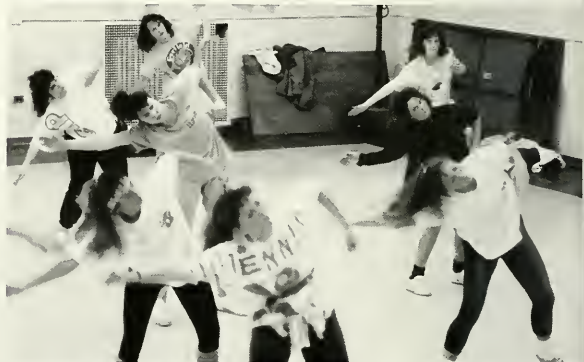

Toxic Protests

Clarion University united with Clarion Township this year to fight the proposed Concord hazardous waste facility. The proposed facility would be in Clarion County and would affect the university and towns as far away as Pittsburgh.

Students fought for their temporary home by attending rallies such as this one to greet Governor Robert Casey in Shipperville. There was a large student turnout and general disappointment when Casey could not attend because of the weather.

Protect the Environment and Children Everywhere (PEACE) organized petitions, letter-writing campaigns and phone-in campaigns. Many of Clarion University's professors encouraged their students to take action. It was under their leadership that many students were kept informed about what was happening and what to do next. Signs were all over town and campus protesting the facility and Act 108 which would put the processing facility in Clarion County. —Laurie Anderson

Dr. Michalski has been very active outside of his university duties. He has been involved in research activities and written numerous articles which have been published nation wide. Some of the organizations Dr. Michalski has served as President are: Pennsylvania Music Educators Association, Phi Beta Mu-National Bandmasters Fraternity, Pennsylvania College Bandmasters Association and Board of Directors for Clarion Hospital. He has also been associated with Clarion Area School Board, Pennsylvania State Education Association, American Bandmasters Association and International Youth and Music Festival.

Dr. Michalski is most notable and his reputation precedes him as a conductor. His first guest conducting job was in 1959 and since that time he has conducted over 150 different festivals. Dr. Michalski's most recent achievement was as Coordinator of Bands for the first playing of the Blockbuster Bowl.

In 1961 many traditions of the Clarion University Bands had their beginnings. It was thirty years ago when a young man, who only two years previously received his Master's degree in Music Education, accepted the position of Director of Bands of Clarion State College. This young man was Stanley F. Michalski. Earning his Doctor of Education from Penn State in 1966, Dr. Michalski continued his education at the University of Pittsburgh, Wyoming Seminary and Clarion University.

Since this time Dr. Michalski has well exceeded his duties as Conductor of bands. Students have seen him teach almost every type of music class offered at Clarion from music appreciation to conducting. In 1970 the annual Summer Clinic had its debut and two years later saw the debut of the annual President's Concert. Besides his musical activities, Dr. Michalski has been involved with other campus events. He has been chairman of the College Social Committee, University Disciplinary Board, University State Employee Combined Appeal (United Way) Fund Drive, as well as serving on several other committees.

Dr. Michalski is still very active in his musical activities. This year he alone will conduct and perform at over 40 different events; but his home pride is performing with the Clarion University Bands. - Don Henry

