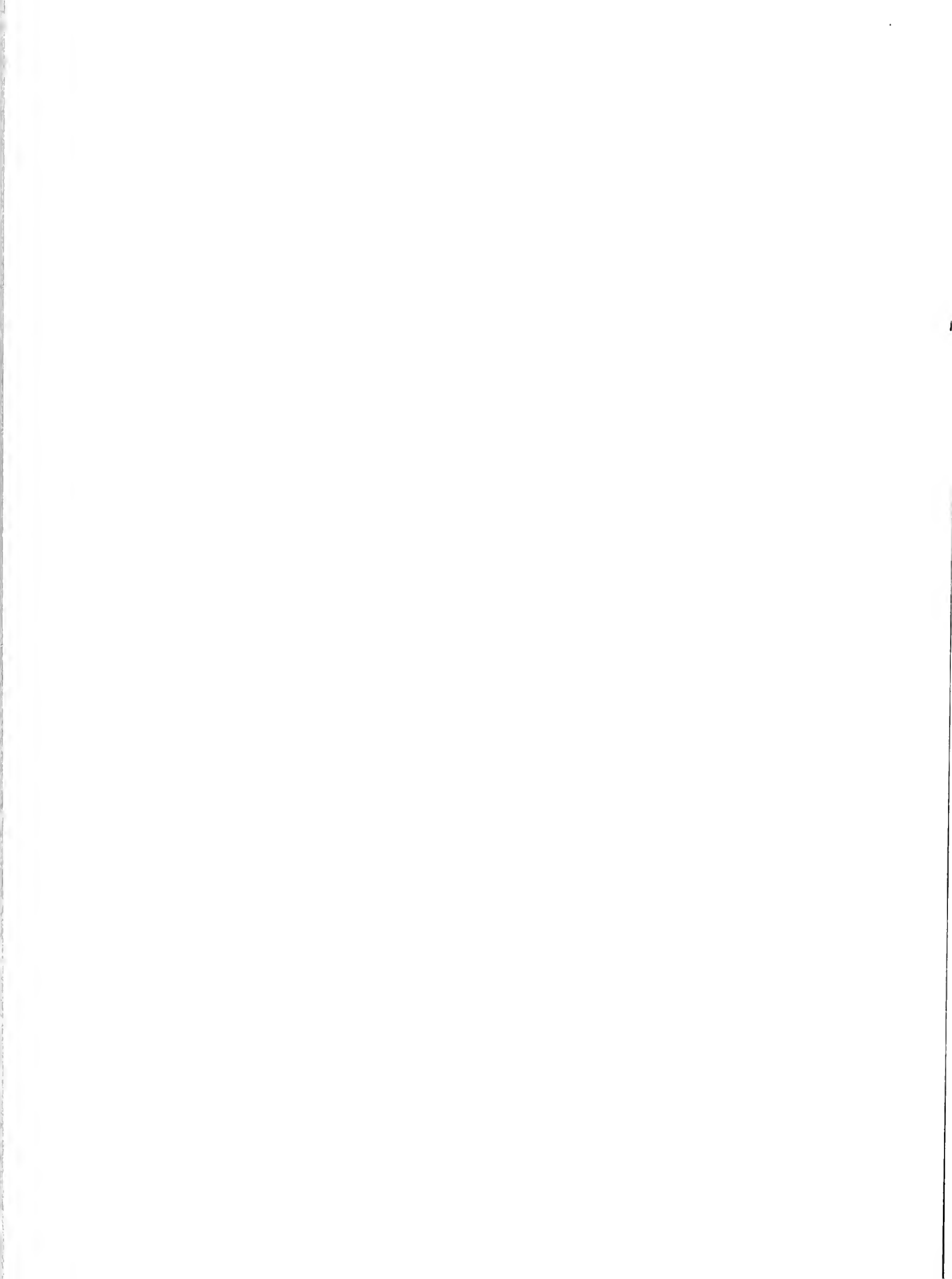

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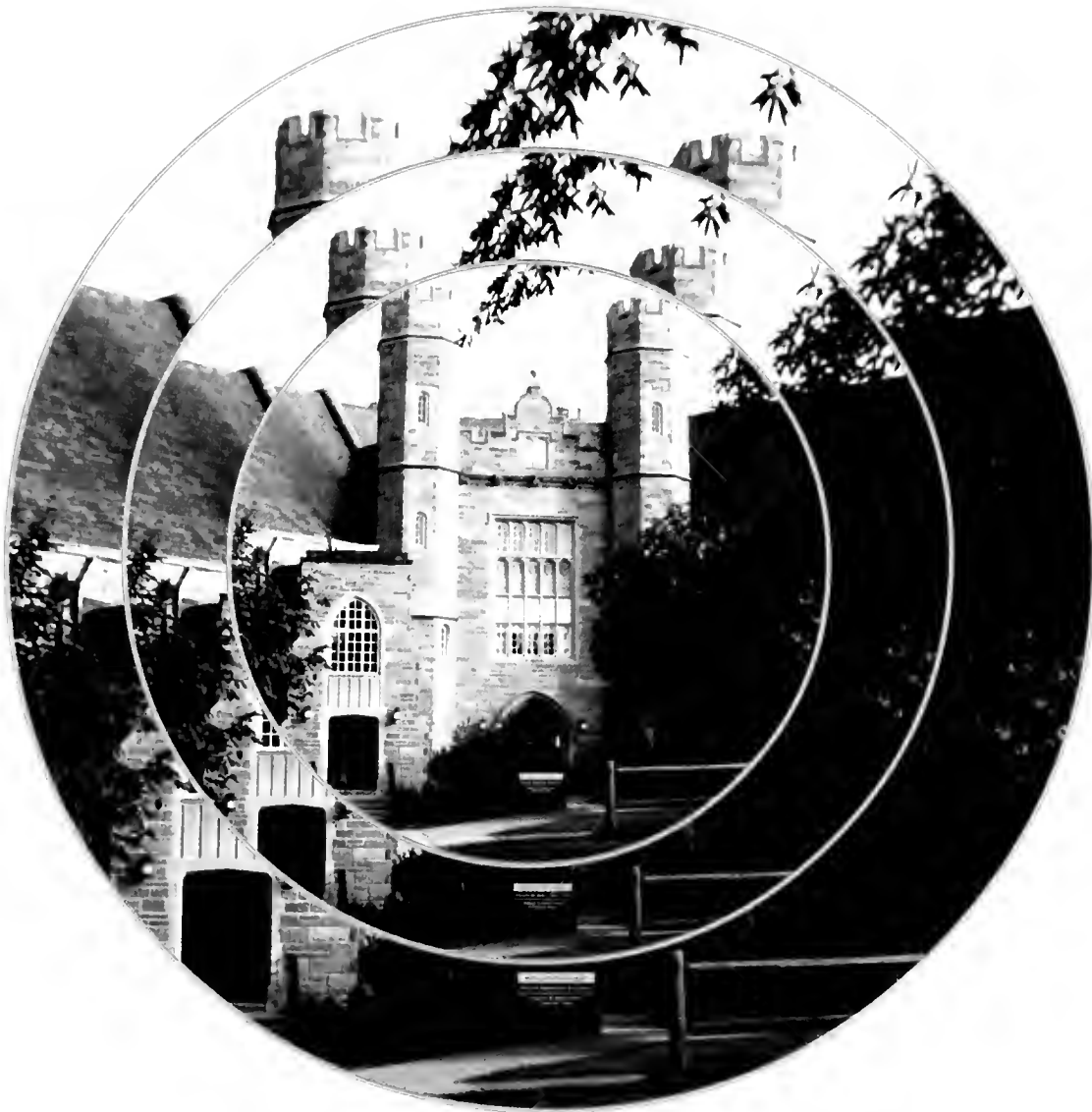

