Ms. Goyette presented Cathy with a bouquet of roses. Another gesture of sincertiy involved the presentation of a petition comprised of 15,080 names. When unrolled, it nearly reached the middle of Boston Common from its starting point across the street from the State House.

The mass effort involved in the SAVE SMU campaign was a great success. The collaboration of students, faculty and staff demonstrated the intimacy within the ranks at SMU. Fortunately it was a successful experience that also served as an authentic learning experience.