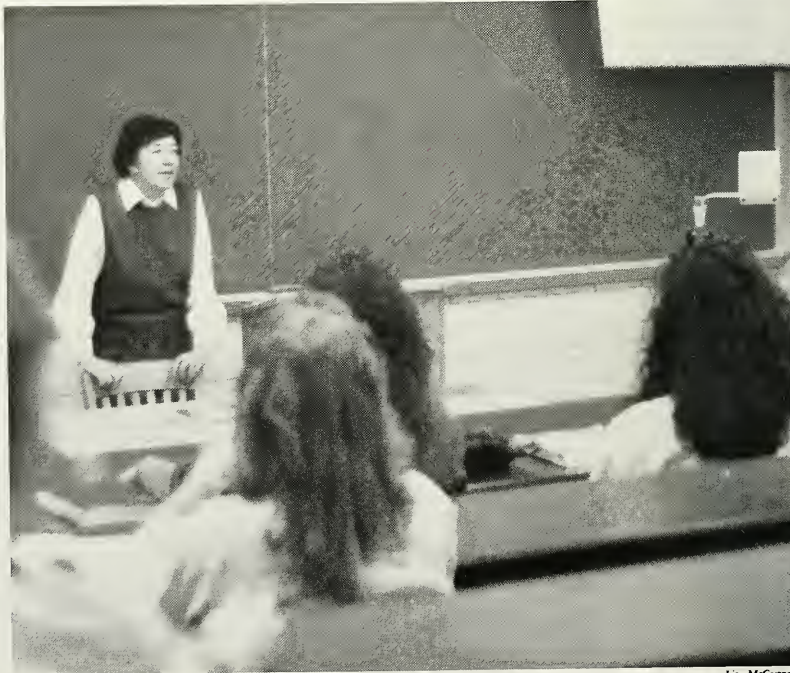

The College of Business Administration provides students with a high quality environment for educational enrichment. The Venango Campus offers an Associate of Science degree with concentrations in business administration or paralegal business studies. The Clarion Campus offers a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with majors in accountancy, administrative science, economics, finance and marketing. Also, Clarion University accepts approximately sixty-six students for a Master of Business Administration. The College of Business Administration provides several outreach services. These outreach services help the students to focus their education. Services such as: the Small Business Development Center, Center for Economic Education, Industrial Resource Center and the Center for Accounting Education and Research.

Dr. William Ross is one of the fifty-three faculty in the College of Business Administration. Director of the Center of Economic Research, Dr. Ross is the recipient of the Pew Charitable Trusts Fellowship award. Presented by the Joint Council on Economic Education, the award gives Dr. Ross the opportunity to work with local elementary and secondary school teachers. Dr. Ross can instruct the teachers on how to incorporate economics into their classroom instruction. Dr. Ross is only one example of how the College of Business Administration is offering a high quality environment for educational enrichment. - Don Henry

Deer Forge

The program for the Department of Communication is designed to develop the student's ability to write and speak effectively, and to use other media—radio, television, film, photography, and the print medium—for specific purposes. Students are required to participate in co-curricular media activities to consist of at least one broadcast oriented organization and one print oriented organization. Available broadcast organizations are Cable TV-5, WCUC-FM non-commercial FM radio station, and WCCB carrier current AM radio station. Print organizations are The Clarion Call campus newspaper and The Sequelle yearbook.

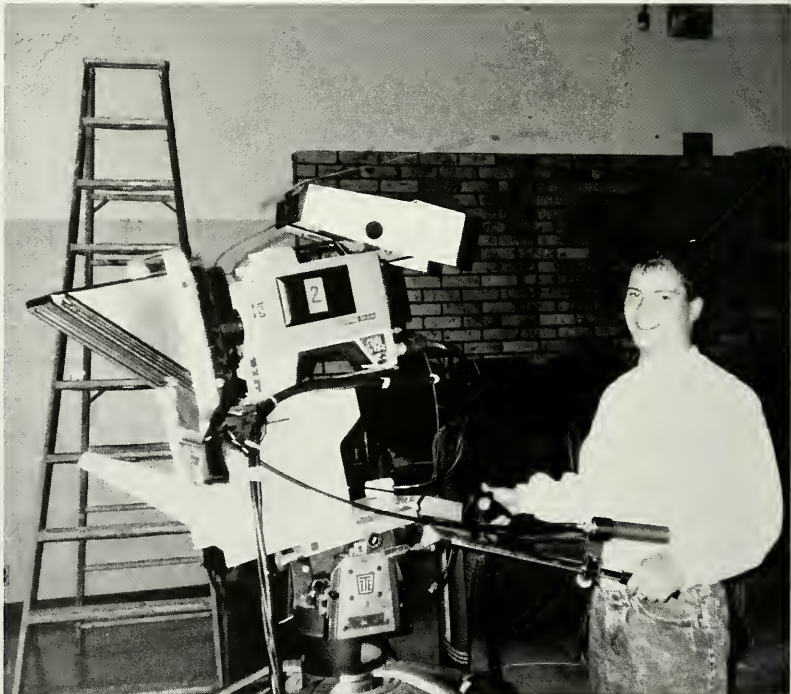
The Department of Computer Information Science offers two majors, Computer Application and Information Systems (CAIS) and Computer Science (CS). CAIS prepares students for careers in application programming and systems analysis. Emphasis is placed on the COBOL programming language and on the principles necessary for computer usage in commercial, industrial, and governmental environments. CS prepares students for careers in systems programming, computer systems analysis, and computer system management. Emphasis is placed on mathematical foundations of computation and principles of data organization and computer systems software.

The State Council of Education approved a curriculum for the education of school librarians at Clarion University on December 3, 1937. The Library Science program at Clarion not only meets state requirements for school librarianship, it qualifies students for entry level positions in public and special libraries. A graduate program in Library Science accredited by the American Library Association is offered. It prepares personnel for first-level professional positions in public, school, and special libraries. - Denise Murphy