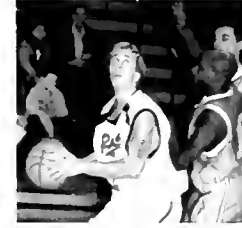
Right on Time

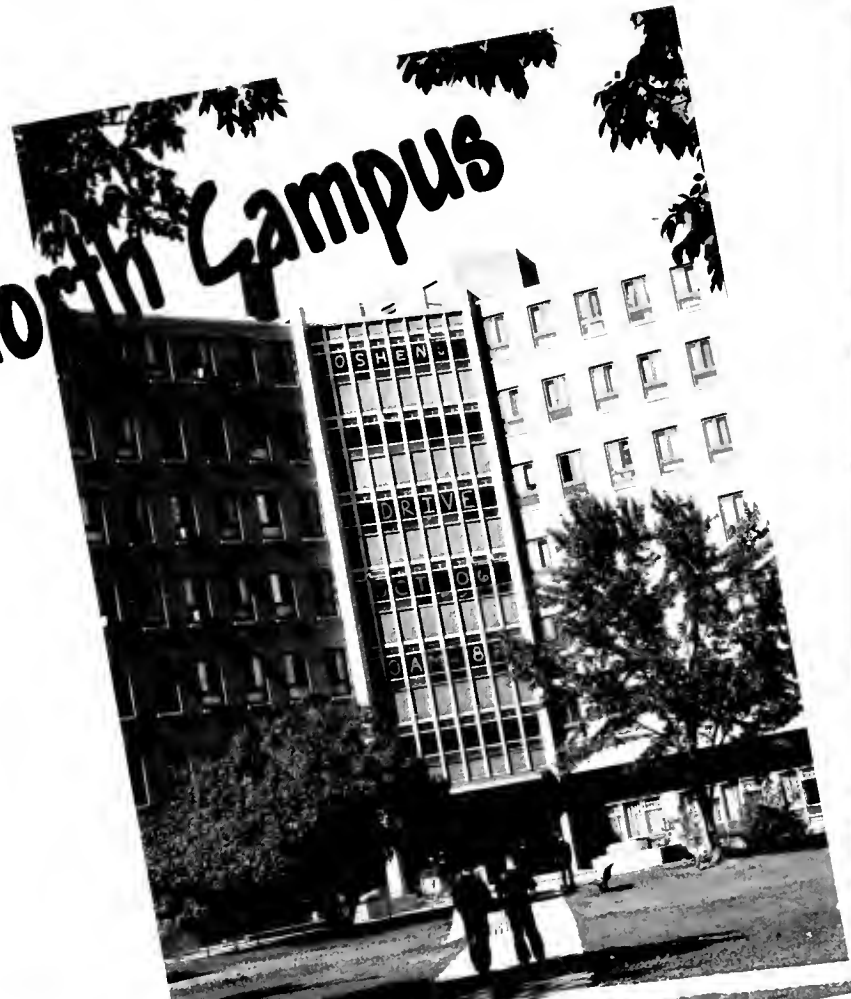
Direct Hit!

