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INTRODUCTION

On the 145 rolls of this microfilm publication are reproduced 429 bound volumes of records relating to Confederate prisoners of war confined by Federal authorities for the period 1861-65, with two of the volumes extending to 1866. The volumes, which consist mainly of registers and lists, are part of the War Department Collection of Confederate Records, Record Group 109.

Many of the volumes comprising this microfilm publication originally were part of the records of the Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners, but a small number were created by the Surgeon General's Office and individual Army commands. Some of the records were compiled in the Commissary General's Office from rolls, returns, and reports submitted by military prisons and stations, but mainly they were created at individual prisons or stations and later turned over to the Commissary General's Office. A few volumes were possibly compiled by the Prisoner of War Division of the Adjutant General's Office.

The Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners, established as an independent agency of the War Department on July 17, 1862, took over the functions previously carried on by an officer under the authority of the Quartermaster General from October 7, 1861, until that date. The Commissary General was responsible for the supervision of Confederate prisoners of war and political prisoners confined in Union prisons, for correspondence and other business relating to Federal prisoners of war confined in the South, for the maintenance of camps for paroled Federal prisoners of war and supervision of the parolees, and for some matters relating to the exchange of Confederate and Federal prisoners of war. Later the Office was assigned duties in connection with the settlement of claims of all prisoners of war. In August 1867 the Office was abolished and its remaining duties and records were transferred to the newly created Prisoner of War Division of the Adjutant General's Office. The Division furnished data concerning prisoners of war to other Government offices, made reports and compilations, answered private inquiries, and investigated cases of former prisoners for correction of records. It was concerned primarily with the military service of former Federal prisoners of war, which necessitated the transfer to that office of records of Federal prisoners in Southern prisons from the Confederate records collected by the War Department and deposited in the Archive Office of the War Department.

The Confederate prisoner records were retained as holdings of the Prisoner of War Division, but were segregated from other records of the Division and bound volumes were numbered in a continuous series. The records remained in the Prisoner of War Division when the office, as part of the Volunteer Enlisted Pension Branch, was transferred to the Record and Pension Division of the War Department in July 1889.

CONFEDERATE PRISONER VOLUMES

They were added to the War Department Collection of Confederate records as a result of their use in the project for compiling military service records of Confederate soldiers.

The compilation of service records of Confederate soldiers was begun in 1903 under the direction of Brig. Gen. Fred C. Ainsworth, head of the Record and Pension Office. Abstracts of records relating to individual soldiers were made on record cards from documents in the custody of the War Department or borrowed by the War Department. The War Department documents from which the information was abstracted were stamped with the word "carded." Many of the Confederate prisoner volumes bear this stamp, and others bear the stamp "not carded." The second stamp indicates the volumes that were considered, but for one reason or another no information was abstracted.

Pages of some volumes were considered but not necessarily selected for publication in The War of the Rebellion, A Compilation of the Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies (Washington, 1880-1901), a publication that has also been reproduced on microfilm by the National Archives (Microcopy 262). The pages so considered bear the distinguishing circular stamp "COPIED, WAR RECORDS, 1861-65." Volumes stamped "Received by the AGO . . . D.C. [discontinued commands]" are later additions to the collection of Confederate prisoner records that were segregated from records of individual Army commands.

In the volumes there is vast duplication of names of prisoners and information relating to them. Many discrepancies occur in the spelling of names, information regarding military organizations, dates of capture, and other data. There are various notes relating to compilation activities attached to many of the volumes; some of them have notations concerning duplication and errors. The volumes have no standard overall arrangement. Some volumes have page or folio numbers, but many have unnumbered pages. A few have name indexes. In the alphabetically arranged volumes there are no names entered under the letter "X"; the letters "I" and "J," and "U" and "V" are sometimes combined; "Mc" is generally combined with "M"; and some letters are missing.

Appearing on the volumes are various numbers indicating several prior numbering schemes. Over the years some numbers have disappeared from volumes. Other volumes may have more than one number, and some volumes have been erroneously renumbered. In general, the significance of the numbers is obscure. For these reasons and also to prevent confusion in the citation of volume numbers, the volumes have been renumbered by the National Archives in a continuous series from 1 to 427. This numeration has been stamped inside the front cover of each volume or on the first available page.

Old volume numbers, where found, have been included in the list following these introductory remarks. Some old numbers, marked with an asterisk in the list, are no longer on the volumes but were taken from an index to Confederate prisoner-of-war volumes deposited with

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the War Department Collection of Confederate Records in the National Archives. The list also cites fragmentary and other material contained in a specific volume. Dates of some of this material often pre- or post-date those of records in the main part of the volume. Such dates are given in the list but are not included in the dates on the title page of a roll because they would tend to indicate a wider date coverage for the records in the main part of the volume.

Not all records relating to Confederate prisoners of war are reproduced in this microfilm publication. Also in Record Group 109 is a large series of unbound records relating to Confederate prisoners. Many of the bound and unbound records were carded and are included in the compiled service records, which are also a part of the same record group and which have been reproduced in other microfilm publications. Related records are in Record Group 249, Records of the Commissary General of Prisoners; in Record Group 98, Records of United States Army Commands; and in Record Group 94, Records of The Adjutant General's Office.

The various series of bound volumes reproduced in this microfilm publication have been arranged in two main sections: records relating to Confederate prisoners of war and to political prisoners without regard to specific prison or place of confinement, and records of individual military prisons or stations. Those under the second heading have been further arranged by the name of the particular prison or station to which the records pertain. A third section contains a few records of several prisons.

#### RECORDS RELATING TO ALL PRISONERS

In compliance with the Revised Army Regulations of 1863, the Commissary General of Prisoners maintained in bound volumes a record of all Confederate prisoners of war and political prisoners giving name, rank, regiment and company, or residence of each prisoner, showing the date and place of capture or arrest, and often disposition. He also kept sets of compiled registers for recording the deaths of prisoners, registers of applications made for releases, and registers of prisoners released. These registers and a few miscellaneous volumes from that office comprise the bulk of the volumes relating to prisoners without regard to individual prison or station. The remaining volumes in the section are the registers of deceased Confederate prisoners compiled by the Surgeon General's Office from returns and monthly reports submitted by medical officers at prisons, hospitals, and other places of confinement.

The Commissary General's registers are generally arranged alphabetically by initial letter of surname of prisoner, but a few miscellaneous volumes are arranged chronologically. Each of the Commissary General's registers of prisoners confined cover the same time period, while the registers of applications continue in chronological order from volume to volume. File-marks entered in the registers refer to letters received by the Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners.

Generally they are citations to letters transmitting the rolls or reports from which the registers were compiled or to letters of application for release of prisoners, depending on the type of register in which they appear. The Surgeon General's registers of deaths, reproduced on Rolls 10-12, are arranged by State and thereunder alphabetically by initial letter of surname of prisoner except for the first volume, which is arranged alphabetically by initial letter of surname of prisoner without regard to State.

