



# Jowa State College

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

An act creating "A State Agricultural College" was passed by the Legislature of Iowa in the year 1858. In 1862 a bill was passed by the National Congress, and upon the signature of President Lincoln became a law, which gave public lands to the states for the purpose of providing means for the creation of colleges of agriculture and mechanic arts. Accepting the grant of the federal government, the General Assembly of Iowa created the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and on March 17, 1869, the college was formally opened for the reception of students.

As will be readily seen by this brief historical outline, we do not have an old institution when compared with the majority of schools in the East. However, this is one of the striking characteristics of the schools in the Middle West. and while we do not have the ivy-covered buildings or the much-guarded traditions of our sister schools in the East, nevertheless we have been progressing with rapid strides and have been recording history of a different character.


The college is located on high, rolling land and is situated about one and one-half miles west of the city of Ames. The central campus of one hundred and twenty-five acres is located in the centre of the one thousand and two hundred acres of college land. The true principles of landscape gardening have been followed in planning the campus and locating the drives and buildings, so as to give the entire campus the appearance of a large and beautiful park. We are justly proud of our campus and we are not boastful when we say it is one of the most beautiful in the West.

The people of Iowa have been liberal in their appropriations for Iowa State College. Iowa is one of the foremost agricultural states in the Union, and it is only fitting that



she should have one of the foremost agricultural colleges in the country. During our comparatively brief existence, the college has been revolutionized, and few of the old buildings remain, as landmarks of the early struggles and ambitions of the people. The small brick buildings have given way to large stone structures, built in the Roman Renaissance style of architecture. The last twelve years has brought the greatest change. During this time Engineering Hall has been built at a cost of \$220,000: Central Hall, at a cost of \$375,000, and Agricultural Hall, at an expense Also many buildings of lesser importance. of \$350,000. To-day thirty-three commodious structures constitute the college buildings, and these are conservatively valued at \$1,550,000. Ground is now broken for the new Veterinary Hospital, which is planned on a mammouth scale, to be erected at a cost of \$175,000, and it will be the finest of its kind in the world. Next spring work will be begun on the new gymnasium. Ames has been sorely in need of a gymnasium for a number of years, and while our athletic teams have always held a creditable place among the schools in the Missouri Valley Conference, yet the lack of a suitable gymnasium has been a serious handicap.

Hand in hand with this increase in equipment has come an almost unparalleled growth along every line. The first graduating class, fourteen in number, left the halls of Iowa State College in 1872, and from this mere handful the number has been so increased that the present enrollment is almost 2.500, and during the forty-two years of its existence has granted 2.221 degrees. These facts are nothing less than remarkable when we take into consideration the fact that Iowa has two other State schools, a State Normal and the State University, and while the University has more colleges than Ames, yet at the present time we have the larger student enrollment and the appropriations for Iowa State College exceed those of the State University. The citizens of Iowa have taken pride in the development of a technical school of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, not only



for the education of the youth of her own Commonwealth, but a school which is already drawing students from all parts of the world.

The scope of instruction has been constantly broadened and the courses have been made more complete. This task, while one of the deepest interest, was from the very first fraught with not a few difficulties, because of the fact that the whole field of applied science is new. During the past forty years more has been done along this line than was done in all the preceding centuries. A year ago the academic department was eliminated, making it necessary for students to enter straight freshmen, either by examination or by a diploma from an accredited high school. At present the college offers four five-year courses and fourteen four-year courses, leading to degrees in all branches of agriculture, engineering, science, veterinary medicine and domestic economy.

The purpose of the college has been the liberal education of young men and young women and at the same time to give them a thorough scientific and technical training. Iowa State College is willing to stand upon the record of her graduates. In engineering, this school has established an enviable record and its graduates are now scattered in all parts of the world. Nineteen colleges of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts have at the head of their Animal Husbandry Departments Ames men, while both Secretary Wilson and Assistant Secretary Huy, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, are Ames graduates.

Fraternities were established in Ames during its early history but were abolished in 1894, owing to anti-secret society legislation on the part of the Board of Trustees. In 1904 they were once more officially recognized and since that time have been in a flourishing condition.

We believe the future of our institution is bright and will be characterized by the same rapid advancement that has been the distinguishing feature of our past. With a healthy growing student body, a broadening of the courses, with

steadily increasing entrance requirements, we believe we are on the verge of a new era of prosperity. Phi Sigma Kappa comes to Ames at a most opportune time. We are eager to take our place and for our fraternity a high place among the existing fraternities, as well as among the faculty and entire student body.







Some of them are alive and active and are doing good work in fostering fraternity spirit among the alumni. Of the others we hear but seldom and the life within them is apparently at a low ebb. Now—we are

justly proud of the fact that not a single dead chapter is recorded on our chapter roll—but can the same be said of our roll of alumni clubs? If dead chapters are not desirable, neither are dead clubs. The alumni club is an excellent means for fostering the fraternity spirit among the alumni and for keeping them in touch with fraternity matters—provided it is alive and active.

We hope that the example of some of our clubs will prove an incentive to action for the others and that the time will speedily come when all our clubs will be thoroughly awake to their opportunities.

Along this same line of thought let me add an editorial taken from the April issue of the "Shield," the Theta Delta Chi publication:

"The welfare of our Fraternity, its continual prosperity, does not rest altogether upon the undergraduates.

"In our work for a greater growth of the prestige of  $\Theta$   $\Delta$  X we should remember that this extension of influence must come largely through the personal work of the individual graduate. The worth of our Fraternity can be estimated only by the character of its members. If our graduates prove to be men of broad sympathies and culture, coöperating in questions of public interests, in the work of the communities in which they reside, then indeed will  $\Theta$   $\Delta$  X achieve an enviable position. This is a development toward which we should look forward.

The young graduate just out of college can ill afford to become so engrossed in his line of work as to fail to keep in touch with his Fraternity, through some active graduate association. With his fresh enthusiasm and desire for success he is too apt to get into a rut that will only narrow his possibilities for a broader field in the future. Contact with  $\Theta$ .  $\Delta$  X will broaden his vision, he will think less of self and as he grows older he will cherish the more the friendships formed therein and prize them among his richest assets.

"These are some of your responsibilities; keep up your associations."

The question is frequently asked: "Is fraternity life conducive to scholarship?" In considering this question it is interesting to note conditions at Cornell University, as set forth recently by Dr. Fraternity Men Schurman, in his report on the comparative scholastic standing of the fraternity and non-fraternity men at Cornell for the year 1911:

Dr. Schurman points out that of the eighty-eight men dropped in February, as the result of the mid-year examinations, the fraternities furnished forty to forty-five per cent., whereas the number of male undergraduates belonging to fraternities constitutes only twenty-nine per cent. of the entire male student population.

The figures are about the same as last year, and Dr. Schurman says that is not a good showing for the fraternities. He is glad to commend fifteen fraternities, whose names he gives, which did not lose a single man for poor scholarship last year.

We do not know whether Phi Sigma Kappa is one of these fifteen. We hope it is. Neither do we know whether Dr. Schurman's report is indicative of conditions in colleges and universities generally, but undoubtedly the report contains a warning which all fraternity men will do well to heed. After all, the first aim of student life is scholarship, and the fraternity man who neglects his studies for the secondary activities of college life does so at the risk of injury to himself and to the good name of his fraternity.

With this issue of the SIGNET, the system upon which its The Signet's financial support has rested hitherto goes "Better-Day" out of existence. Beginning with the Sepat Hand. tember issue, the cost of publishing the SIGNET will be paid out of the "Signet Fund", for which provision was made at the last convention.

There is joy in the office of the Signet. The era of the coin-cards is drawing to a close. Hereafter we shall not

be compelled to disgrace our columns with continuous appeals for remittances. Truly, the "better day" so long promised for the Signet has dawned at last.

However, this issue must be paid for in the old way. Hence once more, and for the last time, we make the request—please return your coin-card with the much-needed coin at once.

All Phi Sigma Kappa men have cause to rejoice in the reports which Bros. Munsell and MeLean made to the Council on their return from the induction of Gamma Deuteron. These reports are

of Gamma Deuteron. These reports are highly favorable alike to our newest chapter and Alpha Deuteron and Beta

Deuteron, and show that Phi Sigma Kappa has a standing in the Middle West that compares very favorably with that of any of our sister fraternities. These brothers report likewise that eighteen of the alumni residing in the Middle West were present at the induction of Gamma Deuteron.

Beside the above, we have been represented in the following: Manager of foot-ball for 1910-1911, six men on the foot-ball team, two men on the basket-ball squad, one man on the team which defeated Middlebury in debate, member of the cast of the college play, one man on each of the under-classmen debating teams, one man on each of the under-

classmen basket-ball teams; all our under-classmen (nine) were on their class foot-ball teams.

As this is a co-educational institution, it is customary for the fraternities to entertain by holding dances from time to time. A few weeks ago we made a new departure by giving a musicale and dance. From all accounts, we have learned that it was a decided success and was the best affair given during the college year.

Next year will be the tenth anniversary of the founding of Xi Chapter. We have plans under way at the present time for the celebration of the event with a banquet that will excel any that has ever been held here. We sincerely hope that some of the brothers from the other chapters will be able to be present on that occasion.

Although we are a young chapter, we are trying to find a way to build a new house. If possible, we hope to be in a rew one at the time of the celebration next year.

Conditions in general have been better than at any time during the preceding five years. And while, in comparison with the past, we are well satisfied with the results shown still we are resolved to make them even better next year and in the years to come.

We wish success in all undertakings to the chapters and brothers of Phi Sigma Kappa.

At present ten of our active and three of our pledged members have their names on the college honor roll. In athletics, too, we are still maintaining our usual prominence. Brother Rühl, '13, is a member of the varsity foot-ball, basket-ball and base-ball teams; Brother Ryder, '12, is captain of the Track team, and Brother Gailey, '12, a member of it; Brother Winslow, '12, is manager of the foot-ball team, and Brother Stanley, '11, manager of the tennis team. Of the other important positions which we hold around college. Brother Williams, '12, is class president and business manager of the college annual; Brother Stanley, '11, is vice-president of the Cotillian Club; Brother Brashears, '12, Winslow, '12, and Hundley, '12, are members of June Ball Committee; and Brothers Brashears, '12, Hundley, '12, and Stanley, '11, are members of the St. John's Dramatic Club.

Our alumni have always taken an especial interest in the welfare of Sigma, and it is always gratifying for us to note their successes in their various occupations. A number of them have accepted commissions in the army. Brothers Hopkins, '05, and Smith, '05, lieutenants in the Field Artillery, are with their regiments on the Mexican border; Brother Halbert, '04, is stationed at Fort Hunt; Brother Garey, '03, is stationed at Fort Douglas; and Brother Rohrer, '03, one of our charter members, is a captain in the Philippine Constabulary. Of our other alumni members, Brother Cecil, '05, is a surgeon in the navy; Brother Dougherty, '03, is a professor at St. John's Manlins, Brooklyn; Brother Niville, '05, is in the ranching business in North Platte, Neb.; Brother Valk, '05, is a resident physician at Johns Hopkins Hospital; Brother Woodcock, '03, is a recent graduate of the University of Maryland Law School, while Brothers Stanley, '10, Rühl, '10, and Warfield, '09, are now matriculated there: and Brothers Harrison, '06, Bosley, '09, and Rühl, '10, are members of the Baltimore Paint and Powder Club.

The work of the chapter has always been greatly handicapped by the lack of a chapter house, but we are now making every effort to secure one and expect, within a year, to have one under construction. Needless to say, Sigma is very pleased to know that the next General Convention is to be held in Baltimore. We will do our utmost to help make it an even bigger success than the Boston Convention.

#### Psi Cetter

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Since the installation of Psi Chapter, on the 19th of January, 1907, truly remarkable strides have been made. With fourteen men, representing various departments of the University, as a nucleus, with a house as the chapter's head-quarters, the then "baby chapter" of Phi Sigma Kappa opened its eyes on the fraternity world of the University of Virginia. It is but natural that the old men looked forward to the second year with trepidation. As a new fraternity, established at a University at which there were already twenty other fraternities, which could boast of a longer life and a stronger foothold, competition was especially keen.

In order that the chapter, upon the same basis which would make for ultimate success in every respect, in order to secure men of the highest class, who would measure up to the high standards of the fraternity, who would represent their Alma Mater in the true sense of the word and whose names would be enrolled upon the pages of her history, as well as upon the records of Psi, hard work appeared to be a necessity. Diplomacy, tact, keenness of perception

and quick decision were essential to the attainment of the desired ends.

The old men, fully realizing this situation, instituted a vigorous campaign, with the result that nine men were initiated on the fifth of October, 1908. In the following spring, two men, eminent in the intellectual as well as the political field, strengthened the chapter. Dr. Harvey E. Jordan, professor of Embryology and Histology at the University, a man who has attained a high rank as an authority in the medical world, and the Hon. Thomas S. Martin, whose astuteness as a politician and whose intelligent and capable action in the United States Senate has brought about his recent election as Democratic leader of that body, became honorary members of the chapter.

Furthermore, two students were initiated in May, two of whom have attained signal honors in athletics.

Thus Psi was well on the road to success. With such men—vigorous, strong, healthy, capable—we entered upon our third year. The succeeding years are but repetitions of those which went before. Each, however, marked a step in advance toward our goal of placing Psi at the top of the ladder.

The outlook for 1910-11 was not, to say the least, rosvhued. The raising of the entrance requirements in the several departments of the University, of course, caused a marked decrease in the attendance. Again, it seemed that the whole field had been carefully gone over in years gone by, and that the calibre of those entering the University for the first time was not equal to that which had been characteristic during the previous four years. It was feared that the number of initiates would be particularly small, in comparison with the past numbers. Yet, with undaunted courage and a will to secure as large a number of goats as possible, twelve old men who returned considered the proposition before them. As a consequence, seven men, who have already exhibtied their high character, their intelligence, and their willingness to work and to maintain our standards, have been initiated.

Nor have we any complaint to offer of the new men who have entered this fall. We have secured, without doubt, those who will add to and maintain the prestige of Psi.

And, now, a short review of the honors attained by Psi during its existence at Virginia: From the beginning, we have always held our own in athletics, as well as in intellectual pursuits. We have been represented in track, baseball and foot-ball. During the last two years our men have attained signal honors. Brother John Speed Elliott and Brother Horace Geyer, Jr., have represented us in foot-ball.

The former played left end until injured, since which time he has been invaluable as an assistant coach of the team. The highest authorities on foot-ball in the South have named him as the best end playing the game in that section. The atter was elected captain of the team of 1910–11, and, although suffering from a severe illness at the height of the season yet was on the field in the last two big games in which victory was imperative. Brother Geyer was named as All-Southern tackle by the authorities.

Brother Edwin Wilson Holladay also represented us on the foot-ball field, being recognized as one of the most vigorous and steadfast players, as well as the most versatile man on the team. In addition to this, after a most spirited and hard-fought battle, he carried off the palm, being elected to the captaincy of the track team for 1910-11. He has also distinguished himself intell ctually, having been elected a member of the Raven Society, an honorary organization of the University of Virginia, and, further, elected to membership in Phi Beta Kappa. Nor does his usefulness end at this point, as he holds the vice-presidency of the General Athletic Association, his name being the only one appearing on both tickets. And yet another honor: he is recording secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and also a member of the Pi Mu medical fraternity. He has recently been elected the president of the graduating class of 1910-11.

Another representative in foot-ball was Brother David Cole Wilson, of Chattanooga, Tenn.

Furthermore, Brother Jared Stout Lapham, of Michigan, was a charter-member of Sigma Beta Phi, an engineering fraternity, instituted three years ago. He is also a member of the Raven Society.

Brother R. H. Houston, of the Engineering Department, has recently become a Raven.

Brother Charles Terrell Porter, of the third year medical class, is the assistant in Pharmacology and Physio'ogy. He, too, has recently been elected a Raven, and is a member of the Phi Beta Pi Medical Fraternity. In addition, we note his election to the Colonnade Club, an organization of Professors, Instructors and Alumni of the University.

Brothers Geyer and Elliott are members of the Eli Banana Ribbon Society, of the University, and Brother Geyer is also a member of the "Hot Foot."

During the five years' existence of Psi, we believe we should be congratulated on her success. The future is bright with hope, although we shall lose two of our strongest members by graduation in June.

#### Omega Cetter

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The following brief report from Omega is but a summary of those achievements which, from a University of California point of view, seem to us to be of the most importance.

The athletic standing of a fraternity in such a university as this, determines, in a large measure, the standing of the fraternity altogether. In this branch of activity we hold ourselves to be the equals of any organization on the campus. Two of the brothers are prominent on the track team and will undoubtedly win in their respective events in our annual meet with Stanford. Brother Rice, one of these men, last month broke the Stanford-California freshman shot-put record. In foot-ball, base-ball and rowing we also have prominent men, all of them wearers of the big "C."