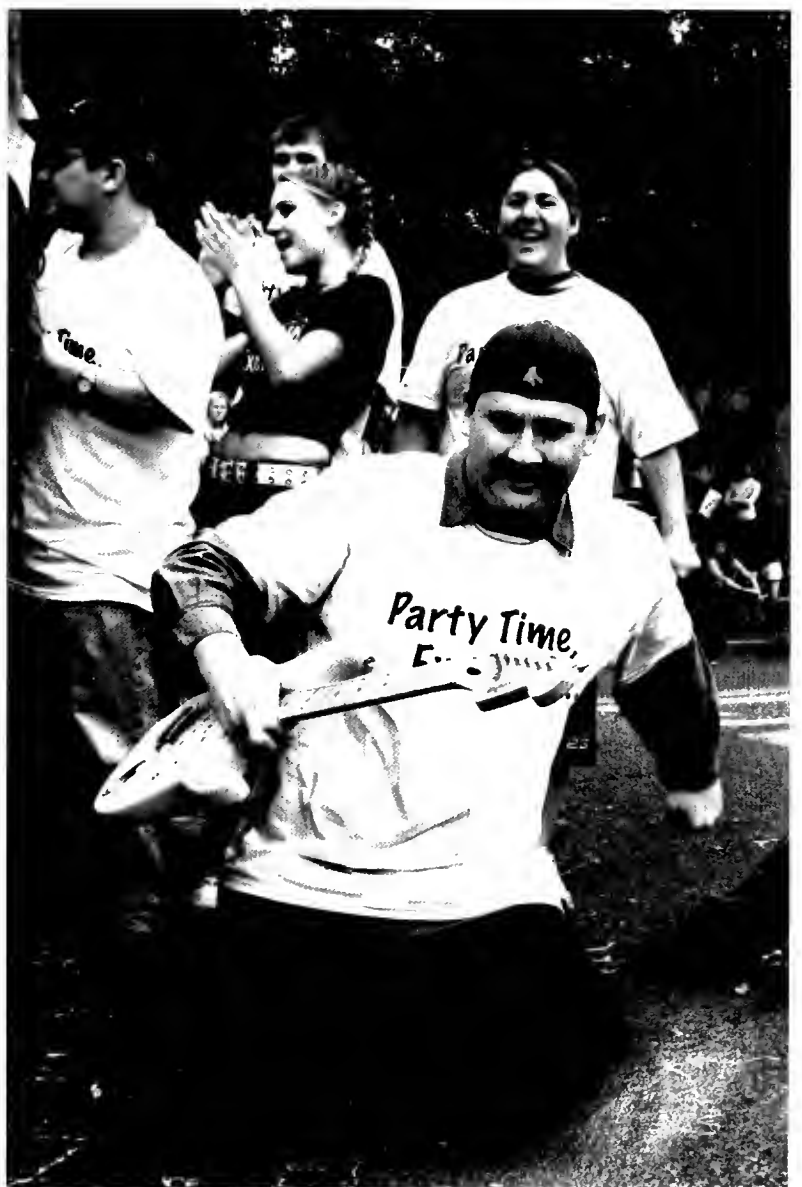

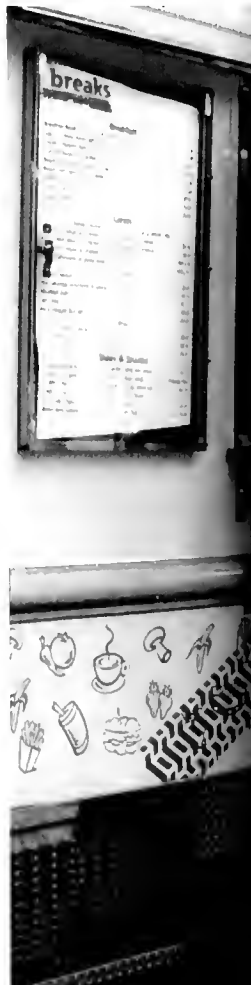

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An Updated Student Identification Card and Dining Changes Offers Students New Choices and Flexibility

