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P R E F A C E .

This Manual of Sacred Song has been prepared with express reference to the wants of the people worshipping God, either in the Sanctuary, the Prayer and Conference Meeting, or at the Family Altar.

The Editor has had access to extensive materials in Poetry as in Music ; and has endeavored to bring together into this single work the most valuable Hymns and Tunes of ancient and of modern times :—hymns rich in sentiment, as well as dignified in style ;—music pleasing in melody, as well as correct in harmony ;—such, indeed, as the people love to sing.

The Hymns will be found to cover the leading doctrines of Christianity, and to meet the various conditions of our Christian life and culture, and the different occasions, whether public, social, civil, private, sad or joyous, on which men meet to worship God. An unusual number of them, however, refer to Christ and his offices, and to the Holy Spirit as manifest in the work of missions, in revivals, and the extension of the Church. It is hoped, therefore, that the work will prove eminently devotional, inspiring and PRACTICAL.

New times develop new phases of religious experience ; new plans, new fields of action ; and these, in turn, demand new hymns, new music, new life, new beauty.

Good compilations in psalmody and hymnology are now before the churches ; but the churches are advancing, and thus, are needing better ones ; they CALL for them ; and hence, this fresh effort to select the “ best from the best,” in order to meet this want so naturally, so deeply felt ;—so earnestly expressed.

Much of the matter in this book, including Hymns as well as Tunes is copyright property, and is here printed by consent of the proprietors, without whose authority it cannot be published.

To such persons as have, by furnishing hymns or tunes, aided him, in his laborious undertaking, the Editor would tender his most cordial thanks ; and would, also, express the hope that this new contribution to the music of the house of God may serve to bring many voices to ascribe still loftier praises to Immanuel's name below, and also help to swell