In scholarship, our standing, while not all that could be desired, is very good notwithstanding. Our most prominent brother in this field is Brother Kelly, who last semester passed the Rhodes Scholarship examinations and who belongs to several of the most respected honor-societies here, incidently being cockswain of the varsity crew. We hope to elect him to the student-body presidency this week, and as he is backed by many of the biggest men in college, we are very hopeful of the outcome.

In inter-fraternity base-ball we consider ourselves to be a factor. We played a game but just last week with the Delta Upsilons and were more fortunate than some of our eastern brethren were, if what we read speaks truly. They entertained us at an informal "smoker" last night, the losers of the game being granted that expensive privilege by previous agreement. They say that the tables will be turned next semester when the regular inter-fraternity series takes place, and as an association of fair-minded individuals, we hold ourselves open to conviction. At any rate, when the game is over, they will know it to have been a real game.

It would probably be well to mention here our annual banquet. The Palace Hotel, we venture, never held a more merry crowd, a small crowd it was, but the merrier therefore. A few of our eastern brethren were there and many of our alumni, and as we disbanded, at midnight, there was more than one amongst who had renewed the final obligation in his heart and again made to himself the pledge of loyalty. It was an epoch in our chapter history, nor will its effect depart for some time to come.

All this is of the past and even of the present, but it's the future that counts, and we'll all, for ourselves, for Omega and for Phi Sigma Kappa, strive that it counts for us and not against us.

#### Alpha Deuteron Cetter

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The first year of our existence as the Alpha Deuteron Chapter of Phi Sigma Kappa Fraternity is rapidly drawing to a close, and we as a chapter look back upon it as the most pleasant and successful period of our life at the University.

In the selection of men we have been exceptionally fortunate in securing representative students in many phases of college activities. Notwithstanding the numerous "outside" affairs taken up, our scholastic standing for the past semester was higher than ever before, and we were placed among the fraternities ranking highest in scholarship.

- W. Roman, '12—Assistant editor of the 1912 "Illio;" "Daily Illini" staff.
- E. G. Hoeppner, '12—"Scabbard and Blade," military fraternity.
- C. O'Connor, '12, A. V. Essington, '14—Delta Sigma Rho, honorary oratorical fraternity.
  - R. Hardinger, '14-Varsity foot-ball squad.

In a financial way we have also experienced fair success. Several old obligations have been wiped out, and numerous extra expenses of this year have been well taken care of. We have recently installed a complete and up-to-date accounting system for handling the Chapter's finances. Another system which has met with the approval of our graduates is the sending out to each member a monthly news letter.

This year we have given four informal dances, and our first Phi Sigma Kappa formal, which we endeavored to make a memorable affair. Several of our alumni were present, which added greatly to the pleasure of the event.

Our building fund, although less than a year ago, has a solid foundation and is growing steadily. At present we are considering the purchase of a lot which is one of the most desirable in the fraternity district.

Since our installation last spring, the first brother to enter the bonds of matrimony was "Happy" Stewart, '09, who, on December 28, 1910, married Miss Marjorie Nichols.

Brother "Tubby" Jacobson at the end of the first semester transferred to Beta Deuteron Chapter.

Brother A. T. Burrows, Lambda, '03, who manages a city daily here, has been of valuable assistance to us as a young chapter.

Brothers Willmore, '11, and Baum, '12, brought back from the Convention full reports, which were of very great interest to the chapter, and gave us a broader understanding of the significance of the fraternity.

The outlook for next year is very bright, and we are confident of the continued success of Phi Sigma Kappa at Illinois.

#### Beta Beuteron Cetter

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We can report material progress made during our first year as a chapter of Phi Sigma Kappa. We feel now that here at Minnesota we have become firmly established and that we can hold our own.

Our first act of importance this year was the securing of a new chapter house. We were fortunately able to secure a satisfactory house on University Avenue, upon which the majority of our fraternities are and on which is located the main entrance to our campus. This house was entirely furnished and ready a week before the opening of the semester and we began our strenuous race for new members not a bit behind the older fraternities either at the start or finish. 
Hardly had our year started before we were called upon to bear one of those indescribably sad events which comes to a fraternity only seldom, the passing away of an active member. Brother McKeen was one of the four who conceived the idea of organizing our chapter. He was a true brother, a man of high and noble ideals, and a brother who always strove to make Beta Deuteron attain to a high standard of fraternal usefulness. Beta Deuteron and Minnesota have both sustained irreparable loss in his departure.

A new spirit has been manifest in the fraternity life of our college. It is the spirit of union for the purpose of elevating fraternity standards. It has resulted in the formation of a Pan Hellenic Council, the purpose of which is self regulation by the fraternities, with a view to elevating the standards of Greek life. It has promulgated laws for rushing and initiation. Its judicial committee, before which all differences between fraternities are reviewed, has as its chairman our Brother Huey. Under the auspices of this council was held an imposing banquet at which each fraternity was represented by twelve active and three alumnimembers. The president of our University, the Governor of our State, and the Board of Regents were guests. Three hundred fraternity men there discussed and listened to plans for increased efficiency.

One very encouraging feature for us has been the spirit in which we were received by the other fraternities. Much could have been done to impede our progress had there been any desire to do so. But the very opposite has been true. Minnesota is not a school where noise is substituted for enthusiasm. Nevertheless a hearty enthusiasm and a quiet spirit of coöperation has marked our relations with other fraternities.

In conclusion, we feel that our ambitions have grown

with our growth in numbers and spirit. We are by no means satisfied with ourselves. We have learned many lessons. Also we have developed a strong desire to become the owners of a suitable chapter house. Many of our Minnesota fraternities have very fine houses and several are now building. Our energies in the future must be directed towards the securing of a house of our own. As some one recently said, "We are strong in hopes."



# News from Alumni.

## Dr. Willis G. Mardonald, B, '87, Passes Away.

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Dr. W. G. MacDonald, a charter member of Beta Chapter, died on December 31, 1910, after an attack of pneumonia. Dr. MacDonald was one of the prominent men in Phi Sigma Kappa. The following sketch of his life is taken from "The Times-Union," of Albany, N. Y.:

Dr. Willis Goss MacDonald, one of the most famous of American surgeons, and one of the foremost and most public-spirited citizens of Albany, is no more. His passing is a great shock to the community a positive loss to mankind. Death, in his taking, has stilled a heart that was ever overflowing with the tenderest sympathy for and love of his fellowman; has lulled to slumber an intellect brimful of the highest ideals and conceptions; has laid low a form whose every movement was a public benefaction. Dr. MacDonald is dead, but the world has received a great measure of profit by his active and useful life. He embodied every quality of sterling manhood. He possessed a rare and diversified genius which he ever applied where it bestowed the most good. He was a warm friend, a powerful advocate, a lover of all that was true and good and beautiful in life and character, a profound thinker, an ardent disciple of good government, a deep student of literature—a man of immeasurable resources in that which pertains to the wealth of the mind and the heart. He is dead, but the good that he did will live after him. It will be an inspiration for those who aspire to the heights of true American manhood. His career will be a blessed benediction to those who read of it in the years to come.

Dr. MacDonald received his early education at the Cobleskill Free Academy. Subsequently he attended the State Normal School at Albany and Cornell University, and then entered the Albany Medical College, from which institution he graduated with the class of 1887.

During his period of study abroad he served as volunteer assistant to August Martin and Ernest Von Bergmann, two of Germany's most noted surgeons. After matriculating in his course in surgery, surgical pathology and bacteriology in Berlin, he came to Albany and began the practice of his profession. His fame as a surgeon soon spread far and wide. He was successful in the most difficult operations and he brought with him into his practice everything that was most modern and up-to-date in his chosen work. He also became assistant attending surgeon at the Albany Hopsital, serving from 1892 to 1897, and has been attending surgeon at that institution ever since. In 1892 he became lecturer on surgery at the Albany Medical College, and in 1895, professor of surgery. In addition to these connections he was consulting surgeon at the Westfield Hospital since 1900 and consulting surgeon at the Hill Crest Hospital, Pittsfield, Mass., for several years.

It was in the domain of abdominal surgery that Dr. MacDonald especially applied his genius. He operated with great skill and dexterity. Not only were many of his methods original, but many of the instruments that he used, and which have since become standard for the profession throughout the world, were his own invention. There is no surgeon in the country who was more eminent, who was more highly thought of, both by the public and by the members of his own profession, and whose opinion was more greatly respected than Dr. Willis G. MacDonald.

When the Spanish War broke out, in 1898, Dr. MacDonald volunteered his services and left a large and lucrative practice in this city and its surrounding territory to give his country and its defenders the benefit of his services. He was commissioned major and surgeon of United States Volunteers and had charge of the Military Hospital at Fort McPherson, Ga., during that conflict. This was characteristic of Dr. MacDonald. When there was a public service to be rendered he was ever ready to sacrifice all personal matters in its interest.

Dr. MacDonald was a public-spirited citizen in the purest acceptance of that term. He was a believer in the highest ideal of government and public life and was ever found active in the cause of humanity and better civic conditions. In this city he was ever interested in that which promoted the welfare and fostered the progress of the city. He rendered signal service in several instances and was a member of the Albany Board of Education from 1900 to 1903. He was one of the pioneers in the movement designed to curb the ravages of tuberculosis and it was mainly through his efforts that legislation was secured providing for the State Hospital for Tuberculosis at Raybrook. He was a member of the first board of directors of that institution and president of that board for several years.

He was one of the leading spirits in the movement which culminated

in the erection of the magnificent institution comprising the Albany Hospital. He personally designed the operating amphitheatre of that institution and many of the other features of the hospital were his conceptions. When he was stricken with his fatal illness, he was taking a most prominent part in the movement to secure for the Albany Medical College the Albany penitentiary property. In all movements designed to better protect the public health and in all that pertained to the welfare of the people, particularly of Albany, he was ever foremost.

Dr. MacDonald was the recipient of many and signal honors during his career. Two years ago he received the degree of LL.D. from Fordham University, in recognition of his eminent standing, and this honor he prized very much. He was a member and former president of the State Medical Society. He was likewise a member of the International Surgical Society, the American Surgical Society, and American Association of Obstetricians and Gyncologists, the Southern Surgical and Gyncological Society. He was a member of the Pan-American Medical Congress and of the Tenth, Eleventh and Twelfth International Medical Congresses.

The following is an editorial taken from "The Times-Union":

Dr. Willis G. MacDonald is dead, and in his death Albany suffers a calamity. His great brain, his generous heart, his wonderful skill, his forceful personality will be sadly missed in the life of this community.

Most of us are beings of ordinary ability and moderate attainments. Not so Dr. MacDonald. Nature was lavish in her gifts to him. He had a splendid brain. His mind mastered every subject it touched; his memory was as retentive as the wax that bears the impress of a seal; his faculties as responsive to the exigencies of his medical and surgical career as the magnetic needle is to its mother lodestone.

And with all his learning, and all his ability, he was a lovable man. His big heart was ever freighted with kindly sentiments and benevolent aims. Science never cooled his ardent nature or chilled his natural impulses. Though in the front rank of his profession, and so acknowledged both in this country and in Europe, he never lost the simplicity and the ingeniousness of character which always shed additional lustre-over intellectual power and applauded achievement. Life was no problem to him. Unlike many other intellectual giants, he did not allow it to become a labyrinth of tangents leading nowhere. The mazes with which hair-spliting theorists would crowd existence found no cognizance in the philosophy of Dr. MacDonald. To do good was his gospel and charity his creed. Every ounce of his energy was given

to the work nearest his hand—a work performed with wonderful skill and with blissful results to the pain-racked and the torture-torn.

He was a great surgeon. The world has acknowledged this. But those who knew him intimately knew he was a great man and great in every way. And, be it said to his eternal credit, he never prostituted his powers to pelf. He would work harder for charity than for money. Sympathy spurred him on more than all the gold in the world, and misfortune appealed to him in a tongue more alluring than the language of affluence. His interests were as broad as human nature. No public-spirited movement failed to find him a strenuous champion. No work to help make life's pathway easier for humanity ever went without what support was his to give. Books he loved and books he knew. Education, he thought, was the greatest thing in the world, and when the poorest lad in the land can get for the asking every chance he craves to drink at the fount of knowledge—then will one of Dr. MacDonald's dreams come true.

Only forty-seven, and yet, what a world of work he had crowded into those few years!

Only forty-seven, and he lies cold in death, while hundreds whom his skill has snatched from the gloom of the grave are walking around in life's glorious sunshine to-day.

What a commentary on the irony of fate and the uncertainty of existence!

Death! Thou hast snatched from Life one whom Life could most illy afford to lose!

"Resolved, That in the death of our brother, Dr. Willis G. MacDonald, Beta Chapter, Phi Sigma Kappa, has lost one of its most brilliant members and Albany one of its noblest citizens.

"Dr. MacDonald was a charter member of Beta Chapter, and with all of his multitude of duties as surgeon, teacher and public man, never forgot his fraternity. Many times his genial presence has graced our rooms and many times his generous purse has tided over financial difficulties so that we might have a suitable home for our chapter.

Brother Howard B. Clark, I, '03, has been engaged in building a Dam Lock and Power Plant for the Chattanooga and Tennessee River Power Co., at Guild, Tenn. The following account of his work is taken from the "Stephens Indicator":

H. B. Clark, for the past two years has been consulting engineer for the Southern Pacific Railroad, and the Pacific Gas and Electric Co., of San Francisco, and in these occupations made no less than eight trips across the continent last year, besides over 16,000 miles through the Middle and Eastern States. On January 1, 1910, he joined the forces of Mr. William H. Flaherty as chief engineer, to take up the work in supersedence of Messrs. Baillie & Dumary in the construction of the dam, lock, and power plant for the Chattanooga and Tennessee River Power Co., at Hales Bar, Guild, Tenn.


This large job consists in the building of a dam 1,200 feet long, 62 feet high, and having a clear width of 60 feet. The lock is 861 feet long over all, 60 feet wide between walls, and 59 feet high. The power station is 66 feet wide and 350 feet long, consisting of two buildings, an operating building 220 feet long and a switch and transformer house three stories high and 130 feet long. The operating building consists of seven bays, each containing two turbine units, or a total of fourteen having a capacity of 3,000 K. W. each, having a maximum capacity, with a 35-foot head of water, of delivering 5,250 horse-power. The buildings will be of steel framing and concrete walls; The floors and roof of reinforced concrete. The station is laid out to accommodate fourteen A. C. generators, six exciters, one exciter switch, one A. C. lighting and power board, one A. C. controlling board, one rheostat, one storage battery, six step-down transformers, fifteen step-up transformers, twenty-nine 6,000 volts, oil circuit braces and busses, three sets of multiple lightning arresters and choke coils, three sets of electrolytic lightning arresters and horn arresters. Each generator is of 3,000 K. W. capacity, three-phase, sixty cycles, 6,600 volts, 112½ revolutions per minute, and is mounted on a vertical shaft which is driven by three water wheels.

The greatest difficulty in the performance of this work was found in the leaks, which occurred in the rock bed upon which the foundations for the power house and sections of the dam were to be built. Four years were spent by the former contractors in endeavoring to stop these leaks, without success, to say nothing of the vast sums of money, no less than three-quarters of a million dollars having been spent last year on this portion of the work. All natural leaks which existed in the power house pit forty feet below river level were nine in number at the time this company came upon the work, and were in the form of geysers, spouting up from the rock to a height of from eight to ten feet in five-to ten-inch streams. These leaks were caused by numerous fissures and underground channels existing to a depth of from five to forty-five feet below the rock bottom. Each fissure varied in size from two inches in diameter to eight feet in depth. They were so close together that the underlying rock was completely honeycombed.

Through new methods these leaks were stopped in eight days after drilling forty-nine holes at a total cost not exceeding \$10,000, and the condition of the work at the present time is so good that final success is assured in from eighteen months to two years. Without the stoppage of these leaks the work could not have advanced any farther.

The total amount of this contract amounts to \$7,500,000, and in addition to supplying power for the city of Chattanooga and surrounding towns for various purposes, it will serve to greatly improve the Tennessee River as a navigable stream, and be of inestimable value for this reason to the surrounding country.

# Scholarship in Fraternities

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John A. Lowe, Chi '06.

A few years ago, the "Outlook," in an editorial commenting on the college fraternity as an educational influence, offered this suggestion: "Would it not be possible to place in chapter houses, by the action and the support of the graduates, young and promising graduate students, who, living with the men and acting as tutors, should direct the work of the undergraduates; teach them how to study, an art in which American students are sadly lacking; stimulate their intellectual life; and in a familiar, informal way, cooperate with the college in its highest work? The means for trying this experiment in many fraternities are ample. Is not the time ripe for more definite and higher direction of this great force in the American college community?"