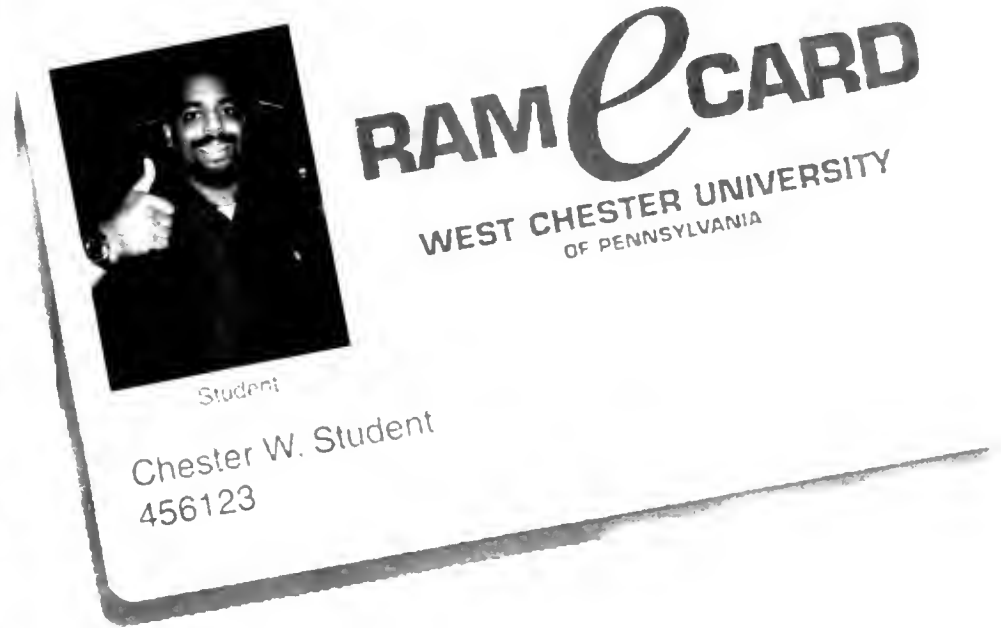

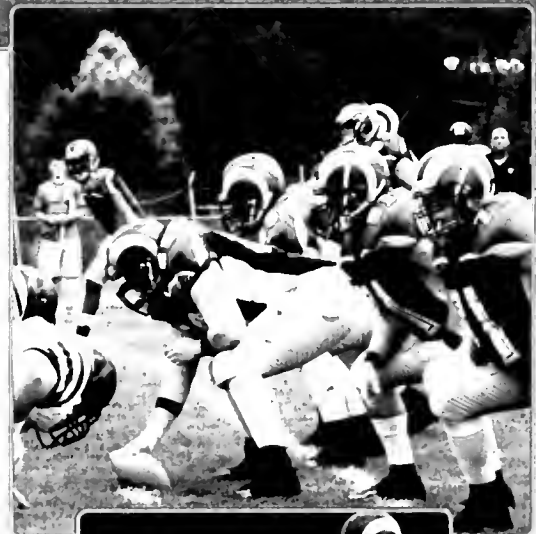
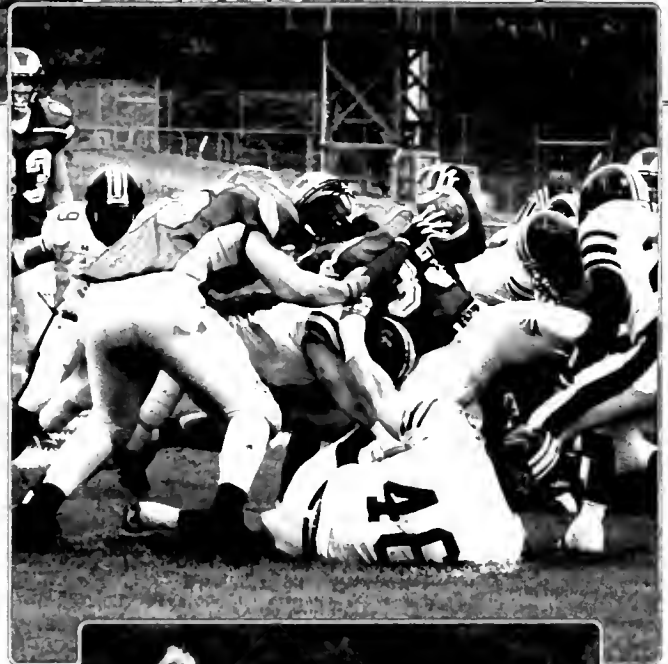
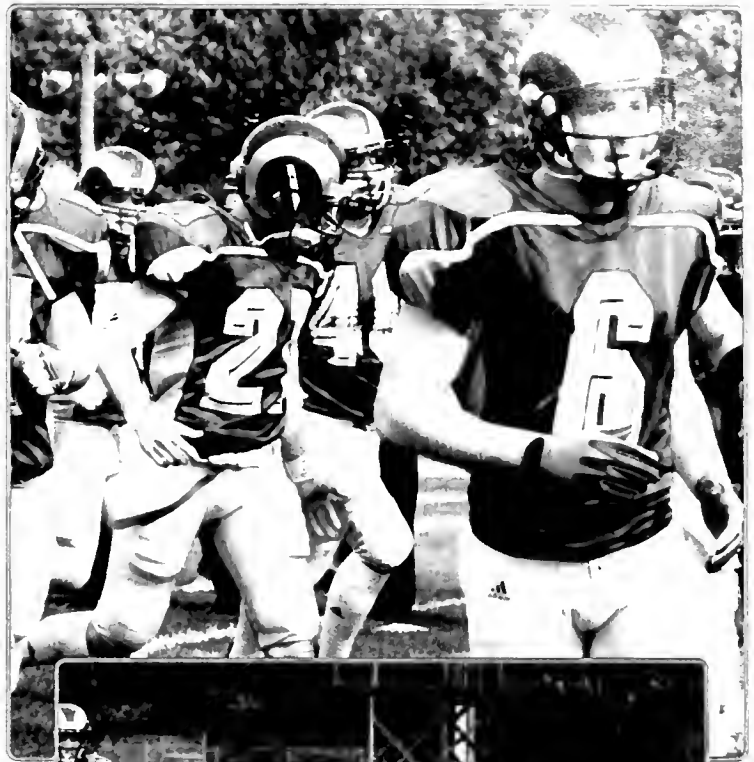
HOMECOMING

Spirited Rams Push Past Millersville

Bonfires, pep rallies, parades, tons of people dressed in purple and gold? This can only mean one thing. It's HOMECOMING! The 2004 Homecoming game kicked off at 2 p.m. on Saturday, October 9. On this beautiful, sunny afternoon, fans of all ages filled the stands to cheer on our Golden Rams. The Rams got off to a great start with an interception from Millersville's quarterback, which led to a touchdown. By the end of the first quarter the Rams led the Marauders by a 14-0 lead. Fans were kept entertained during halftime with a sensational musical performance from the WCU Marching Band and the revealing of this year's Homecoming King and Queen. The crowns went to Andrew Walker and Danielle Evans, both of the Black Student Union.

However, in the fourth quarter Millersville cut West Chester's lead to 21-16 with 6:38 left on the clock. Fortunately, WCU came back to score a field goal and later another touchdown, giving the Rams the much-needed cushion of a lead. In the end, West Chester came out victorious with a 31-16 win over the Marauders of Millersville. Students, alumni, staff and WCU fans took to their feet at the end of the game to cheer on and congratulate their winning Golden Rams football team!

Political Events Run on the Campaign Trail



With a large focus on getting the vote out among young people this year, and Pennsylvania being one of the major swing states this time around, WCU students lucked out as pit stops for both parties' campaign trails.

On September 30, Vanessa Kerry, the 27-year-old daughter of John Kerry, spoke to a crowd of over 500 in the Sykes Ballrooms, discussing her father's vision for America, criticizing the Bush administration, and stressing the importance of young people voting.

Ms. Kerry talked about issues with importance to students, including her father's ideas about tuition and plans to increase accessible grant money. She said of her father, "He really believes in his gut that everyone in America deserves every chance that he has had."

Ms. Kerry was funny and personable in addressing the students, joking that trying to memorize all of her father's policies so that she can answer questions knowledgeably and truthfully was harder than medical school. During a question and answer session with students, when she did not know an answer she told the audience that she was unsure, and offered an e-mail address to direct questions so that she could research and find an answer.

Former New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani, who's approval ratings soared after his handling of the September 11 attacks on his city, spoke at the Goodwill Fire Company on October 3 to stress the importance of re-electing President Bush. Other speakers included local politicians such as West Chester Mayor Dick Yoder, Congressmen Jim Gerlach and Curt Weldon, State Representative Eleanor Z. Taylor and Senator Bob Thompson.



Giuliani discussed the war on terror, saying that Bush is "going on the offense with terrorism instead of just on the defense," and also talked about the president's developments in homeland security.

