Professor Spotlight

Jay, as he is known by faculty and students alike, completed both undergrad. and grad. studies in radio, T.V. and film at Temple as well as doctoral course work in speech communication. He remained at Temple upon graduation in the Office of Business and Government Services. In addition, he produced radio programs for public schools in Philadelphia on WFIL radio. Another career path was that of editor for the Motion Picture Exhibitor magazine. But Jay had, and still has, a burning flame for theatre that led him to the theatre dept. of WCU 26 years ago.

He has been involved in the theatre both in school and professionally since the age of 10. One of his favorite roles was that of Dogberry in Shakespeare's *Much Ado About Nothing*. He put his acting career on hold, though, to pursue directing. This past year he directed *Our Town*. One of his proudest moments at WCU occurred 3 years ago with the production of *Fences*; the first mainstage production of an African American play that was performed in the State School System.

Jay describes himself as being idealistic, concentrated, intense, impatient and prickly. He lives by the motto - We are responsible for ourselves; if we are unhappy it is not because someone makes us that way but because we choose to be! As for the future Jay might return to acting. He feels that now may be the "appropriate" time to play the roles he played in college, such as Creon in *Antigone*. However, for the time being, he is comfortable with the great working environment of WCU that he describes as pleasurable to come to each day.

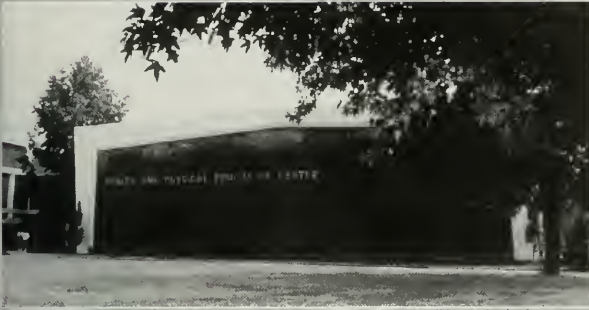

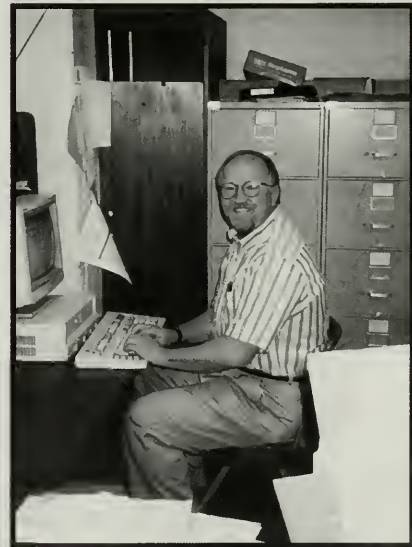

Dr. Slusher began her educational career at North Carolina University where she earned a B.S. degree in Animal Science. She continued on at Penn State College of Medicine in the department of Pharmacology where she received her Ph.D.. It was in 1990 that Dr. Slusher brought her "If you are going to do it, do it right" philosophy to WCU. Being the highly motivated individual she is - shortly after her arrival she received a research grant from the National Institutes of Health. With these funds she has spear-headed a number of projects in the field of molecular biology. One such project was completed this year - "The Effects of Leader Length on Alternate AUG Selection from MOD5 Transcripts in Yeast" - and will be submitted to the renowned journal RNA later this year for publication. In addition, she presented this paper, as well as other student/faculty research, at Cold Spring Harbor Laboratories, one of the most prestigious DNA labs in the country, this past Spring. WCU was the only primarily undergraduate institution present at the convention.

Dr. Slusher has been described by fellow faculty members as bright, engaging, demanding, vivacious and pathologically cheerful. Perhaps these traits helped her in receiving tenure and a promotion to associate professor this year. Dr. Slusher is now in the process of developing a class in techniques of molecular biology that will give undergrad. students hands on experience with current DNA protocols.

Outside of WCU she is kept busy with two children, Corinne age 15 and Carl age 12. They are currently involved with the 4-H seeing eye puppy club, enthusiastic gardening and are planning a vacation to Spain in 1997.



Time to Eat!