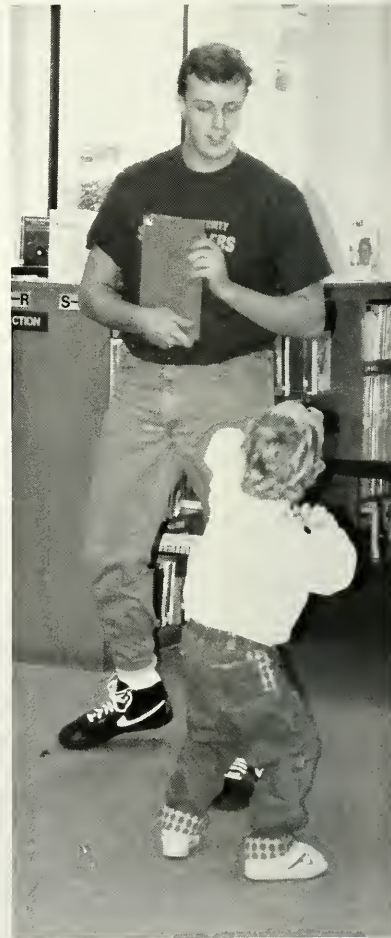
Dr. Sherry DuPont, Assistant Professor of Education, organized the Clarion University Storytellers. These students were enrolled in her children's literature classes.

Storytelling is the oldest form of giving information. Its six techniques: character imagery, pantomime, draw talk, felt board, rhythmic, and puppeteering, have been used as educational tools for centuries.

The main goal of the storytellers is to stimulate the children to read. They are also a first step effort to educate teachers to go into the classroom with creative ideas. Originally, their activities were con-

finied to the students at the Clarion University Children's Center and Daycare Center. However, during their second year of existence they have expanded their focus beyond campus.

During the fall semester they took their talents to the Boundary Street Elementary School in Clarion and started a five week series of storytelling at the Clarion Free Library. The spring semester, DuPont planned to implement creative drama into the teaching of the elementary reading course. This enabled children to make inferences and go beyond the printed word. -Denise Murphy

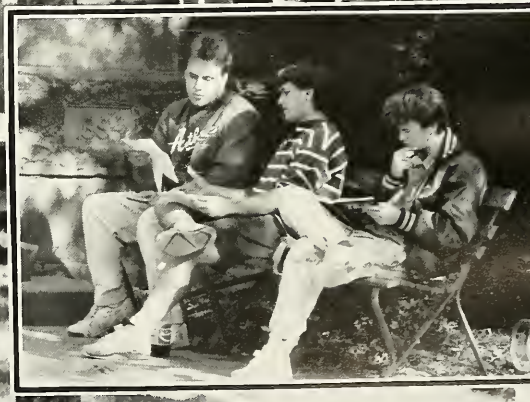

The bat-toting principal, from New Jersey, credited with building a model school out of a dangerous inner city school spoke to a packed audience at Marwick-Boyd Auditorium. When he paced the stage he said, "You are going to say one of two things when I leave: I love Joe Clark or I hate his guts. You will probably love me." Many of the students here at Clarion opted to love him when he left.

Clark suggested that there are five things needed to improve education: discipline, accountability, high expectations of students, dedicated teachers and parents, and reduction of bureaucracy. Clark strongly believes teachers are the foundation of America. For these reasons he speaks out to college students and other groups, hoping to get the message across.

Clark's message of self-reliance and political philosophy made many students think. "Whatever you do in this life, don't ever quit. To persist is to succeed. Some of you are going to miss success because it comes dressed in overalls and looks like work."