#### RECORDS OF INDIVIDUAL PRISONS OR STATIONS

The volumes reproduced under this section are arranged alphabetically by name of military prison or other place of confinement. For each prison or station there are generally three main types of records: registers compiled by the Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners, general registers, and auxiliary registers. Registers for a particular prison seldom give a complete listing of all prisoners who were confined. For some prisons there are no Commissary General registers, and for others there are no general registers. For some places of confinement other than military prisons neither type of register has been found.

The registers compiled by the Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners were numbered for each prison and contain entries that had been copied from rolls, returns, and reports submitted by individual prison authorities. At one time the bound volumes of general and auxiliary registers created by each prison or station were also arranged in a numbered series. Over the years the identifying numbers have disappeared from many of the volumes, but other records in the custody of the National Archives indicate that most of the records for prisons and stations reproduced in this microfilm publication were once part of these numbered series. Both sets of registers, while deposited in the Prisoner of War Division of the Adjutant General's Office, were numbered in one consecutive series. A few additions were made to the series by records received from individual discontinued Army commands.

The general registers are the basic prison registers showing arrivals, confinements, and usually dispositions of prisoners. The auxiliary registers consist of registers of prisoners confined, registers of deaths, lists of prisoners, ledgers, correspondence, morning reports, and various other records.

In many of the Commissary General registers the entries are arranged alphabetically. The arrangement of entries in both general and auxiliary registers is usually alphabetical by initial letter of surname of prisoner or chronological. There are name indexes in most of the ledgers and letterbooks and in a few of the other volumes. Many volumes contain lists of contents that refer to letters of the alphabet and to page numbers. Some of the registers continue from volume to volume, while others are complete within a volume. In some registers the entries for names of prisoners are numbered either within each



letter of the alphabet or consecutively for the entire volume. In a few registers the numbers continue under each letter of the alphabet from one volume to another. Some registers have two separate lists under each letter of the alphabet, one for officers and another for other prisoners. Many registers and other volumes include records of civilian and Federal prisoners with those of Confederate prisoners, and a few volumes contain only names of Federal prisoners. There are several volumes that contain information relating only to paroled prisoners.

LIST OF ROLLS, VOLUMES, AND SUBJECTS

The asterisk after an original volume number indicates that the number no longer appears on the volume. The number has been obtained for this list from an index volume that is in the War Department Collection of Confederate Records in the National Archives.

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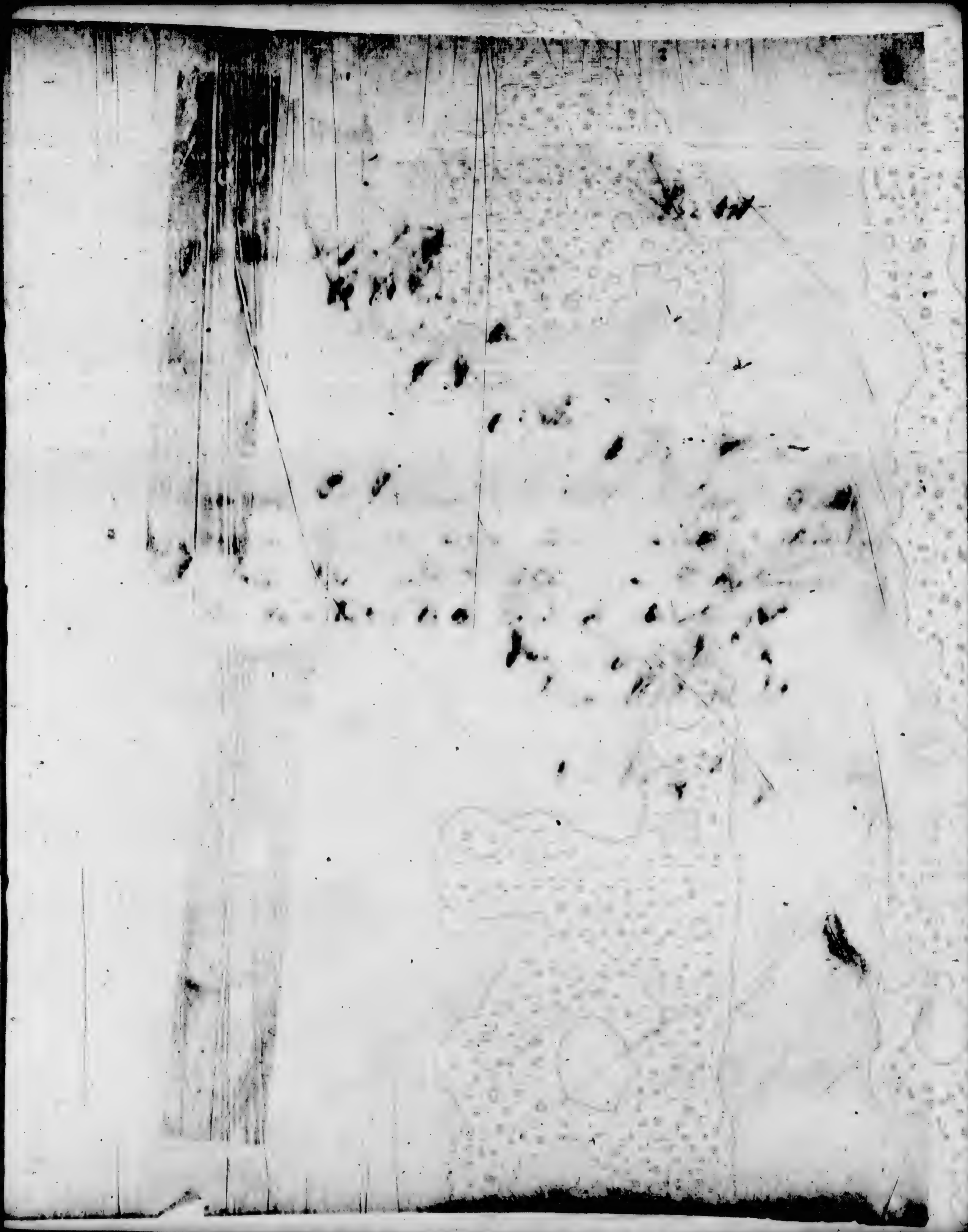

I beg leave to submit the following report of Clothing received at this Office from S. J. Korman, the Author of the enclosed bill, from information derived from J. H. Korman, the prisoner alluded to by the bill, as shown by the records of this Office.

On the 30<sup>th</sup> of Oct 1863. I assumed com<sup>d</sup> of this Camp, a period of at least two weeks subsequent to the date on which the prisoner received notice that he would be permitted to receive clothing from S. J. Korman. This permission was given him, as he states, by Genl. E. F. Robinson, then Com<sup>d</sup> of the Camp at Fort Mifflin, Pa. at that time, and in compliance therewith instructed, in accordance with par. 11. of Gen. Orders, No 100 for a Capt. H. J. Korman man which clothing was then being issued to him; the instructions then desired, the prisoner states, he communicated to S. J. Korman, prior to my leaving the command.

 money arriving at this office directed to prisoners of war  
 as being their property, and to be accounted for as such,  
 unless the articles cannot be passed and placed to their  
 credit and retained. In cases where prisoners are  
 released, all money or property obtained in this office  
 belonging to them, is returned. In cases where prisoners  
 are very destitute and have articles of clothing of a  
 character which cannot be passed, they have not  
 infrequently been permitted to loan their friends  
 and exchange such articles for clothing that can be  
 admitted.

