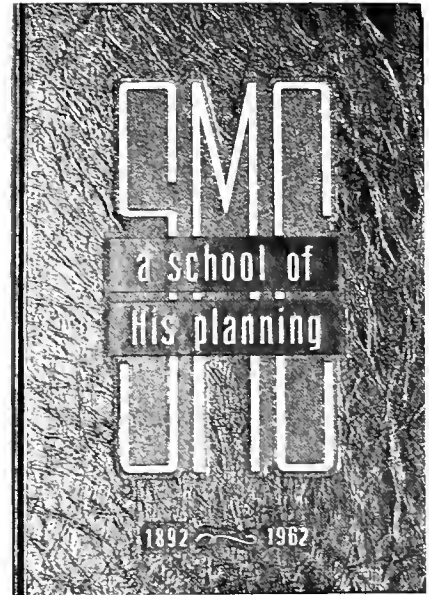

LEO FRANCIS THIEL

Leo Francis Thiel died in March, 1965, at Madison, Tennessee. He was president of Southern Junior College for two periods: 1916 to 1918 and 1922 to 1925.

He was born in Alexandria, South Dakota, on November 16, 1888. He received his B.A. degree in 1911 from Union College and his M.A. degree from the University of Nebraska in 1931.

He held positions as professor of English at Walla Walla College from 1918 to 1922, at Oakwood Junior College from 1928 to 1931, at Washington Missionary College from 1931 to 1943, and as president of Union College.

From 1947 to 1952 he was book editor of the Southern Publishing Association in Nashville, Tennessee.

Unique Plans Set By SMC Alumnus

Robert Hamm, '48, now lives at Collegedale, where his wife is a student at SMC while he is finishing his master's degree at the University of Chattanooga.

He has served as a missionary in Colombia, South America, for 11 years and plans to return to eastern Colombia and begin an educational program under non-denominational support. This support is a private corporation, which is drawing its support primarily from medical groups on the west coast.

His ministry of education and also medical aid are the tools he desires to use in bringing a better way of life to the Colombians. His plans include setting up a village-to-village radio network and taking back with him an airplane to aid him in traveling to the villages.

In 1961 he and his wife founded a school with equipment from CARE and started classes under the trees until thatched roof buildings could be erected. The enrollment of that school has mushroomed from 10 the first year to 80 this year.

When he returns to Colombia, he hopes to purchase a 500-acre tract of land on which to build the training center. Students will gain practical experience by constructing the school and farming the land to provide food for the school. This experience plus two years of classes in nutrition, preventive medicine and educational subjects will supply the students with knowledge when they establish primary schools and teach agricultural methods and hygiene in their own villages.

H. H. HAMILTON

H. H. Hamilton, former president of Southern Junior College from 1925 to 1927, died earlier in 1965 at Riverside, California, at the age of 86.

He was a well-known denominational educator, and beginning in 1906 he taught at Keene Academy and Southwestern Junior College.

Later he was president there and at Washington Missionary College, besides being president at Southern Junior College.

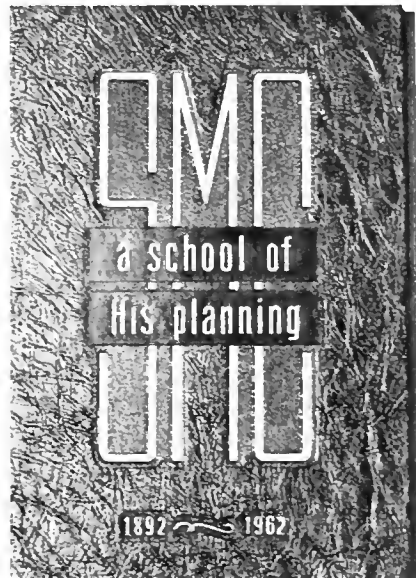

Harry Sylvester Miller, science teacher at Southern Training School in 1905, died at Roseburg, Oregon, May 13, 1965.

In 1907 he was ordained to the ministry. He was called to Oshawa Missionary College in 1915, and he became Bible instructor at Canadian Junior College in 1921. In 1926 he became head of the Bible Department at Southwestern Junior College, where he remained until 1941. He taught Bible at Ozark Academy, was pastor of the Jefferson, Texas, church, and continued as a leader in as many as five small churches in western Oregon after his retirement.



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