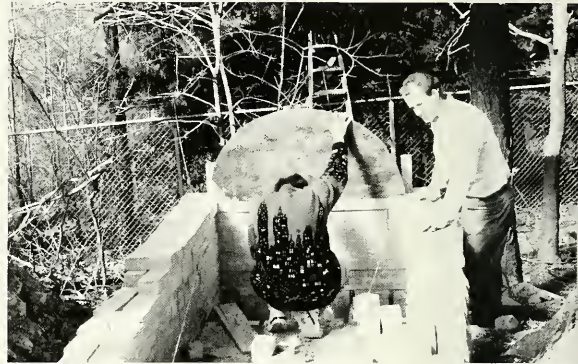

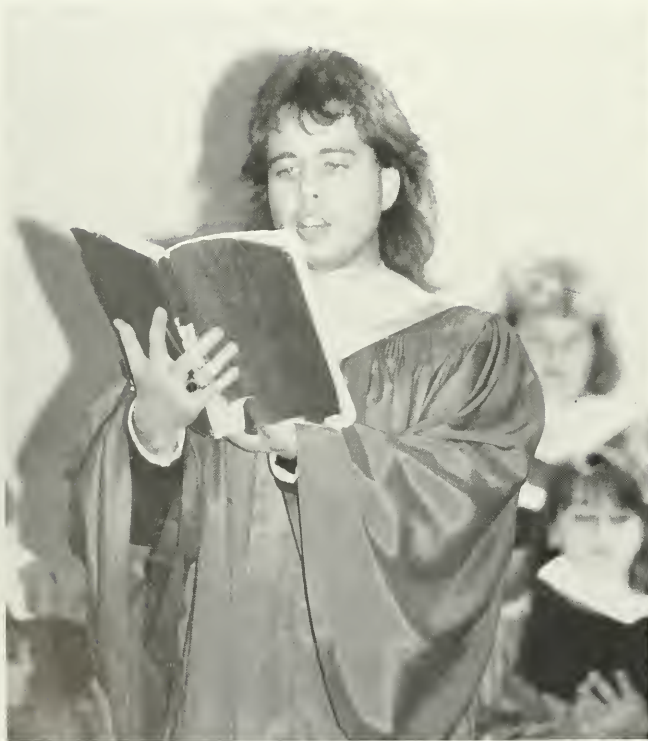

When fully grown, a male gorilla stands about 4½ feet tall and weighs nearly 400 pounds, but very large males may be nearly 6 feet tall and may weigh as much as 600 pounds. The female gorilla is shorter and lighter than the male. The gorilla has long arms, short hind legs, and broad shoulders with a short, thick neck. Its large head has protruding jaws and a long crest on the ridge of the skull. Its small ears are set close together, and it has a large mouth with thin, mobile lips and a flat nose with a wide, open nostril.

Like all gorillas, an adult male is usually 2½ times heavier than a female. In short distances, they usually move on all fours with their weight on their knuckles. In their home range, they travel in family groups of 1 to 15 individuals, including 1 adult male, 1 to 10 adult females, and several young. Gorillas are omnivores; they eat a variety of ground, but they may dig for roots, tubers, and fruit. The only food they eat is made up of about 200 different species of plants. They eat a variety of berries and other fruits, but they also eat a variety of leaves, including the leaves of the bamboo. They make a variety of sounds, including grunts. The female gives a different kind of grunt when she is in heat.

The female will bear one young about 9 months after mating, and she nurses the infant for about a year. A gorilla is mature when it is about 10 or 12 years old, and it may live for as long as 30 years.

Because gorillas are large and strong, few animals

The conference was co-chaired by Mary Jo Phillips and Deborah King. The conference was also sponsored by various organizations and committees of Clarion University.

Faith Ringgold, an internationally known African-American artist, was the keynote speaker at the Eighth Annual Women's Conference. Faith Ringgold's quilts narrate facets of her culture and history.

She said that her work reveals "It's very easy, anyone can fly. All you need is somewhere to go that you can't get to any other way."

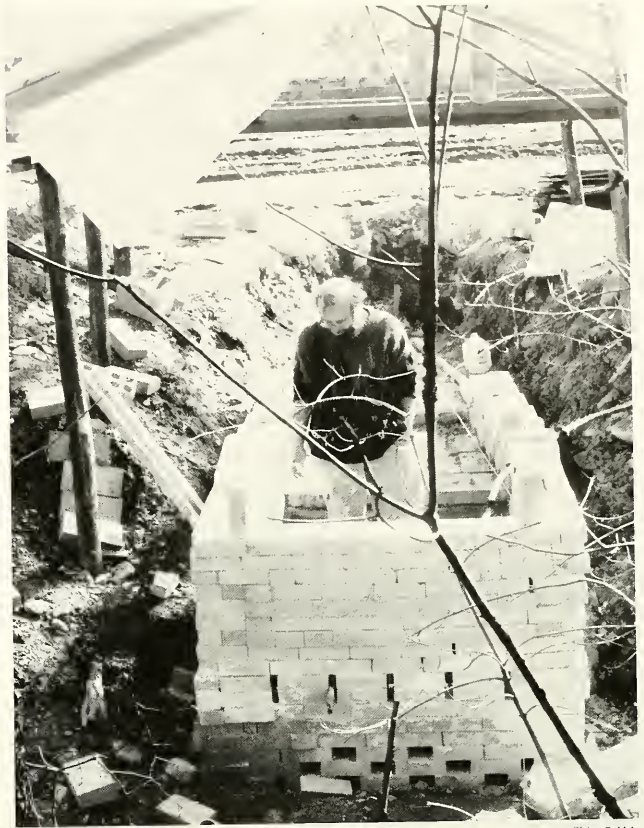

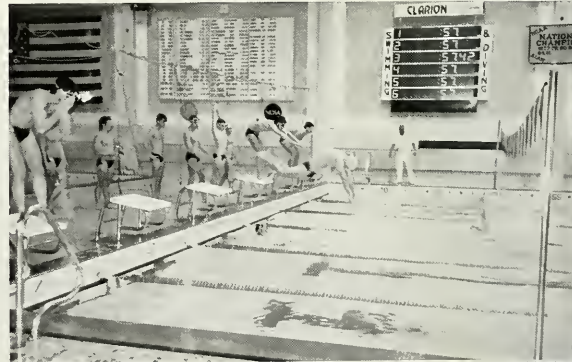