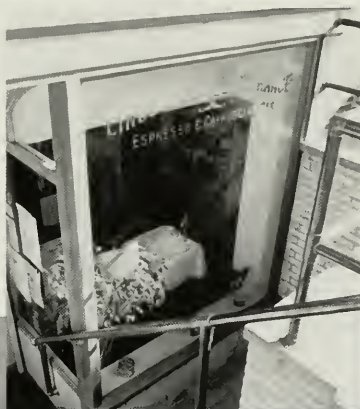

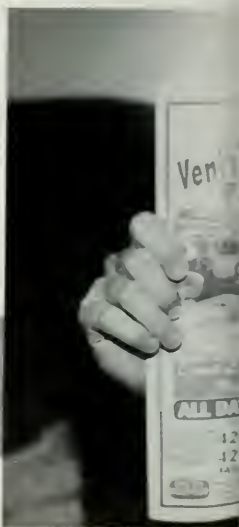
Moving Off

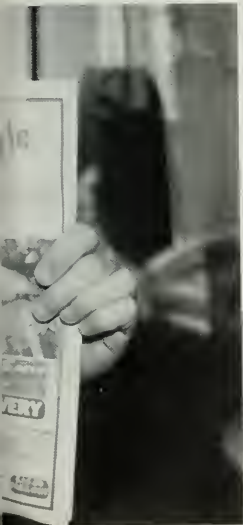

A Soggy Day Delays the Parade

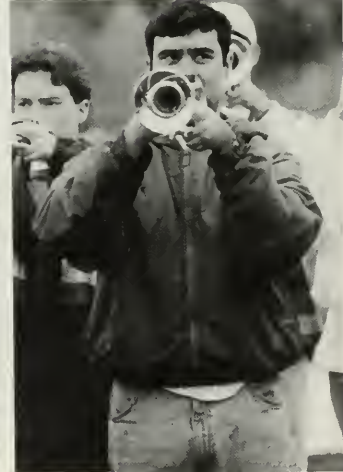

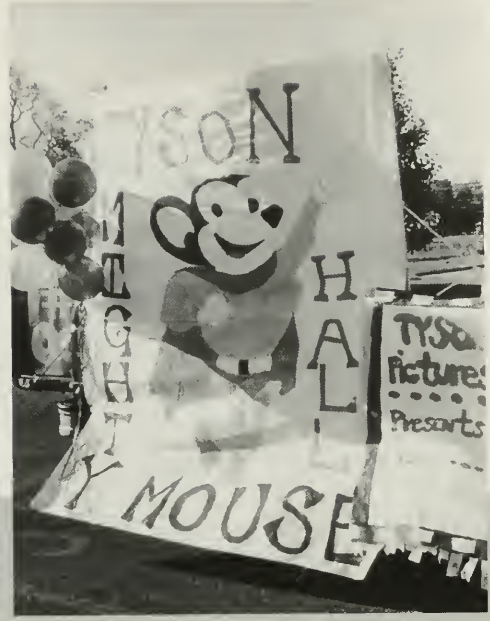

Beggar's Opera

In the Fall of 1995, John Gay's *The Beggar's Opera* appeared on the mainstage of the E.O. Bull Center. Its first debut was on January 29, 1728, at the Royal Theater in England. The play has both a social and political side that pokes fun at the social structure, prison systems, and cultural influences of England in the 18th-century and at the prime minister of that period, Robert Walpole. Contrary to the stuffy literature pieces, where the play was usually found in the 18th-century English Literature books, it is a humorous, fun and rowdy play. The music is foot-tapping with catchy lyrics and the interesting bunch of characters it produces brings a smile to the viewers face. With the interspersed script of spoken words and sung segments, the play is lively and fast moving through its three acts. Within these acts, an interesting love triangle between a ladies man (Huhn), his pregnant wife (Graf) and his mistress Polly (Buck) unfolds before your eyes.

The large cast included David Bickle as Mr. Peachum, Regina Meredith as Mrs. Peachum, and Lori Buck as Polly Peachum. Highwayman Macheath was played by Matthew Huhn and Lucy Lockit by Jenifer Graf. Other notable actors were Brad Hartman and Darryl Wright.

Our Town

Thornton Wilder's classical play, *Our Town* made its appearance on the E.O. Bull mainstage in the Spring semester of 1996. Divided into three acts - daily life, love and marriage, & life & death, the play follows the life of two families, the Webbs & the Gibbsses, as they pass through & experience life's coming-of-age rituals. It takes place in Grover's Corners which is stereotypical of "Anytown, USA": where everyone knows everyone else's business & the idea of a fun time involves going to the corner drug store for an ice cream soda.

The play originally debut in January 22, 1938, & it was based on the chronicles of the residents of Grover's Corners , a small New Hampshire town, from 1901. The theater department added their own unique twist to the script, & gave it a more contemporary feel by moving it to the 20th century & having the stage manager a 22-year-old woman, instead of a 40-year-old man.

