Academic Festival A World of Ideas

WCU held an "Academic Festival: A Celebration of Ideas" on October 5th. It was a chance to acknowledge the academic achievements of the faculty and allowed faculty and students to demonstrate their talents. It also illustrated the values of our university by allowing the exchanging of ideas through public discussion and reflection. The festival began with a convocation ceremony. The President of Howard University, Dr. Franklyn G. Jenifer, was the quest speaker. The Faculty Merit award was presented to Dr. Stanley J. Yarasewick, Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs. The day moved on to sessions presented by a number of approaches including panel presentations, demonstrations, and musical performances.Doug McConatha, Associate Professor of Anthropology and Sociology presented an exhibit entitled "Internationalism and Socio-Cultural Explorations." This presented research, travel, and scholarship opportunities offered by the department. The Vocal and Choral Department's Assistant Professor, Kathryn Chilcote, D.M.A., and student Jamey Strawn, Pianist, presented Knoxville: Summer of 1915, a tone poem. The Forensics Team and Kevin Dean, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Communicative Studies, participated with a session called, "WCU Forensics: More than 'Quincey and Dead Bodies."'They focused on public speaking, oral interpretation, and impromptu.To increase awareness about HIV and AIDS, Lynn Carson, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Health, and Gopal Sanharan, Dr. P.H., Assistant Professor of Health, held a research poster presentation entitled, "HIV-AID5 on campus: Strategies for creating an environment to increase awareness and reduce risk." The sessions that were held gave faculty members and students the opportunity to expand themselves through increased awareness and knowledge. She encourages disabled students because they are not only an inspiration to others, but a lesson to all that they are capable of many accomplishments if given a chance. Dr. LaCoste hopes to enjoy her new life in New Orleans while doing further research of learning disabilities and impairments.

Dr. Diane Casagrande

The first day of Dr. Diane Casagrande's class is an experience her students will never forget. Dr. Casagrande begins to explain her expectations to her students. She says that she expects every one of her students to be executive material and to go far in any career they choose to pursue. She says that if any student does not plan on going this far then they do not belong in her class. She expects so much from her students because she believes that each and every one of them has the potential to be great. Anyone who can learn to communicate effectively can reach

Dr. Casagrande has devoted her life to teaching her students the skills they need to be successful. When asked what made her decide to teach she responded, I'm an extrovert. Hike the classroom and Hike interacting with people," Dr. Casagrande has been teaching at West Chester for twenty-four years. During that time she has taught a variety of courses such as Argument and debate, Conflict Resolution, and Public Speaking. She also wrote a book entitled, Oral Communication: In Technical Professions and Businesses. The basis of her teaching philosophy is that "you have to love what you're doing, you have to love the people, and you have to love your subject." Her favorite aspect of teaching is the interaction with her students. Over the years, she has grown more confident and has tried "crazy things" in class. She "left behind the lecture format for the most

part" and is doing things now "that involve students more"

Over her years at WCU, Dr. Casagrande has also noticed a change in students.

Earlier students were prepared differently. "They were more attuned to reading and writing," she claims. "Current students are more multi-media literate. They can function with various media in ways that would have surprised a generation ago." She also believes that students are more socially aware of issues such as racism and sexism. She hopes that if people "talk and communicate about these issues maybe it will make an Impact on behavior.

Dr. Casagrande has contributed to our school not only through teaching but also through other areas. She has held many positions such as VP of the Teacher's Union, Chairperson of the CAPC, and Parliamentary Advisor to SGA. She also works with and helps train graduation speakers.

She obviously has done something right because when Dr. Casagrande speaks, her students listen in awe. They realize that she practices every technique that she is teaching. Dr. Casagrande is an asset to WCU. She is an encouraging role-model to all students, especially women. Her teaching has helped many students over the years and hopefully will continue to help students in the future.




















Internships World of Learning





But embedded within these liberties is responsibility and the obligation to think and act carefully.










You've Got a Friend in TYSON

Sanderson. . . 1970: Schmidt is dedicated to Gertrude K. Schmidt, pioneer music teacher who initiated WCU's music program. . . . 1993: South Campus Apartments open. Of the eleven resident buildings established, nine go unnamed.






















Family Day World of Togetherness




Renovations A World Of New






Phi Sigma Pi

from their fundraisers, they als hold a party for mental retadred children each year.




Delta Zeta

SGA


The Student Government Association serves as a vital link between the students and the uni-
















CROSS COUNTRY








































WOMEN'S BASKETBALL