The Book and Snake Society of Yale has recently made the most advanced step in the movement toward uniform high scholarship in the Greek-letter world. It has given three scholarships to the Sheffield Scientific School, an institution whose scholarship endowment has been small in the past. At Yale, as at other institutions, the fraternities have spent money lavishly in providing attractive houses, and now with all the necessary luxuries provided, have sought to offset much unfavorable criticism by raising the standard of undergraduate scholarship. This is an indication of how serious is the attempt of the fraternities at some institutions to establish themselves as homes of liberal culture and applied scholarship—of interest in collegiate affairs other than athletic activities.

In November, 1909, and again last year, Interfraternity Councils were called together in New York to talk over methods of fraternity regulation, the raising of the scholarship standard among the societies, and a more general cooperation between the fraternities and the university and

collegiate authorities. A bitter denunciation has in years past been made against fraternities on the charge of fostering habits which produced poor scholarship. Some of the universities are determined to maintain a high standard of scholarship at any cost and are proceeding with their campaign. The business of our educational institutions is to impart a training to the men who come within their walls. From the faculty point of view, this is made up in large measure by the acquirement of information and the mental development consequent thereto. It is with this fundamentally in mind that a young man enters college. business proposition consider it. Sound cash is being paid for the opportunities offered him. Shall he be content with the side shows when the whole circus is spread before him? Shall he be satisfied with a place in a campus activity when soon after his election to the position he is obliged to resign from college because of low standing in scholarship? The signs of the times we have mentioned above bring us to believe that there is in the minds of our leaders a clear conception of the value of a high scholarship record to every chapter. Not bad advice is that, "Get into close touch with the faculty; have all the fun you want, and go out for the teams if you have the right material, but keep the old 'frat.' on an even keel through good scholarship and the rest will take care of itself."

Our best fraternity directors have reached the conclusion that scholarship ought to be improved, but the question of how it is to be done remains incompletely answered. Appeals from and visits by eminent graduates was the earliest method. but this was rather uneven in its results. The next plan provided one whereby a graduate living in the college town looked after the affairs and the scholarship of the undergraduates in conjunction with a senior whose personal character made him valuable as a sponsor for the work of the chapter. Going a step further, some of the fraternities undertook to enlist the interest of faculty members in them with varying success. Today the policy of

abandoning the old feuds between the fraternities has permitted men of all fraternities to talk over this matter of government and scholarship in the open and with the utmost freedom, and the pan-Hellenic conferences have resulted in a valuable interchange of opinion among men who through experience and patient study of the problems at hand have become acknowledged experts. It has at last been realized that the fraternities must stand together or hang separately, and that the combined brains of the best Greekletter men are none too potent in keeping the undergraduate chapter up to the desired standard.

The problem is a nice one, for although every fraternity wants scholars, it does not necessarily want "grinds," but all-round young men who can be made into good students with a little prodding. The scholarship movement has gone so far that some have complained that it has tended to make the undergraduates lose sight of the original purposes of good fellowship, and seek only good men who can keep up in their courses so that the chapter will make a record. This, of course, is not the ideal of those actively interested in the movement. All other things being equal, we prefer the good student, but we do not want to pass over the young fellow of a fine character who is, perhaps, a little backward or a little careless in his work. It is for his benefit that the fraternity is seeking to maintain the standard. ence of wholesome tradition, the influence of capable graduates upon the active members, the guidance or advice of some member of the faculty—all these have served to help the movement for better scholarship.

The interfraternity council committees have each year sent out circular letters to college and university presidents and to the chapters of the national societies whereby they hoped to come to a better understanding of the problem in general. The results of their investigation have been published and we quote at length from them. It will be remembered that the discussion was concerning closer relation between collegiate authorities and the chapters.

"The replies from the fraternities, with hardly an exception, indicate that the necessity for improvement of scholarship is recognized by them, and nearly all either have already adopted some scheme looking toward this result or are now considering the subject with a view to deciding upon something in the near future. Among the plans already in operation by fraternities are the following: careful investigation of each chapter by a visiting officer who obtains full information about the standing of the men from the college authorities; similar investigations by other fraternity officials; investigation of each chapter twice a year by one of its own graduates, who reports to the fraternity; obtaining statements from the college authorities by the fraternity officers of the standing of their undergraduates: awarding honor certificates to those who attain a certain degree of efficiency; requiring chapters to obtain statements of the standing of their members to be forwarded to the fraternity officials; requiring all freshmen to observe study hours: requiring all chapters to place each initiate under the supervision of an upper-class man, whose duty it is to watch over all his activities.

"Among the noteworthy practices of various colleges, by the college authorities, are these: appointing a member of the faculty for each chapter as an advisor, it being his duty to keep himself informed of the condition of the work of those under his charge and to confer with those in danger of falling behind; giving each chapter at frequent intervals information as to the standing of delinquent members and in some cases pointing out apparent reasons for the delinquency; making public the relative standing of all fraternity chapters; posting the records of freshmen and sophomores where they may be inspected by all; prohibiting the initiation of conditioned freshmen; prohibiting the initiation of any student until he has completed a minimum amount of college work."

The opinion of the undergraduates was expressed to the Council by their replies to the circulars sent them. Their

letters indicated plans whose purpose is to encourage good scholarship. Among the most interesting of them were these: appointing a scholarship director, charged with the duty of obtaining information as to the standing of all members of the delegations from the lower classes and charged with the duty of seeing that tutors were provided where necessary; maintaining a committee of upper-class men with similar responsibilities; furnishing blanks to instructors with a list of men in their classes concerning whose work information is desired with a request for a statement of opinion as to the cause of the delinquency where such existed; sending return postal cards to instructors for statements of work of delinquents; reading grades of all members at regular meetings, with commendation of those doing good work and urging improvement where it is necessary; using the "big brother" system by which each initiate is placed under the special oversight of an upper-class man who supervises all his activities.

At the University of Wisconsin the Interfraternity Conference awards a cup each year to the fraternity having the highest rank for the year, it being held each term by the one having the highest rank the preceding term. At the University of Maine, a senior society has given a cup to be held each year by the fraternity ranking the highest the preceding year. It is to become the property of that one who holds it the largest number of times during the period of twelve years.

At this particular season, the opening of the college year with its attendant "rushing" period, we are, to many minds, in the most critical part of our work. The scholarship standard is just at this moment dependent on the choice of new men. In its report, the committee referred to above, says: "At this point, and in connection with the fact that some colleges require a certain minimum of scholarship as a prerequisite to initiation into a college fraternity, your committee wishes to raise the question whether the present custom of admitting conditioned or inadequately prepared

students is wise or just to the students themselves. We have taken no testimony on this subject, and speak of it only because we believe our fraternities suffer proportionately the tragedies which follow upon a practice which admits to college standing a great many young men quite unprepared to continue their college course. These young men have no foundation on which to build. their studies in college well nigh hopelessly handicapped from the beginning and after a longer or shorter period of residence, are dropped out to the great damage of their characters and the humiliation of their friends. unfair to them—they should never have been admitted. At any rate, it is a question which should be seriously considered, whether our fraternities should be asked to insist hereafter that all students received into them should be in full college standing at the time of their initiation."

In a New England college recently a chapter of a little over seventy-five years' establishment changed its policy of initiation. The situation in which young initiates dropped in the first year took eighty per cent. of the delegation, year after year, demanded attention. By rules made by the alumni trustees, freshmen are now rushed and pledged at the beginning of the college year and initiation is given only to such men as have successfully passed the mid-year freshman examinations. Needless to say the entering delegations remained in toto because of a more exacting scholarship choice and because of an infinite amount of tutoring.

It is the boast of our national fraternity that its roll is not weakened by an inactive chapter. Would it not be worth our while to take our place individually and collectively in this advance movement in the Greek-letter world and discover if it may be possible to add to our proud chapter record the distinction that our chapters are not weakened by delegations broken by failures in scholarship? It can be done; others are doing it and so can we. See to it that you are not a part of the rear van of this forward

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movement. Use any honorable method (never do a student's work for him for that is suicidal to his future) to keep up the scholarship standard of your chapter. If one way is not successful, try another. It is not the method, but the spirit in which the method is developed which produces results. True is the old saying, "Eternal vigilance is the price of scholarship."

#### Williams College

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FRANK P. LAND, CHI '12.

On the 8th of September, 1755, Col. Ephraim Williams, while leading an expedition against the French and Indians, was killed in battle in the neighborhood of Lake George. He had been a wealthy and public-spirited bachelor and his will provided for "the support and maintenance of a free school, in a township west of Fort Massachusetts," where he had been in command. This free school was chartered in 1785 and was transformed by act of legislation, on June 22, 1793, into Williams College.

There are three other great dates which the historian of this college must mention.

In 1806 the great movement of Foreign Missions had its inception here. Tradition has it that it resulted from the conversations of five college mates, then students at Williams, who sought shelter from the rain beneath a Williamstown haystack.

In 1821 certain Williams' men, believing that the Hoosic range was a lasting barrier between the Berkshire valley and the outside world, founded a school by the Connecticut River, which three years later was incorporated as Amherst College. Amherst and Williams are now, and have been for many years, keen rivals in all branches of college activity.

In the year 1836, Mark Hopkins, a graduate of Williams


in the class of '24, became president of his Alma Mater. He gave to her six and thirty years of loyal service and to-day we pay him tribute as doctor, preacher and teacher—the great president.

There are now five hundred students and sixty members of the faculty in Williams. On an afternoon, when the spirit calls, they may tramp over the New York line, up into the Green Mountain State, and back to the college campus again; or up to the summit of Greylock to gaze into the hazy distance of five states and watch the deep dim colors which lend enchantment to the Purple Hills.

Overlooking the rest of the campus West College remains as it has stood for a hundred and twenty years, while the hammers are busy in three new buildings—an infirmary, a dormitory and an auditorium. The college library contains about sixty-nine thousand volumes and is in charge of Librarian Lowe, Chi '06. The science laboratories are the gift of F. F. Thompson, in whose memory there now stands nearby one of the most beautiful of all college chapels. There are seven dormitories.

Of the twelve societies at Williams, ten are national. Their members, comprising sixty per cent. of the men in college, eat in the fraternity houses, and a college commons accommodates a hundred and twenty-five others. The societies own about \$350,000 worth of property. There are no "rushing rules," for the rivalry between societies is not only courteous, but friendly. This is further promoted by intra baseball, in which leagues the "neutrals" and faculty are represented.


The field and the schedules of intercollegiate competition are limited at Williams, but the laurels are not infrequently won by Berkshire teams. Her basket ball fives have won the New England League championship seven times in the last ten years; her track team won the New England Intercollegiate Meet at Springfield last May, and the 1911 baseball nine, with a Chi man, Bro. Davis, in the box, defeated Cornell, Yale and Princeton on their own grounds. Bro.

Davis has been elected captain of the team for the coming year.

There are great names to be cherished in every college and Williams has her share. Her present President, Harry A. Garfield, '85, is the son of a man of the class of '56—our martyred President. Washington Gladden was the first American undergraduate to write a college song, and Williams' men now uncover as they sing "The Mountains." Bryant was a Williams' man—while Bliss Perry and Hamilton Wright Mabie are among those who still uphold her literary fame.

It has been said so often that the Williams man, whatever else he may be, is a gentleman, that this has become the ideal of the college. There are in her ranks the rich and the poor, the brilliant and the dull, the true and the false; but the brightness of this star shines forever over the valley where stands this living, lasting memorial to Ephraim Williams—the Founder.


June 16th of this year marked the fifth anniversary of the induction of the chapter at Williams College, an event observed with proper celebration. In these five years the growth of the chapter in size and the development in quality surpasses the hopes of the founders. It has taken a position in the Greek-letter world at Williams in which it

measures lances with chapters of fifty and seventy-five years' standing. Its leaders are holding some of the most important positions in the undergraduate activities, as these pages have shown from time to time. With this growth in numbers and in importance in mind, and because of the increasing scarcity of desirable locations in the town, it was deemed wise to purchase a house to be held by the alumni association. Twelve of the thirteen societies now own their own houses.

At Commencement in June deeds were drawn up for the purchase of the house of the late Professor Henry Loomis Nelson, in South street. The location is somewhat removed from the college buildings but it is in the finest part of the residential section of the town. The grounds, containing an acre of land, are laid out with wide stretches of lawns relieved by flowering plants and shrubs, shade trees and gardens.

The house is admirably suited to the uses of the fraternity. The rooms on the first floor, four in number, each over eighteen feet square, can be so thrown together as to make an almost unbroken space for the convenient entertainment of a large number of guests. In the ten rooms on the second and third floors are accommodations for fourteen men, the number set by the college authorities as the limit of occupants of a chapter house. The men will take their meals here and the dining-room and the kitchen appointments are generous and modern in every particular.

The chapter considers itself exceedingly fortunate to acquire such a valuable piece of property, and wishes here to record its appreciation of the financial assistance rendered toward the purchase of it by Dr. Walter W. Scofield, of Dalton, Mass., whose son, Walter W., is a member of Phi Sigma Kappa, Chi '08, and Omicron '10.

# Boxer Indemnity Fund

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It will be recalled that the government of the United States, acting through the administration of President Taft, remitted to the Chinese government \$50,000,000, being a balance on account of the amount allowed the United States as indemnity for losses growing out of the Boxer Rebellion. It is of interest to university men particularly, that the Chinese government is using this money for the education of Chinese subjects in American universities, so that we obtain the benefit, notwithstanding we have relinquished our legal claims, and the money goes to our educational institutions and is in fact a subsidy from our government to the several colleges and universities of the United States.

The matter has been brought prominently into mind by the recent conference of Chinese students in the United States, held at Princeton, and attended by over one hundred Chinese students, men and women, and also by the arrival at San Francisco of three hundred students to enter upon their studies at the beginning of the fall term.

The Chinese government selects the students to participate in the benefit of the Boxer Indemnity Educational Fund from competitive examinations held throughout the empire.

China now has about eight hundred students, men and women, in this country being educated by the Boxer Indemnity Fund.

All brothers in the vicinity of New York may affiliate with the club by communicating with Bro. W. S. Crandall, President, 25 Broad street, New York.


#### Chicago, Ills.





### History of West Virginia University


Schools, like men, very seldom leap into prominence in a single day. Sterling worth and efficiency are determining factors in the life of both, and these qualities are only attained by a process of evolution.

In the study of the American institutions of learning, this gradual transition is very noticeable. Most, if not all of our universities have had very meager beginnings, or have been offsprings of schools of lesser learning.

The founding of West Virginia University dates far back into the history of the mother state,—Virginia. In 1814, the Legislature of Virginia passed an act incorporating Monongalia Academy, locating it at a small village called Morgantown. At the time of the passing of this act, the population west of the Alleghanies was scattered. Only twenty years before the government of Virginia had sent General Anthony Wayne across the Alleghanies to drive the Indians from the territory, in which it was now founding a school. General Wayne met the Indians and broke their power, thereby making it possible for the pioneer to push westward and settle the unoccupied land.

Notwithstanding the fact, that this territory was not enriched with the queenly cities of the more fortunate east, the Academy began its existence. The early history of the school is more or less enshrouded in oblivion; but in 1828, the two-room brick structure which had up to this time answered the needs of the school, was sold and a more commodious building erected.

It is instructing to note the method for raising money for educational purposes in those days. The school called upon the State for funds, whereupon the Virginia Assembly, by special act, granted to the Trustees of the College the privi-





lege of raising twenty-five thousand dollars by lottery, the same to be used for the erection of a new building. It seems that this system, which to-day is looked upon with contempt, was in general use at this time.

Under the principalship of Rev. J. R. Moore, the school gained a wide reputation. Students from fourteen states were enrolled during one term. The work done in the Academy was very thorough, and it was justly said that it was Virginia's best school beyond the mountains. In 1850, the Trustees voted to expand the Academy into a college, but this was not done until 1867, when the Trustees turned it over to the State.

In 1862, Congress passed an act donating public lands to the several states for the purpose of establishing colleges, in which agriculture and mechanical arts were to be taught. This act was the germination of the state university. On October 3, 1863, the West Virginia legislature, by virtue of that clause of the constitution which provided for the fostering of education and the organization of institutions of learning in the interest of the people of the State, accepted the several conditions of the Congress of the preceding year and appropriated five hundred dollars to defray the expenses of selling and investing that portion of the land script which might be granted to the State of West Virginia. The national government promptly issued script for one hundred and fifty thousand acres of land, from the sale of which ninety thousand dollars was realized.

