



# Construction Watch Your Step!








Throughout the years the building has always obtained a "home-like atmosphere" which allows it to rank as one of the student's favorite buildings. It was named after the first African-American member who taught at the university from 1961-1972.





Francis Harvey Green Library was built in the 1960's. It contains thousands of volumes, microfilms and fiche, and plenty of tables and carrels for studying and socializing. It also houses one of the coziest meeting places on campus in the Special Collections Room.

A part-time home to many of the students who attend this institution, Sykes Student Union offers so many programs under it's roof. Most of the student organizations offices are located here along with the fitness center, game room, the bookstore, theater, and food court. Programs are always occurring in the meeting rooms and ball-rooms which include speakers and concerts.



#### The Foundation








# Student Life

Life in the Residence Halls

or many students during their time at West Chester University, the residence halls become their home away from home. Moving into the residence halls is the first time in most students' lives that they have lived away from mom and dad. Each of these bouldings accommodates between 59 and 49 students in eight or ten apartments. Each apartment houses four or five students and contains a living room, full kitchen, and bathroom. f places to live while attending West Chester University were placed in three steps, then living in the apartments at South Campus would be step one, and living off-campus would be step three. Living in the apartments at South Campus is a mixture between living in the dorms and living off-campus.

Life in the apartments is similar to life in the dorms. The South Campus Apartment Assistant (A.A. - not to be mistaken for Alcoholics Anonymous) is similar to the North Campus Resident Assistant (R.A.). A convenience store located at the South Campus Apartment Complex also includes a computer lab, a front desk, and everyone's mailboxes (as in the dorms). Life in the apartments is also similar to life in a house or apartment off-campus. Each apartment includes a living room, a kitchen, and a bathroom. You have the independence and freedom of living in your own place, without having to pay rent, and water and electric bills. (This is all included in the housing part of your tuition bill.)

You have to buy and cook your own meals - which definitely has to be better than eating cafeteria food unless you really are a bad cook. You share a bathroom with four other people, not forty other people as in the dorms. 


"The Real World: West Chester"

▲ Tony Campolo, Ph.D., is the professor of sociology and the director of the urban studies program at Eastern College. Dr. Campolo is the Founder and President of the Evangelical Association for the Promotion of Education, an organization involved in educational, medical, and economic programs in Third World countries and at-risk oung people in urban America. Dr. Campolo is often quoted by President Clinton for his work with the youth of he world. Tony Campolo recieved his undergraduate legree from Eastern College and Ph.D. degree from Temble. He spoke on the topic, "Is Jesus a Republican or Democrat?" on Wednesday, September 3rd.



▲ David Horowitz is the President of the Center for the Study of Popular Culture. Seeking to "stimulate" the minds of his audience, Horowitz, 1960s left wing radical turned conservaive speaker and author, spoke on Wednesday October 22nd on such controversial topics as racism, affirmative action and he black community. Horowitz, president of the Los Angeles based Center for the Study of Popular Culture, co-editor of the book "The Race Card" and author of "The Radical Son", his nutobiography, voiced his right wing views to an anxious rowd



She spoke about her book, "Who Said It Would Be Easy?: One Woman's Life in the Political Arena" on Wednesday, October 29th. Her book concentrates on a life of commitment to issues and leadership on multiple positions of power and responsibili-

Dr. Lapchick serves as an advisor to everend Jesse Jackson and the Rainbow Companion on Fairness in Sport and to the players attions of the NBA and NFL.

■ Walter Naegle, Executive Director of the Bayard Rustin Fund and life partner of Bayard Rustin, and Norman Hill, President of the A. Philip Randolph Institute and Bayard Rustin successor as head of the historical organization, spoke together in tribute to the historical working relationship between Martin Luter King, Jr. and Bayard Rustin during the civil rights era. These two men spoke on the topic: Bayard Rustin and Martin Luther King, Jr.: Collaborative Leadership Development in the Civil Rights Movement on Tuesday, January 20th.



▶ Dickie Noles is known for his pitching performance in game four of the 1980 World Series. But one pitch in the game made him infamous. It was high and inside; its purpose was to brush back Kansas City's George Brett. Some claim the pitch was a turning point in the series. It motivated the Phillies to win their only World Series title. Now some 17 years later, his new pitch is thrown to brush back young people from using drugs and alcohol. Noles began drinking heavily as a teenager. A brilliant baseball career was shortened because of the devastating effects of his alcohol abuse. In 1990 his dedication to educating thousands of children, teachers and parents on the dangers of substance abuse began. Dickie Noles presented a program on his life story and it's meaning to today's youth on April 6th.





▲ Alexis Moore is a member of the Editorial Board of the Philadelphia Inquirer. She joined the board as a writer and columnist upon her return to Washington, D.C. where she served as national correspondent. Moore visited WCU on February 4th to discuss the memoir of Ruth Wright Hayre, the first fulltime African American teacher in the Philadelphia public school system, the first African-American senior high school principal, and the first woman president of the Philadelphia Board of Education, her co-author of the book titled "Tell Them We Are Rising." This is the story of the family and traditions that inspired that phenomenal gift, which took 116 boys and girls through six years of public school life on the wings of one woman's determination to make a difference in their lives.



■ Donna Red Wing joined the Human Rights Commission as its national field director in 1996 to build the movement from the grassroots up. Red Wing presented a speech entitled "Postcards From the Front: An Overview of Gay and Lesbian Activism Around the Country" on March 24th. In it, she stressed the importance of gays and lesbians actively and effectively combating the lies and stereotypes that the radical right suggests.