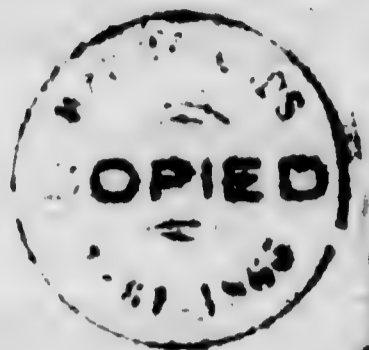

fence in the same manner [Name] in con-  
flict with the instructions, he ordered [Name] to fire.

return to his quarters; That the prisoner, on receiving the order, stopped, and made answer, but did not return to his quarters.

The order being repeated, and the prisoner still refusing obedience, the Guard states that he fired on him, and immediately called the number of his post, following, strictly, the instructions he had received.

(Post No. 21, contiguous, states that the order was given, distinctly, each time, and that the prisoner must have heard and understood it.

As several attempts have been made by prisoners to escape at that point, during the present month, it is probable that the deceased approached the fence with a similar intention.

The deceased himself, a short time before his death, stated that he left his quarters to go to the sinks, . . . As there are no sinks in the quarters to which he was going, he must have had other instructions.

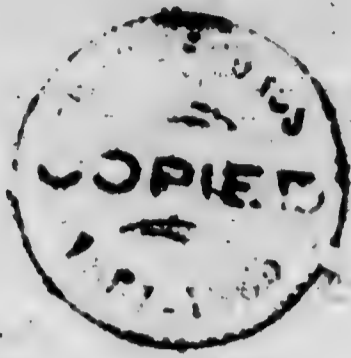

In compliance with your instructions, of the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. I have the honor to submit the following report, of the escape of eighteen (18) prisoners of war, from this camp, as alluded to, in my report of February, 29<sup>th</sup> 1864.

From information received from prisoners, since the occurrence, I am satisfied, that two (2) of the number, escaped, by scaling the fence, about the 3<sup>rd</sup> of that month; the tunnel, reported, not having been completed, until the night of the 10<sup>th</sup>. The thirteen (13) remaining prisoners, escaped, first of them, early on the night of the 10<sup>th</sup> and the remainder, about daybreak, on the morning of the 11<sup>th</sup> - two of whom were recaptured.

The tunnel had been opened beneath the wall, in the east end of Barrack "C" and had escaped observation, by the inspecting officer, the

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prisoners, leaving unwatched it, by replacing and nailing  
down the boards immediately over it - each day.

The outlet of the tunnel, was under  
the guard walk, and concealed from the sentries by it.

The prison barracks, are carefully  
inspected each day, by an officer, especially charged  
with that duty: and, as an additional precaution,  
a patrol is constantly on duty, during the night, to  
see that the prisoners retire to their quarters, at the  
proper time, and that nothing of an unusual  
character occurs.

The tunnel in question, was about  
eleven (11) feet in length, and, from information since  
received, was several weeks in construction; the dirt  
from it, being carefully conveyed, in buckets, mixed with  
ashes, from the stoves, and the sweepings from the floors  
of these quarters - while holding each morning.

I would respectfully state, that, since the  
above occurrence, four (4) similar attempts at tunnelling,  
have been made, in different localities of the prison, each  
of which was unsuccessful.

an unfortunate one, which I deeply regret.  
I immediately placed the guard, Wm. Allen, who shot the  
prisoners, under arrest, and have ordered charges made  
out against him - for murder. The prisoner, Allen, claims  
that the men were trying to escape, but the result of the  
investigation does not corroborate his statements. As to  
the Guard being under the influence of liquor, I am not  
satisfied upon that point, but I have been informed,  
since the occurrence, that during the few weeks he has  
been in my command, he has repeatedly threatened to  
"shoot some rebel," stating that they had shot two fingers

off for him to while he was in the field.

My rules and orders, in regard to shooting, are positive and well understood; and I have great reason to believe that the shooting in question was a malicious and premeditated act on the part of the Guard.

I have the honor to report, that I have in pursuance of your Order, carefully inspected, the Quarters, Kitchens, Storehouses, Bedding, and general Condition, of the Prisoners, of this Camp, daily, during the week ending August 27<sup>th</sup> 1864. and find them as follows viz:

The Quarters occupied by the prisoners, are and have been kept, in as good condition, as quarters built, as they can be kept, but it is impossible, to keep them in a perfect state of cleanliness, for the reason that they are built low, and on the ground, making a ground floor, which by being constantly in use, as they are, by the filthiest set of wretches the world, becomes perfectly saturated with filth, and other nuisances, that is constantly being committed, and is damp all the time, especially, in wet weather, and there being no independent ventilation, these

is an offensive odor constantly arising, from the floor which must constantly, from constantly inhaling it, cause more or less sickness, and to remedy this the buildings should be raised, at least two feet, from the ground, and good substantial floors, be put in them, they can then be thoroughly cleaned by washing the floor every day if necessary, and the ventilation from beneath, will be perfected and drive all foul air from the building, and another benefit derived, will be the preventing, of the prisoners escaping, by tunnelling which they are continually trying to do.

The Kitchens are in good condition, and are kept clean, the Prisoners get their rations cooked, in good order from the Kitchens, in masses of from ten, to twenty, men each.

The grounds have been undergoing, a thorough jobbing, each day, ditches are being dug out, and deepened, making the drainage, as perfect as the locality of the Camp, will permit, the enlargement of the grounds, is progressing as rapidly as possible, and will soon be completed.

The works that have just been adopted, have

out here in one long enough, to determine, those seen  
 but in my opinion, they will not be as efficient as the  
 large sick, which has been in use, for the last two  
 months, by all the men in camp, except those in  
 the Hospital, and the Camp is now cleared of mud  
 and dung, than it has ever been, and the sanitary  
 condition of the whole Camp is being improved  
 gradually.

The bedding and general condition of the  
 Prisoners will require to make them comfortable, for  
 the coming winter, as follows, viz:

- (830) five hundred, and thirty, woolen Blankets.
- (835) eight hundred and thirty five pairs of Trowsers
- (850) twelve hundred and fifty pairs of Shoes
- (850) eight hundred and fifty Shirts
- (350) three hundred and fifty, coats.

The majority of the Prisoners, confined in this Camp,  
 being of the poorer class, of the inhabitants of the  
 Company, and cannot obtain, the means, for  
 supplying themselves, with the necessary clothing,  
 and bedding, to keep them from suffering.

The natives that are being furnished, daily,  
 to the Prisoners, in this Camp, by the commissary  
 of subsistence, at this post, are in compliance to

the circular, issued by the Com. Genl of Prussia  
June 14 1864. The nature of soap, I have found is  
not more than is required, owing to the water that  
has to be used for washing being of such a nature,  
as to require a large quantity to enable them, to keep  
themselves and their clothing clean.

The Hospitals under Charge of Surgeon Charles  
J. Rippe U.S.A. are kept in as good condition as they  
can be, but unless more buildings are built for hospital  
purposes soon, new tents, will have to be drawn, to  
replace the old ones, that are now in use, for I  
find they will soon be unfit, for that purpose  
as many of them will not bear the rain at  
present.

