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INTRODUCTION

On the 145 rolls of this microfilm publication are reproduced 429 bound volumes of records relating to Confederate prisoners of war confined by Federal authorities for the period 1861-65, with two of the volumes extending to 1866. The volumes, which consist mainly of registers and lists, are part of the War Department Collection of Confederate Records, Record Group 109.

Many of the volumes comprising this microfilm publication originally were part of the records of the Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners, but a small number were created by the Surgeon General's Office and individual Army commands. Some of the records were compiled in the Commissary General's Office from rolls, returns, and reports submitted by military prisons and stations, but mainly they were created at individual prisons or stations and later turned over to the Commissary General's Office. A few volumes were possibly compiled by the Prisoner of War Division of the Adjutant General's Office.

The Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners, established as an independent agency of the War Department on July 17, 1862, took over the functions previously carried on by an officer under the authority of the Quartermaster General from October 7, 1861, until that date. The Commissary General was responsible for the supervision of Confederate prisoners of war and political prisoners confined in Union prisons, for correspondence and other business relating to Federal prisoners of war confined in the South, for the maintenance of camps for paroled Federal prisoners of war and supervision of the parolees, and for some matters relating to the exchange of Confederate and Federal prisoners of war. Later the Office was assigned duties in connection with the settlement of claims of all prisoners of war. In August 1867 the Office was abolished and its remaining duties and records were transferred to the newly created Prisoner of War Division of the Adjutant General's Office. The Division furnished data concerning prisoners of war to other Government offices, made reports and compilations, answered private inquiries, and investigated cases of former prisoners for correction of records. It was concerned primarily with the military service of former Federal prisoners of war, which necessitated the transfer to that office of records of Federal prisoners in Southern prisons from the Confederate records collected by the War Department and deposited in the Archive Office of the War Department.

The Confederate prisoner records were retained as holdings of the Prisoner of War Division, but were segregated from other records of the Division and bound volumes were numbered in a continuous series. The records remained in the Prisoner of War Division when the office, as part of the Volunteer Enlisted Pension Branch, was transferred to the Record and Pension Division of the War Department in July 1889.

They were added to the War Department Collection of Confederate records as a result of their use in the project for compiling military service records of Confederate soldiers.

The compilation of service records of Confederate soldiers was begun in 1903 under the direction of Brig. Gen. Fred C. Ainsworth, head of the Record and Pension Office. Abstracts of records relating to individual soldiers were made on record cards from documents in the custody of the War Department or borrowed by the War Department. The War Department documents from which the information was abstracted were stamped with the word "carded." Many of the Confederate prisoner volumes bear this stamp, and others bear the stamp "not carded." The second stamp indicates the volumes that were considered, but for one reason or another no information was abstracted.

Pages of some volumes were considered but not necessarily selected for publication in The War of the Rebellion, A Compilation of the Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies (Washington, 1880-1901), a publication that has also been reproduced on microfilm by the National Archives (Microcopy 262). The pages so considered bear the distinguishing circular stamp "COPIED, WAR RECORDS, 1861-65." Volumes stamped "Received by the AGO . . . D.C. [discontinued commands]" are later additions to the collection of Confederate prisoner records that were segregated from records of individual Army commands.

In the volumes there is vast duplication of names of prisoners and information relating to them. Many discrepancies occur in the spelling of names, information regarding military organizations, dates of capture, and other data. There are various notes relating to compilation activities attached to many of the volumes; some of them have notations concerning duplication and errors. The volumes have no standard overall arrangement. Some volumes have page or folio numbers, but many have unnumbered pages. A few have name indexes. In the alphabetically arranged volumes there are no names entered under the letter "X"; the letters "I" and "J," and "U" and "V" are sometimes combined; "Mc" is generally combined with "M"; and some letters are missing.

Appearing on the volumes are various numbers indicating several prior numbering schemes. Over the years some numbers have disappeared from volumes. Other volumes may have more than one number, and some volumes have been erroneously renumbered. In general, the significance of the numbers is obscure. For these reasons and also to prevent confusion in the citation of volume numbers, the volumes have been renumbered by the National Archives in a continuous series from 1 to 427. This numeration has been stamped inside the front cover of each volume or on the first available page.

Old volume numbers, where found, have been included in the list following these introductory remarks. Some old numbers, marked with an asterisk in the list, are no longer on the volumes but were taken from an index to Confederate prisoner-of-war volumes deposited with

the War Department Collection of Confederate Records in the National Archives. The list also cites fragmentary and other material contained in a specific volume. Dates of some of this material often pre- or post-date those of records in the main part of the volume. Such dates are given in the list but are not included in the dates on the title page of a roll because they would tend to indicate a wider date coverage for the records in the main part of the volume.

Not all records relating to Confederate prisoners of war are reproduced in this microfilm publication. Also in Record Group 109 is a large series of unbound records relating to Confederate prisoners. Many of the bound and unbound records were carded and are included in the compiled service records, which are also a part of the same record group and which have been reproduced in other microfilm publications. Related records are in Record Group 249, Records of the Commissary General of Prisoners; in Record Group 98, Records of United States Army Commands; and in Record Group 94, Records of The Adjutant General's Office.