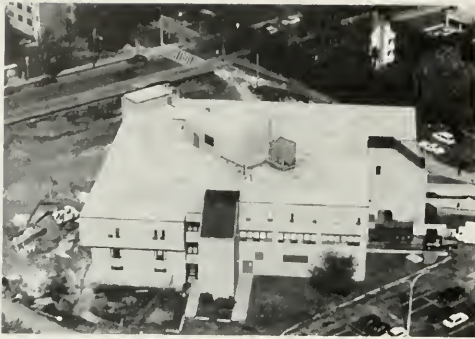

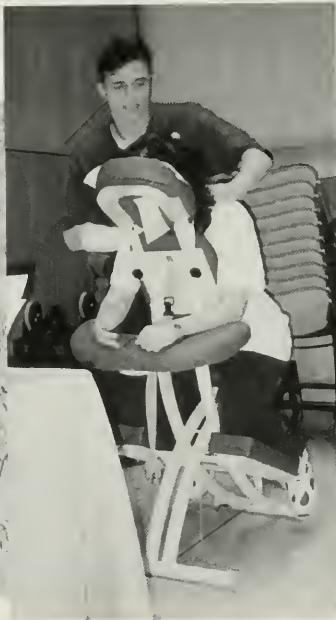
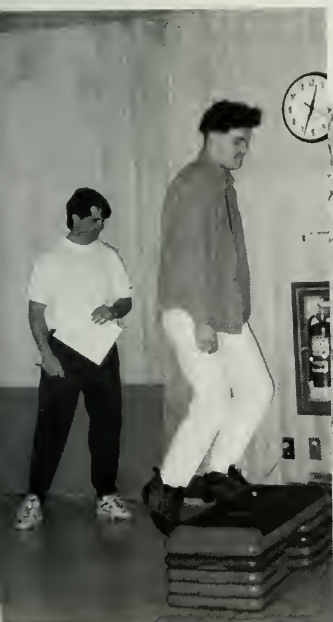




Promoting Healthy Living

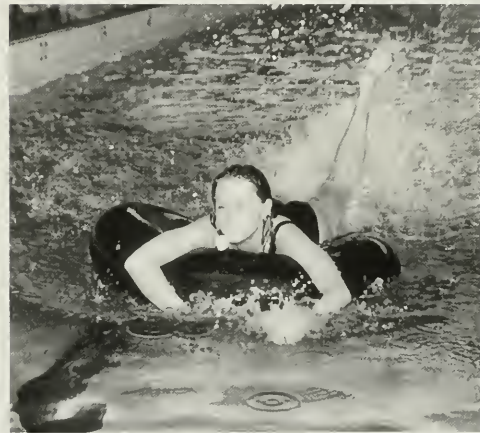


Greek Week

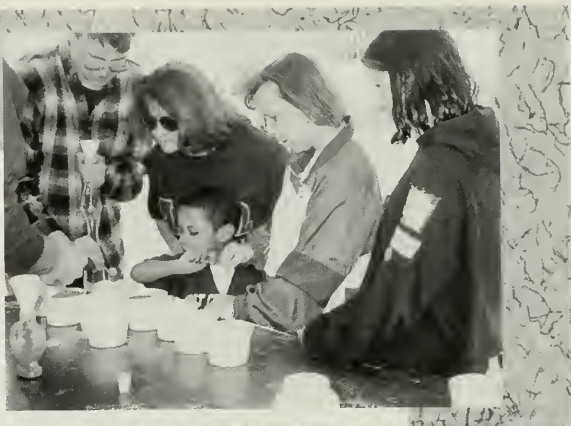
Spring Weekend

"Dance Continental"

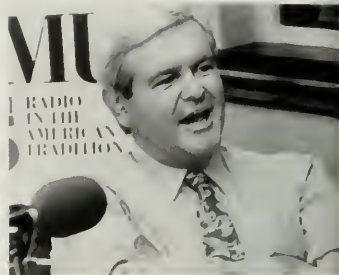

House speaker Newt Gingrich rose to the heights of Speaker of the House of Representatives. Always considered a 1996 presidential candidate, he promised to overhaul more than a generation of social programs that began in the eras of the New Deal and the Great Society.



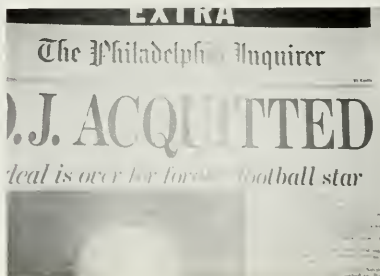
Affirmative action was put into action nearly three decades ago. But in 1995-96, the affirmative action plans began to get weaker. The Supreme Court issued decisions making it harder to justify giving minorities and women preferences in the awarding of federal contracts; and the Clinton administration was reevaluating federal affirmative action programs.

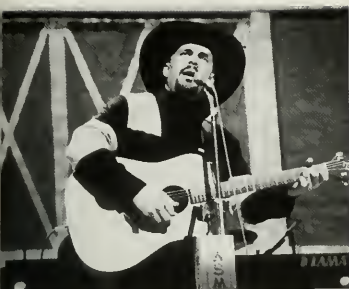


At 1p.m on Tuesday, October 3, 1996 most Americans were most likely glued to their television sets awaiting the verdict for the murder trial of O.J. Simpson. After the jury deliberated for less than four hours, the words "not guilty" were read. Called the "trial of the century", the Simpson trial was the center of media frenzy for months. America watched as O.J. tried to flee arrest in his white Bronco, listened to previous 911 calls from Nicole in fear of her husband, and voiced their opinion as to Simpson's guilt. The trial twisted and turned through a maze of scientific evidence and dozens of expert witnesses. Domestic violence and racial issues were the focus for the prosecution and defense, respectively. Judge Lance Ito presided over the trial in which Los Angeles Police Detective Mark Fuhrman's racial slurs and attitudes became one of the focal points of Simpson's defense. Although the jury found insufficient evidence to find O.J. Simpson guilty of murdering his former wife, Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend, Ronald Goldman; the family of Goldman has filed a civil lawsuit against O.J. for the wrongful death of Ron. Keeping in mind the level of proof is much lower than beyond a reasonable doubt, that lawsuit is still pending at the time of this publication.



