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A SHAKESPEARE REFERENCE LIBRARY

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[Two considerations have mainly governed the choice of books in the accompanying list. In the first place college and school editions of Shake-speare's separate plays have been excluded, and mention is only made of books which seem to throw some original light on the study of Shakespeare's work or life. In the second place it has been deemed desirable to keep the total cost of the library within a limit of some twenty pounds.

Several books which deal with more specialized lines of study than might justify their admission to the general list, are noticed in an Appendix. Many of the volumes that figure in the Appendix are costly. But from among them the main library might well be supplemented from time to time as fundallowed. In making additions to the substantive list from the Appendix, it would be wise to give precedence to works of service in the study of the text.

Unless otherwise stated, the books mentioned are kept in print by the publishers. The dates of the latest editions are alone given. Those works marked † are included in 'A Short List of Books on English Literature from the Beginning to 1832, which has already been issued by the English Association (Leaflet No. 3, pub. 1907).

Students and librarians would be well advised in joining the Deutsche Shakespeare-Gesellschaft, of which the Jahrbuch or annual volume, published in May, supplies essays of value on Shakespearian themes together with an exhaustive review and bibliography of the year's Shakespearian literature. [This book contains, in addition to the Two Noble Kinsmen, the thirteen plays, for the authorship of which in whole or part Shakespeare has been occasionally held responsible, although on few grounds that merit attention. The plays are—*Arden of Feversham; Locrine; *Edward III; Mucedorus; Sir John Oldcastle; Thomas Lord Cromwell; The London Prodigal; The Puritan; A Yorkshire Tragedy; *The Merry Devil of Edmonton; Fair Em; The Birth of Merlin; Sir Thomas More. This collection is chiefly valuable as an illustration in a brief compass of the commonplace types of drama which were popular in the Elizabethan or Jacobean playhouses.

The three plays marked * in the above entry have been separately edited with preface, notes, and glossary in the Temple Dramatists. Dent. 1s. net each. Edward III has already been mentioned; Arden of Ferersham is edited by the Rev. Ronald Bayne; The Merry Devil of

Edmonton by Prof. Hugh Walker.]

[Those who are studying the problem of the Sonnets will find both Prof. Dowden's and Canon Beeching's comments useful, even though they dissent from some of the editorial conclusions. A different view of the Sonnets is offered in the present compiler's biography of the poet and in his editions of Shakespeare's works (see *infra* 11, § 1, and Appendix 1, § 1.]

2. GRAMMAR AND GLOSSARY

[It is essential to have access to a copy of the New English Dictionary edited by Sir James Murray, Dr. H. Bradley, and Dr. W. A. Craigie, now in course of publication by the Oxford University Press. Though the work does not contribute very much that is new to the interpretation of Shakespeare's vocabulary, it is invaluable for its historical treatment of words and for its amplitude of illustrative quotation.]

[An alphabetical list of all the words used by the poet, whether obsolete or not, with explanations and references to the text. Some of the interpretations in difficult passages are questionable, but as a whole the book is full and trustworthy.]

[An explanatory index of allusions to social customs as well as to obsolete words.]

[Shakespeare's vocabulary is here exhaustively indexed, and the context is fully quoted in every entry. Unfortunately the arrangement of the quotations is merely mechanical, and no attempt is made to indicate that similarly spelt words are often employed in the cited passages in varied senses, or even as different parts of speech.]

> [The text is formed from a careful and first-hand collation of the original and all succeeding editions. The prefaces give valuable aid in textual criticism, and the notes collect a mass of various readings. The last volume gives reprints of the imperfect first quartos of The Merry Wires of Windsor, Henry V. Hamlet, together with The First Part of The Contention, and The true Tragedie of Richard Duke of Yorke, the two plays on which are based the second and third parts of Henry VI. The comment in this edition is solely confined to textual criticism.]

A new Variorum Edition. The Works, ed. H. Howard Furness (in progress).

Lippincott (Philadelphia), 1871-1908. 15s. net each vol.

This edition prints the First Folio text in the original spelling, and collects on an exhaustive scale at the bottom of the pages the various notes of previous editors. The Introductions and Appendices give previously published essays of criticism and research. Although the massive editorial apparatus is mainly compiled from older sources, room is found for much shrewd original comment by the editor. The following plays have appeared: Romeo and Juliet, Macbeth, Handet (2 vols.), King Leav, Othello, The Merchant of Venice, As you like it, The Tempest, Midsummer Night's Dream, The Winter's Tale, Much Ado about Nothing, Twelfth Night, Love's Labour's Lost, Antony and Chepatra, and Richard III,]

[The text follows the Cambridge Shakespeare, but occasionally the present editor gives in his notes reasons for preferring another reading. The notes which are at the bottom of the page deal briefly with textual, verbal, historical and general matters, and cite parallel passages wherever they seem to have illustrative pertinence. The annotations of the later plays and the Sonnets are full. The last volume contains two Indices and a Glossary.]

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
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