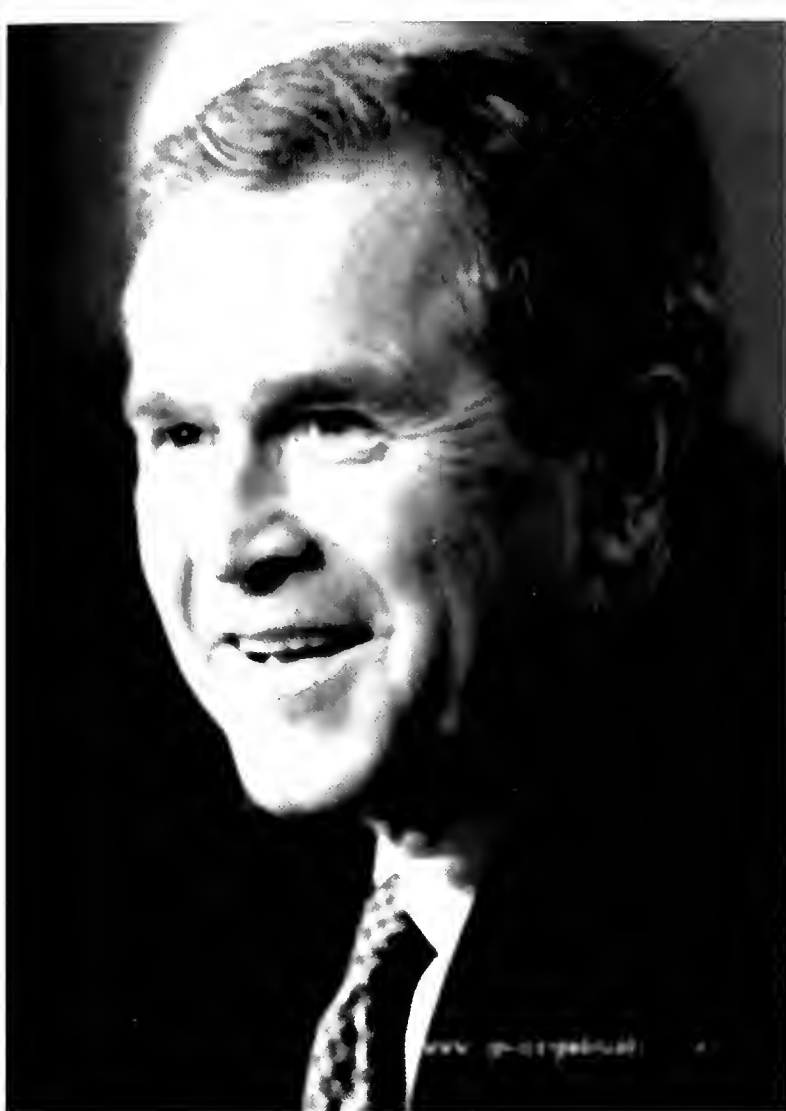
Giuliani also said that the current administration believed in the need for better health care prices, but claimed that Kerry would destroy the system.

West Chester students affiliated with either party greatly benefitted from these appearances, getting a local chance to feel the electricity of a political rally and the power of believing in something.

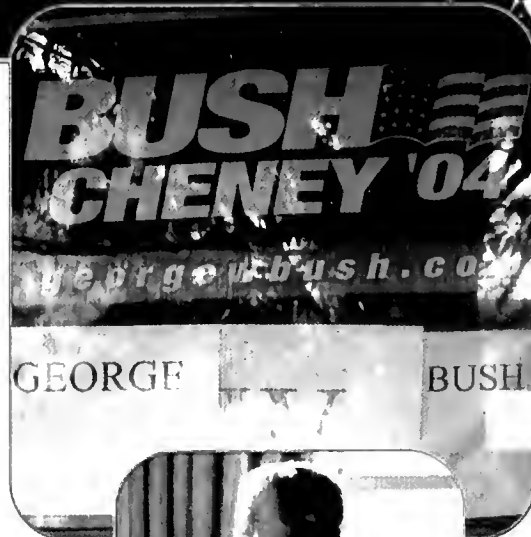
Pulse of Politics

An Impressive Line-up of Speakers Impresses Students

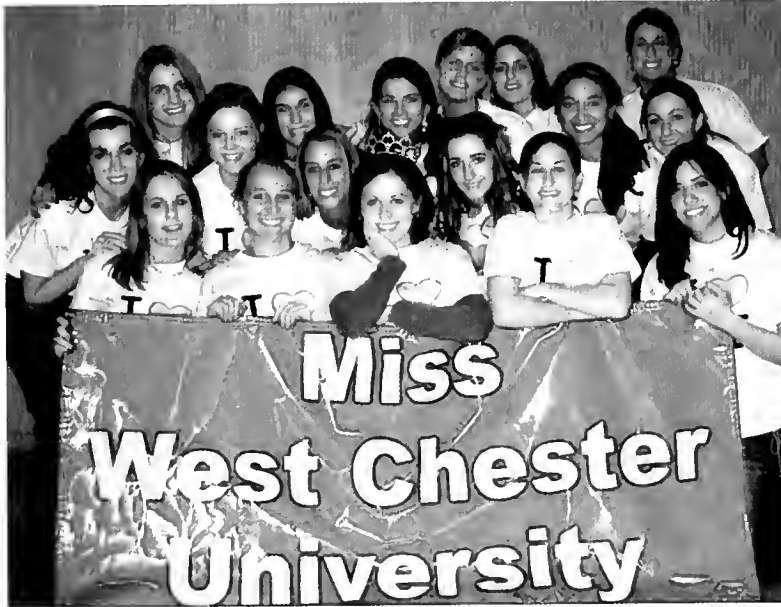
Each year, West Chester University offers a plethora of programs designed to enhance a student's mind and inform them about cultural topics they might be less knowledgeable about. This year was no different. West Chester did a wonderful job of offering fantastic fall LUVIM speakers. LUVIM is an acronym for Leadership, Unity, Volunteerism/Image Maker programs. Many of the topics this fall revolved around the war and politics because of the war's significant presence in our lives and this year's presidential election. There were also programs designed around leadership issues and accomplishing goals.

Seventeen programs were offered this semester. These programs invited such guests as David Swanson and David Zucchini (2), who gave views of the war and discussed their experiences being embedded with troops overseas. Bob Barr (7) talked about the Patriot Act and Dr. Michael Radu (10) was a key speakers in the teach-in, focusing his attention on supporting the war in Iraq. The teach-in also had two other noted speakers, Bobby Muller (13) and Dr. H. Bruce Franklin (8), speaking on their views about the war in Iraq. The month of September is Latino Awareness Month and WCU featured award-winning filmmaker/producer, Jesus Nebot (4). Asian Awareness Month, in October, brought Vickie Nam(3), who talked about being an Asian girl and growing up Asian-American.

Historic poets and writers graced WCU with their presence as well. Acclaimed poet Nikki Giovanni (6) shared her famous poems from the Black Art Movement and Joyce Johnson (1) discussed historic beat writers and her experiences living in that era. Leadership brought in exciting speakers such as Marie Wilson (12) and Randy Shaw (5) who promoted different leadership strategies. Good Politics, Good Music: An Evening with Holly Near (14) was a great success on West Chester's campus. And last but not least, WCU welcomed 1996 Olympic Gold Medalist, Derrick Adkins (11) to talk about his on-going battle with depression and how to beat the blues. The programs were a great success, offering a refreshing mix of information and entertainment.