The Atlantic region's hurricane season was so active that it has produced the most named storms since the National Hurricane Center started assigning names in 1953. Storms are named in alphabetical order; this year, officials were preparing to reach the end of the list and begin naming storms after the Greek alphabet, starting with Alpha.





Garth Brooks was the first country artist to sell like a pop star in the early 1990s. Today, Garth Brooks is part of the old guard. The summit was "No Fences" recorded in 1990, which sold more than 12 million copies. A limited-edition greatest hits record, "The Hits" was a major success, selling about 10 million copies. And this 32 year-old artist from Tulsa, OK is just getting started.



Miss Oklahoma, Shawntel Smith, was crowned Miss America. However, she was not the only focus of this year's pageant. The swimsuit competition was put to a vote for the television viewers to decide if swimsuits should be allowed on stage for judging. The viewers voted overwhelmingly to retain the swimsuit competition, keeping with the 75 years of pageant history.



Timothy McVeigh is a well-guarded prisoner. He and one other man, Terry Nichols, are charged with 11 counts in the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City. The explosion on April 19, 1995 killed 169 people and injured more than 500. In a memorial for the one year anniversary, the remains of the building were removed and a park has been installed in its place.



Senator Bob Dole, a Republican from Kansas, wanted to run for president. When school began in September, Dole, the Senate Majority Leader, was a leading conservative candidate. He previously ran for vice president once, in 1976, and for president in the primaries of 1980 and 1988. If he won this time, he would be 73 years old when he entered office, older than any newly elected president.



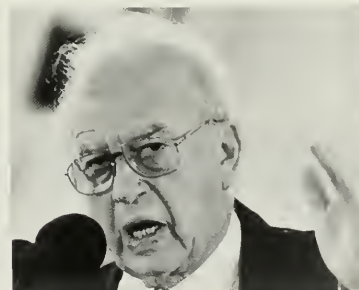
First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton had difficulty this year in finding an appropriate role for herself, one that Americans would be comfortable with. Notably this year, she addressed the World Conference on Women in Beijing, China and was forced to testify in front of a grand jury for the Whitewater affair.



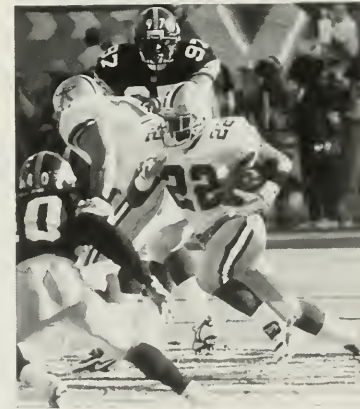
President Bill Clinton prepared for a new political battle: the 1996 presidential election. Early in the process, the Democratic president faced nearly a dozen Republicans looking to be the nominee to run against the President who had not even announced he was a candidate. But Clinton had other concerns — taxes, Medicare reform and for the first time in 40 years, the Republican ruled Congress.



Atlanta Braves won the World Series over the Cleveland Indians in a 4-2 series triumph.



Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, the war hero turned political leader who fearlessly pursued peace with the Palestinians, was assassinated in November 1995. He was 74 years old when he was gunned down after a political rally.



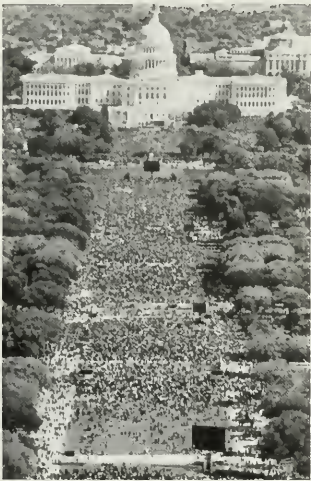
Dallas Cowboys win Super Bowl XXX over the Pittsburgh Steelers in a 27-17 victory.



▲ The civil war in the former Yugoslavia continued through 1995-96. 4 years after the wars of Yugoslavia's destruction began, there was still no peace among the Croats and the Serbs and the Muslims. More than 3 million people have lost their homes, more than 200,000 have been killed and tens of thousands have become refugees. There remains a deep reservoir of bitterness throughout the former Yugoslavia, and NATO continues its attempt to bring peace to the Balkans. ▼



Pope John Paul II returned to the United States for his fourth papal trip.