The various series of bound volumes reproduced in this microfilm publication have been arranged in two main sections: records relating to Confederate prisoners of war and to political prisoners without regard to specific prison or place of confinement, and records of individual military prisons or stations. Those under the second heading have been further arranged by the name of the particular prison or station to which the records pertain. A third section contains a few records of several prisons.

RECORDS RELATING TO ALL PRISONERS

In compliance with the Revised Army Regulations of 1863, the Commissary General of Prisoners maintained in bound volumes a record of all Confederate prisoners of war and political prisoners giving name, rank, regiment and company, or residence of each prisoner, showing the date and place of capture or arrest, and often disposition. He also kept sets of compiled registers for recording the deaths of prisoners, registers of applications made for releases, and registers of prisoners released. These registers and a few miscellaneous volumes from that office comprise the bulk of the volumes relating to prisoners without regard to individual prison or station. The remaining volumes in the section are the registers of deceased Confederate prisoners compiled by the Surgeon General's Office from returns and monthly reports submitted by medical officers at prisons, hospitals, and other places of confinement.

The Commissary General's registers are generally arranged alphabetically by initial letter of surname of prisoner, but a few miscellaneous volumes are arranged chronologically. Each of the Commissary General's registers of prisoners confined cover the same time period, while the registers of applications continue in chronological order from volume to volume. File-marks entered in the registers refer to letters received by the Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners.

Generally they are citations to letters transmitting the rolls or reports from which the registers were compiled or to letters of application for release of prisoners, depending on the type of register in which they appear. The Surgeon General's registers of deaths, reproduced on Rolls 10-12, are arranged by State and thereunder alphabetically by initial letter of surname of prisoner except for the first volume, which is arranged alphabetically by initial letter of surname of prisoner without regard to State.

RECORDS OF INDIVIDUAL PRISONS OR STATIONS

The volumes reproduced under this section are arranged alphabetically by name of military prison or other place of confinement. For each prison or station there are generally three main types of records: registers compiled by the Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners, general registers, and auxiliary registers. Registers for a particular prison seldom give a complete listing of all prisoners who were confined. For some prisons there are no Commissary General registers, and for others there are no general registers. For some places of confinement other than military prisons neither type of register has been found.

The registers compiled by the Office of the Commissary General of Prisoners were numbered for each prison and contain entries that had been copied from rolls, returns, and reports submitted by individual prison authorities. At one time the bound volumes of general and auxiliary registers created by each prison or station were also arranged in a numbered series. Over the years the identifying numbers have disappeared from many of the volumes, but other records in the custody of the National Archives indicate that most of the records for prisons and stations reproduced in this microfilm publication were once part of these numbered series. Both sets of registers, while deposited in the Prisoner of War Division of the Adjutant General's Office, were numbered in one consecutive series. A few additions were made to the series by records received from individual discontinued Army commands.

The general registers are the basic prison registers showing arrivals, confinements, and usually dispositions of prisoners. The auxiliary registers consist of registers of prisoners confined, registers of deaths, lists of prisoners, ledgers, correspondence, morning reports, and various other records.

In many of the Commissary General registers the entries are arranged alphabetically. The arrangement of entries in both general and auxiliary registers is usually alphabetical by initial letter of surname of prisoner or chronological. There are name indexes in most of the ledgers and letterbooks and in a few of the other volumes. Many volumes contain lists of contents that refer to letters of the alphabet and to page numbers. Some of the registers continue from volume to volume, while others are complete within a volume. In some registers the entries for names of prisoners are numbered either within each

letter of the alphabet or consecutively for the entire volume. In a few registers the numbers continue under each letter of the alphabet from one volume to another. Some registers have two separate lists under each letter of the alphabet, one for officers and another for other prisoners. Many registers and other volumes include records of civilian and Federal prisoners with those of Confederate prisoners, and a few volumes contain only names of Federal prisoners. There are several volumes that contain information relating only to paroled prisoners.

LIST OF ROLLS, VOLUMES, AND SUBJECTS

The asterisk after an original volume number indicates that the number no longer appears on the volume. The number has been obtained for this list from an index volume that is in the War Department Collection of Confederate Records in the National Archives.

himself are not very consistent. He was arrested by
Capt. Goodwin, C. D. M. who was then watching with
the Dr. Mr. Grant on the Potomac River but was brought
in this afternoon. He is a son of Thos. D. Davis
of Upper Marlboro. which is about ten miles from
his house, he first told Capt. Goodwin that he
was paroled, but had no papers saying that his
father had his parole, he has since told me the same

he wished to see that he suffered his father had his
parole or release, but it is evident that he was no author-
-ity to be within our lines. Upon going to the house about

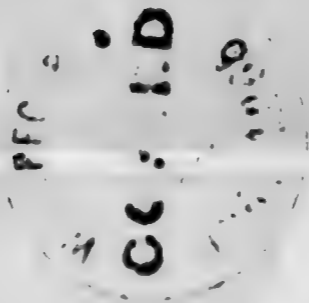

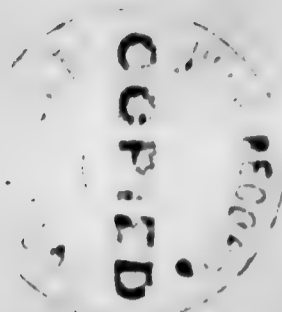