No sooner was the land sold than the trustees of Monongalia Academy again conceived the idea of converting their school into a college, which in the future would be to the newly created State of West Virginia what Williams and Mary was to Virginia, Harvard to Massachusetts, or Oxford to England,—her most beautiful ornament and proudest boast. Accordingly they tendered to the Legislature all the property of the Monongalia Academy, valued at fifty-one thousand dollars, on condition that the school be located at or near Morgantown. The offer was accepted by the state and



steps were immediately taken toward the erection of a suitable building for the needs of the new school. The property of the Academy was sold, and appropriation was made by the Legislature, and the corner-stone of Martin Hall was soon afterwards laid in the presence of a large assembly of the state's most distinguished citizens.

What character and style the new school was authorized to assume seems to have been a matter of much debate. Some claim that the congressional act required that the school be used for the exclusive use of training farmers and soldiers; others claim that the act was of more general nature, and that the primary aim should be to meet the needs of general education in West Virginia. The latter construction was decided on, and in addition to a preparatory department, three departments of instruction were established, the agricultural, scientific and collegiate.

On the third day of September, 1867, the school, under the new name of West Virginia Agricultural College, began work with one hundred and twenty-two students and a faculty consisting of seven instructors. The following year the name was changed to the one which it now bears. The growth of the new institution was slow and uncertain. The civil war had just closed, and the state was alive with sectional jealousies and partisanship. In addition to this serious drawback, much property had been destroyed and many homes impoverished by the recent struggle, so that many were without the means to attend college. The state was also without the necessary secondary schools, which are so important in the growth and maintenance of a successful university.

The school had for its first president an educator in all that the term applies, Alexander Martin, D. D., LL. D. Dr. Martin was a native of West Virginia, and therefore knew the defects of the State's educational system. Under his able administration, the State University, notwithstanding the many hindrances, was rising to a high rank in the character of its work. He resigned in 1876, and later became presi-

dent of what is now De Pauw University. While he was president of that institution, it increased from thirty to one hundred and twenty acres in grounds, from old worn out buildings to nine of the finest in the world, from six to fifty professors, from one-hundred and twenty thousand to two million endowment, and from less than two hundred students to more than a thousand. The above record is evidence of his exceptional ability as an organizer. Without Dr. Martin as first president of the University, it is probable that it would have failed. Dr. Martin to-day is looked upon as one of the greatest educators that the state has ever produced, and his name is a household word throughout the state.

Seven other presidents have succeeded him, each of whom has reflected credit upon the constitution. Special mention must be made of Daniel Boardman Purinton, who served the institution from 1901 to 1911. Under his administration the school has developed into one of the recognized institutions of the east. The present incumbent, Thomas Edward Hodges, was inaugurated on November third, nineteen hundred and eleven. Over sixty leading schools of the country took part in the installation exercises. Dr. Hodges is an alumnus of the institution, and has full confidence of the people of this State. His sterling qualities of manhood, his energy, his excellent ability and his devotion to the work and to the institution, cannot fail to give the school an impetus which will bear it forward with the years and make it a great seat of learning.

### **Growth.**

The school has gradually outgrown the political influence of its early days and has permanently established itself in the confidence and affections of the people. Better secondary schools have been established throughout the state and these have had a marked influence in the establishment of new departments, which now number more than twenty-five.

The College of Agriculture has been in continual existence since the founding of the University. Too much credit cannot be given this department for the important part it has taken in the development of the agricultural interests of the State. A large farm is owned, upon which practical farming is done; and the results of the scientific methods used are issued in bulletin form, so that not only the resident student is benefited, but the farmer as well. The College of Law, which was established in 1888 with one professor and one student, has become one of the leading colleges of the school. The College of Engineering ranks as one of the best and most thorough in the country.

The addition of the new colleges naturally necessitated the erection of new buildings. The State has generously supported the institution in this respect. To-day the valuation of the school property exceeds six hundred thousand dollars.

It is interesting to trace the growth in attendance and the relative cause of such growth. The most remarkable growth was coincident with the admission of women. In 1889 women were admitted to take work in the collegiate departments; in 1895 they were admitted to the College of Law, and in 1897, to the school of music and fine arts. The attendance immediately increased from less than four hundred to over a thousand.

### STUDENT LIFE.

The location of the University is such as to draw the student. The campus includes nearly fifty acres of rolling land overlooking the Monongahela. The site occupied by Woodburn Hall, Martin Hall and Science Hall, for natural beauty, can hardly be excelled by any college campus in America.

In the early days of the college there were but few student activities. Athletic games, at that time, were not so popular as in later years. In all student life, however, there is a marked tendency for the students to separate into groups,

according to tastes, aims or interests. The first group of this kind in the University was the formation of two rival literary societies. Factional differences in one of these societies led to the formation of two fraternities—Phi Kappa Psi, in 1890, and Phi Sigma Kappa, in 1891. For nearly five years the two fraternities constituted the only organizations existing in the University, but in later years seven other national fraternities have been granted chapters. Each of the fraternities have chapter houses, consequently, a large percentage of the upper classmen have homes in their respective chapter houses. Recently a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa has been inducted, with which many of the most prominent men in the faculty are affiliated.

Great interest is manifested by the student body in the various branches of athletics. Their loyalty to the football and base-ball teams is especially noticeable, and this loyalty is not lost on the eve of commencement. At many of the larger games of the season the cheers of the alumni body can be heard far above the shouts of the student "rooters."

The University, from its earliest days, has been a nursery of equality. Its dominant aim has been to use its facilities for the enlargement and enrichment of character and of life. How well it has accomplished its aim is reflected in the character of its alumni, who are found occupying prominent places in all of the vocations of life.

Out of a school hedged about with jealousies, opposition and inadequate facilities has grown a university that is doing the quality of work demanded by the progressive age in which it is living. Judging by the wise and efficient administration of the past and present, which has led to such remarkable growth and influence, it may be assumed that the future will be even more prosperous than the past. The recent development of the State's almost inexhaustible resources puts it into position to maintain a university of the highest rank; one that will continue to prove the inestimable worth of its existence by the comprehensive enlightenment it affords the people.

### Delta Chapter

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JAMES H. RIDDLE, DELTA, '11.

Delta Chapter of Phi Sigma Kappa was inducted February 24, 1891, and was the second fraternity to be represented in West Virginia University.

Previous to 1890 there was not a fraternity in the institution. Delta Chapter owes its founding to friction, which existed between two factions in the Columbian Literary Society. The leaders of one party withdrew from the society and applied for a charter in the Phi Kappi Psi fraternity. The leaders of the other faction remained in the literary society but formed the nucleus of Delta Chapter of Phi Sigma Kappa. Delta's charter was granted February 13, 1891. The chapter was inducted eleven days later. The charter members were: I. C. Herndon, C. E. Mayers, W. L. H. Camden, C. E. Vance, J. C. Vance, C. W. Gore, H. W. Smith, R. W. Ramsay, G. M. Alexander and J. A. Grier.

The chapter did not feel the need of a regular chapter room, hence they met in each member's room in succession until 1893. The first initiations were held in a large hall on the corner of Fayette and High streets. The building was owned by Mr. Grieg. In 1893 the brothers decided that a room should be rented for meetings and social intercourse. Accordingly a committee was appointed to look up suitable quarters. The committee reported favorably on a suite of rooms in the old Brock, Reed & Wade building. This was rented and became the first Chapter Hall of Delta Chapter.

The brothers, two years later, gave up their chapter rooms in the Brock, Reed & Wade building and met for a time in Brother Macker Babb's room. The second floor in the "White Elephant," a large white frame structure opposite the present Woman's Hall, was rented. These rooms

were rented for two school years. After returning to school in 1895, the brothers rented rooms in the Garlow building, on High street. Several of the brothers roomed in the rear of the building and a large room in the front was used as a meeting hall. The chapter met in this building for two or three years. Finally the members decided to rent a house. The building at 279 Wiles street was selected in 1905. This house was vacated in the spring of 1907 and a room was rented in the Acme building during the Spring term of school. In the Fall term of 1907–08, the present Chapter House, at 672 North High street, was rented. The building is large and meets the needs of the fraternity admirably.

Too much credit cannot be given to Brothers Trevey Nutter, John B. Grumbein and Benj. Walter King during the period of time extending between 1907–08. Through their untiring zeal the chapter advanced with wonderful strides. Of course, the other active men contributed their mite, but the three men mentioned above were the leaders. During the same period the alumni responded nobly and helped the chapter in every conceivable way. They formed a Chapter Home Association, purchased a lot and subscribed stock in the association. Delta looks with pardonable pride to her sons in active life.

The charter members were influential in every university activity. From the start Phi Sigma Kappa was fortunate in the type of men working up its membership in West Virginia University. They were not only strong and influential as students, but they have served the State of West Virginia in business and professional life with much credit and honor. The standards of Delta Chapter of Phi Sigma Kappa were high at its induction. The representatives of Delta may be seen all over the state of West Virginia conducting themselves with credit to the fraternity. The high ethical and moral standards of the fraternity did not fall on heedless ears.

The present active members are representative men in

college life, not only in mental ability, but in social and physical attainments. Among the active men may be mentioned, that one has obtained the Rhodes Scholarship for next year, influential men in the college Young Men's Christian Association, members of the foot-ball team of 1910 and members of the base-ball team of 1910. All the members are striving to maintain the standards of the brothers of preceding years.


### Delta Alumni in Morgantown

### Minslom Brigham Home, Alpha '81

Winslow Brigham Howe, Alpha '81, was born in Marlboro, Mass., July 23, 1858, and died September 26, 1911. The son of a farmer, he was early taught the necessity and usefulness of labor. Hours of leisure were rare in those days, but in the long summer evenings, when the day's work was over and all the boys of the neighborhood had congregated at the "Corner," "Win" was sure to be the life of the crowd. He was educated in the public schools of Marlboro, and in the fall of 1877 he entered the Massachusetts Agricultural College, as a member of the class of '81, and remained for two years, when, having attained his majority, he decided to give up further study and take up his life In college, as at home, he made many friends and was ever a welcome addition to any group that was out for good, wholesome fun. He joined the Phi Sigma Kappa fraternity within two weeks after entering college and was a faithful and loyal member during his two years of college life. On his return home from college he helped his father and two brothers to carry on the various lines of work connected with a For a while he was working superintendent of a large farm in his native town. On the death of his father, an older brother assumed the management of the home farm, a younger brother took charge of the ice business and he himself looked after a vinegar factory. Later the vinegar business was sold out, the ice business separated from the farming and his whole attention was, for the remainder of his life, given to the ice business, he being at times president and treasurer of the corporation. He served the city as councilman and alderman until impairment of his hearing made it necessary for him to give upall public duties and barred him from the pleasure of many social gatherings.

He was a member of the Odd Fellows and a charter member of Marlboro Grange. His religion consisted of deeds, not in words, and many a poor family will long remember him for the wood, ice and vegetables which occasionally found their way into their homes, for which the only charge was, "See that thou tell no man."

### Lambda Chapter Letter

### JOHN MARSHALL HARLAN

Lambda Chapter asks the Signet to add its token of sympathy to the many expressions in memory of John Marshall Harlan, late Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States. Others may praise or criticize his official utterances; we shall remember him in the capacity of what he was pleased to term "Fellow Students."

For fifteen years, while a member of the Supreme Court, he taught the subjects of Personal Property, Domestic Relations, Torts and Constitutional Law in the Law Department of the George Washington University. He was loved and respected by his students. Lambda often had him among the distinguished guests it has been her good fortune to entertain.

For many years he conducted a Bible Study Class in connection with the Sunday-school of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, where many of us enjoyed his company and lectures.

The writer recalls the pleasure of his association while a student in the Law School. The tears come as he hears in memory the familiar summons to work "Young gentlemen of the law class, give me your attention," and sees the red handkerchief come to view as the lecture proceeds.

His love of home was often referred to in his lectures and was evidenced to the end of his eventful life. We have heard him say, in his own peculiar way, "Young gentlemen, there will be no session of this class to-morrow. On that day I will be sixty-nine years young, and as is my custom, I hope to spend the day with my family."

Justice Harlan was tall, large and well filled out. His physique was commanding and his disposition as lovable as it was jovial. He enjoyed an anecdote, particularly if it told of himself. He often referred to a cited decision as "Very good law, as I wrote the opinion myself." Justice Harlan and Justice White both used tobacco for chewing purposes. A leading newspaper once published a story that Justice Harlan "borrowed a chew" from Justice White. Justice Harlan pretended to be very indignant and insisted on seeing the man who had written the article. "It is all wrong," said he, "it was White who borrowed the chew, not I." He played golf a good deal, and it is said that on one occasion his opponent, a bishop of the Episcopal Church, having missed the ball several times, but making no comment, looked his disgust, which caused Justice Harlan to observe, "Bishop, that is the most profane silence I ever knew."

It was the ambition of James Harlan, one of Kentucky's noted lawyers, that his son, born in Boyle county, Kentucky, in 1833, should sit on the United States Supreme Court bench. This ambition was fulfilled and not only did John Marshall Harlan become an acting Chief Justice of the highest court in the country, but he also was one of its most picturesque citizens.

Lambda is still located at 1717 S street, Washington, D. C., where visiting brothers are welcome.

Brother Frank Barlow, of Beta Deuteron, has taken up the study of Law at George Washington. He has affiliated with the chapter and is living in the house.

We regret to announce that Brother William A. Woodruff is leaving us for Oklahoma. A substantial factor in the life and progress of the chapter since 1906, he has endeared himself to us all by his uniform frankness and courtesy. He has long been our principal entertainer and the first one to be called upon to "start something," no matter what entertainment was desired or needed. Phi Sigma Kappa needs "Woody," may he be spared for a long life that we may benefit by his promising future.

With the departure of "Woody," Adam Kemble remains the "Old Stand-by."

### The Interfraternity Rushing Agreement at Penusylvania

The class of 1915, upon entering the University of Pennsylvania this fall, were confronted by a state of affairs which had never before fallen to the fortune of an entering class of this institution.

By action of the Undergraduate Committee in the previous spring, hazing was absolutely prohibited, and as a result the freshmen were permitted to roam unmolested about the campus. Naturally, the old stereotyped customs of the University, such as the wearing of little black caps and entering College Hall through the basement, were still strictly adhered to, but such senseless rough-house as baths in the frog pond, pee-rades, etcetera, were tabooed.

The most radical change, however, in the environment of the freshman lay in the new interfraternity rushing regulations, the first concerted action ever taken at Pennsylvania along these lines.

In years gone by, it has been the custom among the fraternities at large to round up all preparatory school stars, rush and pledge them, often two or three years before they could possibly shake off the restraining bonds of their prep. schools. By these actions the freshmen entered the University with a large proportion of their eligible members pledged, and those who had escaped notice up to this time rarely remained unpledged twenty-four hours.

It can easily be seen that the result of this would be that the freshman would fail to realize, first, the importance of the step they were taking, and second, the honor that was being conferred upon them; the fraternities, for their part, often misjudged a man and also failed to observe the solemnity that should accompany the inviting a man to become a member.

To offset these, and many other disadvantages of this old system, a new agreement was drawn up and signed by every National College Fraternity at the University save one. In this it was agreed to abide by the following regulations given here in abridged form.

- (1) Not to refer in any manner to fraternity matters to any prospective Pennsylvanian until noon of the day preceeding the opening of college.
- (2) Not to entertain over night in the chapter house any unpledged freshman.
- (3) Not to offer a bid until the first Monday in December, and then not to receive an answer until the following Monday, when the man is expected to answer in writing.
- (4) During the week intervening between the bidding and replying, not to exert any undue pressure.
- (5) To confine the rushing within the limits of the campus, thereby prohibiting theatre parties and dinners in town.

Thus far the system seems to be a great improvement over the previous state of affairs, one of the most noticeable features being that the freshmen realize that they must prove themselves worthy of the honor before they can expect to receive an invitation to join a fraternity. At the opening of college a combined fraternity reception was held in the gymnasium for the entering class, at which there was a monster turnout. Members of all the fraternities were present and were enabled to meet and mingle with the entering class. Representative speakers outlined the provisions of the agreement, and music and refreshments brought the evening to a delightful close.

At Mu there are at present about thirty men under observation, and the character of the men is shown by the fact that they are already making their presence felt in undergraduate circles. We have a pretty firm grip on these men and it is believed that by systematic rushing and not infrequent entertainments and smokers at the Chapter House, that on December 12th, at which time answers to bids will be received, Phi Sigma Kappa will have a goodly number of truly representative Pennsylvanians on her list.

### Nu Chapter Letter

# THE INTER-FRATERNITY CONFERENCE

The third annual session of the Inter-Fraternity Conference was held in New York City on Saturday, December 2, 1911. The Conference was called to order by its chairman, President W. H. P. Faunce of Brown University, who, in a brief address, greeted the delegates.

