They kept a chart of weight and measurements, and prescribed exercises were oullined for them. Since habits of diel, work, recreation, exercise, even mental habits mold the body. emphasis was placed on correcting any bad habits that might exist. Early in the year. the women were given medical exams, and provisions were made for those who were not capable of taking a regular physical education program.

If the collese continues to grow as it has. perhaps the college program will someday be as complete as the fine four-year program the women experienced in high sthool. A step in this direction was made when classes for college women were inaugurated last fall. However. there is a fine opportunity in extracurricular activilies for those who desire more than they find in their regular gym program.

The staff that worked with these classes was the director of the department. Mrs. Placebe Ann Kirby, Miss Helen Mahany, Miss Mildred Feres, and the accompanist. Mrs. Alma Nakeever.

In the next to the lant contest of the season Joliet was to meet LaCrange in what turned out to be a contest for second place. The LaCrange team had 12 wins and 5 losses when Jotiet visited the school, and the $W$ Volves had 11 wins and 5 losses.