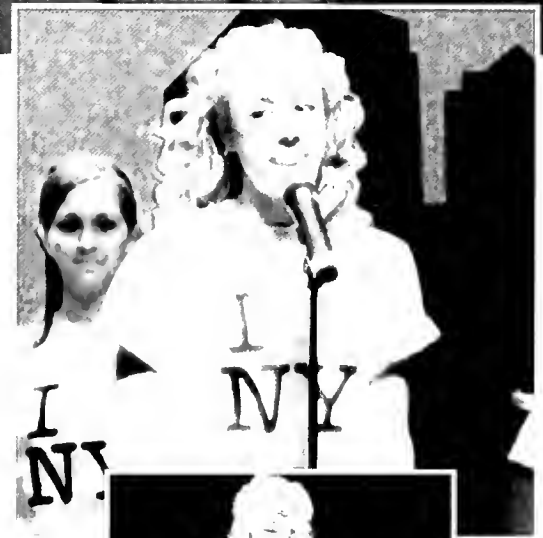
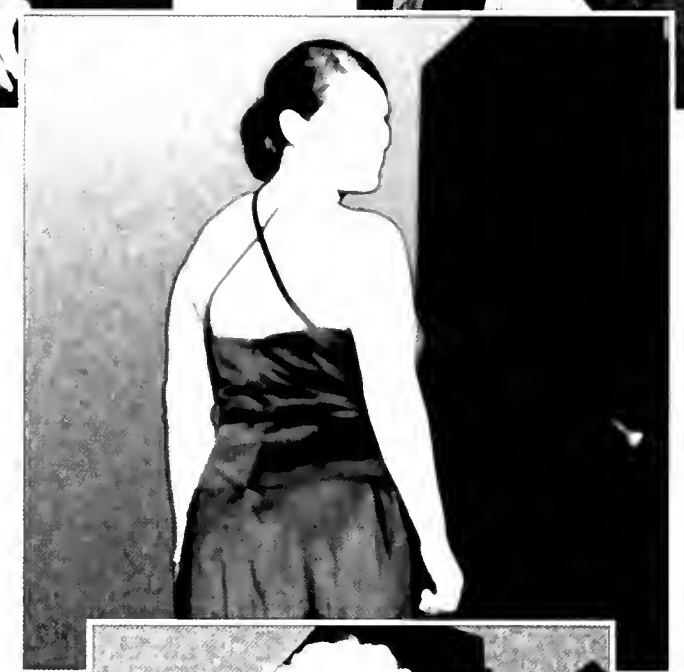

Brian's Run

The 27th Annual Brian's Run took place on December 5, 2004 throughout the town of West Chester. The event began as a benefit for Brian Bratcher, a football player at Henderson High School who was paralyzed during a scrimmage at the age of 15. The race was originally organized to help raise money for Brian's medical expenses. Far surpassing the goal of \$500 for the first year, 2,000 runners participated to raise \$20,000. After the second race, Brian felt that he had benefitted enough from the proceeds, and asked that Brian's Run be made an annual event to help other disabled members of the West Chester community.

This year, for the first time in the race's history, the West Chester Police Department's lead vehicle was forced to make a wrong turn, cutting out 1184 feet, or .22 of a mile, but this minor malfunction was mostly unimportant to the runners who were there for a much bigger cause.

West Chester University, as the host of Brian's Run, has contributed much to this event through the years. Students and employees helped with aspects such as printing registration forms, distributing applications, handling traffic, acquiring financial support, and finding lodging for the runners who come from all over the country. Many organizations participate in Brian's Run as one of their major service efforts.

The university's active participation and contribution to this worthy cause is a shining example of how WCU loves to give back to its community on this day of good health and good fun.