The calling of the roll showed representatives present from the following fraternities: Acacia, Alpha Chi Rho, Alpha Delta Phi, Alpha Sigma Phi, Alpha Tau Omega, Beta Theta Pi, Chi Psi, Delta Kappa Epsilon, Delta Phi, Delta Tau Delta, Delta Upsilon, Kappa Sigma, Phi Delta Theta, Phi Gamma Delta, Phi Kappa Psi, Phi Kappa Sigma, Phi Sigma Kappa, Pi Kappa Alpha, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Sigma Chi, Sigma Nu, Sigma Phi, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Sigma Pi, Theta Delta Chi, and Zeta Psi.

It will doubtless be interesting to those brothers not in close touch with the workings of the Inter-Fraternity Conference to know its aim, which can best be stated by printing the constitution of this body. The following constitution was adopted by the delegates at the first Conference held in New York in 1910:

- (I) The Inter-Fraternity Conference shall be composed of three delegates from each men's general college fraternity which has at least five chapters and signifies its intention of participating in the Conference. Delegates shall be chosen in such manner as their respective fraternities determine. On roll-call in Conference each fraternity represented shall have one vote.
- (II) The purpose of the Inter-Fraternity Conference shall be the discussion of questions of mutual interest and the presenting to the fraternities represented of such recommendations as the Conference shall deem wise, it being understood that the functions of such Conference shall be purely advisory.
- (III) The Inter-Fraternity Conference shall meet annually at New York on the Saturday following Thanksgiving, unless the place or date shall be changed by majority vote of the officers. Notice of all meetings shall be issued by the Secretary.
- (IV) The officers of the Inter-Fraternity Conference shall be a Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer, elected annually by majority vote.

- (V) In order to meet the necessary expenses of postage and printing, each fraternity participating in the Conference shall make an annual contribution of fifteen dollars. Expenditures may be made by the Treasurer at any time on the authorization of the Chairman.
- (VI) This constitution may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the fraternities represented in the Conference.

The standing committees appointed at the Conference of 1910 reported in turn. Albert S. Bard, Chi Psi, Chairman of the Committee on Relations between Colleges and Fraternities, gave a very able report in which he pointed out the existing conditions between college authorities and fraternities in the institutions of the United States and Canada. The Chairman stated in his report that outside of the existing conditions in Mississippi and Wisconsin there was no open hostility against Greek letter fraternities. The second committee to report was the Committee on Forms and Methods of Fraternity Accounting, which committee was headed by O. H. Cheney, Phi Gamma Delta. The discussion of this subject was opened by William A. Trimpe, Grand Tribune of the Sigma Chi fraternity. Mr. Trimpe gave an able presentation of the financial side of fraternity life, and presented ways and means by which this phase of fraternity work could be improved. This question claimed the largest attention of the Conference and resulted in a standing committee being appointed whose duty it will be to present to the next Inter-Fraternity Conference a financial policy, which may be used by Greek letter fraternities.

Among the other subjects discussed by the Conference was the work of the Traveling Secretary, the Importance of Local Inter-Fraternity Councils, and the Legal Status of the Fraternities with Consideration of Regulation of Time of Initiation. All these subjects were ably handled and discussed by experienced men in fraternity work.

The officers of the Inter-Fraternity Conference are: Chairman, Dr. Oscar H. Rogers, Sigma Phi; Secretary, Francis W. Shepardson, Beta Theta Pi; Treasurer, O. H. Cheney, Phi Gamma Delta.

Phi Sigma Kappa was represented at the Conference by William A. McIntyre, Secretary of the Grand Council, and Donald H. McLean, Treasurer of the Grand Council.

# A LOG CABIN IN CAPTIVITY

THE February meeting of the Council was held in a log cabin in Hartford, Conn. Truly, it was a log cabin, even if, from the outside, it looked like one of the best residences in the fashionable section of the city. It was a log cabin of Brother Joseph E. Root, M.D., Alpha '76, on Farmington avenue.

It came about this way. Brother Root may be termed a sportsman and big game hunter, and so fond of log cabins is he that the interior of his otherwise up-to-date home has been done "log cabin style." And it may be said that a game supper added to the programme immensely.

On February 10 there gathered at this back-to-the-woods palace, the Council, and several Hartford alumni of Phi Sigma Kappa, all as guests of Brother Root and his gracious wife. The Council did its business in the afternoon, and it did it in a hurry, for it knew what was coming.

What happened after the business meeting may best be told by Brother Herbert Judson White, D.D., Alpha '87. Brother White writes how the log cabin was captured:

We went out to fashionable Farmington avenue to enjoy the hospitality of Brother Joseph E. Root, M.D., and his gracious wife, and to visit the Council under such happy circumstances. We expected a treat, but imagine our amazement as we stepped from zero cold without into a real log cabin filled with the warmth and glow of a huge open wood-fire. We had been exhorted to bring our "outing" clothes; had rather doubted the "jollying" Doctor, but when we saw him garbed in blue flannel shirt, buckskin belt and cowboy "chaps" we not only believed all that he had spoken, but were apprehensive every time he reached for his bandanna in his hip pocket.

But we did not have long for the adjusting of our mental processes, for after introductions we were initiated. Everyone who enters that wonderful place must prove his friendship by one of two signs. He must smoke a genuine peace pipe or bury a real hatchet. This safely over, we were gravely commanded to take an old oaken bucket and go to the "Spring" and fill it and return quietly. As the spring was probably frozen miles deep, we were able to fill the order and the bucket at the faucet in the kitchen. As one good turn deserves another we were shown the

Doctor's gratitude by being allowed to help get the supper ready. And such a supper!

It revealed to us the sad fact, that our civilization has robbed life of much of its fun and the table of its good things to eat. There in that log cabin were brothers merrily engaged in all sorts of tasks. Melting lard in a long-handled skillet, peeling onions with tears of joy in evidence, slicing potatoes and all other vegetables known to mankind and Indians, all to be poured into a big savory kettle, where venison was stewing on the log fire. What heavenly whiffs of steam arose from that caldron? What cared we that the thermometer outside had gone on a strike?



To the Reverend Doctor fell the duty of superintending a big Dutch oven wherein baked the most delicious hoe cake ever browned under red-hot ashes.

When all was ready the long table and benches were occupied by a lot of backslidden Americans who had gladly and easily slipped back into barbaric simplicity and who went happy in primeval feasting. First came the big oysters roasted in their shells. Words fail us now as they did then. These succulent bivalves with hot hoe cake and steaming coffee made a combination that one hated to leave, even with the venison stew awaiting us. When at length we did come to the stew and had made deep impressions in the big kettle, we were obliged to say that from that time forward we should have more sympathy for Esau. (You know how he sold everything for a mess of pottage.) There were other things, but most of us had passed into a state of coma—I think it was; at least we were feeling "different," and our one comforting thought was that we were with Brothers and that there were several physicians and two clergymen present.

After supper our lives were saved by the exercise involved in clearing away the remains from the field of battle. Then as we were increasingly able to "show some signs," we, the brothers, were marched in Indian file, each bearing his candle, a real tallow



dip, first into the every-day dining room, where we saw pewter and old china, and then back through the kitchen, down some winding stairs, past the furnace, disturbing peace-loving tabby cats, into the dark far corner, where the fruits of many trees and shrubs, and of many years, were made to yield their "boquets" and to scratch and cool the heated palates.

Songs and cheers ascended through the floor and later the procession itself wound its way to the great log cabin, and there before the huge blazing fireplace we quaffed iced cider, told stories and sang songs until we forgot that we were in the Capital city of Connecticut and that Sunday was near at hand. Around us were the heads and skins of beasts and birds taken in the hunt by our host, who has hunted our country over. Yonder on the log wall were the rifles and other guns, big and little, with which he had bagged his trophies, West and East. There hung the coin-embellished saddle and bridle and rawhide lariat, all from Wyoming; there a rattlesnake skin and so on—the eye kept finding new novelties upon which to feast.

All in all it's the most successful "den" in America and Brother and Mrs. Root are the most successful hosts that we have been fortunate enough to know. It is all an eloquent testimony to the wisdom and originality of nature lovers, who will not be tyrannized by conventionality, but will live their lives and have their fun in the true human fashion.

Accompanying President Faunce's report to the Brown Corporation last fall were Dean Meiklejohn's recommendations which treat principally on the fraternity question. He recommends as follows:

- 1. "The fraternity houses should at all times be open to the inspection of the College Physician and the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds."
  - 2. "No commons shall be established in a fraternity house."
- 3. "After September, 1913, no Freshman shall be allowed to room in a fraternity house, except by consent of the University authorities."
- 4. "No one who is not at this time registered as an undergraduate student in the University shall room in a fraternity house except by the consent of the University authorities."
- 5. "Any resident of a fraternity house whose registration is withdrawn, whether by his own act or that of the college, shall discontinue his residence in the fraternity house not later than forty-eight hours of the withdrawal of the registration."

# PROMINENT MEN IN PHI SIGMA KAPPA

#### DANIEL WILLARD

ANIEL WILLARD, Alpha '82, president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company, the American Railway Association and the Massachusetts Agricultural College Club of New York, was born at North Hartland, Vt., Jan. 28, 1861, and attended the district school in Windsor County until fifteen years of age. He passed the examination for school teachers, and taught district school during the winter of 1876-77 and in the spring



entered the Windsor High School, graduating therefrom in 1878. In October he became a member of the Class of '82 in M.A.C., but was too late to be a part in the first class photo. Brother Willard occupied the only vacant room in the dormitories, on the fourth floor of the sunless side of North College, opposite the entrance of our secret hall. We had already initiated nine freshmen and no more initiations were made from the class in two years. Willard was busy in class room, study or farm work, and the writer knew him as a man on his job.

A classmate, Joyner, now a distinguished civil engineer, writes: "I well remember Willard. One afternoon I with other young hellions engaged in breaking the peace, discovered Willard at work in his room and promptly proceeded to break his study window with snow-balls." It was no easy feat; big Bertie

Kinney, Alpha '82, must have been in that affair. Willard cleared up the mess, fixed the window as best possible and went on with his work. His name received serious consideration in the chapter despite the policy of no more initiations.

Leaving college in March, 1879, because of eye trouble developing from a latent astigmatism, he returned to his father's farm with the hope crushed of eventually studying medicine, and, disliking applied agriculture, started on his railroad career, as follows:

1878, summer track laborer Central Vermont R. R., at 85 cents a day; later, same year, with Connecticut and Passumpsic R. R. as locomotive fireman and so employed for about two years when promoted to locomotive engineer; in the fall of 1883 with the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern as locomotive engineer and such until the spring of 1884, when he was furloughed, or relieved from service, because of business depression; in the summer entered the service of the Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste. Marie Ry., as brakeman on construction train and in a short time promoted to conductor; with this company for about fifteen years as brakeman, conductor, locomotive engineer, roundhouse foreman, road foreman of engines, trainmaster, assistant superintendent and division superintendent. Assistant general manager Baltimore & Ohio R. R., 1899-01. Assistant to the president, and first vice-president and third vice-president and general manager, Erie Railroad, 1901-04. Second vice-president of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy in charge of the operating and maintenance departments, 1904-10. Since, president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company.

The Baltimore Sun on Jan. 18 last, in a column notice headed "Willard Meets His Men," quotes Mr. Willard as saying: "The president of a corporation ought at all times to be glad to mingle with those who work under him. Anything that tends to safeguard the life and limb of men is a worthy cause. Don't hesitate to tell your views when you believe their adoption will be for general benefit. Courteous treatment to those who use the road will go a long way toward increasing its revenues."

In an address delivered in Baltimore, Dec. 8, 1911, to the visiting western Governors, Mr. Willard said, "A railroad is a privately owned business with public functions." The briefest recapitulation of the constructive work done by him in the last two years on the B. & O. would be too long for our limited space. The

Baltimore American speaks of him as an ideal railroad president. Ask any Phi Sigma Kappa man in Maryland and West Virginia what is thought of his work. Seven hours were spent by Brother Willard on the standinthe railroad rate examination, during which he presented a large amount of data and deductions, which will play a very important part in the final settlement of the hurtful controversy between shipper and carrier.

One moving human incident I give: While with the "Soo" one winter he had charge of a roundhouse, in which must always be an engine ready for work; the temperature way below zero, sleeping in underclothes between blankets in said roundhouse, every two hours he got up and fired the four woodstoves. He had also placed about pails of water and, having no other thermometer, if he found the water freezing in the pails, he left the drafts of his stoves open till the next firing.

Brother Willard married, in 1885, Miss Bertha Leone Elkins of North Troy, Vt. Their two sons, Harold and Daniel, will enter the Massachusetts Agricultural College and Yale, respectively, the coming Fall.

As a fraternity matter it is of interest to note that his personal assistant is a former vice-president of the fraternity and member of the Supreme Court, Brother James S. Murray.

The writer initiated into  $\Phi \ge K$  this ideal railroad president and splendid American at the Holland House. This was in March, 1910, and those who attended the Founders' Day Banquet shortly thereafter will not forget the brief address our newest member made, in which he expressed the continuing regret of missing what the large majority before him had had—a full college education!

# RITUAL REVISION

At the last convention, a committee was appointed to revise the Ritual, with Dr. Joseph E. Root, Alpha '76, as chairman. The committee has had the initiatory work exemplified by Epsilon and Theta Chapters, and on March 16 met in New York City at Hotel Manhattan to work out such changes as were thought desirable.

It will be necessary for the committee to meet once more, when they will be able to make comprehensive recommendations at the next convention to be held in Baltimore next November.

### NEW YORK CLUB

T HE Phi Sigma Kappa Club of New York celebrated the 39th anniversary of the founding of the fraternity at the Hotel Manhattan, Saturday evening, March 16, with the usual attendance of loyal sons of The Big Chief and his associates.

Brother Walter S. Crandell, Gamma 'oī, the retiring president of the Club, presided as toastmaster and said in part: "From the apparently insignificant gathering of six young men thirty-nine years ago there has sprung a fraternal order which for the rapid-

ity of its growth and sturdy nature of its branches is the wonder of the college world; in the comparatively few years since the event we are gathered to celebrate there have been created twenty-seven chapters, all of a sound and healthy character, with an aggregate membership of 3,100. We do not lay claim to descendancy from a secret brotherhood of medieval times, nor to an enormous membership, but we do wish our sturdy growth to continue with due conservatism, which will prevent internal dissension."

Responding to the toast, "Lest we forget," Dr. John A. Cutter, Alpha '82, Beta '86, sketched briefly some matters of historical interest, called attention, as in previous years, to the need of paid supervisors, and more specifically noted the parts played respectively by Dr. S. E. Armstrong, Beta '85, and S. C. Thompson, Alpha '72, and J. F. Barrett, Alpha '75, in two serious disciplinary matters in which the judgments reached because of their own life studies proved to be altogether just.

To the toast, "Faculties and Fraternities," Brother Thomas Fell, Ph.D. Munich and St. John's College, LL.D. Hampton-Sidney College, D.C.L. University of the South, and president since 1886 of St. John's College, addressed the Club, giving definite relations of democracy and education, and with a fine explanation illustrated the true principles of fraternity life and the importance of a closer relation of faculties and universities.

"Colleges and Politics" were taken up by Brother Emmet M. Showalter, Delta '92, former assistant United States District Attorney in West Virginia; stating very succinctly that the college man had not used for the public the opportunities developed by his education and that all vices and virtues sprang from the people, he sketched the origin and extension of the new political ideas called the initiative, referendum and recall, described the men who made the constitution of the United States as of the highest culture, erudition and patriotism, and in his plea for orderly and sane representative government, in part said: "A pure democracy, that is, a government by direct vote of the people, may for a time suffice for a small province or canton, but for a nation of a hundred millions of people it is absolutely impracticable and impossible. We constantly hear the stock expression that the people are capable of self-government and it is true that the people are capable of self-government, but they will further display their wisdom and capacity when they reaffirm their confidence in the principles of the Constitution and refuse to remove the constitutional checks and make themselves the only balance wheel for every whim that may be suggested by self-interest and misguided ambition."

"The Coming Baltimore Convention" was responded to by Dr. R. P. Truitt, Eta '10, in a well-ordered address; the brothers of Eta are making preparations for an altogether splendid and fraternal gathering; as one convention succeeds another, each presents new features and "Maryland, My Maryland," will fully live up to its well-known history for hospitality.

"The Founders," Dr. Joseph E. Root, Alpha '76, the third initiate after the founding, and that in the fall of 1873, gave some really new information as to the Founders; such is secret history to be kept locked in the hearts of true brothers, and the reader must get hold of some one fortunate enough to have

been at the banquet for said esoteric matter.