Hundreds of thousands of black men marched in Washington in a spirited rally for unity and brotherhood. The Million Man March was organized by Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan. Participants were optimistic that one of the outcomes of the peaceful day of praying, singing and speech-making would be more understanding between blacks and whites.



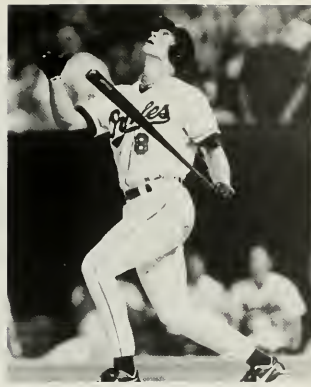
Bill Gates made computer headlines when he introduced Windows 95, the long-awaited upgrade to the Windows computer software program. It was billed as revolutionary and innovative. Gates was also crowned the richest man in the US with a net worth of about \$14.8 billion.



Palestine Liberation Organization leader Yasser Arafat played a role in Israel and Palestinians concluding a major agreement in which most of the control of the occupied West Bank was transferred to Arab residents.



Gen. Colin Powell, 58-year-old career Army officer was national security officer under President Reagan and was appointed chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff by President Bush. He came to national attention during the Persian Gulf War against Iraq and never left the public eye. Although he ruled out running for the president as a Democrat, he said he was always attracted to politics and early in the presidential campaign he looked very much like a candidate.

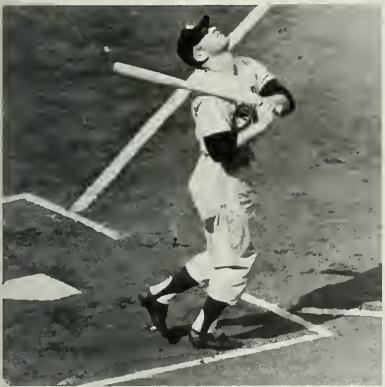


John Major, the British prime minister, re signed as the Conservative leader and 12 days later was re-elected with a 66% vote by Tory members of the Parliament.

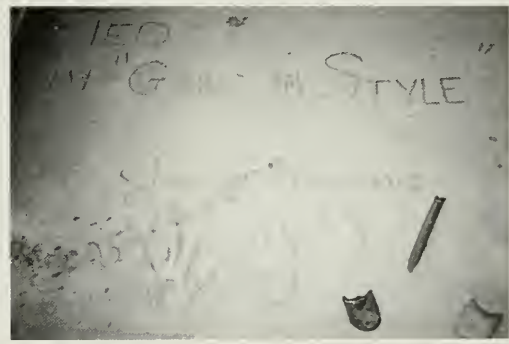

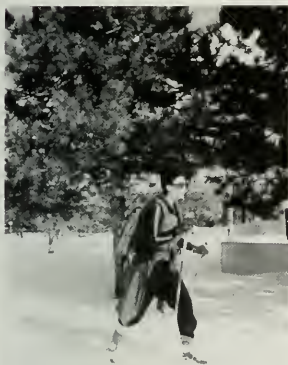
Other events . . .

