Changes





Fall of 2002 began with a rush to get students housed in Pine Dale and Oak Glen. The modern style of the buildings brought a new look to the residential side of the campus and were the first dormitory style housing facilities built by UMass Dartmouth since Elmwood Hall and Maple Ridge Hall were constructed in 1976. The two new buildings held a total of 804 residents, 28 resident assistants, and 2 resident directors. At the start of the academic year, not all the furniture was in, the laundry facilities were not complete, and there were still final touches to be made throughout the building. Even though these first residents of the new dorms faced a number of inconveniences at the start of the school year, it became the pride of the resident communities once the bugs were ironed out. While the students of Pine Dale and Oak Glen adapted to their new buildings, the rest of the resident students worked to adopt the new naming system for the buildings.

One of the main events that the Star Store is involved with is *AHAI* night, which occurs each month. It involves local galleries and museums staying open into the late evening and being free of charge to the public. During AHAI, the Star Store is open to all who wish to view the artwork in numerous gallery spaces throughout the building, as well as visit studios of the artists to see works in progress. After overcoming these difficulties these students finally settled into their temporary homes. Housing selections for the new apartments took place in November. During winter break students were given the option to move their belongings back home or they were provided storage on campus until they could move to their brand new apartments in January.

For any commuter student at UMass Dartmouth, the lounges around campus have been places to relax after class, do some last minute studying before an exam, eat lunch, and socialize with fellow classmates. During the summer of 2004, many of us began to notice that the commuter lounges in Group I had begun to undergo some changes. The worn, blue carpets and upholstery were finally removed and later replaced with more modern oranges and tans. New chairs as well as large, square, padded tables were brought in. The commuter areas not only boasted a more modern look, but also had a trendy appeal.

In conjunction with the construction in the lounges, SodexHo began replacing the food carts that are dispersed throughout the academic buildings on campus. This process commenced in Group VI and continued in Groups I and II. Along with a new look, the dining carts also sported a more extensive menu. In the past, only small snacks, soda, and coffee were sold to long, messy lines of students. Now, however, the carts are much more organized and sell soups, sandwiches, muffins, fruit, yogurt, as well as coffee, soda, and water. Students also have the opportunity to use their resident dining plan to purchase a breakfast or lunch on the go.

Overall, reactions from commuters to these improvements have been positive. After all, don't we deserve a comfortable place in which to do our work while eating a convenient meal?









With the addition of the new apartments, there has been an increase in the amount of construction traffic, as well as in the number of student cars on campus. This has all resulted in less room for parking. In response to this issue, UMD has extended two parking lots so that they can accommodate almost twice their original capacity. Parking decals continue to become more specific (e.g. Cedar Dell, Resident, Commuter, or Satellite Student) in order to alleviate the space problems currently being faced by the UMass Dartmouth community.

Other improvements meant to increase safety on campus have also occurred. Crosswalks all over Ring Road were repainted and blinking yellow lights were installed on the main walkway between the dorms and Centennial Way. Essentially, when a student approaches this crosswalk, a sensor activates flashing strobes as well as a crosswalk sign. Both help to alert drivers that someone is about to be crossing the Ring. As a result, driver awareness of pedestrians has increased greatly at night.

Furthermore, many of us may havenoticed a greater presence of UMD law enforcement members around campus. Guards are often in the shack located at the entrance to the university, checking parking decals and monitoring the number of visitors. Cops can also be found driving around the Dell and the residence halls in an effort to make all areas of the campus safe. It is possible that many of these initiatives are being taken to reduce the number of thefts that have occurred in the recent past.

P.S. Remember the Red Sox riots? There were choppers, SWAT teams, and parking lots full of cruisers to keep the chaos to a minimum.

I was at the Star Store." Everyone has a different story for that day. We will always know exactly where we were and when we found out. While looking through old articles about the tragedy, all the memories came rushing back and I was overwhelmed with emotion. We will never forget what happened that day and we will keep all those who lost their lives in our hearts and minds.









It was not too long ago that students waited at the back of the school store to pick up their Umass Passes, did their banking at the ground level of the Campus Center, and spent free time in the arcade/pool room.

In the past couple of years the ground level of the Campus Center has been

revitalized. Carpet was pulled up, new flooring was put down and paint was applied to enhance the overall appearance. Umass Pass was moved from the back of the school store to where the bank used to be, and waiting in line is much less of a hassle. The arcade/pool room was changed to the UMD Lounge and Pub. A closed area is now the home of the Underground Café, popular due to its smoothies, coffee, and snacks. Along with all of these changes, the Campus Store has been remodeled to be more accommodating and visually appealing.



Located in New Bedford on Hathaway Road, the Days Inn and UMass Dartmouth made arrangements for students to live in the hotel while construction on the new dorms began. Despite the best efforts from both the Days Inn and the Office of Housing and Residential Life, living in the hotel proved to be a different experience than in the dorms. Students experienced many difficulties during their stay: Internet connections would constantly shut down, getting a meal plan was a project in itself and even the size of the rooms proved to be a problem. Residents found themselves in rooms of varying sizes; the smallest of these being 144 square feet in area that translates into 72 square feet per person. There simply just wasn't enough room for the average student. The plan wasn't to keep students at the Days Inn for too long, but those plans were altered due to many changes including the initial contractors pulling out of the new dorm construction. The Fall '04 semester was challenging for most Days Inn residents as they found themselves rushing to the "Dart Van" to shuttle them to class. A sense of isolation from the UMD community fell on most Days Inn residents, making them wonder if they would ever be residing at the new dorms anytime soon. Fortunately, the new dorms were completed for the Spring '05 semester and the Days Inn residents were given the first opportunity to move in. Needless to say, students were thrilled to be back on-campus, giving them the sense that they were now part of the UMD community again. With the new dorms being of such high quality, many students who resided in the Days Inn believe that the wait was worth it.


screens, a computer with an internal and wireless keyboard, a VCR, a DVD player, wireless microphone, four remotes, and a sound system.