The president of the fraternity, Brother George J. Vogel, Gamma '91, dwelt on some features of his work in the last eight years, expressed his gratification, for the good he had got out of his strenuous labors and thanked the fraternity for the honors conferred on him and the backing it had constantly given.

"Big Chief" Barrett, in replying to Dr. Root, exemplified the intimate knowledge fellow townsmen in a New England village get of one another; enlarging on matters previously brought

out, he dwelt particularly on scholarship and, as a part solution to the pressing question of employing men for supervision with qualifications equal to those of a college president, that endowments in time must come.

The incoming president, Dr. A. H. Sutherland, Mu '05, was introduced and in a brief speech thanked the club for his honors, expressed a full promise to make the next reunion a larger success, and then presented to Brother Crandell, on behalf of the club, a beautiful Phi Sigma Kappa gold watch fob.

## NEW METHOD AT CORNELL

Ithaca, Feb. 4.—A new method of making up the scholarship roll of the thirty odd fraternities at Cornell University has been devised by President Schurman, who has ordered the secretaries of all the chapters to send in a complete list of the names of their members. This list will be turned over to the registrar, who will record the marks each has secured in the midyear examinations, which are just closing, and turn them over to President Schurman. The scholarship standing will then be determined by fraternities instead of by individuals, and at some future time Dr. Schurman will make it public at a meeting of the fraternity men.

In the last few years the president has made public the fraternities who have not lost a man by "busting" at midyears as well as those who have, and the number from each house that have been dropped. He believes, however, that the fairer way is to take the marks of each member of each fraternity, average them up and rate the fraternities accordingly. The purpose of this honor roll is to stimulate study among fraternities and bring their scholarship standing up to the average of the non-fraternity men.—New York Sun, Feb. 5.

# CHICAGO CLUB

N the evening of March 16, the newly organized Chicago Club gave its first Founders' Day banquet in the English Room of the Congress Hotel. About thirty brothers were present, among whom were representatives from Alpha Deuteron, Beta Deuteron and Gamma Deuteron chapters, and a number of out-of-town alumni, including dear old "Chappie" Burrows, Lambda '03, from Champaign. Brother W. A. McIntyre, secretary of the Council, who was expected to be present, was called to Kan-

sas City on an important business matter and his absence was regretted by all.

Brother R. F. Fowler, Gamma '08, acted as toastmaster, and after parting with a few of his famous English stories introduced H. A. Swenarton, Epsilon '05, Lambda '09, who has been president of the Chicago Club since its organization.

Brother Swenarton spoke on "The Chicago Club" and pointed out the need of organizing graduate clubs as a means of bringing the alumni together, of strengthening the active chapters, and the especial need of a Chicago club at this time because of the recent expansion of the fraternity in the Middle West. He then took up the subject of expansion, and spoke of the need of earnest endeavors by the fraternity to secure more chapters in the Middle West in order to bind together more strongly the chapters already located. Such expansion, however, should be of a conservative character, and only in promising institutions.

J. C. Dallenback, Mu '06, responded to the toast, "The Western Chapters."

Brother Dallenback, who had recently been in California and visited Omega Chapter, told of the splendid conditions which

prevailed in the chapter and the growing importance of the chapters in the Middle West.

P. C. Brooks, Alpha '01, responded to the toast, "The Eastern Chapters."

After the toasts, the marching song was sung, and the Chicago Club "quartette," which has rendered faithful service at all the smokers and banquets, gave its repertoire of three songs, ably assisted by brother "Tubby" Jacobson at the piano. The fraternal spirit of "help one another" was well shown by their being allowed to finish without interruption, and it was only when they evinced a desire to repeat their offense that their audience joined with them. The "old boys" suddenly remembered "songs they used to sing in college" and taught them to the rest, while the undergrads sang the songs of Illinois, of Minnesota and of Ames. Finally, the parting ode was sung and the first Founders' Day banquet of the Chicago Club was over.

While the number of brothers who attended the banquet was not large, every man present was a "live wire" and the dominating spirit of the evening was "boost Phi Sigma Kappa." The impromptu toasts and the conversation at the tables showed that our three chapters now in the Middle West have done a great deal to bring the western alumni of the older chapters into closer touch with Phi Sigma Kappa affairs than they have ever been before. And this is strikingly illustrated by the fact that the club has on its membership list alumni from Minnesota and the Dakotas, who otherwise would have little chance to keep in touch with the active affairs of the fraternity. The sentiment carried away by every man was optimistic for the success of Phi Sigma Kappa in the West.

# ANTI-FRAT BILL PASSES

Jackson, Miss., Feb. 22.—Seconding the action of the state senate, the house of representatives of the Mississippi legislature last night adopted an anti-frat bill which orders the abolishment of all Greek letter fraternities, sororities, and secret orders in educational institutions, supported in whole or in part by the state. The bill passed 77 to 22, and will become a law when Governor Brewer affixes his signature.

# "SCHOLARSHIP IN FRATERNITIES"

WE trust that every member of Phi Sigma Kappa has read the article on "Scholarship in Fraternities" by John A. Lowe, Chi '06, which appeared in the September number of the Signet. We consider it a most excellent treatment of a most timely subject. It should be read and discussed in every chapterroom of the fraternity.

Undoubtedly the great question that confronts the fraternity world to-day is the question of scholarship. Beside it all other questions sink into comparative insignificance. Wherever fraternity matters are discussed—at inter-fraternity conferences, in council chambers, in press and periodicals—the problem that ever demands first attention is the problem of elevating the standard of scholarship among fraternity men at college. It is a problem that cannot be avoided. The very progress of events has brought us face to face with it. Phi Sigma Kappa can afford no more than any other fraternity to ignore the signs of the times and fail to fall in with this all-important movement.

The situation is significant. It means that we are learning to lay emphasis upon the things that demand emphasis. It means that we are getting the proper perspective and that we are at last beginning to put first things first.

Manifestly the purpose for which the student goes to college is to study. While there he must meet certain requirements in the classroom. If he fails to meet these requirements, no matter for what course, he cannot remain. Scholarship then is the basis of college life and as such it is the bond that holds the chapter together and binds it to the institution of which it is a part. This is simple logic.

Of course social pleasures and athletic diversions are an important and a necessary part of the student's life, but for him to neglect that which alone makes possible his connection with his college and his chapter is, in the very nature of the case, suicidal. Furthermore it cannot be impressed too strongly upon the minds of Phi Sigma Kappa undergraduates everywhere that the Phi Sigma Kappa ideal is an ideal in which scholarship holds first place and to fall short in this is to fall short of the ideal.

Many methods for elevating the quality of scholarship are being used with more or less success throughout the fraternity world. The article to which we referred points out a number that seem to us most excellent. We strongly urge every chapter to give this matter earnest attention and to adopt such measures to bring about the desired result as it may deem expedient in its own particular case.

We suggest that as a beginning each chapter maintain a card system containing the classroom record of every undergraduate, recording the faculty reports as they are received. Such a system will make the record of every member's work in the classroom accessible at a moment's notice.

## "THE SIGNET" IN DEPARTMENTS

As may have been noticed in the December issue, the SIGNET now carries, in addition to its general features, the following regular departments: Alumni, Chapter, and the Secretary's Department. Two of the members of Council have charge of the Alumni and Chapter Departments, while the editor remains in control of the publication as a whole. Correspondents will send general articles to the editor-in-chief and Alumni and Chapter notes to the brothers in charge. The secretary, not the editor, should be notified of a change of address.

#### AN IDEA

An idea occurs to us which we pass on to the fraternity at large for what it may be worth.

The idea is this—Why should not Phi Sigma Kappa observe Founders' Day, March 15, generally throughout the length and breadth of the Phi Sigma Kappa world? Would it not be a good thing for the alumni, wherever they may be, in large groups and small, to get together on March 15 and recall the days and deeds of the birth and youth of our fraternity and revive Phi Sigma Kappa spirit? It seems to us that there would be something inspiring in the thought that on Founders' Day every alumni is somewhere, in some way, observing the day with his fellows.

The New York Club has been observing the day in most commendable style for a number of years. Can not the alumni in other cities and towns do the same?

We should like to hear from the alumni concerning this.

### THE CHAPTER AND ITS ALUMNI

It is highly essential that every chapter keep in close touch with its alumni. The welfare of both the individual chapter and the fraternity at large demands this. Such a statement, it seems to us, needs no proof. Its truth is apparent. Yet, strange to say, very few of our chapters make an effort to realize it practically. A number indeed do keep in close touch with their alumni but the majority do not. What is the result? The result is not only a loss to the chapter in the patronage of its alumni but a loss likewise of efficiency in the managing of the affairs of the fraternity.

We have said it before. We say it again with renewed emphasis—every chapter ought to keep an accurate, up-to-date record of its alumni. The secretary can keep his records full and correct and can compile catalogues that are complete only as he has the address of every member of the fraternity. The Signet can wield its widest influence only as it reaches the last man. This much-needed information can be furnished only by the chapters. Nowhere can the chapters assist the officers of the fraternity more than in this simple matter of keeping accurate records of their alumni.

# THE SORORITY HANDBOOK

Since the issuance of the December number of the Signet there came into our hands the fourth edition of the "Sorority Handbook" by Ida Shaw Martin.

This most excellent little book has been much improved in form and substance. It is a mine of information and as a handbook of this particular phase of Fraternalism leaves little to be desired. The statistical matter has been enlarged and brought up to date. A number of new features have been added, while the chapters on "The Higher Education of Women," "The Evolution of the Sorority System," and "The Mission of the Sorority" remain, as in the former editions, the best thing we have seen on these subjects. We looked in vain, however, for a

"Table of Contents," the addition of which would materially increase the value of the book.

We commend this book anew to all seeking correct knowledge of the growth and status of the Sorority System.

### THE FRATERNITY MAN

In a recent number of the  $\Delta$  K E Quarterly we find the following:

"It is with justifiable pride that we announce the establishment of a  $\Delta$  K E scholarship at Yale, in honor of the late James J. Hogan. This is the first fraternity scholarship ever established, and it is peculiarly fitting that  $\Delta$  K E should be the first fraternity to take this step and that it should be established at our mother chapter. The basis upon which this scholarship is to be awarded is beautifully typical of our fraternity. It is to be given to the one who gives the best promise 'of being an influence for good in the life of the college.' Our ideals are not limited to the athlete, nor to the scholar, nor to pleasing personality or graceful mien, nor to the men of power or wealth or pedigree, but rise rather to those whose lives extend for the uplift and good of their fellow men."

This is fine. The Signet extends hearty congratulations to  $\Delta$  K E and hopes that the fine example she has set in this excellent movement will meet with wide emulation.

We especially like the basis upon which the Hogan Scholarship is to be awarded. Truly the man who gives promise "of being an influence for good in the life of the college" is a man worth having as a member of any chapter of any fraternity.

College life is peculiarly responsive to the influence of personality. Nowhere is there a better chance to purify the spirit and tone of work and sport. Nowhere can a man make his life count for more in shaping the lives of his fellows. We need men in our chapters who will utilize these opportunities of college life. The time is rapidly passing when fraternity ideals are realized in the man of "pleasing personality" or "athletic prowess" or "social standing." He who would rise to the level of the fraternity ideal must possess something more. He may indeed have any or all of these qualities, but in addition he must have an influence for good in the life of his chapter and his college.

The ideal fraternity man is neither a sport nor a "goodygoody." He is not even first and foremost an athlete nor a scholar. He is above all things a man—wielding a man's influence, taking his stand for right and principle. He asks not simply, "What can I get out of college life?" He asks rather "What can I give to my fraternity and to my college?" This is the kind of man we need and want in the chapters of Phi Sigma Kappa. The establishing of the Hogan Scholarship is a step in the right direction. Will Phi Sigma Kappa follow?

## LETTERS

Editor of Signet.

DEAR BROTHER:—At the banquet of the combined chapters of Pennsylvania, held at the Bellevue-Stratford, January 13, 1912, Chancellor Armstrong in an informal speech advocated very strongly the payment of a salary to the secretary of the fraternity. He pointed out that while under the present method very efficient work was being done, this efficiency could be much increased if the secretary were paid enough so that he could give the fraternity his sole attention. Further, the fraternity needs just such a man who could visit every chapter at a stated time and could see to it that every chapter was conducted by the best of business methods. The method suggested for raising funds was this: let each member of the fraternity be assessed one dollar per year. The membership of the fraternity is nearly 3,000; a fund of this size would satisfactorily pay a secretary. Also let an additional dollar be assessed for traveling expenses. The Chancellor concluded his remarks by stating that Phi Sigma Kappa as one of the leaders of national fraternities ought to be first to institute such a movement among national fraternities.

As a chapter Phi heartily wishes to endorse this sentiment and render its undivided support. We believe that such a man, one who is capable of putting chapters upon a firm business basis and who above all understands how to deal with fraternity men, should give his undivided service to the welfare of the fraternity. Furthermore, we contend that the present system is unfair to the present secretary. It may be said that there are brothers who would be willing to give their services to the fraternity without compensation, but the kind of man we want is one who has had business training and experience in dealing with men. We cannot expect such a man to forego totally his profession for work in the fraternity without a just compensation.

Therefore, Phi Chapter desires to take the initiative in bringing this question before the readers of the Signet.

Dear Brother:—We have heard a great many Phi Sigma Kappa men express their disapproval of the use of the abbreviation  $\Phi \Sigma$  K and, as Chi is very much opposed to it, we would like to see it generally discontinued. We think the expression undignified—it sounds more like a high-school "frat" than a college Greek letter fraternity. We consider the abbreviation "Phi Sig" far superior; it is easier to say and sounds infinitely better. Throughout New England we are usually spoken of as Phi Sigs, and as long as the Greek letters abbreviate so conveniently into two syllables we see no reason for using three which are phonetically as unpleasant as  $\Phi \Sigma$  K.

## BALTIMORE, A CONVENTION CITY

In selecting Baltimore for the next convention the Phi Sigma Kappa has made no mistake, for of all eastern cities, Baltimore is probably the most interesting, embodying as it does ancient and modern phases. For those scientifically inclined, the Johns Hopkins University will afford many hours of pleasant recreation, while at Homewood, the suburban quarters of the University, one will find the botanical gardens and athletic field of more than usual interest. Also the first building of the old University of Maryland, now one hundred and five years old, stands as it was erected.

Those who are historically inclined will find the city rich. From Fort Mellenry where flies our National Banner on the site from which it fluttered on the memorable night when Francis Scott Key conceived our National Hymn, to the old breast-works in Patterson Park behind which lay a gallant band of citizens awaiting the undelivered onslaught of Commander Ross whose forces were defeated at North Point, Baltimore is particularly rich in architecture. There are standing, even in the business district, many structures which were built in the early part of 1800. On Holliday Street there stands a building which was the first City Hall. This building is distinctive by reason of its having been the first building in the United States to be illuminated by gas. Within a few hundred feet is the old, and justly famous, Holliday Street Theatre in which men and women famed in the annals of stageland trod the boards. Close by arises a true relic of the early days—the Shot Tower. This structure, two hundred and thirty-four and one-half feet high, was erected in 1828, and the corner stone was laid by Charles Carroll of Carrollton, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. Not only was it then the tallest building in this country, but it holds its own to-day with the modern skyscraper.

Through the section of Baltimore adjacent to the Shot Tower, one finds the Ghetto, probably as interesting as the Ghetto of New York, and in a measure it is distinctive in itself. This section of the city is known locally as "Old Town," it having been founded by one Jones before the City of Baltimore was incorporated. Throughout this section one may find splendid examples of colonial and pre-colonial architecture. Some of the old houses remain with shingled roofs even at this late day.

While it is natural to seek architectural beauty in old buildings, Baltimore is rich in modern architecture. It has been conceded by authorities that few cities have more beautiful church buildings. One of the most noted of the church buildings is the Old Cathedral, built more than a hundred years ago, and old St. Paul's Episcopal Church on Charles Street.

As the Monumental City, Baltimore is well named. Wherever one turns, there is a marble, bronze, or granite memorial piercing the air. The Washington Monument, the first to be erected in memory of the Father of his Country, is surrounded by memorials to the city's famous statesmen and soldiers. On Mt. Royal Avenue are monuments to the heroes of the Revolutionary, the 18t2, the Mexican and the Civil Wars. It is by monuments that Baltimore honors those to whom honor is due.

As a convention city, Baltimore ranks well not only because it imparts to the visitor that warm hospitality for which Dixie Land is so justly famed, but because of its geographical location. Within forty-five minutes' ride by train or trolley is the Capital of our Nation and the home of Lambda Chapter. An hour's ride by train carries one to the battle-field of

Gettysburg. Distant two hours by hoat and one hour by trolley lies Annapolis, the home of the United States Naval Academy, and St. John's College with the Chapter of Sigma.