I have the honor to report that I have each day during the week ending September 2<sup>d</sup> 1864. Inspected the general condition of this Camp and Prisoners therein confined. The sanitary condition of the Camp is being improved by being thoroughly policed each day and is in as good condition as the advantages of the Camp will permit.

The Kitchens and Barracks are kept clean by sweeping which is the only method that can be used for cleaning them for the very reason that they have nothing but ground floors which is useless to wash.

Every effort is being made that can be to prevent nuisance from being committed in and around the Barracks, but it is a very difficult matter there being so many to watch and every one apparently trying to make all the dirt and nuisance that



they can.

The sinks that have lately been adopted will be a great benefit to the sanitary condition of the camp if kept thoroughly cleansed each day by hauling the boxes containing the nuisance out of camp and washing them, which is being done every day at present.

The rations issued during the week by the Commissary of Subsistence at this Post to the Prisoners have been in compliance to the Circular issued by the Commissary General of Prisoners dated June 1<sup>st</sup> 1864. And Antiscorbutics such as potatoes and Onions have been issued three times during the week, as follows potatoes twice, to each man (8) eight ounces each time. Onions once, to each man (6) six ounces.

August 28<sup>th</sup> 1864. referring to the report of Lt  
Wagner. Asst at Camp Morton. giving notice of  
a conspiracy among the Prisoners to rise on  
the Guard Co. by one, referred to as General Cunningham.  
Command. Det. Indiana. and from thence forwarded  
to your office.

The circumstances in regard to the  
Report are as follows - On the morning of the  
24<sup>th</sup> of August the date of that Report. Lieut  
Wagner informed me, that he thought that he  
had obtained a clue to a large conspiracy.  
Among the Prisoners in Camp. the object of which  
was to rise on the Guard, and break out.  
I had then my horse at the door &

As down to Head Quarters of the District to  
obtain an extra detail of 60 men from  
the 10th Mass. Vols. then at Camp Clarington.

I then immediately asked Lieut Wagner  
to take a Pencil and give me a memorandum on  
a piece of paper, that I might mention the  
circumstance to General Clarington.

My attention was then called to some matters  
about the Camp, and in a few moments I again  
enquired of Lt Wagner if he had the memorandum  
ready, when he handed me the report in question, which  
I placed in my pocket and started for Head  
Quarters.

After consulting Genl Clarington in regard  
to the details, I then called his attention to the  
report I had just received of a conspiracy in  
Camp, and referred him to the memorandum or  
report of Lt Wagner. Mr. Genl (C.) said that  
it coincided with other information, which he has  
in his possession, and at once asked me to  
make an endorsement upon the paper referring it  
to him, which I did in his Office. Not Suspecting

813

not suppressing the paper. was to go beyond  
his Office.

In regard to the existence of such  
Conspiracy or organization, I have not the  
slightest doubt. but as to the exact number  
of prisoners belonging to the organization, I have  
I have no means of knowing. The first intimation  
I had of anything of this kind, was last winter  
when I was repeatedly informed that such was  
the case, and from indications among the Prisoners  
I had no reason to doubt it.

Whenever there has been intimations of this kind,  
we have doubled the Patrols of the Prison, inside  
and out, with increased vigilance, on the part  
of the Guards, on the wall, has always effectually  
prevented any occurrence of this kind.

At the time Five Hundred (500) Prisoners, were  
ordered to be transferred from this Camp to Fort  
Bellevue, I took the occasion to select some of  
most influential, of those whom I considered the  
ring leaders and put them on the list to be  
forwarded - which resulted, in partially breaking

up of the Organization, for a while. Since which  
time however, a similar organization has sprung  
up, and I have reason to believe also, several  
Cliques exist in Camp. - but none of them have  
I deemed of so formidable a Character, as to be  
necessary to refer the matter to your Office, feeling  
every Confidence in the Officers and Soldiers, of  
my command. I have to trouble you, with as  
little as possible, with matters of that kind, for  
fear, they might prove to be too much of a  
"Sensation Matter" about them.

I deeply regret that this paper, (intended  
only as a memorandum for myself) should have been  
forwarded under such circumstances. And I am  
not at all surprised, at your astonishment, in  
my entrusting a matter of so great importance  
to my Adjutant, alone to investigate, and in then  
referring the reports without comment, of my own.  
I deemed it my duty, to inform General  
Carrington, of all attempts of that kind, and  
especially at this time, as there was much political  
excitement in different parts of the State, and

Various reports in circulation of organized  
 and armed parties in the State, whose intention  
 it was to liberate the Prisoners &c at the Camp  
 and accordingly the same being extra precautions  
 in the establishment of Patrole & Pickets outside  
 as well as inside. And a finally required ad-  
 ditional force to relieve my forces at this  
 time owing to the extra amount of details,  
 which were being made from my command.

I will also state that as an additional  
 precaution, that I have obtained from the 13th  
 Mountain Division, with a supply of Conical  
 & Spherical Ammunition, which can be placed  
 at each angle of the Camp, at a very short  
 notice. I will also enclose a subsequent dis-  
 patch in writing from Lt Wagner, giving his reasons  
 more fully, for believing, an outbreak, was about  
 to be made at that time.

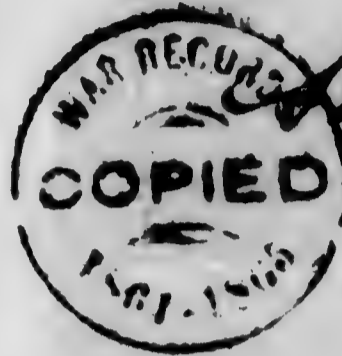

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your telegram, calling my attention to your instructions of the 15<sup>th</sup> & 16<sup>th</sup> of Aug. and to give the information called for immediately.

Your instructions of the 18<sup>th</sup> directed me to appoint a reliable officer, Inspector of the Camp, who was required in addition, to his other duties, to make a weekly report in writing, of the condition of the Camp &c. It he forwarded with my remarks I might make in addition thereto, and in accordance with these instructions I appointed Lt. J. M. Davidson, immediately, who has performed his duties in a most thorough manner, making his reports regularly, which are duly forwarded to your Office.

In your instructions of the 16<sup>th</sup> I was directed to immediately take measures to improve the Sanitary

200

Condition of the Camp, as recommended by Surgeon  
Alexander, Medical Inspector, which I believe  
have been fully adopted and carried out with  
the exception of building a new Hospital, and for  
which I am still awaiting your decision.

The enlargement of the Camp, has been completed  
and the enclosure surrounded with a good substantial  
fence and Guard walk. The old shed barracks, which  
were embraced in the enclosure, have been overhauled  
repaired, white-washed, and will accommodate  
five hundred and eighty-five (585) men. The tents  
can now be removed into the new part: which will  
afford more room for the men, who occupy the  
Barracks to move about in, and will no doubt  
render the Camp much more healthy.