BLIZZARD OF '96

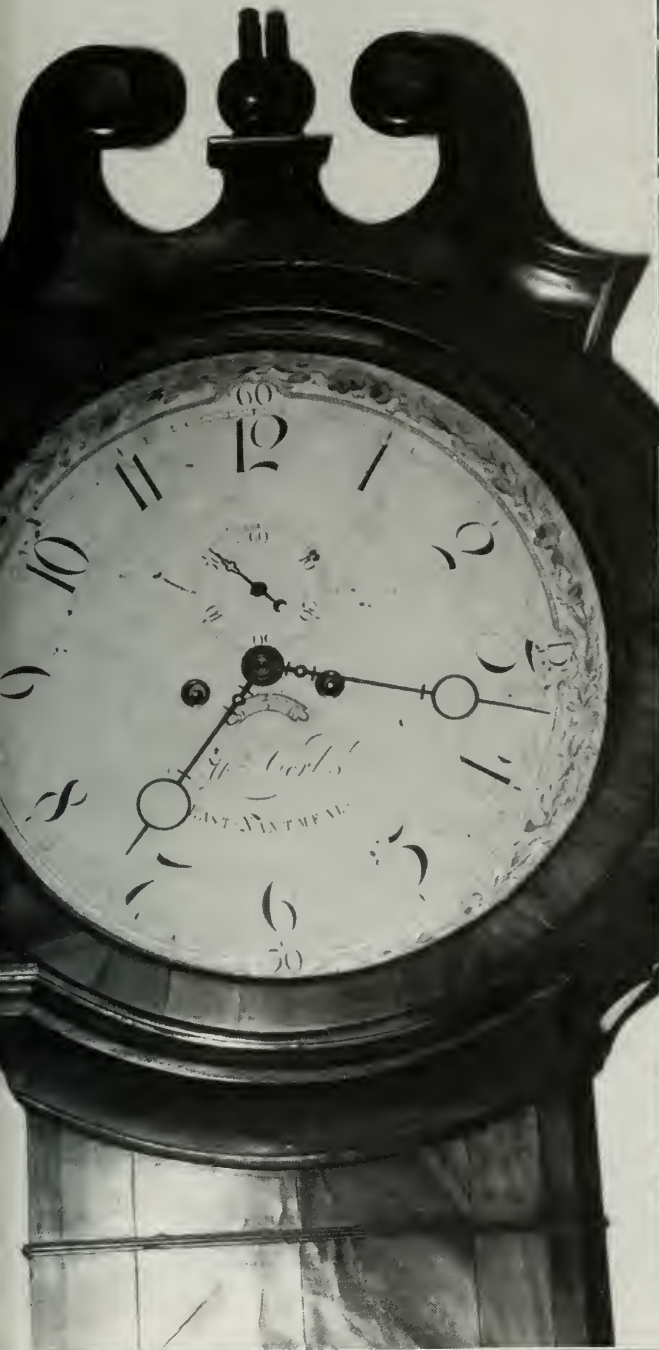

THE INCOMPARABLE GOLDEN RAMS MARCHING BAND

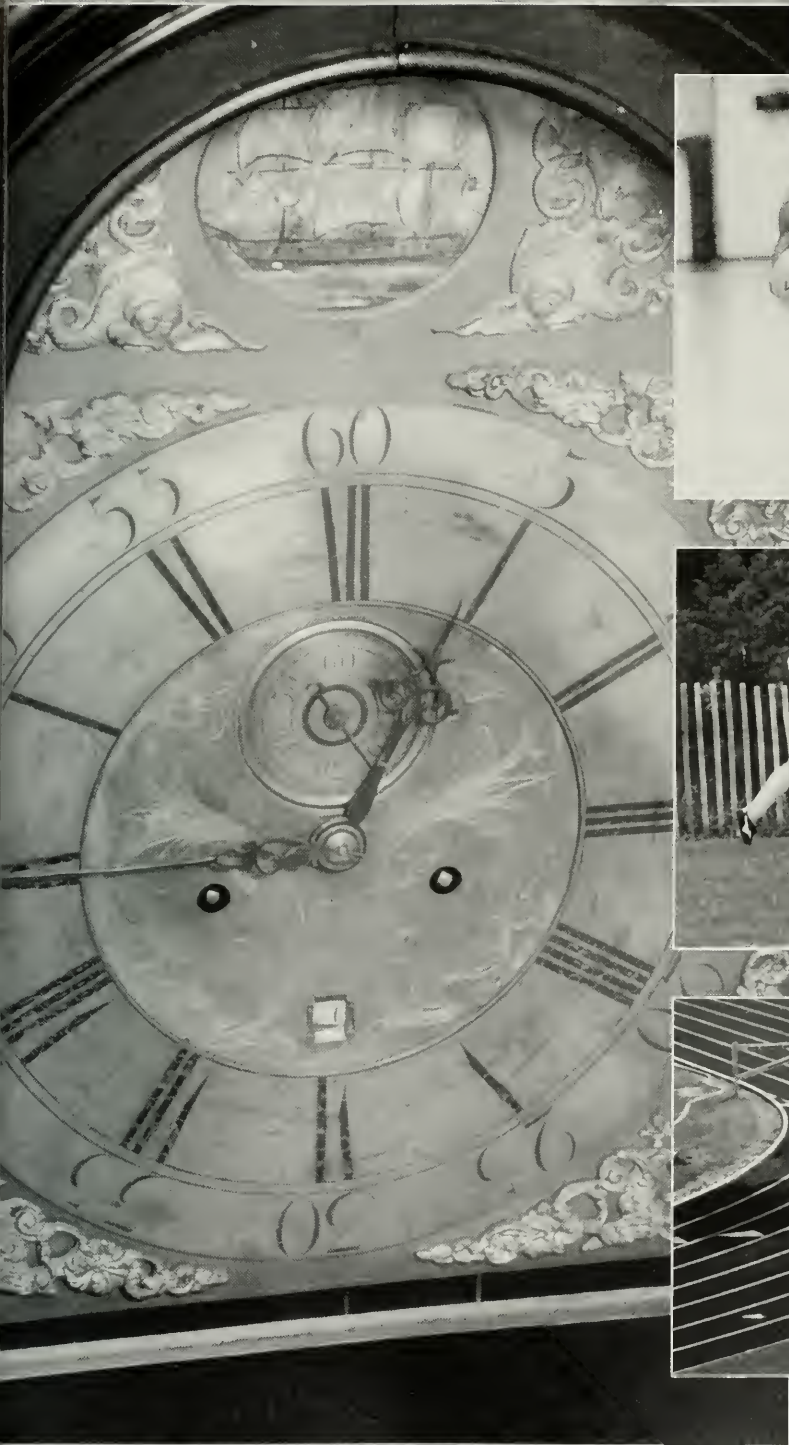

Swinging Toward The Future!