Within thirty minutes by trolley is the great plant of the Maryland Steel Company, where are located the greatest railroading mills in the country.

For the epicurean Baltimore has no equal.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

THE Baltimore Convention marked the beginning of what will probably be a new and notable era in the history of the  $\Phi \Sigma K$ .

The keynote struck there was the need for a closer bond between the undergraduate chapters and their graduate organizations. In this way it was felt that the moral tone of the chapters would be raised; that the chapter house would approach more nearly the ideals of the home where the boys, entering upon the most formative periods of their lives, would be surrounded by every good influence.

To-day fraternities are on trial in the college world. If it is shown that the student is benefited by his membership, then fraternities will be allowed to continue and will grow stronger and stronger. If it is shown that fraternities are a detriment to the student, they will be forced out of existence.

Interest in college activities is desirable and is to be encouraged. The number of men that a chapter has on the various athletic teams, the number who have received political honors from their classes, form a good basis for judgment of the chapter. They, however, give no conclusive proof that the chapter is a success in attaining fraternity ideals. The chapter must do more than secure honors; it must surround its members with influences which assist in making better students, better men and better citizens.

The older men appreciate this the most, and it will be the aim of the new administration to draw them closer to those in college so that the benefit of their experience can be obtained. Along the same line, a closer supervision will be kept over the chapters and an effort will be made to establish a uniform system for chapter treasurers. The financial stream requires the most careful navigation and a good chart will assist much in successfully reaching the harbor.

The new government needs the assistance and coöperation of all.

#### **BUSINESS SESSIONS**

OF THE

## SIXTEENTH GENERAL CONVENTION

THE business sessions of the Sixteenth General Convention were called to order at 10:15 A. M. on Friday, November 15, 1912, by Brother George Vogel, President of the Council.

Brother Gilbert J. Morgan, H '07, extended a most cordial and hearty welcome to the Convention on behalf of H Chapter.

The Secretary then read the names of the delegates, Grand Chapter members, clubs, and visiting brothers. Instead of each delegate reading the report of his chapter he turned it in to the Secretary for filing. These were examined and the recommendations stated in them were taken up for discussion later in the day. All chapters were represented with the exception of P.

The President then called for the report of the Secretary-Historian which was read by Secretary-Historian, William A. McIntyre.

The reports of Treasurer and Auditor were read and accepted. Brother E. A. Munsell's report as Inductor was read by the Secretary.

The Secretary read the report of the Council.

The report of the Supreme Court was read by Recorder Samuel C. Thompson.

While the business of the Convention cannot be printed in full, the following will indicate some of the business transacted.

A new method of granting charters was adopted. Upon the recommendation of the Council and with the approval of the Court, a petition for a charter will go onto the floor of the following convention where it will be accepted or rejected by the vote of the majority of the delegates. The decision will then be referred to the chapters.

The recommendations made by the Council and accepted by the Convention were chiefly of an administrative character. The first provided that a committee of three lawyers, who are members of this fraternity, be appointed to draw up a set of resolutions covering the essential features of chapter incorporation, and report the

same to the Council for its guidance. The second asked that a committee be appointed to develop a uniform system of finance books for the use of the various chapters, which system shall receive the approval of the Council and be obligatory on the part of the various chapters. The third was of a nature entirely new in the annals of the fraternity.  $\Phi \ge K$  has had reason to be proud of its unbroken list of active chapters, and on this account the more we record with regret the necessity for this recommendation. After much deliberation the charter of P Chapter was revoked.

These constitutional amendments were carried:

- 1. That Section 1, Article II, Part First, secret part of the Constitution be amended by striking out from said section the words, "and paying the required fees and dues," and further resolved that no initiation into membership hitherto had or which shall henceforth be had shall be considered incomplete by reason of failure to pay said fees and dues.
- 2. That Section 3, 'Article II, Part First, secret part of the Constitution be amended by adding to the first sentence thereof the words, "provided however that the election of such members be ratified by majority vote of a General Convention in regular session assembled."

It was recorded that "It is the sense of the Convention that when a Club of the Grand Chapter shall have failed for two successive years to file with the Secretary of the Council its report as provided by Part the Second, the Second Degree, Article E of the Constitution, such club shall be considered extinct to the extent that it shall have no vote on the adoption of an amendment to the Constitution."

Through the persuasive presentation of Brother Lipes on behalf of B Chapter, the Convention of 1914 will be held at Albany, N. Y. The question of holding a convention in 1915 was considered. Brother Snell,  $\Omega$  '09, extended in behalf of  $\Omega$  Chapter, an invitation to hold a special convention in San Francisco, California, in 1915, and the courtesy was accepted by the appointment of a special convention for that time and place.

With an idea of keeping informed of the development of the universe and colleges of the country, the incoming Council was directed to secure a line of information on all the different colleges throughout the country, to have it on file and ready for the next convention of 1914. With such data at hand, the question of passing on new chapters could be done intelligently and with discrimination.

Upon behalf of the members of the Grand Chapter, delegates and visiting brothers, a vote of thanks is extended to H Chapter for its generous hospitality in entertaining so successfully the Sixteenth General Convention.

The election of officers resulted as follows:

Council—President, William A. McIntyre, M '04; Vice President, James E. McDonald, © '03; Secretary, Donald H. McLean, A '06; Treasurer, Gilbert J. Morgan, H '07; Auditor, Walter H. Conley, B '91; Inductor, James A. Boehm, II '04.

Supreme Court—Joseph F. Barrett, Founder; Samuel C. Thompson, A '72; J. Edward Root, A '76; George J. Vogel, Γ '91; Frederic G. Farquhar, M '00; Elbert A. Munsell, E '01.

The reading of the minutes was referred to a committee of three appointed by the Chair, and there being no further business, President Vogel declared the meeting adjourned at 12:05 A. M. Saturday, November 16, 1912.

N February 2d, 1888, B Chapter of Φ Σ K was inducted. For many years the parent chapter had lived and flourished and had achieved for itself "a local habitation and a name." On that date it altered its status and, ceasing to be a local society, began its course as a general, national fraternity.

We are nearing the close of the first quarter century of the Chapter's history and it is proper that an event of such significance, not only to B, but to the whole fraternity, should be celebrated in a fitting manner.

Toward this end B Chapter will give a banquet in Albany, N. Y., Saturday evening, February 1st, 1913. This will afford an opportunity for B men to renew old acquaintances and for other brothers to form new ones. Announcements as to particulars will follow later.

# SOCIAL DIVERSIONS AT BALTIMORE

"SOME one must have told you," coyly responded the ancient dame, when twenty-one was suggested as her probable age. This quotation must apply to you, Mr. Editor, in connection with your recent request that we dilate under the above caption for the columns of the Signet. While appreciating the honor thus conferred, we suspect that personal acquaintance would have caused a different selection, for certainly an avoirdupois of two hundred and fifty pounds under a head silvered by age is not typical of the society reporter. Rather does this brief description indicate that the writer might properly consider his personal comfort and safety, and claim a position well to the rear, and only a desire to furnish a glorious example to rising generations of brothers has induced us to expose ourselves at your request.

Credit for the goodly attendance at the Convention belongs solely to the Brothers who were present, for the formal notice of the event that came from the Council was repellent rather than attractive; strongly setting forth the duties of the occasion, with scant reference to expected pleasures. As a home for the Convention, the Emerson was entirely satisfactory. Of recent construction, the house is the last word in furnishing and appointments, conducted by a courteous manage-

ment, and maintaining efficient service. Doubtless we differed greatly from the invaders of the recent National Democratic Convention, but we trust those interested in the house were not disturbed because we did not demand "game" at each meal, or "open wine" at all hours. All requested accommodations were cheerfully granted, and leaving, our good wishes remain with the house.

The man of the hour was Brother Morgan, H '07, who in some mysterious way, both in and out of season, was at hand when needed, and always "with the goods." We suspect that he took upon himself more than he should, but if so, he only was punished. Wisely the Convention made opportunity for the Fraternity to become better acquainted with Morgan.

Lady visitors were not numerous, perhaps because the advance notice did not invite them, except by a questionable inference. This may have been intentional, because feminine subjects have since time began provoked discussion where two or three males were gathered together. Being biased we will omit argument, still holding the faith that our ladies will continue a feature of future Conventions. Thanks to the friends of H Chapter, and especially to Brother and Mrs. Shoudy, our visitors were made welcome and fully entertained. A number of excursions were undertaken with success, and we are informed that Mrs. Shoudy's luncheon Friday afternoon was a very cordial and dainty affair, and the many attentions of herself and husband are fully appreciated. We also know something about the tea and reception of H Chapter Friday evening, for we were there, with others, to the holding capacity of the house. From the walls hung the usual banners, eclipsed by the wealth of loveliness beneath. Being presented to a line of stately matrons as being all wives of  $\Phi \Sigma K$ men, we marveled at our brothers' good fortunes, but were utterly unable to express the sentiment at that moment. If we mistake not, we beheld others who expected, or were willing, to qualify for that matronly line. H Chapter can remember its Convention Reception only with pride.

But let us draw more closely to the Convention and its appointed functions, beginning with the "Smoker" of Thursday evening. Our retiring President was at his best, knowing that after being long in office he still was held in love and esteem. Our elected President was also at his best, comprehending that the office came to him after abundant service, and thus adding power to his final appeal.

#### RETROSPECT

GEORGE J. VOGEL, Γ'91, President Φ Σ K 1896-1912

THE presidency of the fraternity in 1896 was a comparatively small matter to that of 1912. In those days we went to New York and learned precedent and procedure of Brother John A. Cutter, who was the founder of our general fraternity. There were only five chapters in existence at that time and necessarily the work was less.

The Secretary, during the years of 1898 to 1902 inclusive, found the work growing rapidly, and during those four years six chapters were inducted.

That is the position which will test a man's ability in careful attention to petty details while working for a high, broad standard.

The two years from 1902 to 1904 cover the term of Justice of the Supreme Court. The development of this branch of the fraternity under the wise foresight and leadership of Brother J. F. Barrett helped to an excellent preparation for the following eight years in the presidency. This conservative expansionist has had to modify his views to meet the growing demands of the fraternity, demands which were expressed emphatically and unanimously at the Lancaster Convention in favor of extension to the Pacific coast. This policy has resulted in a roll of twenty-seven chapters in November, 1912. The great strides made in the development of the chapter roll has not lessened the development of the true, loyal fraternity ideals presented to us in our constitution and secret work. The breadth and nobility of these ideals will be sufficient authority for the statement that the fraternity will continue to grow in numbers and in spirit, and that a member of  $\Phi \Sigma$  K is a truly representative fraternity man.

The writer would express here his appreciation of this long term of service in behalf of the fraternity. It has given him many pleasant hours, much work, and a larger vision.

#### PROMINENT ΦΣΚ

CHARLES SUMNER Howe, Ph.D., Sc.D., LL.D., A '78

The Editor

NE of the things the  $\Phi \Sigma$  K should glory in is the large number of men it has in the places of real power in the country—men who have their hands on the forces which are moving civilization nearer its goal, men instructing minds of the next generation, men righting wrong and interpreting law for protection of innocents and punishment of criminals, men forwarding economic welfare of the market, safety of travel and means of communication, men making two blades of grass to grow where only one sprang before—these are they who by service bring honor to themselves and their fraternity.

The limits of this sketch permit no more than a reference to the work of President Howe, but we wish to mention three phases of his career, educational, civic, and fraternal, not with the idea of adding to the fund of information held by his friends in the fraternity, but with a desire to introduce him to those lately come among us.

The full accounting of the facts of his life and of his achievements would require reams for the telling. Born in Nashua, New Hampshire, in 1858, educated in the Boston public schools, he went to Amherst, where he was graduated from the Massachusetts Agricultural College in 1878, and received the B.S. degree from Boston University. He remained there a year and devoted himself to post graduate studies in mathematics and physics. This work he continued later at Johns Hopkins. As an educator, his experience began in 1870 with the principalship of the high school in Longmeadow, Massachusetts, but the following year found him at the head of a preparatory school at Albuquerque, New Mexico, under the charge of Colorado College. From 1883-1889 he held the Professorship of Mathematics and Astronomy at Buchtel College, in Akron, Ohio, and at the end of that time the trustees called him to the same departments in the Case School of Applied Science in Cleveland. In 1902 they elected him President of Case School, a position which he holds with honor and success to-day.

Wooster University conferred the doctorate of philosophy upon him in 1887. Armour Institute followed with the doctorate of science in 1905. Three years later Mt. Union College honored him with a degree of doctor of laws, and Oberlin granted another in 1911.

They will tell you that he is a member of the Astronomical Society of the Pacific, American Mathematical Society, and the Astronomical and Astrophysical Society of America; that he is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and of the Royal Astronomical Society, and these are important indeed, but I beg to remind you that he holds a membership in over a score of educational societies, and in eleven important civic organizations, not to mention seven scientific organizations of the first ranking. Nor does this mean that President Howe's name is on the rolls of membership in these organizations only; he is a live member and contributed his share to the advancement of the ideals of each. Indeed, he leads among many of them. He served as the first president of the Ohio Association of Teachers of Mathematics and Sciences. As chairman of the sub-committee on industrial education of the Cleveland Education Commission, he wrote the report which induced the Board of Education to issue bonds for the present Technical High School and to open a school of commerce in that city. He is ex-president of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, and chairman of the committee on city finances, a committee which endeavors to do the same work that the Boston Finance Committee accomplishes. He was chairman of the Cleveland Bridge Commission, and of the Cleveland River and Harbor Commission.

In a letter I received only a few days ago from the Mayor of Cleveland this high praise came from His Excellency, Newton D. Baker:

"President Howe . . . has for many years been one of the foremost citizens of Cleveland. He has not sought nor been willing to accept political preferment, nor opportunities for remunerated service to the public, but he has devoted with almost prodigal freedom his large scientific attainments and his genius for painstaking and conscientious investigation to the City's service, and his work in every relation has been of the utmost value to the people. . . . On the River and Harbor Commission Dr. Howe's work has been so broad and far-sighted that his temporary separation (he is on a leave of absence from the city) from it would be a public calamity were it not for the fact that his associates have caught his spirit and will carry on his work."

In speaking of Dr. Howe's presidency of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, the Honorable Munson Havens says:

"The faithfulness of his service was distinguished even in an organization which receives wonderfully faithful service from its officers, committee chairman and committee men. He made the organization a real and vital part of his daily life during the term of his office. With his fine mental equipment he approached the problems of the city on which the Chamber was engaged from the disinterested standpoint and with the painstaking tendencies of a scientist; but he coupled with this the practical viewpoint of a man of business and affairs."

But with all this civic activity the President has found time for club and society life.

The Masonic Fraternity and many scholarship societies and honorary clubs record his membership. And this had origin in the fraternity of his undergraduate days, of which he writes with pleasure.

"I was initiated into A Chapter of the  $\Phi$   $\Sigma$  K during my freshman year. The fraternity then consisted of one local chapter. After graduating I remained at Amherst for a year of post graduate work. As a means of recreation I gave considerable attention to the affairs of the society: from its inception the organization had been a literary society. I fostered the literary spirit and more and better work was done that year than ever before. This was not by any means due to my literary efforts but because college students always look up to a post graduate, or at least it was so in my day, and will take advice from him. In the winter of 1879, it occurred to some of us that our organization ought to be more than a local society and that in order to extend itself to other colleges it would be necessary to have a Grand Chapter, with power to grant charters. Cutter and Fowler, then students in college, and I talked the matter over for many months before broaching it to the alumni members.

"The idea was received with great favor by such men as Barrett, Brooks, Hague, and other charter members and the Grand Chapter was organized in the spring of 1879. If I remember correctly, I was the first president."

On February 1, 1913 B Chapter celebrates its twenty-fifth anniversary of membership in the  $\Phi \Sigma K$ . Its induction was the first development in the  $\Phi \Sigma K$  in growth from a local society into a national fraternity and on this account the more this reminiscence of the origin of the Grand Chapter affords interest.

#### ΦΣΚΟΝ THE GRIDIRON

I is not an uncommon thing at election time to read in the newspapers that it was necessary to close an edition before the full results of the voting are at hand. They say, "Returns in the state election to one o'clock this morning, with twenty-five towns to be heard from, show ———." So in this instance, although it appears from chapter correspondence in the Signer that the  $\Phi \Sigma$  K was represented last fall on many football teams, this writing must be limited to the returns received. It should be remembered at the outset that many of our chapters are located in institutions where there is no varsity football team.

The returns show that while the fraternity has figured more or less conspicuously in the season's gridiron battles, there is promise of greater prominence in the game next season. Two captains, one coach, and a score or more of brothers in various positions, added credit to the name of the fraternity because of clean sportsmanship. We will mention a few of these here.