The Ratio of Deaths per 1000 sick, for the week ending  
August 6.<sup>th</sup> 1864, were 75.42 - and for the week ending  
Sept. 10.<sup>th</sup> 1864 . . . 23.50. Showing a very great  
decrease. The Camp is thoroughly policed daily, and  
strict discipline kept over the Prisoners, and also the  
Troops, guarding them. I will be able to report in a  
few days in regard to the Soap and Vinegar rations, as I need  
to make some further inquiries.

I have the honor to report that I have during the week ending September 11<sup>th</sup> 1864. inspected the Camp in every respect, and find the general condition, of both prisoners, and prisoners, is being improved, each day, in the way of cleanliness, as much as is possible, until the clothing required for their present use, can be received and furnished them.

And by building new barracks or rebuilding the old ones and raising them up from the ground and putting good substantial floors in them they can be kept thoroughly drained, and in a good healthy condition by washing them out each day, which is impossible to do at present. I would more particularly call your attention to the barracks on the north side of the Camp which is in need of considerable repairing,

The enlargement of the Camp is completed but will require considerable policing and ditching before being used. The barracks already finished in the new enclosure will accommodate in the manner in which it is fitted up at present (585) five hundred and eighty five without crowding. The number should be taken from the tents and the ballances of the should be struck and pitched on the fresh ground as soon as it is properly policed.

The rations issued during the week was strictly in compliance with orders, and potatoes were issued (6) six times during the week at the rate of (8) eight ounces to each man each time.

On the 1<sup>st</sup> of the present month I forwarded for your approval a special requisition signed by the Acting Assistant Quartermaster of the Camp, which exceeds the amount of my estimate, but judging that a supply should be kept constantly on hand and also from the present appearance of the prisoners that much of their clothing would necessarily have to be renewed I thought proper to forward the requisition as estimated by the Quartermaster.

In compliance with your requisition in letter of 16<sup>th</sup> Aug. and Telegram of Sept 13. 1864. I have the honor to submit the following report in relation to the Soap and Pinegar Rations issued to Prisoners of War confined at this Camp.

I have carefully examined the provision returns as made by my Adjutants and find the amount of rations called for to correspond with the Monthly Abstract of Issues of which a copy for each month has been forwarded to your Office, and also that the average No. of daily rations for the month of July 1864. was 4456, and the total No. of rations for the month amounted to 138155. Requiring 5225  $\frac{1}{2}$  lbs of Soap, and 1036 gals. of Pinegar. For the month of August 1864. the average No. of daily rations was 4473, and the total No. of rations 137393. Requiring 5295  $\frac{1}{2}$  lbs of Soap, and 1030  $\frac{1}{2}$  gals of Pinegar. I also find

that these amounts correspond with the invoices made by the Commissary of Subsistence at the Post of Indianapolis, and receipts for by Capt. Sharpleff a Captain & M.C.S. of Camp Mingo, for three months. In regard to the Prisoners, having actually received the full amount of the Soap, and Vinegar, ration, as specified upon said returns, and Abstract. I find it impossible to ascertain, that since Lieut Davidson, has been acting Inspector of the Camp, I am confident that the full complement has been issued, of Soap, and Vinegar, and all other articles in strict accordance with the Regulation.

In the investigation of this matter, I have not been able to find any discrepancy, upon the books, or papers, of the acting Commissary, of Subsistence, of the Camp - and in the future, I trust I shall be able to take such measures, as will prevent any attempt, to defraud the Prisoners, of their rations. It has been owing to the great scarcity of Officers, in my commands that I have not been able to select a suitable Officer, to superintend the issue of rations hereafter.

I have the honor to report that I have inspected this camp with reference to its sanitary condition each day during the week ending September 17<sup>th</sup> 1864. And find it is being greatly improved by thoroughly policing men barracks and grounds. The men are obliged to keep themselves clean, and for the purpose of so keeping them, I have them inspected every morning, and all that are found dirty are taken from the ranks and washed, by that means they are kept clean and healthy.

The barracks on the north side of the camp in the old enclosure have been repaired and are now very comfortable.

The new enclosure is being rapidly improved by ditching, and policing, the barracks that were fitted up have been filled with men

301  
from the tents. And the remaining tents occupied  
by prisoners have been struck from the old ground  
and pitched on the new which has been  
very beneficial to their general health and  
condition. but I would very respectfully call  
your attention to those prisoners occupying the  
the tents as the weather is getting cold and there  
is no means of warming the tents to keep  
them from suffering. Many of the prisoners  
being entirely destitute of blankets and almost  
destitute of clothing, and unless barracks are  
built for them to occupy they will undoubtedly  
suffer very much from the severe winter  
weather adapted to this country.

The rations issued during the week have  
been strictly in compliance with orders, and  
antiscorbutics: have been issued as follows: <sup>viz</sup>  
Potatoes six times and Onions once during  
the week.

The attack was the success by troops of the 48<sup>th</sup>  
Indiana Polo. and the 60<sup>th</sup> Mass. who are armed  
only with the M. R. & Bayonet. and had these  
troops been armed with the Repeater in addition  
the prisoners would have been able to have escaped.

In this case it will be seen that one prisoner  
was killed instantly, & one mortally wounded, who has  
since died. Three (3) escaped, two (2) of whom were  
instantly wounded - as could be seen by their blood  
when they got over the fence - enclosing a field outside  
of the prison, and opposite the point where they escaped.  
Patrols were instantly sent out, in all directions, but  
owing to the rain and extreme darkness, the prisoners made  
good their escape.

It may be proper to add that no escapes have  
been made within the last six months, at this Prison  
where the soldiers of the Belgian Reserve Corps, were confined  
or at least that owing to the excessive darkness, it has  
been necessary to make details from other troops in  
the vicinity and hence the result.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Inst. in which you refer to my monthly reports as not covering the Case No.

In regard to the clothing mentioned in your letter, to be issued to Prisoners I will state, that I commended the requisition to your office, for approval on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of September last and to day the clothing arrived at Camp, which was one month and seven days from the time of forwarding the requisition from this Office. But in the meanwhile we have issued the balance of clothing, we had on hand at that time, to the most destitute cases, and in that manner no very great inconvenience has been experienced.

According to the instructions contained in your

In your letter of the 14<sup>th</sup> September. I immediately commenced the construction of two wards of the New Hospital. but as much of the materials had to be collected together from different sources, it has been but a few days of the week. that the Carpenters could work, owing to the heavy and continued rain, but I think I shall be able to report them next week, as completed.

In regard to the improvements, in the old barracks, as estimated in my letter to you, of Aug 16<sup>th</sup> / 64. I will respectfully state, that I have never received any instructions, to make the repairs as specified in my estimate, and consequently I went on and repaired them, in a different manner from some old lumber, which I was able to collect about the Camp - as will be seen by reference to my letter of Sept. 12<sup>th</sup> / 64. The barracks upon to, are now as comfortable as other barracks in the Camp, but only with a 1/2 or there about width by adding another 1/2 them, and on the additional side, they would accommodate double the number of Russians that they now do - I will submit a plan and estimate of barracks, which will be required the coming winter as soon as it can be made -

The Hospital repairs will be pushed forward as rapidly, as possible, and when two (2) wards are completed, I will immediately report the cost as.

Accident in your letter of the 14th Sept-1864.

