




The year 2001-2002 began like any other. **Students**


Academic Buildings










Academic Quad


Academic Quad


Academic Buildings


Studying




Summer Orientation





Residence Halls



Ramsey Hall

Ramsey Hall, named after former English professor Dorothy Ramsey, is one of three Yshaped buildings on North Campus. Ramsey Hall sits on the corner of Sharpless and New Streets next to the Lawrence Center. It is the oldest residence hall and has 6 floors. This residence hall houses approximately 400 students and is a co-ed building. It has pool tables, study lounges vending machines and a kitchen for its residents to use. Ramsey Hall is also home to a study center for students which is located in the basement

Tyson Hall

Tyson Hall is the second of the Y-shaped buildings and is named after Elizabeth S. Tyson. Ms. Tyson was the pioneer of West Chester University's Speech Clinic. Tyson Hall houses about 450 male and female students living on co-ed floors and wings. There are three wings connected by a common lobby where students can study or hang out with their friends. This hall has seven floors and has ping pong tables, pool tables and air hockey tables in the first floor lobby.





Goshen Hall

Goshen Hall, named after forme Psychology Chair and public educatic specialist Anne M. Goshen, is the third Y shaped building and houses around 45 male and female students. As another of ed residence hall, Goshen is comprised (single sex and co-ed wings. This residence hall also has a common lobby for the students it houses and has various recreational activities such as pool table and ping pong tables in its first floor lobby



Sanderson Hall

nderson Hall is named after WCU alumni ristian C. Sanderson. He was an artist, writer, storian and a teacher. Sanderson Hall is a nine or co-ed residence hall. This residence hall uses around 350 students in its single sexed d co-ed wings. Located in the Residential rad in front of Sanderson are lighted volleyball d basketball courts.

McCarthy Hall

McCarthy Hall, named after first Dean of Women Grace D. McCarthy, is an all female residence hall. It is the only single sex residence hall on campus and houses approximately 250 females. Located in McCarthy's basement is the McCarthy Children's Center. The center allows students to learn teaching skills while working with small children.





Schmidt Hall

hmidt Hall is named after Gertrude K. Schmidt was the under of the music program here at WCU. Schmidt Hall a "V" shaped co-ed residence hall and houses about 400 idents. Schmidt is located on the corner of Rosedale and w Streets across from the Calvery Luthern Church.



Wayne Hall

Named after General Anthony Wayne who served with George Washington in the Revolutionary War, Wayne Hall is a nine floor residence hall that houses approximately 350 male and female students on six of its floors. PACE and the Health Center also reside in Wayne Hall.



Killinger Hall

Home of the "Killer Bees" Killinger Hall is a "U" shaped residence hall and is named after Glenn Killinger former Dean of Men and football coach. Also known as K-hall is the only residence hall with a 24 hour quiet policy for all of its floors. Khall houses approximately 300 male and femal students, many who belong in the pre-med and Honor programs.

Familiar Sightings








Free Time











Homecoming
















Deck Party

Brian's Run












































Seniors