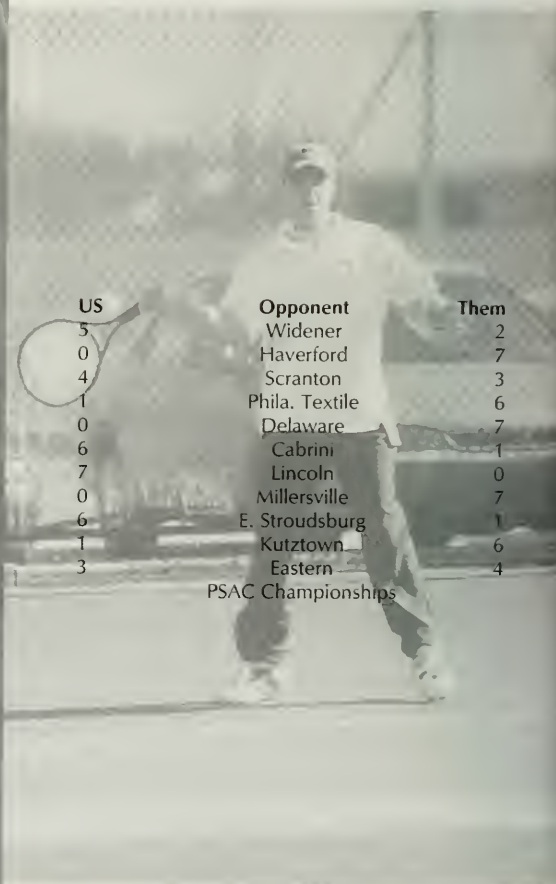

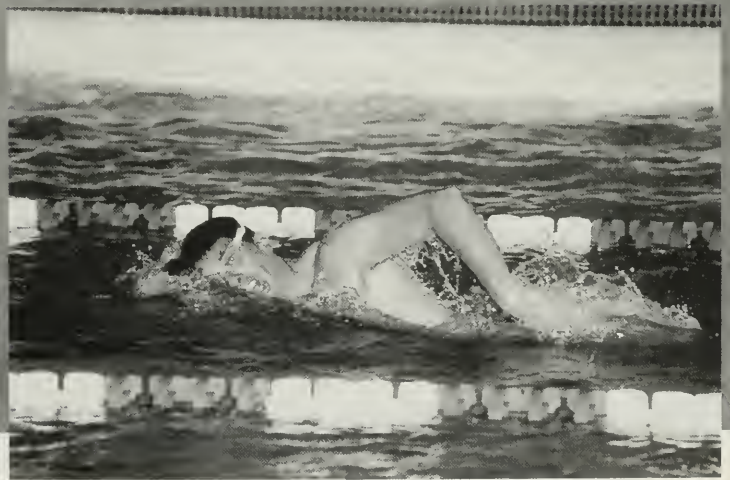
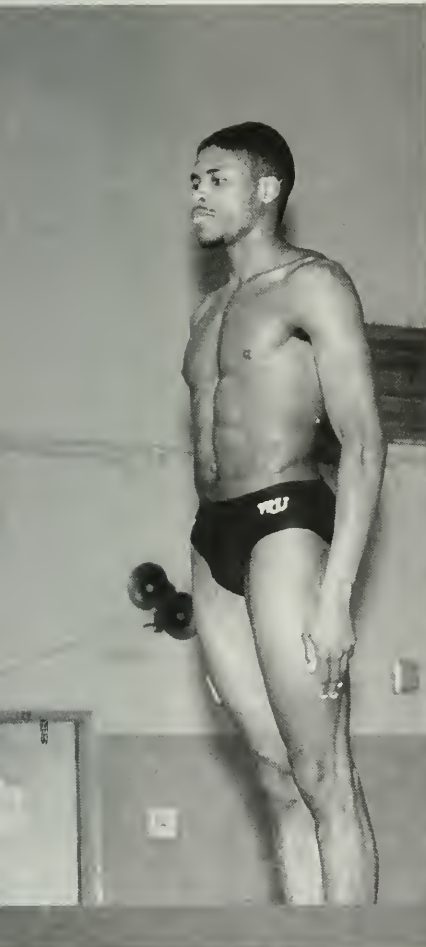
Splashing Toward Victory!

Shoot for two!!

After the loss of Damien and Chet Blair, the West Chester University Golden Rams were predicted to have a "rebuilding" year. The Rams have surpassed that assumption to achieve great heights in the 1995-1996 season.