I would respectfully recommend several changes which I think could be made - by the removal of the barracks - which would be highly beneficial to the Camp. One of which I will mention in this letter. Which is the removal of the old barracks from the close proximity to the fence - turning them about - and forming streets between them. and also raising them up from the ground - and blowing. This would prevent the incessant attempts at tunnelling. and also be of the greatest importance as a Sanitary measure. as the barracks could then be thoroughly washed. and cleared. when ever necessary -

I trust that although my reports have not been sufficient - in their detail. that nothing has been neglected in the Camp. either in its police. or discipline. and that your Inspector. may have the satisfaction of noting a very great improvement. Since his last visit

F. Davidson, and F. J. Norman, 9th Iowa Cav. Co. 2d were detailed on the 24th inst to accompany pack in Wagon to and from Camp, for the purpose of hauling filth, and branches and when outside the Camp, about 200 yards distant, and concealed from view, in a hollow or ravine, the Prisoners suddenly dashed upon the guard, a Private of the 43rd Ind. who took his gun away from him by force, and fled for the woods, and made their escape. Pursuit was instantly made by the Prison Guard, but all efforts failed to

to Captain Chen. I have been unusually importunate with  
 the general detached from the 48<sup>th</sup> Regt. there being a great  
 lack of discipline among the men of that Regt and I will  
 state that the General commanding the district has seen  
 fit to relieve them from duty at the Camp, and has supplied  
 their places with the Co. M. and Co.

I will here mention that my orders are to send with one  
 Major and two (2) Prisoners, a guard of one Non-Commissioned  
 & one Private. but in this case by some mistake, the Non-  
 Commissioned <sup>Officer</sup> did not accompany the guard - but I trust

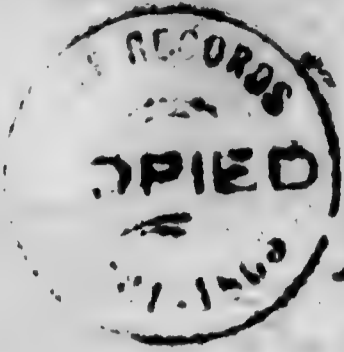

I have the honor to submit the following report of the escape on the night of November 14, 1864, of forty eight (48) prisoners of war from U. S. Military Prison, Camp Morton.

This escape was the result of a long existing plot. On the night of the late "reindeer" excursion, Nov 8, 1864, the prisoners of war who were confined here having perceived, by the change in their guards, that some of the troops on duty at this post, must have been detached, a party of about four hundred (400), ascertained the route of their escape, but by special vigilance on the part of the troops on duty at the prison and of the troops guarding the same, their plans were on that occasion entirely frustrated and no open attempt was then made. Their plans for escaping were not however entirely abandoned, but only deferred to what might occur to them a more convenient season.

At about six P. M. on the fourteenth inst, the evening being very dark and cloudy, a large number of prisoners emerging from several divisions at once, with a concert of action, ran at the fence on the north side of the prison Camp, opposite posts nos 21-22-23 and 24, which posts were being guarded by troops of the sixteenth

(60) *Mass. Col. Duff*. Scaling the fence, by means of ladders which had been hurriedly constructed from small pieces of boards, taken from the bottoms of their bundles, while another party assailed the sentries with stones and other missiles, severely injuring the guard at post No 23 the real point of attack and having overpowered the guards in that vicinity, forty eight effected their escape, to the woods, of the surrounding country.

The alarm was immediately given, several shots being fired, most of the prisoners driven back to their quarters, and in the troops stationed at Edenside Barracks turned out under arms, a proper disposition of them being made in and around the Prison Camp, and pursuit was instituted for the re-capture of those who had succeeded in getting over the fence.

Of these 17 have already been re-taken, leaving a balance of thirty one, but as pursuit is still kept up I am confident that others will be returned.

On the night of this month, six days previous to the escape, three companies of this command, Companies 'G', 'H', & 'I' Capt. A. B. were detached on duty to Chicago Ill on special duty, by order of the commanding Genl. and as they were not returned to duty here until after the night of the escape, I was obliged to increase the details of the sixteenth to Regt. Mass Col. One hundred and twenty five to make up a deficiency in the guard details, occasioned by the withdrawal of the troops above specified.

I must in a great measure attribute the partial success of the affair, to the withdrawal of the troops of the Veteran Reserve Corps, who had been long accustomed to this kind of duty, both in its having more and less force, as well as in its emboldening of our militia, and to the fact that their guards were, principally one hundred days troops whose term of service had already expired, and whom they had to be armed with the newest hot iron, and not the roughest and oldest, as the troops of my own regiment are, and that they were not accustomed to them, as to being shot, and that they had not been drilled in a long time, and so offered the escape. This information has been gathered from our prisoners and by prisoners since their recapture.

In a communication from Brig. Genl. St. Coffman, then Commissary General of Prisoners dated November 7, 1864. I respectfully concluded that for the second 23rd regiment of the 1st Div. of the 1st Army in the state be ordered to report here as a the 1st, to report the 1st division of Mass Volunteers whose term of service was then about to expire. On the reason that in my opinion better discipline could be maintained with troops all composed of the Veteran Reserve Corps than in a mixed command, in part of one hundred days men or other men, can be seen.

The number of guard posts in and around this camp is

seventy one and if there were enough troops at my disposal, I should increase this number at once to one hundred, including patrols and vedettes. But owing to the small command stationed here (consisting at present of but nine hundred & eighty nine men for duty) I have been unable to increase the number of posts to what I deem necessary.

In this connection I beg leave to call your attention to the fact that the Sixtieth (60) Regt Mass Vols has been replaced a portion of the Forty third (43) Regiment Ind. Vols, numbering but four hundred and fifty seven (57) enlisted men, present for duty and considered as being duty so that these troops are, principally new recruits and drafted men who are very imperfectly instructed in their duties and in my opinion, are not suitable troops for this kind of service.

Having been apprised of the fact that some organizations exist among the prisoners in a view to another escape, those who are considered to be the leaders in the matter, have been placed in close confinement, and I have in addition to the usual guard and picket system, increased many videttes beyond the limits of the camp as the small force at my disposal is unable to do so.

All of which I have the honor to acknowledge for the information of the Commanding General of Prisoners.

I have the honor to transmit  
in inc. a plan of Camp Morton, showing the position  
of Barracks &c as at present arranged, and also, an  
accommodation plan for a re-arrangement of Barracks  
to a more central position in the Camp, thus affording  
a better accommodation to Prisoners of War, Confined,  
and less facilities for escape.

I would respectfully recommend the con-  
struction of eight Divisions, consisting of Four (4) Barracks  
Each. Which will as arranged by this plan, ac-  
commodate with the usual percentage of Sick, and  
Convalescents, in Hospital, about 10000 Prisoners.

The Barracks, to be 10 ft high, 30 ft wide,  
and 120 ft long. Much of the material of the old  
Barracks now in use (and nearly worthless) can be  
used in the construction of the new.

It is respectfully suggested, that the barracks

Now in use, are not sufficient either in capacity, or  
in extent. Being originally, Batta Stalls, and Sheds,  
erected temporarily for State Fair purposes.

