
SOPHOMORE CLASS







STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council is composed of officers of both the Freshman and Sophomore classes, a representative of W. A. A., the Shield, the Blazer, and Men's College Y. 




In the past few years, the small enrollment in the college made it impossible for the club to function on a large scale and become prominent. With this year's large enrollment and the co-operation of every active member a





Even though the Wolves this season did not linish on the very top of the Illinois Junior College Basketball Conference, the quintet was regarded by many basketball fans as the outstanding team in the conference. It was Joliet that issued the only defeat of the season to Morton, the conference leaders, by a score of 100 to 62.

With tripled enrollment to select from this year. Coach James A. Rickhoff had ample material from which he culled his victorious first string five. Four lettermen returned this year: however, only two of them were from last year's squad. Forwards Lou Bertani and Ed Skoien came back after helping the team through a successful season last year, while Don Peterson and Bob Long returned to the hardwood after three years in the military service, Joe Pohlman, Tony Gutierrez, Don Drake, and Paul Kristofer received their preliminary hardwood training with the Joliet Township High School.

When the last game of the season was completed, the Wolves were in second place with 15 wins against 1 loss, while LaGrange Junior College trailed the Wolves in third place with 12 wins and 6 losses.

There were two brilliant games of the scason, one with Morton and the other with LaGrange. In the next to the last contest of the season Joliet was to meet LaGrange in what turned out to be a contest for second place. The LaGrange team had 12 wins and 5 losses when Joliet visited the school, and the Wolves had 11 wins and 5 losses. The winning team would be recognized as the holder of second place since the Wolves had only one game remaining to play with the cellar


team. Morgan Park. The LaGrange squad paced the Joliet men thru the first three quarters; however, in the final period the pressure of the strong Purple and White cagemen forged Joliet out in front to win the game. 00 to 44.

Another spectacular game that demonstrated the power of the Joliet quintet came midway in the second half of the season when the Wolves dealt a crushing defeat to the hitherto undefeated league leader, Morton. A deluge of baskets that totaled 100 points for the Joliet men wrecked the conference and raised the already high rating of the Joliet team in the opinion of opposing coaches.

Although Joliet lost five games in the conference, there was no team that the Wolves did not beat once. In three of the games in which the Wolves bowed to their opponents, the Joliet team was within two baskets and a free throw from the score of the victorious team. The Purple and White trailed by an average of eight points in the five games that they lost.

Fortunately for the Wolves this year they lost only one man in the mid-semester graduation. Bob Long, a valuable center, graduated in January while at the same time Don Drake entered school and capably filled this vacancy. On the first string at the opening of the season were Joe Pohlman and Don Peterson, forwards; Bob Long, center; Tony Gutierrez and Paul Kristofer, guards.



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
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
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
