PROPHECY — CLASS OF 1964

Well, we've finally returned to earth!! We are very happy to be back from our three day trip. 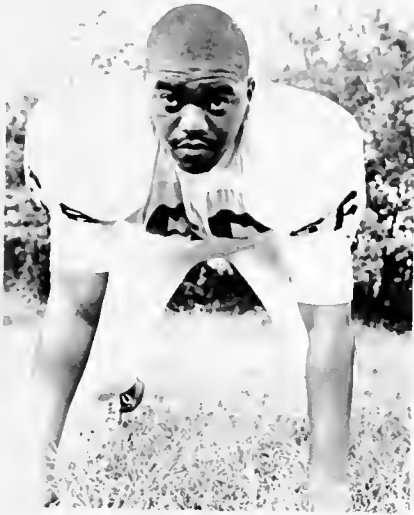

Kermit "Saus" West from Chester, Penn., is the only senior on the team. He has led the team in rebounding for the last three years. The Bears will miss West next season.



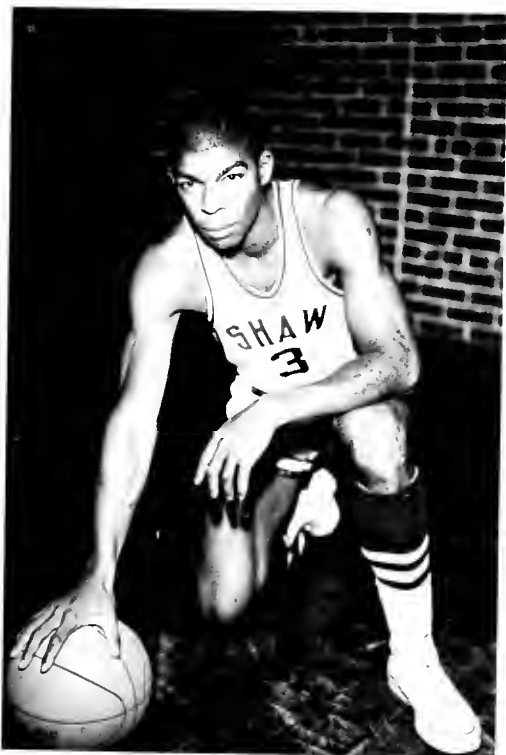
Bennie "Jo-Jo" Byers 6'3" a junior from Greensboro, N.C. has earned the respect of opponents because of his ability to jump and shoot.

Bernard Wilder is a native of Raleigh, and was one of the top pitchers in the C.I.A.A. His E.R.A. (earned run average) was 2.94.



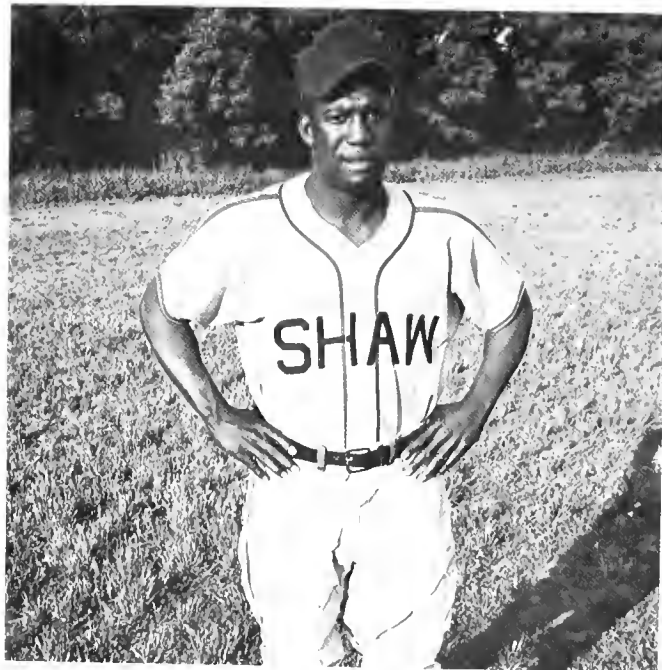
Nathan Walton is a fine athlete in every respect. Aside from catching duties, Nat led the team in pitching with an outstanding E.R.A. of 2.79.

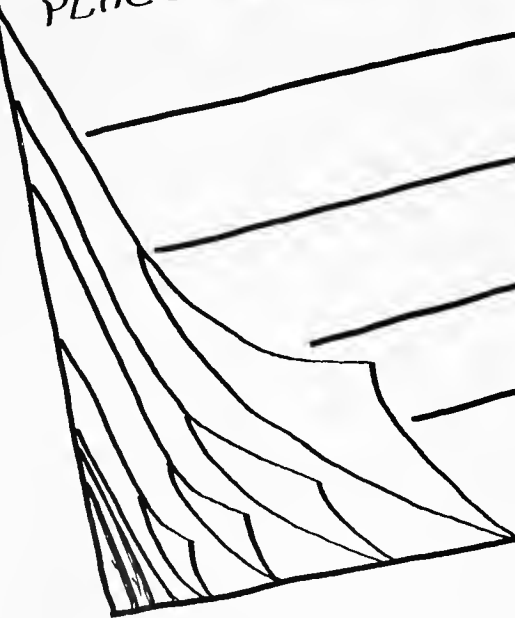

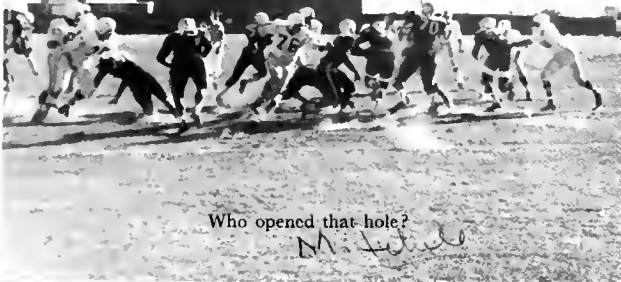