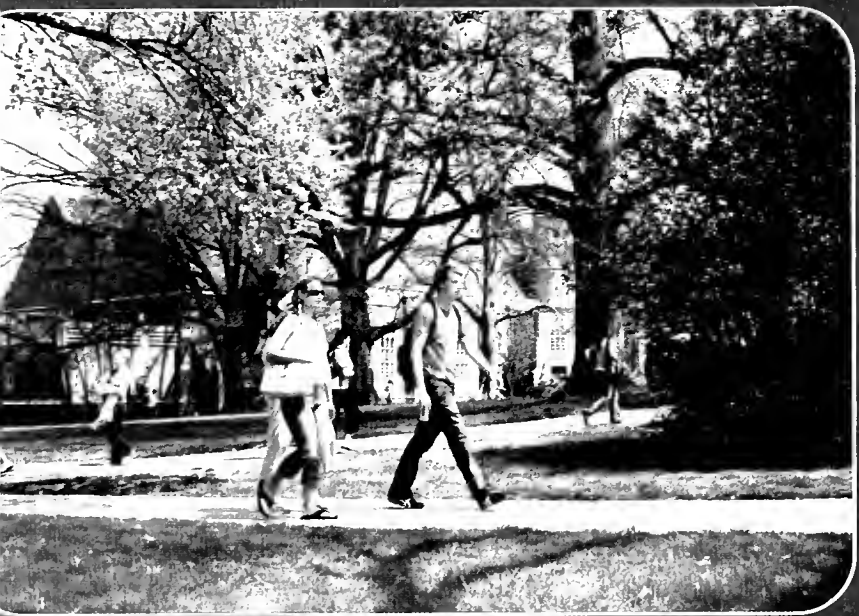

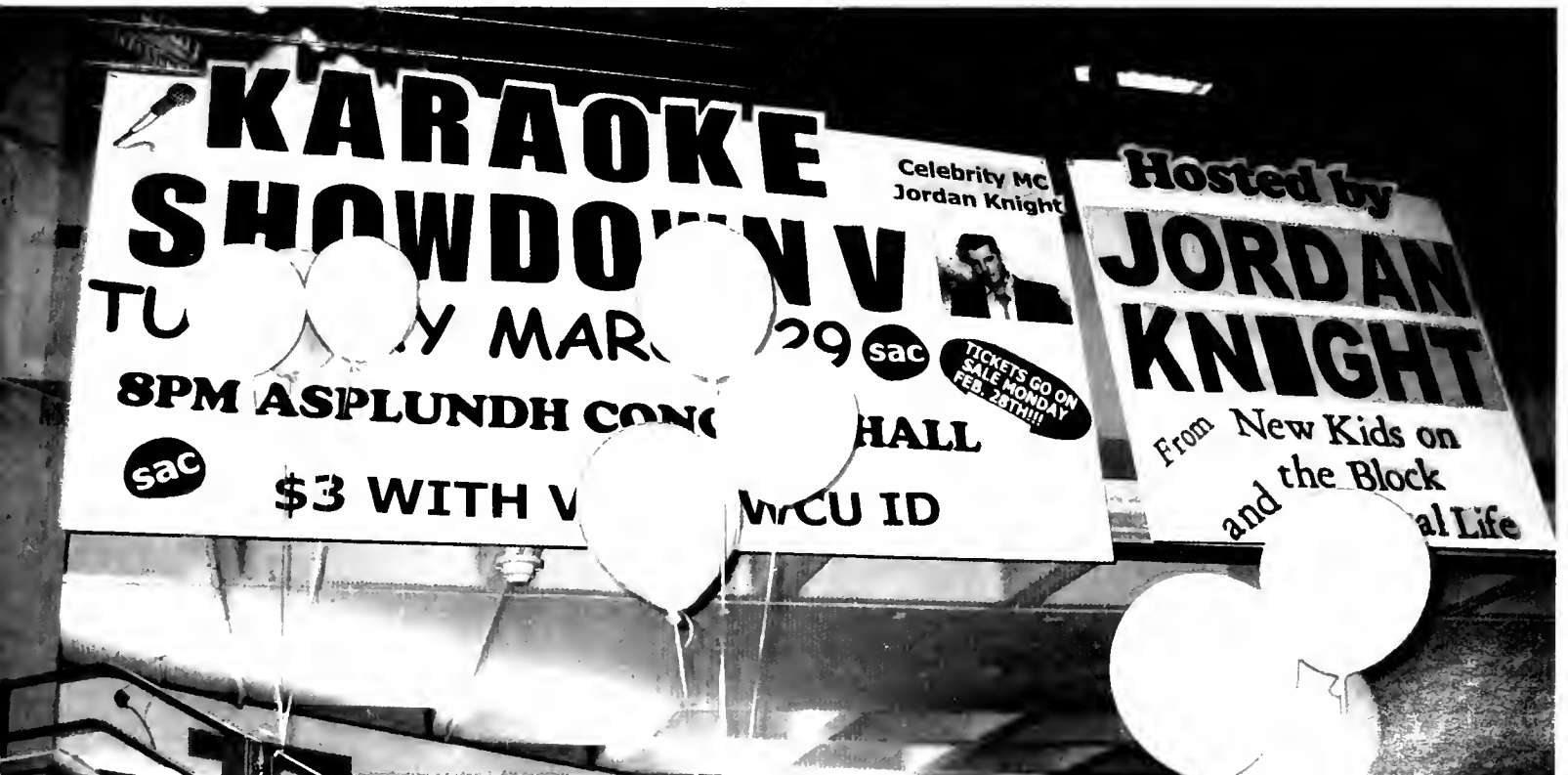
Keeping WCU Entertained: Student Activities Council