#### 1997-1998 The Year in Review







- WCU senior Kelly Rech is currently living her dream of being a professional dancer; she is in her second season as a dancer for the 76'ers basketball team.
   A crowd of nearly 10,000 people turned out to enjoy the offerings of local restaurants and caterers, breweries and wineries at the 18th annual Chester County Restaurant Festival in downtown West Chester.
  - Two female students were assaulted in two separate incidents, one at an off-campus party and the other in Miner Alley.
- The University changed its student purging policy, sending letters to 1,103 students informing them that they are no longer a student a West Chester University. This happened when students didn't pay their bills in time or have their financial and approved.
- W'CU was reviewed in the October issue of Philadelphia magazine, and the outcome of the review was not at all flattering. They related the GPA's of students to their blood alcohol level, classified students as apathetic and dressing in baseball caps and midriff-blaring tops.
- Approximately 10 West Chester Borough police officers, accompanied by two undercover agents from the Liquor Control Enforcement Board, stopped a keg
  party on 610 N. High Street. They handed the residents a search warrant, and cited some 60 under age drinkers for various alcohol-related charges, arresting
  four people.
- The Share-a-Bike program allows students, faculty and staff to ride a bike to their destination, and put it back in the bike rack for the next person. The bikes were donated to the school, bought at garage sales or were abandoned bikes that were left on the racks.
- Students celebrated "National Coming Out Day" when two student organizations Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Services and the Safe Space Alliance informed the student body about issues surrounding the gay community. "National Coming Out Day" is the day designated for lesbian, gay and bisexual people to reveal to their families, friends and co-workers their sexual orientation.
  - Esteemed professor and educator Dr. Shirley Ann Walters passed away from cancer.
- The Irving H. Cohen Memorial Recital was held in Swope Hall, sponsored by Sara H. Cohen. Paul Kreider, baritone; Rebecca Abram Kreider, soprano; and Richard Veleta, piano, were featured in the recital.
  - Mark Lukanski lost all his belongings in a tragic fire at 529 S. Matlack.
- Sykes Student Union Building underwent repairs again; construction crews replaced the square tablets of stone which line the outside walkways of Sykes.
   Cafe Chicane, a restaurant more likely to be found in downtown Philadelphia, arrived on High Street.
- Student Government Association President Peter Kulp was elected to a State Board position; he is vice-chairperson of the state's Board of Student Government Presidents.
- Despite the number of parties that have been busted by the West Chester Police and the LCE, 25 E. Bernard Street held its third annual Oktoberfest with over 150 people in attendance.
- WCU celebrated "Alcohol Awareness Week"; this year's purpose was not to preach against the act of consuming alcohol, but instead to make students more aware of how their decisions affect lives.
- The Community Service student organization of West Chester University donated books to over 700 children in the Chester County Area on National Make a Difference Day.
- WCUR, after 25 years of waiting, finally received an FM construction permit from the FCC authorizing permission to build, secure and operate an FM station for one year.
- The 20th annual Brian's Run, the main race which consisted of 10 kilometers, took place. The day also offered a two-mile walk, a one mile open fun run, a two mile open fun run, and a one mile children's fun run.
  - · Lunchbox Heroes, a local college band consisting of three WCU students, appeared on the "Jenny Jones" talk show.
- The "Midnight Masturbator", a man who was charged with indecent exposure, open lewdness, and disorderly conduct after a police undercover sting
  operation nabbed this accused habitual flasher and masturbator.
- West Chester University Associate Art professor, Victor Lasuchin, celebrated 50 years of his oils, watercolors, lithographs and silkscreens with faculty and students at the McKinney art gallety in Mitchell Hall.
- The Union Advisory Board (UAB) held the Battles, Beans and Books Extravaganza in Sykes Student Union Building to showcase the new coffee cart, the game room and the book store. The most noticeable change was the addition of the coffee cart, which sells Starbuck's coffee products.







#### Field Hockey

A-10 Regular Season Champs

he West Chester University Field Hockey team stirred up the Atlantic 10 in the NCAA Division I. After a 0-5 record in the 1996 season the Golden Rams claimed their first Atlantic 10 victory in history against St. Josephs. This was the beginning of the remarkable 1997 season

Under mid-East Region Coach of the Year, Kathy Krannebitter, this team of fierce competitors came together. The trio of seniors Mary Melnick, Kristin Smereczynski, and Heather Vearling led this team to a perfect 5-0 A-10 season. These three were also selected 1997 National Field Hockey Coaches Association Mideast Regional First Team All-Americans. Melnick, who was named the Atlantic 10 Player of the Year, was the leader among WCU scorers with 26 points and 10 goals. Smereczynski led the team with eight assists and finished second on the team in both points and goals. Vearling, one of the top Division I goalkeepers in the nation, compiled a 15-4 record, playing in every game of the season. Her goals against average was an astounding 0.99, and she had eight shutouts in 19 games

In only their second season in the Division I Atlantic 10 Conference, the Golden Rains of WCU beat all of their opponents for a title. They finished with a 15-4 overall record, the best since 1987 and its first winning season since 1991. The team entered the NCAA Division 1 Championship Tournament as the top seed Although they eventually fell to the University of Massachusetts in the title game, the Golden Rains have succeeded in writing their own worst to first story.
















#### Women's Volleyball











#### Three Points Ahead





This year i Lady Rains not only earned their seventh consecutive PSAC Championship Tir making this the 12th title for WCU, but they made their mark in history as well. The WC Women's Lacrosse team was the first NCAA Division II team to ever be selected for the Divisio Women's Lacrosse Championship Tournament. Even though the Rams fell in the opening rou of this tournament, they gave a valuant performance trailing only 3-1 to the 1997 Division National's Runner Up squad. 


#### Criminal Justice Association