And one may begin, perhaps, with K, where Brother James Lester Mauthe, of Du Bois, Pennsylvania, by his three years of consistent work at fullback, won the command of Pennsylvania State's successful eleven. For two successive seasons the team has experienced no defeat, and by many critics has been ranked second only to Harvard. Brother Mauthe made the team in his freshman year. His skillful long-distance punting, his terrific line plunging, and his accurate goal kicking from placement, kicking nine such goals and failing only on two attempts, have won for him a place on the mythical All-American.

But much praise for Penn State's successful team should be given to another K brother, Richard C. Harlow, of Edge Hill, Pennsylvania. "Dick" Harlow, '12, a star lineman on former Penn State teams, acted as graduate coach during the season. He devoted special attention to the centers, guards and tackles. His painstaking work was responsible for the splendid line of forwards into which he instilled his fighting spirit and thorough knowledge of the game.

Further South, at the University of West Virginia, Brother Bachman,  $\Delta$  '13, was captain and fullback, and played an excep-

tionally good game during the entire season and was one of the mainstays of the team. His weight and speed enabled him either to plow through the opponent's line or skirt their ends for long gains; also, he did the kicking for the team and in every instance easily outpunted his adversaries. Brother Bachman displayed some remarkable skill and judgment and through his individual efforts won the Allegheny and Marietta games.

With Captain Bachman played Brother Wilkinson, '14, and Brother Knapp, '16. The former played a strong game behind the line, at halfback and quarterback positions, and owing to his speed and wonderful dodging powers became formidable in open field play. He was the best man on the receiving end of the forward passes, and his ability in this direction was the direct cause of three of West Virginia's victories. The latter was a substitute in the varsity back field.

If you have visited N recently you must know Brother José I. Vela, of Ambato, Ecuador. Brother Vela played a strong game at left end, and from his skillful work came sufficiently into prominence to be mentioned for the All-American team for the season of 1911 and also made the All-Pennsylvania eleven. With him played Brother Hoban, T 1912, in his position at halfback. He was directly instrumental in the scores that resulted in such a successful season, culminating in a victory over Lafayette. Brother Hoban was the halfback selection for the All-Pennsylvania eleven.

Lehigh's season proved most successful. Defeated by only two teams, Princeton and Carlisle, and scored on by only one other, a goal from the field, she fought her way to the sixth place among eastern teams.

Although A's representation on the varsity gridiron was not a very large one, she did her share in shaping the first team and can look confidently to next season as one which will see her better represented on the varsity eleven.

Brother Almon M. Edgerton was the only man in the chapter to earn the football M. While he was not the star of the team he was always dependable, and played a hard, consistent game at left end. He played in every game with the exception of one, from which he was kept by a severely injured shoulder. His work on forward passes was excellent and his defensive play was even better. His weight is 160. This is Brother Edgerton's second year as an M man; his freshman year he substituted at end.

Brothers Eldridge and Plaisted, two of the chapter's freshmen, got into the final game of the season with Springfield, but not into enough games to make their letters. Plaisted uses his weight and size to advantage in the line at tackle. Eldridge, in spite of his light weight, 132, made good in the backfield. His speed and cleverness offset his lack of weight and make him practically certain of a varsity position next year. Plaisted can also be counted upon as a varsity man next fall.

In the annual freshman-sophomore football game A was represented by nine brothers. Brother Jordan captained the sophomores and had with him Brothers Fuller, Brooks and Tonry. The latter broke his leg in the interclass game a year ago but was back this fall in his old position. On the freshman eleven Eldridge was practically the whole team, making possible all the freshman points and contributing some spectacular runs for long gains. With Eldridge on the freshman team were Brothers Scheufele, Murphy, Plaisted and Verbeck.

Going farther West, but still within the confines of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the  $\Phi \Sigma$  K was represented on the Williams varsity by Brothers Beverley Montagu Eyre, '13, and Frederick Clowes Hewlitt, '13. Brother Eyre played the position of center in part of four games during which his offensive and defensive work was steady. Brother Eyre is captain of the varsity swimming team. Brother Hewlitt played throughout the season a good game at center while on the offensive. In defensive formations he shifted to right tackle. There is something of a coincidence in the fact that these two members of X should have played the same position on the team and both win their W's for their creditable work. They are both twenty-one years old, both six feet tall, but Brother Eyre officially weighs one pound more than Brother Hewlitt, who turns the scales at 174. In the intercollegiate rating the Williams team was placed sixth.

In the annual freshman-sophomore football game three of X's freshmen played on the team and won their numerals. Brother Seibert played right end, Brother Bacon left guard, and Brother Guthrie right guard.

From the Middle West comes good reports of football interest among the brothers of A<sup>Δ</sup>. On the University of Illinois varsity Brother Norman K. Wilson, '14, of Chicago, played the right end position with much credit to himself. He was a member of

the Illinois track team and ran on the relay team which competed at the Pennsylvania games last spring. His sprinting ability was a valuable asset to the team. By his skill in handling the forward pass Brother Wilson made long gains. His defensive work was excellent.

Brother Rühl, Z '13, played quarterback on the freshman varsity. He has shown considerable ability and the fraternity may look for him in the Illinois varsity line-up next season. Brother Ralph W. Bunge, '13, played fullback on the senior team.

On the University of Pennsylvania varsity M had a representative in Brother Craig '15. This season was his first on the varsity squad. Last year he played quarterback on his freshman eleven and shone on offense and defense. This fall he made the position of quarterback on the varsity, competing against the regular backfield of the previous year for his position. While in the game his playing was always brilliant but unfortunately he was injured and was out of the last two games. Brother Craig still has two more years and big things are expected of him in coming years. The athletic council awarded him his letter recently.

During the football season of 1912 Swarthmore produced one of the most successful football teams in its history in spite of a departure of the college from its former policy of confining its football schedule to the smaller colleges. Swarthmore records victories over the University of Pennsylvania, the Navy, and Lafayette.

Φ Chapter had two regular varsity men on the team, Brother Leroy Durborow and Brother Raymond Albertson. Brother Durborow played a good game at end and was in nearly every game. Brother Albertson at guard was regarded as one of the mainstays of the line. He was the only freshman to receive his letter. Brother D. Murch was sub quarterback and played in one regular game. Brothers Thomas and Martin played on the sophomore team and Brothers Pohlig, Gowdy, and D. Murch on the freshman team. Brothers Thomas and D. Murch were captains of their respective teams.

And for the rest of the football men, about whom no information unfortunately is at hand, there are many who played good games in honest sport, and many we doubt not who won their letters. We received three pictures which we could not reproduce on account of space.

Therefore, why not have an All-American  $\Phi \Sigma K$  team? Those in favor say "Aye"; opposed, "No." The "Ayes have it." So here's a go, and if any  $\Phi \Sigma K$  football brother knows that he ought to be on and isn't, let him avenge himself on his Signet chapter Secretary for not having sent fuller information about him, and see to it that there is something to be sent next year and that it is sent.

#### THE GRADUATE AND THE CHAPTER

I T seems to me that . . . it would be well to look matters in the face, and to take heed of the things which surround us. The fraternities are on trial in the University of Pennsylvania, and unless they are able to demonstrate more clearly than they have in the past that they are good things, the university will in all probability adopt a policy which will not be helpful to the fraternities. The reason is that the fraternities of Pennsylvania have turned themselves, as in many other institutions, into political clubs. They have started a system of rotten politics which has permeated every form of student life, which has made it almost impossible for about nine-tenths of the representatives in the university to have any representation, and a non-fraternity man is discriminated against. Secondly, instead of the fraternities helping to maintain a healthy student spirit, both scholastically, morally, and otherwise, the attitude seems to be purely indifferent or entirely negative. The boy comes to college to be broadened out, and his parents sent him there to be educated. There is entirely too little disciplinary work done by the fraternities, and there are entirely too many fraternity boys whose names later appear on the police court blotter. There are too many of these boys who flunk out of college. So also they form bad

habits which count against them when they get out into the world. Instead of the fraternity being a home, where proper influences are exercised, a great many of the fraternities are becoming nothing more nor less than an atmosphere which rules the weaker man who goes into them. It seems to me that this is a bad situation. Unless the fraternities remedy this situation most people will find that the fraternities will be banished from a great many institutions in the next ten or fifteen years.

However, I did not start to preach a sermon. We have discovered at M that the fellows who are "rounders" did not come up in their work, are undesirable fellows and are usually the men who are in debt with the fraternity. They take the money which they spend down town from the fraternity. In other words, they spend too much money down town. What does this mean? It means that the other fellows in the fraternity have to make up the deficit or bad losses, of which there are always some from these chaps.

Now we have come to a point where the graduates have to do two things. First, to make the boys live within their means and keep them from running into debt. Second, a moral responsibility resting on the graduates to see that the fraternity represents the right ideals. We certainly ought to keep the fraternity in good financial condition. We ought to have the affairs conducted on good business methods. The graduates should have an individual say in this matter and go out and stop things when the active chapter is running bad. The graduates themselves as a body ought to have some sort of graduate control by all of the graduates of the chapter. I believe it would have a superior influence and would be a distinct benefit to the fraternity at large. (Spoken at the Convention.)

#### ΦΣΚ BASEBALL CAPTAIN

#### "Champ" Davis

Φ Σ K held a position of prominence at Williams College during the successful season of baseball last spring. Although the college turns out creditable teams in the major and minor sports, its greatest reputation in athletics is made in baseball and basketball. This year the varsity won the enviable distinction of intercollegiate champions of the East. In a schedule totaling fourteen games all but three were won, numbering victories from Yale (6-1), Princeton (2-0), Cornell (8-5), Dartmouth (2-0, and 4-1), Holy Cross (6-1). Considerable credit for these results is due to Brother George Davis, X 1912, for his phenomenal pitching, and for the masterly way in which he handled the team as its captain.

Brother Davis is the son of Senator George A. Davis, of New York State. His early training was secured at St.

John's Military Academy, Manlius, N. Y., and there he gave promise of his ability as a baseball player. He pitched on his school team with great credit to himself and honor to it, and it was only natural that his record at Williams should be a continuation. He early won the distinction of being the strongest man physically

in the college, an honor which he held through his course. In a recent strength test by the metric system, he established the remarkable figure of 1,659.5. This record exceeds that of Hardwick, the strong man of Harvard by 388.5 points and that of Huntington, Harvard's strong man last year by 356.2 points. Notwithstanding his love of athletics and his interest in baseball which is simply for the pleasure of playing the game, Brother Davis has a high scholarship record, and has developed a true literary taste.

Although his pitching during the past college season may not have been as spectacular as it was in former years, yet his steadiness and control throughout have been especially noticeable. In his Sophomore year he attracted considerable attention in the baseball world by winning the West Point game (2-1) in 1909, by pitching a no hit game against Massachusetts Agricultural College and by winning a closely contested game against Dartmouth in the same season. On May 2, 1912 he struck out twenty men in the game against Wesleyan. Last year he was given an inter-collegiate ranking of second pitcher, and this year was selected as first pitcher on that staff.

Through the past summer months Brother Davis has pitched with the New York Americans, where he made a creditable showing.

Our toast to you is: "Here's to four years of hard work, high attainment, good times and successful graduation."

In these days of rush and hurry are we so busy that we cannot keep alive that thing which is invaluable, without price, our friendship? Do we join our college and our fraternity just for four short years? Does all end with graduation? Not so. Our truest friendships are made eternal and we cherish them as we may. THE SIGNET is much pleased to record the fact that from their own statement the authorities of the University of Missouri "realize the important part which fraternities may play in the development of proper spirit and standards in the University, and desires very much to coöperate with the various chapters represented here and the national officers." They are planning to keep the national officers informed of the scholarship of all chapters in order that good may come to the University and to the chapters. We hope other institutions will follow this excellent lead.

In a recently issued comparative scholarship statement for the year 1911-12, the chapters were ranked according to the per cent. number of subjects carried with a clear record. In a list of twenty fraternities  $\Phi \Sigma K$  was ranked eighth, as the chapter average was 84.69 per cent. The highest average was held by  $\Delta \Upsilon$ , 92.49, and the lowest by  $\Theta \Delta X$ , 67.93 per cent.

THAT this is a critical period for fraternities is recognized by a watcher of the times. Several speakers at the Convention echoed it. President McIntvre strikes its warning note in his message. The magazines of the Greek world make it apparent that the fraternities have heard and are responding. Some of them are making a strenuous campaign for the betterment among their chapters of two fundamental things, scholarship and morals, and it is this response that gives us hope for a successful weathering of the coming storm. Only it behooves us one and all to gird us to the limit of our strength if we hope to win. What are we doing about it, each of us in his own chapter, this bringing about more nearly ideal conditions? Is our chapter making a distinct contribution to the welfare and uplift of our community, or is it a social parasite, drinking out a petty, mean existence of selfish indulgence? The time to build the dike securely is before the rains fall, not when the mountain torrents are even rushing down through the valley.

For while the rabble, with their thumb-worn creeds,

# In Memoriam

"We live in deeds, not years; in thoughts, not breaths; In feelings, not in figures on a dial—
We should count time by heart-throbs. He most lives
Who thinks most—feels the noblest—acts the best.
Life's but a means unto an end—that end
Beginning, mean, and end of all things—God."

Hubert A. Lane, E '99, died October 18, 1912, at Craig, Mo., after an attack of typhoid fever. He was associated with the Madison Dredging Company.

On Saturday, June 29, 1912, Brother Willard F. Williams,  $\Phi$  '13, was killed at Atlantic City. His body was ground to a pulp between a train and the platform.

Arthur Albert Hofmann, M '09, treasurer of the  $\Phi \Sigma K$  Club of Pittsburgh, died on December 26, 1912, at 4727 Center Avenue, Pittsburgh, after an illness of several weeks from heart disease. He was 27 years old, a graduate of the Pittsburgh High School and the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. After his graduation from the university in 1909 he became credit man for Heeren Brothers, a firm of jewelers with which his father and two brothers are connected.

Brother Hofmann is survived by his widow, a bride of less than a year, Hazel Johnston Hofmann; his parents, Frederick and Olga Hofmann, and two brothers and a sister.

Funeral services were held at the family home Saturday, December 28, and several of the members of the Pittsburgh  $\Phi \Sigma$  K Club acted as pall-bearers.

Brother Hofmann always took an active interest in fraternity affairs and was one of the most popular members of M Chapter while at the university and later as one of the organizers of the Pittsburgh Alumni Club. His loss is keenly felt by the brothers in Pittsburgh and members of M Chapter who were at the university with him. In spite of intermittent periods of ill health, Brother Hofmann was an indefatigable worker and always cheerful and in seemingly good spirits. The Pittsburgh Club and other members of  $\Phi \geq K$  who knew him extend their heartfelt sympathy to his bereaved wife and family.

Dr. Matthew J. Elgas, an honorary member of Z Chapter, died suddenly in Buffalo on September 1, 1912, of heart failure. The news of his death caused widespread sadness, especially among his teachers and former pupils. He was looked upon as the real founder of the night school system and as one of the most beloved characters of the entire New York educational system.

Dr. Elgas was born in Buffalo, December 24, 1844, educated in the schools of that city and at Fordham University, where he was graduated in 1862 with high rank. About four years afterward he was appointed principal of Public School 69. Fordham gave him A.M. in 1863 and Ph.D. in 1866. For twenty years he was principal of Public School 69 and conducted "the kid glove school" with great efficiency. In 1896 Dr. Elgas was elected assistant city superintendent and then began his great work as an executive. The school system greatly expanded. Dr. Elgas organized the course of study to meet the needs of the students and got a law passed permitting teachers to take evening school positions without passing examinations. He introduced courses in industrial training and similar branches. He also took steps to induce the Regents to recognize the work of the night schools.

Dr. Elgas was married in 1873, and Mrs. Elgas and her three sons survive—Francis Bertran, a lawyer; William Taylor, Z '96, a stock broker; and Matthew T., Jr., Z '99, an insurance broker. To our brothers and their esteemed mother the Signet expresses the sincere sympathy of the fraternity for them in their loneliness.

In an editorial the editor of *School* says: "For over half a century Dr. Matthew J. Elgas . . . seemed to be almost an institution. He will figure in the history of the schools of New York as the real founder of the night school system. For forty years he was associated with this work and more than any other man made the night schools a great power in the training of boys and girls and also men and women for useful occupations. . . . But in his profession Dr. Elgas will probably be more valued as a trainer of teachers and of boys and girls. The simplicity of his methods and his gentle, diplomatic, but firm ways characterized the man. He always brought with him an atmosphere of cheerfulness, brightness, helpfulness, which made him one of the most beloved men in the system."