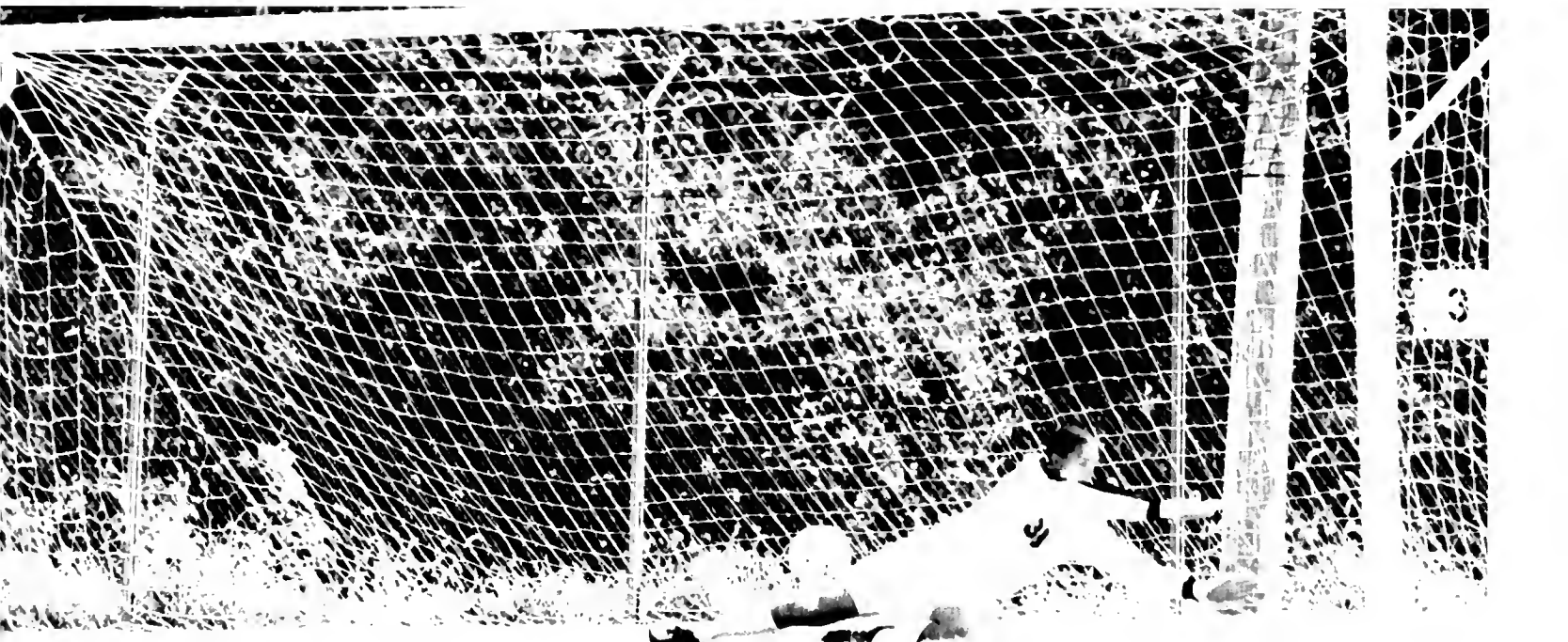
MEN'S SOCCER

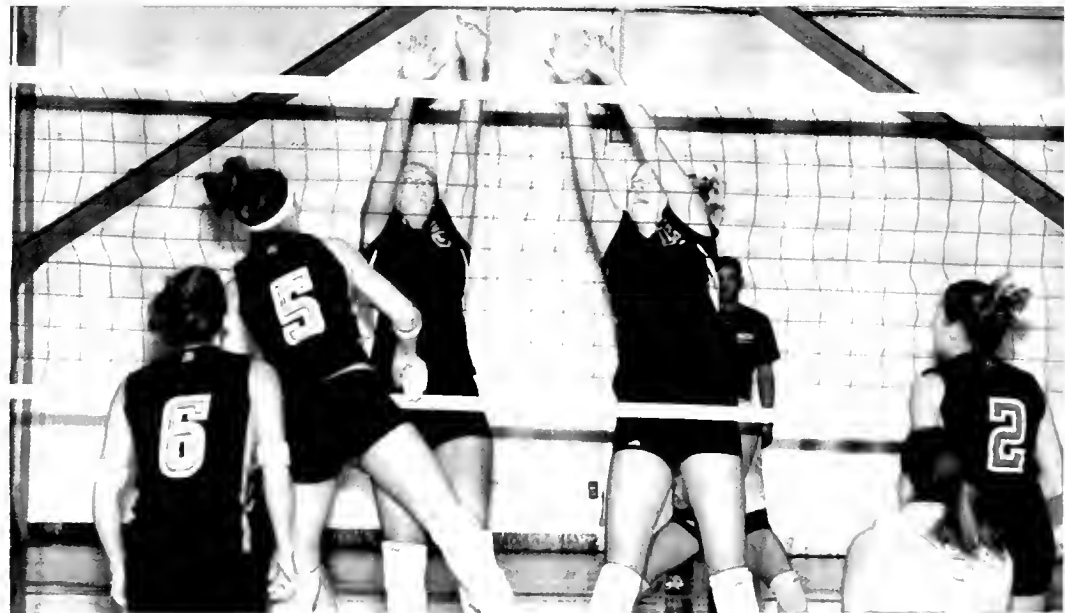

The Lady Rams volleyball team had a successful and memorable season. Early in the season, freshman Kristen Decker took honors as a PSAC East Player of the Week, then helped the team to victory against Bloomfield. Towards the end of the fall semester, the team made an NCAA Division II National Service ace record, overtaking Cheyney University in a 3-0 victory. Destroying the previous record of 33, from September of 2002, the girls slid in with 47 aces. In the Eastern Division of the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, the Rams went forward, defeating their opposition and scoring more than half of their points in service aces. This feat made them the first in NCAA Division II to ever achieve such. Freshman Michelle Wile was responsible for earning 19 of the service aces, which tied her for third place for service aces recorded in WCU's volleyball history. At second place is senior captain Valerie Louey with 20 aces in a three-game match, which she mastered against Cheyney on October 14th, 2003.

The end of October had the Golden Rams holding a new victory over Delaware State (Division I). Led by Louey, the team's other captain, junior Beth Foster, and sophomore Nicole Vetock, the girls now had an overall score of 15-11. The team then ended the season early in November with a 3-2 victory over Millersville, with their final score of the year at 17-12 overall, and a 5-5 in PSAC East.

Both the men's and the women's teams swept the 2004 Goldey-Beacon Invitational in Wilmington, and at the Dickinson Invitational, the men placed 14th overall, while the women claimed fourth place.

Cross country runners display an extraordinary endurance, and West Chester is proud of its Rams for their successful seasons. With such a young team under new leadership, we can only expect further greatness in years to come.

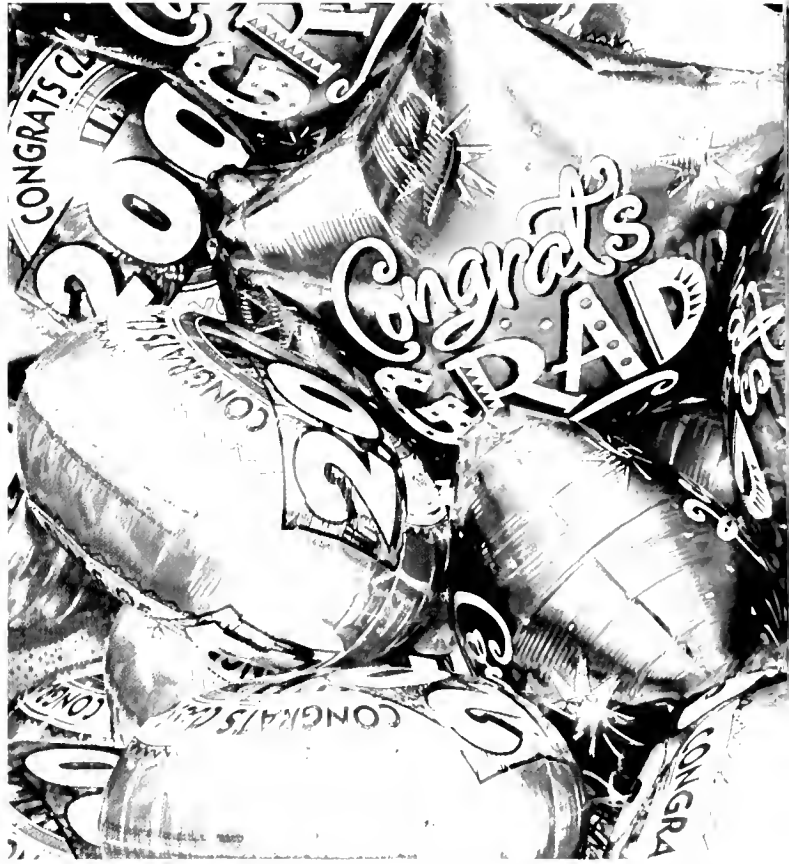








December Graduation