In thus increasing the capacity of the pens  
no more grounds would be necessary, than is now  
required to perform the duty of feeding 8700 Phe-  
asants at the present time.

The area of the grounds enclosed, is  
thirty-one (31) acres, which affords ample room  
for the accommodation of 10,000 Pheasants, with  
ease. The cost of material, for a barrack, 12ft  
high, 35ft wide, and 135ft long, is about \$1000.00. The  
labor can be performed by Pheasants.

The amount of the Pheasant Fund, at this time  
is about \$10,000 Dollars, which has accumulated  
at this Camp, during the past year, above all  
necessary expenditures.

The number of men detailed for duty each day  
at this Camp is 365. And should in my opinion be  
increased, to three thousand, including Batta, but  
owing to the small number of troops in my command  
(450) men, I have been unable to do so.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a communication from the Office of the Commissary General of Purvis, dated Nov. 21<sup>st</sup> 1864, relative to the erection of Hospital Buildings, at this Camp, and also to report without delay, the cost of constructing the wards, in the manner recommended by Surgeon Kipp.

In reply I would respectfully state, that the cost of the two (2) wards, constructed, and reported in letter, of the 21<sup>st</sup> Oct. was nine hundred and fifteen dollars, and forty six cents each (\$915.46) and with the addition of plastering, the side walls, of the building, would increase the cost of the wards about fifty dollars (\$50.-) each, as recommended by Surgeon Kipp.

From the knowledge I have of the

Clinical, and particularly during the winter months.  
I can fully endorse the suggestions, of Surgeon Kipp,  
as a matter of economy, in the saving of fuel,  
alone. Besides, the great importance, as a sanitary  
measure, as regards the health, and economy, of the

I have the honor to inform you that from information received from Prisoners confined in this Camp, another conspiracy is on foot to attempt an escape, upon a large scale within a few days, and I deem it my duty to inform the General Commanding of this fact and to ask that if possible, two (2) Companies of the 2<sup>d</sup> Reg. U.S.C. be ordered to this Post for duty at the earliest moment.

Owing to the very inefficient state of the 43<sup>d</sup> Reg. And. the large number absent from the Regt. without leave, the limited knowledge of duty manifested in both Officers and men, I deem it highly important to make this immediate request as in fact I have no real dependence to place upon the troops of that Reg. in case of an attempted outbreak. Ad. I am Sir

Situation. I am compelled to place the men of  
the 8<sup>th</sup> Reg V.R.C. upon every important duty  
possible, and owing to the present disorganized  
condition of the Prisoners, the details upon that  
Regt. have been too heavy, to be withdrawn, without  
endangering the health of the men.

I have the honor to enclose herewith Plan marked 'C' made in compliance with your request of the 1st Inst.

The buildings marked 'A' are for mess, Cook and Commissary houses. It is intended to mess the men of one Division at one of these mess houses. The building to be 95 ft x 20 ft. long x 12 ft. high.

The barracks marked 'B' are to be 100 ft long by 25 ft wide 10 ft high, intended to accommodate 240 men each, and with four barracks to each Division, and eight Divisions will in total accommodate 9600 men. The mess and commissary houses (7680) - to this add 320 as the usual proportion of patients, and convalescents to be accommodated in Hospital, making a total of eight thousand men. (8000)

Baracks marked 'D' is proposed for

and houses of Caracota. Capable of holding in  
close confinement one thousand prisoners, it  
being very necessary at times to separate the  
Cherokees and King Indians, in order to maintain  
the balance of the Prisoners.

The Barracks marked 9<sup>th</sup> are proposed  
at the General Hospital Building.

In view of the present prosperous condition,  
and the the important improvements which have been  
made during the past year, in the fortification  
and enlargement of the Camp, and with an ac-

The attention of the Officer of the Day, at this Post, is again called to the apparent neglect of Officers in Charge of Guards, and the great want of discipline manifested by Troops while on duty.

It is expected that the Officer of the Day, will exercise the strictest vigilance and enforce the strictest discipline among the Officers and Men of his Command.

He will instruct the General Officer of the Guard, both Commissioned, and Non-Commissioned, in their several duties, and cause them to hold their rifles, at all times, in readiness to "fall in" at a moment's warning. No straggling when off duty, will be tolerated, but the guard must be sound to remain at hand quarters ready for any emergency. For any violation of this order the Officers, on duty at the time will be held responsible.



It is very important that frequent rounds be made upon the daily walk, and pains taken to instruct the sentries in their duty. This duty should be performed, by, at least, one Commissioned Officer, each shift, during the day, and night. And in addition to this precaution, a Non-Comid. Officer, should be selected, to make the rounds, and keep them to observe, that the Sentries on duty are awake, and prompt in the discharge, of their duties. This duty is important, and it is expected that hereafter it will be strictly adhered to. And that the Officer of the day, will see that these instructions together ~~to~~ with the Rules, and Regulations, heretofore adopted, are fully carried out. during his term of duty, and duly communicated to his successor, when relieved.

From the recent attempts, on the part of the Prisoners to escape, and from information obtained, it is highly necessary, that the above precautions, in addition to the usual patrol & videttes, be strictly observed, and the fullest precautions, be taken to

To prevent the escape of Prisoners.

The attention of the Officer of the Camp is  
 also called to the fact that much complaint  
 is constantly being made by citizens residing  
 in the vicinity of this Camp, in regard to the  
 frequent depredations committed by soldiers  
 while detached on furlough upon their property,  
 which must be prevented in future.

All Hucksters and peddling women, must  
 be excluded from the limits of this Camp,

Sir: I have the honor to submit the following Inspection Report of the condition of the Prisoners of War at this Station for the week ending November 26<sup>th</sup> 1864.:

Conduct, very quiet, no attempts to escape; Cleanliness, good state; Clothing, good, except shirts; Bedding, good; State of Quarters, bunks kept clean, but the floors being ground it is impossible to keep them clean in wet weather; State of Mess Halls, none; State of Kitchens, good condition; State of privies, first class; Food, quantity, sufficient, being in accordance to orders; Water, sufficient; Sinks being portable cannot be kept thoroughly cleaned in cold freezing weather; Police of wards, thorough when dry enough to police; Drainage, complete; Police of Hospital, good; Attendance of Sick, good; Hospital Dist., first class; General health of Prisoners, good; Vigilance of Guard, Ordinary, owing to half the guard being new recruits.

#### Remarks and Suggestions.

I would respectfully suggest that for the cleanliness of the barracks and the health of the prisoners therein confined, they be raised, at least two feet from the ground and good substantial plank floors be put in them, as it is impossible to keep a ground floor in a perfect state of cleanliness; during the cold wet weather of the fall and winter seasons, for the prisoners are constantly coming in and out and always carry in more or less mud with them, which keeps the ground floor constantly damp and muddy, whereas if they had good plank floors they

sinks be washed and kept clean every day, and by being raised from the ground will give sufficient ventilation from below to dry the floor during the night.

In regard to the Sinks, I would respectfully suggest that three large stationary sinks be built, as it is impossible to use the portable sink in freezing weather.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 28<sup>th</sup> inst. in which you request information respecting the existence of a spirit of insubordination during the past month, among the Prisoners confined in this Camp, and beg leave to report respecting the same as follows.