Led by senior co-captains Anthony Bolden and Jeff Campisi, the Golden Rams opened the season by winning the Suburban Cable Tip-Off Classic held at West Chester. In November, WCU broke Philadelphia Textile Ram's 80-game winning streak by winning an exciting over-time victory 68-65.

The fighting Rams also pulled off a huge upset by knocking off the 12th ranked California (PA) 82-72 in December. Then in January, they were down 43-17 in a match against the Marauders of Millersville with 12 minutes to play. WCU made an extraordinary comeback in what many say was the greatest comeback in West Chester University Men's Basketball history. The Golden Rams won the game 63-62.

West Chester ended their 1995-96 season with a tough game against Bloomsburg. The lead was bounced back and forth the whole game with the Rams holding out for the victory.

Red-shirted freshman, Donta Evans, had a fantastic year for the Golden Rams. Evans has been piling up awards his rookie season. He was named ECAC II Co-Rookie of the Week and also ECAC II Weekly Honor Roll. Donta was also named the PSAC East Rookie of the Week eight times, and the WCU Athlete of the week twice. He also received awards from both the Emil H. Messikomer, Jr., Memorial Endowed Basketball Scholarship Fund, and the Robert W. Resse Scholarship Fund. At the end of the 1995-96 season, Donta Evans was named the PSAC East Rookie of the Year, and was named to the All-PSAC East Second Team.

Evan's teammate Anthony Bolden also received many accolades this season. Bolden was honored as the Sam Cozen Award winner. He was twice named PSAC Eastern Division Player of the Week. He was named to all-tournament teams at WCU, Mercyhurst, IUP and a WCU Athlete of the Week. Anthony Bolden was also named to the All-PSAC East Second Team.

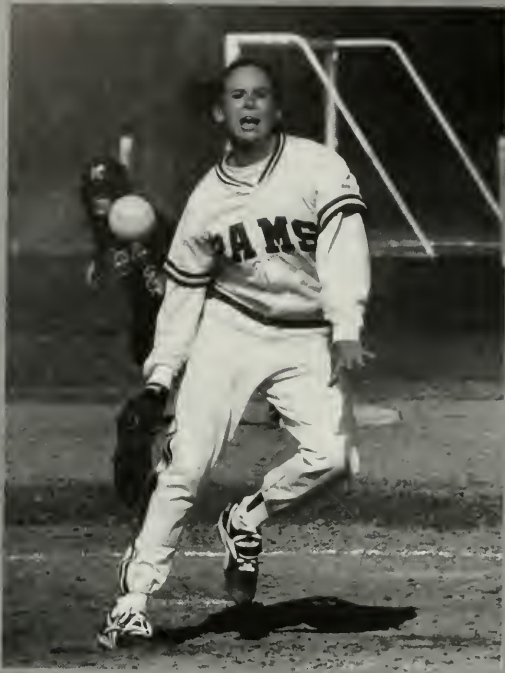
Striking Out the Opposition!

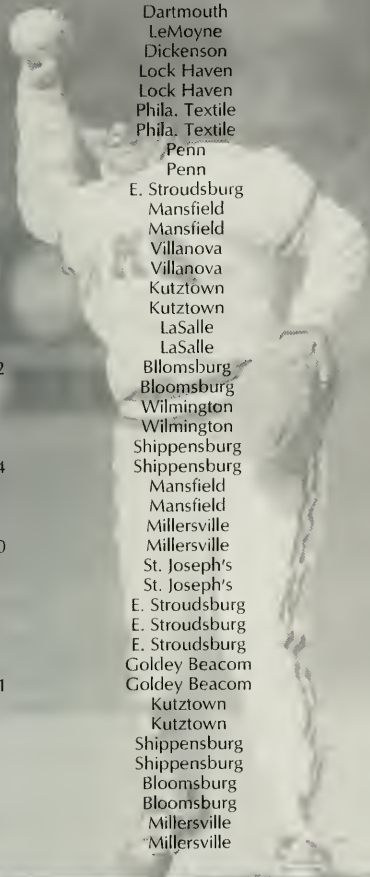

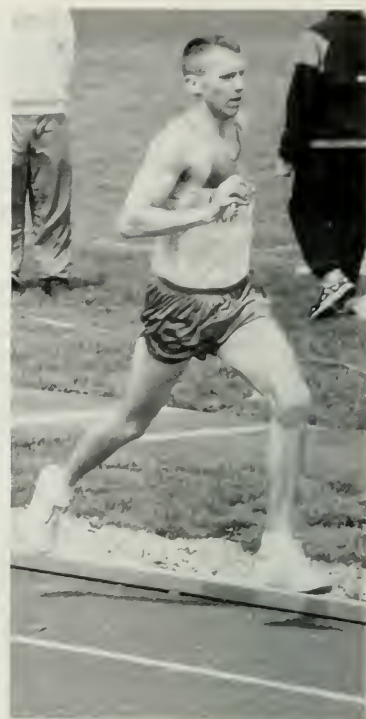
Decade of Champions!