The insubordination, which appears to me, to be greater, than that usually existing, among Prisoners, is attributable to the following reasons.

1<sup>st</sup> A their knowledge, of the insufficiency, of the forces, of this Command, for duty, as regards numbers.  
2<sup>d</sup> A their knowledge, of the insufficiency, of a portion of the Troops, who act as their guards, owing to their want of discipline, being new recruits, and drafted men, and a consequent leaning, if not an actual sympathy, of many, of these Troops, towards them.

3<sup>d</sup> A knowledge, on the part of nearly all of the Prisoners, of the late Conspiracies, against the Government throughout, some of the North Western States and especially, in this State, and a feeling of

assurances. That if once they had the maintenance of this Prison. That their escape to the lines of the enemy, would not be difficult, because of the apathy of some, and the actual aid, and sympathy, to be expected, from others.

That there are secret combinations, and organized associations, among the Prisoners of this Camp, for the purpose of escape we have abundant proof, and are also well satisfied, that much sympathy exists, among various persons, residing in this City, and State, towards the Prisoners.

During the months of August, and September, last there were many evidences of existing sympathy, on the part of outsiders, and about the time, of the occurrence of the incendiary fire, at Louisville, Ky. After, their discovery, no have been thrown into the Camp, by means of being tied to a Stone, during the darkness of the night. Which stated, that "Louisville had been unconditionally exhorted the Prisoners, to be of good cheer, that their time would soon come", &c.

Prisoners, have confessed, that many letters, have found their way into this Prison, by this method, and, that they expected their release, by the help of outsiders, in the month of August last.

Since the discovery, and separation, of the secret



of us, which existed in this State, I am of the opinion  
that all hopes on the part of the Prisoners for the inter-  
ference of outsiders, for their release have been abandoned.

I would moreover state, that during the  
long time, that the guard duty at this Prison, was  
performed, by troops of the Veteran Reserve Corps,  
Escapes, barely occurred, and that discipline, and  
good order, among the Prisoners, was much more  
easily maintained.

Remarks and suggestions.

I have the honor to remark that during the past week owing to the weather being favorable, the Camp has been kept in a good state of cleanliness by thoroughly policing the Mess Houses and Grounds; but I would respectfully call your attention to the necessity of building at least three large stationary sinks in the Camp, as the portable sinks now in use are getting very filthy, occasioned by the nuisance freezing or hard in the boxes as to make it impossible to cleanse them thoroughly when taken out of Camp to empty them.

Remarks and suggestions.

I would respectfully suggest that mess houses be built for each Division, as it is impossible to keep the barracks clean while the men continue to sleep in them and they are obliged to do during the extremely cold weather.

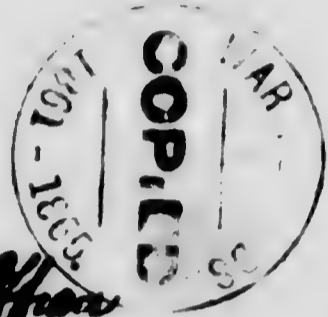
I also find that during the cold weather the prisoners neglect to clean themselves and their clothing properly, and do not use the whole ration of soap issued to them for that purpose, but destroy it by throwing it around the barracks.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 27<sup>th</sup> inst. and in reply would respectfully state that your suggestions in regard to laying partial floors in the Prisoner Barracks meet my own views upon that subject and should the weather prove favorable there will be but a small portion of the time during the winter that the floor would be actually needed - As long as the weather is cold and freezing - the granded bottom of the Barracks answers a very good purpose,

I would remark in relation to the floors of the new Hospital Wards that before purchasing the tongue and groned flooring I caused a careful estimate to be made and found the difference to be in favor of the kind we are using. To have put down a coarse floor it would have required lining of  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch lumber which costs the same in this market as m.c.

required, would equal the cost of the matched

Conduct, good; Cleanliness, good state; Clothing, good; Bedding, good; State of Quarters, kept well polished; State of Mess Houses, have none; State of Kitchens, good; Food, quality of first class; Food quantity of sufficient, being in accordance to Orders; Water, sufficient; Linens, sufficient for cold weather; Police of Grounds, covered with snow and ice all week; Drainage, complete; Police of Hospital, good; Attendance of Sick, good; Hospital Diet, first class; General health of Prisoners, bad and fatality great; Vigilance of Guard, very strict.

Remarks and Suggestions.

I would respectfully suggest that owing to the Barracks in this Camp being badly constructed for cold weather, and the weather being so extremely cold, the sickness has increased very rapidly in the past week, and the casualties have been very heavy. Also that the new Hospital wards under construction are completed and are being occupied by the sick in camp, but, unfortunately there

not sufficient room in them for the sick in camp, and, in my opinion, at least  
 three additional wards are still needed to contain them.

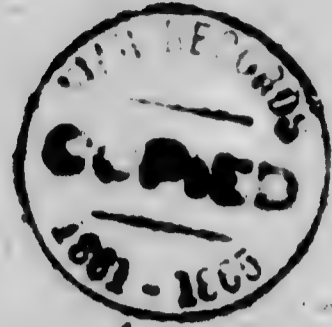

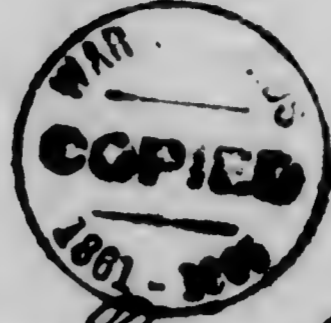

I have the honor to inform you, that in compliance with instructions, contained in Telegram from the Office of the Commissioner of Prisons, dated Washington D. C. Feb, 14, 1860. Five hundred (500) names of men were this day forwarded from this Prison, for Point Fortout - Pa. over the Bal and Ohio Rail Road (via Baltimore). In this lot, was included prisoners belonging to the States of Missouri, Tennessee, Kentucky, Louisiana and Arkansas. The number of these 500, were and slightly over (500) and the balance was made up of invalids, and cripples who wished to be sent on Sechsung, without regard to State. The sending of these invalids, together with the bad and rainy weather, has delayed the starting of the Prisoners at least two (2) days. But we hope to be more prompt in future with the remainder as follows.

The Rolls for the first Point Fortout (1860)

are ready for signature, and the prisoners can be ready to follow by the 22<sup>d</sup> Inst.

From a careful examination of the prisoners in this Camp, there is still about Fifteen Hundred (1500) who desire to go on Le Charys, which leaves a balance of about Two thousand (2000) who desire to take the oath. Many of whom I have no doubt would be willing to enter the Federal Service, and I am very credibly informed, that out of the number lately allowed on the oath given this Prison, Five Hundred and Twenty Five (525) have enlisted in the Service, at the Post of Indianapolis.

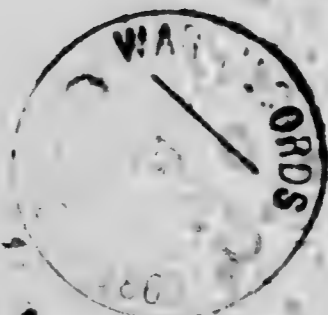
